





Colossians 3:12 (NIV): "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience."

In 2023 the Synod implemented the Values for life programme within all Presbyterian Schools. The programme continues with emphasis on teacher development, toward social transformation. The general social breakdown, including in the home, places much more responsibility on teachers to ensure that morals and values are taught in the most impactful way. Thus, Rev. Elahie has been facilitating a five-module workshop that explores themes and ideas toward personal and professional growth. He explores, "arriving at a moral compass; thinking as an imperative; self-understanding; meaning and purpose and behaviour that would define the authentic life". Rev. Elahie stands firm on the position that healthy morals and values cannot be sufficiently taught by instruction but necessitates the teacher becoming a role model.

The programme has been widely supported and accepted throughout the schools that have completed the workshop thus far, with a resounding ask for further workshops on this subject. One principal wrote, "Thank you for the workshop yesterday, Rev. You have ignited a spark of curiosity in the staff, encouraging them to think and learn. Encouraging self-reflection, self-understanding and self-love. Thank you."

A comment from another principal stated, "Good evening GS Ashford. I would like to personally thank you and by extension the Synod for having the insight to conduct the Values for Life program for teachers. Rev. Elahie did a marvelous job at my school today and the staff was truly receptive of what was shared. Blessings always. We do look forward to more programs like these to enrich the lives of teachers."

At Synod's office we are eternally grateful for the hard work and dedication that Rev. Elahie has put into shaping and re-shaping this programme, to ensure that it is delivered to all teachers within our Presbyterian school system. Teachers will be able to create a solid foundation for personal growth, strong relationships, and a positive impact on their schools and communities. The society that we live in today, we see there is the need for persons to navigate the complexities of life with integrity, compassion, and resilience, ultimately leading to a more fulfilling and meaningful existence. THE STRUGGLE WITH FORGIVENESS AND BITTERNESS

A. Why should we?

Forgiveness stands as a fundamental principle in Christian belief, intricately connected to the lessons of Jesus Christ and the larger narratives found in the Bible. Yet, even with this clear call to forgive, many Christians find it challenging to move past feelings of bitterness and pain, despite receiving apologies and efforts for reconciliation. Let's delve into the reasons that might contribute to this difficulty, look closely at what the Bible teaches about forgiveness, and consider the issue of hypocrisy when our actions fall short of our expressed faith.

B. Biblical Foundations of Forgiveness

1. The Call to Forgive

The Bible consistently highlights how vital forgiveness is. Jesus instructed His followers to pray, "Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors" (Matthew 6:12). In this Lord's Prayer, He clarified further, "If you forgive others when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins" (Matthew 6:14-15). This highlights the interconnectedness of forgiveness within a Christian's journey.

2. The Parable of the Unmerciful Servant

In Matthew 18:21-35, Jesus shares the story of a servant who, after being freed from an enormous debt by his master, declines to forgive a minor debt owed to him by another servant. The master admonishes the servant, asking, "Shouldn't you have shown mercy to your fellow servant just as I had to you?" (Matthew 18:33). This story serves as a reminder that those who have experienced God's grace are expected to share that grace with others.

3. Jesus Forgiveness on the Cross

In His last moments, Jesus embodied the essence of forgiveness, praying, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34). This powerful act of forgiveness amid immense suffering sets a profound example for all Christians.

C. Why Some Christians Struggle to Forgive?

1. The Struggle of Human Nature

The Apostle Paul recognizes the internal battle between spirit and flesh: "For I do not do the good I want to do, but the evil I do not want to do—I keep on doing" (Romans 7:19). This conflict can hinder the capacity to forgive, as anger, pride, and a thirst for revenge take root. 2. Lingering Pain and Trauma

Bitterness can often arise from unresolved emotional wounds. Hebrews 12:15 cautions, "See to it that no one falls short of the grace of God and that no bitter root grows up to cause trouble and defile many." Unhealed pain may turn into bitterness, complicating the act of forgiveness.

3. Misconceptions about Forgiveness

Some Christians might confuse forgiveness with excusing wrongdoings or forcing reconciliation without fully addressing harm caused. Biblical forgiveness does not imply ignoring injustice; it means letting go of the desire for revenge and trusting God's ultimate judgment (Romans 12:19).

4. Pride and Self-Righteousness

Pride can obstruct forgiveness, nurturing a sense of moral superiority. The Pharisee in Luke 18:11-12 embodies this attitude, declaring, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector." Such self-righteousness can harden one's heart and make forgiveness more challenging.

D. The Hypocrisy of professed faith without action

1. Faith Without Works is Dead

James 2:17 emphasizes, "In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead." A Christian who claims to follow Christ yet nurtures bitterness and refuses to forgive lives in contradiction to their stated beliefs. Jesus criticized the Pharisees for their hypocrisy, declaring, "You hypocrites! Isaiah was right when he prophesied about you: 'These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me" (Matthew 15:7-8).

