Set Sail on a Historic Schooner

Sometimes, adventures can be overlooked when they are so close to home. San Francisco Bay may be such a destination. There really is nothing quite like being out on the water in a sailboat in our beautiful Bay.

If you are lucky enough to pick a day without coastal fog, like my sister-in-law and I did on Labor Day weekend, then you can get amazing views of iconic features of the Bay, such as Angel Island, Alcatraz the San Francisco skyline with its brilliantly lit Ferris wheel, and the Golden Gate Bridge.

San Francisco Bay Adventures offers special holiday cruises so that's who we chose to commandeer our evening sailing adventure. Despite my worry over finding parking near the harbor in Sausalito on a Saturday night over a holiday weekend, we had no problems securing a spot at the Spinnaker Restaurant, which is the closest lot to the boat. Aboard the Schooner Freda B, Captain Reno Cambridge delivered a safety briefing and then described the features of our vessel with obvious pride. "You will not see any wenches or hydraulics," said Cambridge. Everything is block and tackle. Every line on this boat has a purpose.

A schooner is a two-masted gaffrigged vessel. The 80-foot Schooner Freda B is quite literally made of steel and includes four sleeping cabins. She arrived in the Bay Area in 2010 where she is used as a charter boat with a Coast Guard-certified capacity of 49 people. Our tour group on was much smaller, so the boat did not feel crowded.

The history of the type of boat called a schooner began in the 1600s. According to Captain Cambridge, the schooner was originally designed to shuttle merchandise typically found in general stores, such as shovels and pickaxes. The Schooner Freda B (formerly named Liberty) is a modern replica. She was built in 1991 by naval architect Charles Wittholtz in Florida. She spent her first eighteen years shuttling guests up and down the East Coast.

Freda B has appeared on the "Travel Channel" and "Eye on the Bay" and in "Sea Magazine", "Latitude 38", "Cruising World", and "Sports Illustrated". She is also a two-time winner of the Masters Mariners Regatta and was a sweepstakes winner of the Sausalito Lighted Boat Parade.

One of the wonderful things about sailing is that once the sails are raised, guests can sit back, relax, enjoy a beverage, including acholic ones and chat among themselves in relative quiet.

Wildlife enthusiasts and birders might spot seals or dolphins on the Bay or gulls flying overhead or roosting on harbor pilings. Brown pelicans flew overhead during our sail and were hanging out on a spit of land next to the Spinnaker Restaurant where we parked.

After the captain commandeered a young guest to help him sail the boat for a few minutes, a task the boy thoroughly enjoyed; I had a chance to speak with him. Cambridge described his best memory over the last seven years of captaining this boat. It was









a marriage where the wedding couple allowed him to write their vows.

There is something truly humbling about gazing at the Golden Gate Bridge with its storied history. It held the record of the longest bridge span when it was completed in 1937, a distinction it held until 1964. It was declared a Wonder of the Modern World by the American Society of Civil Engineers in 1994.

Watching the sun set behind it, and then the lights flicker on as darkness descended, is a memory I will not soon forget.

Sailing on the San Francisco Bay is best when the weather is warmest and sunniest, making October an ideal time to go.

European Delights Bakery, Treats from Old-World Recipes

European Delights is a small and little know bakery in Walnut Creek that specializes in old country European bakery recipes. And those that know there is a difference will be happy to discover this tasty store. It is well, delightful.

Rica Zaharia owner works with her brother/partner Dan Petcu. They are originally from Transylvania, Romania just 20 miles from Dracula's castle. She came to US in 2003 and learned English.

Ricca moved to Walnut Creek to start the

business and ease up on her weekly commute to Sedona where she worked as a Senior Living caregiver while her husband attended law school at Berkeley. She baked treats for her clients who encouraged her to open a bakery. She decided to give that a go and left her job in Sedona. She practiced baking for two years out of her home, offering samples to her neighbors. They raved and said she was ready.

