
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
About the Cover

thereal Painting is a style of art that aims to evoke a sense of the otherworldly or imagery that appears dreamlike or mystical. 20th century artists like H.R. Giger and Frank Frazetta introduced otherworldly paintings into the covers of sci-fi magazines and books. The Fantasy genre in books, movies and games also helped propel the ethereal motif and grew even more so through conceptual art used in games with the use of digital tablets and art software. Unfortunately a lot of it has been taken over by AI even though it can be programmed to do some beautifully renderings.

Ethereal painting often involves the use of soft, diffused lighting and a subtle, muted color palette to create a sense of atmosphere and depth. Artists may employ techniques such as glazing, wet-on-wet blending, layering



and delicate brushwork to achieve a luminous, ethereal quality in their work. The focus is often on creating a sense of harmony and tranquility, inviting the viewer to contemplate the beauty and mystery of the world around them. Ethereal paintings often celebrate the beauty and majesty of the natural world, portraying landscapes, seascapes, and celestial phenomena with a sense of awe and reverence. These works may evoke the sublime – a feeling of overwhelming grandeur and mystery in the face of nature's vastness.

While ethereal painting can encompass a wide range of styles and subjects, common motifs include ethereal landscapes, celestial bodies such as the moon and stars, heavenly beings or spirits, and abstract representations of light and energy. I am a professional artist based in East Sussex who creates large semi abstract landscape, seascape and wildlife paintings in oil on canvas. My painting style is very distinct and fuses art-nouveau, impressionist and semiabstract techniques with traditional portraiture that reflect my love of nature, animals, birds and the flora and fauna of the landscapes around me. My main working method has been the development of a painting style I term 'memory impressionism'. This method involves walking somewhere, looking at and absorbing the things I see and experience, and then returning home to my studio to try and capture an echo or essence of the place from memory including any wildlife I may have seen. By this method I can capture essences and echoes of places and the feeling I have about them. I love the ancient landscapes of England and my paintings often reflect the spiritual elements that such landscapes have.

As a child, I taught myself to draw and paint by copying pictures from wildlife and horse books on an almost daily basis and the skills I acquired were added to throughout school and art college. However, my first real introduction to life as a working artist began on leaving art college when I discovered that the Brighton art galleries and the local job centre did not, at once, sign me up for a glittering career as an artist. In the job centre, when I informed my consultant that I had a Fine Art degree, the lady laughed sympathetically and then offered me a job as a chambermaid (which I took).

In the art galleries I visited, I was told I needed to be an 'emerging' or 'midcareer' artist in order for them to be interested. I tried to convince them I had, in fact, 'emerged' at age 3 but my reasoning failed to impress and so like millions before me I discovered the well-known issue of needing to be 'a name' before I was 'a name'.

However, regardless of not winning the Turner prize or being Picasso, I continued to draw and to paint and regularly took part in or organized exhibitions where I sold work or was given commissions. In the 1990s I met an art agent who traveled the area selling animal portrait commissions and I became one of the artists he represented which was excellent experience as it demanded I learn some formal portrait painting techniques. Commissions continued as my main income source until around 2010 when I first began to sell art online. The success I had on this gave me the opportunity to spend more time developing new ideas and techniques and, for the first time in my career, I painted for my own pleasure, eventually developing a distinctive style of my own. I am a self-representing artist. Although I am happy to work with galleries and agents occasionally, I prefer to remain in control of my own creativity.

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Artist Showcase Chicago, IL, USA Janice Aponte

JANICE APONTE is a visual artist based out of the city of Chicago. Aponte was born in Ponce, Puerto Rico and grew up in New York City. At the early age of 8, she began her creative journey and instinctively drew and sketched. During her childhood and adolescence, she relocated between New York and Puerto Rico several times. As a result, she faced the challenges of continuously readjusting to a new environment and cultural values. Despite these challenges, one thing was constant, her love and intuition for art. She continued practicing her drawing skills as a selftaught artist and in time obtained a degree in Business in Ponce, Puerto Rico. Soon after graduating, she relocated to Chicago with her family and worked in the Accounting-service industry. Motivated by her need to create, she enrolled in private oil painting lessons. It was a way to cope with the everyday chaos and create a space that was hers. This pathway helped her discover a world that would impact her life's journey. She cultivated the creative skills within her, transitioning from paper and pencil drawings to oil paintings. As a self-taught artist her earlier paintings drew inspiration from influential artists such as Picasso, Monet, Kahlo and others. Throughout the years, and with much perseverance, Aponte developed her own distinctive style and solidified her unique voice in the arts, using it as an anchor for empowerment and purpose. Today she showcases her body of work in her own gallery located in the vibrant neighborhood of Jefferson Park in the city of Chicago.

My art is continuously inspired by my travels, human interactions, and my lived experiences. During my creative process I am releasing energy and heightening my sense of self, discovering more of who I am, not only as an artist but as a woman. I connect with others through my art, which invites the viewer to step into my world while empowering them to tap into their emotions and experience a personal interpretation of my work.

