

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

hether it's the Battle of Agincourt or Six Nations rugby, fry-ups or croissants, a healthy Anglo-French rivalry has been ticking along for about a thousand years and counting. These days, the competition seems most apparent in what both sides choose to put in their mouths. "The French are the king of cuisine," boasts Quentin, my Paris-dwelling French friend over supper at L'Entente, Le British Brasserie (a clever reference to a certain Anglo-French treaty) in the second arrondissement. "They can be patronising towards other countries' food – especially Britain's."

Hasn't this always been the case, especially in Paris? Last year, ex-Harrods chef Calum Franklin – nicknamed London's 'Pie King' – brought his famously flaky pastry to Paris to open a highly anticipated new British brasserie, Public House. But when the lauded UK restaurant critic Jay Rayner called it a "calamitous" place of faux British references, garish decor and stale bread, a collective 'quelle surprise' was likely muttered by every Parisian in the city.

And yet, a quiet *révolution* stirs. One of the most reputable cafés in Paris, for instance, is run by two British women – Anna Trattles and (half-English, half-French) Alice Quillet. They started turning French appetites onto British cuisine 15 years ago, from the moment they opened their first venture: a restaurant in the 18th arrondissement called Le Bal Café. "We did kedgeree, rarebit, smoked herring," Alice says. "We've pushed the British agenda in everything we've done since."

This 'agenda' has reached a crescendo at their trendy Bastille neighbourhood bakery, café and

coffee roastery, Ten Belles. Here, English fry-ups, sausage rolls and scones with jam and butter (clotted cream is near impossible to get hold of in France, and tricky to make at scale) are served. The best thing about Ten Belles – according to off-hand comments from more than one chef lately – is the distinctly moreish sourdough bread, which is otherwise a rarity in a city dominated by the baguette and surprisingly popular among French customers. They sell 800 loaves per day. "We actually





started making sourdough for our sandwiches," Alice says.

Odes to the humble sandwich are a bit of a theme among British food spots in Paris. Well-travelled chef and ex-Londoner David John Kelly has a deli named Project Sausage just around the corner from Ten Belles, where British pork and pastry products reign supreme. Like Alice and Anna, David is confident he can challenge French classics such as le jambon-beurre.

"When you go to a French bakery, it's always the same four or five sandwiches," he says.
"But the British sandwich is far superior to the French sandwich." Could the French think so, too? According to David, they have a thing for his coronation chicken sarnie, in all its roast chicken, curry mayo and pickled raisins glory.

The increasingly common revelation is that British chefs can cook, after all – but the French stereotypes of soggy, beige British food live on. According to the Nation Brands Index, the French currently rank British food as among the lowest in the world. Is that really because animosity towards porridge, builders' tea and fish and chips is very much alive and kicking? "Really, they don't know what [British food] is," says Quentin. "Say 'Pimm's', and they'll think of the French biscuit."

the challenge PARIS

As British brasseries, cafés and bakeries increasingly spring up around Paris, it's likely that most Parisians' introduction to (good) British cuisine happens in a more coincidental way – like when the French chefs serve up British food at Very French Beans, a British-style deli near Montmartre, or the English chef Ollie Clarke inflects his French plates with British accents at his neighbourhood bistrot Quedubon. As food culture in London and Paris increasingly cross-pollinates, British ingredients, techniques and dishes are slyly finding their way into Parisian neighbourhoods and onto French menus. Parisian diners might be enjoying the UK's cuisine without even realising it.

Although my friend Quentin lived in England for a year, a lot of L'Entente's menu – such as the Beef Wellington and Welsh rarebit – is new to him. His verdict? "I might come back."

The fish is served with plenty of tartare sauce (as it should); the beef in the Wellington is tender under a flaky pastry; and the rarebit comes with an appropriate amount of cheese sauce (not a cheese puddle, like the French interpretation 'Le Welsh')." For a gooey flapjack: VERY FRENCH BEANS

"After they became hooked on fish and chips, haggis, bacon baps and salt and vinegar crisps while studying in the UK, French chefs Marine Pourtauborde and Marine Cacciaguerra opened this British-inspired deli in Batignolles. Named after their own take on English baked beans, this place riffs on English food customs. The pies are stuffed with aubergine and feta, while the flapjacks are cunningly embellished with nontraditional vanilla and almonds." Hugh's rating:



For an excellent pork pie: PROJECT SAUSAGE

"Expats and anglophiles flock to David John Kelly's one-man deli for sausage rolls, pork pies, sandwiches and Cornish pasties. Fair warning – the super-popular Scotch eggs are only sold on Saturdays, in a measure introduced to help David manage the demand. Seeking the full British experience? Order a pork pie with a jar of Colman's English Mustard on the side."







For French-English fusion: **QUEDUBON**

"Neighbourhood bistrot Quedubon may look quintessentially Parisian, but its chef is anything but. Having grown up in the British countryside, Ollie Clarke brings a touch of rural England to the 19th arrondissement with veal tongue pastrami and calf's brains poached in lemon caper sauce. Look to the menu's end for more obviously British dishes like bread pudding and rhubarb crumble, or the wine list. which will soon sport bottles from English vineyards." Hugh's rating:






For the best ham sandwich in Paris: TEN BELLES

"The sourdough bread at this café is so good it's tempted Parisians away from their beloved baguettes – and that's before you've even tasted their authentically British fry-ups, scones and sausage rolls. talo disco is Naples distilled into a beat. The relaxed, electronic style, known for its synthesisers, upbeat tempos and sometimescheesy vocal samples, fits right in with the laid-back yet energetic way of life that's unique to the southern Italian metropolis. Some people don't know, however, that the genre actually originated in northern Italy, in the late 1970s, quickly spreading across the country and then continental Europe. It hit its peak in 1980s West Germany, where the name Italo Disco was coined. Back in Italy, however, it was simply known as 'pop'. The style was inspired by the so-called 'Father of Disco', Italian producer Giorgio Moroder, and US composer Patrick Cowley (famous for his collaborations with 70s disco-soul singer Sylvester). But its first wave is best known for mid-80s holiday hits like Sabrina's Boys (Summertime Love), a fun, sunny track that still gets regular airtime on the radio today.

Over the past decade or so, Italo disco has had a huge resurgence, in Italy and beyond. Its euphoric sound and danceable rhythms are being newly appreciated by a youthful crowd, from techno



nightclubs in Berlin to day festivals in London and evenings on Milan's sundowner rooftops.

Nowhere has this revival taken hold more than in the hustle and bustle of Naples. The city was a magnet for Italo disco producers and songwriters in its 1980s heyday. Now, the southern city is home to a new crowd of collectors, DJs, producers, label bosses and record shop owners. These music obsessives are dedicating their time to unearthing classic Italo, as it's sometimes called, while also creating fresh throwbacks of their own.