2. The Risk of Self-Deception

1 John 1:8 warns, "If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us." Refusing to forgive while claiming to follow Christ leads to self-deception, creating a rift between one's spiritual identity and actual behavior.

3. The Call to Genuine Discipleship

Jesus invites His followers to embrace authenticity: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24). This journey necessitates setting aside the urge for revenge and engaging in the challenging act of forgiveness.

E.Biblical Solutions for Overcoming Bitterness and Hypocrisy

1. Lean on God's Grace

Forgiveness isn't a typical human response but a divine act made possible through God's grace. Philippians 4:13 reassures us, "I can do all this through him who gives me strength." Through prayer and reliance on the Holy Spirit, Christians can discover the fortitude to forgive.

2. Contemplate God's Forgiveness

Ephesians 4:32 encourages, "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you." Meditating on the enormity of God's forgiveness can motivate Christians to extend similar grace to others.

3. Pursue Healing and Reconciliation

Matthew 5:23-24 advises, "Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there at the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift." Reconciliation is an active process requiring humility and effort.

4. Protect Against Hypocrisy

Jesus cautioned, "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye?" (Matthew 7:3). Christians must consistently evaluate their hearts and actions to make sure they align with their faith.

F. Summary:

Forgiveness is a challenging yet vital part of the Christian experience. While human frailties, unresolved pain, and pride can obstruct the act of forgiveness, the Bible offers clear wisdom and reassurance to navigate these hurdles. Christians are called to live authentically, ensuring their actions reflect their professed beliefs and relying on God's grace to practice forgiveness. By doing this, they mirror the love and mercy of Christ, who forgave even those who nailed Him to the cross. As Paul advises, "Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you" (Colossians 3:13).

The three-day visit of Rev. Dr. Jooseop Keum, General Secretary of the Council for World Mission (CWM), to the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT) was a significant milestone in strengthening the relationship between the two organizations. It marked PCTT's journey towards becoming a full CWM member which involved deep and meaningful interactions.

On Day 1, the visit began with a breakfast meeting with key PCTT leaders, setting the tone for collaborative discussions. Rev. Dr. Keum then engaged with the South Eastern Presbytery, learning about the diverse pastoral regions and churches of the PCTT. His visit to the historic lere Memorial Presbyterian Church, established in 1868, provided him with insights into the Church's rich legacy. Later, he had lunch at St. Andrew's Theological College, where he shared his personal journey and insights with various PCTT Orders, inspiring attendees. The day concluded with a dinner at Naparima College, where Rev. Dr. Keum was briefed on the PCTT's organizational structure and mission initiatives.

Day 2 began with a service at St. John Presbyterian Church, where Rev. Dr. Keum delivered a sermon, highlighting challenges such as poverty, inequality, and climate change that Trinidad and Tobago faces. He commended the PCTT's mission work despite historical struggles and emphasized the importance of the Church's partnership with CWM in advocating for justice and equity. Afterward, Rev. Dr. Keum visited Susamachar Presbyterian Church and had lunch at Paradise Hill, where presentations on the work of St. Andrew's Theological College and other PCTT boards were made. The day concluded with Rev. Dr. Keum attending the induction service of Rev. Shirvan Siloch in Barrackpore, where he spoke about the power of faith and mission despite historical challenges.

On Day 3, Rev. Dr. Keum visited Naparima College, where he delivered a message to the students, encouraging them to aspire to be exemplary leaders who prioritize the common good. Afterward, he had breakfast at Synod's office before departing for Guyana.

Overall, the visit reinforced the PCTT's commitment to mission work and highlighted the importance of global partnerships. Rev. Dr. Keum's visit was a powerful step toward deepening the ties between the PCTT and CWM, with a shared focus on building life-flourishing communities based on justice, equality, and hope.













INDUCTION SERVICE OF REV. SHIRVAN SILOCH BARRACKPORE PASTORAL REGION

On Sunday, January 12, 2025, the South-Eastern Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago, along with the Barrackpore Pastoral Region, held the Induction Service for Rev. Shirvan Siloch, the newly appointed minister to the Barrackpore Pastoral Region. The service, which marked the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord and the start of Jesus' public ministry, took place at the Barrackpore Union Presbyterian Church. The sanctuary was filled with church members from regions where Rev. Siloch had previously served, along with family, friends, and special guests, including Senator Jayanti Lutchmedial-Ramdial. Worship was led by Rev. Radica Samuel-Moonoo, Minister of the Nariva/Mayaro Pastoral Region. The secretary of the South Eastern Presbytery Mrs Rumonia Drepaulsingh welcomed all for attending. Prayers were offered by Presiding Elder Agnes Sultani, Presiding Elder Grace Sookoo and Rev. Robert Dinnoo. The scripture readings were read by Ms. Sarah Sahadeo (Psalm 100) and Mrs. Teshiera Mathura (2 Timothy 4:1-5)

Rev. Peter Arjoon, minister of the Tableland Pastoral Region, delivered a message focused on the theme "Preserving in our Ministry, Overcoming the Challenges Encountered," drawing from 2 Timothy 3:16-17. The scripture emphasized that the Word of God is inspired and beneficial for teaching, correcting, and training in righteousness, equipping believers for good work. Rev. THE FAMILY CAN

THE PILGRIMAGE OF PARENTING: [PART 11] - WHY (SHOULD WE) PARENT - MEMORY

In this series, we have established that parenting is a relationship between the 'parenter' and the 'parentee'. The focus here is - how and why should we parent memory for a parentee?

