Your whole family will soar with the friendship, adventure, and discovery of Girl Scouts. The Juliette Program is flexible to a family's needs. The Juliette Program also allows the continuation to the Girl Scouts experience and generation.

About Girl Scouts

Founded in 1912, Girl Scouts of the USA is the preeminent leadership development organization for girls. Girl Scouts is 2.6 million strong – 2.6 million girls and adults who believe girls can change the world. It began more than 100 years ago with one woman, Juliette Gordon “Daisy” Low, who believed in the power of every girl. Today, Girl Scouts continues her vision of building girls of courage, confidence, and character who make the world a better place by helping them discover their inner strengths, passions, and talents.

And with programs and events across our council and beyond, there's a chance for every girl to do something amazing.

3 Keys to Leadership

We are a girl-led, all girl organization focused on three core “keys” to leadership: Discover, Connect, Take Action.

Through these three keys, you will: Discover your special skills and talents, find the confidence to set challenging goals for yourself, and strive to live by your values. This includes being proud of where you came from as well as where you're going.

Connect with others, which means you'll learn how to team up, solve conflicts, and have healthy relationships. These skills help you in school right now and will prepare you for any career you choose in the future.

Take Action to make the world a better place and learn a lot about your community and the world along the way. Our goal is to create a society in which every girl has the opportunity to achieve her leadership potential. Our distinguished alumnae are proof our leadership development program works.

Membership Fees

A \$25 annual membership fee, due at the time of registration, goes directly to Girl Scouts of the USA and pays for the various services GSUSA provides to councils, including development of program materials, and activity insurance. Parents, guardians, and other adults are all invited to become members of the Girl Scout Movement.

Financial Assistance

GSCO is committed to providing every girl with the opportunity to participate in Girl Scouting, regardless of financial background. Financial assistance is available to cover the membership fee.

Uniforms and Books: Assistance is available for the purchase of official Girl Scout uniforms and Journey and badge books. One grant per year per member. Fill out a [financial assistance request](#). Available for up to 100% of the total cost.

Camp financial assistance: To apply for financial assistance to attend a Girl Scouts of Colorado camp that registers through Camp In Touch, submit the [Camp Financial Assistance form](#).

Program events and training grants provide assistance to attend council-sponsored programs, approved Service Unit events, and council-sponsored training opportunities.

What is a Juliette?

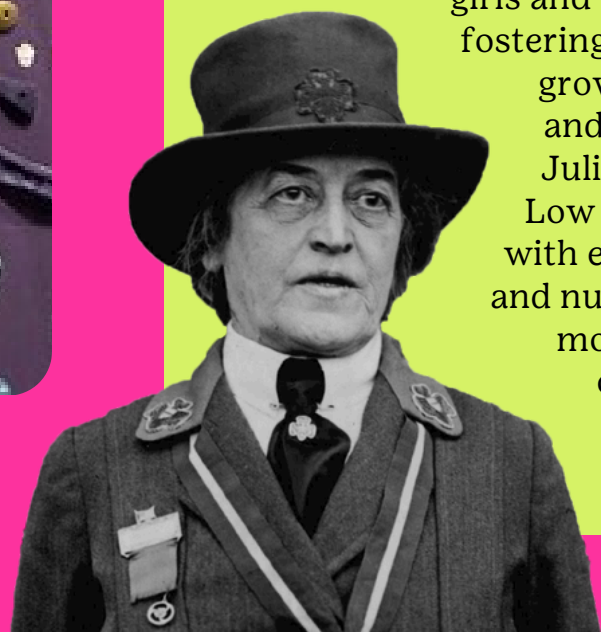
A Girl Scout Juliette is an individually registered Girl Scout (not in a troop). Juliettes choose not to participate in the traditional troop format but still have access to Girl Scout experiences and opportunities. As a Juliette, she has the unique ability to mix and match Girl Scout activities that suit her interests by choosing special events, leadership projects, travel opportunities, and badge work that appeals to her. Juliettes are busy, independent, self-confident girls and young women who may have once been part of a troop that disbanded, or whose availability does not fit the traditional troop schedule.

Girls in any grade (kindergarten through 12) can be a Juliette. As a Juliette, she can participate in any program, event, trip, or summer camp that open to her grade level.

