The Ministry of Health and Human Services is warning that a plume of Sahara Dust is entering the region and could cause poor air quality.

According to the Ministry of Health, as the phenomenon of Saharan dust continues to impact air quality, the plume is travelling westward across the tropical Atlantic approaching the eastern Caribbean.

The Caribbean Institute for Meteorology and Hydrology (CIMH) in a Dust Bulletin dated February 9th, 2024 stated, "it is highly likely that particulate matter levels will be above the 24-hour outdoor air quality guidelines" as established by the World Health Organization (WHO) and cautions the public about the potential health hazards associated with increased levels of particulate matter in the air.

"The Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) underscores the risks posed by Saharan dust, particularly to vulnerable populations such as small children, older adults, and individuals with underlying lung conditions and chronic cardiopulmonary disease. Dr Joy St John, Executive Director, CARPHA reiterated that "saharan dust can also worsen the health symptoms of those who suffer from asthma, allergies and

chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)".


The dust also can increase the risk of water-borne disease and cause skin and eye irritation.

Considering these health risks, it is imperative for individuals to take proactive measures to minimize exposure to Saharan dust. Here are some recommended strategies:

1. Stay Indoors: Limit outdoor activities, especially during periods of high Saharan dust levels. Keep windows and doors closed to reduce the influx of dust particles indoors.
2. Wear Masks: If outdoor activity cannot be avoided, wearing masks rated for particulate matter can help reduce inhalation of dust particles. E.g. KN95 mask
3. Use Air Purifiers: Consider using air purifiers with HEPA filters to help remove particulate matter from indoor air.
4. Monitor Air Quality: Stay informed about air quality levels in your area through local news sources or air quality monitoring websites/apps. Adjust your activities accordingly when air quality is poor.
5. Stay Hydrated: Drink plenty of water to help your body flush out any toxins or irritants that may have been inhaled.
6. Seek Medical Advice: Individuals with pre-existing respiratory conditions should consult their healthcare providers for personalized recommendations on managing exposure to Saharan dust. Persons who use respiratory condition medications should always carry them as prescribed. At the first sign of difficulty breathing, seek professional medical advice immediately. For less severe symptoms, standard allergy medications such as antihistamines and steroid nasal sprays may alleviate symptoms. By implementing these precautions, individuals can reduce their risk of adverse health effects associated with Saharan dust. Sargassum A Threat To Tourism

The invasion of Sargassum in the Turks and Caicos Islands is potential threat to tourism, therefore, immediate measures should be taken to manage the seaweed, this according to Minister of Tourism and Environment Hon. Josephine Connolly.

Speaking at the Sargassum Mitigation Strategies and Adaptations Workshop at theConference Room, Connolly highlighted that in addition to environmental toll, sargassum poses a severe threat to the driver of the economy, which is tourism.

Sargassum has been described by NOAA as a genus of large brown seaweed (a type of algae) that floats in island-like masses and never attaches to the seafloor.

The workshop saw several persons making presentations, including Dr. Janice Cumberbatch of the University of the West Indies, Cave Hill, Barbados, and Dr. Thierry Tonon of the University of York, United Kingdom.

The tourism minister declared that tackling Sargassum is of utmost importance, given that the Turks and Caicos Islands is predominantly marine-based.

"With more marine space than land and being entirely surrounded by water, it's imperative that marine management challenges like sargassum are given top priority on our government's agenda," Connolly pointed out.



She added: "This led us to establish the Leroy Brooks Fisheries and Marine Laboratory in May 2023 at the DECR compound in the Lower Bight. Our vision in establishing this laboratory is to position ourselves as a leading center for marine research and management, emphasizing the importance of addressing issues such as the influx of sargassum.

"The environmental impact of sargassum cannot be overstated. These massive blooms disrupt delicate ecosystems, smothering coral reefs, and suffocating marine life. The excessive decomposition of sargassum depletes oxygen levels in coastal waters, leading to the formation of "dead zones" where aquatic life cannot thrive.

"Moreover, the sheer volume of seaweed washing ashore poses a significant challenge to

coastal ecosystems, disrupting nesting grounds for sea turtles and other vulnerable species." She added: "While we do get manageable amounts of other seaweed washing up on our shores daily, sargassum is different. The sheer amount of sargassum lining our beaches creates unsightly mats that deter tourists, tarnishing the image of our world-rated pristine beaches and, at times, creating a dilemma for our beachfront proprietors who promised white sandy beaches to customers when booking but are presented with a beach filled with sargassum upon arrival."

Connolly noted that she was encouraged by the expertise that lent themselves to the Providenciales and Grand Turks workshops on the matter of managing Sargassum.

"We can all agree that we're faced with a formidable challenge; however, I am encouraged by the presence of everyone in this room here today. Our collective presence underscores the importance of stakeholder engagement in devising effective strategies to manage sargassum

influx.

"I am a firm believer that only through collaborative efforts and shared expertise can we hope to find viable solutions to this complex issue. By bringing together government agencies, scientific institutions, industry representatives, and local communities, we can pool our resources, knowledge, and experiences to develop practical measures to mitigate the impact of sargassum.

"From innovative technologies for early detection and monitoring to sustainable management practices for seaweed removal and disposal, our collective ingenuity holds the key to overcoming this challenge.