It is at my home studio in the city of Chicago where I create my body of work. I use various mediums and tools to create texture in my paintings, such as brushes, sponges, and combs. Of all the tools I use, my favorite is still my bare hands and pallet knives! I love to work in layers, which add depth and substance to my pieces. While I prefer oil paint, I also love using oil pastels, acrylics, and experimenting with mixed media. My work is a mix of expressionism and realism that evokes femi-

ninity, love, and celebrates my cultural roots from mi bella isla, Puerto Rico. Some of my work is planned, compositions sketched, but in the past 7 years, I have created new work through a more intuitive approach. These sessions are somewhat more physical and have their unique experimental moments. I start with an idea, mark my canvas or draw a rough sketch and let the moment lead me. This is usually accompanied by some good music and lots of isolation. These pieces are more abstract in nature and heavily textured. You can see these techniques developed in my topographical pieces and textured Flamboyance. Some of my most enjoyable subjects are feminine in nature; whether it's a portrait, landscape, or an abstract, you will always find curvaceous shapes and playfulness in my colorful pallet. Other ways that I channel my creative thinking is in the form of fashion and jewelry design, carrying my own label AponteART.

Peter Olsen-

Then Artist Peter Olsen left his hometown New York studio for the paradise of South Florida, his classical training, experience, and versatility opened doors quickly for opportunities. He placed a small ad in the newspaper and soon began painting beautiful commercial and residential murals of tropical seascapes and themed landscapes. Then came commissions for paintings of varied themes and book illustrations.

Years later, in the midst of an 'other worldly' project, he was given a book with an outer space themed cover. A random glance inside revealed an intriguing passage about an angel described as a heavenly being having one foot on the sea and one on land, the countenance of the sun, clothed in a cloud with a rainbow upon his head, feet like pillars of fire, and more. When Peter read this, unaware of its origin, he said "I have to paint this!" That book changed Peter's focus, his heart, and his life. The painting, "The Rainbow Angel", became the foundation artwork that changed his career. The narrative for this painting is Chapter 10 of the Book of Revelation, a magnificent book that encompasses the past through the future with content of drama, surrealism, and joy.

50 years forward, the project has expanded in concept, has over 2,000 works, and continues to grow. The collective "Sacred Visions in Art" is based on the narrative and themes of the Old and New Testament. Mediums are oil, acrylic, mixed media, pyrography, pen and ink. His art has been shown in museums, art centers, schools and universities, religious facilities.





Russian-Israeli painter. Born in 1964 in Kuibyshev (now Samara), Russia. In 1986 he graduated from the Architecture department of the Academy of construction and architecture (diploma with honours). He has been painting watercolours since 2016. The main theme is architecture and urban landscapes.

Andrei Samolinov is a member of Israel Painters & Sculptors Association, International Watercolour Society (IWS) and the Union Watercolour Russia (UWR). Participant in 5 solo and more than 40 group exhibitions. His works are in private collections in Russia, Australia, France, Georgia, Spain and Israel.

In his watercolors, the artist seems to rise above his object, becoming a kind of "genius loci," its patron spirit. At the same time, the viewer can really feel the master's impression; understand his emotions caused by interaction with the urban environment and architecture. All his works are full of the movement of space, air and light.

"...Watercolour, for me, is more of an adventure than work. Water and paper always strive to go their own way, and I'm always trying to adjust what's happening, but not so much in the direction I want, but towards maximizing the aesthetic component - and until the very end, I don't know how it will all finish. This is interesting and exciting, and my own pleasure from the process is far

from being my last goal... For me, watercolour is the best thing that can happen to an artist. Therefore, only watercolour!"

The Enigmatic RENE

René François Ghislain Magritte, one of the most celebrated Surrealist artists of the 20th century, was born on November 21, 1898, in Lessines, Belgium. René's childhood was marked by tragedy when his mother drowned herself in the River Sambre in 1912.

Because Magritte's mother was suicidal, Magritte's father had to lock her up in her room. One day, she escaped, and was found down

by a nearby river dead, having drowned herself. According to legend, 13 year old Magritte was there when



they retrieved the body from the river. As she was pulled from the water, her dress covered her face. This later became a theme in many of Magritte's paintings in the 1920s, portraying people with cloth covering their face.

Magritte began taking drawing lessons at the age of 12 and in 1916, he enrolled at the Académie Royale

des Beaux-Arts in Brussels. He continued to develop his artistic style, experimenting with Cubism and Futurism.

In 1922, Magritte married Georgette Berger, a fellow artist and moved to Brussels, where he joined the Surrealist movement. Surrealism, with its focus on the subconscious and the irrational, resonated deeply with Magritte's artistic sensibilities. He quickly gained recognition for his



distinctive style of meticulous detail in painting ordinary objects in unexpected contexts, and the use of visual paradoxes. Magritte's works often

featured pipes, apples, and bowler hats—rendered with precise realism but placed in surreal, dreamlike scenarios. One of his most famous paintings, "The Treachery of Images" (1929), depicts a

pipe accompanied by the caption "Ceci n'est pas une pipe" ("This is not a pipe"), challenging the viewer's perceptions of reality and representation (of course it was not a pipe but a painting of one!)

The outbreak of World War II forced Magritte and his wife to flee Belgium for France. where they lived in relative poverty. Despite the difficult circumstances, Magritte continued to produce art, often focusing on themes of confinement and isolation.

After the war, Magritte's reputation continued to grow, and he enjoyed widespread success and recognition. He held numerous

solo exhibitions in Europe and the United States, ce-

René Magritte's legacy endures to this day, with his influence evident in the work of countless artists and his iconic images—such as "The Son of Man" and "The Lovers"firmly entrenched in the popu-

lar imagination. His ability to challenge the viewer's




perception of reality and evoke a sense of mystery and wonder remains as powerful and captivating as ever.

René Magritte's life and art are rich with layers of complexity and intrigue, deserving of further exploration.

My drawings are informed by a lively sense of texture and details. I regularly draw


and have completed many portrait commissions in my free realistic style.
