



Ride a robotaxi

in <u>Dubai</u>

If you're hailing a cab in Dubai this month, you better hope that robots have good eyesight. This UAE city rolled out its first test bunch of robotaxis, from autonomous vehicle (AV) start-up Cruise, in the upscale Jumeirah district in early December.

These cars are fitted with laser detection and more than 100 sensors to help them avoid crashes. According to Ahmed Bahrozyan, the CEO of Dubai's Roads and Transport Authority (RTA), who is hoping to add 4,000 of these cars to bolster Dubai's 12,000-strong taxi population, the vehicles should be safer as they cut out human error in driving.

The rollout came at the end of a year when the world's first full-size autonomous bus – the AB1 – began its route between Edinburgh and Fife in the UK, and Aurrigo Auto-Shuttles began testing in Prague and Brno in the Czech Republic.










"The deeper you go, the crazier it gets"

Deep Dive Dubai is home to the world's deepest pool featuring an underwater city and a 60m-deep abyss. How would our inexperienced (and terrified) writer get on?

y trial by water begins in the dive shop, where I'm handed a pair of fins and a wetsuit that accentuates every roll of fat. Tanks of air, a belt with lumps of metal attached, snorkel and a rubber mouthpiece complete the look, which doesn't do me any sartorial favours.

For some reason I've volunteered to jump into the world's deepest swimming pool, kitted out in scuba gear. How deep are we talking? Sixty metres. To put that in perspective, the average depth of the English Channel is 63m. It's fair to say I'm pretty nervous.

Twenty minutes from the city's downtown, Deep Dive Dubai resembles a giant oyster shell. The complex was built in 2021 as a one-stop shop for dive training at all levels, with a hyperbaric chamber, filter system and an underwater film studio, as well as the vast pool.

On the poolside, I'm met by Dario, a friendly Italian with over 30 years of diving experience. I've only been diving twice before, but even complete beginners are welcome here, although non-qualified divers like me can only dive to 12m. Even that seems a lot right now – it's higher than a three-storey house! – but Dario attempts to calm my anxieties with a long and thorough pre-dive briefing.

I'm reminded how to equalise: to regularly pinch my nose and attempt to exhale through my nostrils, mitigating against the increased air pressure as we descend. Also how to remove and replace my regulator underwater, and how to communicate via hand gestures. To tell others you're OK, divers make a circle with their thumb and index fingers. I practise this, despite still feeling anything but.

After a couple of submersions in the shallows, we are on to the dive itself, which begins with the crossing of a ledge. It's at this point where what looked like an innocuous swimming pool transforms into a scene from *The Abyss*. Far below me is a deep, dark, circular chasm from which no light emerges. It's an impressive and disconcerting sight. As I see a group of freedivers descend into the depths, I feel grateful for my limited experience and confinement to the relative shallows.


At 60.2m, the pool is 15m deeper than anything built previously, and has been verified by Guinness World Records as the deepest in the world. It contains 14 million litres of water. I reflect that only Dubai – already home to the world's tallest building, largest observation wheel and highest infinity pool – could create such a pool on such a scale.

Throughout the dive I have to occasionally clear water from my mask, but this goes without incident and I can equalise with ease. At one point, Dario and I enter an underwater habitat, which enables us to surface inside a dry air space and chat. Things are going well, he says, although my mask is slipping.

I feel like James Bond in *Thunderball* as I begin to interact with the pool's sunken city. Each level has different features – the deeper you go, the crazier it gets. At my basic level there are streetlights, parking metres, a toilet (don't ask), benches and lots of amusing elements to engage with.

One minute I'm cueing up for a game of underwater pool, the next I'm revving the throttle of a motorbike. Dario and I play a game of chess. There's a sofa to

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


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the experience



slender, grey-haired Frenchman stands next to me. We both stare at the powder-dusted forest on the mountainside above us, hoping to see his friend emerge from the trees. He doesn't look as worried as I feel, but then I'm new to this. I've never lost an eagle before.

It's been a day of firsts. A sunny one, too, which began by meeting Jacques-Olivier Travers and his eagle, Fletcher, at the Les Aigles du Léman – a traditional Savoyard restaurant/bird sanctuary located on the Pointe de Nyon, one of the tree-covered peaks surrounding the fabulous, vibrant Alpine town of Morzine. Slap bang in the middle of a broad piste, it's quite the place. You can enjoy a hearty, probably cheese-based lunch while watching Jacques-Olivier educate visitors with displays from the resident raptors (aka birds of prey).

You can also interact with the birds in unusually exciting ways. Wannabe Franz Klammers can race a falcon down the mountain (the bird has yet to lose), while a limited number of people can ski with Jacques-Olivier and Fletcher most mornings. It's free, but booking well in advance is recommended.


It's the latter I'm trying today, and it begins in slapstick fashion. The three of us get on a chairlift, with Fletcher gripping tightly to Jacques-Olivier's leather glove. He's full of pent-up energy because Jacques-Olivier has been away for a couple of weeks. As a result, I get an accidental wing to the head. It's not why I wear a ski helmet but I'm grateful for it nonetheless. "He's like a kid," explains Jacques-Olivier. "Some days he's very peaceful. Some, like this morning, he's very excited!"

At the top of the lift, a group of friends somehow remain oblivious to a man with an eagle standing next to them until a collective, comical double-take is followed by exclamations of wonder. They're not the only ones bewitched. As we weave down the busy piste, Fletcher twists, soars and dips along his own path, sometimes inches from the snow, but always in contact with Jacques-Olivier, as if attached by an invisible bungee cord. Skiers' eyes everywhere are drawn to him; collisions miraculously avoided.

I can't blame them. I can't quite believe that I'm skiing with an eagle; it's an almost spiritual experience. It's the best thing I've ever done on a mountain.

Diverting onto a quieter run, the sunlight piercing through gaps in the trees like a barrage of laser beams, we have the time and space to take it all in, before stopping when Fletcher decides he wants to rest on the ground for a bit. It's an opportunity to discuss Jacques-Olivier's work.