"This spirit of collaboration and inclusivity will enable the voices of all stakeholders to be heard, and their concerns considered in the decision-making process. By working in partnership, we can turn the tide against sargassum and pave the way for a more sustainable and resilient future for generations to come," Connolly said.

Local Principals Bemoan Losing At Least 50 Former Students to Violence

"If you want to live a long and prosperous life, it is important that you make the right choices."



When the students were asked to raise their hands if any of them had lost a loved one, friend or someone they knew, approximately half of them raised their hands.

"The Turks and Caicos Islands is currently fighting a war against violent crime...a war that is attacking the youths of this country...in particular our young men," so said Deputy Governor Her Excellency Anya Williams.

Deputy Governor Williams made the statement while addressing the male population at the Louise Garland Thomas High School on Long Bay, Providenciales on Wednesday during a forum initiated by the Turks and Caicos Islands Christian Council, in the wake of a series of gun murders on Providenciales and Grand Turk.

A similar session also organized by the Christian Council took place simultaneously at the HJ Robinson High School on Grand Turk.

Deputy Governor Williams made the statement against the backdrop of murder stats obtained from the heads of the Clement Howell High School in Providenciales and the HJ Robinson High School in Grand Turk. "Earlier this week I visited the HJ Robinson High School in Grand Turk, where the principal spoke of having lost 17 former students over the last few years due to violence crimes. I visited Clement Howell (High School) before that, and the principal there has lost 37 (former students) to violence crimes," Williams revealed.

She implored the Louise Garland Thomas students to track the right path because that could save their lives.

"What I want to say to you is that we don't want to lose any more lives," Deputy Governor Williams asserted. "The choices you make are very, very important, it will determine your future. And you are indeed the future of the Turks and Caicos Islands." When Deputy Governor Williams asked the students to raise their hands if any of them had ever heard a gunshot, majority of them raised their hands. When she asked the students to raise their hands if any of them had lost a loved one, friend or someone they knew, approximately half of them raised their hands. All the students raised their hands when she asked if they wanted to live a long and prosperous life. "If you want to live a long and prosperous life, it is important that you make the right choices. It is important that you do not associate with persons that would bring you danger or bring you harm. It is important that you listen to the advice of your parents, your family, your principals, or those you know that can provide guidance to you.

"I know that many of you feel sometimes that you don't have options...you don't have persons who can provide support to you; you may not have the family life that you desire at home. You may not trust some of your teachers or your peers. But at the end of the day there are persons who care about you...they are there to support you," Deputy Governor Williams implored.

Deputy Governor Williams revealed to the students that it is difficult for someone to extricate himself from a gang after joining, and to that end, the advice is not to get entangled with such group.

"I don't want any of you here today to feel that there is no way out. But I want to say to you, if you get into gang, it's easier to enter a life of violent crime than it is to get out. So, the easiest thing is to make the decision not to. But if you found yourself entangled in a gang or any other situation, know that there are ways to get out.

"A lot of us are able to help, provide the support to you that is necessary. You are the future of the Turks and Caicos Islands. You, as young men, have to make the right choices that would allow you to take your rightful place in society. We are here to provide support for you, we care about you, and we want to make this a bright, beautiful, and safe Turks and Caicos Islands," Deputy Governor pleaded.

Members of the TCI Christian Council, including its President Wilbert Jennings, who organized the meeting, were in attendance. Also in attendance were Governor Her Excellency Dileeni Daniel Selvaratnam, Acting Commissioner of Police Christopher Eyre, and Deputy Commissioner of Police Rodney Adams.

In the meantime, Deputy Governor Williams applauded Jennings for initiating the talk with the male student body, saying that the initiative underscored his commitment for change in the country's young people.

"I want to comment pastor Jennings, who was someone that I knew from his younger years growing up on the island of Grand Turk. And he really has an amazing story. But he is someone who cares, and he is here today, and he has brought us all here, because he wants to make a change in these Turks and Caicos Islands.

The toxic nature of older colleagues in the workplace

One of the most daunting phenomena for young people in the workplace is the bitterness displayed towards them by their older colleagues.

Firstly, a history of disagreement, animosity, disdain, and victimisation pervades the world of work. The strength of these types of conflicts often filters into new decades and new work eras. Who could be the possible carriers of this history of conflicts? It is certainly not the newly employed; therefore, it has to be the older employees in the workplace.

Typically, when a colleague is newly employed he or she is usually furnished with information about former times in his or her new workplace. That person may get this information from people who choose to tell him or her directly or he or she may make inferences based on interactions among the older people in the workspace. Having ascertained that this is how the world of work operates, many young people decide to either resign, adopt similar traits, or become isolated.

For many people the psychosocial atmosphere of the workplace is fraught with toxicity. Consequently, they become withdrawn, self-serving, or misanthropic. This is a response that is natural, as even Abraham Maslow in defining the third level of his hierarchy of needs –

sense of belonging – asserted that individuals engage in hobby and profession to feel a sense of belonging. Maslow also posited that when this sense of belonging is sapped or is not felt people resort to ostracism. When individuals ostracise themselves or other people, the toxicity in the workplace is perpetuated.

