# PASSOVER: OUR PEOPLE'S STORY, OUR STORY

Last year, a couple days before Passover I got a call from my dad. He was excited that we would all be able to spend the second seder of Passover together. Our tradition has been to lead the Temple seder on the first night, and then drive to Milwaukee for the second night with our family. A number of years ago, when my grandparents passed away and the Bar-Lev seder moved to my parents' house, my dad took over leading the seder. I sent him a PDF of our Temple Haggadah and he had copies printed and bound so we could have a proper seder. Even though I'm the "professional," he enjoyed leading the seder and it was nice for me to just be myself and not have to lead (although I probably did more backseat leading than I should have, suggesting a song here or a reading there).

Back to last year. My dad called me a couple days before Passover to ask if I would consider leading the seder this year. He said that he wanted to start the seder, maybe do a couple readings and then hand it off to me. I remember at the time thinking the formal "handoff" was a little weird and kind of funny, but sure I would be happy to help however I could. So Passover arrived, we gathered around the very long table, eight kids laughing and yelling, twelve adults trying our best to ignore the craziness at the kids' end of the table. My dad quieted the room and began speaking on behalf of my mom and himself.

My younger brother Ari had recently started dating a wonderful woman named Ali, who is now his fiance (wedding at the end of March!). This was the first time Ali was together with our entire family and as the seder began, my dad wanted to formally welcome Ali to the family and say how much my parents loved her already. That was why he wanted to start the seder before handing it off to me - he wanted to make sure Ali knew how thrilled we all were that she was there. And then, in a quintessentially Nissan way, he said, "and now I hand it over to the real professional to lead - Benjameeno take it away."

After he died unexpectedly this summer, I was looking through my dad's phone and found in his Notes app, his entire welcome speech from Passover. He cared so much that he wrote his entire speech down, four bullet-point paragraphs typed out on his phone. A later note with just the headings from the four paragraphs indicated to me that he worked at memorizing that speech and delivered it beautifully.

Never in any of our wildest dreams would we have thought that last year's Passover seder would be the last one with my dad. The guy was in better shape than almost anyone I know, still besting his children in arm wrestling competitions and working out vigorously daily. But alas, he is no longer with us. And I'm sure our Bar-Lev family Passover seder this year will be a mix of great joy and celebration as well as deep sadness and grief.

Like so many in our congregation have experienced with the loss of a parent, these past seven months have been a balancing act as grief ebbs and flows. I try every day to bring my dad's goodness into our lives. My mom, my siblings, and I share stories and funny remembrances of my dad almost daily.

I keep using my terrible version of his accent, one that I think he didn't love while he was alive! Our kids talk about him often and continue to ask lots of questions about him. We try our very best to tell his story; to keep him with us in every way we can.

One of the reasons I think Passover is such a magical holiday is that it relies heavily on family traditions and stories. When we sit down around the seder table and enact the same general Passover celebrations that we attended with loved ones who are no longer with us, it is in some cosmic way, as if they are still here with us. We tell the stories our parents used to tell. We eat the recipes our grandparents once prepared. We pass the traditions to our own children and perhaps see the light of our loved ones in their eyes. That's the beauty of this holiday.

So as we approach Passover that begins on Wednesday, April 5, I invite you to carve out a little extra time to celebrate the holiday. Perhaps you are new to Judaism or don't have family in town with whom to celebrate. In that case, join us at the Temple seder on the first night and partake in the beautiful age-old tradition of telling and retelling our people's story. And while you are celebrating Passover with family and friends, I encourage you to share your own stories as well. The stories of our families and our traditions will always link our generation with those who came before us as well as those who are yet to be.

On behalf of Lauren, Sammie, Jake, Asher, and Noah, I am wishing you a very sweet, happy, and healthy Passover season. May our family stories endure, and may they be blessings in our lives forever.



# PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

Hello and Happy Passover,

Recently, a good friend of mine asked me over a nice glass of bourbon, "With three decades of either being active in a leadership role or as an Executive Director, what do you think makes a successful Temple?" I had to think about that for a few minutes because my friend is a smart person who has also served in many leadership roles in his life.

After thinking a few seconds and al experiences, the answer came very easily to me. A three-legged stool. A piece of furniture which relies on three major legs or points to keep a person steady while sitting on it. If the three legs are not even or sturdy, the stool will wobble and eventually the person will fall off.

I think the same way about Temple success. If the Board of Trustees, clergy/staff, and the members of the congregation are uneven, our Temple will not be sturdy and great things cannot be accomplished for the good of all involved.

At Temple Beth Shalom, I feel that our stool is strong because all three components of our Temple is in synch and works very well to achieve one goal to provide a strong Jewish community to learn, pray and build strong Jewish relationships.

How is that happening at Temple Beth Shalom today? As the President of the Congregation, I am proud of the work the Board of Trustees is currently doing. We are working hard on fact-finding, discussing ideas, and putting words into action to make our Temple community better.

There are four pillars/silos that we are addressing today for our future success:

 Membership- Researching ways to modify our dues structure to encourage an increase in our membership, while retaining our current members with a new, refreshing way to support the Temple's operating budget.

- Fundraising- Setting clear policy and procedures to accept gifts from small to large donations.
- Building- Revisiting the strategic building report done 11 years ago during our last strategic planning. There are several items or ideas that were deferred. The Board of Trustees want to revisit those items or ideas to discuss the importance and put a current price tag to see future cost to keep our building appealing and structurally sound.
- Religious school- Looking at ways to make our Religious school adapt to family life today, thinking of creative ways to have our children participate in Jewish life and promote Jewish friendships. (Did you fill out the survey if you have kids in R/S?)

