CURIOUS CONVERSATIONS VS POLARIZATION

We hear you. Your concern about polarization. Asking if we're capable of having honest, curious conversations about contentious topics? Do we know how? Can we talk about policy, politics, police or—egad!—the color of our skin?

"Depolarizing Conversations About Race" is a workshop designed for those who want to develop more skills for listening to others and expressing their own views about race and racism in ways that lead to more productive conversations, even when vast differences exist. This workshop seeks to improve the 'culture of conversations' around race and provide constructive alternatives to polarized and judgmental exchanges that dominate current conversations.

AgForestry has partnered with Braver Angels, an organization that works to "bring Americans together to bridge the partisan divide and strengthen our democratic republic". This workshop will focus on race, but the skills apply to any polarized conversation, if you take this workshop, you will be:

More skilled in expressing views in a way that the other person can hear you
Better at listening to people who have differing views on race, and related public policy, so they feel heard
More able to find common ground when it is present

<u>CLASS 42 DONATES IN PUERTO RICO; BRIAN AND DONNA</u> LOUCKS MATCH FUNDS

Class 42 is donating over \$2,000 to Siempre Vivas in Puerto Rico with the help of matching funds from Brian (Class 7) and Donna Loucks.

Puerto Rico has the highest per capita rate of women murdered by their partner in the world, with an estimated 60 women murdered in 2020. Class 42 met with Siempre Vivas' founder, Dr. Luisa R. Seijo Maldonado to learn the group provides support services for those trying to leave abusive relationships as well as support for children from abusive homes trying to break the cycle. Siempre Vivas is a local, grass roots organization.

After hearing powerful stories of gender violence and the work Siempre Vivas is doing to change the future, Class 42 was inspired to provide a donation that will make a meaningful difference in the work the organization is able to do.
