Abbeville County voters to go to polls this coming Tuesday

Abbeville County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 3, for the general election, which will include candidates ranging from the local scene to the President of the United States, according to Abbeville County voter registration and elections director Kim London.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Voters may cast their ballots at the regular voting places--with one notable exception. The Abbeville County Courthouse will be closed to voting, so as not to conflict with a session of court going on there.

People who typically vote at the Courthouse may vote at the Abbeville County Administrative Complex.

Locally, voters in Abbeville will be choosing among four candidates for Mayor--incumbent Delano Freeman is facing challenges from Trey Edwards, Eric Delgado and Josh Baughman.

In City Council District 8, incumbent Jim Grant is facing challenger Matt Gambrell.

Three City Council members are running unopposed--James JJ Jackson in District 5, Benji Greeson in District 7, and Faye Thomas in District 2.

City Council elections are nonpartisan.

Ray Watson is running unopposed for reelection as a Republican, and Shandal Boggs is running unopposed as a Democrat for Abbeville County Clerk

State Rep. Craig Gagnon, a Republican, is facing no opposition in his reelection effort for State House District 11.

Democratic incumbent Ronnie Ashley is facing Republican challenger Mark Dorn for Abbeville County Coroner.

In U.S. House District Three, Jeff Duncan, the Republican incumbent, is facing Democratic challenger Hosea Cleveland, London continued.

In State Senate District Four, Republican incumbent Mike Gambrell is facing Democratic challenger Jose Villa Pliego, she continued.

In State Sen. District 10, Democratic incumbent Floyd Nicholson is facing Republican challenger Billy Garrett.

In State House District Seven, Republican incumbent Jay West faces Democratic challenger Andrea Bejarano-Robinson.

Eighth Judicial Circuit Solicitor David Stumbo is running unopposed.

Three, Democratic incum-

Abbeville County Sheriff bent Charles Goodwin is facing Republican challenger Nicole Matthews.

In County Council District Four, County Council member Billy Norris, a Republican, is running unopposed. In County Council District Five, Republican James McCord is running unop-

posed. In County Council District Six, Republican Rick Campbell is running unopposed.

Susie New is running for Soil and Water District Commission unopposed.

On the Abbeville County School District Board of Trustees elections, all the candidates are running unopposed on the ballot. They are Joe Boochie Bry-

an in Area Two, and Marion Buster Taylor in Area Four. David Brooks is running unopposed in Area Five, and Patricia Davis has declared a write in candidacy London continued.

Keith Dunn is unopposed in School District Area Eight.

School board elections are nonpartisan.

Abbeville County voters will be joining voters across the Palmetto State in casting ballots for the U.S. Senate race, where Republican incumbent Lindsey Graham is facing In County Council District Democratic challenger Jaime Harrison.

And of course, there is the Presidential race, where Republican President Donald Trump is facing Democratic challenger, and former Vice President, Joe Biden.

There is still time to vote absentee. A voting station has been set up in the lobby of the Abbeville County Council chambers on the first floor of the Abbeville County Administrative Complex.

Those people planning to vote need to bring a photo ID to the polling place.


> Each tour guide held a lantern, and each tour group consisted of approximately 15 people.

School District to distribute food boxes

Abbeville County School District is collaborating with Save the Children, an organization working hard to help with food insecurities in communities, according to Dr. Lori Brewton, Chief Operating Officer with the Abbeville County School District.

"We have an opportunity that we are offering to our community," she said. "The program is called Farmers to Family, which delivers food boxes to rural communities."

Food boxes will be delivered to the Abbeville County community on Thursday, October 29. ACSD will help to distribute the food boxes, along with both of the FFA Chapters at Abbeville High School and Dixie High

"We will be located in the parking lot of the old Fred's shopping center," located on Hwy 28 By-Pass (on the western outskirts of Abbeville), beginning at 8:30 a.m.," said Brewton.

"We are excited to be able to partner with an organization focused on feeding families in rural communities. We will have signs posted and will help to direct vehicles in and out of the parking lot. There will be over 1,152 boxes distributed. Each vehicle will be provided one box of food."

These food boxes weigh about 32 pounds each and each will have fresh fruits and vegetables, protein, and dairy items.

"We will begin distribution at 8:30 and continue until we run out of boxes," she said.

Brewton explained the origins of the project.

"One of the neighboring superintendent's Dr. Faye Sprouse, contacted Dr. Gary with the information,' she said.

"Ware Shoals partnered with this organization a few weeks ago. We are using members of our FFA chapters at both high schools since the food boxes are from the USDA, directly from farmers. Our FFA (Future Farmers of America) fits right into this initiative. It will be district office staff, along with our FFA students and their advisors helping to distribute the food boxes.

Board contracts with Gary to be superintendent

The Abbeville County School District Board of Trustees voted Tuesday night to enter into a contract for interim superintendent Dr. Mason Gary to be District superintendent for a three year period, with the terms to be decided by Gary and the board.

