Coragulac House is a 30 room bluestone homestead lovingly restored by Sharyn and Garry Gibson. The highlight being the "secret" men's room through a hidden door, opening up into a magnificent billiard room with raised timber panelled roof with wonderful stained glass windows. Council Hardship Policy updated

Surf Coast Shire

Council has updated its Hardship Policy to assist community members having difficulty paying Council rates, fees and charges.

The policy outlines Council's approach including:

- more options for relief applications, to make accessing support easier;
- Council will proactively identify ratepayers and service users experiencing hardship and assist them in understanding the relief application process;
- interest will only be charged on overdue rates and charges, not the subject of a relief measure;
- a detailed review process for people dissatisfied with a decision made under the policy;
- family violence and economic violence clauses relating to confidentiality and under the financial hardship definition:
- Council will provide contact details for external support providers to ratepayers experiencing hardship.

Relief measures available under the policy include payment plans, deferred payments, waivers on interest and/or default costs, and in particular circumstances, partial or full waivers on rates and charges.

Ratepayers having difficulty paying rates, fees or charges are encouraged to reach out for a confidential discussion by calling 5261 0600 or emailing info@surfcoast.vic.gov.au.





Protecting our forests with help of Al

Charles Darwin University

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is the newest tool to prevent depletion and degradation of forests, revealing how technology can help protect the ecosystem.

Charles Darwin University (CDU) collaborated on a study led by the University of Sri Lanka, to develop an AI model which detects changes in the amount of land surface covered by trees.



The custom Al model was fed a dataset of images from Google Earth and was able to detect forest cover changes with an accuracy of 94.37%.

Change Detection for Forest Ecosystems Using Remote Sensing Images

Associate Professor in IT Bharanidharan Shanmugam said, "Traditional methods struggle with accuracy. Manual interpretation is time-consuming and prone to errors. Our research provides a tool for governments, environmental agencies and conservationists to monitor deforestation more effectively. It enables rapid analysis of satellite images, allowing authorities to identify high-risk areas and respond to deforestation before irreversible damage occurs.

Winchelsea Land and Rivercare Monthly Working Bee

The Landcare working bee on Saturday morning saw eleven people out and about in the sunshine keen to assist with the landcare aim of protecting our environment. While Jane and Kerry did the monthly test of the river water, the rest headed out to Buckley School Road to do some removal of Bridal Creeper.

A native of South Africa this creeper is highly invasive and aggressive, it smothers trees and shrubs. Bridal Creeper can form large mats on the ground and large masses in the canopy of trees. It is listed as a 'Weed of National Significance' - one of the 20 worst weeds in Australia and is a declared Noxious weed across Victoria. It has the potential to spread widely and cause serious economic loss to agriculture or have some detrimental effect on animals, the environment or the local community. Bridal Creeper grows rapidly in autumn/winter and dies back to the roots over summer. The leaves are bright green to 3cm long, broad and round at the base, coming to a point at the tip (similar to Wandering Trad). Stems are thin (like a dress pin) and wiry. A round green berry develops after the white flowers, ripening to red. It grows in drier areas such as ridges or open grassy forest and paddocks. Often found in farm windbreaks where the seed is dropped by birds complete with fertiliser.

Bridal Creeper grows from fibrous roots which have storage tubers - these must be dug out for best results. The above ground portion of the plant can be cut and left to die - this should be done before it fruits. The roots must be dug out and disposed of carefully.

The photo shows what we found; one long thin shoot which 'gave away' the location of the large underground root system. Growth probably stimulated by the 40mm from thunderstorm that came through Winchelsea in March. Careful digging was needed to get all the roots and 2 bags were filled and taken away.

Surf Coast Council to cease buying carbon offsets and focus on local action to reduce emissions

Surf Coast Shire Council is moving away from a reliance on paid accredited carbon offsets toward more direct measurable actions that reduce emissions locally.

"Best practice has changed and so must we," Cr Leon Walker said.

From 30 June 2025, Council will align its Climate Emergency Response Plan 2021-2031 with evolving best practice by ceasing to be a certified carbon neutral organisation.

Funds previously used to purchase non-local offsets will be re-directed to initiatives that reduce the organisation's emissions and support the development of local carbon abatement projects with environmental, social and/or economic co-benefits.

