THE MAKING OF RI DISTRICT 3300'S GLOBAL CLIMATE CHANGE CONFERENCE

THE BEGINNING

On 12 July 2020, committee members of DAGES met DGE Dato Bindi together with some of her committee members at an exclusive restaurant in TTDI, KL to discuss ongoing activities of DAGES, future plans and to brainstorm ideas for RY 21-22 and how to usher in Rotary's seventh area of focus, Environment in our District.

One of the ideas discussed was the HugOurTree initiative proposed by Ir Nirinder Johl of RC Bernam Valley and he presented the concept, the proposal for fund raising through green CSR funds from energy and other corporates and tree planting projects by Rotary Clubs in West Malaysia using the funds raised. Other ideas discussed included hosting of a major event to kick-off this initiative and other potential DAGES projects proposed for RY 21-22.

There was much hope and optimism then, that the COVID19 pandemic will end soon and that life will go back to normal by the end of 2020. Projects were planned and proposals prepared, but alas, the pandemic decided to stay put and matters worsened over time and the lockdowns and work from home became routine for most of us.

THE INCEPTION OF GLOBAL CLIMATE CONFERENCE

Later that year, Dr Kong Voon Sin of Rotary Club of Bukit Kiara Sunrise planted an idea with Dato Bindi about holding a Climate Conference to usher in Rotary's seventh area of focus, **Environment**, in our District. The idea blossomed. A chat group was created on 20 November 2020 and an ad-hoc committee (Green Year Committee) was formed by Dr Kong and the date of 4 th July was set for the Conference.

DAGES was invited on 6 January 2021 to support the adhoc committee and on 4 February 2021 Dato Bindi requested DAGES to take the lead in organising the Climate Conference as Dr Kong had just taken a position with the University of Malaya and thus was unable to anchor the organising committee. The work commenced thereon.

EMBRACING THE CHALLENGE

Being clear from the start on what we hope to achieve was important. Going virtual was not our prime choice, but sharing expertise, resources and connection was made easy with technology. The team was handpicked. They were enthusiastic, interested and driven team players. We showcased strong visuals in the form of our promo materials including our DAGES conference website. And we had extraordinary keynote speakers and panelists who set the required tone for the Conference. And the world was with us through Rotary's global network. As for the rest, we just went forth and did it.



TEAMWORK. AND COLLABORATION

A great team definitely makes all the difference. This was especially true when organising this Conference. The key committee members who were brought in when laying the groundwork were not many, but instrumental and effective.

Yasmin Yusof (DAGES Secretary) managed the design for the Webinar Series, Conference materials, and Rotary Eco-Warrior Manifesto which included the brochures, visuals and EDMs. She also assisted in developing the contents for the webinar and conference promotion through social media. Ajit Johl crafted the the details of the conference sponsorship and coordinated the website development exercise. Karthi Palanisamy and Samantha Samson anchored the production and event management of the Conference after much persuasion and arm twisting.

On 3 April 2021, a tree planting project was organised by Ir Nirinder with members of Rotary Club of Bernam Valley, volunteers of #HugOurTree, officials from Lembaga Urus Air Selangor (LUAS) and volunteers from DAGES. The event was held at Rotary Peace Park, LUAS ORS Lakes, Bestari Jaya, Kuala Selangor. We had over 30 participants and 50 tree saplings were planted. The event was video recorded by Nirinder's team using a drone and the contents of the recording was edited and made ready for broadcast at the official launching of the HugOurTree initiative at the Conference.

Chiew Teck Wee took the lead role in developing the Rotary Eco Warrior (REW) Manifesto together with the 4-Way Path with inputs from a number of us, including one of our Webinar guest speakers, Rita Dutta - to bring it to its present form and guided the Rotaract team in producing the REW video which was partially shot at Bukit Kiara nature forest. The Rotaract team played a key role in the video production and


subsequent editing.

The international speakers/panelists were approached through District Governor Dato' Bindi's and other Rotarians' extensive network. For the Malaysian youth panel session, a number of youth activists and professionals were approached. Azrina Abdullah, a new Rotarian from Rotary Club of Ara Damansara stepped in and managed to persuade four youth panelists from the corporate, NGO and university sectors to participate.