This resentment can become overbearing. Why do people think many of our nurses, teachers, and corporate personnel are migrating solely for better remuneration? This is not always the reality. Many professionals, especially our talented young people, migrate to countries like the United Kingdom and the United States of America not because there will not be miserable, sad, and bitter people in those work environments but because they believe that if they are going to experience these unfortunate circumstances it is better to experience them while earning competitive remuneration. Can we blame them?

Secondly, several of these older workers are clearly jealous of the skills and enthusiasm that many young people bring to the table. Many of the older employees have not achieved half the accolades that many young people are achieving in the workplace now. Many of them wait until they are 40 to do a master's degree, for example. In fact, many did

not even complete a bachelor's degree until age 40.

If one conducts an empirical assessment of the number of young people with graduate degrees these days, one will find that, compared to 10 years ago, far more young people pocket these degrees by age 30. This is a laudatory phenomenon that provides said young people with skills that cause them to sometimes enter the workplace and surpass the older folks in a short period of time. This results in some older employees clapping their hands for the young people but with bitterness in their hearts. That is even if they care enough to at least feign the applause.

Not only that, but sometimes young people come into the workplace with so much enthusiasm that they contribute more to achieving the mission of the organisation than those who have been there for 10 or 20 years. This usually lands them warranted recognitions and promotions, which is like a dagger in the hearts of many older employees.

I invite young people and new employees to continue to be trailblazers, trendsetters, and models of excellence despite all the nays and toxicity they experience in the workplace. After all, they have higher heights to climb and a future that they need to create and sustain.



Man Found Guilty For Gun Possession



Codet was charged with sexual assault of a 51-year-old woman

A South Dock Man was found guilty of gun possession charges when he appeared in the Supreme Court on Tuesday, February 13. He is identified Jacquin Cadet 44, of South Dock Road, Providenciales. Cadet was found guilty of possession of firearm and ammunition following the guilty verdict. Cadet is expected to be sentenced on March 21. The charges against Cadet stemmed from a December 20, 2022, incident. The police reported that at about 4 a.m. Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force Officers executed what they deemed an Authority to Search for a firearm at Cadet's home.

According to the police, during the search, a black 45 calibre handgun and ammunition were found inside a closet in his bedroom. He was then arrested and charged with the offences.

Dean Holden, Superintendent in charge of the Serious Crimes Unit, responding to the conviction, declared: "Officers in the Serious Crime Unit should be proud of the hard work and professionalism executed that resulted in this conviction.

"As a police officer, it's disheartening to see yet another individual found guilty of firearm possession. Firearms in the wrong hands pose

a serious threat to public safety, and we have to ensure that those who choose to illegally possess them face consequences.

"The ramifications of firearm-related crimes extend far beyond the immediate incident, impacting communities and perpetuating a cycle of violence. Our work does not end with this conviction; we will continue our efforts to prevent illegal firearms from circulating.

60-YEAR-OLD MAN CHARGED WITH SEX CRIME


A 60-year-old man, James Codet of Grand Turk is to face the courts after being charged with sexual assault against a 51-year-old woman in North Caicos.

Police Investigate Gun Discharge in Over Back

The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force is actively investigating two reports in-

volving the discharging of firearms. At 9:25 am today, a male victim reported to

officers at the Grand Turk Police Station that while driving in Over Back, Grand Turk, someone pointed a firearm and fired a shot in his direction. The victim escaped injury.

At 7:55 pm on Monday, 12th February, the Police Control Room received a call of gunshots in Over Back Grand Turk. Officers were dispatched to the location where the scene was processed.

Based on investigations, no injuries were reported.

Commenting on both incidents, acting Commissioner of Police Christopher Eyre said: "Acts of violence have no place in our society. The RTCIPF are fully committed to bringing those responsible to justice. We are increasing patrols and implementing measures to augment the strength of officers in Grand Turk to prevent further acts of lawlessness.

"We are actively working to investigate these matters thoroughly and swiftly, and our officers are diligently following all leads and utilising all available resources to apprehend the perpetrators.

"I urge anyone with information about these incidents to come forward and assist us in our investigation. Your cooperation is crucial in helping us hold accountable those who seek to harm others."

Governor for the Turks and Caicos Islands Her Excellency Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam on Monday, February 12, sworn in Christopher Eyre as Interim Acting Commissioner of Police.

Eyre has taken over the post from Deputy Commissioner of Police Rodney Adams, who assumed the role in the twilight of 2023, when former Commissioner of Police Trevor Botting demitted office.

A commissioner of police for these islands has already been appointed in the person of Edvin Martin, former commissioner of police for Grenada. Martin was scheduled to take up the reins of the local police force in February, but he will now assume the role in May.

The oath of Eyre's swearing-in ceremony was administered by Governor Daniel-Selvaratnam at the Police Headquarters, Airport Road, Providenciales, and witnessed by the Deputy Commissioner of Police Rodney Adams, Assistant Commissioners of Police Kendall Grant, Darron Williams and Mat Newton.

Superintendents of Police Dwight Gardiner and Willet Harvey were also present. Following the brief ceremony, acting Commissioner Eyre met with the officers of Division B at the Ethel Ingham Centre.