"We remain as committed as ever to reducing organisational emissions and to tackling the climate emergency. "We're focused on reaching our target of zero emissions from all operations, excluding Anglesea landfill, by 30 June 2030," Cr Walker said.

Cr Walker said there were growing concerns about the credibility of carbon neutral claims, and procuring quality approved offsets is challenged by availability and cost.

"Many other councils and organisations are looking to reduce their emissions and invest in projects with local benefits that promote biodiversity and capture carbon, rather than buying cheaper international offsets to cover their entire emissions."

Anglesea Landfill is Council's biggest emission source, accounting for 70 to 85 per cent of corporate emissions. Landfill emissions can't be eliminated as existing organic material deposited over the life of the landfill operation will continue to emit 'legacy' emissions for over 20 years.

Council plans to reduce organisational emissions by:

- Switching its facilities from gas to electric.
- · Switching its light fleet of Council vehicles to all electric.
- Replacing appliances that use high global warming potential refrigerants.

Council has reduced its non-landfill corporate emissions by 41 per cent since 2021, which includes:

- Converting all Council operations to 100 per cent renewable electricity, through the Victorian energy collaboration.
- Installing 784kw solar 92kw battery storage on Council facilities.
- · Transitioning street lighting to LED.
- Introducing FOGO (food and garden organics) residential waste collection to divert organic material from landfill.

An organisational Emissions Reduction Strategy will be developed for Council's consideration in 2026 following the development of the Council Plan this year.

"We will continue to monitor and review what's going to deliver the best results so we can lead the way to achieve a true cleaner, greener future," Cr Walker said.

Council adopts Urban Futures sustainable growth strategy

Surf Coast Shire

A new Urban Futures Strategy will guide sustainable urban growth in Surf Coast Shire across coming decades.

Surf Coast Shire Council resolved to adopt the strategy at its April meeting, putting in place a clear policy framework defining the future roles of towns to guide land use planning.

The strategy has been prepared during the past few years. shaped by community and stakeholder feedback along with expert technical assessments of forecast population and housing growth to 2051.

It aligns with Victorian Government and regional planning policy directions including the government's housing target of 8,000 additional dwellings to be provided in the shire by 2051.

Research and forecasting undertaken by population and growth projection experts in the development of the strategy consider this target achievable, with capacity for the majority of future dwellings being shared across Torquay and Winchelsea using greenfield and in-fill development opportunities.

The strategy affirms Torquay and Winchelsea as the two principal locations for long-term growth due to constraints on other coastal and rural towns in the shire.

It is recognised that growth outside of established towns and settlements is associated with higher infrastructure costs and potential impacts on the environment and agriculture. In line with Victorian Government policy direction, the strategy supports growth within established townships.

The strategy includes a direction for Council to prepare a comprehensive Place Plan for Winchelsea in collaboration with the community, determining the appropriate level and locations of growth for the town, as well as further strategic work planning for growth in Torquay within the town's protected settlement boundary.

Draft 2025-26 Council Budget and Draft 2025-29 Revenue and Rating Plan available for community feedback

Surf Coast Shire

Surf Coast Shire Council has released its Draft 2025-26 Budget and Draft 2025-29 Revenue and Rating Plan for community feedback.

The draft budget aims to balance financial sustainability with continued investment in important community facilities and services. It features a forecast result (Unallocated Cash Surplus) of \$2.2 million, and a record capital works program to deliver new and renewed assets.

The proposed total capital works budget of \$64.25 million includes planned multi-year projects worth \$49.14 million such as the Wurdi Baierr Aquatic and Recreation Centre, hockey pitch at Banyul Warri Fields, and Karaaf Diversion project, along with new projects valued at \$15.11 million.

There is strong focus and investment in roads and pathways. alongside new and renewed community buildings, facilities and open spaces.

