Claude Monet and the 19th Century French Impressionists, Ridicule to Fame

Nineteenth-century French Impressionism remains one of the most cherished and influential movements in the history of art. This seminar will explore the artistic currents that paved the way, Romanticism and Realism, before turning to the revolutionary work of the Impressionist Circle, with a special focus on its founder, Claude Monet, and the enduring impact of his vision.



Kathleen Key teaches numerous art history and fashion history courses. With nearly 40 years of experience, she currently lectures at Central College of Houston Community College, the University of Houston, the Art Institute of Houston, and the University of Texas at El Paso.

Her work includes identifying historic landmarks on campus, advising on restoration projects, digging into archival research, and leading tours of historic sites.

Balance and Aging

As societies age, falls have become a growing public health concern. Dr. John Milton will offer insights into solutions ranging from vibrating shoe insoles that enhance sensory feedback to activities like golf, dancing, and Tai Chi, all of which help improve balance and reduce fall risk.



John Milton, M.D., Ph.D., is internationally recognized for his research on human balance dynamics. A Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of Canada and the American Physical Society, he currently serves as Senior Staff Scientist in the Department of Neurology at Dell Medical School.

Gault and the Peopling of the Americas

The Gault site in Central Texas provides us with a unique and important glimpse of the earliest peoples in the Americas. Dr. Wernecke will discuss the broader picture regarding these early immigrants and what the Gault site told us about them.



D. Clark Wernecke is the retired Director of the Prehistory Research Project at the University of Texas at Austin and the nonprofit Gault School of Archaeological Research. For the last 23 years, he has examined the earliest people in America.
