


What were you doing at age 26?

Michael D. Tubbs was making history. In 2016, he was elected Mayor of Stockton at 26 years old. He was the city's first African-American Mayor and the youngest Mayor of any major city in American history. As Mayor, Tubbs was lauded for his leadership and innovation. He raised over 20 million dollars to create the Stockton Scholars, a universal scholarship and mentorship program for Stockton students. Additionally, he piloted the first mayor-led guaranteed income pilot in the country. Currently, he is the Special Advisor to California Governor Gavin Newsom for Economic Mobility and Opportunity; the Founder of Mayors for a Guaranteed Income (MGI); and the Founder of End Poverty in California (EPIC).

Under his leadership, Stockton was named an "All-America City" in 2017 and 2018 by the National Civic League. The city saw a 40% drop in homicides in 2018 and 2019, led the state of California in the decline of officer-involved shootings in 2019, and was named the second most fiscally healthy city in California. Additionally, it was recognized as one of the most fiscally healthy cities in the nation and was featured in an HBO documentary film, *Stockton on My Mind*.

Tubbs has been named a fellow at the Harvard Institute of Politics and The MIT Media Lab, a member of Fortune's Top 40 under 40, a Forbes 30 under 30 All-Star Alumni, the "Most Valuable Mayor" by The Nation, the 2019 New Frontier Award Winner from the JFK Library, and the 2021 Civic Leadership Award winner from The King Center. Prior to his tenure as Mayor, Tubbs served as a Councilmember for the City of Stockton District 6, a high school educator, and a fellow for the Stanford Design School and the Emerson Collective.

On November 16, 2021, Tubbs released "The Deeper The Roots: A Memoir of Hope and Home," published by the Flatiron Books imprint, An Oprah Book. The book — which the LA Times describes as "intimate and insightful"— not only relates Tubbs' story of growing up in poverty but lays his vision for leadership and policy that is more empathetic and responsive to people who are struggling.





Willie L. Banks Jr., Ph.D.

Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs

In his position, Vice Chancellor Banks leads the Division of Student Affairs, which is dedicated to transforming the lives of the more than 38,000 students at UCI and employs over 800 full-time and 1,200 student staff members.



Prior to his role at UCI, Dr. Banks served as the Vice President for Student Affairs at Indiana State University, with a simultaneous appointment as an Assistant Professor within the Bayh College of Education's Department of Educational Leadership in the Student Affairs and Higher Education program.

Vice Chancellor Banks is passionate about teaching, learning and mentorship and is active in several professional organizations related to higher education and student success. He has dedicated his professional career to the field of Student Affairs, with experience in various capacities overseeing multicultural programs, resource centers and services, student unions, and housing and dining programs.

In March 2022, Dr. Banks was recognized as a Pillar of the Profession at the NASPA National Conference. Each year, the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators Foundation recognizes exceptional members of the student affairs and higher education community through the Pillars of the Profession award, one of the Foundation's highest honors.

Dr. Banks earned his undergraduate degree from Mercer University in Macon, Georgia and his Master's and Ph.D. in College Student Affairs Administration from the University of Georgia.



The Marty A. Belknap Endowed Memorial Keynote

Martha "Marty" Belknap worked at UCI for many years in the 70s and 80s within The Division of Student Affairs. Her contributions to the newly-established Greek community at what was then a very young UCI helped to build an exceptional foundation for what we know today as Sorority & Fraternity Life.

She also worked to establish a lecture series within Student Affairs that brought prominent individuals to campus to speak to student populations. The Marty A. Belknap Endowed Memorial Lecture Fund was established in 2007 after she passed away, to honor Marty's memory by carrying on the work she did with the Student Affairs lecture series.

Sherwynn Umali is serving her 18th year as a staff member at UC Irvine. Currently, she is the Deputy Chief of Staff for the Division of Student Affairs. In this role, she works on strategic initiatives, programmatic endeavors, and supervises an incredible Creative & Marketing Communications team for the division. Previous to this role, she served as Associate Dean of Students in Student Life & Leadership (SLL) for nine years.



When not at UCI, Sherwynn serves as a consultant to private sector and non-profit organizations and is a freelance graphic designer and photographer. Her favorite thing to do is spend time with her partner, two silly kids, two awkward dogs and some pet reptiles.

Sherwynn earned a Bachelor of Arts from UCI and a Master of Arts from the University of Maryland, College Park.

Panelists:

Tamara Inoue is in her ninth year as head coach of the UC Irvine women's basketball team.



She is the second-winningest coach in program history with 140 career victories. This past season, Inoue led the Anteaters to the Big West Championship and their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1995.

In 2022-23, Inoue's squad won UCI women's basketball's first Big West regular-season title and closed out the campaign with a school-record 25 victories. For the second year in a row, the 'Eaters earned the conference's automatic bid to the WNIT, and they won their first-round game at San Diego State.

Under Inoue's watch, UC Irvine has produced four 20-win campaigns, including in each of the last three seasons. She was named the 2020-21 Big West Coach of the Year, while she mentored the program's first Big West Player of the Year. The Anteaters have also seen success in the classroom during Inoue's tenure with 28 Big West All-Academic selections. As a team, UCI has made the WBCA Academic Top 25 Honor Roll twice in the last three years.

Bernadette Boden-Albala, MPH, DrPH, is the Founding Dean of the University of California,



Irvine's Joe C. Wen School of Population & Public Health, which has grown from one department to four departments within the last two years. A renowned researcher and academic administrator, she holds several leadership roles within the public health field, at the UCI campus, and at the UCI-system level.

For more than 25 years, Boden-Albala has dedicated her career to promoting health equity for all; defining, and intervening on social determinants of disease; and leading community-level health assessments and solutions. She also has expertise in cardiovascular disease and stroke, emerging infectious diseases, epidemiology, as

well as global health. Recently, she received prestigious recognitions for her work from the American Heart Association as the 2024 Edgar J. Kenton Lecture awardee and the American Academy of Neurology as the 2024 Cheryl A. Jay Lecture Awardee.

Dr. Dyonne Bergeron is the Vice Chancellor for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion and Chief





Diversity Officer at the University of California, Irvine (UCI). She oversees the Office of Inclusive Excellence and is UCI's senior executive responsible for providing a holistic and integrated vision of all major inclusive excellence endeavors on Irvine and UCI Health.

Dr. Bergeron earned a Doctor of Education in educational leadership, with an emphasis on college leadership, at the University of South Florida. She is a native of New Orleans and a proud alum of Louisiana State University. She is an accomplished higher education leader in the areas of DEI, academic affairs, and student affairs. Her accomplishments also include DEI consulting

and curriculum development; training for faculty, staff, and students; recruitment and retention of underrepresented students and staff; crisis management; and student and staff leadership development. Dr. Bergeron has received several awards and recognitions for exemplary work to make institutions and higher education a more inclusive, equitable, and just environment for students, staff, faculty, and community.