"We are both workaholics. Without sacrifice you are not doing anything. I am glad to be in this country because this country gives you lots of opportunities. If you dream big you solve the problem," she says firmly. Rica walks the talk. As a small business owner, Rica assumes many operational responsibilities. She comes in at midnight every night to bake the next day's fresh line up of menu items and pre-orders and cleans at the end of the day.

Her old-world recipes come from different European countries. The strudel is from Germany. For savories, Feta Cheese and Spinach brioche is

from Greece. Cannoli comes from Sicily. Sweet and savory croissants from France.

Pavlova's (originally from Australia, but named after Russian ballet dancer Anna Pavlova who was a mega star there in the 1920's.)

European baking uses less sugar than American recipes. This allows for more flavors to experience. "People come here for the flavors, "which she says comes from only using quality products. For example, she uses Fresh apples for strudel

and home-made custards for her fillings.



One project with the potential to improve the daily lives of our residents is GoMentum Station, a 5,000-acre world-class autonomous vehicle testing facility located at the former Concord Naval Weapons Station and managed by CCTA.

The facility has over 20 miles of paved roadway, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, railroad crossings, potholes, a smart signal lab, and a mini-city supporting multimodal testing. GoMentum Station offers both the private and public sectors a unique opportunity for innovation and access to emerging technologies without risking public safety or property.

This innovation hub is an economic driver in the region that attracts companies nationwide to the Diablo Valley. Recently, CCTA announced two partnerships that originated at GoMentum Station. These partnerships are pilot programs that will run through early 2025.

The first, Beep, Inc. has deployed its second autonomous PRESTO electric shuttle program (PRESTO Rossmoor) to serve the residents and visitors of the senior community of Rossmoor in Walnut Creek. Their first program is in San Ramon. PRESTO Rossmoor is free to

ride, operates on set routes, and has an onboard attendant. To ride, wait at one of the two shuttle stops between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

The second pilot program launched last month is May Mobility's shared autonomous PRESTO minivans (PRESTO Martinez), which connect the Contra Costa Regional Medical Center (CCRMC) to downtown Martinez. There are seven minivans, with an attendant, that provide free service weekdays from 2 pm to 10 pm. From 2 pm to 6 pm, PRESTO Martinez is limited to CCRMC and select stops; to get a ride, visit the CCRMC information desk. From 6 pm to 10 pm the free service is open to the general public running through 20 stops. To ride, download and use the May Mobility App or call 925-995-3797. As a member of the Board of Supervisors, I believe it is important to increase opportunities for individuals to access care at CCRMC which is exactly PRESTO Martinez is doing.

With pilot programs like PRESTO here in Contra Costa County, the future of autonomous vehicles and mass transit can be greener, safer, and less congested. If you would like to experience this new technology or learn more about the PRESTO, please visit https://ridepresto.com/.

14 Years to Win World **Correspondence Chess** Tournament

Although the most cerebral of games, chess is generally played in the physical world: the site of the match, the pieces, the players squaring off across a board. But apart from a handful of postcards, Correspondence Chess, a long-distance competition form of the game, takes place entirely in the mind.

Victor (Vytas) Palciauskas of Walnut Creek is a World Champion Correspondence Chess Champion. What is Correspondence Chess, you ask? "You play your first move, which you then send to your opponent, usually by postcard. Your opponent replies. You can take up to three days to analyze a counter move. You make the move, then mail it back to him," explains Palciauskas,

A match of ten moves could take a player thirty days or longer, depending on the mail service and the location. It all seems so oldfashioned and improbable in today's environment of limited and irregular mail delivery. As we talked, I asked him about being able to do it all now via email, text, or with Zoom, and with a computer or handheld device. He just smiled.

