Route 9 CDC, <u>formally known as New Castle Prevention Coalition</u> formalized in 2010, is a coalition of organizations, agencies and people that seek to revitalize our community through partnerships that address social determinants of health and build community resilience. We focus on the 12 communities parallel the Route 9 Corridor from Rogers Road to Memorial Drive, north to south, and Route 9 to Route 13 east to west, where prevention activities will have the greatest impact.

Despite common misconceptions, the Route 9 Corridor experiences lower crime rates, thanks to grassroots leadership and youth-driven efforts. Through innovative, community-centered approaches that promote cohesion and care, residents are reshaping safety perceptions and addressing key social determinants of health (SDoH).

- Young leaders are using creative methods—art, storytelling, community events, and peer advocacy—to drive connection and awareness.
- Residents are no longer waiting for change; they're creating it through collaboration and compassion.
- Programs born within the community are showing measurable results in improving mental health, public safety, and trust.

These efforts prove that when a community invests in its people, transformation naturally follows. Route 9 is more than a corridor—it's a blueprint for everlasting, community-led progression.

OUR CONTRIBUTION

Route 9 CDC is dedicated to addressing the social determinants of health (SDOH) in the Route 9 corridor by creating a healthier, safer, and more equitable environment for all residents. We focus on economic stability, education, healthcare, neighborhood improvements, and social support to eliminate barriers to well-being.

Our programs include **Environmental Restoration Projects** that reclaim trails and parks, plant trees, and clear debris to create safe, green spaces. The Alternative to Out of School Suspension (AOSS) **program** provides middle school students with a safe, supervised environment during suspensions. Through **<u>Community Engagement</u>**, we organize cleanups, host events, and distribute resources to keep residents connected. Our **<u>Health</u> and** Wellness Initiatives promote health literacy and access to mental health resources, while we also offer resources for Housing and Economic **Support** through community workshops and financial assistance to improve housing stability and financial well-being.

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES AND INITIATIVES

The following data highlights the most frequent calls for service within top communities in Sectors 31 and 32 under the New Castle County Police Department's Targeted Analytical Policing System (INTERACTIVE)



What's going on?

Call volume varies by category, with domestic-related incidents, welfare checks, and vehicle-related issues appearing most frequently. The inclusion of community assist and public relations calls indicates continued engagement and responsiveness efforts by NCCPD in these communities.

This real-time data supports community policing strategies and allows for targeted responses that meet the corridor's evolving needs.

The top call types, listed from most frequent to least frequent, include:

Check on the Welfare (CheckWel), Domestic – In Progress, Domestic – Just Occurred, Disorderly Person, Abandoned Vehicle, Parking Violation, Suspicious Vehicle, Burglary – In Progress, Alarm – Burglary, Vehicle Stolen, Assist Fire/EMS Assist Other Agency, Public Relations / Community Assist, Fraud / Harassment / Miscellaneous Investigations, Violation of No Contact Order, Criminal Mischief, Accident – Property Damage / Hit & Run (PD H/R), and PBOP (Probation/Parole Offender Patrol).



OUR IMPACT

- We've received a Bezos Earth Fund grant to support pathway clearing, trail connections, and neighborhood-based parks restoration throughout the corridor.
- Established a community feedback loop to learn of issues that affect residents' lives and to find solutions. This has allowed residents to resist development that is detrimental to the community in favor of development that supports community needs.
- Continuously keep the community informed with state resources, events, and wellness tips.
- Our community's restoration efforts have reclaimed 2 trails and 5 parks, planted 165 trees and 800 native plants, cleared 34,450 feet of trails, and removed 42 tons of waste, creating cleaner, greener, and more accessible spaces for all.