"I've loved birds since I was a baby," he says. "My first bird was a magpie. I lived near a farm



and it fell from a tree. I wanted to help it.
Unfortunately, I was not good. I gave it
bread and milk and it was a disaster. It died
after three days. I was crying and crying.
My mother said, 'You will save the next one.'
After that, I tried to save all the birds I could."

Jacques-Olivier's current ambitions are grander. Fletcher is a white-tailed eagle. For generations, they were a common sight above the Alps. Then, with one snap of humanity's finger, there was none. As well as this winter park, there's a summer park and a reintroduction centre near Lake Geneva. It's here that he's bringing these glorious birds back to the region.

"In the 19th century, we killed all of them by shooting," says Jacques-Olivier. "It was in England, in France, everywhere. They disappeared from almost all of Europe. The last pair in France disappeared in 1892.

"We decided 10 years ago to introduce this bird around Lake Geneva. But it took me 10 years to get the authorisation and the skill to breed them and release them. In the future, we'll release 80 birds, but we started in 2022 with four birds: two males and two females. It's funny because two stayed in France and two went to Switzerland!"

Fletcher isn't one of them. His only significant other is Jacques-Olivier. They have quite the bond, like an all-action version of Long John Silver and his parrot – minus the piracy and "pieces of eight" lines.

Jacques-Olivier Travers and his feathered pal, Fletcher, strut their stuff on the slopes around Morzine "A friend of mine told me, a bird or a dog gives you back what you give first," says Jacques-Olivier. "There's no secret. I spend lots of time with him, do things like walking and skiing. He understands that it's good


to be with you because when you come he will not stay in his cage. You become his central point, so he's happy to see you."

Kids don't always behave, of course. Our trio continues down through the forest until, suddenly, we're a duo. Fletcher has absconded into the trees. We ski slowly, eyes peeled, with members of Jacques-Olivier's team joining us in the search. Walkie-talkies and mobile phones appear from pockets – this isn't their first eagle rodeo. We reach the bottom of the run, which is where we find ourselves staring up – me worried, my French friend's feathers unruffled. "He'll come," he says. Five minutes pass. Then five more. I feel anxious and useless, so I volunteer to jump on a chairlift that runs through the section of forest where Fletcher was last seen and report any sightings.

Moments after I take my seat, I get a call. Fletcher has just flown onto Jacques-Olivier's wrist. I look up again, this time at the chairlift, and smile. There's now no reason for my long, slow, irreversible journey ahead, but Jacques-Olivier's is far from pointless.


urprisingly, the seed for Bishkek's most innovative tour company was planted halfway across the world. "I did my master's in England, and I used to go on thematic tours," says Rahat Yusubalieva. "I really loved the different perspectives that the local guides would provide – not what you see from the official point of view, but underground subcultures, or the history of abandoned towns." Back in Bishkek, she was keen to see her own culture with fresh eyes but couldn't find the kind of insider tours that sparked her curiosity. Swapping office life for a freelance career, she launched Bishkek Walks in 2016.

The company's English-language tours run year-round, usually on weekends (they also offer private tours by request), spanning everything from street art to archaeology and Ayurveda. In summer, they focus on multi-day trips around Kyrgyzstan – in hot demand among international visitors. These might include staying in a yurt, meeting shepherds, or enjoying the country's superb hiking and mountain lakes. The now five-strong team is supplemented by extra seasonal guides, and a pool of outside experts.

History tours have always been at its core, going way beyond the country's relatively recent Soviet past. "Bishkek has such a diverse story to tell," says Rahat. "There have been so many peoples on this land, from nomadic civilisations with their visual arts, to the Silk Road, which was a crossroads of trade, culture, religion and language. Then there was Islam, the Soviet Union, and independent Bishkek. There are layers and layers of history here – not just things you can see, but also things that you can't."

It's this hidden side of the country that she's particularly passionate about, be it buildings still

bearing Latin script - used briefly before Soviet-era Cyrillic came to dominate - or medieval streets amid otherwise modern cities. "You turn a corner and suddenly there's a very different feeling. Or you enter a building and find a stained glass masterpiece. There are so many amazing places that often you don't really notice." Visits to memorial sites bearing witness to Kyrgyzstan's independence also line up alongside tours of local artists' studios, and one uncovering the Interhelpo group: Czech Communist workers who built Bishkek's industrial district. "It's a very interesting part of our history from which we can derive lessons for the future," says Rahat, "but not many people know about it, even residents."

One popular walk focuses on Bishkek's striking array of Soviet murals and architecture, from the whacky UFO-shaped State Circus to the vivid Sunny Fish Fountain. Such sites are menaced by rapid urban redevelopment; besides sharing their joys, Rahat is on a mission to help document and preserve them, turning to social media to raise awareness of their importance. "Every time we do one of these tours something is gone," she says. "A beautiful yurt-shaped bus stop was destroyed in Issyk-Kul because they were widening the road and didn't know about the art. These kinds of sites really speak about the local culture, whether it's

- 1. Did you know that Turanian tigers (also known as Balkhash or Caspian tigers) roamed the reed thickets around Bishkek until the early 20th century?
- 2. It is a said that Bishkek is named after a wooden stick used to make the national drink, kumis, or fermented mare's milk.
- 3. Wondering why your flight ticket to Bishkek says 'FRU', where you would expect the airport code for Manas International Airport? It stands for 'Frunze', the capital's Soviet name until 1991.

showing the nomadic lifestyle or flora from a place. They're so unique."

Rahat's background in environmental protection and community development meanwhile fuels the group's socially conscious remit. "As part of Bishkek Walks, we take vulnerable local kids on our tours and give them art workshops where we talk about environmental issues. We want to do something for the community and share our knowledge with kids who don't have access to culture." If that doesn't sound like your typical tour agency, that's largely the point. "We do things that we want to do," clarifies Rahat. "It's not purely commercial, but more things that we want to see or improve in Bishkek."

