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
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### UNETHICAL ENCOUNTER

Visitors at Hluhluwe-iMfolozi Park jump off at a Cheetah sighting!



What should have been a family-friendly, peaceful cheetah sighting quickly escalated into a cause for concern when visitors exhibited irresponsible and, frankly, foolish behavior during their self-drive in the Park. Westley Knight and Nicole Mercury witnessed this incident and hope that by sharing their story, they can deter future visitors from engaging in similar irresponsible behavior.

While observing the magnificent cheetah sighting, they noticed a man getting out of his vehicle and climbing on top to take pictures of two cheetahs, assisted by another male while a woman leaned far out of her window [eventually also climbing on top of the vehicle]. This reckless behavior emboldened the second and third cars to imitate them. Unbeknownst to these drivers, a third cheetah, an injured male lurked nearby, heightening the risk.

Such actions endanger both human lives and wildlife, as the stress on animals can lead to serious consequences. While self-driving in the park is a privilege, it relies on responsible behavior. Unfortunately, many visitors disregard the needs and moods of the animals. This disregard is not isolated; for instance, some drivers rush elephants blocking the road, causing panic that can trigger aggressive responses.

"Taking selfies at the expense of safety is selfish and puts both animals and people at risk", says Westley. When they drove past the culprits and reminded them that such behavior could lead to being banned from the park, the response was a dismissive, "Oh really, thanks."










The absence of consequences for such behavior is concerning. It raises the question of whether individuals who jeopardize the safety of others should be allowed in the park at all. Nicole Mercury, a wildlife lover and mom, also shared her opinion on this matter and condemned the disrespectful behavior of the visitors. "The Park promotes a family-friendly environment, aiming to discourage zoos and educate children that animals belong in their natural habitats, such as protected game reserves. However, reckless behavior undermines this mission, teaching kids to disrespect wildlife", she explained.

A primary concern is the impact on young witnesses. Imagine a child seeing an attack or an animal harmed due to human irresponsibility. Such dangerous experiences could lead to a negative perception of wildlife, which is totally unacceptable, regardless of whether the individuals involved are locals or tourists.

Everyone needs to be held accountable for their actions. We all strongly hope that this story will encourage others to think twice and refrain from irresponsible behavior.







# Although rhino dehorning is performed as a last resort, how effective is it in preventing poaching?

Dehorning rhino has definitely proven to reduce the incidence of poaching on reserves however isolated poaching incidents still occur. It is one of methods used to mitigate the risks of poaching.

### What was your take on being part of the dehorning initiative at Hluhluwe-iMfolozi Park?

Margaret Mead famously quoted "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed, citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

Dehorning rhino is a complex task as the welfare of the rhino always needs to come first. The organisation required to put together such an operation is immense. It would not be possible without the committed dedication of the experienced EKZNW Game Capture team, the support of WWF, African Wildlife Vets and various other important organisations.

Each person involved has a pivotal role to play to ensure that each dehorning is smooth, efficient and quick. Working in the bush always comes with challenges and by working with an experienced team, reduces certain risks.


## What did a typical day as a Conservation Vet look like with regards to the dehorning procedure?

The Dehorning Operation consisted of skilled veterinarians, helicopter pilots and game capture & the days began early with us vets meeting to organise our drugs and equipment. At the same time the game capture team would come together and prepare their vehicles and equipment, and move out to the pre-arranged location in the park where the dehorning would take place that day.

The pilots would prepare the helicopters and depart to the location to start searching for rhino to dehorn. As vets, we were either part of the game capture teams on the ground, ensuring the health of the rhino while the dehorning took place, or we were in the helicopter darting the rhino. We were always close by in case of an emergency and if any assistance was required.

### Is this an emotional experience for conservationists?

The dehorning rhino process is definitely not something that conservationists take lightly. As much as it brought despair, it also brought a sense of ease knowing that by doing this we give that rhino a better chance at survival right now.

During the dehorning operation we rescued 8 orphans which to me was one of the most heartbreaking aspects of the operation. The ariel coverage was extensive and this allowed us to find these orphans that may ordinarily not have been found.

