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

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### **A LETTER FROM OUR PRESIDENT**



reduction equivalent to the GHG emissions from 8,153 miles driven by an average passenger vehicle!

### Meet the Shearers

Andy Rice, of Hogget Hill Farm in Halifax VT. near Brattleboro, has been shearing for 40 years and works across the entire northeast region. He has studied with the masters of shearing in this country and New Zealand. Andy has sheared over 250,000 sheep.

**Siri Swanson** is a full time shearer as Yankee Clippers Shearing and owns and operates Yankee Rock Farm, LLC with her partner, Colin, in Orwell, VT. Together they serve more than 10,000 sheep per year and maintain their flock of 40 ewes with a commitment to cutting-edge shepherding, service to community, and progressive land management through their endeavors.

### **CHOPSTICK KNITTING CONTEST**

### HELD THURSDAY, FRIDAY AND SUNDAY @ 3PM

Registration ends 30 minutes before each competition.

Adult and Youth divisions to be run at the same time.

### <u>Rules:</u>

- 1. Contestants will be provided with worsted weight wool yarn.
- 2. Contestants will be provided with a pair of Chop Stick Knitting Needles.
- 3. Before timing begins, contestants will cast 20 stitches on knitting needles.
- 4. Knitters will knit for 15 minutes.
- 5. When time is up, the swatch will be measured and judged by the rows knitted.
- 6. Judge's decision is final.

### **SPEED SPINNING CONTEST**

### HELD THURSDAY, FRIDAY AND SUNDAY @ 1PM

Registration ends 30 minutes before each competition.

Adult and Youth divisions to be run at the same time.

### Rules:

- 1. Contestants must bring a Hand Drop Spindle or spinning wheel (no electric wheels)
- 2. A set weight of prepared roving will be provided.
- 3. Spinners will spin for 15 minutes.
- 4. When time is up, the spun yarn will be skeined, measured and judged.
- 5. Judge's decision is final.
- 6. Adult and youth winners will be awarded on number of YARDS SPUN.
- 7. Completion of roving before time is up will add one (1) point per minute to score.
- 8. Breakage will result in a subtraction of one (1) point per break.

Registration is available online until end of day Wednesday. In person registration available 1 hour before event at the event tent.

#### How the pull works:

- Contestants will be given (2) chances to get the sled moving from the starting line.
- The pulling tractor must stay between the lines while pulling the sled. If the tractor crosses one of the side lines, the pull will be measured to where it crossed the line.
- After tallying all the measurements of contestants pulls for each class, the farthest pulls will determine the top 3 winners.
- In case of a tie, a pull-off will be held.
- Measurements made by the event officials are final.

#### <u>Rules:</u>

- 1. Participation is limited and contestants will be allowed to register on a first come first serve basis including online entries.
- 2. Boys and girls will pull together and pulling class will be determined by age at the date of the event.
- 3. Contestants will pull in the order that they signed up.
- 4. Due to time constraints, the contestant MUST be present when their name is called to pull or will be disqualified.

#### Safety Requirements:

- Contestants must be able to pedal the tractor with his or her feet without assistance.
- Contestants MUST wear closed toe and closed heal shoes. (rubber soles are recommended)
- Contestants must not touch wheels & must keep feet on pedals at all times while pulling.



- 1. The whole team needs to fit in the age group registered.
- 2. The captain registers the team.
- 3. Each team must have a minimum of 6 members and a maximum of 8 members. (five on the rope, two alternates and one captain)
- 4. Each team member may only be on one team.
- 5. No spiked footwear.
- 6. Gloves may be worn.
- 7. No hand over hand pulling (members must move back with the rope.)
- 8. Only anchor person may have one hand on the ground.
- 9. Anchor person rope will pass under one armpit diagonally cross the back then over opposite shoulder.
- 10. Only the team captain may consult with the judges.
- 11. The judge's decision is final.
- 12. Official tug of war informational videos available on you tube at TWIF (Tug of War International Federation)2nd, and 3rd).