Dato' Bindi managed to convince PRIP K R Ravindran to be one of the keynote speakers. Bharat Gorasia played a key role with Yeshey Dorji from the Rotary Club of Thimphu, Bhutan to invite another keynote speaker from Bhutan. That incredible effort in the mountains and valleys of Bhutan was another story to be told on another day.

Rotary has always shown deep investment in environment even before it became the 7th area of focus and having Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) was a must. Through Synergy Rotary Friendship Alliance, we managed to bring in a special invited speaker, Dr Christopher Pullock, ESRAG Chair 18-21 to speak at the Conference.

THE JOURNEY



This inaugural edition of Global Climate Conference gathered like-minded individuals and organisations from across the globe, to learn, discuss thoughts, network, share ideas, create new ideas, and to ignite motivation in preserving and protecting the environment.

The Conference expounded on the global challenges brought upon by climate change and invited dialogues and discussions on practices and implementations from around the world. To ensure global participation, the Team explored and extended connections from within Rotary.

Synergy Rotary Friendship Alliance, a friendship alliance comprising 16 clubs from 14 countries came on board. Next to join as an international partner was Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) with more than 1,400 members in 80 countries. Closer to home we had the Global Environment Centre (GEC) supporting our event. DAGES already have a long standing working relationship with GEC on community engagement and biodiversity conservation especially in river care.

Through #HugOurTree, Tenaga Nasional Berhad agreed to Rotary's nationwide tree-planting projects. Forestry Department, Malaysia gave their nod a few weeks before the Conference to be Rotary's partner in tree-planting as part of their 100 Million Tree-Planting Campaign 2020-2025 in the Greening Malaysia Agenda.

As part of the strategic planning in building the momentum and drawing potential participants to the Conference, the DAGES Facebook Group was created on 1 March 2021. The Group grew in popularity, not only amongst Rotarians, but non-Rotarians and NGOs from around the world in a short span of time. It gathered 200 members within 24 hours of launching;



500 members in 6 days; and in 4 months, 2,200 members.

The DAGES FB Group was used as our promotional platform to create awareness and trigger curiosity and thirst for information, thus indirectly prepping our potential audience for the Webinar Series and the Conference.

The cooperation between people and organisations in the process of organising the Conference was what got most work done effectively. It was truly amazing to witness the amazing outcome and results and the relationships that was built and flourished during the journey and after.






02 Website Development

03 Promotion & Marketing

The Conference website was running by the end of May 2021 to accept online registration for the Conference and our Conference Promotion and Marketing team under Pushpa Krishna from Rotary Club of Melawati started their marketing campaign to promote registrations among Rotary Clubs, Rotaract Clubs and Interact Clubs both in our District and internationally.

BEHIND THE SCENE

The Conference was also promoted at our District Training Assembly, District Conference, Rotaract Assembly, our DAGES website, FB page and through talks at various Clubs.

A few members from the team spoke at the club meeting of RC Kuching, Sarawak on 7 June 2021. Also present were members from RC Kuching Central, Kuching Unity City, Kuching South, Kuching Jaya, RC Luyang, RC Bandar Seri Begawan and RC Tawau. On 17 June, the same promo was done at the club meeting of RC Luyang, Kota Kinabalu. Ir Dr Dhileepan Nair spoke at the Rotaract Assembly on 17 June 2021.

Dato' Bindi promoted the Conference through her incoming District Governors' classmate network and her other Rotary networks. We had over 2200 participants who registered for the Conference when the online registration closed on 3rd July 2021.

O4 Conference Production

There was much hope and optimism then, that the COVID19 pandemic will end soon and life will go back to normal by the end of 2020. Projects were planned and proposals prepared, but alas, the pandemic decided to stay put and matters worsened over time and the lockdowns and work from home became routine for most of us. The thought of having a hybrid conference vs fully virtual was hovering during the planning.

We sourced quotations from three studio companies and finally selected FTF Creators Studio to undertake the production of the Conference, enhancement of the website, promotions, and other services.

The MCs for the Conference were selected from some of our outstanding Rotarians and this included a new Rotarian Adi Afendi and Siva Kumar Raghavan.

The production team was headed by Karthi Palanisamy who worked magic with the studio company and was ably supported by Samantha Samson. The tech team was headed by Rajj Melambaram and supported by Mahendran Daniel. They resolved many technical hitches along the way, most unseen by us.

