New Concert Dress Update

If you are one of the many forty-five ESTE students who have already performed during the 1997-1998 school year, you should already have the New Concert Dress requirements. Now is the time to check to be sure that your cummerbund fits properly-the velcro in the back should overlap to meet perfectly or slightly over, not too tight so that the velcro shows on the outside. The cummerbunds should fit loosely over the pants. If yours is too tight or too loose, please let us know now before we make the cummerbunds for the other students. Please put your child's name on a piece of masking tape and put it inside the plaid bottom pleat to avoid C.C. (cummerbund confusion) at the performances!

Please also check the fit of your pants-both boys and girls-and remember that all shoes, socks and hair accessories must be BLACK!

For those of you who will be playing at performances later in the year, we will be getting your measurements in March to prepare for the Spring Program on Saturday, May 16th at ECC.

Please note that cummerbunds and ties are to be dry-cleaned only.

A TRIBUTE

DR. SHINICHI SUZUKI 1898 - 1998

It was hardly 50 years ago that major symphony orchestras were concerned that they would not have enough players to fill the vacancies that were left by retiring players. The importance and interest in music as a career was waning. Science was the exciting direction. What was so important about making music? The "Space Race" seemed to be the direction for an exciting and significant career. Enter Suzuki - with his ability to develop musical skills in children as early as three and four years old. Unheard of - what's the trick? Skeptics reasoned it was an Oriental gimmick. Yet, a handful of insightful music educators went to Japan to explore what caused this phenomenon. As a result of their diligence in investigating and returning with reports of, "It's true, it works!", within 25 years, orchestras are so full with outstanding string players at young ages that auditions are highly selective and competitive. Because of Suzuki, there is a "healthy economy" in the music world.

Who is this man who reversed the tide of the music world? Who is Suzuki that he knew intuitively what behaviorists are just now understanding? How dare he say that music isn't an inborn talent. What authority did he have to say that the environment in which a child is raised is more influential than the genetic coding passed down from his parents. Such radical thinkers are usually talked about by the press, criticized by colleagues; interviewed and quoted for the public to decide for themselves the values of his ideas. Humanitarians like Albert Schweitzer and Mother Theresa, the scientific genius of Albert Einstein and Marie Curie are heralded throughout the world. Suzuki ranks in stature with them - yet, a large portion of the world does not recognize Suzuki's contributions.

What attracted me to Suzuki violin? I was intrigued by the result of learning an instrument that I didn't want to play - little steps made for easy success. If I did what my teacher showed me, I learned. That fascinated me. The music was interesting - none of this counting whole notes for six pages with a scratchy tone - Suzuki offered the rhythms of the great masters as an introduction to playing the instrument. No music to interpret, use your ears, imitate what you hear - I was encouraged at every step. This was different. I was in music school where I was used to being corrected when I made a mistake. After all, how can you learn something if you don't know what you did wrong? Suzuki says encouragement nurtures the person in a way that gives the confidence to try again. We do not correct a child when he says his first words. We provide praise and celebration! Music can be taught the same way. I was fascinated how my attitude was changed by the approach of the teaching and the teacher.

What has Dr. Suzuki provided me? From my college days when I was first introduced to the Suzuki Method until now, I have been involved in a movement to continue what Dr. Suzuki has set forth. His philosophy has given me a lifestyle as well as career direction and foundation for my own teaching. It has provided me with a love of music that might have come to a dead end if I hadn't been introduced to Suzuki Method. I have had the privilege of being in the first generation of teachers who are passing on Suzuki's ideas. I have a camaraderie of colleagues who uphold Suzuki philosophy as being some of the important work of the era. I have the joy and satisfaction of putting Suzuki Method into practice with your children.

He considered himself a servant to mankind with a single focus of making better human beings through music. His ultimate goal of "Peace in the world through the music of children" resounds on every continent. Why isn't he recognized by more people as someone who has changed educational patterns? Those of us involved shake our heads and ask the same question. Maybe it's because he didn't write a book. Maybe it's because he didn't hold a press conference and announce his discoveries on satellite television. Maybe it takes being involved in Dr. Suzuki's practices where one begins to see his greatness-his unique approach to learning. Being in his presence was treasured time. Whether time spent was long or short, the contact with him changed a person. He modeled what he wanted, laughing and playing with students. We all knew we were with someone of unique value to us and to mankind. Still, it is hard to explain.

Time moves on and an era has passed. The Suzuki movement has had an encouraging beginning. What is important to me is Dr. Suzuki's goal - to help children fulfill their capabilities as human beings, "Teaching music is not my main purpose. I want to make good citizens, noble human beings. If a child hears fine music from the day of his birth, and learns to play it himself, he develops sensitivity, discipline and endurance. He gets a beautiful heart."

Super!

That Special Practice Time!

Are you tired of the same old practice habits?? Do your kids race through a song just to "get it over with?" We have found a way to make weekend practicing fun. Since we usually play our instruments right after school during the week, dad isn't home to listen, and he NEVER goes to a lesson. Therefore, he doesn't really know how to help when practicing and certainly doesn't know what is the correct bow hold or position, etc... To get him more involved and give mom a break, we play the "30 Point Game" whenever he is home on the weekends. Each child selects songs they want to play, and he gives them points based on the difficulty of the piece, speed of playing (the slower the better), if it sounds pleasing to the ear and other things like keeping the bow thumb bent, etc... Deductions would be made for making mistakes with the bow or playing way out of tune! (Even dad can tell THAT!!) The most points given per song is "10," and the practice time isn't finished until the child reaches at least 30 points. For a more advanced student you can try 40 points, but keep it fun!

This really helps with technique because the students don't rush and they seem to play their best for dad! This could work with a neighbor or grandparent, just someone who doesn't usually get involved with lesson time. It is a nice change of pace for those of you who are "stuck in a rut." Good Luck!





Resolving the Rosin Dilemma