For the moment, tours mainly draw foreign visitors, but there's growing interest among locals too - especially younger people who have travelled

abroad and returned, like Rahat did, with a newfound passion for their roots. Going forward, to encourage that trend, she plans to add Russian and Kyrgyz language tours to the mix. She's also busy expanding a range of Bishkek Walks merchandise – totes, T-shirts – featuring images of the threatened buildings central to their preservation campaign. "For Bishkek we chose 'Rakushka', a small 1970s building shaped like a snail. It's an architectural masterpiece and now a café, and when a private company wanted to sell the land, it caused a scandal.

"In the future we would like to support Bishkek more and more," she continues. "In terms of Kyrgyzstan, we would also like to do some reforestation projects, because climate change is really affecting us. This year we could feel the lack of water in the country though we are one of the main providers for Central Asia. We are doing these things slowly because they require a lot of research and we only have so much time. But our dreams are big and step by step we will get there."

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
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
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This December in London there's every chance you'll see a strange-looking bus. Covered in green lights, and full of clinking china and singsong, the Grinchmas Afternoon Tea Bus Tour is one of the several themed tours run by Brigit's Bakery in Covent Garden.

"More than 10 years ago, we were lucky enough to be part of the movement to make afternoon tea affordable for anyone," explains Jean-Philippe Boriau, who heads up the company's entertainment arm. "Then we wanted to elevate the experience, to make it fully immersive." They reached out to brands to theme their 'afternoon tea on a bus' concept.

Ten years later, the idea has *scone* down (sorry) a storm. Tours now include collabs with Peppa Pig, Paddington and Bombay Sapphire, with the company selling over 10.000 tickets a month.

After a successful debut last year, 'Grinchmas' is returning with an extra bus running daily for 2023. Guests cuddle up on green furry seats for 90 minutes of Christmas lights and games hosted by the Mayor of Whoville, along a route that takes in classic sights including Trafalgar Square and Harrods. Its unique, Grinchy take on teatime includes 'Here for the Roast Beast' turkey and cheese sandwiches and 'Sweet as Cindy Lou' Lime Pies.

Jean-Philippe says he met a lot of amateur Grinch impressionists last year – "We get fans of the Dr Seuss universe who come specially for the experience," he says – but also tourists who appreciate the timesaving factor. "It's very quirky, a bit unconventional but they get to tour on a 1960s Routemaster bus, see the lights, get information about London, and a full afternoon tea, all at the same time." **b-bakery.com**



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t's fair to say Vienna's world-famous inventions are varied. The croissant, psychoanalysis and waterproof mascara are just some of the Austrian capital's mighty exports. But there's one memento that gets a little more focus at this time of year: Vienna is also the home of the snow globe - the water and 'snowflake'-filled miniature worlds synonymous with the magic of Christmas. And it came from a - literal - bright idea over 100 vears ago.

"My grandfather was a surgical instruments mechanic, and he wanted to improve Edison's light bulb to use in hospital operation rooms," says Erwin Perzy III, the third generation to run the family's snow globe business. Experiments followed, he explains, from mounting a solid glass lens in front of an electric light bulb, to taking a water-filled glass globe used by shoemakers to magnify candlelight and filling it with light-reflecting glass grains, which quickly sank.

"One day in his mother's kitchen he found a white powder - wheat semolina used for baby food," says Erwin III. "He poured this in, and the little flakes got soaked by the water and floated very slowly, and that was the basic idea for the invention of the snow alobe."

Today, more than 200,000 Viennese snow globes are produced each year at the Perzy workshop in a 250-year-old building in Vienna's suburban

17th district. Erwin III and his daughter Sabine, the inventor's great-granddaughter and first woman at the company's helm, still create snow globes by hand just as the original Erwin Perzy did all the way back in 1900. But the rise of the snow globe from accidental invention to Vienna's gift to the world is serendipitous in many ways.


After he made that first snow globe, Erwin Perzy continued his work on surgical instruments. The opportunity to sell his new creation came via a friend's souvenir shop in nearby Mariazell. The first snow globe scene was of the church of Mariazell. "He made just one and his friend sold it right away," says Erwin III. "And then told my grandfather to [make more] because it might sell well," he says. And so, he began working with pilgrim sites in Austria to craft globes featuring churches and Christian crosses.

The next step for the snow globe came when Erwin's son, Erwin Perzy II, took over after the Second World War. He was a part-time courier driver for an Austrian newspaper under American management. Somehow, the right person caught a glimpse of the globes and thought they would make a perfect Christmas gift in the USA – but without the Austrian churches. Erwin III explains how his father made three new designs for this new market: a Santa Claus, a Christmas tree and a snowman – the latter becoming a best-seller and the company's logo.

"He showed these new designs at the Nuremberg International Toy Fair, met American customers, and since then, we've been selling snow globes to the United States," says Erwin III.







Although today Japan is the biggest market for the Perzy snow globe, they are imported all over the world. Outside of global souvenir buyers and highprofile clients like Versace, Tiffany & Co., Chopard and Porsche, around 10% of annual orders are Vienna based, with designs customised for museums like Albertina and Secession, and Viennese hotels including Sacher, Sofitel and Ritz-Carlton. You'll also find an array of advent scenes for sale across stalls at Vienna's Christmas Markets with the 'Vienna Snow Globe Austria' stamp of originality on its base.

In the workshop, toolmaker-by-trade Erwin Perzy III still creates all the snow globes personally. Year-round production, from assembly to painting, is done by hand – although 3D printers and plastic injection moulds are used for larger orders. The snow globe's legacy is explained in the three-roomed







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

Original Snowglobe Museum – attached to the workshop – which begins with a recreation of Erwin Perzy's experiment beneath a black-and-white portrait of the inventor. Inside, a chronicled exhibit full of cabinets and corkboards, tables and tassel-lined shelves is filled with everything from old tools and pictures to a replica of the wooden cabin snow globe from the Orson Welles 1941 classic, *Citizen Kane*. The archive is packed with hundreds of snow globes, which of course you can buy on site. Every other spare inch of wall space is given to framed photographs of the Perzy family with happy customers.

"I think our product reflects our love for what we do, and this is absolutely necessary to produce the snow globes," Sabine says. As the mastermind of newer designs and with a constant eye on trends – she was the brains behind the whimsical toilet roll snow globe during the pandemic, which went viral online and reached 1,500 orders in a single day – she will continue the legacy of the Perzy's timeless souvenir with an experimental touch.

