A brief history of the town of Happy Valley-Goose Bay, and our Air Force origins at the start of WWII

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Goose Bay is a vibrant and multicultural community, nestled in the heart of Labrador on Canada's East Coast. Rich in history and culture, Happy Valley - Goose Bay, usually shortened to Goose Bay, is surrounded by the great Canadian wilderness, making it an ideal destination for outdoor enthusiasts looking for home in our outdoor playground. The largest population center in Labrador, Goose Bay is the small but vibrant hub of culture and activity in our expansive region, and is filled to the brim with community spirit. Goose Bay residents have a strong sense of community, amplified by our many local events that aim to foster inclusivity, commerce and sense of place.

We know that moving to a new place can be intimidating, especially if you don't know much about it. That's why we created NORTH 1941. In 'Our Community', we'll give you a solid background on the history, culture and peoples of Labrador to shine some light on the region, and equip you with the knowledge you need to feel welcome in a familiar place. 'How We Got Here' offers you a brief history of Goose Bay, our air base 5-Wing, and how Happy Valley and Goose Bay became HV-GB. We hope that knowing our backstory will shine some light on our region's hub, and shine some light on the history of your new home.

After that we'll take a walk through our region's Attractions. Our Top 10 list of Central Labrador's must see attractions and must do activities aims to answer all of your questions about what there is to do here. Additionally, our region's bustling food scene is on fire. Enabled by a mix of local investment and international talent. Central Labrador's dining options are outstanding for such a remote Canadian region. Highlighted by a number of outstanding newcomer owned operations slinging fare from the Philippines, India, Nepal, and France, as well as a variety of local enterprises offering wholesome home cooking, or buttoned-up haute cuisine. Despite our small town population, Central Labrador has an oversized appetite for festivals and events. Throughout the year there are a wide variety of local events. From capstone annual events like the North West River beach festival and Expo Labrador, to frequent local craft and food markets, to community building events like our Community Potluck at the Legion hosted by the Labrador North Chamber of Commerce and the Association for New Canadians. So be sure to keep an eye out for these wonderful opportunities to make your new home home.



All of our events, festivals and activities are prime opportunities to get out into the community, meet new people and make new friends.

Last, but certainly not least, is our 'Community Resources' section and 'The Directory'. North 1941 is here to help you learn about, and settle into your new home. Our region is home to a variety of service providers that are here to help you after you land, particularly the Association for New Canadians. At the end of this magazine you'll find The Directory: our categorized list of nearly everything our region has to offer, from schools to

restaurants, all in one place.

Our community's roots date as far back to 1941. While the towns of Goose Bay and Happy Valley hadn't amalgamated until 1973, its conceptualization began during the second world war, when Canada and the United States chose Goose Bay as a geographically significant location for a military air base. Labrador represented an important strategic location for the allies during World War II. Because of our location on the Northeast end of The Americas, Goose Bay made for an ideal stopover point for Europe-bound aircrafts and anti-submarine patrols, while also helping to bolster our defenses along the North Atlantic. That base would come to be known as Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Goose Bay, or more commonly, 5-Wing Goose Bay.


During its development, the need for workers drew in civilians from across Labrador, who first set up camp at a nearby site called Otter Creek. However, because of the site's proximity to 5-Wing's fuel storage, workers migrated further out, to a location that would become the town of Happy Valley. As the pace of 5-Wing's construction climbed, so did our population. At its peak, the number of workers jumped to 3,000. By 1943, Goose Bay's airport was the largest in the Western Hemisphere, and was used by the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF), the United States Air Force (USAF) and the Canadian Army.

Once completed, the base was large enough to house 5,000 personnel. Nearby, Happy Valley continued as a small civilian community that persisted primarily in service of the base. Meanwhile, 5-Wing's airport remained a permanent facility after the war, playing a defensive role for North America during the Cold War years. From 1957 until the early '70's, the USAF operated the base under a lease from the Canadian government. By 1973, Happy Valley and Goose Bay had amalgamated, and today, 5-Wing is used by the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) and the North American Defense Command (NORAD) for a

variety of operations and training exercises.

5-Wing's primary mission is to support NORAD operations for the projection of air power on the north and northeast coasts of Canada — an increasingly important task given the growing interest in the Arctic's improving accessibility, abundant resources and geopolitical significance. The base also supports military training for the CAF, Canadian allies, and NORAD, providing effective training facilities, adaptable infrastructure and a unique, austere and challenging training environment. The role of the base has changed dramatically in the past few years, moving from a small station supporting a long range radar site, to a moderate sized base that sustains multinational flying operations and hosts a wide array of international guests.