### Is dehorning a painful experience for the rhino?

Rhino horn is made of keratin which is no different to our fingernails or hair. The trimming process causes no discomfort to the rhino. The rhino remains healthy after being dehorned and while there is some preliminary research on how it impacts behavior, longer term research is required to fully assess how it may impact behavior.



### How does it feel knowing that you play such a vital role in conservation of these incredible animals?


Being involved in conservation is a passion that is lived through the work that we do. It becomes a way of life and knowing that there is a small chance that a difference can be made is immensely humbling and gratifying. Rhino are part our heritage and hold a deep legacy in hope and survival in Hluhluwe-iMfolozi. They remind me that despite all the challenges they have faced and continue to face, it is important to remain hopeful.

African Wildlife Vets is a non-profit organisation, and we rely solely on donations to operate. If people would like to make a difference, every donation big or small goes a long way in assisting us with what we do.

We understand that not everyone has the financial means to contribute, and therefore just raising awareness of conservation issues and the important work that we are doing is really important.

















# "THE DREAM TEAM"









Much has changed in the last year within the Munywaneni pack. The highs and lows that come along with following a pack of wild dog are nothing short of an emotional roller-coaster!

Almost two years have passed since I first fell in love with a particular pack whose territory spans more than 24 000 hectares of the northern part of the Park. Since my last sighting of the five pups, three have thrived into robust young adults and are doing exceptionally well.

Learning from their fellow pack members will be essential to their survival.

However, tragedy
struck when the
Alpha male was taken
by a lion early this
year, and his successor,
the Beta male, was
soon also killed by pack
of dispersals from the
South.



Having lost both the Alpha and Beta males in such a short space of time left the Munywaneni pack incredibly anxious and vulnerable, and to add, both the Alpha and Beta females were pregnant at the time.

The situation worsened with further confrontations involving the dispersal males, resulting in the Beta female losing her right ear to the dominant male, and the Alpha female tragically losing her life to a vehicle on the community road. With zero hierarchy, the pack fractured - with the Munywaneni males heading south into the wilderness and the females aligning with the new dominant dispersal males.



During this, the Beta female had given birth to the previous Alphas pups, who sadly were not taken care of by the new males and did not survive - I believe due to them not being their bloodline.



I hadn't received any updates on the Munywaneni males who had moved south for quite some time. However, we did hear about three females from the southern pack who had also dispersed through another path. Knowing how few of these incredible animals we have left in the wild and how vulnerable they are in small numbers only counted against them.

However, if those boys were to run into those girls - it would be a dream come true. It could form a third pack in the park. In a remarkable turn, that is what happened! A pack consisting of five males from the north (Munywaneni pack) and three females from the south (Msasaneni pack) joined forces to create what I affectionately call - "The Dream Team".

### #WILDLIFE THROWBACK


The Beta female of the Munywaneni Pack suffered injuries and lost her ear due to an altercation with the dominant male dispersal earlier this year.

Nicole Mercury & her fiancé, Westley Knight are no strangers to the bush. As frequent visitors to Hluhluwe-iMfolozi Park, they are always eager to immerse themselves in the essence of Mama Africa.

Each trip brings a unique set of experiences, and the saying "Africa is a feeling" resonates with them every time.

However, nothing could prepare them for the haunting experience they encountered, witnessing an injured wild dog cry out in pain.





While on a self-drive at 8h, a peculiar and unsettling sound echoed from a distance, perhaps 200 meters away. Disturbed by the unfamiliar call, they grabbed their cameras and binoculars, trying to piece together the scene. Initially, one of them speculated, "It sounds like a dog-wait, it seems like its ear is caught under its collar." But that wasn't the case; the ear was completely absent, leaving them both confused and alarmed by the sight before them.

As the wild dog [Beta female of the Munywaneni Pack] approached their vehicle, she was wailing in pain, her neck was gaping, her mouth sliced and her ear had been cleanly ripped right off. The couple grappled with a mix of compassion and helplessness.

The wild dog's suffering was a stark reminder of the harsh realities of nature, where beauty and brutality coexist. They knew they were witnessing something deeply tragic, and their instinct was to alert the sightings group as wild dogs are considered to be priority species.