While pointing out the pictures of children looking at snow globes with wide-eyed wonder, Erwin III acknowledges how they arrive to the museum distracted by their phones and tablets, "But with our snow globes, there is no light, nothing, just snowflakes inside. They must use their hands, and shake it to make the snow fall. The way they look at the snow globes..." "It's very magical," Sabine finishes.

So, what is this magic snow made of today – is it still semolina? "It's my secret," Erwin says with a cheeky smile. It turns out it's such a safely guarded secret that even Sabine doesn't know the recipe yet. "She knows a little bit, but not everything," he adds. Whatever it is, it's a glass-encased kind of magic that will continue to shake up the souvenir scene for generations to come. **schneekugel.at**

Though you can now get most produce throughout most of the year in Türkiye, Maksut has made it his goal – and that of his restaurant, Neolokal – to preserve the joy of seasonality and traditional cuisine in an innovative and sustainable way, earning the eatery Türkiye's first green Michelin star at

Neolokal opened nine years ago on the top floor of Salt Galata, an Ottoman-era bank-turned-art-space. Maksut was already playing with the concept of hyper-local cuisine in his previous restaurant, so it was an easy choice to make that idea central to the new enterprise. The restaurant would have a garden, would use local produce

from all over Anatolia, and would focus not just on environmental sustainability, but cultural and social sustainability as well.

Maksut was a delegate with the Slow Food movement in Türkiye, and through that he gradually started to build up a network of farmers and producers all over the country, from a yoghurt maker in Denizli to a beekeeper in Şile. Through dishes made from local produce, Maksut is attempting to preserve the flavours and traditional recipes of the country. Ideas for dishes come from all over the place. "Childhood memories, stories, my mum, my family, families of others, the huge history and heritage of our traditions... I think geography is a great inspiration," he says.

All of it comes back to nature and what grows locally. Maksut makes this a key aspect of the whole process of preparing the food at Neolokal. "I let my young team touch the soil, because everything starts from touching the soil and understanding the soil's cycles," he says.

An hour away from Neolokal's perch in Karaköy is Urban Garden, the place that

provides much of the produce for the restaurant's menu. Beyhan Uzunçarşılıoğlu greets visitors at the entrance to her garden in Gümüşdere. While located in greater İstanbul, the tranquil neighbourhood is a far cry from the hustle and bustle of the city. Walking through the garden, past neat lines of pockmarked cabbages and cauliflowers, broccoli and green peppers, Beyhan neatly breaks off fragrant leaves and shoves them towards her visitors, imploring: "Taste this!" There are herbs for tea, oxalis leaves with the flavour of punchy citrus, and mint so fresh, it makes breath seem to sparkle.

Beyhan has been active in farming and gardening for nearly 30 years, and the Urban Garden has been open in Gümüşdere for 12. During that time there has been an emphasis on growing and teaching about organic, local food. Beyhan doesn't manipulate the soil or use chemicals, and really focuses on farming as a way of life.

Many chefs approach Beyhan about working together, but she felt most drawn to Maksut because of his heart, his way of looking at sustainability, and an affinity between their two visions. Now, much of the process starts with the produce at the farm, even before the menu is made, or sometimes as a collaboration between Maksut's vision and Beyhan's capabilities. "It's a real farm-to-table discipline," she

says. Waste from the restaurant is returned to the garden, to use as compost.

Through Maksut, Beyhan has found a partner who can project an example of true urban gardening sustainability out into the world of fine dining. "Everybody talks about sustainability, of course, but it's not the real thing. They're talking, but not doing," says Beyhan. "We know the difference between the chefs and restaurants only talking about sustainability. Ok, you are talking, but what are you doing to change things?"

Urban gardening and sustainable food are a growing trend in Türkiye, despite the many challenges of making it work in a city as dense as İstanbul. Projects such as Kokopelli Şehirde and Ek Biç Ye İç promote sustainable growing and eating in the city, while the Kadiköy Municipality offers urban allotments for residents to grow what they choose. Meanwhile, the culture centre Postane in the Galata neighbourhood keeps an urban garden on the roof to both supply the downstairs café with produce, and also to educate about growing your own food in the city.

The idea of a roof garden was part of Postane's design from the beginning. Burcu Arıkan is the cofounder of İyi Ekim, who partners with Postane on creating and maintaining the edible garden. "Our goal

The windows at Neolokal open to a view of the majestic Süleymaniye Mosque, glowing as the sky fades to a smoky blue and the city glitters. Some tables have views of the tangle of streets that make up the Perşembe Pazarı – the part of Karaköy where it's possible to buy anything from fishing tackle to porcelain handles and spools of wire – Hagia Sophia and the Galata Bridge.

The meal at Neolokal is accompanied by a small booklet of stories about each course. One plate is preceded by a dramatic five-minute-long video illustrating the creation of the dish, a complex morel mushroom manti (Turkish dumpling). The courses draw inspiration from seasonal produce and recipes from all over Türkiye.

On an unseasonably warm night in October, some of the menu highlights included a marinated sea bass and gambilya fava speckled with edible flowers, a perfect balance of sweetness and brine; a dish called "tirit & katmer" that contemporises a beef and duck dish layered in a crispy layer of filo pastry, with colourful dollops of infused yoghurt; and a clear drink that looks like water but tastes like fresh pumpkin, a culinary magic trick full of the flavour of autumn.

Neolokal is trying to create a bridge between the past and the future, between the nostalgic tastes and traditions of Anatolia and the cutting-edge fine dining that earned Maksut and his team the coveted green Michelin star.

"I can be a good role model for young generations, so that they can believe in what we have done so far, and they can take it to the future, because I'm not going to be there in the future. They will be there," says Maksut. "I need to sustain my traditions, so that I can create a sustainable future for myself and for others."