Dr. Gary had been serving as interim superintendent in the aftermath of Dr. Julie Fowler's departure this past summer.

The board took the action for the contract following an executive session of about 45 minutes.

The board also approved a Capital Improvement Plan. It is a plan to move forward on various projects at the various schools, including, just to name a few, security entrances at several schools, two 20 passenger buses for the District's high schools, and some awnings Primary and JCCE.

The plan includes projects that would be prioritized, and consists of smaller projects that we can afford.

The District has slightly more than \$5 million for these projects, in terms of cash on hand, Gary said before the meeting.

The school board also Tuesday night approved the ABM Request for Qualifications, to select a company which would help the District fund projects in the capital improvement plan specifically related to energy savings.

ABM is based in New York, with a branch in Georgia, said Gary before the meeting.

Gary gave his Superintendent's report, including updates on finance, safety, technology, and curriculum.

The trustees also looked at a maintenance report, a

There are 188 public high schools in South Carolina, and Dixie ranked 48th in term of SAT scores from the spring of 2020, and Abbeville 74th, said Gary.

There was also a segment for Gold Star Highlights.

Schools could see various improvements

The Abbeville County School District is planning to make some improvements to a number of District schools, according to the District's interim superintendent Dr. Mason Gary.

These could include the addition of awnings that will be designed to provide shelter for students and teachers moving from building to parking lot or building to car loops at Long Cane Primary, John C. Calhoun Elementary, and Wright Middle School.

The District is also hoping to install safety capture areas at the front entrance of our schools.

These would provide areas where the school secretary could buzz in a visitor rather than having him or her have access to the building, he continued.

This would add another layer of protection for schools, something which is needed, many say, in the wake of much publicized school shootings, Dr. Gary said.

The schools where the front office is at the main door will be the ones where the safety areas are first installed, once the materials

The only schools which would provide an exception are Westwood Elementary and John C. Calhoun Elementary, where because the offices are located deep inside the building, additional design work will be needed.

The awning plans are scheduled to be considered by the school board, and the "safety capture areas" have already been approved.

Dr. Gary is hoping that both kinds of improvements will become reality later this



Council studies plan for engineering services

The Calhoun Falls Town Council met Monday night studying a plan for engineering services in connection with efforts to upgrade its sewer infrastructure.

Council tabled for further study a resolution authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with Dunn and Shirley consulting engineers on behalf of the Town of Calhoun Falls to obtain engineering services to provide oversight on the sewer collection system habitation associated with the award of \$300,000 from the State Revolving Fund, according

to information from the Town of Calhoun Falls.

These Revolving Fund monies are to be used for "repair/rehabilitation of sewer collection system infrastructure," Calhoun Falls Mayor Chris Cowan has said.

In other matters Monday night, Council approved final reading on Ordinance 2020-05, with the Dominion Electric and Gas Combination Franchise Agreement.

Council approved final reading on Ordinance 2020-06 with the Little River Electric and Gas franchise agreement.

There were also on the agenda departmental reports for the Police Department, the Fire Department, Facilities and Recreation, and Utilities/Streets/Sanitation, and the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

There was an executive session that was slated to include a discussion of personnel matters.

After returning to open session, Council agreed that the Town's utility crew and office personnel will be working half a day on Nov. 3--Election Day--a Town spokesperson said Tuesday.

Due West adopts anti-virus proclamation

The Town of Due West has adopted a supplemental proclamation representing a renewal of a proclamation the Town adopted earlier this year.

Due West Mayor Jeannie Knight, on Oct. 9, proclaimed a Second Supplemental Proclamation and appealed to all citizens, visitors, faculty and students to "wear a mask and social distance" at least six feet apart "when shopping, lounging, or walking about Town or in public places.

"The emergency continues to exist during the duration of this proclamation.

This will expire on Dec. 7, 2020, but can be renewed."

The proclamation notes that Gov. Henry McMaster issued an executive order on March 13, issued a State of Emergency in South Carolina, having determined that COVID-19 posed an imminent public health emergency to the Palmetto State.

This State of Emergency continues, and McMaster, along with the CDC, the U.S. Surgeon General, and DHEC, makes three recommendations, according to the proclamation:

Those include the practice of social distancing, wear-

ing face coverings, and getting tested for the virus on a regular basis.

"Towns/cities have the emergency powers to adopt emergency proclamations to make decisions regarding protections against the virus for their citizens," Knight explained last week.

"This is part of South Carolina's emergency proclamation from the Governor in March to address the pandemic dangers. These town proclamations last for 61 days and then can be renewed. So we now have the second one in place."





County's coronavirus case count still climbing

The number of coronavirus cases in Abbeville County continues to rise, closing in on the 700 mark.

Abbeville County, according to figures released by DHEC on Monday, Oct. 26, had 669 coronavirus cases, and 12 confirmed coronavirus-related deaths.