#### Tractor Pull Rules

- 1. The Martha's Vineyard Agricultural Society assumes no responsibility for loss, theft and/or injury to the participant or property competing.
- 2. Tractors must be standard make, at least 25 years old, rubber tread, wheel type, equipped for farm use. No four wheel drives allowed, no dual tires, no studs or chains permitted. All power must be transmitted to the wheels. No hydrostatic drives allowed.
- 3. The order of pulling in each class will be determined by drawing numbers for each class at the time of weighing in.
- 4. The pull director will determine the number of classes you may enter.
- 5. The first-place winner may enter the next class and pull last in order. The second-place tractor will only be allowed to enter the next class if the pull director determines that the class is less than full and time allows.
- 6. All pullers will have a total of 4 minutes of pulling time. During that 4 minutes they can make as many hitches as they want with only longest pull counting. The pin resets with rehitching.
- 7. All pulls must be made on the concrete slab provided. Dead hitch to boat by cable, clevis and pin provided. Hitch for tractors under 2,000 pounds must not be over 12 inches from the slab. Any hydraulic drawbar found raised after original check will be cause for disqualification. All drawbars to be stationary (rigid) in all directions at all times. Hitch for tractors over 2000 pounds must be less than 20 inches from the slab.
- 8. Load must be pulled six feet in one hitch from the starting point. Distance is measured to the point where the boat first stops forward motion. Any yank pull, which tips the concrete block off the load, will be cause for disqualification of both operator and the tractor for this contest. No previous tries will be counted for awards.
- 9. All tractors must be weighed on fairground scales. Weight is to include the operator.
- 10. The winner of the previous class may add weight to correspond to the next class.
- 11. No portion of the tractor may interfere with the boat.
- 12. All weight must be safely secured to the tractor and must not move rearward while pulling.
- 13. All tractors must have a rigid seat and tip seats must be secured while pulling.
- 14. The Fair strongly recommends the use of stabilizer bars.
- 15. Operators will use all due consideration for the safety of other operators, track crew, and spectators and remain in the seat at all times. No operator shall allow their tractor to continue spinning after the boat has stopped and they have been signaled by an official.
- 16. The rules and classes are subject to change. Any changes will be announced before the contest starts.
- 17. All four tires must remain on pad while pulling.
- 18. The drawbar hole must be easily accessible to hookup. The hole size is to be no smaller than 1 1/4 inches.
- 19. Any loss of liquid on the pulling surface or loss of weights or safety equipment may be cause for disqualification.

Each operator will have to pick up and move 4 items from one side of machine to the other side placing the items into designated areas and then return the items back to original area, while only using the bucket. No thumb use will be allowed. Sign up at tractor pull ring on Saturday.

### <u>Rules</u>

- 1. Use safe practices at all times
- 2. Make sure controls are how you need them before starting
- Judge will check with operator and make sure they are ready to go. Time starts on signal and finishes when last item placed back in starting position
- 4. All items will be placed in starting position before Operator begins
- 5. Items must be picked-up and moved using only the bucket as no use of thumb allowed
- 6. If judges deem you are being unsafe you will be Disqualified
- 7. Two timers will be used with average of both times being the official time
- 8. Judges decisions are final
- 9. All operators must sign a release form before being able to compete No Exemptions
- 10. Must have 1 year experience running an Excavator

### Penalties

- 1. Using Thumb = Disqualified
- 2. Not placing items into proper areas =1 minute per item
- 3. Having to track machine from original location = 1 minute
- 4. Unable to Finish in a reasonable time = Disqualified
- 5.Spilling water = 1 minute

### SHUCKING COMPETITION HELD SATURDAY @ 4PM

#### **Divisions**

- 1. Professional
- 2. Non-professional
- <u>Classes</u>
- A. Littlenecks
- B. Oysters

#### Preregistration is not required.

#### Rules:

- 1. All rulings by judges are final.
- 2. Shuckers may wear gloves, use their own knives and carry an extra knife for use in case the first breaks.
- 3. Each contestant will receive the same amount of oysters that will be randomly selected by the judges. Four of oysters may be exchanged by the shuckers if I they don't like the look.
- 4. The shuckers may arrange the oysters in front of him/her for the event.
- 5. Time-keepers from the audience and/or the judges will keep track of each shucker's time of completion. At the start of the event the Judges will yell "Go!", initiating the start of the event.
- 6. When a contestant has finished shucking and is satisfied with his/her arrangement of the shucked oysters, he/she will raise their hands and the timekeepers will stop their stopwatches.
- 7. The shuckers may not touch their trays after they have signaled completion.

**Note:** <u>**Presentation is of utmost importance**</u>. An appetizing arrangement is rewarded over a "sloppy" or "hacked" presentation.

PENALTIES: Judges will add seconds of time accordingly:

#### Three (3) second penalties

An oyster is not completely severed from the shell.

An oyster presented on a broken shell (No penalty if placed on the top shell).

An oyster presented with grit, blood or other foreign substances.

An oyster is cut.


An oyster is not placed properly in its shell.

#### Twenty (20) second penalty

An oyster is missing from the shell or plate.