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"We have this swimming culture in celand - going to the ool is a vital part of ife's routine New Year's Day sees cold water dips all over the world - but are any as loony as Reykjavík's? We speak to some of those who took the plunge for 2023's event to find out why Icelanders take sea-swimming to the next level Words by Sarah Warwick

REYKJAVIK

here's something weird about looking at pictures of Reykjavík's Nýárssund (New Year's Swim) from January 2023. The juxtaposition of ice and this many sequins usually only happens at cocktail parties, and there the ice is well under control.

While there's no less of a sense of occasion depicted in these images, they nevertheless feel wildly out of kilter. The ice is dominant, manifesting in great blue chunks that crust over the city's main bay. Women of all ages, resplendent in multi-coloured spangle, are wading knee-deep through frozen water while the bow-ties and tailcoats of their male counterparts are polka-dotted with snow.

The overall impression is of some magical cocktail party gone wrong or party-goers transported to an icy planet. But of course, it's not that at all. It's just the couple of hundred overexcited locals who take it upon themselves to plunge into the icy shallows of the Nauthólsvík geothermal beach each 1 January.

Reykjavík is by no means the only place to celebrate a New Year's Day swim. South Queensferry, near Edinburgh, has its infamous Loony Dook; New York's Coney Island its Polar Bear Club Plunge and the residents of Geneva are known to bob about in the eponymous lake to mark the first day of the New Year. Participants at these events also dress in elaborate costumes and sometimes break the ice, but

as we found out when we spoke to those involved, there's something a bit special about Reykjavík.

"We have this swimming culture in Iceland," explains Herdis Anna Thorvaldsdottir, chair of Sjór Sund, the Reykjavík sea-swimming organisation, since 2018. "Going to the pool is a vital part of life's routine. The neighbourhood public geothermal outdoor pools with all their hot tubs and various facilities play a huge role in making this country habitable. It's our version of going to the pub."

While swimming here still usually means bobbing about in geothermal pools, over the past 10 years there's been a big change in levels of enthusiasm for cold-water swimming. "It's been a constant trend for the last decade and just skyrocketed after Covid, especially since it's believed to boost the immune system. Since around 2015... every swimming pool has a cold part as well as warm," says Herdis.

She estimates around 2% of Reykjavík's population will head to Nauthólsvík – the city's man-made beach – all year round, including the 300 who attend on New Year's Day. "Of course those that don't do it still find cold-water swimming kind of crazy, but there are so many doing it now – you don't get the same reactions when you talk about it."

For many of us the very idea of a New Year's swim is sheer lunacy (hence the 'loony' dook). But, if you follow the logic that, the colder and darker it is, the



more of a spectacle it provides, then Reykjavík, the most northerly capital city in Europe, provides the ultimate spectacle.

Indeed, the Icelanders' outfits – be they shortsleeved velvet or leopard print – look inappropriate for the weather, even before they start to wade out into the water, which is often below freezing. But participants say that, for those who can endure, there are a myriad of health benefits to an ice-cold dip.

"Sea-swimming is very health-promoting and has a broad function on body and soul," is how another of the swimmers – Hinrik Ólafsson, actor and guide, who has been sea-bathing and sea-swimming for almost 20 years – puts it. "It works on all kinds of inflammation in the body, produces mental wellbeing, improves breathing, is self-promoting and provides a great sense of freedom."


Hinrik, who suffers from arthritis, reports he is completely free of pain (and medication) since taking up cold-water swimming. "And don't forget the mental aspect. A lot of positive signals from the brain in the cold water spew out, so smiles and joy play around you."

Herdis too describes this joy, the post-dip rush of endorphins, as a "superhero" feeling, relating it to the body's victory over a physically challenging experience. "It's about facing the elements," she explains. "When you go into the water, you go

into fight or flight mode. By manually putting your body into rest and digest mode by controlling your breathing, you can tolerate it. You're not just controlled by nature. You're in control."

To get into 'rest and digest', Herdis has an unusual technique: singing. "When you sing you're breathing out slower than you breathe in," she explains. "This stimulates the right way of breathing and it also makes time fly faster. My guidance is to find a song you know before you go in and just start singing. Sing loud because who cares when you're in the sea!" For beginners, she also recommends wearing neoprene boots and gloves, eating suitable nutrition, and ideally letting someone know this is your first time in such cold water.

If attending the New Year's swim, there's a softer option, as Nauthólsvík has a geothermally warmed lagoon that's around 3°C warmer than the sea, as well as a giant hot tub for warming up (at 38°C) afterwards. Either way: "Try not to party too hard on New Year's the night before since it's vital to have a good night's sleep to endure the cold. Just listen to your body and respect your limits and follow the guidelines."

Another New Year's Day reveller in 2023, Bryndis Osp has been swimming in the sea at least twice a week for the past three years and agrees you have to know your limits. "You quickly realise you can't push the body too much and need to respect the cold. Some days you can stay in the ocean for a long while and other days five minutes is all you can take."

Last New Year was the first time Bryndis broke the ice. "I didn't get far into the ocean [because of the ice] so I practically had to lay down in the sea to be fully covered." The experience hasn't put her off. "I will definitely be there and wearing a nice dress for this January's swim."

Herdis, too, will be there on 1 January: "I love to start the New Year in the cold sea. You can start the year by challenging yourself and creating such wellness and beautiful sensations in your body."

She welcomes anyone who wants to join. "The Icelandic nature is quite unique with its extremes: volcanoes, geothermal water and big glaciers affecting the spirit and energy of the habitants making this experience with us one of a kind." See more about Icelandic sea swimming at sior.org





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


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As Morocco makes a lauded list of must-see destinations in 2024, we look at 10 reasons why the African country is so hot right now

Emerging surf culture, easy winter climate, world-beating food, beautiful boutiques, edgy new art and music festivals that draw top-class international talent – a trip to Morocco has never been a better idea. And that's certainly what the experts at Lonely Planet think – they have just named this North African nation one of its must-visit countries for 2024. So, do you want to get lost in World Heritage-listed medinas? Be guided to the summit of North Africa's highest mountain? Or browse digital art in a luxurious yet welcoming riad? Read on for these and more tips on why Morocco should be on your travel hitlist this year.