Palciauskas first learned chess from his father and uncle while in the DP (Displaced Person) camp in Augsburg, Germany, when he was five years old. Born in Kaunas, Lithuania, during World War II, his family escaped Communism by fleeing to allied-occupied Germany. Without a country, without passports, his family waited for a country to adopt them. That happened in 1949, and they finally emigrated to the USA, settling in Chicago, where they had relatives. The city had the largest Lithuanian community outside of Lithuania. Here he received his elementary and high school education, attended the University of Illinois at Urbana, majoring in Mathematics and Physics and then attained a Ph.D. in Theoretical Physics.

For seven years, Palciauskas was a member of the US Nuclear Waste Technical Review Board advising Congress regarding the Yuca Mountain nuclear disposal waste site.

A brilliant mathematician and an expert on the geology of nuclear waste, Victor's research paper in 1986 won a US Government award. Together with a French scientist, Yves

Gueguen, he published a book, "The Physics of Rocks," which has been translated into multiple languages. He produced four technical papers and twenty-three others that are considered as seminal studies on the subject.

But as much as he has had an amazingly successful academic and professional career, it is as a chess player that he has received international accolades. It was while living in the Lithuanian community in Chicago that he was introduced to the United States Chess Federation. Several men in the community were past Lithuanian Masters.

Palciauskas did not start playing chess seriously until the age of thirteen. He achieved a Candidate Master rating in his first tournament at age sixteen and became a Master at twentyone when he took 5th place in the US Open. But needing more time to spend on his career and preparation for his Ph.D., where he was studying Theoretical Physics, he


abandoned playing regular chess in favor of playing Correspondence Chess. In 1970, he read an article that outlined the process by which a person could advance to become World Correspondence Chess Champion. The winner is based on a points system, mainly the number of games won. It would be a long and tedious path, but having made the decision to do so, Victor excitedly announced to his lovely wife Aurelia, "I have decided to go for it." After listening patiently, she then asked, "And how long will this take?'

"About twelve years if I win every required tournament for the first

"Twelve years! I'll be dead by then!"

He was almost right on target and became the 10th World Correspondence (WC) Chess Champion in 1984 (14 years), as well as a member of the World Chess Hall of Fame. President Ronald Regan sent him a letter of congratulations.

After reaching the pinnacle of the WC

chess world, Palciauskas continued to compete and, in 2003, tied for second place in the "Champion of Champions" tournament for the International Correspondence Chess Federation's Golden Jubilee. It was later in Poznan, Poland, at the ICCC Congress that he received the title of International Correspondence Chess Grandmaster.

Regarding correspondence versus face-to-face chess, he says, "I enjoy the fact that there is no clock. I love this kind of chess because it has played a major role in my life, providing joy, sometimes grief, but always excitement. And I have the opportunity of meeting and corresponding with people from all over the world."

His story of how a young boy from Lithuania, living in a Displaced Persons' Camp in Augsburg, Germany for five years became a world champion chess player, an expert mathematician and a renowned physicist is nothing short of a miracle.

Now living in Walnut Creek, Victor is your amazing neighbor.

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
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Concord Chamber of Commerce Goes to Cuba

"People are going to have the opportunity to live with a Cuban family who is an entrepreneur, to understand what that person is going through to put a nice breakfast on the table. You will meet people on the street, see cultural activities, for example, the Cuban Ballet, one of the top ballets in the world," Bardwill says.

There is much to learn about this forbidden island country. Cuba boasts some of the best salsa dancers, singers, musicians, anywhere according to Bardwill.

"They have very sophisticated medical advancements. They have a free educational system that works. They have a free medical system that works. But they are struggling. Tourism just hasn't completely recovered since Covid."

Most of your needs are covered in the program's costs. "Understand, traveling to Cuba, you have to bring cash because there is no teller machine in Cuba that works for a US bank due to the embargo. You will need money for five dinners. Some people will want to buy cigars. Some people might want to buy some harder rum. Bardwill recommends you bring \$500 to \$1000 of spending money.'

The program costs \$2975. But hurry, deadline to sign-up is October 15. Eligible applicants



will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. Space is limited.