Thanks to Nicole's quick alert, the veterinarians arrived on-site to treat the injured dog. Their hearts left the park heavy that day, filled with a mix of sadness and sorrow. Yet, there was a sense of confidence knowing she stood a good chance of recovery, thanks to the incredible efforts of the conservation organizations and the veterinarians. Every day, they checked social media groups for updates, and there she was, back with her pack, healing and thriving in the wild.

Although they had felt helpless in that moment, their timely report had made a difference, allowing her to receive the care she needed before vanishing into the bush. She had become a special wild dog to them, referring to her as "their dog". They took comfort in knowing she was growing stronger each day. To them, she embodied life in the African bush: a testament to strength, courage, and determination, while also reminding them that miracles can happen.

The day kicked off at 7 am at Siyabonga Jetty in St. Lucia, where we eagerly boarded our boat, greeted by the sounds of grunting hippos and the soft glow of dawn. Our knowledgeable skipper, Heynie, expertly guided us through the St. Lucia Estuary which is the largest estuarine system in South Africa. It is known for its rich biodiversity and unique ecosystems, supporting various wildlife, including hippos, crocodiles, and numerous bird species.

As we spotted a pod of hippos waking up, the sun painted the sky in brilliant shades of orange. Whether basking in sunshine or splashing through rain, a hippo and croc cruise promises endless adventures waiting to be uncovered. Heynie shared fascinating facts about hippos, while we captured stunning photos of the wildlife. We also marveled at the diverse birdlife, with the glossy black African Darter spreading its wings



while perched on a branch and then it was not long before our Skipper pointed out a baby Nile crocodile basking on the riverbank.








# The WWF South Africa Black Rhino Range Expansion Project (BRREP)





# ABOUT THE PROJECT

#### **POPULATION MANAGER**

The WWF South Africa Black Rhino Range Expansion Project (BRREP) was established 21 years ago by Dr Jacques Flamand with the goal of increasing the range and numbers of the critically endangered black rhino. The black rhino reached its lowest continental population number in the mid-1990's when only 2500 black rhinos remained across sub-Saharan Africa. Since then, through consistent conservation efforts, this number has grown to over 6000 black rhinos.

BRREP removes black rhinos from existing populations where numbers are reaching carrying capacities and translocates them to new blocks of land where these new populations can grow, while the existing populations have more space to continue reproducing as well. BRREP has established 17 populations across South Africa and one population in Malawi, moving over 250 rhinos, over the past 21 years.



BRREP sites now make up 15% of South Africa's national herd. BRREP is housed within WWF South Africa as a project and is primarily funded by the WWF Netherlands office. BRREP is in partnership with Ezemvelo KZN Wildlife and Eastern Cape Parks and Tourism Agency that provide black rhinos for translocations to new sites, through custodianship agreements.

BRREP has also partnered with Wildlife ACT since its inception, to provide the important task of training monitors on new BRREP sites and providing post-release monitoring support after translocations.

# THE ROLE OF A POPULATION MANAGER

My job as the population manager for BRREP focuses primarily on supporting existing BRREP sites with their rhinos. For BRREP as a team, the job is only half done once the rhinos have been introduced to a new site (which can be a 1-3 year job on its own!).

On introduction, the rhinos are monitored regularly by a dedicated rhino monitor employed by respective BRREP site to ensure the safety and well-being of the rhinos. Monitors gather important demographic, movement and social data on rhinos which I receive from all sites.

With this data I can then provide BRREP sites with population management assistance such as looking at rhinos requiring removal, rhino introductions, advising on monitoring techniques, data management and genetics. I also advise the conservation agencies on rhino selection to form new populations, keep track of rhino ownerships and organise meetings to bring BRREP sites and the conservation agencies together.

I'm also responsible for any scientific research happening through BRREP, providing linkages between researchers and BRREP sites and fostering relationships



I qualified with a BSc Honors Biology in Canada and a MSc Zoology from Stellenbosch University as well as a certification in Wildlife Management. The basic qualifications for a position like mine would definitely be a BSc in a biology or conservation related field, with a Masters preferable.