The final production broadcasted at the Conference was the result of meticulously arrangement of the various Conference segments, detailed coordination with the MCs, speakers and panelists, final editing of pre-recorded segments and insertion of impactful videos as intermissions.





The Crisis and Decision Time

The Conference production team had three options for broadcasting the Conference, either at a venue with live audience or at a venue with the production team, MCs, moderators and panelists or completely on zoom and live broadcast from remote locations.

Option 2 seemed viable and a location for the broadcast was identified in Bukit Gasing. Petaling Jaya and permits were obtained from the relevant authorities. It was an exotic location with three to four studio background options for live broadcasting from the venue.

As the event day approached, covid cases were rapidly rising in Selangor. A crisis loomed for the Conference and the nation. On July 1st 2021, the Government announced that Enhanced Movement Control Order will be imposed in Selangor and parts of Kuala Lumpur from July 3rd 2021.

A crisis meeting was held on the night of 1st July and the Conference production committee decided it was too risky to have the Conference broadcast from the Bukit Gasing venue and the decision was made to broadcast via zoom and live FB/DAGES website with the production team, speakers and panelists at their homes.

SETTING THE STAGE FOR THE CONFERENCE

The Webinars were professionally run by our Rotarians led by Mahendran Daniel and ably supported by KK Looi and other team members. The Webinars attracted a good number of viewers ranging from over 100 to 200 participants for each webinar from Malaysia and overseas. The webinars were hosted by different clubs in Penang, Perak and Klang Valley and our District Officers were invited to officiate these Webinars. The Webinar Series were concluded on 29 June 2021.








Wildlife Protection, Sustainable Lifestyle and Storms & Weather

Shah Redza launched the International Webinar Series by sharing the deep secret of the untouched Belum-Temengor forest covering 15,200 Hectares dotted with hundreds of islands. The forest is home to a wide variety of flora and fauna including 14 of the world's most threatened mammals including the Malayan tiger, Indian elephant, white handed gibbon, Malaysian sun bear and tapir.

Next in the Series was the collaborative effort between the Jeffrey Sachs Center on Sustainable Development (JSC) at Sunway University and the Rotary Club of Bukit Kiara Sunrise (RCBKS). The program was especially designed and implemented as a campaign to educate and empower Rotary Club members and their families to understand the link between personal consumption patterns and global environmental consequences.

Following that, Professor Gabriele Villarini from the University of Iowa, shared the serious consequences climate change has on storm and rainfall patterns, flooding events, river flow, and water supply. In his true academic fashion, he enthralled the audience with astounding statistics and figures.





Dr Sarah Karikó chronicled her works, the biodiversity of spiders and the interconnectedness among species from her fieldwork in Madagascar and the Teton Mountains. She is not only a scientist but also an artist who interweaved designs and creativity in exploring the Web of Life.



While many subjects involving climate change dealt with terranean matters, Fairul Izmal shared about the Forgotten Frontier - the marine environment - that large area of the planet that is covered by oceans.

He presented facts and data surrounding ocean conservation,





WELCOMING ADDRESS

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Climate change has become a global environmental issue which dominates the international agenda and one of the most challenging issues for mankind and is at the heart of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals.



Dato' Bindi Rajasegaran, the District Governor RY21-22 of District 3300 kick-started the morning with her awakening statement that the earth which is 4.5 billion years (give or take 50 million years) was fine except when humans started the industrial revolution some 300 years back and since then humans have done untold damage. Humans' use of resources — forests, water, air, minerals, soil — is far outstripping the earth's ability to replenish them.

She also reiterated that conservation measures are also nothing new, in which they have been in existence since the 19th century or even earlier. For over 120 years, conservation initiatives have been in place but today the situation is worsening, going in a

downward spiral. Millions of people worldwide are grappling with these challenges, which require new ways of thinking.

Dato' Bindi said there is no other place that she loves but Malaysia. As a peninsular country, the impact of climate change could pose a serious threat to those living in coastal communities due to the rise of sea level and tidal inundation. Being of tropical climate year through, Malaysia's relatively predictable rainy seasons have changed and these were attributed directly or indirectly to human activities that alter the composition of the global atmosphere and that is in addition to natural climate variability.

Governments of the world are racing to take measures in clean energy initiatives and reducing carbon emissions, greenhouse gas emissions, and methane emissions but we need to see this change happening also in communities and in ourselves.