Why “Juliette”?

In 1912, Juliette Gordon Low (1860–1927) founded Girl Scouts of the USA, an organization that today serves millions of girl members and alums, and reflects the arc of her remarkable life. An ardent believer in the potential of all

girls and the importance of fostering their individual growth, character, and self-sufficiency, Juliette Gordon Low is credited with establishing and nurturing a global movement that has changed the world.



Juliette Mentors

A Juliette mentor is a parent, family member, caregiver, or other adult who guides a Juliette during her Girl Scout journey. Juliette mentors are not assigned by council but chosen by the girl and her family.

As a Juliette mentor, you will:

- Register as an adult volunteer and complete the required background check (registration fee is \$25/year).
- Support your Juliette’s commitment to Girl Scouting.
- Explore council programs, helping her pick the activities she wants to participate in, and plan how she will fund her participation.
- Help your Juliette choose the badges and Journeys that interest her.
- Assist your Juliette in purchasing or borrowing the books and materials needed to complete each badge or award.
- Verify that your Juliette has completed badge requirements and purchase badges and awards from the Girl Scout Store.
- Retain signed annual health history and permission form for your Juliette to participate in product programs, events, summer camp, and other activities.
- Help your Juliette participate in product programs by submitting the required forms, completing your training, fulfilling program requirements and following safety guidelines.



There are advantages to participating as a Juliette Mentor!

- Gain leadership experience
- Create a well-rounded Girl Scout experience for your Juliette by completing the planning guide for her grade-level, on her own time

 - The Recruitment Support Specialist supports recruitment of girl and adult volunteers for our Juliette Program. They also coordinate Parent Information Nights and recruitment booths at youth-related events.

In 2023, GSCO served over 16,000 girls, and 10,000 adult members. Our council relies heavily on dedicated volunteers to provide an exceptional Girl Scout experience.

National Level (GSUSA)

This includes all 110 councils in the United States. The National Headquarters for Girl Scouts of the USA is in New York City.

Service Units

As a Girl Scout member, you are part of a Girl Scout service unit. A service unit is designed to serve one large community or several smaller communities together. A service unit consists of a team of adult volunteers that provide direct support to the girls and adults within their area. This team meets with local volunteers to exchange ideas, present program resources and training, and share council programming opportunities.

Product Program

Fall Product Program & Cookie Program

Girl Scouts of Colorado offers two annual product programs:

The Fall Product Program starts in September and ends in October. It is a "friends and family" sale through which Girl Scouts sell nuts, candies, Tervis Tumblers, BarkBox options, magazines, and other specialty items before cookie sales begin in January.

Girl Scouts can choose to participate in the Fall Product Program during the months of September and October, and in the Girl Scout Cookie Program starting in January and ending in March.

Juliettes are eligible to earn reward items, Cookie Credits, and Juliette Cookie Credits. Girl Scouts do not earn proceeds; only troops earn product program proceeds.

Cookie Credits and Juliette Program Cookie Credits may not be used to pay for or renew adult membership or pay for travel expenses for adults or those not related to Girl Scouts of Colorado. Contact the product program team or email financial.followup@gscolorado.org for any questions or clarification regarding what Cookie Credits and Juliette Cookie Credits can be used for.

When girls participate in our Product Programs, they develop Five essential skills:

1. Goal Setting
 - Girl Scouts learn how to set goals and create a plan to reach them.
2. Decision Making
 - Girl Scouts learn to make decisions on their own and as a team.
3. Money Management
 - Girl Scouts learn how to create a budget and handle money.
4. People Skills
 - Girl Scouts find their voice and build confidence through customer interactions.
5. Business Ethics
 - Girl Scouts learn to act ethically, both in business and in life.

Fall Product Program

The Fall Product Program takes place between September and October. It is a "friends and family" sale through which girls can sell nuts, candy, magazines, and other specialty items.

The Fall Product Program is a great jumping-off point before the Girl Scout Cookie Program. It will give your Juliette the opportunity to learn the ins and outs of the program before cookie sales begin in the spring.



Girl Scout Cookie Program

The Girl Scout Cookie Program is the largest girl-run business in the country! It takes place between December and March. Much more than a fundraiser, it's a unique, hands-on program that empowers girls to become successful businesswomen.