## A DAY IN THE LIFE

A typical day is probably a lot less exciting than people think! While our BRREP team heads out into the field once or twice a year to capture and translocate black rhinos, the majority of my time is spent behind a laptop, answering emails, crunching numbers, writing reports and assisting BRREP sites. When I'm not working from home, I'm often on the road travelling to BRREP sites for meetings or providing assistance in the field.

However, I'm very fortunate that on occasion I get to assist wildlife veterinarians or game capture teams with rhino work outside of BRREP's scope, such as dehorning operations, that allows for some extra field time.

When in the field on rhino translocations I'm usually responsible for collecting biological samples such as blood or tissue from rhinos for research and/or for genetic sampling, coordinating rhino off-takes, train new rhino monitors on data management and assist with post-release monitoring.







I ended up in wildlife conservation three years after graduating with my MSc Zoology. I had started off as an environmental consultant in the Western Cape but did not enjoy the work as much as I thought I would. After some soul searching I was drawn to wildlife conservation and I ended up completing my wildlife management qualification and interning on a small community-owned game reserve in Zululand. There I was hired on as the intern coordinator and a year later moved to BRREP where I have been ever since.

When I left the environmental consulting world, I wanted to work in a field where I could make a difference and see the positive impacts my work would have on the environment. With BRREP I'm fortunate to experience this every day – I get to see black rhino populations grow, thanks to the tireless efforts of reserve managers, rangers and rhino monitors, see black rhinos return to areas where they haven't been in decades if not hundred's of years and be part of the greater conservation community that has more than doubled black rhino numbers in the last thirty years.

# ADVICE ON GETTING INTO CONSERVATION

Wildlife conservation is an incredibly complex undertaking, everything is connected. From national environmental policies, to community relations on park and reserve boundaries, to wildlife disease management, genetic management, habitat management and so much more.

Most people don't see how intertwined everything is and wonder why conservationists don't "just do X". Chances are that there are multiple forces at play that require careful consideration.

Black rhino conservation is no different and BRREP and its partner reserves and sites navigate this complex world daily, but despite the hurdles faced at times, perseverance usually pays off to further black rhino conservation goals and ensure that the species will be around for decades to come.

For anyone that would like to follow a path into wildlife conservation or management whether rhinos or another species, the work is most definitely worth it.

It is not always easy work and often involves long hours, time away from home, early mornings and sometimes late nights, but it is all worth it.

Especially at the beginning of ones career to take any opportunity coming ones way, be willing to put in the work and bide ones time.

Connections and relationships are also important – the conservation world is small and knowing the right people can make all the difference to one's career!

The Black Rhino is a seldom seen denizen of Zululand. It is most often associated with fleeting shadows and thick scrubland. On this particular day, our guide had been struggling to find anything of note. A few Impala, a dazzle of Zebra, lots of elephant spoor and the odd bird came to observe the tourists in their boredom. One of our group emitted light snores, obviously unimpressed with the early morning and lack of entertainment. I felt sorry for the guide. He was trying very hard. We learned about three types of dung beetles, the different flora that fed all the magnificent animals, yet the animals themselves remained unseen, unnoticed or just plain un-present.

In the guides desperation he started going faster. He had heard over the radio that there were lions in a particular area and wanted to get there to at least restore some credibility to this haven of wildlife. Then just like that, without fanfare, without a momentous entrance applause this young male Black rhino stepped out of a thicket and caused us to stop suddenly. The jerking motion of coming to a halt causing even the sleeping passenger to jerk awake. Fortunately before he could utter surprise his partner shushed him. There was a large shrub obscuring our view, and I could see the guide was nervous to move us into the clearing.

Despite the heavy rain and the need for a 4x4 in the harsh weather conditions, we relied on our trusty BMW X1 to carry us on our journey, and it took us far - until we found ourselves mired in the soggy earth. Our Guide, Tim, kindly towed us to the lodge with the open Toyota 4x4 landcruiser

safari vehicle, braving the downpour. Though the reserve was unfenced and I had the lovely task of "keeping an eye for lions nearby", we felt 100% completely safe with our Guide by our side. Upon arrival, Casey, the Assistant Lodge Manager, and his warm team enveloped us in true local South African hospitality. 




