



Tama's stories about the islands' history added depth to the day, making it both educational and enchanting. Back aboard, we dressed up for dinner at Restaurant Bar de Plage, indulging in a local buffet alongside mesmerizing Tahitian dancers and fire performers. It was the grand finale to an unforgettable leg of the journey.





whats billing? February - April 2025

Yes!!! It's bitter cold outside and we are fully in the throes of winter's grip! The freezing temperatures will continue to interfere with many anglers who just want to get out there and enjoy some fishing. But fear not my friends, because our beloved area is host to many species who are willing to bite right now and many more are poised to "spring" into action as warmer temperatures will be here in the coming months. Sometimes you just have to remember, the fish which call coastal Virginia waters their home do eat when they get hungry and conditions allow them. We are the ones who must adapt to the weather, as the fish do that daily. Deep droppers are catching their share of quality fish along the coastline offshore on wrecks and contour changes in the bottom. Cut bait is still your best option either on plain hooks or added to artificials. Black Sea Bass, Blueline and Golden Tile along with snowy Grouper have been the most heavily sought after this winter, but look for flounder to move up the list of targeted species as the season progresses.

Offshore sport fishing for huge bluefin tuna has been outstanding between 35 miles offshore and just a few miles out by trolling with large ballyhoo rigs, parachute rigs, large shad body plastics, and fast trolling Nomad lures with large single hooks instead of trebles. Look for the topwater trolling action to improve as water temperatures increase and the method of skipping jelly baits resembling flying fish under kites gets back underway. Trolling spoons on planers can produce good numbers of cold pelagic as well. Look for yellowfin and big eye tuna to join in the mix. Swordfish action has been steady as they are available most of the year in Virginia waters for those deep droppers pursuing them.

Bay and tidal river action has been slow, but productive for anglers targeting inshore striped bass, redfish and speckled trout. Anglers trolling live eels or artificials for striped bass in the cut channel near Cape Charles and the mouth of the Rappahanock River caught both keeper size rock as well as the giants that were protected and had to be released. Look for those fish to make their way up the large rivers such as the James, York, Potomac and Rappahanock to spawn as spring approaches.

Many absolute "gator" trout have been caught in the Elizabeth River over the winter in both deep and shallow waters by anglers using suspended lures and slow sinking plastics. Look for action to improve and become more widespread as the water temperature increases and the trout along with reds leave their winter haunts. Live minnows, menhaden or mullet under corks near structure or oyster beds is an excellent way to target trophy trout, stripers and puppy drum, and using cut bait like peeler crab, mullet fillets or chunks of menhaden on the bottom is usually very productive near grass beds along the bayside creeks.



Paul Brown topwater and suspended baits along with large glide baits thrown over grass and mud flats as the water warms should produce strikes, especially early or in low light conditions. While the number of puppy drum will continue to increase as resident winter holdovers and schools of migrating fish converge on the area, by April you can expect large red drum to be an option either casting in the open waters of the bay or using cut bait on the bottom near the islands of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge tunnel. Beach and pier fisherman should see good action for Croaker, sheepshead, roundhead, sand perch, trout, puppy drum, flounder and pompano as water temperature warm.



Standard high, low bottom rigs with sand fleas, worms, squid, shrimp, minnows and crab will produce strikes from many bottom feeders while cut bait like mullet and menhaden on fish finder rigs will get the job done for larger species. Flounder will be making their way back into the shallows for the summer and many brackish river systems will produce good numbers of keeper flatties in the spring. After the last few years of action, you can expect big blue fish in the surf along the coast, especially between Sandbridge and the beaches of North Carolina. Casting large spoons, diving plugs, tube lures or large topwater hard baits with wire leaders are a must. By mid April you should be consistently catching bluefish trolling spoons on cannonball rigs with 3-ways, stretch 25's, Cisco Kids, rubber eel and tube lures or rag-mop lures. Keep several rigs handy so if you have a deep hooked fish you can just throw the fish in the cooler with the bait and keep fishing. More than likely the fish will shake the bait loose in the box. Casting near the rocks over the tunnels during strong current periods should also be productive.