Acting Commissioner Eyre expressed his gratitude for the opportunity to lead the Force temporarily and vowed to work tirelessly to ensure the well-being and safety of all within the TCI.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to lead and serve," he was quoted as saying. "I look forward to collaborating with the Force Executive and community stakeholders to address emerging challenges and uphold the principles of justice."

"I am deeply committed to serving our community with integrity, transparency, accountability and dedication while upholding the rule of law and fostering trust between law enforcement and the community."

According to a release from the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force, Eyre has 37 years of experience as a police officer, including 18 years as Assistant Chief Constable Rank and above. His final role in UK policing was as Chief Constable (Commissioner equivalent) of Nottinghamshire Police.

During his career, Eyre led the operational response to terrorist attacks, riots, major demonstrations, international criminal investigations and sensitive covert operations. In his last post, Eyre led the British Overseas Territory Police Force in the Sovereign Base Area of Cyprus.

This year's theme, "Discovering a Social-Emotional Lifeline Through Reading", refers to find-



Conch (pronounced 'konk') is a large type of marine snail popular throughout the Caribbean and especially in the Turks and Caicos Islands. The Queen Conch, or *strombus gigas*, is found naturally in the Atlantic, from the coast of Brazil, the Bahamas, up until the Florida Keys. Queen Conch are herbivores, unlike other conch species such as the horse conch.

Conch is becoming endangered in the Turks and Caicos due to extreme overfishing. Some conservation efforts have been implemented, but overall the rate of fishing is not sustainable for these mollusks. The Caicos Conch Farm on Providenciales was the world's only conch farm, which used to supply conch for the entire country and also for export.

Enid Capron Primary School organized its Ninth Annual Career Expo on February 8, showcasing a diverse range of career opportunities to its students.

The event featured approximately 13 government and private enterprises, providing children with insights into various professions. Participating entities included the Emergency Medical Service, the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force Support Services, Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force Community Policing, the Turks and Caicos Library Services, Sun Oil, Domestic Fire and Rescue, Fortis TCI, The TCI Community College, Inter-Health Canada, TCI Government Dental Services, Provo Water Company, TCSPCA, Department of Environmental Health, DECR, The TCIFA, and a mason demonstrating the art of construction.

Zoe Barnett-Butler, one of the school's guidance counselors, highlighted the importance of exposing children to diverse career paths at a young age. She emphasized that waiting until high school might limit students' choices, as the current job market emphasizes a skills-based economy. The aim of the expo is to broaden students' perspectives beyond traditional careers like lawyers, doctors, and nurses, encouraging exploration and experimentation with various options from an early age.

She said the ultimate goal of the Career Expo is to ensure that students understand the multitude of career possibilities available to them.

By exposing them to different professions early on, the organizers hope to give students the time and opportunity to explore, experiment, and expand their horizons before making career choices in the future. The event seeks to empower students with the knowledge and awareness needed to make informed decisions about their future paths.

"The takeaway is for the students to realize that career is not limited. I think for a long time they are mostly drawn to the more traditional careers such as lawyers, doctors and nurses. But we are in a skills-based economy, and so, we try to get a lot of the skills-based persons to come. But most importantly, our kids are young, and we believe that they should be exposed to careers like these from an early basis, so they have a chance to explore...we don't want to wait until they get to high school," Butler said.

Butler added: "We want them to be able to explore from now. So, they have options... they can choose, they can dabble, they can dabble, they can experiment. And so, when it is time to make that one or two choice they would have had enough time to expand their horizon."







10 hacks to sustainable wellness



MAINTAINING A healthy lifestyle in today's fast-paced world can often feel like an overwhelming challenge. However, there are some easy-to-implement hacks that you can gradually adopt that will lead to a more balanced and fulfilling life.

Embracing a healthy lifestyle is not just about strict diets and intense workout regimens; it is about making sustainable changes that promote physical, mental, and emotional wellbeing.

According to Dr Rivane Chybar Virgo, medical doctor and health and wellness coach, set three reasonable goals for each day, things that are achievable, and they will help to build a feeling of momentum. "Make sure you tick your achievements off, you will be surprised how satisfying that feels. It stops a feeling of getting nowhere, strengthening a belief of making progress; developing your self-belief and empowers you to push on," she said.

When we are busy, it feels as if things are coming at us from every direction. Having to switch your attention quickly and continuously from one topic or issue to another quickly drains our brain. Multi-tasking has become what we are expected to do, but our brains are not necessarily geared to do that on a regular basis.

"Our resources help us to complete a task or job. Our energy is a renewable resource; time is not. Taking frequent breaks during the day is not a sign that you are slacking; and when working from home those breaks are even more important. Move away from your home desk, get air and break your mind's loop," Dr Chybar Virgo said.

Practising gratitude, she said, can be a game changer that has far-reaching effects, from improving our mental health to boosting our relationships with others. Living your life with gratitude helps you notice the little wins – like the bus showing up right on time, a stranger holding the door for you, or the sun shining through your window when you wake up in the morning.

"Each of these small moments strings together to create a web of well-being that, over time, strengthens your ability to notice the good. Building your capacity for gratitude is not difficult. It just takes practice. The more you can bring your attention to that which you feel grateful for, the more you will notice to feel grateful for," Dr Chybar Virgo said.