Highlights of the proposed new capital allocation include:

- A major irrigation and drainage upgrade to the oval at Spring Creek Recreation Reserve, Torquay (\$2.55 million);
- upgrade of Gladman Street, Winchelsea to become a sealed road (\$757,064);
- unsealed road renewals on Bambra-Aireys Inlet Road (\$386,000), Eagle Rock Parade in Aireys Inlet (\$97,000) and Pettavel Road in Freshwater Creek (\$152,000); and
- renewal of Cape Otway Road from Dysons Lane to Parish Lane, near Moriac (\$200,000)

The draft budget also details the Council's commitments to core services such as open space, civil and road maintenance (with a total budget of more than \$14.3 million), waste and recycling services (\$13.06 million), early years (\$4.53 million), and local libraries (\$850,500 contribution to the Geelong Regional Library Corporation).

Specific initiatives have been funded to help protect and enhance the natural environment, generate economic activity, support community-led projects, and keep the community safe. These include:

- \$160,000 for year two of the 'Branching Out' urban tree planting program;
- \$148,600 for community grants;
- \$87,000 for Christmas decorations and activations; and
- \$64,600 to Life Saving Victoria towards lifeguards on Surf Coast beaches.

The draft budget factors in a total average rate rise of 3 per cent, which is in line with the Victorian Government's cap.

Mayor Mike Bodsworth encouraged the community to read the budget and have its say. "The budget is a document full of numbers but it's about much more than numbers - it's about the lives of the people in our shire," Mayor Bodsworth said."It sets out how and where we'll invest to support our community and see this region thrive in the years ahead.

It is the final budget under the 2021-2025 Council Plan, and will transition Council into a new four-year plan set to feature a refreshed set of strategic priorities.



history of winchelsea

Buntingdale Mission 1836-1850

Rev' Francis Tuckfield on behalf of The Wesleyan Missionary Society established the first Victorian mission in 1836 with a view to protecting Aboriginal people from the effects of colonisation. The site for the mission was selected at Buntingdale near Birregurra with the assistance of Wadawurrung trackers. Other missions and reserves soon followed, and many were run as successful tourism or agricultural enterprises, largely due to the skills and labour of their Aboriginal residents.

As the mission system grew, tensions also grew between pastoralists such as James Dawson of Kangatong or John Allan of Allansford, who wanted to protect Aboriginal people on country without a mission system, pastoralists who wanted to move Aboriginal people off country to missions and concentration centres, and pastoralists who wanted to wipe out Aboriginal people altogether by use of force. The pastoralists demanded more land for agricultural pursuits, and some saw the mission system as a threat to their interests. George Armytage of Ingleby, in Winchelsea wrote to Lieutenant Charles La Trobe on behalf of himself and his neighbouring pastoral squatters complaining that it was unfair that "their land" was being taken from them by Aboriginal people. The Irony of this complaint coming from squatters during the early stages of colonialism where Aboriginal men, women and babies were being physically harmed and entire communities forcibly removed from country is palpable.

A letter to the editor of the Age (Melbourne), on 29 August 1939, signed of as 'The words of A Bushman' describes the esteem with which the Gulidjan men from Buntingdale were held at the docks of Geelong.

'A Bushman' describes two incidents as an illustration of the virtue and work ethic of the Gulidjan men from Buntingdale. One where the Gulidjan dray team transporting wool from Buntingdale to the docks in Geelong rescued a drunk driver of a loaded dray belonging to a Colac settler. The Gulidjan men took it and its drunk driver in charge, driving' it with their own team to Geelong.

In the second incident, 'A bushman' reports that a Gulidjan man was driving the mission wool drays to Geelong with a white colleague. The white man met an acquaintance and was invited for a rum, when his Guidjan colleague reprimanded him, saying "borac [Never] you gegue public house to drink, while wool quamby [forever] dray... borac [never] me take it your bullocks, you come barley and mind your own work till wool quamby [forever] store, then gegue and drink it rum with white fellow." This remonstrance by the Guidjan man had its desired effect. The white man declined drinking with his friend and proceeded with the Guidjan man to deliver his load.

According to 'A Bushman' when a group of Gulidjan people from Buntingdale mission gathered for church in Geelong, they were noted for their neat presentation and nice behaviour. 'A Bushman' lists some of the names of the 'native youths' of Buntingdale at the time. Mrs Tuckfield worked closely with the Gulidjan women in the "'miamis"-, washing and cutting their hair, and administering medicines and other comforts, helping them dress for church and teaching them about her religion.