NATURAL HIGHS

In the spectacular Atlas Mountains, you'll find wildflowers in spring, cooler temperatures in summer, and skiing and saffron harvests in winter. Although the villages around the epicentre of last September's earthquake are still focusing on rebuilding and recovery, elsewhere locals are crying out for tourists to help keep the economy turning. Ensure your money goes directly into local hands by choosing Moroccan operators such as Trek Atlas or Morocco's first female mountain and desert guide, Hafida Hdoubane, at Tawada Trekking.

HANDICRAFT HUNTING

From babouche shoes in butter-soft leather to vibrant, geometrically patterned pottery, Morocco's artisanal crafts are legendary. But there's a bright new creative scene, too, much of it moored in Marrakesh's cool industrial quarter of Sidi Ghanem. Add LRNCE lifestyle store (pictured) to your itinerary for homeware and contemporary prints, and Marrakshi Life for gender-neutral, sustainably made kaftans. Just don't forget to book an extra bag for the flight home.

CLEANSING RITUALS

If you go to Morocco and don't try a hammam, can you even say you've been to Morocco? Such is the power of this tradition, with its origins in the Roman bathhouse, that it's become a ritual synonymous with any visit to the country. Options range from public hammams, such as Marrakesh's Hammam Mouassine, built in the 16th century and where men and women are kept separate, to some of the country's finest five-star options, including Royal Mansour and La Mamounia.

How to hammam, Moroccan style:

First, put on your swimming costume/shorts



2. Secondly, sit in a hot, steamy room and relax



3. Then, get sloshed with water and lathered with black olive-oil soap



4. Next, you'll be energetically scrubbed with a loofah and coated with a mineral clay



5. Finally, you'll end up with one last rinse before you're left feeling squeaky clean

STYLISH STAYS

Marrakesh's riads are justifiably famous, and while modern classics such as El Fenn, currently celebrating its 20th birthday, are always a safe bet, there's a bevy of new beauties to choose from. Like Rosemary, owned by artist Laurence Leenaert, whose bold take on the region's natural beauty. captured in a natural, earthy palette, defines the design of this five-room sanctuary. IZZA, a sleek new riad that pays homage to Moroccan aesthete and interior designer Bill Willis, has its own multimillion-pound art collection, including one of the world's largest galleries of digital art. Seeking something more bucolic? While not technically a riad, Farasha Farmhouse (pictured right), set amid olive groves 30 minutes outside the city, is a showcase of Moroccan art and artisanship.





STARRY NIGHTS

There are few places where you find unsullied skies a stone's throw from a bustling city. Yet, just an hour south of Marrakesh, the red, rocky Agafay Desert gives visitors the chance to stargaze in style, with the Atlas Mountains as a backdrop. Several operators offer luxury glamping in the Agafay, not least Inara, which has 18 tents with beautiful Berberinspired interiors and its very own mini-oasis in the form of a gorgeous swimming pool. Or there's the understated Caravan Agafay by Our Habitas (pictured left), with lodge-style and tented accommodation, a full wellness menu and experiences that include yoga and desert survival skills.

MARRAKESH'S MUSEUMS

Swerve the mayhem of the medina in favour of a visit to one of the Red City's top-notch museums and cultural centres. Our favourites include: the House of Photography, a converted riad that's home to some 10,000 documents and images of Morocco from the 1870s-1960s; the Berber Museum, housed within the city's iconic oasis, the Jardin Majorelle (pictured); the Musée Yves Saint Laurent, dedicated to the fashion designer who spent lots of time here; and the Museum of African Contemporary Art Al Maaden.

CLASSY COOKING

Subtly spiced yet full of complex flavours, Moroccan food is beloved the world over. Learn how to whip up a tagine, chermoula or zaalouk at the Fez Cooking School, at the upmarket Palais Amani riad. Set in Morocco's gastronomic capital, it covers everything from primers in Moroccan ingredients – and trips to gather them in the medina – to Sephardic cooking workshops.





SURF'S UP

From kite-surfing capital Essaouira, to Oualidia, where a tranquil lagoon, flamingos and seafood restaurants offset the wild Atlantic shore, Morocco's star as a surf destination is rising. So, too, are the boutique accommodation options, giving even non-surfers good reason to visit. Think Mellow Beach House, an eco-friendly complex of rooms traditionally built in stone, clay and wood in the village of Sidi Kaouki, just south of Essaouira. Or the buzzier town of Tamraght, where The Lunar Surf House provides surf lessons, yoga classes and rooms in boho style. Want more wave? Head to the ramshackle but upwardly mobile fishing village of Imsouane, where you'll find Olo, comprising a surf school, restaurant and ocean-breezy luxury villas, bungalows and rooms right next to one of Africa's longest right-handers. thelunarsurfhouse.com, mellowbeachhouse.com, olosurfnature.com







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

FRESH SOUNDS

Morocco is moving to a new beat. As well as one of the world's largest music festivals, Mawazine, making a comeback in Rabat in 2024, there's the Oasis Festival (pictured), the country's coolest mash-up of dance music, food, wellness and cultural experiences, last year held in the central city of Ouarzazate, south of the Atlas Mountains. Meanwhile, if you've never listened to gnawa (or gnaoua), head to Essaouira, where every summer a network of city stages hosts artists playing this and other world music. Essaouria also comes alive to the sounds of electronica at the annual Moga festival in autumn, while in Fez there's more spiritual inspiration at summer's Festival of World Sacred Music.



What is gnawa?

Sometimes described as Morocco's answer to gospel, this spiritual music invoking religion and ancestory dates back to the 16th century. Today it's enjoying a bit of a modern makeover – in part thanks to the Gnaoua Festival in Essaouira every June. In 2019 gnawa was listed by UNESCO as intangible cultural heritage.

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The story of Poland's lost palace


As the painstaking process to rebuild Warsaw's Saski Palace begins, read on for how you can help to bring a resplendent architectural icon back to life

Did you know that one of the most important Polish palaces – where kings, cultural greats like Frederic Chopin and top spies used to visit – doesn't exist? During World War II, a huge inferno destroyed the resplendent Saski Palace, and more than 300 years of history disappeared in a matter of days. Now, in one of the biggest efforts to bring back destroyed European cultural heritage in this century, the Saski Palace and its neighbouring buildings will return to grace the centre of Warsaw.