Healing, she said, is a process that requires time, patience, and most importantly, kindness to oneself. Whether it is physical, emotional, or mental healing, it can be a challenging journey, and often, the hardest part is being patient and understanding with ourselves.

"We can be our harshest critic, and the pressure to heal quickly can lead to disappointment, frustration, and even self-doubt. However, it is essential to recognise that healing is a unique journey for everyone,

and it is crucial to be kind to ourselves and show compassion while we are healing," Dr Chybar Virgo said.

Self-compassion, she explained, is the act of treating ourselves with the same kindness, care, and understanding that we would offer to a friend. It involves recognising our humanness, accepting our flaws and limitations, and treating ourselves with compassion and dignity.

"Research has shown that self-compassion has a positive impact on our emotional well-being and can enhance our ability to cope with stress and adversity. When we are kind to ourselves, we create a supportive environment that promotes healing, self-care, and growth," she said.

Dr Chybar Virgo said you should also think of food as fuel for your body, as it helps you do the things you love. Fruits and vegetables, she said, are essential for your body.

"Try to eat at least five servings a day. They have vitamins and minerals that keep you strong and healthy. You can still enjoy your favourite foods, just be mindful of how much. Use smaller plates and measuring tools to help control how much you eat," she said.

Planning your meals ahead of time, she said, can be a big help. "Make your meals for the week on a day like Sunday. It saves time, money, and even calories. Plus, you will have tasty home-made meals ready when you are hungry," Dr Chybar Virgo added.

We are social creatures, and so connection with other like-minded people makes a huge difference to our well-being. "Surround yourself with supportive and positive individuals who uplift and inspire you. Strong social connections can have a profound impact on your well-being," Dr Chybar Virgo said.

In addition, find healthy ways to manage stress, such as meditation, deep-breathing exercises, yoga, or spending time in nature. Chronic stress can negatively impact both your physical and mental health.

Lifestyle changes for better memory



IN MANY ways, our memories shape who we are. They make up our internal biographies, the stories we tell ourselves about what we have done with our lives. They tell us who we are connected to, who we have touched during our lives, and who have touched us. In short, our memories are crucial to the essence of who we are as human beings.

That means age-related memory loss can represent a loss of self. It also affects the practical side of life, like getting around the neighbourhood or remembering how to contact a loved one. It is not surprising, then, that concerns about declining thinking and memory skills rank among the top fears people have as they age.

What causes some people to lose their memory while others stay sharp? Genes play a role, but so do choices. Proven ways to protect memory include following a healthy diet, exercising regularly, not smoking, and keeping blood pressure, cholesterol, and blood sugar in check. Living a mentally active life is important, too; just as muscles grow stronger with use, mental exercise helps keep mental skills and memory in tone.

"Among the best ways to improve memory are the same lifestyle changes that reduce the risk of heart disease and stroke. For example, quit smoking, drink alcohol in moderation or avoid drinking completely, and limit intake of sugary and processed foods," Dr Emmanuel said.

According to Dr Emmanuel, when it comes to how to improve memory, eliminating factors is just part of the puzzle; the other piece is adding in new habits. "For example, eating foods that help memory, such as leafy green vegetables, nuts, berries, tea, coffee and oily fish, is a

great way to promote your overall health while strengthening your brain," she said.

Regular exercise boosts the growth of brain cells and the production of neurotransmitters, enhancing memory. A mix of aerobic (cardio) and strength exercises is best. If you are not getting enough sleep, you might be harming your cognition and memory – aim for seven to nine hours each night.

Meditation, stress reduction and keeping up a good network of social relationships have all been shown to stave off the effects of ageing on the brain.

"One key to keeping your mind young is to keep it busy and challenged through lifelong learning and stimulation. Travelling, learning new languages, picking up a musical instrument, taking art or cooking classes, doing puzzles, playing board games, all these things promote the growth of new brain cells and help the brain forge new pathways," Dr Emmanuel said.

Memory enhancement can also come from properly managing your physical and mental health. Checking your hearing, vision, blood pressure and blood levels of thyroid function and cholesterol may find abnormalities which could easily be addressed and result in improved memory.

NYPD, JCF challenge US State Department's Travel Advisory

Deputy Commissioner Tarik Sheppard of the New York Police Department (NYPD) is moving to cast a new light on the US State Department's travel advisory for Jamaica, offering a counter-narrative that underscores the island's safety for tourists.

According to a news release on Friday, this comes in light of concerns raised in the advisory issued late last month. The latter cautioned tourists against visiting the island due to 'crime and medical services.'

The release stated that Sheppard's observations, 'grounded in both statistical evidence and personal experiences, affirm the efforts of the Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF) in main-

taining law and order, and ensuring the safety of visitors.'

"The statistics I've seen do not justify the concerns outlined in the travel advisory," Sheppard noted.

Sheppard was speaking during a joint-interview with a group of US-based journalists. The JCF's Commissioner of Police, Major General Antony Anderson also sought to reassure travelers and international partners that the island remains a safe and vibrant destination. Also drawing on statistics, the top cop said recent data shows a marked decrease in major crimes, with murders down by 7.8 per cent and shootings by approximately 6 per cent, marking Jamaica's

lowest level of crime in more than 22 years. Anderson further highlighted that the downward trend in crime is as a result of the JCF's strategies in combatting violence and ensuring public safety.