She hoped that at this Conference, participants will get to hear the different perspectives from professionals in varied areas of environment endeavours, who will share their views and solutions in addressing climate change.

"Let's keep the momentum of positive change in consumer behaviour and let's be the catalyst of change and it starts with us.

Let's pledge to make the Earth a greener and healthier place and remember, every little effort helps."

KEYNOTE ADDRESS

ENVIRONMENT AS ROTARY'S 7TH AREA OF FOCUS

The Rotary Foundation grants are channeled through six Areas of Focus. On 25 September 2019, I initiated with the Board of Trustees a discussion on why we should not have Environment as a separate Area of Focus.

I submitted that satisfying ourselves that projects which pertain to climate change and the environment being handled via the other six areas of focus, was not nearly adequate.

I was convinced that we could not continue to ignore calls around us of many young people all over the world, who in massive outward displays were beseeching the attention of us adults to climate change.

Some of the first such youth rallies began in Australia, and then spread from there to the Pacific islands to India and Turkey and across Europe, and the US as students kicked off what organizers were calling a Global Climate Strike.

The last straw which thrust me to react was the cutting words of a 16-year-old schoolgirl, Greta Thunberg speaking at the UN when she said "You have stolen my dreams and my childhood with your empty words. Our entire eco systems are collapsing and we are at the beginning of mass extinction. But you (adults) can only talk about money and fairy tales of eternal economic growth".

Coincidentally about the same time then President Mark Maloney also had similar thoughts and pushed for a seventh Area of Focus on the RI side. The wheels of our respective Boards started moving and 'Environment' came into being as an Area of Focus.

Having said that I must quickly point out that It was not as though Rotary was not involved with projects to protect the environment. In fact over the last five years, our Foundation has allocated \$18.4 million in global grant funding to environment-related causes as we support water, sanitation, and hygiene projects.



From a program to saving pollinating monarch butterflies from extinction in the US to a Rotary Peace Fellow helped goat herders earn a decent wage in Mongolia while protecting the grasslands.

I am impressed with your Districts collaborative arrangement with the Selangor State Water Management Department and the launch of your Peace Park – a first in Asia offering recreational facilities for the local community, university students and the general public. Equally compelling is the 4-Way Path Manifesto which you just launched. I also liked how you have defined and illustrated each of the four paths. It is more than just theory.

Rotarians will have a distinct bearing on improving our environment. We will play to our strengths of being in 200 plus countries and geographical areas around the world and take advantage of the connections our members have to the right people. We should use the power of our advocacy to elicit powerful support.

Rally Rotary first, your community next and your country thereafter. We would have become part of the solution. Paraphrasing a Chinese proverb we would have begun our journey of a thousand steps with that one single step.

Even organising this conference shows an understanding of the challenge ahead, a willingness to take that first step, and a passion to get others to follow.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS

BHUTAN - CARBON NEGATIVE, LEADERSHIP POSITIVE BY MR. TASHI JAMTSHO | COUNTRY

DIRECTOR OF WORLD WILDLIFE FUND BHUTAN OFFICE

Mr. Tashi Jamtsho is driven by inclusive conservation with focus on green approach and youth engagement. He was instrumental in establishing the Bhutan for Life Initiative the first project financing for forest protection program in Asia. Bhutan is a haven for environmental conservation. It is home to a vast number of flora and fauna. Even though it is one of the smallest countries in the world and has a small economy, it is a country with the biggest and truest commitment to environmental conservation. Bhutan had pledged to remain carbon neutral to eternity.

Bhutan had pledged to remain carbon neutral in times to come.

Mr. Jamtsho emphasised through his four-

chapter narration that humans should act as one as global actions and efforts have big impacts on environmental issues. In Bhutan, the biodiversity is slowly changing.

The wildlife are retreating, the water levels in rivers and below ground are receding and landslides and flash floods are happening more frequently. This might cause a loss in people living in tranquil harmony in centuries to come. Rural areas do not provide the job opportunity in which youths seek and hence they move to the urban areas.

Mr. Jamtsho has made it clear that we should inspire the youth to care for the environment, to use natural resources responsibly and live as one with nature.

We should protect the forest, sustain the rivers, maintain the threatened ecosystem and eventually adapt to the changing climate. He ended his keynote with a question:

"If there is a plant on the ground, will you choose to trample it or pick it up and nurture it with your hands?"