**BONUS:** Judges may (optionally) award a bonus reduction of ten (10) seconds as an award for the tray whose presentation is deemed outstanding.

# The Judges will then declare the winner by the shucker with the fastest time, including all penalties and bonuses.



# COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues (M.G.L.C.128 ss214D, 14E, 44 and 330 CMR 4.03, 4.07, 16.03), all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance of the fair.

#### 2023 ANIMAL HEALTH RULES FOR FAIRS AND SHOWS

NO animal will be admitted to the fairgrounds unless it meets the requirements below. NO animal is to be unloaded or enter a barn or tie-out stall until the animal and its paperwork have been inspected and approved for entry.

#### A. General Rules for All Animals: See M.G.L. c. 128 §2C, 129 §2

- All animals must be in proper physical condition, be properly identified and free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease at time of arrival. Specific diseases and conditions which will disqualify an animal for entry are identified for each species in the following sections of the rules. Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.
- 2. Evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in the animal's rejection for entry. THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION IS FINAL.
- 3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly-licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 4. Official ID: See Final Rule: Summary of Traceability for Livestock Moved Interstate (Summary of general requirements by species) All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved for the species, e.g., official metal ear tag, tattoo, scrapie tag, or microchip. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification.
- 5. Health Certificates: -- One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (CT, \*ME, MA, \*\*NH, RI, and \*\*\*VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved. Note that \*ME, \*\*NH, and \*\*\*VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter period of time and may have additional language, movement and permit requirements

# For the 2023 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have official certificates of veterinary inspection (OCVIs) that meet the following requirements:

a. MA, and RI: OCVIs issued on or after January 1, 2023 may be used for those

animals being shown at multiple fairs and shows in CT, MA, and RI through the 2023 show/fair season ending October 31, 2023.

- i. CT and ME: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture (860-713-2504) or ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits or questions.
- ii. MA -Note: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires a CVI issued within the prior 30 days for all horses entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition.
- iii. NH: \* \* NH: To qualify for the extended CVI, animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after April 1, 2022 to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31. The extended CVI is not available for animals that do not reside in New England. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for details and permits.
- iv. \*\*\*VT: Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802-828-2421) for specific import requirements that deviate from the general information in this letter and must be met for legal import of livestock.
- b. A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited. MA animals being shown ONLY in MA may substitute a signed, dated latter on the letterhead of an accredited veterinarian for an OCVI if all required information is included and all additional requirements are met.
- c. Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- d. An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
  - i. A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show. ii.
  - ii. That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
- e. The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the "destination" on the OCVI form. In addition, "See attached list" or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- f. Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were actually on the show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- g. Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2022 for health reasons it must have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30

days of the next interstate movement.

h. Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

#### B. Cattle: See M.G.L. c. 129 §§2, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

- TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795). All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox and open or draining wounds.
- 2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated for rabies.
- Note: The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle entering the Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2022. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact fair office with questions.

#### C. Poultry: See M.G.L. c. §§2, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02.

- 1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
- 2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.
- 3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date. 4.
- 4. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.
- 5. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2023 shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out of state exhibitors.
- 6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty days of the fair will be admitted.

# D. Goats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- 1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals.
- 2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds. All goats must also be free of sore mouth and scrapie exposure.
- 3. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of

any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363- 2290.

# E. Camelids (Llamas, Alpacas, etc.): See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, M.G. I. c. 131, §23,321 CMR 9.02.

- TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795).
- All Camelids originating from outside the Commonwealth are required to be tested for Blue Tongue. Exception: Animals from a USDA declared "Low Incident State" are exempt. New England and New York are low incident states.
- 3. All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds.

#### F. Swine: See M.G.L. c. 129 §14E, 330 CMR 11.04(2), 9 CFR 71.19

- 1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
- 2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, manage and open or draining wounds.
- 3. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.
- 4. No person shall import into Massachusetts swine from Stage I or Stage II Pseudorabies States.
- All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or monitored herds in qualified pseudorabies free States only. The pseudorabies status of the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state.

#### G. Sheep: See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- 1. No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous eighteen months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.
- No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which soremouth has existed or in which soremouth Vaccine has been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
- 3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, sore mouth, pink eye,

ringworm, and open and draining wounds. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

#### H. Equine: M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C, 44 , 330 CMR 16.05.

- 1. All equines entering a Massachusetts fairground must have a valid health certificate. Note: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires a CVI issued within the prior 30 days for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition.
- 2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.
- 3. All equines originating from within and outside of the Commonwealth must have a negative USDA□approved EIA test (i.e., Coggins test or ELISA test) dated within twelve months of entry.
- 4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and WNV within one year of the fair.