'A Bushman' vocally supports the mission system and opposes squatters who criticise it. 'A Bushman' offers a detailed description of some of the atrocities committed against Aboriginal people, (too graphic to recount here) as evidence of the need for the mission. Port Phillip's Indigenous population was rapidly declining. The squatters believed that the mission was exacerbating traditional tribal tensions between Wadawurrung and Gulidjan people, and Tuckfield complained that he was having difficulty converting Indigenous adults to his religion. The government, who were largely represented by pastoral squatters with vested interests, thus decided that the mission was a failure and cancelled his pastoral licence, which allowed the mission to exist, at the end of 1850. Wadawurrung and Gulidjan people continued to be employed on local Pastoral stations for generations thereafter.

St Vincent de Paul Society Australia looks forward to working with the new Government in supporting struggling Australians, particularly the 1.3 million people living under the poverty line.

'We acknowledge the government has implemented more social and affordable housing, increased JobSeeker by \$40 per fortnight, upped Rent Assistance, expanded eligibility for Parenting Payment Single until youngest child turns 14, boosted the Urgent Care Clinics program and proposed a cap on PBS medicines.

"But more needs to be done," said the Society's President, Mark Gaetani.

"We are concerned about the inadequacy of JobSeeker, well below pension rate. A Foodbank study shows 3.4 million households ran out of food this year. Onein-six children is living in poverty."

The cost-of-living crisis impacts disproportionately on people with low incomes. The Economic Inclusion Advisory Committee called these payments "seriously inadequate".

Mr Gaetani said the housing rental market needs urgent attention. One in three Australians are renters, and too many are in insecure and unaffordable housing.

Other policy areas deserving attention are the wellbeing of First Nations Australians, and the treatment of asylum seekers and refugees."

Know your rights as renters Victorian Government

The Government is urging renters to know and understand their rights - as part of an awareness campaign that is now live across Victorias. The 'Know the Fundarentals' campaign highlights the important things Victorians needed to know about renting, and where they could go for advice and support.

The campaign shares tips on the top issues facing renters, such as getting urgent repairs, properties not meeting minimum standards, rent increases, and renters not being clear on their rights before signing a rental agreement.

Most real estate agents and rental providers want to do the right thing and this campaign is also designed to help them understand and comply with their legal obligations.

Victoria has the strongest rental laws in Australia, with more than 130 rental reforms introduced in 2021, and further reforms coming into effect at the end of this year. These aim to close loopholes that drive up cost of living for renters and give them more certainty regarding their leases and living standards.

More people are renting than ever before. In 2024, around two million Victorians were living in a rental property. Everyone deserves the right to feel at home in their rental property.

A renting taskforce was set up last year to put the spotlight on rental laws and crack down on offences, including rental bidding, false advertising, failing to lodge bonds and renting out properties that do not meet minimum standards.

The renting taskforce has issued more than 70 infringements worth more than \$620,000 in fines since starting its operations last year.

People are encouraged to contact Consumer Affairs Victoria if they have concerns about misleading advertising of a rental property, terminations of rental agreements or notices to vacate.

The campaign has started rolling out across multiple channels, including social media, digital banners and out of home advertisements around Victoria, including billboards and digital displays in universities.

Take Note! Road Rule79A is about to be expanded

RACV

Victorians will soon slow down when passing any incident response vehicle.

RACV has welcomed the Victorian Government's announcement today that Road Rule 79A will be expanded to protect emergency roadside workers, tow truck drivers, and their customers.

Makarla Cole, RACV GM of Automotive Services, said, "Since 2017, drivers on Victorian roads have had to slow down to 40 kms per hour when passing emergency services vehicles at the side of the road. "For the past two years, RACV has called on the Government to include roadside assistance vans, such as RACV patrol vans, and tow trucks in this rule.

"From July 1, 2025, Road Rule 79A will be extended to include accident towing, breakdown towing, roadside assistance, Peninsula Link Incident Response, Eastlink Incident Response and Transurban Incident Response vehicles.

"Victoria's emergency roadside workers and tow truck drivers are often the first and only responders to an incident or breakdown and are exposed to the same risks to other responders, such as police and paramedics.

"I am sure every driver who has needed the help of an emergency roadside assistance worker or tow truck driver will be pleased to know that the Victorian Government is now protecting these essential responders in their workplace, and their customers."