How to Participate in Product Programs as a Juliette

Your Juliette can take part in the Fall Product Program and the Girl Scout Cookie Program, conducting sales in-person and/or online. She can also partake in cookie booth sales. In order to participate, a Juliette's parent or other volunteer must attend required product program training provided by the the service unit, where complete details of program participation will be discussed. Parents and/or other volunteers are required to sign a position agreement, register, and complete a background screening prior to training. Juliettes must adhere to the same safety guidelines as girls participating with a troop.

Uniforms and Insignia

Girl Scout uniforms show how much a girl has accomplished and that she is ready for what's next. Each part of the uniform is unique and signifies the girl's program level. Wearing the same uniform as their peers gives Girl Scouts a sense of identity and comradery within their troop, and instills in them the values of Girl Scouting.

Badges: Awards earned by Girl Scouts indicating increasing knowledge and skill in a subject.

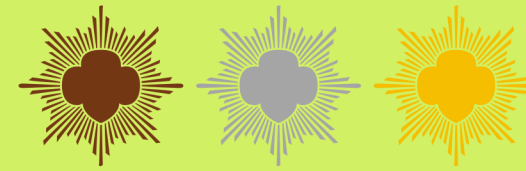
Counselor-in-Training (CIT): This award is for girls that mentor younger girls in a camp setting and build skills toward becoming a camp counselor. The steps to earning this award are outlined in Girl's Guide to Girl Scouting.

Fun patches and pins: A Supplementary insignia received by girls for simply participating in an event or activity. Girls wear fun patches on the back of their uniform.

Insignia: The umbrella term for U.S. Girl Scout earned grade-level awards. Girls wear all insignia, except participation patches and pins, on the front of their uniform.

Religious and other awards: Official awards earned for completing requirements set by religious/other organizations or by Girl Scouts of the USA. These awards are all worn on a similar place on the uniform.

SWAPS - Special Whatchamacallits Affectionately Pinned Somewhere: Tokens exchanged at special Girl Scout/Girl Guide events that signify friendship. Ideally these are inexpensive handmade items that are accepted by the receiver as a token of friendship.

Through the program, Girl Scouts develop their leadership skills by using their creativity, talent and compassion to reach out to others in need, both locally and globally.

The **Gold, Silver,** and **Bronze** Awards are the currency of this investment, representing your chance to make a difference for people in areas such as social services, healthcare, education, and any number of other arenas.

As your Girl Scout earns one of Girl Scouts' highest awards, they'll change their corner of the world—and beyond. The possibilities are endless.

Community Service

Community service is an integral part of being a Girl Scout, providing girls with an opportunity to practice teamwork, build critical-thinking skills and empower them to make changes in their community. Sharing their time and resources helps girls increase their self-esteem and civic responsibility.

Community Service

- Addresses an immediate need
- Addresses a problem by working with or for a community partner
- Makes community better for some people, right now.
- Contribution to the community is usually, but not always, measurable.
- Not usually long-lasting or continuous

Take Action Projects

Take Action projects are a chance for girls to partner with others in their community to solve a problem. Girls learn about getting to the root causes of issues, mobilizing and engaging community members and volunteers, and striving toward creating lasting change in their world

Take Action Projects

- Address a need, immediate or not.
- Address the root cause of a problem by working with (not for) community partner(s).
- Create a lasting impact in the community.
- Contribution to the community is always measurable.
- Sustainable long after girls' involvement in the project has ended.

A Take Action Project might be:

- **Measurable:** The success of the project can be determined based on the number of people the project helped, the number of people who were involved, any reduction in the community's need and other concrete numbers.
- **Sustainable:** Girls should discuss if their project creates lasting change. Girls can do this by collaborating with community leaders and/or organizations, building alliances with mentors, and inspiring others to keep change going. The Gold Award Project is the ONLY project to make arrangements for sustainability.

Community service projects are an important way for Girl Scouts to serve their community. However, Take Action projects make a lasting difference in the community and give girls even more opportunities to make their world a better place! If a troop chooses to do a Take Action project they can still participate in community service projects

Important!

One key to a successful Take Action Project is to determine what the community needs are before creating the Take Action Project. There is nothing worse than creating a project, then finding out that it was not needed.
