# WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE PURPLE?

Purple is among the rarest color in nature, reminding us to seek out the "purple-ness" in our haumāna-the things that make each student rare and unique.

Mai'a means banana ma ka 'ōlelo Hawai'i. It references the purple flower of the banana tree.

# OUR PROGRAMS

### EDUCATION

The Kaikaina project is our collection of programs for youth ages 10-18. Weaving together technical skill-building, Hawaiian cultural practices, community knowledge, and leadership/entrepreneurship development, Kaikaina programs are intentional in creating culturally-grounded computer science (CS) and STEAM learning experiences for mostly Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander youth. We focus on after school time learning as well as collaborative partnerships with schools and youth centers to increase community capacity in culture-based CS.

### ENTREPENEURSHIP

In 2016 we created the Purple Prize, an innovation competition that empowered the people of Hawai'i to create impactful technology startups rooted in Hawaiian values. Since then we've worked with over 40 teams and given out nearly \$250K in funding.

After four Purple Prize competitions we started to evolve and expand our entrepreneurship programming and launched a culture-based design thinking program, an accelerator for minority wāhine, and created a venture studio to more effectively support me'e entrepreneurs building values-driven ventures.

# WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

The Hiapo Program is designed to give Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders the opportunity to transition into a new career in tech. The program consists of an intro course, a bootcamp-style online training to gain Salesforce Administrator certification, and finally the opportunity to join our Olonā apprenticeship. Hiapo's vision is to create a new generation of skilled tech workers from often overlooked segments of our community and provide them with better career opportunities, training, and ultimately economic advancement.

# KAIKAINA YOUTH PROGRAMS

Underrepresentation of Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander students in the technology classroom persists in part because Indigenous and other non-western cultures have been stereotypically portrayed as backward and undeveloped--the opposite of excellence in technology and innovation. This carries down into students not "seeing themselves" as potentially good at computer science and feeling like existing educational spaces for CS aren't welcoming or affirming of their identities.

We challenge this by running Computer Science (CS) classrooms in a culturally grounded way. This means teaching a coding class based on the algorithmic patterns of making lei. Or using the Minecraft gaming platform for haumāna to build ahupua'a landscapes. It is our goal to make the link between Indigenous ecological technologies and contemporary digital innovation -- teaching CS in concert with culture-based and 'āina-based education.

As we increase access to tech education and ground students in the knowledge that their ancestors were Indigenous innovators, we also increase students' earning potential and unlock their ability to use their talents and perspectives to serve their communities and lands through technology and innovation.

# BUILDING ON OUR TRACK RECORD OF SUCCESS.

### 2014 - 2015

Haumāna: 20

Pilot after-school technology class at Jarrett MS in Pālolo Valley. Oʻahu.

### 2015 - 2016

3 after school classes serving 32 middle school students and 10 Community Workshops serving 140 haumāna and 15 teachers.

### 2016 - 2017

Served 129 elementary, middle, and high school students in urban Honolulu, Wai'anae coast, Maui, and Lāna'i. 10 Community Workshops serving 190 haumāna.

### 2017 - 2018

Served 211 students in 6th-12th grade in urban Honolulu, Wai'anae coast, Kapolei, Kailua, plus Maui and Hawai'i Island. Piloted Weekend Academy, an online course, and Women & Girls Processing Power workshop.

### 2018-2019

Served 216 students in 6th-12th grade on Oʻahu, Maui, and Hawaiʻi.

### 2019-2020

Served 484 students in 6th-12th grade mostly on O'ahu and Maui. Pivoted at midyear to totally online instruction during Covid-19, reaching students on neighbor islands.

# 2020-2021

Served 439 students in 6th-12th grade on Oʻahu, Hawaiʻi Island, Maui, and Kauaʻi, mostly through virtual after school learning.



In March 2020, Purple Mai'a pivoted to all online instruction. In a matter of a few weeks, we launched courses, many of them new offerings. We attracted over 240 students from across Hawai'i. Going through that experience provided insights that we have since incorporated into our course offerings, which remain virtual or hybrid until the thread of Covid-19 has subsided. We are working to build supports for digital learning across all our youth programs, such as Haumana, our Moodle-based system for online student learning, and our parent portal for enrollment and tracking student progress.