Among Abbeville's neighboring counties, Anderson County had 5, 386 coronavirus cases, and 12 confirmed

Greenwood County had 2422 cases, and 69 coronavirus-related deaths.

Laurens County had 1, 865 coronavirus cases, and 59 confirmed coronavirus-related deaths.

McCormick County had 257 confirmed coronavirus

cases, and six coronavirus-related deaths.

"We continue to encourage mask wearing, good hand hygiene and social distancing," stated Dr. Trey Moore, AAMC family physician, in a quote passed along by Meg Davis, AAMC marketing/foundation/volunteer services director. "Avoiding close contact with others is an important tool to minimize exposure to the virus and to help curb the spread of COVID-19."

Meanwhile, the Town of Due West recently approved an "appeal" for citizens to wear masks and social distance, according to Mayor Jeannie Knight.

Knight was asked about the status of the coronavirus pandemic in Due West.

"Last week there were only three cases that were in quarantine," she said in an Oct. 23 e-mail. "The Town just goes by the Abbeville stats but we hear of a few cases in families in this area of the County. Nothing confirmed.

"We rely on the testing if anyone has symptoms and the contact tracing that alerts people who may be exposed.

"Of course, I keep up with the Town employees. They were tested back in August. If we have a case close by, I will arrange for them to be tested again. Our businesses seem to be operating as usual so far. Hope to continue to avoid a lockdown."

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










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a Word from "THE WORD"

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2 Kings 20:19 "So Hezekiah said to Isaiah, the word of the Lord which you have spoken is good! For he said, will there not be peace and truth at least in my days?"

In a "Peanuts" comic strip, Lucy is swinging on the playground. Charlie Brown reads to her, "It says here that the world revolves around the sun once a year." Lucy stops abruptly and responds, "Are you sure? I thought it revolved around me."

That is what most people think—even if they aren't as blunt about saying it as Lucy. That seems to be the attitude of Hezekiah in our text. Let me put this verse in context. 2 Kings 20 records that Hezekiah was very ill. In fact, the Lord sent Isaiah to inform him that he would not recover from his illness.

Hezekiah tearfully entreats the Lord to heal him and the Lord does just that. In fact, before Isaiah gets out of the palace, the Lord instructs him to return and tell Hezekiah that he will not only recover but have 15 additional years added to his life.

After Hezekiah's recovery, Berodach-Baladan, king of Babylon, sends a get well present to Hezekiah. Hezekiah was so enamored with the gift that he showed the messengers of the gift all through the treasure house and all the material wealth that he had. There was not anything in his possession that Hezekiah held back from showing them.

After they left, the Lord sent Isaiah, the prophet, back to Hezekiah. Isaiah asked where the men came from and what had they said to Hezekiah. Hezekiah shared with Isaiah that the messengers were from Babylon and that he

had showed them everything in the king's palace. Isaiah then told him that the result of that would be that they would return and take everything that had been accumulated and the descendants of Hezekiah would be deported to Babylon and the men would be eunuchs in the palace of Babylon. Hezekiah's response was, "The word of the Lord is good, at least I will have peace during my time." Three thoughts come to mind from his words.

First of all, one can't trust everyone. You probably have heard the expression, "Beware of Greeks bearing gifts." That saying comes from the narrative of the Trojan horse that the Greeks used to trick the citizens of Troy. That is precisely what the messengers from Babylon did to Hezekiah. They brought gifts to Hezekiah on the pretense that their king was glad he recovered from his illness.

In reality, they were coming to case the royal palace and the treasures it held. Hezekiah foolishly shared with them all about his wealth. More than likely, Hezekiah was so happy to be healed and receive the gift that he was proud to show them all the wealth that he had.

It is a sad but true fact: everyone cannot be trusted with personal information. Beware whom you share things with.

Second, one cannot tell everyone sensitive information. Not everyone can be trusted with privileged information. Some folks have a hard time keeping confidences. You may also have heard the expression, "Three people can keep a secret if two of them are dead." It is a hard lesson to learn that some people cannot be trusted to keep their mouths shut. I have learned by painful experience that some folks won't keep a confidence. Hezekiah learned that the hard way-he not only shared with the messengers but told them all about it.

Third, one cannot turn his back on future generations. Hezekiah did that. His reply to Isaiah was, "Oh well, at least it won't happen in my lifetime."

He was not concerned about his progeny going into Babylonian captivity. As long as it didn't happen to him, he was okay with it.

One of the failings of our present generation is that we do not seem to be concerned with future generations. Our nation is putting our descendants in trillions of dollars in debt without the least consideration of how they are going to pay for it. When the bill comes due, our grandchildren and great-grandchildren will suffer a tremendous burden. We should be concerned with what kind of world our future generations will have to live in—but by and large many of us are only concerned about ourselves, our comfort, our welfare.


