Bridging the Gap

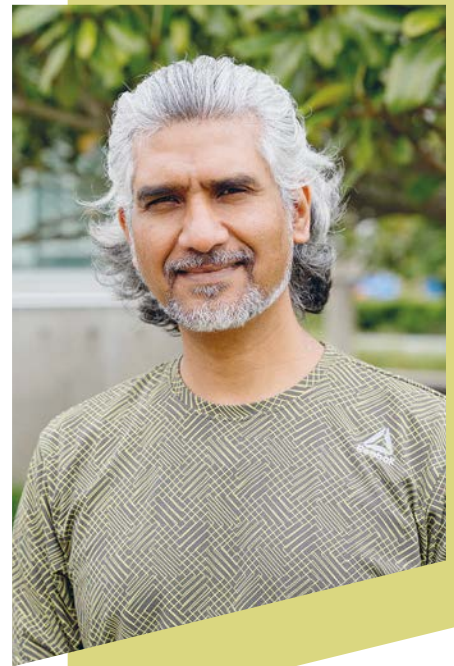

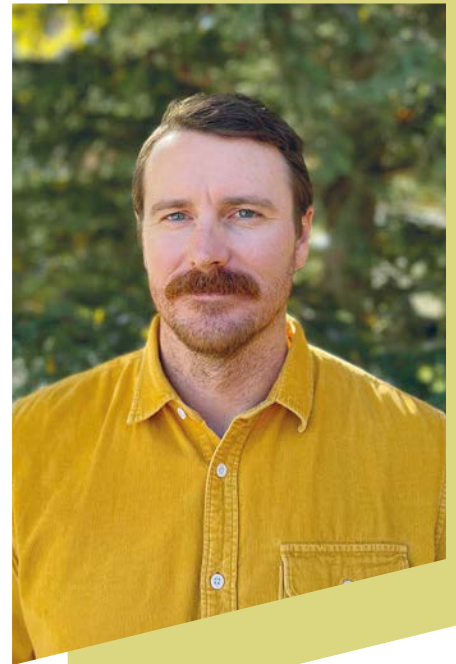

I came to Regent because I'm interested in the overlap of ecology and theology. Through various relational connections, I learned that Regent is a school that fosters these conversations.

Last year I was able to take an amazing class on science and theology with Dr. Ross Hastings. Regent College Overall Finances

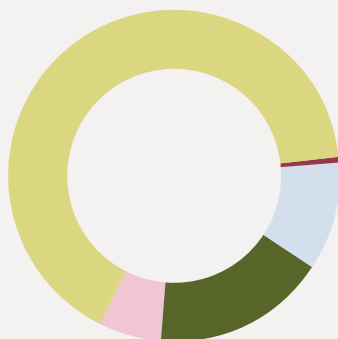
We are so very grateful for God's abundant provision through your giving in 2024–2025. And we thank God for the surpluses of past years, which allowed us to operate with a Board-approved deficit this past year. The College's cash position is strong, so there was no negative impact on our mission or on our support for students due to the deficit.

The Board of Governors has mandated that Regent achieve a balanced budget by 2026–2027. This will necessitate an increase in giving to our Annual Fund from this year's \$1.7 million to \$2 million in each of the next two years. We would be grateful for your prayers and for your generous support in 2025–2026 and beyond.

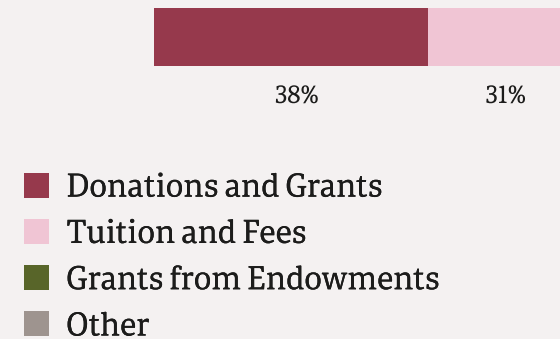
Your Generosity

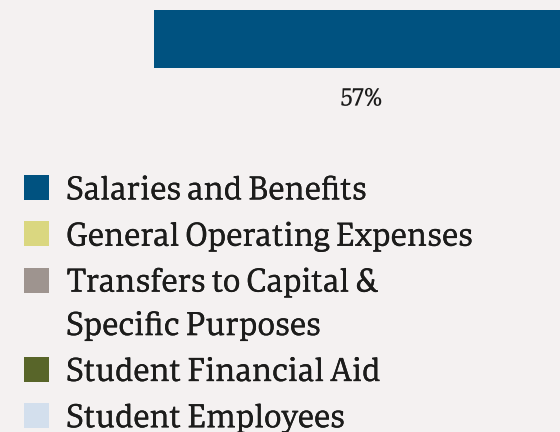

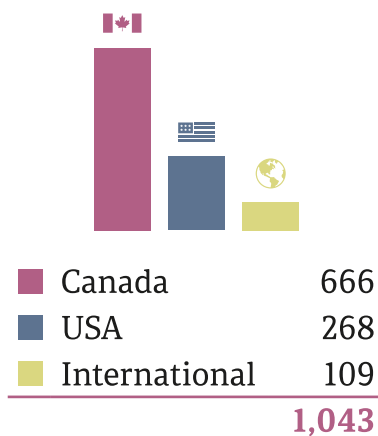

The Old Testament and the Regent Community

It wasn't until I took Hebrew in my last year of university that I realized how little I knew about applying the Old Testament to contemporary life. Perhaps that's surprising, because I'd grown up in the church—I'd been reading the Bible my whole life. But I'd never had to slow down to read the text so closely before. Through that Hebrew class and my further studies, I discovered how life-giving and relevant the Old Testament is for us today.