Our Community

Weather and Wildlife

What to expect from our Northern Climate, local wildlife, and what to wear to get through winter in comfort.

So you're considering a move to the Great White North, eh? Well, you might be wondering what kind of weather you'll be in for once you arrive. If you're coming from a warmer, sunshine all-year-round region, maybe you're curious about the snow. How much snow do we get? What kind of clothes do I need? How big do your spiders get? Are there really polar bears? The short answer is: a lot, warm ones, pretty teeny, and yes, but way up north. But that's boring, so read ahead for the long answer!

Knowing as much as you can about your new home is very important, whether you're moving here from elsewhere in Canada, or from somewhere across the globe. Our mission isn't to sell you on Central Labrador. Our mission is to give you the information you need to feel confident and comfortable in your new home. Part of that means highlighting the good stuff, part of that means emphasiz-

ing the hard stuff, and when it comes to Central Labrador's weather and climate, there's plenty of both to go around. From a born-and-bread Labradorian, to a potential adoptee: don't let the North intimidate you — let it welcome you with open — albeit, often chilly — arms. Let's skip to the part you're already thinking about:

Winter

Winter is Labrador's longest and most arduous season, and tends to blend right into the first part of Spring and the later half of Fall, and can last up to six months, start to finish. Temperatures



in Central Labrador hover somewhere below -20° for most of the season, but particularly cold days can dip below -30°. If you're not coming from a snowy climate you might not be familiar with wind chill. Wind chill is the increase of perceived coldness on the skin resulting from the wind's ability to pull heat away from your body. So, when you check the weather here in the winter, it might say -25°, feels like -32°. This means that while a thermometer might say -25°, the effect of the wind makes it seem more like -32°. But what does that mean practically? If the temperature is -20°, feels like -20, there's no wind chill. In this situation, I might forgo a scarf, hat and/or gloves. If the temperature says -20°, feels like -34°, that's your sign to dress extra warm.

Winter comes with heavy snowfalls, and there are usually a few snowstorms that mostly shut down the town each year. This snow, however, provides excellent opportunities for outdoor activities like skiing or snowshoeing, and children particularly love sledding. While it might be hard if you're not accustomed to colder climates, making the effort to get out and find ways to enjoy the snow is a surefire way to better acclimating to the region.

Spring

Once the snow really starts to melt and Spring has started, the need for waterproof footwear becomes increasingly apparent. One major result of Labrador's heavy snowfalls is an extremely wet Spring. But despite the street-long puddles, and occasional freezing rain, Labrador's Spring comes hand in hand with gloriously refreshing air that's bound to get anyone excited about the changing seasons. The later half of Spring in Labrador is one of my favorite times of year. The warmer days and cooler nights mean that for a short time, there's still some snow on the ground while the warm sun beams down from above. This, combined with the refreshing air, makes





late spring one of our most pleasant seasons — even if the streets are filled with puddles. As a quick word of caution, please resist the urge to speed through springtime puddles. Doing so, you risk losing traction, and if water coats the bottom of your vehicle and freezes at night, you may freeze your gear shift in place.

Summer

Something that surprises a lot of people is that Central Labrador is known for more than just our cold winter. We have an absolutely gorgeous Summer season that brings average temperatures of 20°+ degrees. Our clear big blue sky is rarely overcast, and the sun is almost always beaming through a few big fluffy clouds. Summers here are perfect for all sorts of warm season activities — outdoor activities especially. Our access to the great Canadian wilderness is exceptional, and there are plenty of great spots for hiking, camping, fishing or biking, and we have fairly easy access to a handful of sandy beaches. The season might not be a particularly long one, but it is absolutely stunning.

Dress For Winter

The cold winter temperatures and heavy snowfalls may sound intimidating, but they don't have to be. Knowing how to dress in the winter is key to keeping comfortable throughout the longest season of the year. The three keys to winter readiness are keeping warm, keeping dry, and staying upright.

Keeping warm requires insulation. This could be the fill inside your jacket, the hefty warm material of a thick sweater, as well as all the air caught in between your layers. Being sure you have enough insulation is the most important part of staying warm in Labrador. In the coldest months, you'll want to have a large insulated jacket, ideally with a hood. When shopping, be sure your jacket is loose enough to fit a thick sweater underneath.

