## Okanagan Falls Deserves Local Representation

I hope everyone has been enjoying a wonderful summer. From everything I've seen, our communities have been vibrant with events, visitors, and local activity - and tourism numbers appear to be strong again this year. It's always encouraging to see our region bustling during these warm months, with businesses and volunteers working so hard to make the season successful.

This past month, I released a position statement on the incorporation of Okanagan Falls. I shared that residents voted to incorporate with the goal of gaining local representation and decision-making power for their community. People expected a straightforward path toward self-governance, but instead the process has stalled.

The NDP government has made Okanagan Falls the first test case for its implementation of the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (DRIPA). While reconciliation is an important and shared goal, the way this is being applied has created delays and uncertainty that were never part of the community's expectation when they cast their ballots.

What concerns me most is that these discussions are happening entirely behind closed doors. The Osoyoos Indian Band (OIB) has asked for concessions before incorporation can proceed, but none of this has been shared publicly by the government. There are no agendas, no minutes, and no updates. At the table are OIB, the Province, and the RDOS. With only one director of 20 representing Okanagan Falls - and others hesitant to push back for fear of



repercussions in their own communities - the people of Okanagan Falls are effectively left without representation in these meetings. Even more concerning, as your MLA I have not been invited to these meetings, informed of outcomes, or given a seat at the table. This means the residents of Okanagan Falls - and their elected

MLA - have been completely sidelined in decisions that directly

impact their future.

This is not acceptable. The referendum that residents voted on did not include conditions or concessions. Changing the rules after the fact undermines trust and sets a damaging precedent for every

other community that may want to pursue incorporation. That is why I am calling on the Province to issue the Letters Patent immediately. Once incorporated, Okanagan Falls can elect its own mayor and council, receive municipal tax revenue, and engage in proper consultation with OIB from a position of democratic strength. That's how reconciliation and collaboration should happen - with all elected local leaders at the table.

I will continue to speak up on this issue and advocate for the people of Okanagan Falls. You deserve to have your voices heard. To read my full position statement, please visit: https://www.donegalwilsonmla.ca/news/

#### **Kaleden Irrigation District News**

**Drawing On A Deficit** ~ As of mid-August, the Okanagan was dropped to Drought Level 2 and we stayed at Stage One watering restrictions (kaledenirrigation.org/watering-restrictions). Dodged one bullet, but we are in a years-long precipitation deficit situation. Our main lakes may have remained stable so far, but without more rain and snow the Valley cannot recharge fully. So, we need to carry on conserving (check out okwaterwise.ca for tips), and KID staff will continue to monitor compliance with watering restrictions. Thanks for doing your bit!

What Hue Is Your Hydrant? ~ You may have noticed that our fire hydrants are sporting a new paint job. This was done to conform with the National Fire Protection Association's colour-coding system, followed by both Canada and the USA. This colour coding guides both local and outside assisting firefighters, as firetrucks are now able to pump at much higher rates, which could collapse smaller supply pipes. All of KID's hydrants and standpipes have a yellow base, but the colour of the top cap indicates its flow rate (something your insurance company also may want to know):

- Green 1,000-1,500 USgpm (3,875-5,780 lpm)
- Orange 500-999 USgpm (1,893-3,874 lpm)
- Red below 500 USgpm (1,892 lpm)

Nowadays, the classic all-red hydrant is only used to indicate a private system.

Let's Celebrate The Cemetery! ~ You're invited to come and check out the improvements at the Kaleden Cemetery on September 19. The event will begin at 10:30 am with a ribbon-cutting ceremony complete with piper, and will include presentations and handouts on the history and operation of the graveyard. Thanks goes to the Kaleden Seniors Committee (KSC) for partnering with KID on this event and providing refreshments. (See also the KSC poster on page 19.) The Cemetery is located at the southern end of Oak Avenue. We hope to see you there!

#### Kaleden FireSmart Tip

#### Is Your Fence FireSmart?

Wood fences offer ZERO fire resistance and can act as a wick directly to your home.

- Fence panels with gaps, such as wood slat fences, can allow embers to become lodged in the gaps and ignite the fence.
- Combustible materials (firewood, mulch, cedar hedges) along the base of a wood fence increase the likelihood of flame spreading to a building.
- If a wood fence is installed, ensure there is at least a 1.5-metre non-combustible break between the wood portion of the fence and your home. Install a metal gate, for example, to break up the combustible fence and protect your home.
- Repair or replace any fence panels or posts that show signs of rot or damage.
- Combustible debris near the fence should be cleared regularly and the lawn well maintained.