# MEET MOYA


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




## A magical encounter with Moya

During my recent visit to Emdoneni Lodge with the Zululand Cat Conservation Project, I immersed myself in the world of endangered cat species. It was essential for me to be at a place dedicated to conservation, where I could grasp the complexities of animal care - beyond mere captivity.

One cat, in particular, captured my heart: Moya, a stunning 15-year-old cheetah. On a private tour with Sanele, an incredibly passionate and knowledgeable Guide, we met Moya in an expansive enclosure designed to mimic his natural habitat. There he sat, a striking embodiment of grace and strength. Encountering a cheetah up close is profoundly different; though habituated, he retains his wild instincts, reminding us to respect his space.

As I took photos, Moya stirred from his rest, approached me, and gently brushed against my side before settling down beside me. His presence was incredibly overwhelming, creating a serene moment where everything else faded away. I felt a deep connection, an emotional stillness that left me in awe. Surrounded by the dedication of the Nel family and their conservation efforts, I was filled with gratitude for this experience.



Research indicates that about 70% of male cheetahs born in captivity are sterile, and females can be notoriously selective when it comes to choosing mates.

Despite these formidable hurdles, the project remains undeterred. They believe that with dedication and innovative strategies, they can contribute to the survival of these remarkable animals, embodying the spirit of resilience and hope in the face of adversity.




Visitors are invited to view only the the ambassador cats. This policy reflects the projects commitment to local and international animal welfare standards, ensuring the safety and well-being of both animals and visitors. It is believed that every animal deserves a life free from fear, which can arise from close encounters with unfamiliar humans.

In their rewilding efforts, cats being prepared for release remain out of public view. They deliberately avoid human imprinting, as this can lead animals to bond more with humans than with their own species. This approach helps prevent the development of problematic behaviors in

animals once they are returned to the

The bush has become my sanctuary, a place where the presence of wildlife eases my anxiety and ignites a newfound purpose. Witnessing the dedication of families like the Nels, who tirelessly commit themselves to animal welfare, fills me with admiration.

While it's easy for outsiders to judge, few truly understand the immense dedication, financial sacrifices, and emotional resilience needed to sustain a successful cat conservation project. I believe that Emdoneni Lodge and the Zululand Cat Conservation Project are exemplary in their commitment to legal and ethical conservation practices. Writing this piece brings back deep feelings of gratitude as I reflect on the incredible connection I felt with these animals, especially as their numbers dwindle due to poaching, human-wildlife conflict, and habitat destruction.

We all have a role to play in conservation. Begin by educating yourself, planning a visit to Emdoneni, and discovering the incredible efforts being made for cheetahs and other African cats. Share what you learn; every small effort contributes to a larger impact. Together, we can make a significant difference in the fight for wildlife conservation and create a sustainable future for these majestic creatures. Let's unite in this mission, for every action counts in preserving our planet's incredible biodiversity.

#### A TRUE SANCTUARY THAT CARES FOR WILDLIFE

We do not promote captivity of wildlife unless it is for great conservation value. Emdoneni Lodge upholds a strong commitment to wildlife conservation, supporting captivity only when it serves a significant conservation purpose. The Zululand Cat Conservation Project focuses on rehabilitating sick and orphaned cats while enhancing the populations of cheetahs and other cats. The lodge's educational programs feature ambassador cats that cannot be reintroduced into the wild, ensuring ethical interactions - visitors engage through observation only, adhering to all established guidelines.



In our journey to deepen our understanding of wildlife, we discovered FreeMe Wildlife - a dedicated rescue and rehabilitation centre that not only cares for animals but also fosters a profound appreciation and understanding of our natural world. Their work inspires a compassionate connection to wildlife and the environment.



The facility operates as a professional wildlife rehabilitation centre that strictly adheres to a 'hands-off' philosophy, ensuring that patients are not tamed, petted, or habituated during their recovery. This approach preserves their natural instincts and behaviors, free from human interference.

Public viewing of wildlife is not permitted, and staff interactions are kept to a minimum in order to prevent any unnatural reliance on humans, safeguarding the rehabilitation and reintegration process into their wild habitats.

