## Learning and Teaching at County

As the Assistant Headteacher in charge of Learning and Teaching, my job is to improve student outcomes. In short, I want the learning that takes place to be as consistently effective as possible. Taking over the role from Jo Cole in September left some very big shoes to fill. The quality of education at County is in a strong place. So, the question that I had to find an answer to was, 'What Next?'

We are currently very fortunate in education that we now have access to a range of robust evidence, from both educational research and wider cognitive science, about how the brain learns. I wanted to take time to share some of the core principles that underpin what we do at County and why.

The definition of learning is simple: transferring new knowledge from the working memory to the long-term memory, so that it can then be recalled and applied later. To do this, there are generally agreed principles that, if followed, improve learning.

Firstly, we are trying to optimise what is known as

cognitive load. Cognitive load refers to the amount of information the working memory can process at any given moment. The range of chunks of information that a person's brain can process at any given point is typically between five and nine chunks. If the brain is asked to process more information than this, cognitive overload occurs, and this negatively impacts learning.

There are three key levers we can pull to optimise cognitive load:

Firstly, reducing the number of external distractions that do not directly contribute to learning (known as extraneous load).

Secondly, ensuring that the new information is linked to what is already contained in the long-term memory (known as germane load). Thirdly, ensuring that tasks and instructions are as clear and simple as possible (intrinsic load). This does not mean to say that we want learning to be easy. Rather, it means we want all students to struggle on the right things, in the right manner and at the right time.

Crucial to all of these is engaging the brain as soon as possible in the lesson. We place a high value on attention for learning. In all our lessons, students are immediately engaged with 'connection' tasks and there is a period of silence within the first five minutes of the lesson. This optimises germane load and sends a signal to the brain that learning has begun. From this point, lessons are all based on what is known as the 'Accelerated Learning Cycle'.

Having worked at multiple schools, I can say with confidence that the staff at County are incredibly committed to, and genuinely invested in, the success of all students.

Despite the high quality of education, we are always looking for marginal gains to improve outcomes. As with every aspect of school life, learning in the classroom is driven by our belief that

## **Safeguarding News**

## 'Safer Internet Day'

Every February sees Safer Internet Day, an opportunity to reflect on the dozens of incidents we deal with each year that see children get themselves into difficulty online.

Some of the cases we deal with see children experiencing significant harm. Often, prior to incidents, families had felt confident that they were being protective parents.

To get a sense of some of the risks of children having unfettered online access, we recommend parents and carers watch the videos available on the **Internet Watch Foundation**'s YouTube channel, especially **"Home Truths".** 

As a school, we try to be clear in our advice to families, saying that unless your child uses a smartphone for medical monitoring, you should:

- ⇒ Swap smartphones for "brick" phones and location tags.
- ⇒ Strictly limit screen time, and supervise it.
- ⇒ Ensure effective filtering and monitoring programmes are used to control online access.
- ⇒ Conduct regular, thorough searches of your child's online activity.

If you allow your child access to a smartphone, please regularly remind them that:

- ⇒ They are responsible for any content on their phone.
- ⇒ They should not take or share sexualised or otherwise inappropriate images of themselves or others.
- ⇒ Anything they post online remains available to others forever.
- ⇒ A generosity of spirit, demonstrating kindness and respect to others, is just as important online as it is in the physical world.

We then visited the fantastic exhibits at the Topography of Terror Museum, before enjoying some down time, and evening of bowling.

Day 3: Our final day began with a guided tour of the Berlin Wall, where students learned about the history of it being built and developed, the lives of people who had attempted to cross the Death Strip, and the impact on German families who had been divided by the wall. The last historical stop was to the graffiti art on the remaining sections of the Wall at the East Side Gallery. Some free time then followed, as well as lunch at Alexanderplatz. We then began our return trip home.
