CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I'm pleased to share the progress and challenges of Owls Club, our innovative not-for-profit organization dedicated to enhancing the lives of adults aged 55 and older in Elkhart and surrounding areas. Since our inception in May 2023, following two years of careful planning, we've focused on providing enriching experiences through service, lifelong learning, active engagement, and social connections.

By the end of 2023, our membership soared to 859, reflecting an unmistakable demand for our services. This growth, while encouraging, aligns with the trends seen in our neighboring state of Michigan, where senior centers are thriving. Unlike Indiana, Michigan assesses millage property taxes to fund specific local services or projects, including senior centers. Owls is banking its future on the private sector's willingness to underwrite the funding gap.

Our journey, while promising, is not without its challenges:

- Unique Partnership: As an independent 501(c)(3), we've partnered with Trinity on Jackson, with the church's facilities becoming our campus on weekdays. This arrangement, while immeasurably beneficial in terms of function and cost, requires continuous adaptation by both parties.
- **Financial Sustainability:** Our board has committed to funding Owls through 2024. We anticipate attracting longer-term financial support from private foundations and individuals.
- **Volunteer Dependency:** Our operations heavily rely on volunteers. Their continued involvement is crucial for maintaining our culture and enhancing our appeal to potential investors (donors).
- Affordability: In our commitment to access for all, membership is free. While noble and inclusive, this approach relies on members' willingness to volunteer and the commitment of private foundations and individuals to play a significant role in underwriting a large portion of the Club's operating costs.



• Replicable Model: Part of our strategic plan is to develop a business model that can be licensed to others. However, it's still uncertain whether our model will be applicable broadly or attract the necessary funding.

Despite these hurdles, the leadership remains confident and committed. We're a community partnership, where each member's investment of time, talent, and resources is invaluable. Our focus isn't only on overcoming early-stage risks but also on demonstrating the effectiveness of a private-sector approach to fulfilling the needs of our senior community.

As this report unfolds, we will delve deeper into the critical aspects of our journey – member engagement and program success. The preliminary results are promising and indicative of our potential impact. We stand poised to meet the challenges ahead, driven by our mission and the support of our community.

YEAR IN REVIEW

In its inaugural year, Owls Club — Older, Wiser, Lifeloving Seniors — quickly emerged as a vital community asset in Elkhart County and neighboring communities. The mission to foster wellness, socialization, and active aging is confirmed by the rapid growth in Owls membership. Owls' ever-expanding commitment to diverse programs, including fitness, lifelong learning, health, and recreational activities, manifested itself in a total of 1,410 hours of classes, programs, activities and events.


At the heart of Owls' success are dedicated volunteers who, with a collective contribution of 2,250 hours, played a crucial role in hosting classes, supporting activities, and assisting in administrative tasks. Additionally, strategic partnerships with community organizations broadened class offerings each week, aligning with the organization's goal of providing diverse and accessible opportunities for active aging.


We think it's reasonable to expect continued growth in membership in 2024. The ongoing challenge for Owls in its second year of operations is to hone its programs and services so that the member participation rate increases noticeably from the national average of 25%. 

Education

In 2023, Owls Club's educational offerings showcased a diverse range of subjects, catering to the varied interests of our members. Our programs included extensive 12-week lecture series on topics like *Propaganda and Persuasion* and the *U.S. Constitution*, as well as informative *Lunch and Learn* presentations covering essential subjects such as Medicare. The richness of our educational content was made possible thanks to the incredible contributions of instructors from both within our community and our own membership, who collectively dedicated over 490 hours to teaching.

Health & Wellness

Our members enjoyed staying physically active and mentally sharp through diverse Health and Wellness activities. Highlights included seasonal walks on and off campus, engaging exercises like Cardio Drumming and Pickleball, and relaxing options such as Pilates and Chair Yoga. Holistic wellbeing was also emphasized through mindfulness workshops, outdoor activities, and classes on emotional wellness. Members spent 2,902 hours enhancing their physical and mental health in 2023.

Social and Recreation

Social connections flourished in 2023 with our Coffee and Conversation sessions, creative outlets in Knitting and Art Classes, stimulating Book Club and Trivia, and community-building games like Euchre. These programs not only entertained but strengthened our community bonds. Members signed in to 388 social and recreation classes in 2023.

Special Events and Trips

Our inaugural year featured memorable events like a two-day opening celebration and an open house in October. Exciting trips like the visit to Meijer Gardens and communal Thanksgiving celebrations enriched our members' experiences. We also showed appreciation for our dedicated volunteers with several social events, emphasizing our commitment to the members that make Owls Club possible. These types of events require a tremendous amount of volunteer support and our members stepped up, providing 486 hours of their time.



FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The Owls Club, deeply committed to its mission and vision, has strategically financed its startup phase internally with the founders' capital. As we transition from this initial phase, our focus shifts towards expanding and diversifying our funding base. With our nonprofit status now affording tax-deductible contributions, we are poised to appeal to other private sector benefactors ("investors"), including foundations and individual donors.

The Owls Club views contributions from individuals and foundations from the broader community as vital investments in our mission and our future. We acknowledge the responsibility to ensure our investors can evaluate the impact of and return on their contributions. Our commitment to transparency and results-oriented reporting underlines our dedication to honoring the trust and support of our community partners.

Our funding strategy is underpinned by two key strengths: minimal occupancy costs and a robust volunteer base providing much of our human capital needs. The in-kind contribution of Trinity for our 10,000 square foot campus is appraised to be \$54,965 per year. Although not a financial statement disclosure, monetizing the contribution of our volunteers at \$20 per hour resulted in significant human capital cost savings of \$85,000 in 2023. These factors create an attractive return on investment proposition for potential investors. (The in-kind donation of facilities by Trinity and the corresponding Owls Club expense is a required financial disclosure.)

The accompanying table presents salient financial information for members to evaluate our start-up organization. Although Owls Club began offering programs and services in May 2023, it incurred organizational and other startup costs beginning in October 2022. Accordingly, the Statement of Activity & Net Assets includes the fourth quarter of 2022 and calendar year 2023.

These disclosures provide an overview of our financial health and operational efficiency. For more detailed financial information, stakeholders are encouraged to refer to our comprehensive IRS 990 (IRS.gov/nonprofit), which will be available before the filing deadline on May 15, 2024.