Keeping dry is crucial to keeping warm and comfortable, and you should keep in mind that moisture comes from both the outside of your clothing as well as inside. When choosing a coat and boots, it's important to consider waterproof — or water resistant — options. Any moisture that gets inside your clothing will quickly draw heat from your body, while making you quite uncomfortable. For the best results, make sure that both your coat and boots are waterproof. If you'll be spending time outdoors, be sure to invest in base layers also known as long johns, or thermal underwear. Not only will these provide another layer of warmth, they also work to wick moisture (i.e. sweat) away from your skin. Left to it's own devices, this moisture will work against you by pulling heat away from your body. By absorbing this moisture, base layers speed up its evaporation, helping you stay dry, and keep warm. Staying upright is probably top of mind for everyone, all

year around, but it's especially important in the winter,

when snow, ice and water conspire to knock you down. Aside from a warm coat, good boots are the most important aspect of winter wear. When choosing your winter boots, be sure to look for slip-resistant out-soles, with deep, wide grooves in the treads. When the snow is wet, it's especially easy for these grooves to pack with snow, hampering your boot's ability to keep you upright.

Labrador Wildlife

The Province of Newfoundland and Labrador is home to a wealth of native and non-native wildlife species. We are fortunate to have ample opportunities to experience a diverse range of wildlife species in their natural habitat, from backyard bird feeders attracting an array of songbirds, or up-close views of big game in the woods.

We live in harmony with most wildlife in Newfoundland and Labrador, often without even realizing it. Unless we intentionally seek them out, some people can go a lifetime without being aware of their presence. A few of these "neighbors" are black bears, lynx, wolves, fox, moose, and beaver, to name a few. You can also visit the NL Government website for a full list.

While Labrador doesn't have any massive spiders, or giant wasps, we are home to a variety of particularly pesky flies. The two main varieties you should know about are mosquitoes — which are common everywhere, but can be sometimes overwhelming near wooded areas and wetlands — and 'sand flies'. A common term for tiny, biting flies, comparable in size to fruit flies. While neither are dangerous, they can sometimes be overwhelming, especially if you're hiking, or otherwise exploring our beautiful woodsy region. So, when you're planing your summer adventures, be sure to include insect replant in your shopping

Making the Adjustment

Adjusting to Labrador's climate can seem intimidating if you aren't used to frigid temperatures and the snowy outdoors. While it's certainly not for everyone, you can take a huge step in the right direction by equipping yourself with the appropriate outerwear. When done well, dressing for the cold can help you stay warm, dry and comfortable all winter long. Inversely, giving too little thought to appropriate outerwear will all but guarantee that your winter months will be cold, uncomfortable and depressing. So remember our 3 Keys to Winter Readiness, and Keep Warm, Keep Dry and Stay Upright.

Key Takeaways

Winter is what you make it Labrador's climate may be cold, but compared to our island neighbors in Newfoundland, our winters are dry, and humidity is comparatively low. When our dry air gets in between our layers, its ability to chill is relatively low compared to the humid air of



Newfoundland. In short, our cold is easier to dress for, and there are never any puddles of water around in the middle of March. These factors make dressing for the winter far less of a challenge in Labrador, despite our colder temperatures and more significant snowfalls. This doesn't mean you can skimp on good outerwear, but it does mean you can spend more time outside comfortably — without wet feet, damp hair and soggy everything else. To make the most out of winter, make sure you know your layers. Base layers rest against your skin, mid layers

provide extra insulation and warmth, while outer layers are, well, on the outside. When it's time to shovel the driveway, but it's thirty below, this writer wears the following:

1) Thermal underwear/long John's: base layers come in tops and bottoms. These will keep you warm and dry by moving moisture away from your body and speeding up evaporation.

2) A thick sweater, or light insulated jacket: these materials will trap air between your layers, keeping the warm in, and the cold


3) A waterproof parka: a heavy insulated and waterproof jacket is the capstone of winter outerwear. Providing the most insulation, a waterproof exterior, and a fur-trimmed hood makes sure you're keeping as much warmth in as possible.

4) Accessories: a pair of waterproof, or water resistant gloves are a must; a winter hat is a great idea, especially if it's snowing, and waterproof boots are super important too. Be sure to tie it all together with a thick scarf. This ensures you seal off any gaps your heat might escape through.

Be sure to stay aware of your body temperature. While this outfit might be great for particularly cold, windy days, you might find yourself overheating quickly on milder days, and the exertion from shoveling snow will quickly warm you up. The beauty of layering is that it's easy to adjust your outfit throughout the day. If you get warm, take a layer off.