In partnership with stakeholders like Wild Tomorrow, which focuses on securing land for wildlife conservation, FreeMe Wildlife is actively engaged in species reintroduction programs alongside local Nature Reserves and Conservancies.

We had the privilege of meeting Wade and Tammy from FreeMe Wildlife to learn more about their remarkable efforts and share their mission. Their deep passion fuels a strong commitment to exceptional wildlife care and their dedicated, outstanding staff consistently goes the extra mile to ensure every creature thrives. During our visit, we adhered to their strict policies aimed at minimizing human contact, which is essential for giving the animals the best chance at survival upon release. One inspiring story we encountered was that of five black-backed jackal pups. Rescued as tiny infants after a compassionate local discovered they were being sold as "domesticated dogs," FreeMe Wildlife sprang into action. The team began the challenging rehabilitation process and maintaining minimal human interaction to foster the pups' natural instincts.

Every day, the pups are moved to an outdoor enclosure that mimics their natural habitat. The dedicated staff employs thoughtful strategies to encourage exploration and self-sufficiency, such as placing quail eggs in weaver nests for the pups to discover and providing their first taste of real meat [a bush buck leg]. Each step is meticulously planned to ensure that when they are ready to return to the wild, they can thrive, hunt, and survive on their own.



An eland calf, battling severe hypothermia, was discovered in an old plantation and brought to FreeMe Wildlife by kind hearted individuals. After being warmed in a cozy, naturally simulated environment and assisted by a heater, it took time for the calf to recover and regain her strength. As she grew stronger, the team introduced a bottle holder to her enclosure to ensure she formed a bond with the bottle rather than the staff, adhering to their principle of avoiding any taming or interaction. Once she was comfortable with the bottle, she was moved to a larger area to allow for exercise and natural behaviors.





FreeMe Wildlife is committed to maintaining the calf's wild instincts, ensuring that when she is ready, she can be successfully reintroduced into her natural habitat. It's inspiring to witness such a genuine organization that rigorously follows protocols to support the rehabilitation of these animals.

FreeMe Wildlife operates without charging for its services, relying entirely on the generous support of the public to sustain its mission. Their dedicated team runs the centre day and night, ensuring they remain open year-round to care for compromised wild animals, regardless of the costs involved. The continued existence of FreeMe Wildlife is a testament to the unwavering support from the community.

While enjoying a hot cup of coffee, we had a fascinating conversation with Tammy about the crucial role FreeMe Wildlife plays in providing SANBI with valuable species DNA, helping to protect and celebrate South Africa's diverse ecosystems.

## Zululand Elephant Project

FreeMe Wildlife is embarking on a monumental journey to guide a fragmented herd of 15 elephants back to the safety of the Royal Jozini Game Reserve in Eswatini. This initiative marks the beginning of an ambitious vision: a Trans Frontier Park that will span the border between South Africa and Eswatini, creating a sanctuary for expanding elephant populations while seeking new homes for them.

In collaboration with the Royal Jozini Game Reserve and Ezemvelo KZN Wildlife, FreeMe Wildlife is implementing a contraceptive program to manage breeding until relocation can occur. The project unfolds in phases, with funding secured for phase 1 - the safe transport of the 15 elephants - thanks to the generous support of Animal Survival International. This organization is also funding a helicopter survey to assess all elephants in the reserve, a crucial step for planning subsequent actions.

Phase 2, with an estimated cost of R3,000,000, focuses on constructing a robust fence around the Pongola Nature Reserve to secure the South African border of the future park. This barrier is essential for safely managing elephant and big game populations until the existing border fence can be dismantled. Phase 3 will involve capturing and relocating excess elephants to suitable reserves, ensuring that 30 elephants remain in the Trans Frontier Park.

This inspiring project unites two nations and numerous stakeholders with a shared mission to protect these magnificent creatures. Those moved by this cause are encouraged to support their efforts by donating to the 'Elephant Fund,' helping to turn this vision into reality.

While immersing ourselves in the inspiring initiatives of FreeMe Wildlife, Wade arrived at the centre with an aardvark. Tragically, it was not alive, serving as a stark reminder of the ongoing struggle between humans and wildlife. A kind soul discovered an aardvark lying injured by the roadside, a victim of a careless vehicle strike. After scans revealed a severed spinal cord, the FreeMe Wildlife team faced the heart-wrenching decision to gently euthanize the creature.