Freshwater lakes and brackish River action was amazing again this winter for big catfish with Blue Cat action topping the list. Cut bait like eel, menhaden, shad, perch, chicken and crab on circle hooks and fish finder rigs on the bottom are great producers for cats of all sizes. Live bait like perch and minnows are great during the cold months while bream work great in the warmer months. Setting out multiple rods with preset drags will increase your odds. This is a great way to catch alligator gar as well. Noodling or jugging is a fun way to catch them too. Remember in Virginia no live bait can be fished using this method. Yellow perch action has been on fire in the Chickahominy River in recent years and this is the best time to target them as they are primed for spawning. Hard to beat a small minnow on a jig under a cork for all the perch species. 

As March approaches look for the worm bite to improve as more fish seek out spawning grounds. Topwater action will have improved by then as well. Landlocked striped bass, musky and walleye are present in many rivers and freshwater bodies of water in Virginia and North Carolina. Trolling minnows or live shad on bucktails or plain hooks under corks or trolling deep diving hard baits is an excellent way to locate feeding fish. Casting for musky in the New and James Rivers has become much more productive as populations of this amazing species has increased. Using large swim baits and hard glide baits has been producing some quality fish for those anglers with enough patience to wait on a strike. Make sure you have your drag set to slip so you don't break your line when these fish strike violently and always have a big net with a long handle in the boat. Brown,

Brook and Rainbow trout action should be heating up as more insects come out with rising air temperatures. Many of these critters will find themselves to be trout candy when they venture too close to the surface of many streams and lakes where these beautiful trout species live. Artificial baits like spoons and Mepp's spinners will also produce along with salmon egg replicas. They can be very challenging. Give it a try.

The featured fish for this issue is winter bluefin tuna. These giants travel up and down the east coast and throughout the Atlantic Ocean as water temperatures fluctuate, ever in search of food supply or their preferred spawning grounds. The tuna follow the food supply, and have begun traveling right off Virginia Beach into the mouth of the bay gorging on schools of menhaden. These fish will move back offshore and more southward as temperatures drop during the winter but will make their way northward again in the spring heading to the North Atlantic. Many captains have found by covering the water column they are increasing their catches. By running Nomad DTX Minnow lures down about 25ft, pulling Joe Shutes and lead headed jigs with large shad bodies subsurface, and ballyhoo rigs of various sizes way back behind the boat on the surface, they are getting the strikes. The distance you must travel changes daily to stay on these fish so look for other boats to give away the location of feeding fish. The presence of whales is usually a good indicator as well. There is a slot limit to abide by and permits which you must have to keep these fish so make sure you are up to date on the ever changing regulations. Good luck and leave some pictures of your tuna in the comments!!! Try this recipe: For me it's hard to beat pan seared tuna in butter and lemon juice with just a sprinkle of salt and pepper. A few minutes on each side is all you need, depending on the thickness of the filet. Tight lines friends!!!







Does a College **Education Lead to** Higher Earnings for Virginia Residents?

The relationship between higher education and earnings has long been a topic of debate, with conventional wisdom suggesting that obtaining a college degree guarantees financial security. While data consistently show that college graduates, on average, earn more than those with only a high school diploma, this trend is far from universal. In Virginia, a nuanced analysis reveals significant variability in post-college earnings based on factors such as the institution attended, the field of study pursued, and the socioeconomic background of the student. This report examines whether obtaining a college degree translates into higher earnings for Virginia residents and the factors that influence this outcome.

The Earnings Premium: General Trends in Virginia

Nationally, college graduates earn, on average, \$1.2 million more than high school graduates over a lifetime, according to Georgetown University's Center on Education and the Workforce. In Virginia, the U.S. Department of Education's College Scorecard indicates that 80.1% of graduates from four-year institutions earn more than the median high school graduate 10 years college. While entering Virginia's performance is slightly better than the national average of 77.5%, the data still highlight that nearly 20% of Virginia's college graduates earn their high school-educated less than counterparts within a decade of starting college. This disparity underscores the importance of examining the factors influencing earnings outcomes. These include the institution attended, the field of study, and local economic conditions. Virginia offers a unique case study because of its diverse higher education landscape, ranging from prestigious research universities to smaller liberal arts colleges and regionally focused institutions.


Field of Study: A Key Determinant

The choice of major plays a critical role in determining earnings outcomes. In Virginia, as elsewhere, graduates in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) fields and business disciplines tend to command higher salaries than those in the liberal arts or education.