If you've just got here, or if you're getting ready to make your move, you probably don't have a vehicle just yet. When you do, you'll want to make sure your car has a block heater. If not, you will likely want to have one installed. Because of our region's cold temperatures, you may find that after a particularly frigid night, your car may not start. A block heater will make sure your car's internals stay warm, and make sure your car is ready to go in the morning. While this will make sure your vehicle's bits and bobs stay warm and functioning, this doesn't warm the inside of your car.

If you want to make sure you're warm and toasty from the moment you walk out of your home, to the point you walk through the doors at work, another key car consideration is a remote start. The benefits of being able to remotely start your car in the morning can not be understated. Turning on your car from the warmth and comfort of home will considerably improve your winter experience by letting you give your vehicle time to warm up before you head off to work. If you don't have remote start, you'll still want to pop out and turn your car on for a while before heading off to work on those especially frosty winter days.

Central Labrador is home to three indigenous groups: Innu Nation, Nunatsiavut Government, and NunatuKavut Community Council.

Innu Nation

The Innu people of Labrador formally organized under the Naskapi Montagnais Innu Association (NMIA) in 1976 to better protect their rights, lands, and way of life against industrialization and other outside forces. The NMIA changed its name to the Innu Nation in 1990 and today functions as the governing body of the Labrador Innu. The group won recognition for its members as status Indians under Canada's Indian Act in 2002 and is currently involved in land claim and self-governance negotiations with the federal and provincial governments. In addition to the Innu Nation, residents located in both First Nation Reserves (Sheshatshiu in central Labrador and Natuashish in northern Labrador) elect Band Councils to represent their needs and concerns. The chiefs of both councils sit on the Innu Nation's board of directors and the three groups often work in cooperation with one another. Although Sheshatshiu and Natuashish are home to most of the province's Innu people, some also live in Labrador City, Wabush, Happy Valley-Goose Bay, St. John's, and elsewhere.

Nunatsiavut

The Labrador Inuit way of life remained untouched by the rest of the world until the 1760s. Their earliest ancestors lived mainly on the North Coast of Labrador and traveled widely to harvest the resources of land and sea. For thousands of years, they had little or no contact with European cultures. In the 16th







Century, they first encountered Basque whalers and later, a growing settler population. In the 1770s, Moravian missionaries became the first Europeans to establish a presence north of Hamilton Inlet, and their way of life began to experience sweeping changes. Over time, Inuit life became more sedentary, and more connected to the emerging trade economy of Newfoundland and Labrador. The demise of trade in the 1920s brought further social and economic upheaval. In the 1970s, the Labrador Inuit Association (LIA) — later reformed into Nunatsiavut Government — was formed and a land claim was filed with the Government of Canada. For the next several decades, Nunatsiavut worked hard to promote its culture, health, wellbeing, and constitutional, democratic and human rights.

NunatuKavut

The NunatuKavut Community Council is the representative governing body for around 6,000 Inuit of south and central Labrador, and the population remains deeply connected to the land. Strife and warfare marked their early encounters with fishermen and explorers and many of their people lost their lives, as did the Europeans. The British-Inuit Treaty of 1765 was reached to end the hostilities. Some European men chose to remain on their lands and survived in NCC territory because of the knowledge and skills of the Inuit of NunatuKavut. As time went on, there was intermarriage, and their way of life began to change dramatically. They too suffered the effects of colonialism. Outsiders pillaged their resources, brought their own form of government, denied their language and many experienced resettlement and residential schools. Their ancestors have lived and survived in their territory for hundreds of years and they continue to live in these same places, carrying out many of the same traditions passed down to them by their ancestors.









otels and accommodations are a big business in Canada. Known for our friendly charm and welcoming nature, this is certainly no big surprise. While Canada's hospitality is well known around the world, Canadians know that Eastern Canada is among the most welcoming regions in the world, and Labrador is certainly no exception. Here in Central Labrador, we have a variety of quality hotels, ample B&Bs, and a wonderful lakeside campground just a short drive out of town. Whether you're a tourist tracking down a night's worth of accommodations, a camper looking to gaze at the stars, or a newcomer needing a place to stay before moving into your new home, Central Labrador has something suited to you.