#### I. Rabbits: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2

Rabbits must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: rabbit hemorrhagic Disease Virus 2 (RHDV2), snuffles, wet tail, and skin and ear infections. Microchips may be used for ID in rabbits originating in MA.

#### J. Dogs and Cats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §39G

- 1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm and mange.
- 2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies.

- 3. Entries entered in the "Other" Category must be identified.
- 4. **All Non-perishable Hall entries** must be brought to the Agricultural Hall between 10AM and 5PM on Wednesday August 16, 2023. Preserving is considered Non-perishable.
- 5. **ALL JUNIOR entries** MUST be brought to the Hall on Wednesday, August 16, 2023 between 10AM and 5PM.
- 6. Adult Perishable Entries may be brought on Wednesday, August 16, 2023 between 10AM and 5PM or before 8:30AM on Thursday, August 17, 2023.
- 7. **All Eggs and Butter** should be brought to the Hall by 9AM on Friday August 18, 2023.
- 8. **All Animals and Poultry** should be brought in between 3-7PM on Wednesday or 7-9AM on Thursday. Animals leaving before 4PM Sunday forfeit any prize money which they might receive unless arrangements are made with the Barn Manager.
- 9. **PETS** Register with the Pet Show Committee at the stage on Friday August 18th. Show starts at 3:00PM.
- 10. Exhibits may be accompanied by descriptive information, but the exhibitor's name must not appear until after the judging. The Society provides a tag for all Hall exhibits, with information to assist in judging. This tag must be firmly attached to the exhibit by the exhibitor.





## ENDANGERED OR RARE WILDFLOWERS OF MARTHA'S VINEYARD

## NOT TO BE PICKED OR UPROOTED

The Martha's Vineyard Garden Club has provided us with the following list of wildflowers which are in special need of conservation on the island. These flowers are uncommon or considered threatened by reason of their susceptibility to picking, digging or disturbance of their habitat. Some are listed by the MassWildlife Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) as endangered, threatened or of special concern, and as such are officially protected. Do not pick any flower without being certain of its identity.

#### Summer Flowers

<u>Bushy Rockrose</u> - yellow - Crocanthemum dumosum - Dry, sandy plains <u>Butterfly Weed</u> - orange - Asclepias tuberosa - Dry, open fields <u>Cardinal Flower</u> - red - Lobelia cardinalis - Stream banks, damp meadows <u>False Foxgloves</u> - yellow -Aureolaria ssp. - Dry, sandy areas, roadsides <u>False Solomon's-Seal</u> - Maianthemum racemosum - white - Shaded roadsides, edges of clearings

Gerardias - pink/purple

1.Purple gerardia - Agalinis spp. - Moist meadows and bogs 2.Seaside gerardia - A. maritima - Salt marshes

<u>Goat's Rye</u> - yellow/pink - Tephrosia virginiana - Dry, sandy clearings <u>Hairy Solomon's-Seal</u> - Polygonatum pubescens - white - Mesic, shady roadsides

#### Lilies - orange

1.Wood lily - Lilium philadelphicum - Dry, thickets, fields

2.Turk's cap lily - L. superbum - Damp meadows, edges of woods <u>Northern Blazing Star</u> - bright pink - Liatris novae-angliae - Dry, sandy fields <u>Orchids</u> - All orchids including Pink Ladies Slipper

<u>Pink tickseed</u> - Coreopsis rosea - pink - Wet meadows, pond edges <u>Sandplain blue-eyed grass</u> - blue - Sisyrinchium fuscatum - Sandy, open fields <u>Sandplain Flax</u> - yellow - Linum intercursum - Sandy, open fields <u>Scotch lovage</u> - Ligustum scoticum - white - Sandy or rocky shorelines <u>Seedbox</u> - Ludwigia alternifolia - yellow - Wet meadows <u>Swamp Azalea</u> - white/pink - Rhododendron viscosum - Swamps, wet thickets


#### Evergreen Plants

<u>Broom Crowberry</u> - Corema Conradii - exposed hillsides <u>Ground Pine</u> - Dendrolycopodium species - woods and clearings <u>Pipsissewa</u> - Chimaphila umbellata - dry woods

#### PICKING WILDFLOWERS

NEVER pick all the flowers in bloom in one area. Leave more than half the flowers to make seeds for next year. Use scissors or a knife so you do not disturb the roots.