GLOBAL WARMING, BIODIVERSITY LOSS AND ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY IN SOUTH EAST ASIA



In his presentation, Dr Puttock focuses on the biodiversity loss challenges in Southeast Asia, since it is one of the most species rich places on Earth, coupled with the highest rate of loss of species. The main driver of biodiversity loss in Southeast Asia as well as in the rest of the world, are land-use alterations; forests and natural habitat being converted to monoculture plantations, as well as agricultural and urban expansions.

He continued that world citizens should be provided with the basic education and literacy about saving the earth. Only then can we combat climate change as one. The importance of water and sanitation, disease prevention and treatments are much needed and should be a subject for many to be aware of.

Even as normal citizens, we can help save the earth by just measuring our carbon footprint and rally everyone to do this consistently.





Dr. Puttock mentioned some shocking facts about the world. According to him, fossil fuels consist of 300 million years of stored sunlight and carbon. Humans are burning fossil fuels about 1 million times faster than they were created. 70% of the world's surface was used for agriculture, forests are removed and 15.3 billion trees are cut down each year. 92% of nature is declining from what we do with the land (habitat loss, ecosystem service disruptions, human destruction etc).

This will help bring awareness about the seriousness of climate change and hopefully urge more people to take action in changing their everyday habits for the better.

Dr. Puttock ended his keynote by saying that 'when we take care of nature and energy, climate will take care of itself.




REW & 4-WAY PATH





At the International Forum, Shah Redza talked about how there was no longer predictability in terms of weather. Previously, decades ago, indigenous people were able to track weather patterns but such tracking methods are impossible now. They are being cut off from aid and clean water with weather patterns change. The weather plays an important role in global climate. He shared that Sungai Perak is the biggest source of water for the state of Perak. It has 10 huge raw water sources. Thousands of km of water for agriculture irrigation. The river has such a huge significance and people forget the source of the water comes from the forest. Should there be no forest, the river will dry up.

"The forest is an asset that needs to be looked at beyond wildlife." Shah Redza continued. "It is a complex web; from spiders to ants to tigers, if you remove just one small thing from the ecosystem, everything falls apart."

His remarks were reiterated by Prof Gabriele Villarini and Dr Sarah Kariko on their presentations about weather patterns/flooding and biodiversity protection respectively.

Milla Bruneau took it further by reiterating on the importance of good leadership. It has to do with a lot of wise and smart women and men leading the city. The political will 'When there is












a will, there is a way' is a significant selling point in future and she was bullish about having moreyounger people to come to Lahti, Finland. There must be an overall strategy that is implemented onto everyone in the city - a collaborative action, that everybody has to be involved in. Of course, this idea is not fully realistic, as the idea is much simpler than the actual conduction of the act, this is why leadership and communication skills are very important.

Dr Rashed Mustafa Sarwar, highlighted the impact of climate change for communities and children in coastal and flood prone areas.

The Youth Plenary convened four youth leaders from Malaysia discussing marine environment, Orang Asli, financial systems and corporate balancing.

Fairul Izmal, a marine biologist who specializes in conducting environmental related studies; Suria Angit, an Assistant Professor at the University of Nottingham Malaysia who is part of an indigenous community; and Poh Chin Hui and Vishnuvarthan Muniandi both representing the corporate sectors - KPMG Management and Risk Consulting Sdn Bhd and PETRONAS respectively.

Fairul believed that the planet is very dependent on the health of our ocean. "If the ocean is not healthy, its capabilities to regulate the climate reduces". Ocean provides 50% of our global oxygen. He mentioned that we, as humans, must acknowledge the fact that the ocean and our land environment is all interlinked.

Suria examined the power dynamics between the mainstream societies and Orang Asli communities. Where climate change is concerned, Orang Asli would always be at the receiving end. In all fields related to Orang Asli, the policies are made by outsiders. Bigger corporations should make efforts to meet the Orang Asli as they aren't just subjects.

Poh shared about how the financial system is being prepared to support the low carbon emission system in Malaysia.

Vishnu opined that more ambitious targets are needed. As people become more understanding of the seriousness, then there will be more of a push from the youths since they will be the ones who are mainly affected. Another key factor is for companies is to find the balance between the bottom line and environmental sustainability.