Located on Kelland Drive, Emma's Suites provides comprehensive hospitality services at affordable prices. Just a 10 minute drive from the Goose Bay airport, Emma's Suites is equipped with one and two-bedroom rooms, air conditioning, high speed internet, and all of the hotel amenities tourists come to expect from quality accommodations. If you're coming to Goose Bay during the warm seasons, this pet friendly hotel is just a few steps away from one of our local foodie hot-spots, D'Cravings. The menu of this local favorite food truck features a variety of western staples, and an alternating selection of Filipino classics. For more information on D'Cravings, see their entry in the 'Food Therapy' section. Many tourists come to Labrador with their own accommodations in tow. And, while they may not need a bed to sleep in, they always need somewhere to park it. Trailer-bound travelers are also well accommodated in Central Labrador. Those looking for a quick and easy place to park, there are a number of lots in town that welcome them. Here at the Labrador North Chamber of Commerce, we provide a number of trailer parking spots complete with outlets to provide electricity for a small fee, our parking lot is a quick, no-frills option that offers easy access to local restaurants, shopping and gas.

If you prefer frills, however, Gosling Lake Campgrounds offers a variety of lakeside lots for those who prefer a more secluded, nature-focused option. A short drive out of town in-between the communities of Happy Valley Goose Bay and North West River, Gosling Lake Campgrounds is an exception







option away from the hustle and bustle of town, and sits in a prime spot for those interested in touring the communities of North West River and Sheshatshiu.


The largest selection of hotel rooms can be found along three Hotel North properties. In the uptown area of Goose Bay you'll find Hotel North I and Hotel North II, while those seeking accommodations in North West River are served by their third local property, Motel North.

Hotel North I (HN-I) sits just a short drive from the airport, right out of the gate separating Goose Bay from the local Canadian Armed Forces base. HN-I is equipped with a wide selection of immaculate rooms, friendly service, and one of Goose Bay's long time favorite restaurants: Mariner's Galley. Similarly situated just a short walk away sits Hotel North II. This larger space carries over the same hospitable care and quality as the first, and includes a dining hall and conference space that serves the community well along a variety of local events. Downstairs, you'll find one of Eastern Canada's favourite restaurant brands, Jungle Jim's. More information on Jungle Jim's — or more commonly, JJ's — see its entry in 'Food Therapy'. Motel North is comfortably tucked away in beautiful North West River, about 30 kilometers down highway 520. A much smaller community than Goose Bay, North West River — usually shortened to North West — offers pristine views and lovely attractions like the Labrador Heritage Museum and the Labrador Interpretation Centre, as well as some of the best camping options outside of Gosling Lake. The motel is also a short drive from North West's popular Riverside Restaurant, conveniently located just next door from the Labrador Heritage Museum.

Not far from the docks, on the upper end of Hamilton River Road, sits Kerry's Place. This quaint and cozy bed and breakfast is the perfect combination of style and atmosphere. Kerry's place offers accommodations for anyone seeking short term room rentals during their stay in Goose

Bay, and houses up to eighteen people. Back in the Valley, the Royal Inn + Suites is located just minutes from the offices of the Labrador North Chamber of Commerce. Perfectly located in the middle of town, the Royal Inn offers a variety of tastefully decorated rooms, and a lovely outdoor space for guests looking to relax on those beautiful summer evenings. Featuring friendly staff and the lovely Labrador hospitality tourists have come to rely on, Royal Inn offers a variety of quality amenities to make your stay a pleasure. Bonfire Night

Bonfire Night, also known as Guy Fawkes Night, is an annual commemoration on the 5th of November each year. Originating in England, and adopted here, Bonfire Night is celebrated with large fires, and sometimes fireworks displays. Around the community, people will host their family and friends for backyard bonfires and fireworks, and the town hosts their own large bonfire for the community. Bonfire night is the first annual celebration of the winter season, and always draws a large crowd.

Lab Cup

At the end of each Spring, our local soccer association has their annual Lab Cup indoor soccer tournament hosted at the E.J. Broomfield Arena. Drawing teams from all across Labrador, the tournament has multiple divisions competing for the title and it is one of the most popular sporting events in the region.

Cain's Quest Snowmobile Endurance Race has been described as the ultimate in extreme racing. At more than 3000 km of high energy racing, this race is the longest race of its kind in the world and promises to keep race fans on the edge of their seat. Cain's Quest is a true northern adventure that gives racers the experience of a lifetime. Held every two years, racers push body and machine to the limits in an all-out race to the finish for a shot at a hefty prize purse. Teams of two leave the start line pumped with adrenaline and an eye on the prize.