- 1. High-Earning Majors: Engineering graduates from Virginia Tech report starting salaries exceeding \$70,000, with mid-career earnings surpassing \$100,000. Similarly, business and computer science graduates from George Mason University and the University of Virginia often achieve strong earnings trajectories.
- 2. Low-Earning Majors: In contrast, graduates with degrees in social work, education, or the arts often face starting salaries below \$40,000. While these fields may provide personal fulfillment, they typically do not offer the same financial returns as high-demand, technical disciplines.
- 3. Variability by Institution: Even within the same field, the institution attended can influence earnings. For example, an engineering graduate from the University of Virginia may earn significantly more than one from a smaller, less well-resourced institution.







Socioeconomic Factors and Their Influence


A student's background also affects their earnings potential after college. Students from higher-income households often have access to greater resources, enabling them to focus on their studies without the financial pressures faced by their lower-income peers. This disparity manifests in both academic performance and post-graduation outcomes.

- 1. Household Income: Research shows that students from wealthier families are more likely to attend selective institutions and graduate on time, leading to higher earnings. In contrast, students from lower-income families may take longer to graduate or drop out, diminishing their earnings potential.
- 2. Debt Burden: The average student loan debt for Virginia graduates is \$29,400. While manageable for those entering high-paying fields, this debt can be crippling for graduates in lower-paying professions, further eroding the financial benefits of a college degree.
- 3. Local Economic Conditions: Graduates who remain in economically depressed areas of Virginia, such as parts of Southwest Virginia, often face limited job opportunities, regardless of their qualifications.



The Role of Completion Rates

Another critical factor is whether students complete their degrees. In Virginia, as in the rest of the United States, individuals with some college education but no degree often earn only marginally more than high school graduates. Institutions with higher graduation rates, such as the University of Virginia and William & Mary, tend to produce graduates with stronger earnings outcomes. Conversely, schools with lower completion rates see a larger proportion of students who struggle to recoup the costs of their education.



Opportunity Costs and Net Gains

While college graduates often earn more than high school graduates, it is important to consider opportunity costs. Attending college typically means four or more years of lost income, as well as tuition and other expenses. For many students, particularly those who take longer than four years to graduate, these costs can outweigh the financial benefits of a degree.

- 1. Cost of Attendance: In Virginia, the average net annual cost of attendance (after scholarships and grants) for public universities ranges from \$10,000 to \$20,000, with private institutions costing significantly more.
- 2. Forgone Earnings: High school graduates who enter the workforce immediately can accumulate several years of earnings before their college-bound peers even begin their careers. For some, particularly those in high-demand trades, this early income advantage can offset the benefits of a degree.





Addressing the Earnings Gap

Given the variability in outcomes, policymakers and educators must work to ensure that higher education delivers on its promise of economic mobility. Several strategies can help bridge the earnings gap for Virginia residents:

- 1. Improved Career Services: Colleges should strengthen career counseling and job placement services, particularly for students in lower-earning fields.
- 2. Focus on High-Demand Fields: Expanding programs in high-demand fields such as healthcare, technology, and engineering can improve earnings potential for graduates.

- 3. Support for Low-Income Students: Enhanced financial aid and support services can help students from lower-income backgrounds complete their degrees and access higher-paying jobs.
- 4. Regional Development: Addressing economic disparities across Virginia's regions can create more opportunities for graduates to find well-paying jobs close to home.






The Takeaway for Our Readers

For Virginia residents, obtaining a college degree often leads to higher earnings, but this outcome is not guaranteed. Factors such as the institution attended, the field of study, socioeconomic background, and local economic conditions significantly influence financial outcomes. While Virginia's colleges and universities outperform national averages in many respects, nearly 20% of graduates still earn less than the typical high school graduate within a decade of entering college.

To maximize the benefits of higher education, students must make informed decisions about where to study and what to major in, while policymakers and institutions must address disparities in access and outcomes. By aligning educational offerings with the demands of the labor market and supporting students from diverse backgrounds, Virginia can ensure that college education remains a pathway to economic success for all.

A Tale of Two Cities...or Maybe Three



The cancellation of the Something in the Water festival in Virginia Beach, initially scheduled for April 2025, has raised several questions regarding the long-term future of the event, local cultural impact, and the broader consequences for Virginia Beach's tourism industry. While such decisions are not made lightly, the festival's abrupt end signals a turning point in how major events are hosted and the responsibilities organizers and local communities face when considering the sustainability and impact of large-scale festivals.