New tracks that blend upbeat, synthesised Italo disco sounds are being released by the Naples-based Soul Express and Napoli Segreta collectives, and by indie labels like Periodica and Biloba. Pioneering artists and DJs here, like Gigi Testa, Curcio, Karlove and Daniel Monaco, blend Italo with Neapolitan funk and boogie, creating a modern version of the sun-soaked sound. Head to a Naples club night at Basic, REC or Lento Hi-Fi Bar to see them behind the decks, probably under a huge disco ball. And while you're there, keep an eye out for some of the scene's big players...









Raffaele Arcella is one of the best-known artists in the new Neapolitan Italo disco scene. He's a co-founder of the Naples-based, indie record label Periodica, and its associated West Hill Studio (both also run by Dario di Pace, who records disco under the name Mystic Jungle and runs the Futuribile record store; and Enrico Fierro, who makes future-funk tracks as Milord). Raffaele is also behind the vinyl-only label Biloba, and pumps out a huge number of his own bangers, both solo and collectively, under several different names. If you see Whodamanny, Somachrome, I Coccodrilli, Mystic Jungle Tribe, Danger Boys, Afrodesia or Nico Mecca on a festival poster, they're all Raffaele.

He began working with Periodica's other cofounders around 2010, while cataloguing records for Futuribile. There, they all discovered a shared passion for early Italo disco and Neapolitan funk. Releasing its first vinyl 12-inch in 2016, Periodica is now a full-service labour of love.

Allowing your creativity time to blossom is everything. Even with Whodamanny, his main project, Raffaele spends more time "on the couch, thinking and speaking about the music" than actually writing it. "A record is something that happens first in our minds," he says. "It's more of a dream, an idea. We create, mix, master, we do our own [vinyl] cuts. Even the fonts are custom. It's an in-house story, a work of true passion." periodicarecords.bandcamp.com

Nicknamed the 'Palm Springs of Portugal', Faro is home to around 500 examples of South Modern architecture. As the city celebrates its Modernist Weekend festival in November, we speak to the people preserving it for future generations to admire

If you're strolling around Faro, don't forget to look up. You'll see abstractpatterned tiles, offering modern takes on historic Portuguese decorative tradition. Latticed exterior façades filter strong sunlight, while letting in a cooling breeze – echoing Arabic mashrabiya screens, or Brazilian cobogós. Bold primary colours and softer pastels zing in the Algarve light, and slender columns prop up raised living spaces, inspired by the functional, minimalist designs from legendary modern architects like Swissborn Le Corbusier and the USA's Frank Lloyd Wright.

In the 1960s and 70s, youth culture in London, Paris and New York meant music, cinema and

But in Portugal's Algarve, that era's drive for creativity was channelled into architecture. The key pioneer of Faro's distinctive style, dubbed South Modern, was Portuguese architect Manuel Gomes da Costa, who designed around 300 public and private buildings in Faro. His work took the Modernist principles of natural light, modern materials and geometric forms and gave them an Algarvian twist, taking style inspiration from Portugal's former colony, Brazil.

In nearby Portimão, fellow local architect
Antonio Vicente Castro designed some 120
buildings now classed as South Modern, while
Gomes da Costa's counterpart Joel Santana –
better known for his modernist churches in Lisbon
– carried out the 1970s transformation of a former
shipping company office on Faro's Rua Francisco
Gomes. Striking for its grey, straight-lined façade
with red geometric tiles featuring circles and
squares, the building has become a modern
homage to the lesser-known architectural style.

In 2021, the building was restyled into a chic apart-hotel called The Modernist by the trio of women that head up Faro's influential PAr 'architecture platform'. Founded by Joana Carmo Simões and Susana dos Santos Rodrigues in 2006, they were joined by Vânia Brito Fernandes in 2009 to create a Three Musketeers-style team.

"We live by the spirit of 'all for one, one for all'," says Vânia. "The three of us are always involved in

every project." Joana adds: "Three heads are better than one. Plus, it's more fun."

Their redesign of The Modernist's building was carried out for French couple Christophe and Angelique de Oliveira. After working in real estate and hospitality in Paris, they decided to pursue a different way of life elsewhere, and landed on Faro as a sunny, welcoming and well-connected city surrounded by beautiful nature.

They chanced upon the abandoned building, which has since become the place to stay for savvy, cultured travellers – plus the main venue for Faro's annual Modernist Weekend (7-9 November). It's a growing festival dedicated to celebrating and learning about the South Modern movement.

A patient five-year transformation by PAr saw each of The Modernist's six apartment-style rooms bathed in

light from enlarged windows, plus the addition of patios and a rooftop terrace with panoramic views to the Ria Formosa Natural Park. In keeping with South Modern's commitment to showcasing local connections, interior details feature wood craft and fabrics sourced from within 96km of Faro. "We combined the Modernist memories embedded in the building with local materials, to intensify the building's original identity," says Susana.

For owner Christophe, The Modernist is part of a wider ambition. "Our goal was to make Faro a

source of inspiration across Europe," he says. "But everyone coming to Faro today still has this underthe-radar architecture experience."

If you're hunting down South Modern icons in Faro, The Modernist is just the beginning. Vânia points to Casa Gago (Rua Humberto Delgado 17) as one of Faro's most emblematic creations. She describes the house built by Gomes da Costa for a wealthy Venezualan client as "a distinctly Modernist project with Latin American influences, but also strong regional awareness." Think cubelike living spaces, encased in latticed screen façades, lifted high on slender concrete columns.

If there's one street that sums up the South Modern style, it's Rua de Berlim. Arcing around the Mata do Liceu park, many of the street's chic villas were built by Gomes da Costa during a prolific decade between 1959 and 1969. Originally, the villas were intended to sport Modernist flat roofs, but objections from city planners prompted Gomes da Costa to come up with wonderfully asymmetric, slanted roofs. Check out the beauties at Rua de Berlim 13, 15, 37 and 57, and you'll understand why the South Modern style's unofficial cheerleaders – PAr and its clients – are so keen to preserve its heritage.

"We want to spread awareness about South Modern architecture," says Christophe, "not just for its quality and creativity, but also to save buildings from demolition, and develop conservation campaigns." parplataformadearquitectura.pt; themodernist.pt



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Natural wellness in Larnaca

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Romania's complex history, dramatic landscape and supernatural stories inspired the character of Count Dracula, who's back on cinema screens with the celebrated *Nosferatu* remake and this year's release of *Dracula: A Love Tale*. We travel to Transylvania to discover how the vampire and other folkloric figures came about

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




is the highlight of their eight-day 'Halloween in Romania' trip, which starts in Bucharest and takes in Transylvania's most atmospheric sites, including the rural village of Viscri, medieval Sighișoara and the haunted Hoia-Baciu Forest near Cluj-Napoca.

Pulling up at the base of Bran Castle, it's easy to see why Stoker was so moved by it. If you were to conjure an image of a 'haunted castle' in your mind's eye, this wouldn't be far off: an imposing cluster of weathered towers rising out of a craggy limestone cliff and framed by the Southern Carpathians, covered in ominously dense forest.

But it wasn't just the location that fed into Stoker's story – it was also one of the castle's former residents. Vlad the Impaler (who became known as Dracula after his father, Vlad Dracul) was a 15th-century Wallachian ruler who some believe spent a short spell at Bran Castle on his way to Târgovişte, the capital of his kingdom.