As I stood by observing the aardvark, my heart ached. This was my first encounter with an aardvark and witnessing its lifeless form, a casualty of human negligence, feels incredibly unjust. We share our world with wildlife, and it's crucial that we learn to coexist harmoniously. Let this serve as a call to all: as we navigate our roads, let us remember that animals share our environment and deserve our vigilance. 

#### assess your swimming abilities

Before entering the water, evaluate your skills and the conditions. Remember, the sea can be more challenging than a pool.

#### rip currents

A rip current is a powerful channel of water flowing away from the shore. If you get caught in a rip, do not swim against it; you'll tire quickly. If you can stand, wade instead of swimming. It is advised to swim parallel to the shore to escape the current, then head back to land and signal for help by raising your hand and shouting.

#### avoid tidal risks

Stay informed by checking the tide tables before heading out. Be aware and keep an eye on the tide's movement while enjoying the beach.

#### emergency assistance

Alert someone or call 112 or 063 699 2722 (NSRI Station 40 St. Lucia) for the coastguard if you are in trouble or you see someone in trouble.

### What inspired you to become an ecologist?

From the time I was just a tiny tadpole, I was mesmerised by the wonders of nature. My childhood dream was to be a forensic entomologist at the ripe old age of 6 - think of it as a bug detective. But as I grew, my fascination shifted from insects to the intricate dance of ecosystems. I fell head over heels for the complex relationships between critters and plants, especially in the watery worlds of rivers, wetlands, and estuaries.

### What qualifications did you obtain?

I kicked off my academic adventure with a National Diploma in Nature Conservation, then leveled up with a Bachelor of Technology in the same field, diving deep into invasive species and aquatic ecology. Now, I'm wrapping up a Master's of Applied Science in Nature Conservation, focusing on chemical pollutants and how humans impact aquatic ecosystems. And just when you thought I was done, a PhD is on the horizon!





### Tell us about your journey into this field like, and how long did it take you?

I began my undergraduate studies in Nature Conservation in 2016, a three-year odyssey that blended two years of theory with a full year of hands-on bush experience. I crossed the graduation stage in early 2019, then jumped straight into a two-year BTech program, emerging victorious in early 2021. Now, I'm deep into my Master's, exploring aquatic ecology at a catchment level with a focus on human impacts. It's been an 8-year marathon, and I'm still sprinting!

### Have you faced any challenges in this field?

Being a woman and a person of colour in this field is a bit like being a unicorn - rare and magical. Conservation is slowly inching towards inclusivity, but it's historically been a white, male-dominated realm. And let's just say, some folks aren't too thrilled when you start shaking things up with new ideas for better environmental management and long-term sustainability goals.



Tertiary education is not always accessible for all people, but to be taken seriously, you have to have multiple academic qualifications backing up your ideas.

### What does Shaskia's future goals look like?

Next up is a PhD - because who needs free time, right? I also want to keep using my social media platform to spread the word about conservation, building a future-focused audience that's as passionate about sustainability as I am, and hopefully inspiring them to pass that spark along.

### What was a memorable experience that you will cherish forever?


Where do I even start? From being mock-charged by an elephant bull in musth (one of many close calls that always give me a new appreciation for life), to reeling in monster tigerfish, tilapia and barbel within Kruger National Park—while some hippos and crocodiles watched on (hopefully impressed). And then there was that time tracking a black rhing on foot in the Kalahari, only to witness it greet another rhino with what can only be described as a tender kiss. I've also gotten to witness rhinodehorning and track and monitor a newly released pangolin (I cried when I held it). Nature really knows how to keep things interesting.

### Any advice to others that want to make an impact?

When you find something that sets your soul on fire, don't just sit back and admire the flames - grab hold of it and run with it.

Passion is your compass and the fuel that keeps your engine running, so let it guide you and make sure you have a full tank!