"Our numbers are going down, which reflects the effectiveness of our efforts to tackle crime across the island," Anderson stated, highlighting the disconnect between the advisory and the actual situation.

According to the release, the collaboration between the NYPD and the JCF further exemplifies the shared commitment to public safety and crime prevention.

Former BVI premier found guilty on drugs related charges

MIAMI, CMC-Former British Virgin Islands (BVI) premier, Andrew Fahie, faces the possibility of life imprisonment after he was found guilty late Thursday evening on drug and racketeering related charges.

The sentencing is scheduled for April 29, 2024.

Fahie was convicted after a trial that lasted eight days, with the 12 member jury returning guilty verdicts of conspiracy to import a controlled substance, conspiracy to engage in money laundering, attempted money laundering, and interstate and for-

ign travel in aid of racketeering.

The jury deliberated for just over four hours returning unanimous decisions in the case that was brought by United States prosecutors, who during their opening arguments, described the matter as a straightforward case.

The prosecution relied on the information provided by a Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) informant, who had initially made contact with Fahie's co-conspirators, Oleavine and Kadeem Maynard – the British Virgin Islands' former head of ports and her son.

The conspiracy's objective was to bribe BVI authorities to ignore the movement of cocaine-laden ships using the Tortola coastline as a transient haven en route to US ports.

The prosecution alleged that for his involvement, Fahie was to receive a share from each cocaine sale, part for personal gain and part to ensure the complicity of key public officials.

The court heard that while in Miami, Fahie and Maynard, inspected what they believed to be their initial shipment of cash, US\$700,000, to be divided between them, aboard a private jet at Miami-Opa Locka Executive Airport.

Fahie, who pleaded not guilty, was arrested in April 2022 by officers posing as cartel members and the Maynards, who had pre-

viously entered guilty pleas to their charges were granted lighter sentences.

Kadeem Maynard received a prison sentence of nearly five years, while his mother's sentencing has been deferred until after her testimony against Fahie.

During the trial, her testimony, aligned closely with the prosecution's case, detailed her role in introducing the scheme to Fahie and confirmed his willingness to participate.

She recounted Fahie's direct negotiations with the DEA informant, including his agreement to a 12 per cent profit share from the cocaine shipments and his acceptance of a US\$20,000 "good faith" cash gift, while she admitted receiving US\$10,000 from the same source.

She will be sentenced on February 22. During the trial, Fahie maintained his innocence and court observers say that the resulting full jury trial means he is ineligible for any leniency typically afforded by a plea deal.

The charges carry severe penalties, with the money laundering counts each warranting up to 20 years in prison and the racketeering charge up to five years. The conspiracy to traffic cocaine, could lead to a life sentence and a fine of up to US\$10 million.

Fahie, who had been on bail and residing at his daughter's Miami apartment, was taken into custody late Thursday evening.

Gov't seizes Boeing 747 that Iran illegally sold to Venezuelan firm

The US government has seized a Boeing 747 cargo plane that officials say was previously sold by a sanctioned Iranian airline to a state-owned Venezuelan firm in violation of American export control laws.

The Justice Department said on Monday that the American-built plane had arrived in Florida and would be disposed of.

The plane had earlier been transferred from Iranian airline Mahan Air – which officials have alleged provides support for Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps-Quds Force – to Emtrasur, a Venezuelan cargo airline and subsidiary of a state-owned firm that had previously been sanctioned by the United States. Officials said the sale, done without US government authorisation, violated export control laws and also

improperly benefited Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard.

Mahan Air has for years been subject to US government restrictions on its business.

"The Justice Department is committed to ensuring that the full force of US laws deny hostile state actors the means to engage in malign activities that threaten our national security," Assistant Attorney General Matthew Olsen, the head of the department's national security division, said in a statement.

The plane was detained in June 2022 by Argentine law enforcement, and US officials moved several weeks later to take possession of it. Argentina officially transferred custody of the plane to the US on Sunday, officials said.

The Justice Department said the plane would now be "prepared for disposition", though it did not elaborate.

The Justice Department has identified the registered captain of the plane as an ex-commander for the Revolutionary Guard. Officials also cited a flight log which they say was recovered that shows additional flights after the transfer to Emtrasur to locations including Moscow, Caracas and Tehran – all without US government approval.

Mahan Air has denied any ties to the aircraft, and Venezuela has demanded that Argentine authorities release the plane.

On Sunday, members of a Venezuelan-led, left-leaning alliance condemned Argentina for its role in the plane being seized by the US, characterising the actions as "theft". The Bolivarian Alliance of the Peoples of Our America – Peoples' Trade Treaty argued that the actions violate international law.

"This aggression is another consequence of the unilateral coercive measures imposed by the government of the United States that threaten the sovereignty of Venezuela and violate the fundamental principles of the United Nations Charter and international law," the group, commonly known as the Alba Alliance, said in a statement.

The alliance was created in 2004 by Venezuela and Cuba in a bid to counter US influence in the region. Nicaragua, Bolivia and some Caribbean nations are among its current members.