A complex figure in Romanian culture, who's sometimes considered a hero for defending the country from foreign invaders, he became infamous for the cruel tactics he used against his enemies – mainly the Ottomans – including impaling them on thick wooden spikes. Sound familiar?

"Stoker never actually visited Transylvania. Supposedly, he was friends with well-travelled

Hungarian writer Vámbéry Ármin, who told him stories about Eastern European history and superstitions," says senior tour guide Matei-Simion Petrisor as we wander inside. Vámbéry is even mentioned by the character Van Helsing in the novel, giving weight to such a theory. These accounts, along with books he discovered in the British Museum Library, influenced Stoker's most famous work.

n ominous murder of crows flanks our car as we drive along the main road towards Bran Castle. As though we're in a cheesy horror movie, they follow us for a minute before peeling

off and soaring across an adjacent field. We forge ahead, passing a small cemetery filled with neat rows of cracked stone crosses and tombstones part-hidden by overgrown foliage. I half expect to

hear the clichéd howling of wolves in the distance, but thankfully the only sound is the crackle of Romanian music over the car radio.

A spooky spectacle is rather fitting. We're on our way with responsible tour company Intrepid Travel to the very castle thought to have inspired Bram Stoker's *Dracula*, a late 19th-century Gothic horror novel about a bloodthirsty vampire. This visit



This fact doesn't seem to matter to the Dracula fans here. A steady stream of visitors flows through the castle's rooms, fed by an everreforming queue outside. Bran sees some 5,000 visitors each day during peak season – a number that's likely to increase given the current cultural renaissance of vampire stories, led by the release of *Nosferatu* earlier this year and *Dracula: A Love Tale* hitting cinema screens this summer. But why do tourists travel from all over the world to see somewhere so loosely connected with this fictional character?

"People love a story – good or bad, real or made up," Matei-Simion explains. "That's why they visit Neuschwanstein Castle in Germany, Hobbiton in New Zealand, and this castle rather than one of the other 181 in the country."

Romania is the right place to come for stories, especially those of a supernatural bent. Folkloric tales about witches, werewolves, vampire-like creatures and other demons are extremely common throughout the country and have been for centuries, devised to give reason to natural phenomena or things beyond explanation at the time. Everyone knows about the *strigoi*, for example: troubled spirits that rise from the grave at night and drain vitality from their victims, even causing illness or death.

A variety of rituals can be performed to prevent someone from becoming a strigoi, such as burning and staking the corpse. These creatures were first chronicled in Romania around the 17th century and likely influenced Dracula and other vampiric tropes.


Another folkloric figure that has made its way into the mainstream is the werewolf. While

modern interpretations are quite consistent, Romania's part-wolf, part-human beasts have appeared in many forms. Some are born as werewolves, others are made; some are humans that shapeshift into wolves, others are always wolf-like in appearance;









some harness the devil's power for evil, others try to stop themselves from doing harm. This proliferation of wolf-related legends probably stems from the fact that Romania has the largest grey wolf population in Europe, with estimates ranging from about 2,300 to over 3,000. Most reside in the Central Carpathian Mountains around here.

One tale that comes up time and again during our tour is that of the *iele*. Around since the 18th century at least, these are groups of beautiful wood nymphs-cumsirens that live in forests and are often found dancing ritualistically in clearings. "If you see them, you're either going to be lucky all your life or have something terrible happen the next day," says Andra Oprescu, tour guide and native of Brasov, near Bran

nymphs or sirens. They often appear in forests and men who see them go mad or perish the next day.

Sântoaderis Centaurs who can move objects by magic, said to appear during Sântoader Week. Tradition dictates all domestic work has to be completed by then to avoid gruesome punishment.

Solomonari: Sorcerers who can control storms and command dragons.

Strigoi: A type of Romanian vampire that sucks its victims' lifeforce rather than their blood.

Varcolaci: Humans who can shapeshift into wolves or other monsters. One of several types of werewolf in Romania.

Vrafitoare: Romanian witches who practice magic, curses and healing spells. Many people still consult them today, especially in rural areas.

Castle. Although most stories focus on men being affected, a chill still runs down my spine as I hear about the iele and I make a mental note to keep away from any blustery-looking woods.

Still, not all these mystical creatures are considered scary. Giants (known by many names, including *jidovi*), for example, are often described as kind and patient. Once the rulers of the world, they passed it onto tiny folk known as 'humans' and have great respect for us, even helping out with everyday tasks such as picking cherries or repairing roofs. Some believe they are beings of the past, while others claim there are giants still living in deep caves in the mountains.

Witches, too, are historically good. While they may have been demonised during past



religious persecution – and some will cast curses when necessary – they are generally respected herbalists and healers. "Even today, many rural Romanian villages have a resident healer, usually an older lady," adds Andra.

Braşov – a historically multicultural city that, in addition to Romanian, has Hungarian and German (Transylvanian Saxon) communities – is the ideal place to hear these stories. "They all brought their own religions – Orthodox, Catholic and Protestant – as well as their own folklore based on the traditions, experiences, fears and preconceptions of their ancestors," says Andra.

It's a true microcosm of the whole country. Throughout its history, Romania – or the former principalities of Wallachia, Moldavia, and Transylvania – has always been a 'buffer zone' between empires due to its geographical position. It was conquered by the Romans before being invaded by Goths, Huns and Slavs. Braşov was initially under Hungarian rule and

later incorporated into the Habsburg Monarchy, and for centuries stood on the frontier between Christian Europe and the Ottoman Empire.

Add to that a large population of Romani people, whose ancestors migrated from India around the 9th-12th centuries, and you can see exactly why modern-day Romania is so abundant with folkloric tales and

mythological beings.

"The supernatural is part of our daily lives," Andra says. That's not to say that everyone in Romania is conjuring spells or wandering round with wooden stakes in their pockets but, in the same way you might throw spilled salt over your left shoulder, it's so ingrained that it manifests in practices that people most likely don't think twice about.

Children are often given a red bracelet to protect against the evil eye, mirrors are covered after someone dies so their soul doesn't return as a strigoi, and morning news programmes include daily horoscopes alongside their weather and traffic reports.

Still, such practices tend to extend further here than it does in many countries. "In 1989, we had the Communist revolution. Ceauşescu and his wife were shot on Christmas Day, and what did

some people do right away? They went to his mansion and put garlic cloves on the door, so that his spirit wouldn't come back as a strigoi," says our guide.


The final stop on Intrepid Travel's tour is the city of Cluj-Napoca, the 'heart' of Transylvania. We're here to explore Hoia-Baciu Forest, which became world-famous for paranormal activity after an alleged UFO was photographed hovering above it back in 1968. Since then, it has become associated with ghosts and spirits too, with people travelling from all over the world in search of interaction with 'the other world'. If we're going to run into the iele anywhere, it's here.