## From The Director For RDOS Area "D"

"Open House" Discussion With Director ~ Thanks to all those who attended the August 6 meeting. It was very well attended - I'm told it was the best attended meeting in Okanagan Falls in decades. Regardless, 300-350 people showed up in person or online. We ran out of chairs, and it was standing room only at the back.

For some there were frustrations that the meeting wasn't chaired adequately

or that a few were too vocal, and there's probably some truth to that. On the other hand, residents were hearing some possibly alarming news on an issue they feel very connected to - so no matter what you do or say as chairman, they're not all going to comply! By the end of the night, together, we got the job done and while people may not have liked what they heard, I think most were pleased to get the information.



As Director, I had the opportunity to update residents on the incorporation - both the current status and the issues. My primary objective was to inform residents. And in response, residents had an opportunity to tell me what they thought ... and they did! And I really appreciate it, because my second objective was to understand people's views, so that I can pass these on to the provincial government!

**Incorporation Meeting With Minister** ~ The Honourable Christine Boyle, Minister of Housing and Municipal Affairs, invited RDOS and myself to meet on August 14. At our request, this meeting was lengthened due to Okanagan Falls being the first incorporation in 15 years, the first since passage of DRIPA (Declaration of Rights of Indigenous Persons Act, 2019) and the process being challenging for everyone - whether from Ministry, Osoyoos Indian Band (OIB), Okanagan Falls, or RDOS.

While 'name' was the primary issue discussed, others were acknowledged for subsequent discussions. On the issues discussed, the residents' views shared on August 6th were communicated and a broad range of guestions is being submitted. I remain very concerned about our situation. However, I do recognize and appreciate that this Minister actually chose to meet with us - her predecessor did not - and is taking a direct role to lead a process that gets our incorporation through to completion. Supported by a facilitator who will meet with all parties, this process should now provide Letters Patent next spring and an election in 2026. Meetings with the facilitator and senior staff from the province and OIB, start in early September here in Okanagan Falls, and will continue with ongoing engagement and leadership by the Minister. This is the process we have, to learn what additional changes will actually occur with incorporation - at the moment we're mostly guessing.

As your representative, my efforts will be dedicated to: informing residents as we proceed; making best use of the resources and options at our disposal; and, creating the most sustainable municipality possible - through a provincial process where we're only a part of the decision-making! More to follow ...

7th Avenue Infrastructure Upgrades ~ Work on long-awaited upgrades to the Okanagan Falls water system will start on September 8 or shortly thereafter, and run through to mid-October. The work is on 7th Avenue between Cedar Street and Main Street, and involves upgrading the watermain and adding additional fire hydrants. The work has been postponed until after the bulk of summer traffic, but can't be delayed further, as new asphalt has to be laid down before winter.

This is one of several water and wastewater projects that were initially announced in December 2023. At that time, a \$6.5M package was assembled and approved through the RDOS budget process, involving sewer and water upgrades servicing the core 'downtown' of Okanagan Falls. These upgrades will enable or facilitate already planned development in Okanagan Falls, including market-based and supported housing that is needed in the community.

**Business Licenses For Short-Term Rentals** ~ Business Licenses were approved in late August, and will be required for Short-Term Rental operations advertised on various public platforms and registered in the BC Short-Term Rental Registry. Business Licenses will be available at a cost of \$500. Failure to obtain a business license if required may result in a fine of \$3,000. The licenses should be available for purchase soon.

Parking Requirements In 'Downtown' Okanagan Falls ~ Parking requirements are being reviewed and a significant change is proposed. Generally speaking, the area included is businesses either side of Highway 97 throughout most of the town and the intent is to grandfather the parking presently required, so long as operators are simply changing the type of business they are doing. If the footprint of the building changes, then the operator would need to comply with current parking requirements for the zoning on that parcel. This proposal has worked it's way through the RDOS committee process and will be considered by the RDOS Board in early September. To me, this proposal makes sense. Many of our buildings are built to the property line. The only parking available is street parking. Without a change like this, new businesses may be declined simply, because they cannot provide off-street parking required by zoning. What do you think?