Regarding the second leg of the stool, our clergy and staff could not be more dedicated in making all our Jewish lives more meaningful. Their hard work and creativity stand out by the wonderful services, programs and overall support to our congregants. The value they bring to our Jewish lives cannot be measured by one big scale, but to each one of our own personal scales. Without this dedicated and committed team of professionals, our stool would not stand.

The last leg of the stool is you, the Congregation, who supports the Temple financially, spiritually and by volunteering to make our house of worship meaningful for all of us. Just like our founders envisioned, TBS has the reputation of being a warm, caring, and welcoming place that encourages all walks of life to be one Jewish community. With your financial commitment, your engagement in congregational life and the love for being Jewish, that third leg of the stool remains strong 35 years later. Thank you!

On a personal note, I am so excited to see my youngest child, Sophie being called to the Bimah this month to becoming a Bat Mitzvah. There are so many emotions and thoughts that go through my mind about seeing my last child become a Bat Mitzvah and being President of the Congregation at the same time. But one thing comes to my mind as my deceased mother, Sandy would say, "Life is like the sands of the hourglass, so are the days of our lives!" Cherish every moment, every person and every experience that crosses your path in life. May you cherish the time with family and friends at your Passover Seder table.

#### POLLINATOR GARDEN UPDATE

Spring is approaching and my thoughts turn to the pollinator garden we started last year on the Temple grounds. Although it is a small garden compared to our neighbors garden spots we are enthusiastic that we can grow the garden in size and variety.

This year we are planting 5 Elderberry trees near the existing garden to provide food in the fall for the birds. We are also planting 5 dogwood trees that near the fence line that will eventually flower in the spring and help provide food for bees and butterflies. We area also adding another 50 native wildflower plants, expanding the garden by another 100 square feet.

Our long-term plan for the garden is to expand the foot print to around 5500 square feet of area, incorporating one or more paths through the garden and provide a bench to sit on to enjoy the garden space. Additionally, this would create a hands on educational space for our religious class to learn about a sustainable environments and repairing the earth, which ties into the newly adopted TBS Environmental Guidance Statement.

Urban gardens are important because they provide sanctuary for bees, birds, butterflies and other pollinators that are significant contributors to the world food production, and seed dispersal.

The Green Team is asking for donations so we can realize our dream of expanding the TBS Pollinator Garden. The donations will be used to create an urban wildflower sanctuary for pollinators and our temple members as well as develop educational programs for environmental sustainability.

To donate go to the TBS Home Page, click on the Donate to TBS button, fill out the form and pick the Green Team as the recipient of the donation. Our goal is to get \$3,000 by this fall so we can get the area ready for planting in the spring of 2024.

By building the power of organized people in our community, we work to hold decision makers accountable to solve the community problems that create victims in the first place.





### AN UNTOLD STORY FINALLY GETS TOLD



I will give you only one chance--who was Anna M. Rosenberg? If you guessed a collaborator of the treasonous Jewish couple Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, you would be wrong. Anna Marie Rosenberg, nee Lederer, was a Jew born in 1899 in

Budapest, Hungary. She immigrated to New York City in 1912 along with her mother and older sister so they could join her father who had immigrated some two years earlier. The story of her U.S patriotic sense of duty and great accomplishments are unfolded in the first ever biography written about her interesting life, The Confidante: The Untold Story of the Woman Who Helped Win WWII and Helped Shape Modern America, by Christopher C. Gorham.

Anna honed the art of being an arbitrator of labor issues during the 1920s and in the early years of the depression following the 1929 Stock Market Crash. Her skill set avoided many labor strikes and shortened others. Doing this brought her national attention. Eleanor Roosevelt, who became Anna's lifelong friend, approached and convince Anna to work on such national pressing matters of the time as women issues, civil rights issues, and child labor injustices. FDR took notice of Anna's talents, stamina, and accomplishments and hired her to prevent and settle labor disputes, and to help him design, develop and implement the New Deal policies, programs, and legislation. She went on to become the New York Administrator for Social Security. During WWII she made two extended trips to the European Theater to be FDR's ears where she interviewed Gls to determine what they needed and what they hoped for after the war ended. Her reports to FDR gained better food and clothing, and

more weapons and ammunition to improve the war effort. Additionally, her interview notes resulted in her being a big influence on the GI Bill of Rights, including assistance with veteran home owning and education. She never got over FDR's death, as she judged him the greatest person alive.

She went on during the Truman Administration to serve as Secretary of Defense General (of the Army) George C. Marshall's Assistant Secretary of Defense. She made two trips to South Korea during the Korean War to again talk to Gls, and she was very instrumental in desegregating the armed services and any dependent children schools on military installations; thus paving the way to be followed in America's society. Anna met Eisenhower during her trips to the WWII European Theater where she gained his admiration. When Eisenhower became President, she served in his administration as well. During the short-lived Kennedy Administration, Anna returned to running her labor arbitration firm.

She got along famously with LBJ during his early political years--first as a Representative to the U.S. Congress and later as a U.S. Senator from Texas. She served President Johnson in forming Civil Rights and Great Society legislation. She was greatly disappointed in LBJ's decision not to run for his own second presidential term.

Anna M. Rosenberg is a woman, a Jew, and an immigrant who was the first person to be awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the civilian equivalent of the Congressional Medal of Honor in the military. She was a behind-the-scenes individual in the shadows of some powerful historic figures. I urge you to read this well-written book so you can learn more about this unusual lady and the history she had a hand in making.