Historic Record - Raises \$253,000 for Martinez Education Foundation

An enthusiastic crowd of runners and walkers, along with 49 generous sponsors, raised \$253,000 in the 22nd Annual MRC-MEF Run for Education on September 28, 2024. The weather was perfect for people to run, walk or roll through Downtown Martinez in the annual community event that supports the Martinez Education Foundation (MEF). MEF funds teacher grants throughout the Martinez Unified School District (MUSD) for items such as interactive TVs for Alhambra High and Martinez Junior High, library books, science workshops, musical instruments, elementary and preschool learning materials, laptops, and playground equipment.

Since the Run for Education started in 2003, it has raised \$1.65 million for K-12 supplies and educational experiences in MUSD and Martinez Refining Company underwrites the cost of the event. City Council Hands Police New Powers to Crack Down on Public Encampments

Leveraging a recent ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court, the Martinez City Council unanimously approved an urgency ordinance giving the police expanded powers to crack down on public encampments.

Although Martinez does not appear to be currently grappling with any large-scale encampments, the City Council decided to take advantage of the new powers granted local governments by the June Supreme Court ruling in Grants Pass v. Johnson to stop the unhoused from sleeping in public areas even if there is no shelter available to them.

In approving the ordinance, council members and staff claimed that Martinez is a compassionate community that has addressed, and will continue to, the issues facing the unhoused in a humane way — despite the fact the city has an abysmal record in creating lowincome housing.

In 2023 Contra Costa County Civil Grand Jury Report found that Martinez was the only city in the county that met zero percent of its Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) targets. All 88 housing permits issued in Martinez during this period were for "above moderate income" homes.

In addition, the state Department of Housing and Conservation Development's Housing Element dashboard shows that in 2023, all 90 housing units completed in Martinez were categorized as "above moderate income"

The issue of lack of housing will no longer be a barrier to the city citing and potentially arresting residents who sleep in public spaces. Previously, the Martinez Municipal Code allowed the city to cite people for camping in public spaces between the hours of 11 p.m. and 8:30 a.m. only if (1) they had been informed of the whereabouts of homeless shelters within Contra Costa County, (2) shelter was available, and (3) they refused to stay in the shelter.

The urgency ordinance lifts those restrictions, which had been required



under a previous ruling by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals that said arresting or removing people who have nowhere to go amounted to "cruel and unusual punishment." In the Grants Pass case, the Supreme Court's overturned the lower court ruling, paving the way for cities such as Martinez to remove the unhoused without a guarantee of shelter elsewhere.

The new ordinance also repeals a previous provision prohibiting people from sleeping in their cars.

Despite the scope of the problem, affordable housing has not emerged as a major topic of interest or discussion during Martinez election campaigns or at council meetings which are not focused on the state-mandated housing element.

Data from last year's civil grand jury report showed that from 1999 to 2020, Martinez permitted a grand total of 48 housing units categorized for very low-income residents, out of a total RHNA target of 633 such units during that period. Martinez is expected to create 350 units of very low-income housing during the 2023-2031 housing element cycle; it created none in the first year.

That priority, however, wasn't reflected in the only recent public statement that the city has made on housing, in which it celebrated a "record-breaking year for property values," boasting that the city saw the biggest percentage increase of any city in Contra Costa County this year.



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California Condors Return to Mount Diablo and the



Seven California condors flew north into Alameda and Contra Costa counties on a circuitous aerial tour on Aug. 18, according to Save Mount Diablo. The three-hour flight began shortly after noon, when they left their previous evening's roost site south of Ohlone Regional Wilderness.

They soared over Pleasanton and Sunol, near the intersection of interstate Highways 580 and 680, over Dublin and Tassajara, and ventured north over Mount Diablo's Pine Canyon near Castle Rock — which Save Mount Diablo said is a potential future nesting site and where the group helped reestablish endangered peregrine falcons

The condors flew as far north as Lime Ridge Open Space, west of Clayton, before veering east — the furthest north the birds have flown in Contra Costa. Save Mount Diablo said the condors circled Mount Diablo before heading south over the outskirts of Livermore and then spending the night in the mountains near Lake Del Valle.