On non-fieldwork days, I switch gears to my role as a lecturer at Tshwane
University of Technology's Faculty of
Science, Department of Nature
Conservation. Then, my day is a mix of writing scientific articles, lecturing, handling admin tasks, and creating social media content for both my scientist account and wildlife photography account—never a dull moment!

We are Mohammed and Taleah Ally, born, raised, met, and married in KZN, South Africa.

We'd like to think that our adventure started when we met each other, but truthfully, it only began on the 27th of November 2021 when the keys to a pre-loved Suzuki Jimny were dropped into our hands after years of prayer, hard work, and lots of patience waiting for it to be available in kinetic yellow (this was a non-negotiable).

## The Jimny may be small but it is certainly more than capable of conquering everything a bigger 4x4 can do and more.

Still unnamed, our Suzuki Jimny has inspired a love for off-roading in us both. Through countless adventures, we've put our trust in our Jimny and were never disappointed.

Our proudest moment occurred on one of our first off-roading adventures with our friends. We encountered a steep, mud-laden hill that halted every 4x4 vehicle before us.

Fully capable drivers and their machines were trying their best to conquer this challenge, but eventually needed the assistance of a winch to pull them up. The Jimny, however, glided up the hill unassisted on its first attempt, through the mud and through the cheering of onlookers, emerging as a victorious underdog and sealing its place in our hearts forever.





If we didn't have our Jimny, we would have never made it up the treacherous Sani Pass, through the roads of Lesotho to Maletsunyane Falls, where we got engaged. We even had our Jimny with us on our wedding day at Tala Game Reserve, capturing the essence of the adventurous couple we are.

Having our Jimny there for our big moments made them even more special as it reminded us of our journey together, our hard work, and what we could accomplish together.





We understand that game can sometimes be very shy towards people and cars. They often run away from the loud roars of the 4x4 engines even while idling. This is no problem for the Jimny, whose little engine makes the softest purr, allowing us to quietly watch the game from a close distance without disturbing their natural environment.



Every Jimny can be modified and built to suit its owner's style and needs. Here are some of the extras we have added to ours:

- 40MM suspension lift kit. This is a must to clear rocks and other objects that could damage the undercarriage. It also adds to the stability of the vehicle and supports any additional payload.
- · All Terrain Tyres. These on-road/offroad tyres are perfect for the tar and gravel roads of game reserves like Hluhluwe-iMfolozi. They also deliver exceptional toughness, durability, and traction.
- · Wind deflectors. These aesthetically pleasing additions change your vehicle's aerodynamics, causing the outward draft of your vehicle around the product. It also kicks out rain, snow, and even dirt.
- · Seat covers. These protect the upholstery from spills, scratches, and stains, and prevent crumbs and debris from dirtying the Jimny's original cloth seats.
- Centre console storage tray, cup holders, and door grip storage pockets.
   Extra storage inside the vehicle is always helpful.
- Rear cargo net with tie-down rings.
   This really keeps our things in-place and secure while bundu bashing.

Roof Rack. It's nice to have the option of strapping luggage, tools, and other items to the roof when the small trunk has reached its capacity.

- Rear ladder. Because we need to have some way of accessing all that storage space on top!
- · Jimny ladder and fuel can combo.
  This offers an extra 7.5L of fuel to get
  that extra distance when a petrol
  station is too far away. The ladder can
  also be used to mount other
  accessories, like recovery tracks.
- · Branch deflectors. We use these to push away branches from the windscreen while navigating through thick bush.

All's well that ends in adventure.

We know that we may not be as experienced or as well-equipped as other off-roading and over-landing rigs out there, but what we do know is that this is who we are meant to be and this is the vehicle we were meant to have.



Our journey with our Jimny has only just begun. There is still so much of beautiful Zululand to explore, so many adventures to go on, and many more modifications, and additions to make to our Jimny.

We are excited for what the future holds, and can't wait to share it with you as we go along.

Bhejane, paired with the camper, handles off-road terrain like a pro, giving us the freedom to explore remote and rugged destinations that are off the beaten path.




As I reflected on the day, watching the Runners race for conservation ignited a spark of inspiration within me to participate in the Outrun next year to raise funds for the APU.

We concluded the day watching the sunset paint the sky while catching up with friends & family, creating memories that will linger long after the day ends.