I love teaching the Old Testament to my students. In my classes, I hope they discover a new appreciation for the depth and breadth of Scripture. I hope they come to love God more because they've slowed down to spend time in his word. I hope they learn how important lament is to the life of the church. I hope they learn to trace the hospitality of God through biblical theology, and to see how this theme should translate to the way they view and treat other people. I hope this understanding encourages them to invite strangers to share their table for years to come.

I also love teaching at Regent College. Regent students are incredible—so bright, creative, and eager to learn and grow, with hearts that are open to care for God's creation, people included. The broader Regent community is a nuanced and joyful network of fascinating people from all over the world who are seeking to love Christ and his world well. That's a rare and beautiful thing.

Being part of this community looks like sharing deep conversations, delicious meals, and life with all its struggles and joys. I wish everyone could come taste Regent, even for a short season!



Dr. Brittany N. Melton is Associate Professor of Old Testament at Regent College. Her research interests include divine presence and absence, the Megilloth (the books of Ruth, Esther, Lamentations, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Songs), wisdom literature, and hospitality.

From Strategic Plan to Strategic Action

As Regent concludes the first year of our current strategic plan, we are deeply grateful for your contribution to this work. Donor support has been and will continue to be absolutely crucial to Regent's strategic action. Your prayers, student referrals, contributions to our community, and financial support are irreplaceable gifts. Thank you for making this journey with us!

Here are a few updates regarding our six strategic priorities.

Priority 1: Healthy Community

In spring 2025, Regent adopted revised policies on community life and safety that help concretize the College's commitment to cultivating a respectful community in which each person is treated with dignity. Faculty, staff, and students will receive training in the new policies and related procedures this summer and fall.

Priority 2: Grow Enrollment

Regent's new Director of Recruitment, Ryan Klassen, is providing invaluable expertise and leadership as he works with the Admissions team on new strategies to help prospective students find their way to Regent College. Early initiatives, such as changing registration timelines to encourage earlier enrollment, are already bearing fruit, and there is much more to come.

Priority 3: Deepen Formation

The year's focus on deepening students' spiritual formation was realized through a number of efforts, including the creation of new avenues for the intentional pursuit of spiritual friendship, periods of silence, and communal prayer. In addition, Regent has convened a group of student, staff, and faculty representatives to provide insight and leadership as we strive to grow as a community in which everyone is able to bring their whole selves to our shared life and where all voices are heard and honoured.

Priority 4: Extend Impact

Regent is working with like-minded partner organizations to develop resources for lifelong learning—including a new video series—that will engage new audiences while serving our existing community. We have also deepened our collaboration with The Rabbit Room, a major hub of activity and connection among Christians engaged in the arts. Professor Jonathan Anderson and Ryan Klassen were delighted to attend the 2024 Hutchmoot conference, where our students helped them make many new contacts.



Priority 5: Achieve Sustainability

Regent has successfully completed the sale of Lot 3 (our former parking lot), the proceeds of which will significantly strengthen our long-term financial position.

The past year also saw the implementation of policy changes around the use of student financial aid that are already increasing uptake and allowing students to take more credits each term, allowing our financial aid resources to be used more efficiently and with greater impact.

Priority 6: Fresh Expression

Regent is close to finishing a complete redevelopment of its website that will introduce an exciting new look and improve the experience of online visitors. The site will also include a new online platform to distribute high-quality video, audio, and text resources for the whole people of God. We are excited to see this project launch in the coming months!

Caring for Place

In spring 2025, Regent completed a series of much-needed projects to upgrade and refresh our building. Launched nearly three years ago, the Caring for Place project unfolded in stages, culminating in a major overhaul of our Chapel space last fall and winter.

After months of holding Tuesday Chapel offsite, moving back into our own space was a joyful occasion marked by deep gratitude. In a brief welcome-home address, Jeff Greenman recognized the tremendous contributions of Building Operations Manager Josh Bennick, the Facilities team's student employees, and the many workers who carried out the upgrades. He also led the community in thanking the more than 450 donors who gave generously to make it all possible.

Thanks to you, our donors, Regent's building is more conducive to learning and sharing life together. Fresh paint, carpets, bathrooms, Chapel seating, and classroom furniture (no more tiny tablet desks!) have made this a more beautiful and welcoming place. We couldn't be more grateful!