Spain seizes eight-tonne cocaine shipment



MADRID, Spain (AFP) — Spanish customs agents said Monday they had seized eight tonnes of cocaine inside a container from the tiny Latin American country of Suriname in one of the

largest such shipments to date.

The container arrived at the southern port of Algeciras and inside it was a metal structure made with a special alloy that was designed to con-

fuse the customs agents' scanning equipment, the Agencia Tributaria tax and customs authority said in a statement.

Even so, the scanner managed to detect that the structure contained "a large quantity of merchandise" which turned out to be eight tonnes of "very high purity cocaine".

Police arrested three suspects, including the person who received the shipment.

Spain is one of the main entry points for drugs into Europe given its close ties with Latin America, which is the main source of cocaine, and its proximity to Morocco, a key source of cannabis resin.

On Friday night, two police were killed when their patrol boat was rammed by a speedboat driven by drug traffickers off the southern port of Barbate, 70 kilometres (40 miles) west of Algeciras.

Eight people were arrested over the incident, which also left another two police injured.

Interior Minister Fernando Grande-Marlaska said Monday the government would "continue investing whatever necessary" to work against drug smuggling in the Gibraltar Strait, where trafficking is rife.

But he ruled out resigning as demanded by Spain's right-wing opposition and local police unions who have repeatedly asked for more resources to fight trafficking.

Former Antigua and Barbuda Olympian found guilty of molesting young boys



MASSACHUSETTS, CMC – A former Antigua and Barbuda Olympian and longtime track coach, who used his status to abuse young boys, will spend what a judge said would be “probably a life sentence” after he pleaded guilty to 12 counts of indecent assault and battery on a child over 14 years.

In addition, Conrad Mainwaring, who was a hurdler for Antigua and Barbuda in the 1976 Summer Olympics in Montreal, also pleaded guilty to four counts of indecent assault and battery on a child under 14. The charges involved nine male victims.

The Berkshire Superior Court was told that Mainwaring, a 72-year-old Los Angeles resident and United Kingdom national, sexually molested young boys at a sports camp in western Massachusetts in the 1970s. He faces up to 11 years in jail.

Judge John Agostini said it was “probably a life sentence” given Mainwaring’s age.

“He used his Olympic status to abuse young boys. He chose young, attractive, athletic boys, young men because he knew, at least he thought he knew, they would not speak up. This was his opportunity for self-gratification, a fraud at the

expense of many, many lives,” District Attorney Timothy Shugrue told the court.

Shugrue detailed case after case in which Mainwaring leveraged his Olympic credentials as part of a grooming technique used on boys attending Camp Greylock, making the youngsters believe that the sexual assault would make them better athletes. The abuse took place in the woods around the camp, in a van and near a tennis court among other places.

Mainwaring, who appeared on court in a wheelchair and wearing a mask, said “yes” when asked by the judge if he committed the offenses laid out in court. He then said “guilty” after each of the charges was read out. The court heard he molested campers from 1975 to 1979 while working as a counsellor at Camp Greylock in Becket.

Authorities have said they believe there are “many other victims” in several states and outside the United States.

Some of the camp victims, who were as young as 13 and as old as 19, testified at last Thursday’s hearing, and calling Mainwaring a danger to young men. They demanded a long jail sentence, arguing that he be kept away from boys

or young men and barred from coaching.

“It’s beyond diabolical, the pain and suffering of so many. It’s why he must be put behind bars and be prevented from ever harming anyone again,” said John Shapiro, an entrepreneur and father of three, who told the court how he was abused at the Massachusetts camp and Syracuse University.

Attorney Michael Waxman detailed how he met Mainwaring 40 years ago at the camp and was “overjoyed” that Mainwaring had picked him and would have followed him to “the ends of the earth” to see the dream of becoming a top athlete.

Massachusetts authorities started investigating Mainwaring following a 2019 ESPN report in which more than 50 men alleged they were abused by him, some of them at Camp Greylock. He was arrested in 2021 on a fugitive warrant as he left a Los Angeles County courthouse after a plea in a separate case from 2019.

Mainwaring also is accused in several lawsuits of abusing dozens of young men when he was a doctoral student, a deputy residency hall director and track and field coach at Syracuse University in the 1980s.

Joseph signs with Lucknow in IPL

Fast bowling sensation Shamar Joseph is set to feature in the Indian Premier League (IPL) after signing a US\$362,000 deal with Lucknow Super

Giants. The 24-year-old will replace England speedster Mark Wood who media reports say has been re-

called by England and Wales Cricket Board to prepare for upcoming assignments.

At Super Giants, Joseph will join fellow West Indies player Kyle Mayers and will be part of a fast bowling contingent that includes Afghan Naveen-ul-Haq and Englishman David Willey.


Super Giants were good enough to make the play-offs of last season's IPL before being knocked out by Mumbai Indians.

The Twenty20 franchise deal is the second to emerge for Joseph after he was signed by Daren Sammy's Peshawar Zalmi in the Pakistan Super League which bowls off later this month.

Joseph shot to prominence on the recent drawn two-Test tour of Australia when he produced a Man of the Series performance to earn West Indies their first Test win down under in nearly three decades.