Leading us to our potential doom is Alex Surducan, who runs regular guided walks through Hoia-Baciu (often at night) that culminate in a visit to Poiana Rotundă, a circular clearing where, mysteriously, nothing grows. As we venture deeper into the woodland, past gnarled trees at crooked angles, silence falls and the city's familiar hum fades away. In the stillness, even the smallest sound – a snapped twig, a bird's call – carries with startling clarity.

Alex tells us local legends, shows spectral photos from previous tours, and recounts some of his own experiences, always careful to give empirical explanations alongside the superstitious ones. The bloodcurdling screams of the iele, for example, could be attributed to common foxes; the high-pitched cries of a scared child are more

likely groups of trees, which grow uncommonly close together here, rubbing together in the wind.

It strikes me how much nature, not just history and religion, has influenced Romania's folk tales. It makes sense, given that 87% of the country's territory is classified as rural and, even now, some 46% of the population still live in the countryside, compared to around 25% in Hungary



or 15.6% in the UK, for instance. A large portion of the landscape is covered in dense forests and dramatic mountains, ideal places for magical spirits or noisy animals to hide.

Just then, our Intrepid guide, Raluca Kocsis,

lets out a gasp. I rush over, thinking she may have encountered a wolf or a group of forest spirits skipping through the trees. "Don't worry, it's just a beetle. They're very common," she laughs. It's just as well, I think - I'd probably have missed my flight home if the iele had been disturbed by our presence. It would've made a pretty good story, though. intrepidtravel.com



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
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

In literary circles, romance novels have generally been undervalued - despite being enduringly popular. But now, a London bookshop and a host of literary experiences are giving the genre the love it deserves

arah Maxwell expected someone to beat her to it. When she dreamed up the idea of a romance-only bookshop in London, the idea was so obvious, she thought, that someone else would create it before she did.

Fortunately, like a lot of obvious ideas, no one else had put their money where their mouth was. In June this year, Sarah – 'Saucy' to her family – opened Saucy Books, the first romance-only bookshop in the UK. She had long struggled to find her favourite genre in the bookshops of London, and guessed that if she was feeling that way, other people would be too. She was right. The bookshop, in the heart of Notting Hill – a fitting spot for romance fans – is full of excited readers united in their love for these romantic



books, browsing Sarah's highly curated shelves with gusto.

Saucy Books is surfing the crest of a romantic literary wave that can arguably be traced back to the stratospheric success of E.L. James' *Fifty Shades of Grey* in 2011. Consumer intelligence company Nielsen IQ recently reported that the genre of 'romance and sagas' had surged to £69 million in sales in 2024, compared with £62 million in 2023 – and the numbers have been growing year-on-year for the past decade. Romance has always been popular, but it's now more sought-after than ever. During a time when print can struggle to sell, romance is helping to get more books into readers' hands. In other words, love is finally getting the love it deserves.

"Romance readers are keeping the industry afloat," says Daisy Buchanan, author of *Read Yourself Happy* as well as the funny novel *Insatiable*. "They deserve a bookshop and they deserve to have the books they love taken seriously." Saucy Books demonstrates just how successfully the genre has skyrocketed into the mainstream. The rise of e-readers was initially credited for allowing people to read steamy, romantic books like *Fifty Shades* out in public or on their commute. But the launch of a bricks-andmortar store dedicated to romance makes the idea that anyone would be embarrassed to read such novels seem wholly outdated.

Social media has played a big role in the rise of romance. 'BookTok' – a way of gathering together book enthusiasts on TikTok – has helped the 'romantasy' genre enormously, with fans evangelising about specific authors and finding a community online. Sarah notes that a trilogy of books by Elodie Harper called *The Wolf Den* is very popular in the shop. Though the first in the series came out in 2021, one of the benefits of a platform like TikTok is that it can catapult cult titles into the zeitgeist.

Will this bubble burst, or will romance novels continue to thrive? "I think people will take [the

genre] more seriously," says Sarah. "It's been around forever. Nothing about this is new – it's just the way it gets re-marketed over and over again."

Romance on tour

Another thing social media has brought to people's attention is the growth of literary tourism – which is booming. "I probably had about 500 people on my newsletter a year ago," says Paul Wright. "It's well over 2,000 now." Paul runs a travelling book club called Books in Places, which takes keen readers to the destinations of specific novels, where they discuss the book in question while having a holiday together. Think *Girl with a Pearl Earring* in Delft, Netherlands.

Hotels are getting in on the action, too, and the UK's historic cities aren't short of establishments with deep literary roots. The boutique Henry's Townhouse in London's Marylebone is named after Jane Austen's brother, who once lived here and Bloomsbury's The Memoir Club taps into the literary connections of its surroundings. Named after the collection of intellectuals who called themselves the Bloomsbury Group in the 1920s, the décor includes Virginia Woolf-inspired motifs and each room (of one's own...) includes books and spaces to write.





Book pilgrimages abroad are also becoming increasingly bespoke and elaborate, with Future Market Insights reporting that the market size of global literary tourism was £1.77 million in 2024 and will have grown to £2.45 million by 2034. Companies like Author Fan Travel take guests abroad with authors like Dan Jones, and phenomena like the *Gone Girl* cruise give customers the chance to spend eight days on the same ship as author Gillian Flynn.

Readers will often travel extraordinary distances to destinations inspired by a book. "Books make our world so much bigger," says Daisy. "It makes total sense that books are going to make us want to go and see the world."

Hayley Solano realised that starting a travelling book club was a viable idea after she witnessed how hungry the members of her online group were to graduate from virtual tours of literary locations to the real thing. Since 2023, her Enchanted Book Club has taken guests on various literary trips, including an 'England Tour' comprising excursions to Jane Austen's home, Shakespeare's Stratford-upon-Avon and Chatsworth House, where the 2005 film *Pride and Prejudice* was filmed.

One of Hayley's tours includes a trip to Oxford, a city that's so seductive you can barely move for a tour group. "The first time I went to Oxford I just thought, 'I'm literally in Hogwarts'," says Hayley, who lives in California. Her guests explore the various haunts of J.R.R. Tolkien and C.S. Lewis – both authors synonymous with the city. They see places like University Church, where Lewis preached; Magdalen College, of which Lewis was a fellow; and Pembroke College, where Tolkien was a professor.

Why are these trips so popular now? Paul and Hayley think that the pandemic was hugely important in an attitude shift around travel. "Before Covid," says Paul, "people would have the attitude of 'I'll go to Florence one day – it's fine, I can go see it any time.' Covid suddenly made people think, 'Actually, maybe I need to go now otherwise I might miss out."

Similarly, Hayley points to a wider acceptance of the importance of self-care in a society that feels increasingly pessimistic. "A lot of women I meet have the attitude of 'If not now, when?" she says. She talks about how transformative these trips can be for the people who take them, who are mostly female. "We're walking past a building

in Oxford and the tour guide says, 'You know, Alice from *Alice in Wonderland* was a real little girl, and she lived in that house right there.' How are you supposed to go home and be the same person after that kind of information?"