**Summer Coming To An End** ~ It seems that summer only just started, but it is actually September. School is starting or has already started for some! 'The holidays' are over, and our out-of-town guests have returned to their homes, fresh and relaxed from the summer - some of which was spent here in Okanagan Falls ... and the rest of us can enjoy September, one of the nicest months of the year in Okanagan Falls, one of the most beautiful places there is!

## Overview Of The Okanagan Falls Incorporation Study

The Okanagan Falls Incorporation Study was a community-driven process that examined whether Okanagan Falls should incorporate as a municipality. Initiated under a Terms of Reference adopted by the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) in April 2023, the study focused on governance, service delivery, and financial impacts. Its purpose was to give residents clear, balanced information to decide if incorporation was the right path forward.

The study area confirmed by the Province was a defined portion of Electoral Area "D", chosen for its population density, infrastructure, and growth potential. Oversight was provided by an Incorporation Study Committee made up of 10 local residents, along with the RDOS Area "D" Director and hired technical consultants. With support from the BC Ministry of Municipal Affairs, the RDOS received \$150,000 in grants to fund technical analysis, public engagement, and a roads assessment.

Key activities included a detailed comparison of service costs, taxation, and governance under two scenarios: incorporation or remaining within the RDOS. Community engagement was central, with public forums, mail-outs, and information booths held to ensure residents were well-informed and able to provide feedback.

The timeline extended from the technical analysis phase (Fall 2023 - Spring 2024) to community information sessions (Summer 2024). The committee delivered its final report to the RDOS Board in December 2024. The Board recommended moving forward, and a referendum was held in March 2025.

The referendum presented a single question: "Are you in favour of incorporating Okanagan Falls as a municipality?" Only those living within the study boundaries were eligible to vote, in accordance with provincial legislation. Okanagan Falls residents voted 512 in opposition and 588 in support of the referendum question to incorporate. Therefore, a simple majority vote confirmed the community's decision to move forward.

In the end, the study provided the foundation for a communityled decision on greater accountability, representation, and service delivery. With the referendum now complete, the community is waiting for the Lieutenant Governor in Council to issue letters patent, which will officially establish Okanagan Falls as a new municipality.





#### **Okanagan Historical Society Book Sale**



#### A Grain Of Sand

"To see a world in a grain of sand and a heaven in a flower, hold Infinity in the palm of your hand, and Eternity in an hour". The English poet, William Blake, wrote those words in 1803.

There are about 5 x  $10^{26}$  grains of sand on the Earth. That's a shorthand way of writing 5 followed by 26 zeros.

Can we really see the world in a grain of sand? In one way, yes: sand is everywhere on the Earth, and any one grain looks very much like any other. A handful of dirt picked up in your back yard isn't very different from a handful of dirt picked up anywhere else (geologists might have a different opinion!) Your handful of dirt is easily recognizable for what it is, a representative sample of the Earth's surface covering.

A similar principle runs right through astronomers' concept of the Universe: however special our corner of the Universe may seem to us, it is probably just a representative sample, and there are very probably thousands upon thousands of similar places elsewhere in the Universe. On a warm, sunny fall day, we think our Sun, shining brightly in a blue sky is special. In fact, the Sun is just an ordinary star, and there are billions of others like it out there in the vastness of space.

We live on a planet orbiting a star. That's not unique. We know of more than 5000 places out there where one or more planets are orbiting a star. And we have explored only a tiny region, and we know that there must be many more planets, currently beyond the reach of our telescopes.

This principle, the uniformity of the Universe, applies to space, but does it apply to time? The answer is, nearly, but not quite. An hour of my life is not necessarily very different from an hour of William Blake's life 200 years ago: certainly, we dress differently, we do different work, but we both started the day with a meal, and then we both set about our occupation. Our societies are organized in such a way that neither of us hunts for our meat, or gathers our vegetables, we pay other people to provide them for us.

William Blake wrote his poems using a quill pen, made from a bird's feather, and I write using a very elaborate machine, a computer. William Blake's poems are still read, two hundred years after his death, and will be read for many more years. What I am writing now will be in the recycling bin an hour after you have read it. Nevertheless, we both write as part of our daily work.

That being said, there is not perfect uniformity of time. A sample of the Universe today does not resemble a sample of the Universe 13 billion years ago, just after the Big Bang. William Blake's poem has fine ring to it, but an hour is not a sample of eternity.