The condors, fitted with radio and GPS transmitters, did not appear to have landed during their time in the area. Save Mount Diablo said they got the information from wildlife biologist Joseph Belli, who volunteers for the California condor recovery program at Pinnacles National Park. He also works closely with Save Mount Diablo and pays special attention to birds ranging up and down the Diablo Range.

"I've been monitoring condors for nearly 20 years and it's wonderful to see groups of them exploring further north in the Diablo Range every summer for the past four years," Alacia Welch, the condor program manager




at Pinnacles National Park, said in a statement. "We would rarely know of these long-range flights if it weren't for the GPS transmitters on some of the condors. I wouldn't be surprised if these summer forays continue into the future, so all you eagle-eyed condor enthusiasts should keep an eye to the sky."

Six condors took an exploratory flight near Mount Diablo about the same time last year. It was the first flock in Contra Costa County in 100 years. Two of them were also among this year's group.

The most recent visitors were a blend of condors raised in captivity and products of wild nests in southern San Benito County and Pinnacles National Park. Pinnacles and the Ventana Wildlife Society co-manage the flock, managing release sites and monitoring the birds from the park and Big Sur.

The central California flock consists of roughly 100 free-flying condors, ranging from north of Paso Robles and San Luis Obispo to southern Santa Clara County and occasionally beyond.

Save Mount Diablo said that number will increase toward the end of the year, when 10 to 12 young condors raised in captivity will be released.

California Secures \$95 Million In Federal Grants For 15 Transformational Neighborhood Park Projects

California today was awarded \$95 million in grant funding from the National Park Service (NPS) to improve outdoor recreation spaces in underserved communities. The funds will go to 15 California public agencies to support park projects in neighborhoods where residents currently have few opportunities to recreate and experience nature. The awards are part of the NPS Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership Grants Program, a nationally competitive program that provides matching grants for park projects in underserved urban communities.

NPS awarded funding to every California project submitted for consideration – the most grants and the largest total amount the state has received in program history.

for Better Health



Do you know the old adage that "you only have to brush the teeth you want to keep?"

Well guess what? The same holds true for your eyes. They need daily maintenance. While everyone knows the importance of brushing your teeth, very few people realize the importance of caring for your eyes.

Your eyes were designed to see the world — the sky, the horizon, the things off in the distance and those right in front of our noses. We should be able to stare at objects, track things as they move, and observe life occurring in our periphery. Our eyes should be able to jump nimbly from one thing to another, regardless of depth or distance.

In our modern lives, we rarely engage in activities that provide our eyes with the necessary visual skills, except for staring at things in close proximity. This scarcity highlights the need for conscious efforts to maintain our eye health

maintain our eye health.

While neglecting to train muscles in your arms or legs is not ideal, ignoring the strength and flexibility of your eyes has consequences that run far deeper than movement limitations. Because vision is so important to survival, even minor deficits in the way our eye's function can create a litany of unwanted health issues such as chronic pain, balance issues, cognitive issues such as focus or memory problems, anxiety, depression, and other mental health issues.

But here's the good news. The reverse is also true. Even minor improvements in visual skills can have considerable benefits in the way you think, move, and feel.



So how do you take care of your eyes? Well, just like the dentist can help you improve your brushing habits, working with a coach can help you dial in the specific visual skills your eyes might benefit from the most. Here is one drill that can get you started:

EYE ISOMETRICS

Practice staring at things. (This can be shockingly difficult for some people). Hold your head straight and still during these exercises. We just want the eyes to move. Start by looking up at something above your head for 5 seconds. Then, repeat to the right, left, and straight down. If that feels too intense, reduce the amount of time or pick a target closer in. If that is fairly easy, hold the gaze for up to 30 seconds.

the gaze for up to 30 seconds.
You can do this drill anywhere, anytime: sitting, standing, even lying in bed. I recommend doing this a few times a day, especially if you spend a lot of time staring at screens. You may notice a decrease in pain or a shift in the way you feel just from doing this simple exercise. But even if you don't, know that this simple drill can help you maintain your health and wellness for the rest of your life.



