This year H-F had the most Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) Those Who Excel Award recipients in school history. Those Who Excel awards honor educators who have made significant contributions to Illinois schools. Awards of Excellence, Merit and Special Recognition have been presented annually since 1970 across multiple categories: classroom teachers, early career educators, school administrators, student support personnel, educational service personnel, community volunteers and teams. Co-Taught Social Science with Reading: Award of Meritorious Service - Team —

Co-Taught Social Science with Reading is a Tier 2 reading intervention program, designed to assist students as they expand their reading comprehension and information-processing skills, vocabularies and fluency to transfer such skills across content areas. Department Chair of Social Science Nick Anello and Department Chair of Reading Lauren Freeman, who co-nominated the team, wrote in part: "The number of students who are engaged in lessons, asking questions, using critical-thinking skills, reading for understanding, and improving writing skills grows daily as teachers are able to assist and support students to have more confidence in themselves and their abilities."

H-F joins national coalition of multiracial school districts



-F is the newest member of the MSAN Network, a national coalition of multiracial school districts that share a history of high academic achievement and connections to major research universities. MSAN districts come together to understand and eliminate racial opportunity gaps that persist in schools.

"Homewood-Flossmoor High School is proud to join this accomplished network of school districts throughout the United States," said Superintendent **Dr. Scott Wakeley**. "This partnership allows us to work collaboratively with districts that look like ours with diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds as we strive for excellence for all students."

"We made this announcement as we kicked off Black History Month to show the importance of celebrating black excellence today and every day of the year," Wakeley said. "Our membership in the MSAN Network is a major step in our commitment to developing the core competency of Diversity & Inclusion, the true north in our Profile of a Viking," Wakeley said.

The Profile of a Viking, developed in collaboration with the community, reflects the core competencies that H-F strives for each student to have upon graduation. These are the skills we believe are critical in addition to the academic knowledge students gain through their coursework. H-F administrators, teachers, staff, coaches and sponsors are intentional in the way these skills are developed through daily interactions with students. The competencies are:

- Diversity & Inclusion
- Innovation & Problem-Solving
- Reflection & Resilience
- Communication & Collaboration
- Citizenship & Character

"We are now part of a larger educational community that shares best practices and supports each other as we strive to continually improve the quality of education and experiences for all of our students," Wakeley said.

There are 28 MSAN network school districts that are keenly focused on raising achievement for students of diverse racial, ethnic and linguistic backgrounds. H-F is the fourth Illinois high school district to join MSAN including Evanston Township High School District 202, Niles Township High School District 219 and Oak Park River Forest High School District 200. Member districts across the country also include Amherst-Pelham Regional Schools in Massachusetts; Ann Arbor, Mich. Public Schools; Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools in North Carolina;

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Princeton Public Schools in New Jersey; and Shaker Heights City School District in Ohio, among others.

MSAN districts work collaboratively to conduct and publish research, analyze policies, share promising practices and lift up student voices in pursuit of the network's mission.

This winter H-F administrators attended their first MSAN meeting, providing the school district with access to resources and professional development to raise achievement.

"As an administrator, participating with MSAN opens doors to one of the greatest resources anyone could ever expect to have," said H-F High School **Associate Principal Shannon Swilley**. "That resource is knowledgeable, experienced practitioners who are willing to share details about their failures and blueprints for their success as it relates to educational equity in their communities."

The MSAN Network conducts collaborative research that informs school practices, engages in and evaluates evidence-based instructional interventions, and provides learning opportunities for teachers. Four focus areas comprise MSAN's research and development agenda:

- Mathematics
- Literacy, with an emphasis on adolescent literacy
- Student-teacher relationships
- Conversations about race and achievement



Senior Earns QuestBridge Scholarship to Northwestern University

H-F senior **Jada Marsh** is the recipient of a full-ride scholarship to Northwestern University, offered to her through the 2022 QuestBridge National College Match. This program — offered since 2003 — connects high-achieving high school seniors from low-income backgrounds with full four-year scholarships to 48 of the nation's best colleges and



universities. This year QuestBridge's 48 college partners matched with 1,755 finalists, who are recognized as Match Scholarship Recipients.



omewood-Flossmoor High School is committed to setting high expectations for all students and supporting them to be successful through **The Viking Academic Challenge**. This opens the possibility for all students to make the most of their high school years by engaging fully in the total H-F experience by:

- Exemplifying the Profile of the Viking
- Taking at least one Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB) or Dual Credit Course during their high school career
- Balancing academic rigor with their personal life, athletics and/ or activities
- Making connections and seeking support

H-F encourages all students to challenge themselves while earning college credit while still in high school. The Viking Academic Challenge removes gatekeepers to enrolling in these courses, allowing all students to pursue AP, IB and Dual Credit courses.

Advanced Placement (AP) Courses

Using a curriculum specified by the College Board, AP courses replicate entry-level university courses. An AP course concludes with an exam, administered by the College Board in May. H-F teachers skillfully guide and prepare the students for the exam throughout the school year. If students choose to take the exam and score well enough on it, they can earn college credit for that course. H-F currently offers 30 AP courses in the following disciplines: English, Social Science, Math, Science, World Language and Fine Arts. AP classes are open to all grade levels at H-F, although freshmen have a more limited selection during their first year. Some H-F alumni have accumulated enough passing AP score credits in their four years of high school to enter college as a second-semester freshman or sophomore.


International Baccalaureate Programme & Courses (IB)

Offered at H-F since the 2014-15 school year, the IB Diploma Programme is a two-year course of study for junior and senior students, presented through six academic areas: English, World Language, Social Science, Experimental Science, Mathematics and the Creative Arts. At H-F, this program immerses students in the two most challenging and internationally recognized high school curricula: Advanced Placement and IB. Graduates of this program are recognized internationally as well-rounded critical thinkers who possess strong research, writing and oral communication skills. H-F students can choose to pursue the full IB Diploma — which also includes an Extended Essay

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and Creativity, Activity and Service requirements - or plan to take fewer IB courses as an IB Certificate candidate, while still enjoying the creativity, thoughtfulness and inquiry-based learning style that IB provides. Although there may be prerequisite requirements for individual courses, there are no minium requirements or placement tests required for H-F's IB program. IB courses also end the school year with an exam; results are announced in July. Many alumni have earned college credit by taking IB courses at H-F.

Dual Credit Courses

Dual Credit courses offer students the opportunity to earn college and high school credit simultaneously. The credits earned are transferable to the institution that offers the dual credit and to other four-year colleges and universities. Dual Credit courses can reduce the overall cost of college for families, and these courses support college preparation and transition. Students may take advantage of college/university resources while enrolled in the dual credit course. Dual Credit courses show the student's ability to successfully complete college-level coursework during the college-admissions process. H-F currently offers dual credit courses in tandem with Prairie State College and Lewis University.

<u>Balance</u>

Our goal is for all students to find the right balance for themselves among academics, athletics, activities, home and personal lives. Finding the right combination that works for them will allow them to have a well-rounded high school experience and equip them with the skills to find that balance in their lives after H-F.