The right-armer snatched a five-wicket haul on debut in Adelaide as West Indies went down by 10 wickets, and returned with figures of seven for 68 in the second innings in Brisbane to bowl West Indies to an eight-run victory on the fourth day. Joseph finished the series with 13 wickets at 17 runs apiece.

Devynne Charlton Shatters 60m Hurdles World Record at Millrose Games



The 116th Millrose Games kicked off with an incredibly dynamic start as Devynne Charlton continued her standout season in the 60m hurdles, reclaiming her former world lead (WL) with a world record of 7.67 on Sunday (11 Feb).

"It's all about crossing the line first," Devynne Charlton said in a post-race interview with NBC Sports. "I feel I got the start I needed; I just held it," she added. ALSO READ: Terrence Jones Teases Noah Lyles on X: A Friendly Rivalry for the 60m World Lead

The Bahamian achieved the best start in a field that included several Olympic and World Championship hurdle finalists (both indoor and outdoor), among them the reigning 100m hurdles World Champion, Danielle Williams of Jamaica. Williams ran a season's best of 7.79 to narrowly beat Tia Jones (7.79), the athlete who had taken the WL from Charlton in Boston on February 4th, for second place. Ackera Nugent, who finished sixth in Budapest, came in fourth on Sunday with a season-best of 7.80.

"So many of these ladies have the capability to do it; it's all in executing the race," Charlton remarked.

This season, Charlton has competed in seven 60m hurdles races, finishing under 8 seconds in each. Her performances included two sub-7.80 runs: a 7.75 that earned her a win at the Corky Classic with a new national record (NR) for the Bahamas and WL, and a 7.76 effort that surprisingly only secured third place behind Jones' 7.72 and Nigerian Tobi Amusan's 7.75.

Charlton, who was fourth outdoors last season in Budapest and runner-up in Belgrade in 2022, appears to be in prime position to improve her championship finishes

in Glasgow.

Following closely after the Women's 60m hurdles was the flat Women's 60m, where Julien Alfred raced to a new personal best (PB) and WL of 6.99.

Julien Alfred Breaks the 7-Second Barrier in Women's 60m at Millrose Games


Like Charlton in the hurdles, Julien Alfred had a strong start, leading the field by mid-race and decisively pulling ahead by the 50m mark. Jamaican Shashalee Forbes finished second in 7.14, while American Destiny-Smith Barnett took third in 7.16.

The St. Lucian sprinter became the first woman to break 7.00 seconds in 2024, surpassing Ewa Swoboda's 7.01.

"It means I'm on the right track," Alfred told NBC Sports. "It just means I have to keep going and keep training hard."

Alfred, who graduated from the University of Texas and signed with Puma in 2023, is navigating her first full professional season with careful consideration, even with the Paris World Championships on the horizon.

"I'm taking it race by race; I'm not thinking about down the line right now," she stated. "Now that I'm done with Millrose, I'm focusing on the World Indoors."



Sports Director Labels Murder Near Parade Ground As Brazen

"It is a travesty, the brazen act of violence that occurred in the vicinity of the Grand Turk Parade Grounds, during the HJ Robinson High School's Sports Day yesterday, February 8th," said Jarrett Forbes Director of Sports.

"Such an act resulted in the loss of life and a traumatic experience for those present and loved ones connected to both the victim and attendees. This is an abhorrent and vicious attack on our social fabric," Forbes said.

While extending the Sports Commission's sympathy towards the family of the victim, who was

killed in a hail of bullets, Forbes described the act might have a rippling effect on students and teachers at the Parade Ground, who were staging their sports day at the time of incident.

"The Turks and Caicos Islands Sports Commission (TCISC) offers its condolences to the family of the deceased and is sensitive to the trauma experienced by the students, teachers, and other community members.

"While the School Sports Day occurred at a facility managed by the TCISC, the event was hosted by the HJ Robinson High School. We can confirm, however, that a reasonable security strategy was implemented by the school's administration, based on the nature and timing of the event.

Crowd control measures were in place, school security was on site and police officers were conducting periodic stops throughout the day. The TCISC gives credit to the school's administration for their rapid response to the incident.

"The Commission has an aggressive security risk strategy to safeguard athletes, officials, and spectators at 'major' sports events. This security strategy includes a strong continuous presence of the Royal TCI Police Force (RTCIPF), both on the inside of the venue and patrolling the sur-

rounding area; professional security services; screening of all persons entering the premises; crowd control strategies; strictly enforced venue rules; and lock down or evacuation plans.

"We must however be judicious as to what is the risk assessment at a smaller sports event such as a School Sports Day, and we must determine what reasonable level of security is required to safeguard the students and visiting spectators. We are prepared to meet with the various school administrators and the RTCIPF to conduct a risk assessment of school or community sports events," Forbes said.

Forbes said the school community was still in shock from the incident, pointing out that his department was committed to throw its weight behind the safeguarding of its stakeholders.

"We cannot overstate the shock experienced by the school, community, attendees, and event hosts that such a violent act could take place not just in the surrounding area of the school but also in the middle of the day, while a school event is taking place.

"The TCISC is committed to working with all parties to safeguard our stakeholders and we encourage everyone to assist in the investigation of this crime," Forbes said.