Another university city known for its literary heavyweights is Cambridge, which is also experiencing a surge in tours. "I've gone from doing maybe one a year, to three or four a month." savs Mary Forster-Lewis of Cambridge Tour Guides. One of her two-hour tours takes in alumni like William Wordsworth. Ted Hughes and Virginia Woolf, and shows visitors where they studied and drank. Mary has definitely seen a rise in young people booking her tours, who are reading more English literature - particularly Chinese and American students. "They love it because they think it gives them a window into our past life, into our past history, and what it used to be like."

Readers often project themselves onto the character of a romance novel, or hope to fall in love on a week-long trip to a picturesque city – and these whims are catered to onscreen, too. This summer, Netflix released My Oxford Year, which shows a





Celebrate the Austens at Henry's Townhouse

This year marks the 250th anniversary of Jane Austen's birth, and from Bath to Oxford, Austen fever is spreading across the UK like wildfire. Her favourite brother, Henry, lived at this address in the 18th century, which has now been converted into a small boutique hotel that brings the Regency era back to life through period artworks and furnishings. Each of just six bedrooms is dedicated to a different member of the Austen family, and the reception room is named after the First Lady of English literature herself. Velvet furnishings and bright Georgian windows make Jane's Reading Room the beating heart of this special find. henrystownhouse.co.uk

young American woman who adores Victorian poetry and decides to visit the beautiful city of Oxford - where she falls in love with a hot English Literature postgrad who can quote reams of Victorian poetry. Tick, tick, tick.

"There is definitely a sense, post-Saltburn, of people coming to Oxford with a romantic view of its literary history," says Ellie Peng, who works in an Oxford bookshop-café called Gulp Fiction. The shop's section of novels set in Oxford sells particularly well, she says. Saucy Books also has a 'Made for TV' section, which includes David Nicholls' One Day and Rivals by Jilly Cooper.

Romance writing and literary tourism have been around for a long time. But now, they are catering to an expanding cohort of people that want to publicly celebrate their passion for the genre. "People love love," says Hayley. "People love love stories. People love happy endings."

Twenty-six versions of the same single malt whisky are hidden in mountain lodges along a stunning hiking trail in Switzerland's Alpstein massif. We made it our mission to track some down




he adventure starts with a glass of whisky. As I sit at the bar, watching the tumbler fill with golden single malt, the barrel catches my eye. It's no regular keg, but an old beer cask, its oak textures and steel hoops glowing in the late-afternoon sun.

Although this could be Scotland, the spiritual home of single malt whisky, we're actually hidden away within the Alpstein – a spectacular limestone massif in the Appenzell Alps, an area more commonly known for pastoral Swiss traditions like dairy farming and yodeling, than whisky drinking. Yet here I am savouring an extraordinarily highspirited adventure: the highest-altitude whisky trek in the world.

This area of northeastern Switzerland, hugging Lake Constance on the border with Germany and Austria, hasn't always been known for distilling. But in recent years, in the picturesque canton of Appenzell Innerrhoden, whisky is on everyone's lips.

The reason for this is Brauerei Locher AG, a brewery and distillery in the town of Appenzell. It used a bounty of Alpine ingredients to formulate Säntis Malt, its award-winning single malt whisky. Nearby, soft spring water gushes from the mountains, barley flourishes in the peaty highlands and Alpine wood is




used for a light smoke. All this terrain is reflected in each glass. Not much can be better than nursing a dram after a day's hiking, and this is the idea behind the Appenzell Whisky Trek: a 26-stop itinerary around the Alpstein's mountain inns, created by Brauerei Locher AG in partnership with each innkeeper. The idea is that each guesthouse contains its own exclusive barrel of cask-aged whisky for tastings.

The tour launched in 2015 and now, a decade later, has matured into something that continues to attract

connoisseurs from far and wide. Initially, some casks were pulled by horse-drawn cart into the mountains. Others were shoulder-lifted by barrel-chested innkeepers. One, at the vertiginous 2,124m Rotsteinpass, is accessible only by steel cables and staircases carved directly into the rocky cliffs.

I start my two-day version of the trek at the Brauerei Locher AG distillery, where pot stills can be seen alongside rows of oak casks. Stacked three high by six wide, all are more than a century old and stamped with the mark of the distiller. Here, the single malt has rich notes of vanilla, toffee and tobacco.


One of the many pleasures of the Alpstein, I'm told, is the variety of different whiskies at each mountain inn. Each barrel contains the same basic distillate, but every cask is unique – made from a variety of American, Portuguese, French and Russian oaks. Some were previously filled with port, sherry, rum, bourbon or dessert wine.

Each of the barrels gives the whisky a different flavour profile and unpredictable colour. Shades range from white gold through caramel to burnished copper.

One dram down, I set out from the distillery to the village of Brülisau, taking the cable car to the 1,791m summit of Hoher Kasten. Down an exposed path, I follow the trail along a limestone ridge – a natural perimeter between the Alpstein and Rhine lands, separating Switzerland from neighbouring Liechtenstein and Austria's mountainous Vorarlberg state. The air is scented with pine and moss, my boots kicking up the mulchy scent of wet leaves. Past valleys and summit-reflecting mountain lakes, the joy of walking here lies in soaking up the rippling views that stretch to Lake Constance and the German city of Friedrichshafen, some 40km to the north.

A few hours of hiking later, Lake Constance retreats behind me, and I arrive at Berggasthaus





Staubern, my first mountain guesthouse, for a whisky with owners Daniel and Judith Lüchinger. The spirit, described to me as 'woody and the ideal winter warmer' because of its larch cask finish, is exquisite. The accommodation here teeters on the knife-edge ridge at 1,800m altitude, and rather than the bare-bones refuges of the past, the rooms are cosy and comfy. The family is taking full advantage of the popularity of whisky trekking by adding a guesthouse extension above the barren rock face. During my visit, a helicopter shuttles construction materials throughout the day from the valley far below.

By the evening I've trekked to the Berggasthaus Plattenbödeli, another mountain guesthouse, arriving just before the sky reveals a bright scatter of stars. Overlooking the bluegreen Sämtisersee lake below the limestone spires of Saxer Lücke, the timbered guesthouse is a dreamlike, flowerbox-festooned chalet straight out of *Heidi*. Besides the whisky, it's huts like these that drive folk this deep into the mountains – as well as the hospitality of the local Appenzellers, who are known in Switzerland for their strong cultural traditions. Their folk costume consists of an apple-red waistcoat,

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breeches and a hooped earring to rival a pirate's.

The lodge's co-owner Alois Inauen and his wife. Manuela Sager, bring out heaped plates of potato rösti and pungent Appenzeller cheese. as hikers drain glasses of beer and whisky. "When the trail launched, we'd have scores of people coming. Its popularity took everyone by surprise," says Alois. "Now it has quietened down, and we only receive a handful of whisky trekkers each week." A more manageable number, perhaps, which makes the experience all the more pleasant - and attracts a special breed of whisky-loving walker. "Each is a pilgrim, in their own way," smiles Alois.