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Plant Annual Bulbs Now

There is no better time of the year than October to plant annual flowering bulbs. Many require no or little irrigation water during dry summer months. In fact, watering during their dormant phase can rot and kill bulbs. Most are early- to mid-spring bloomers. In clumps or borders, their vivid blooms dazzle and delight.

Plant bulbs in autumn: Our native clay soil can be as hard as concrete in early fall. Planting bulbs is easiest a few days after our first soaking rain. Until then, keep bulbs dry and cool in a paper bag – some gardeners in our area refrigerate them to simulate a cold snap since our winters are milder than their original climates.

When soil is moist and workable, use a spade or special bulb hole digger (available at your local garden center), to dig a hole deep enough for the top of the growing tip to be ½ - 1 inch beneath ground level. Cover the bulb with soil and wait for our seasonal rains to water and wake them. You will not see growth until early spring when they grow their bloom stock. Do not walk or drive over the bulbs as they can easily be crushed. Some gardeners like to cluster several bulbs in a small area for effect.

Separate established bulbs: After the first couple of years, more and more blooms appear in the same area. Healthy bulbs divide each year. Over the years, they may crowd each other and compete for nutrients. Dig up and separate the bulbs after they have gone dormant in early summer. It does not harm them. Use these new bulbs to expand your flower garden with 6-12 inches between each bulb to allow for expansion.

Trimming and care: Annual flowering bulbs require only light maintenance. After their blooming is done, cut the spent flower shoots to about an inch above the leaf crown. Allow their leaves to grow as this is the period when they convert sunshine into stored energy for next year's blooms. In hot summer weather, leaves will yellow and die back to the ground. The dried leaves can be trimmed and disposed of at this time.

Bulb Choices for our area

Narcissus (or jonquil) and daffodils (also on the narcissus family) are spring classics. Most narcissus-jonquil varieties are predominantly white, have small-clustered blossoms, and are alluringly fragrant. They are early spring bloomers. Daffodils are larger, more showy, usually unscented and don't bloom until mid-spring. Many delightful variants are sold, but my personal favorites are King Alfred daffodils and Tazetta hybrid narcissus.

Tulips are not native to our area but thrive in our mild weather. Like other annual bulbs, they come in a wide variety of colors and add color to midspring. Tulips prefer irrigated areas, but too much water can rot bulbs. Plant different-colored plants in a ring or

showcase area to add extra splash.

Douglas irises are native to California and follow the same growing habits as narcissus. They are larger and more enduring plants, so more space in the garden is required. Irises tolerate irrigation water in summer without rotting. Horticultural varieties come in blue, yellow, white, red, copper, pink, or brown. They bloom once in midspring, but their leaves are evergreen. They rapidly multiply in good growing conditions, so plan on separating and replanting.

Non-native Dutch, Spanish, English, Japanese, and bearded irises have larger blooms and later blooming seasons – lasting into early summer. They require more water but are great for showcase areas of your garden. Water immersion-tolerant blue flag irises are native to many parts of north America and are showy choices for decorative ponds and marshy areas.

Many more beautiful annual bulb plants are sold in local garden centers and the internet than space exists to list. Try to choose native and low-water use varieties and you will be delighted by the flowery and fragrant show next spring.

Seasonal Notes: In October, you should allow your rose blossoms to form their "rose hips", the bulbs of flowers. Biologically, this signals the rose bush to stop pushing flowers and reserve its remaining nutrients for a big spring splash. The bush begins its dormancy period.

Also, late season fruits are ripening. Look for orange persimmons and redskinned pomegranates swelling into full ripeness. They are delicious additions to Halloween and Thanksgiving meals.