Created by Pharrell Williams in 2019, Something in the Water quickly became a cultural milestone for Virginia Beach. The event was a blend of music, art, and activism, featuring top-tier artists, local talent, and a commitment to giving back to the community. It was more than a music festival; it served as a vehicle for Pharrell's deep-rooted connection to his hometown and the opportunity to bring global attention to Virginia Beach. The festival quickly gained traction as an economic engine for the region, attracting tourists, boosting local businesses, and offering a platform for emerging artists.

The cancellation of such a beloved event has left fans and critics alike questioning the reasons behind it. At face value, it's hard not to see this decision as a blow to the local economy, which has undoubtedly benefitted from the influx of attendees and the exposure provided by the festival. According to several reports, the 2022 edition brought in millions of dollars in revenue, with local hotels, restaurants, and vendors seeing increased traffic. More importantly, the festival provided an unmatched opportunity for Virginia Beach to position itself as a cultural destination rather than just a beach town, a feat that many small towns and cities long to achieve. For a region that is often overshadowed by its larger counterparts, the festival represented the potential for sustained growth in the tourism sector, far beyond the typical summer crowds.





However, it is essential to consider that hosting an event of Something in the Water's scale comes with complexities. The financial risks, logistical challenges, and unfore see consequences that arise from trying to satisfy an increasingly diverse and demanding audience are significant. Issues of safety, crowd control, and community relations cannot be taken lightly. Organizers may have faced pressure from various local authorities or residents concerned about the impact on public services, or perhaps financial losses from previous years may have made it difficult to continue at the same level of investment. Moreover, tensions between event organizers and local government officials, or even among festival-goers themselves, could have played a role in this cancellation.

This cancellation should serve as a wake-up call to other cities considering similar ventures. It's important to recognize that large festivals must balance commercial objectives with the well-being of the community and the long-term environmental and social consequences of hosting such events. When cities prioritize events that place strain on infrastructure, local resources, and the lives of residents, they must be prepared for the fallout when something inevitably goes wrong.

In the end, the cancellation of Something in the Water may mark the end of an era for Virginia Beach, but it can also serve as a starting point for reassessing the way the city wants to develop its cultural and economic landscape moving forward. Will there be other festivals in the future? Perhaps.

But the real question is whether Virginia Beach can find a way to marry cultural vibrancy with sustainable development—a challenge that extends far beyond any single event, his was but just one of several regional economic development projects that has faced opposition - now let's turn our focus to Norfol.

The question of why Norfolk, Virginia, is pursuing a casino project despite the recent opening of a casino across the river in Portsmouth is a valid concern that highlights the competitive nature of the regional gaming and tourism market. Additionally, Norfolk has long struggled with a lack of large-scale, high-profile attractions compared to other nearby cities. The proposed casino, with its upscale amenities and potential for a hotel, could help elevate Norfolk's position in the regional tourism market, driving more visitors who might otherwise pass through on their way to other destinations like Virginia Beach.



Norfolk's economy is historically tied to government and military sectors, including the naval base and port operations. While these are critical to the city's economy, they can also make the city vulnerable to federal budget changes or shifts in global trade. Though Portsmouth's casino is also expected to create jobs, the proximity of a second casino in Norfolk could amplify employment opportunities across the region, with both cities benefiting from the influx of workers and their spending.

Casinos tend to have a significant local economic impact, especially if they offer a variety of attractions beyond just gambling, like entertainment, dining, and retail. Norfolk might believe that a casino would tap into a slightly different market than the one served by Portsmouth, targeting visitors who may want a different experience or who are more familiar with Norfolk's unique offerings. The regional population is large enough to support multiple casinos, particularly when

one takes into account the combined draw of Norfolk, Portsmouth, and nearby areas such as Virginia Beach.

Norfolk sees the casino project as a way to carve out its own place in the regional economy, despite Portsmouth's new casino. The hope is that by offering a distinct mix of attractions, leveraging its central location, and contributing to long-term economic development goals, Norfolk can create a sustainable and complementary casino environment that benefits the entireregion, rather than one city at the expense of the other.





If you cannot find something to do while visiting Windsor Castle Park, you're not looking hard enough. There is a compass course, a dog park, a fishing pier, a fitness map, a kayak launch with self-service rentals, a mountain bike trail, a natural playscape for children, a picnic area, and many opportunities for taking pictures or videos. Windsor Castle Farm is just one stop along the 3.8 miles of walking trails known as the Captain John Smith National Historic Trail.

One notable attraction that draws history enthusiasts from across the country is the Windsor Castle Manor House & Grounds Tour.