The riveting history of the Saski Palace goes back to the 17th century when a crafty courtier and brilliant poet built his estate here. The building was later bought and rebuilt by the Polish king Augustus II the Strong, whose dynasty gave the place its name: the Saxon - or, in Polish, Saski - Palace. The king's strength not only allowed him to break horseshoes with his bare hands: he also bent the city map to his own liking, creating the Saxon Axis cutting across the main streets of Warsaw. At its heart? The fabulous royal Saski Palace and its courtvard - known as the Piłsudski Square today - with a luscious garden in the back, which soon became the first public park of the Commonwealth of Poland.

Under the care of the next king, Augustus III, the Saski Palace and its surroundings flourished, especially the neighbouring, ornamental Brühl Palace, named after the most powerful man in the country, second only to the king: Count von Brühl. His name may be familiar to those who visited Dresden, where the Brühl's Terrace offers stunning views of the river and architectural sights.

Later, with the decline and partitions of Poland, the Saski and Brühl palaces reflected the state of the nation. But despite the circumstances, the Saski Palace housed brilliant minds of next generations, including the musical prodigy Frederic Chopin, who spent a large part of his childhood here and most likely composed his first pieces of music in its rooms, or the romantic poet Diotima. The palace weathered the political storms of





the 19th century, transforming midway from its baroque form into a majestic, neoclassicist mansion. In the meantime, the neighbouring Brühl Palace became a central point for the international telegraph network, connecting London with the Indian subcontinent.

With the turn of the 20th century and Poland regaining its independence, both palaces flourished, and the square in front of them became the heart of the reborn country. It was the place to be in Warsaw: from national celebrations, mass events, to even high-stakes races, the Piłsudski Square had it all. The Saski Palace became the seat of the Polish Army. In its top-secret offices hidden away from the prying eyes, Polish cryptologists first broke the famously complex German Enigma machine, which later helped the Allies save thousands of lives during World War II. The majestic colonnade of the Palace held the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, while the beautiful Brühl Palace housed the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. All was lost, however, during World War II, when the Germans blew up the palaces, while systematically destroying the city in late 1944.

There have been many attempts to rebuild what was lost. While the resurrection of the Warsaw Old Town was praised and gained the status of a UNESCO World Heritage Site for the painstaking rebuilding process, the palaces had no such luck. Only the lone Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was recreated: a silent witness to the years of communism, but also to the moments of hope, when people gathered to show their unity in hard times.

Now, after surviving almost 80 years of the painful void at the

heart of Warsaw, Poland has a unique chance to rebuild the Saski and Brühl Palaces and complete the process of restoring its core. But to make it work, we need you. Yes, you! If you think you have family photos showing the Saski or Brühl Palaces before 1945, please get in touch with us through our website. Maybe your great-grandmother played as a child in the Saski Garden or perhaps your granduncle served in the Polish army – their photos may help recreate the details of the palaces! Wizz Air supports fuel decision

Wizz Air has welcomed a decision by the European Parliament to adopt the ReFuel EU Aviation Regulation, establishing minimum shares of Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) to be blended with conventional jet fuel.

The regulation aims to increase demand for supply of SAF, which has lower lifecycle CO_2 emissions than fossil fuel. Suppliers must ensure 2% of the fuel available at EU airports is SAF in 2025, rising to 6% in 2030, 20% in 2035 and 70% in 2050.



"As Europe's leading airline in terms of emissions intensity reduction, Wizz Air has supported the ReFuel EU Aviation Regulation proposal since its inception," says Yvonne Moynihan, Corporate and ESG Officer at Wizz Air. "These mandates will boost the

supply of SAF, which is critical to improve its availability and cost. Wizz Air has started preparing for the upcoming EU mandates by partnering with SAF producers and making our first equity investments in SAF research and development."

Agadir

Sitting on Morocco's southern Atlantic coast, in the foothills of the Anti-Atlas Mountains, Agadir is famous for its wide crescentshaped beach which, thanks to December/January temperatures reaching more than 20°C, is very much open for business all-yearround. Walking along the city's seaside promenade lined with it might well

swimming trunks when heading to the largest of Spain's Canary. Islands. You'll still get around six hours of sunshine per day - and with sea temperatures averaging 20°C, a beach holiday is very much on the cards. Make sure you work the white sands of Playa del Duque in Costa Adeje, and Playa de las Vistas (The Beach of Views) into the rotation. A wine-tasting trip to Bodegas Ferrara winery in the Arafo region or a dolphinspotting spin on a catamaran will round off your sun-kissed winter break nicely.

Hurghada

You'll want to make the most of up to 10 hours of sunshine a day at this popular beach resort town stretching some 40km along Egypt's Red Sea coast. For some truly mind-boggling diving, head 5km south of the Giftun Islands to Gota Abu Ramada for a meeting with eagle ray, butterflyfish or sea turtles. As night falls, swap underwater stories with your friends at a restaurant in the carfree Hurghada Marina while yachts bob gently nearby, or head inland and explore the Hurghada desert and Bedouin camps on the back of a quad bike.

Larnaca

Benefitting from a beautiful Mediterranean climate that comes with a location on the south coast of Cyprus, Larnaca pretty much has great weather all year round, even when things get a bit colder in the winter months. There are of course some lovely beaches to stretch out on here. but why not also tap into local culture with a trip to Pano Lefkara - a small village on the southern slopes of the Troodos Mountains that's known for its lace and skilled silversmiths - or a stroll through the Lanarca Fort and its fascinating Medieval Museum?

The Let's Get Lost campaign represents that so well – we take a plane full of adventurous, open-minded people and introduce them to another culture in the best possible way: through meeting local people, gastronomy, music and sights."

The latest LGL trip in September 2023 saw passengers head for Bishkek, the capital of Kyrgyzstan, where they could soak up the local culture and traditions. While the sightseeing is always sublime, not knowing the destination adds another layer of excitement.

"The moment you walk into the airport, and see 'unknown' as a destination on the screen, some special excitement and adrenalin kick in," adds Robert. "The uncertainty about the destination brings the people together, they start chatting, bonding and – of course – guessing the destination.