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Healthy Halloween

It's not often the words healthy and Halloween are put together, but Halloween can be just as healthy as it is fun. Those who know me well, know that I love to make soup on All Hallows' Eve. With this soup and a colorful salad, there will be no guilt splurging on sweets at the end of the



White beans and kale offer protein, fiber, vitamins and antioxidants. Together they make a true superfood. Unlike soups that take all day to cook, this recipe is so fast it will be ready before the kids are ready to hit the streets.

Syrah is a great partner to the spicy chorizo in this soup. One of the more robust grapes, Syrah has beautiful berry flavors, easily picks up the smoky oak barrel notes, and can have a slightly meaty quality. Its dark, almost black, color indicates an abundance of anthocyanins from the skins of the grapes - another healthy bonus.

Beets offer protection against coronary artery disease and stroke, lower cholesterol levels within the body, and have anti-aging effects. When you pair them with piquant grapefruit and creamy avocado, healthy never tasted so good.

Any dish with grapefruit immediately makes me think of New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc. My husband has gone so far as to say that this wine reminds him of vodka and grapefruit juice. Its citrus flavor is so intense, it can sometimes overpower food. In this case, it pairs perfectly with this salad. As a contrast, earthy beets provide a nice counterpoint to the fruitiness of the wine.

This year I am serving 'healthy' chocolate-dipped pretzels at the end of the evening to accompany the usual chocolate minis. For pairing, seek out the sparkling, pink bubbles of Vin du Bugev-Cerdon (pronounced VAN-DUH-BOO-JEE-SEHR-DON). If you cannot find a Bugey, a sweet, sparkling Moscato is a great substitute. Pretzels are low in fat and the salt will set off the

sweetness of both the chocolate and the wine.

So, go on. Pair Up!

BEET, CITRUS, AND AVOCADO SALAD

INGREDIENTS

For the dressing:

- 2 tablespoons lemon or lime juice
- 1 teaspoon cumin seeds, lightly toasted and ground
 - Salt and freshly ground pepper
 - 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
 - 1 tablespoon walnut oil
 - 2 tablespoons canola oil

For the salad:

- 1 bunch beets (about 1 pound), scrubbed and roasted
 - 1 pink grapefruit
- 1 medium or large, ripe but firm, Hass avocado, sliced
 - 2 tablespoons slivered fresh basil

DIRECTIONS

Mix together the lemon or lime juice, the ground cumin seeds, salt, pepper and Dijon mustard. Whisk in the walnut oil and canola

Peel the roasted beets, and slice or cut into wedges. Toss with 2 tablespoons of the

Cut away both ends of the grapefruit so that it sits flat on your work surface. Cut the skin and pith completely away from the fruit, following the natural curve of the fruit from top to bottom. Hold the grapefruit in your

hand over a bowl to catch the juice and cut away each segment from between the membranes

Arrange the beets in the center of a platter, and surround with the grapefruit and avocado slices. Drizzle on the remaining dressing

and any grapefruit juice in the bowl over the grapefruit and avocado. Sprinkle on the basil and serve.

WHITE BEAN SOUP WITH KALE AND CHORIZO



INGREDIENTS

- 2 ounces Spanish chorizo sausage, finely chopped
 - 1 cup chopped onion
 - 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 cups fat-free, lower-sodium chicken broth
- $2\ (15\mbox{-}{\rm ounce})$ cans organic cannellini beans, rinsed and drained
 - 4 cups chopped kale
 - 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper Cracked black pepper (optional)

DIRECTIONS

Heat a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add chorizo to pan; sauté 1 minute. Add onion and garlic to pan; sauté 5 minutes or until tender.

While onions cook, pour

broth into a microwave-safe bowl; microwave at HIGH for 3 minutes. Add hot broth and beans to pan; bring to a boil. Partially mash beans with potato masher. Stir in kale and 1/2 teaspoon pepper; cook over medium heat for 6 minutes. Sprinkle with cracked pepper, if desired.