Dawn brings a whisky-coloured sunrise, the light streaking across the mountains in an explosion of amber and gold. Ahead is my last day as a whisky pilgrim, too, with a stop

at the Berggasthaus Ruhesitz – a guesthouse that has the natural advantage of being built below the Hoher Kasten, the mountain that I'd begun this walk from at the start of my hike.

Once there, I sip one final dram from the terrace beneath a tiny, timbered barn - the purpose-built whisky storehouse.

When the waitress asks me to assess the drink - "This one is extra sweet and rich because of the rum cask finish," she says - I can't help but smile. Yes, there are notes of raisin, cinnamon and cardamom, but also something more overpowering. It's the blast of fresh Alpine air and chest-puffing view of wrinkled mountains. Hikers don't get these moments often, but here, it feels like a given.

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






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Anyone wanting to venture beyond the typical Mediterranean resort spa experience should look up the Ömerye Hamam in Nicosia. This historic site, which has operated as a bathhouse since the island's Ottoman conquest in 1570, offers a unique detox ritual that has remained relatively unchanged for centuries. In its communal steam room with hot and cold taps, you'll cleanse vour body with natural soap and a loofah to help open the pores, stimulate circulation and eliminate toxins, before choosing between an array of mud masks and natural scrubs. At the Golden Donkeys Farm in Skarinou, surrounded by ancient olive groves, co-owner Stella Georgiadou's home-made beauty products are created with the farm's star ingredient: donkey milk. This ingredient has been prized for centuries – even Cleopatra bathed in it to preserve her beauty. It's naturally rich in lactic acid, a gentle alpha hydroxy acid that helps remove dead skin cells, and is deeply hydrating. Its main draw is the high levels of lysozyme, an anti-microbial and anti-inflammatory enzyme. Indulge in a hydrated face serum, donkey-milk ice cream and a liqueur with echoes of Baileys. goldendonkeys.com

Grassroots

At Aperanti Agrotourism, a charming B&B tucked into the picturesque village of Pera Orinis, winding cobblestone lanes weave past traditional homes and *kafeneions* (community meeting spaces and cafés). Visitors take seasonal foraging walks along the nearby river to collect plants, flowers and roots, before returning to the B&B's kitchen to learn about the medicinal properties of their findings and how to transform them into a delicious meal. Beyond foraging, there's olive harvesting, halloumi making and the spectacular trekking trails on the forested Machairas mountains, rich with endemic flora and breathtaking views.

With just four guest rooms arranged around a peaceful central courtyard, life here moves slowly. A highlight of the stay is the daily breakfast of homegrown and homemade organic delights: jam made from fragrant kaisi apricots, fresh anari cheese, fruit platters of prickly pear and figs and home-baked pies filled with their own olives. aperantiagrotourism.com




Weaving wellbeing

A 10-minute drive from Skarinou, past the ancient Neolithic settlement of Choirokoitia, lies a world where time slows down. Here, Petros Nikolaou has been weaving magic with baskets since his grandparents initiated him into the craft at the tender age of 12. To visit his museum is to enter a cultural haven surrounded by flowers and birdsong.

"For me, it's relaxing, not a business," he says, his hands twining the softened cane bamboo into a spiral shape. His baskets - which he lovingly calls his "babies" - can take days to make, but he refuses to compromise his art for the mass-produced souvenir market, preferring instead to invite curious visitors to connect with tradition through hands-on workshops and live demonstrations. It's a surprisingly meditative activity, focusing the mind on small, rhythmic gestures, to the sounds of only a nearby tinkling fountain and the soothing buzz of cicadas. agrotourism.com.cy





The essentials

At the sprawling Lumina Botanical Gardens in Kornos - around a 30-minute drive from both Larnaca and Nicosia - endless rows of neatly manicured shrubs in shades of pale lavender and vibrant green sit beneath the surrounding mountains, and the air is fragrant with the aroma of healing herbs.

Owner Barbara Michael's deeprooted passion for plant medicine led her to study herbology, and what began with a single patch of spearmint has blossomed into a thriving sanctuary of over 25 carefully chosen herbs, selected for its

on-site distillery where the essence of these herbs is bottled. Essential oils become the foundation for a diverse range of products in an accompanying shop, alongside loose-leaf tea blends, seasonings and refreshing mists. There are tinctures for cholesterol, heart health, hair and scalp - even tinnitus. Beyond browsing the store and wandering the grounds, Lumina offers

immersive experiences throughout the year. You can practice

The Mediterranean Sea makes a perfect contrast to mountain paths. Put your core strength to the test with yogi Caroline Schutte-Goby and freediver Rebecca Zeeb – two expats who connected on Instagram and combined their love of wellness and the sea to create Thalassa Yoga. They host a variety of stand-up paddleboard yoga experiences at scenic beaches around Larnaca and Limassol: sunrise sessions, moonlight flows, even classes incorporating underwater photography.

"Often in a yoga class, the instructor encourages you to be present," says Caroline. "When I am on a SUP board and doing yoga, 99% of my thoughts are focused on staying on the board. I'm not thinking about my dishwasher that needs to be unloaded. The very nature of this activity means you are giving your body your undivided attention."

It also shows that searching for wellness isn't something that should always come easy. "SUP yoga gives you hands-on lessons in patience, resilience and humility," Caroline confides. "I wish I had a nickel for every time SUP yoga has humbled this yoga teacher!" While the class is a challenge, nothing restores balance to body and mind quite like lying on the paddleboard in shavasana pose, cradled by the gentle rise and fall of the sea. **thalassayogacy.com**







Mythical mud

Greek mythology beckons at the Adonis Baths near Paphos, where lovers Adonis and Aphrodite are said to have met and bathed together under the trickling falls. Today, clear blue pools of water and mythological statues flank the forested beauty spot. But the real draw is the mud therapy, where mineral-laden, detoxifying natural mud is applied to the body – the perfect counterpart to a refreshing swim in the falls.

Further inland into the Troodos Mountains, fertile hiking trails wind to more waterfalls, and the ancient spa village of Kalopanayiotis, which sits among sulphur-rich spring waters, celebrated for their curative properties for centuries. These waters form the foundation of treatments for many nearby spas. A wellness retreat at Casale Panayiotis offers bathing rituals promising to soften the skin, relieve swelling and joint pain and fight disease. casalepanayiotis.com



Beauty sleep

For the creatively inclined, The Agora Hotel in Lefkara, 30 minutes from Larnaca, is the ideal launchpad into Cypriot wellness. Tucked among this traditional lace-making village's narrow, sun-dappled streets and with a soothing, Scandi-style interior, the hotel generates an immediate sense of calm. While respecting of Cyprus's cultural roots - think traditional hand-stitched lace on linencovered tissue boxes and pottery workshops to connect with local craft - it's effortlessly modern in its approach to wellness. The spa menu goes well beyond the typical, offering treatments like Reiki and reflexology that feel genuinely restorative, not just indulgent, and those brave enough to wear lycra in 30°C heat can take one of their custom-designed, carbon road bikes out for a spin. From weekly yoga to Sunday hikes, the adults-only Agora offers wellness that's deeply rooted within the surrounding landscape, theagorahotel.com





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


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

Warsaw

Opened two years ago, the new Barceló hotel in the Polish capital is a modern addition in keeping with the hipster Powiśle district it calls home. Built in the former Elektrownia Powiśle power station, the building's industrial past reveals itself in design features throughout its communal areas and 151 rooms – think pipes, control units and exposed brick.