For the last two months, our focus considered how do you parent learning and why parent learning? To recall, learning provides the tools to resolve, make appropriate decisions to overcome personal problems, family conflicts, and the development of individual personality with skills to get along with other persons/groups.

Further, learning makes a person more **aware of self** and whomever they relate to in whatever situation. Learning develops perception, skills for behaviours and emotional control, assist with adjustments to situations that daily challenge the individual extending into his/her relationships and societal interactions. Humans are complex individuals in a complex world and **learning with memory** is vital and necessary for *his/her psychological and psychosocial* functioning.

This month, we focus on **MEMORY**. Learning involves committing to memory processes which progress into skillsets for a person's performance and solutions. Learning begins with thinking, then committing to memory, to the reinforcing of an approach that can be recalled to solve life's challenges. Memory is 'proof of learning' and can be defined as 'the present knowledge of a past experience.' There are **four** kinds of memory: to **recognize** - e.g. faces; to **recall** - becoming aware of an experience; to **reproduce** - that previously learned; and to **perform** - as habits done automatically. Put together, this is memory linked to learning. However, learning a habit and committing to memorization can be determined by the challenge to the individual, resulting in his/her responses.

Q. Why parent memory? Learning is connected to memory, with the short and long-term human memory being our internal store house that can be accessed automatically or triggered by our senses and our environment. Are we becoming too heavily dependent on external memory devices? Learning is information that can be anchored to *our memory* for daily living. Parents as 'parenters' have a duty and responsibility to guide positive and realistic practical learning and memory development, not leaving the 'parentee' to his/her own devices. Can this approach improve our parenting relationships and skills and improve intra and inter-family relationships? I hope that this perspective can guide and effect changes and adjustments to the narrative and approach to parenting where the participants interact in a relational exchange that impacts their words and actions, attitudes, behaviours and roles, duties and responsibilities.

Remember, the family is not just a group or gathering without a common purpose. Never let it ever be that the family can NOT adjust and adapt as changes occur.

Encounteringthe Archives of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago

It is **2025**, a most significant milestone for the Archives of the PCTT (CAPCTT) as this marks the **50th Anniversary** since the establishment of the present physical location in September 1975. At that time, there existed archival materials mainly at the office of the SATC; at Kemp House - the office of the San Fernando Field Missionary; and the library and other facilities of the Naparima Teachers, Training College, closed by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago in July 1975. Each of these have its own history in the development of the PCTT.

The suggestion for an Archives as documented, was made at the then Presbytery meeting during 1957 by a Canadian Lady Missionary, Ms Elma Inman. It was not until 1961 that the first Archives Committee with a Chairman was appointed by Synod, (itself established January 1960). It was called the Archives and Historical Committee. In 1966, a new committee called the Archives and Museum Committee was appointed in preparation for the year-long Centenary celebrations of 1968 of the then Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Grenada (PCTG). This committee mounted a display or exhibition of artefacts and documents at the Naparima Bowl and Morton House for all of Trinidad. Some of these items are today held at the Archives.

However, going into 1968 and looking towards the New Century, a major survey to assess the work of the Church and to propose a way forward into the future led to the completion of the Garth Legge Report in 1966 which listed seven underlying features of situation and itemised ten areas for 'stimulating thought, discussion and action throughout the PCTG. It would be interesting for leaders and members of the PCTT to lift these pages today nearly sixty years later and evaluate any achievements.

To go back to the history of the Presbyterian presence in Trinidad is to research documents: since 1833 – the Church of Scotland; 1843 - the American Mission; and 1868 - the Canadian Mission, beginning with Reverend John Morton, his wife Sarah, his daughter Agnes and sons.

Here, too, should be noted that at a Synod meeting on August 1962, Mr Enos Sewla, I a Presbyterian and the then National Archivist of Trinidad and Tobago presented a proposal for the establishment of the Archives of the PCTG with details for three sections: the Repository, the Museum, and the Archival Library.

To members of the PCTT and all persons interested in satisfying a thirst and hunger for study and research of the PCTT, the CAPCTT is available to your 'Encountering the Archives' and hope, in some way, to lay a table to your satisfaction and satiation. These few references only touch the tip of the proverbial/symbolic iceberg that are contained in the Archives, PCTT.