Consider your password habits this World Password Day

The Government is reminding Victorians to review their passwords and protect themselves from cyber threats.

Visit the Service Victoria website and use the password strength tester to make sure you have a strong password.

60% Victorians are still using weak passwords. A cybercriminal can hack a weak password in minutes, but a strong password could take centuries.

The Government advises Victorians to activate multi-factor authentication (MFA) on their devices to protect themselves. This makes it harder for someone to get into your accounts - even if they steal your passwords.

Victorians lost more than \$42 million to cyber scams last year, with only one in three Victorians using MFA to protect their accounts.

Strong passwords can protect bank details, online records, private documents, online communications, social media accounts, and other information shared online.

Victorians are encouraged to update their password to a passphrase, which is long and contains four or more random words.

Other ways to build a strong and safe password include making it unpredictable without any sequences or personal information and making it unique by using different passwords for different accounts.



Groundbreaking dental pilot paves way for nationwide rollout for a national dental scheme for seniors

A first of a kind dental pilot project which has seen improvements in participants' oral health could be the blueprint for a government seniors' dental scheme.

The Maroubra Seniors Dental Benefits Schedule Pilot tackled the oral health of 70 Eastern Sydney seniors with a chronic disease and socioeconomic disadvantage, from Nov 2024 to March 2025. Dentists provided dental treatment, with advice and information to improve oral health and reduce the risk from dental disease on the rest of the body.

The University of Sydney's Faculty of Medicine and Health then evaluated the effects of the treatment on the participants' dental and overall health. They found improvements in oral health, particularly in the management of tooth decay, gum disease, and provision of prosthodontic care.

"Participants commented on the dental health education they received to clean and floss more and see their dentist more often. These improved oral habits will have a beneficial effect on their chronic health condition," said ADA President Chris Sanzaro.

"The results of the four-month pilot show that this scheme is a valuable blueprint for similar pilots to be rolled out around the country and inform the construction of a Seniors Dental Benefits Schedule (SDBS) down the track."

The program's holistic approach supported both treatment and behaviour change, potentially reducing further tooth loss and improving oral health.

Patients reported better-fitting dentures, improved confidence and a greater understanding of oral hygiene practices, while all untreated tooth decay, a major problem in this cohort, was successfully managed and prevented from progressing to more severe disease. Prosthodontic and restorative services delivered involved multiple appointments and procedures, reflecting seniors' complex oral rehabilitation needs.

Welcoming the next generation of Victorian ambos

Victorian Government

The next generation of Ambulance Victoria recruits will hit the road later this month. Following three years of full-time study – practical simulations, coursework, and clinical placements – the graduates are well-prepared.

20 graduates will now begin the bridging program as Medium Acuity Transport Service (MATS) paramedics, six in Melbourne and 14 across Barwon South, Gippsland, Grampians, Loddon Mallee and Hume. The 16 monthbridging program provides graduates the opportunity to work with Code Two and Code Three patients.

The current intake of graduates will be followed by 30 additional graduate paramedics starting at the end of May.

Paramedics are getting the training and skills they need to deliver increasingly specialised levels of care, with 2022 election commitments to deliver Australia's first Paramedic Practitioners and more MICA paramedics.

These investments are as important as ever, with the latest quarterly performance data revealing Victorian paramedics responded to nearly 100,000 Code One cases this quarter, or around 1,100 lights and sirens cases daily.

This is more than 3,000 additional Code One incidents than at the same quarter last year – an increase of 1.5 per cent year-to-date on what was Ambulance Victoria's busiest year on record.

More mental health support for workers

Victorian State Government

Workers now have access to a Worker Mental Health Support Helpline counselling service to help improve their health and wellbeing and prevent work-related mental injuries. It provides services similar to an Employee Assistance Program, and is available for workers in small and medium-sized businesses.

Workers using the free and confidential service will be supported by trained counsellors to address issues such as work-related stress and burnout before they lead to an injury that might need medical treatment or time off work.

Work-related mental injuries currently make up 18 percent of all workers compensation claims in Victoria.

TELUS Health will target industries at high-risk for workplace mental injury such as healthcare and social assistance, education and training, and manufacturing and construction.

Eligible workers can access to up to four sessions each of free and confidential 24/7 support via telehealth or online by calling 1800 318 421.