Upstairs, bedrooms have floor-to-ceiling windows offering views of the Vistula River and the cultural, pedestrian-friendly area surrounding the Copernicus Science Centre (which is also where you'll find the nearest metro stop, just 50m away).

Head to the top floor for the trendy four-star's secret weapon: a rooftop pool, beside the B-Heaven rooftop bar where comfy lounge seating sets the scene for Polish and Asian-influenced plates, with barista coffees and cocktails.

Back downstairs there are conference spaces for events to impress a trendy crowd – and when it's time to venture outdoors, the beach clubs, barge bars and street food trucks of Warsaw's coolest area, the riverside Wisła district, is mere steps away.



Leven

Manchester

The living is easy at this design-led boutique near Manchester's vibey Canal Street. Studio rooms are a home from home, with kitchenettes, living areas, spacious bathrooms and wraparound windows framing the street scene below. The friendly lobby doubles as a swish cocktail bar – order the Rhubarb Sour – while bottomless brunch takes over the attached restaurant Maya, with banging tunes travelling from the decks to the canalside while you tuck into seared rare steak or fresh-veg risotto.

Cologne

This sleek, modern stay right in the heart of the city has a central location that makes exploring Cologne's main sights – like the cathedral and the Rhine – a breeze. Rooms are clean, contemporary and surprisingly peaceful given the buzz outside, but the in-house restaurant is a real highlight, serving up beautifully cooked dishes, including a standout trout with herby mashed potatoes. It's a stylish yet practical base for a weekend in Cologne, combining comfort, convenience and a touch of culinary flair.

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


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

Wizz Air expands network with new routes from three new European bases

Wizz Air is launching a huge number of new flights as they expand operations in Europe and beyond, in part thanks to three new bases. The airline will reopen its base in Tuzla, Bosnia and Herzegovina, on 12 December, and will add two new Airbus A321neo aircraft by March 2026, serving 17 routes to nine countries. The airline's new Bratislava Airport base opens on 14 November, offering 13 new routes to Spain, Greece, Italy and other exciting countries. And Wizz Air is delighted to be opening a base at Warsaw

Modlin after a 13-year hiatus, from where passengers will be able to enjoy new routes to Athens, Barcelona and Milan among other long-awaited destinations.

But that's not all. Wizz Air is launching its largest Romanian expansion yet for the 2025 winter schedule, with 15 new routes from Bucharest Otopeni, Cluj-Napoca, Iași and Brașov to destinations across 12 countries including Germany, the Czech Republic, Morocco, Sweden, Norway, Italy, Denmark, Spain, Finland, France and Portugal. The expansion reinforces

Romania as a key market for the airline's European network.

In the UK, Wizz Air is celebrating a series of major milestones. Since opening its London Gatwick base in 2020, Wizz Air has expanded rapidly, and is now flying to nearly 30 destinations across 20 countries. This summer, the airline added over 300,000 seats to its UK network and started flying its first state-of-the-art Airbus A321XLR aircraft from London Gatwick.

On 1 August, Wizz Air made history by launching the first-ever direct route between London and Medina. Medina is Wizz Air's second destination from the UK to Saudi Arabia, following flights between London and Jeddah.

The airline is also expanding from London Luton with five new Spanish routes to Madrid, Barcelona, Bilbao, Valencia and Seville from March 2026, plus new daily flights to Milan, Rome and Vienna from London Luton starting on 26 October. It's a good time to fly with Wizz Air.





Hungarian football takes off

Wizz Air is taking Hungarian football to new heights by becoming the new main sponsor of the men's national team, as they prepare for the World Cup qualifiers. The partnership was announced on 26 August by Wizz Air CEO József Váradi and head coach Marco Rossi. But it's not just about sponsorship – the airline will be flying fans, too. Four special supporter flights to the matches in Lisbon and Yerevan, in October and November, will make it easier for Hungarian football fans to cheer on the team in person.

"Sport - especially football - builds community, inspires, and connects people. That is exactly what we do: we connect Europe's cultures, people and economies," said Váradi. It's a win for both the team and its supporters.

As the aviation industry turns to sustainable aviation fuel (SAF), Wizz Air is taking steps to meet regulatory targets and support the transition through investment and innovation

magine boarding a flight powered not just by traditional jet fuel, but by used cooking oil, household waste, or even algae. This isn't a distant vision – it's already underway, and it's called sustainable aviation fuel, or SAF.

SAF refers to a range of alternative fuels – including biofuels, synthetic fuels, and recycled carbon fuels – that can be used in today's aircraft. These fuels are made from non-fossil sources and, when measured across their full lifecycle, can reduce greenhouse gas emissions by up to 80% compared to conventional jet fuel.

"SAF is currently the most realistic option we have to reduce aviation emissions," says Ferenc Torma, Fuel Purchasing Manager at Wizz Air. "It works with existing aircraft and infrastructure, which means we can start using it without waiting for future technology."



Despite its potential, SAF is still in limited supply and costs significantly more than traditional fuel – often up to three or four times as much. For an ultra-low-cost airline like Wizz Air, this means the cost of operating flights is also rising, making early adoption a challenge.

Wizz Air has begun using SAF in line with European regulations, which require a minimum of 2% SAF in jet fuel from 2025. The airline has also conducted SAF trials at airports such as Barcelona and Brussels Charleroi to ensure operational readiness and prepare for mandatory reporting.

To support future availability, Wizz Air has invested in CleanJoule and Firefly, two companies developing new SAF production technologies. These investments are part of a broader effort to secure long-term supply and help scale up SAF across the industry.

"We've taken early steps to integrate SAF into our operations," Ferenc explains. "But this isn't something one airline can solve alone. Scaling up SAF requires coordinated action across the industry, along with strong support from governments."

Aircraft technology also plays a major role in reducing emissions. Wizz Air operates the youngest and most fuel-efficient fleet in Europe, including the Airbus A321neo, which has the lowest emissions intensity per passenger kilometre in its category. In fact, Wizz Air was named EMEA Environmental Sustainability Airline Group of the Year 2024 by CAPA, Centre for Aviation Awards for Excellence – a result of investing in modern aircraft and efficient operations.


"We've invested in modern aircraft because it's one of the most effective ways to reduce emissions today," says Ferenc.

"But to go further, we need innovation – aircraft that can handle higher SAF blend rates, and new technologies that push the boundaries of what's possible."

For millions of people, flying is part of everyday life - whether it's visiting family, exploring new places, or travelling for work or study. It's a fast, affordable way to connect across borders and access opportunities. That's why reducing aviation's environmental impact matters: not to limit travel, but to make sure flying remains accessible and viable in the long term.

Earlier this year, Wizz Air announced its aspiration to reach net zero emissions by 2050, publishing a detailed roadmap that outlines the steps needed to get there. SAF is a key part of this plan, alongside aircraft innovation, operational efficiency, and industry-wide collaboration.