"They met at the airport as complete strangers, but by the time we landed they looked like a large group of friends. Our crew did a wonderful job keeping the hype going in-flight and they are the ones who get to announce the destination upon landing to a huge ovation and cheering."

For starters, when launching the campaign in 2018, Wizz Air had to create a new International Air Transport Association (IATA) code to be able to display 'unknown' on departure boards. For the Saudi Arabia trip, there was the logistical challenge of passengers making their way to Venice Airport from all over Italy after the winners were announced a week before takeoff.

"I had concerns if all the people would show up at Venice Airport, as many of them

Your onboard safety

Please show consideration for your fellow passengers and pay attention to the following information. Remember that by purchasing your Wizz Air ticket, you have accepted the Wizz Air General Conditions of Carriage (available in full at wizzair.com)



Safe handling of hand luggage

Ensure hand luggage remains safely stowed in the locker or under the seat in front of you for takeoff, landing and at any time as instructed by the crew. Passengers seated in the emergency rows and first row must store their cabin bags in the overhead lockers. Take care when opening lockers, as falling items may injure fellow passengers.

In case of evacuation, all baggage must be left on board, and the instructions of the cabin crew must be strictly followed.



Safety equipment

It is an offence to tamper with or remove safety equipment, including adult and infant life vests, infant safety belts or extension belts. You are not allowed to remove or damage any onboard informative placards.



Sharp items

To dispose of any sharp items (e.g. hypodermic needles), please contact a cabin crew member. Do not leave your needle or syringe behind.



Turbulence management

Turbulence can occur unexpectedly. Whenever seatbelt signs are switched on, remain seated, keep seatbelts fastened, and stow away large electronic devices.



Safety of infants on board

Wizz Air has a clear procedure for infant (a child under two) restraint systems. You can only use the single hook infant seatbelt - vests/slings cannot be used with the infant seatbelt. Wizz Air only accepts aft-facing car seats when an extra seat is purchased. However, during take-off and landing, and whenever the seatbelt sign is switched on, infants should sit on an adult's lap with the seatbelt fastened. Life vests for infants are available and are provided whenever flying over water. All lavatories are equipped with a changing table. Do not leave children unattended in the cabin.



Lithium batteries

Portable electronic devices (PED) such as phones, laptops and tablets can contain lithium batteries. When damaged, faulty or overheated, these batteries can catch fire and explode. If you recognise any issues with your device, inform the cabin crew immediately.

Charging electronic devices on board using a portable battery charger is forbidden.



Electronic devices

Some electronic devices can be used during the flight with WLAN/Wi-Fi/Bluetooth turned off.

Larger electronic devices that cannot be held comfortably in one hand, exceed ca. lkg in weight and do not qualify as handheld devices (e.g. laptops, notebooks etc.) must be stowed in the overhead stowage compartments for takeoff, landing and whenever required by the cabin crew.

If in doubt, please ask your cabin crew.

Inflight health tips

Read these tips on how to stay fit when travelling.



Before your air travel

Consult your doctor before travelling if you have any medical concerns. Pregnant women and those with heart or respiratory problems, blood diseases or ear, nose and sinus infections should seek medical advice before flying. Crew members are entitled to call for medical assistance pre-flight if they deem it necessary and are in doubt about your fitness for the flight.



Medical supplies on board

Keep any medication you may need in your hand luggage and in its original packaging. Inform cabin crew of allergies or illnesses. If you are seriously ill or travelling post-surgery, you will need a medical certificate confirming that you are fit to fly. If you have limited mobility, are hearing- or sight-impaired, pregnant, or unable to understand/react to safety instructions, you will be unable to sit in the emergency exit rows or the front row. If you start to feel unwell during the flight, do not hesitate to talk to the cabin crew.



Nut allergy

During our WIZZ Café service we offer peanuts and some snacks containing peanuts/nuts traces. If you have any allergies we strongly encourage you to take all necessary medical precautions before flying, and to inform the cabin crew during boarding about your allergy.













Your security

...is one of our top priorities. To ensure a smooth and pleasant flight, please read the following rules of conduct

We encourage you to...

- Follow crew instructions, which are there to keep you safe
- Be respectful towards everyone on board fellow passengers and the crew
- Use appropriate language and try to stay calm and cooperative

...so you can:

- Travel in a nice, pleasant and peaceful atmosphere
- · Relax on board
- Get to your destination as soon as possible

Not tolerated onboard...

- Smoking on board (including classic cigarettes or e-cigarettes, pipes, vapes)
- Placing e-cigarettes in your checked-in bags or charge them on board
- Breaching, or refusing to follow, crew instructions
- Harassing fellow passengers and/or crew members in any way (including sexual harassment)
- Threatening or being aggressive towards fellow passengers and/or crew members
- Being violent or behave in a hostile, erratic manner
- Damaging the aircraft or onboard equipment
- Wasting, polluting or contaminating the cabin
- Endangering the safety of the flight by any means
- Consuming alcohol that was not purchased on board. Alcohol is served at the crew's discretion to passengers of legal drinking age. The crew reserves the right to stop serving alcohol to any passenger who is, or appears to be, intoxicated
- Being under the influence of drugs or medical substances that may affect your behaviour or self-control
- Filming or photographing the cabin crew without their permission

...or face the consequences:

 You are fully responsible and accountable for your behaviour. Unruly or disruptive behaviour on board and before boarding will not be tolerated and will be reported to the authorities. You will be held legally and financially responsible in all cases.

The following consequences* will occur for such misconduct:

- Passenger denied boarding
- Penalty/fine or arrest by local police:
 - Smoking on board, including lavatory: up to €3,000*
 - Unruly behaviour due to intoxication:
 up to €5,000 and two years in prison*
 - Endangering the safety of an aircraft: up to five years in prison*
- Diversion of flight and arrest
- Reimbursement of cost of diversion: €10,000-€80,000*
- Criminal procedure and court litigation*
- Cancellation of all of your existing Wizz Air flight bookings
- A ban from Wizz Air flights in the future