# 'ĪNANA

Based in Hālau 'Īnana, this program uses technology education to foster student engagement, expression, and leadership. Students explore their world through imaginative digital and tactile/embodied arts and math content and make connections with guest experts from the community.

# FUTURE ANCESTORS

Know your piko (hoʻomau), find your passion (hoʻomoʻo), and live your purpose (poʻokela). This program builds Future Ancestors by focusing on inspiring, empowering, and activating students to master traditional practices and contemporary technologies to serve their communities. The program engages haumāna from Hawaiian focused Charter Schools (Ka Waihona o Ka Na'auao) in a predominantly Native Hawaiian region (Wai'anae/Nānākuli). With the goal of developing connection to their community through social entrepreneurism, this form of leadership training grows 'ōiwi leaders from the ground up by empowering them to see the genius in themselves and their community.

# MĀLAMA ENTREPRENEURSHIP PROGRAMS

In ecologically balanced societies, culturally-embedded technologies enhance and serve sustainable, living systems that provide health and well-being for 'āina and people, now and into the future.

That is the vision the Purple Mai'a foundation set out to work towards in 2016 when we launched the Purple Prize as a pilot competition designed to push the limits on the way technology facilitates and amplifies the values of aloha 'āina, which means "love of the land," a central idea of Hawaiian thought and culture emphasizing connections between land, people and communities.

After four years, this vision has materialized into some exciting results!

# MĀLAMA VENTURE STUDIOS

Purple Mai'a Foundation has been looking to ancestral technologies for inspiration, recognizing their importance in a time where our climates are shifting, our environments are degrading, and where peace is difficult to come by. Over the last five years, we've successfully led four incubator cohorts to generate nearly 50 ideas and over a dozen technology companies, a handful of which are growing quickly.

To ensure these companies' success and the creation of local, future-of-work jobs, we've decided to launch a venture studio this year. At Mālama Venture Studio (MVS), we partner with companies, often driven by Native Hawaiian founders, to build impactful and scalable technologies on top of the platforms our ancestors created.

As a venture studio, we are here to fill gaps in key functions for these companies, empowering them to grow faster, larger, and create greater impact. As founders, investors, social innovators, and builders ourselves, we are capable of providing value to teams and love the journey of building a company from the ground up. As fathers, mothers, and sons rooted in Hawai'i and Hawaiian culture, we are driven to see our communities thrive economically and we aspire to see a world that resembles the stories we read about times of old

# PURPLE PRIZE

In 2013, Donavan Kealoha and Olin Lagon, Native Hawaiian entrepreneurs and technologists, co-founded Purple Mai'a Foundation with the intention of educating and inspiring the next generation of culturally grounded, community serving technology makers.

Recognizing a lack of job opportunities for students being educated, Kealoha, Lagon, Kelsey Amos (now Co-Founder & COO), and many of the founding board members created a prize competition for innovators with ideas for technology solutions rooted in Native Hawaiian culture, the Purple Prize.

Their hope was that the Purple Prize would spark the creation of local values-driven, place-based technology companies, which would eventually add to the supply of high-wage technology jobs for our high-potential youth...

A handful of the companies we've worked with have the potential to do immense good for our community and generate significant value, leading to a more vibrant local innovation economy in the form of jobs, livelihoods, and Hawaiian leadership. **56**

# HAWAI'I FOUNDHER

FoundHer is an accelerator program tailored specifically to the needs of Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander, and/or Asian women and mothers starting businesses in five core markets of Hawai'i's economy: Tech, Fashion, Health & Wellness, Food System/Restaurants, and Keiki/Education.

FoundHer was created by women for women and provides researchtested resources critical to the success of an early-stage wāhine-led business. We aim to provide:


Funding, Child and elder care, Workspace, Mentorship

Our team of wāhine (women) founders, business leaders, investors, and operators aim to grow five women-led businesses by 100-300% in the year they participate in the 6-month program.

In the 2021 pilot year, we received almost 200 applications from throughout the pae 'āīna. The final five companies are from Hawai'i Island, Maui and Kaua'i.

We're proud to serve the growth of Native Hawaiians and women in technology.











# HIAPO WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

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The first cohort, dubbed Papa A'ali'i to emphasize resilience to challenges, took their first steps of the 12-week journey in September 2020.

Cohorts learn the basics of the cloud-based Salesforce customer relationship management (CRM) platform and aim to achieve their Salesforce Administrator certification by the end of the training program.