"We're committed to doing our part," Ferenc says. "But for real progress, the entire aviation ecosystem manufacturers, fuel producers, regulators, and airlines needs to move faster."

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Why smoking is banned on flights

Airlines started banning smoking in the late 1980s and by 2000 it was made illegal across the world. Here are the reasons why

Secondhand smoke: It contains over 7.000 chemicals, including at least 70 known carcinogens. Breathing them in the confined space of an aircraft poses serious health risks.

It impacts air quality: Cigarette smoke jeopardises how the cabin pressure system functions, which can result in a lack of oxygen at high altitude.

It's a fire hazard: A lit cigarette can ignite flammable materials. potentially leading to a fire.

Electronic cigarettes/vapes/ IQOS are also not allowed:

While e-cigarettes produce vapour rather than smoke, they use lithium-ion batteries that can overheat or explode while being used.

Dry air conditions: The dry air in the aircraft cabin can make fuel more flammable.

Smoke detectors: The smoke detector in the toilets is linked to a warning system, which triggers an audible alarm.

Why you can't drink your own alcohol on an airplane

And why it's a bad idea anyway

Flying can be stressful, and a drink or two might seem like the perfect way to relax. But before you crack open that mini bottle of whisky you picked up at duty-free, remember that consuming your own alcohol on a commercial flight is prohibited by law. This rule applies regardless of where the alcohol was purchased. Cabin crew are trained to monitor alcohol consumption and are responsible for ensuring that no passenger becomes intoxicated or disruptive during the flight.

ALCOHOL AFFECTS YOU DIFFERENTLY IN THE AIR

The cabin pressure in commercial aircraft is equivalent to being at about 6,000 to 8,000 feet above sea level. This means:

- You may feel drunk faster
- Your judgment and coordination may be impaired more than usual
- You may experience dehydration and fatigue more auickly

Combined with the stress of travel, jet lag and limited mobility, alcohol can increase the risk of medical emergencies, conflict with other passengers or non-compliance with the crew.

PREVENTING DISRUPTIVE BEHAVIOUR

Airlines have seen a rise in air rage incidents,



SMOKING ON A PLANE COULD LEAD TO:

- Fines of up to €3,000
- A ban from flying with that airline
- As per the applicable law, smokers on board may face prosecution

Remember, lighting up during a flight is not only illegal but also jeopardises the wellbeing and safety of everyone on board. The ashtrays in the passenger cabin and restrooms are not an optional design element and not an invitation to smoke. Cabin crew members are trained to extinguish smoke and fire and eliminate any potential danger.



many of which are linked to alcohol. By restricting alcohol service to flight attendants, airlines can:

- Limit overconsumption
- Refuse service to visibly intoxicated passengers
- De-escalate situations before they become dangerous

THE BOTTOM LINE

While it might be tempting, drinking your own alcohol on board is illegal, unsafe and inconsiderate. If you'd like a drink, let the cabin crew serve you - they're trained to do so responsibly. And if you're feeling anxious or stressed, consider deep breathing, listening to music or watching a movie to relax.

Your onboard safety

Please show consideration for your fellow passengers and pay attention to the following information. Remember that by purchasing your Wizz Air ticket, you have accepted the Wizz Air General Conditions of Carriage (available in full at wizzair.com)



Lithium batteries

Portable electronic devices (PED) such as phones, laptops and tablets can contain lithium batteries. When damaged, faulty or overheated, these batteries can catch fire and explode.

If you recognise any issues with your device, inform the cabin crew immediately. Charging electronic devices on board using a portable battery charger is forbidden. Please refrain from storing your electronics and power banks in the overhead compartments.



Safe handling of hand luggage

Ensure that your larger hand luggage remains safely stowed in the locker and the smaller ones are under the seat in front of you for take-off, landing and whenever instructed by the crew. Passengers seated in the emergency rows and first row must store their cabin bags in the overhead lockers. Take care when opening lockers, as falling items may injure fellow passengers.

In case of evacuation, all baggage must be left on board, and the instructions of the cabin crew must be strictly followed.



Safety equipment

It is an offence to tamper with or remove safety equipment, including adult and infant life vests, infant safety belts or extension belts. You are not allowed to remove or damage any onboard informative placards.



Sharp items

To dispose of sharp items (e.g. hypodermic needles), contact a cabin crew member. Do not leave it behind.




Turbulence management

Turbulence can occur unexpectedly. Whenever seatbelt signs are switched on, remain seated, keep seatbelts fastened and stow away large electronic devices. For your safety, we recommend that you keep your seatbelts visibly fastened at all times when seated.



Safety of infants on board

Wizz Air has a clear procedure for infant (a child under two) restraint systems. You can only use the single hook infant seatbelt – vests/slings cannot be used with the infant seatbelt. Wizz Air only accepts aft-facing car seats when an extra seat is purchased. However, during take-off, landing and



whenever the seatbelt sign is switched on, infants



Electronic devices

Some electronic devices can be used during the flight with WLAN/Wi-Fi/Bluetooth turned off.

Larger electronic devices that cannot be held in one hand, exceed ca. Ikg in weight and do not qualify as handheld devices (e.g. laptops, notebooks etc.) must be stowed in the overhead stowage compartments for takeoff, landing and whenever required by the cabin crew. If in doubt, please ask your cabin crew.

Inflight health tips

Read these tips on how to stay fit when travelling.



Before your air travel

Consult your doctor before travelling if you have any medical concerns. Pregnant women and those with heart or respiratory problems, blood diseases or ear, nose and sinus infections should seek medical advice before flying. Crew members are entitled to call for medical assistance pre-flight if they deem it necessary and are in doubt about your fitness for the flight.



Medical supplies on board

Keep any medication you may need in your hand luggage and in its original packaging. Inform cabin crew of allergies or illnesses. If you are seriously ill or travelling post-surgery, you will need a medical certificate confirming that you are fit to fly. If you have limited mobility, are hearing- or sight-impaired, pregnant, or unable to understand/react to safety instructions, you will be unable to sit in the emergency exit rows or the front row. If you start to feel unwell during the flight, do not hesitate to talk to the cabin crew.



Nut allergy

During our WIZZ Café service we offer peanuts and some snacks containing peanuts/nuts traces. If you have any allergies we strongly encourage you to take all necessary medical precautions before flying, and to inform the cabin crew during boarding about your allergy.

- Damaging the aircraft or onboard equipment
- Wasting, polluting or contaminating the cabin

- Threatening or being aggressive towards fellow passengers and/or crew members
- Being violent or behave in a hostile, erratic manner

- Reimbursement of cost of diversion: €10,000-€80,000
- Criminal procedure and court litigation*
- Cancellation of all of your existing Wizz Air flight bookings
- · A ban from flying with Wizz Air in the future
- Penalty/fine or arrest by local police:
 - Smoking on board, including in the lavatory: up to €3,000*
 - Unruly behaviour due to intoxication: up to €5,000 and two years in prison*