Labrador Winter Games

Every three years, the Labrador Winter Games are hosted in the community of Happy Valley-Goose Bay. Each community puts together a team of up to 17 athletes and one coordinator to compete in a series of traditional and modern events important to the lives of Labradorians. In total, some 500 athletes, 600 volunteers, and many more spectators, make the Labrador Winter Games one of the biggest events in all of Labrador.

Canada Day

Canada Day, formerly known as Dominion Day, is the national day of Canada. A federal statutory holiday, it celebrates the anniversary of Canadian Confederation which occurred on July 1, 1867. Festivities in HVGB tend to take place at Kinsmen Park throughout the day with food, games, music, and fireworks at night!









Remembrance Day

Every year, Canadians pause in remembrance of the men and women who have served and continue to serve our country during times of war, conflict and peace. In Goose Bay, a Remembrance Day ceremony is held on November 11th at the Royal Canadian Legion.

Community Outdoor Market

A local favorite in the summer season, the Community Outdoor Market (COM) serves as a welcoming venue for local craftspeople, farms and other local sellers. Hosted in Kinsmen Park, HGVB's largest park, COM is held every Saturday from 10AM to 12PM, every week, rain or shine. Currently our community's only market of its kind, it's the perfect arena for newcomers to get out into our community and meet its people. If you're lucky enough to be arriving in the season, be sure to drop by for snacks, local crafts, fresh vegetables and entertainment.

North West River Beach Festival

One of the largest festivals of the year, the North West River Beach Festival takes place on the waterfront of the oldest community in the region. For two days each summer, music and entertainment draw in people from across Central Labrador into North West River.

Community Potlucks



The final highlight is the Northern Lights Military Museum, densely packed with military and wartime relics collected by the shop's owner, Bruce Haynes.

Canada's wilderness at your doorstep


FOR THOSE SEEKING to immerse themselves in the Labrador wilderness, a visit to Scenic Falls and Peace Rock is highly recommended. This 1.3-kilometer out-and-back trail, nestled between Happy Valley-Goose Bay and the neighboring communities of North West River and Sheshatshiu, offers a moderately challenging yet tranquil hike.

A short drive from town, Scenic Falls provides an easy walk through lush forests and alongside a babbling brook, culminating in a serene waterfall that invites peaceful reflection. The trail, popular among local hikers, remains quiet enough to offer the solitude of a brisk and contemplative trek.

Continuing from the falls, the path ascends to the Peace Rock lookout. This uphill journey leads to a large boulder emblazoned with a peace sign, offering panoramic views of the majestic landscape. It is an ideal spot for photography and contemplation.

Both Scenic Falls and Peace Rock serve as excellent picnic locations, perfect for those wishing to pause and refuel before the return journey. Whether you are a seasoned hiker or a casual nature enthusiast, this trail promises a rewarding and enriching outdoor experience. Just be sure to pack bug repellent, as the flies can sometime get intense.





THE LABRADOR **MILITARY MUSEUM**

Our Air Force origins






LOCAL **CRAFT SHOPS**




Mamattuk is also home to our community's only espresso machine and provides all of the classic espresso staples, in addition to a variety of tasty seasonal beverages.

This makes Mamattuk one of my favorite spots for lunch, and the best place to grab a fresh espresso and baked treat in the morning.



If you'd like to dip your toes into traditional Newfoundland cooking, head down to Pep's Diner & Takeout at 21 Green Street in Goose Bay.








wned and operated by Irish turned Labradorian, Niamh Roche, and a small team of dedicated staff, MÓR Meats is Goose Bay's specialty meat market.




ptown, just outside the entrance to 5-Wing Goose Bay, you'll find Mariner's Galley.


Serving up some of Goose Bay's long time favorite pizzas, and a mighty medley of Mediterranean signatures, The Greek has something for everyone.

You can find Bentley's Sports Bar and it's dancier neighbor downtown at 97 Hamilton River Road.









The Association for New Canadians (ANC) was founded in 1976, and is a community-based, non-profit organization committed to providing settlement, resettlement and integration services to newcomers of all statuses. Since it's inception, this network of over 300 staff — with the support of province-wide volunteers — has delivered a variety of programming and services for international students, temporary foreign workers, permanent residents and government-assisted and privately sponsored refugees, without cost to eligible clients.

The ANC's mission

The mission of the Association for New Canadians is to settle and integrate immigrants, and to empower them with the skills, knowledge and information necessary to become independent, contributing members of the community and country.

Our vision

Newfoundland and Labrador is a welcoming community where immigrants can easily integrate into the social and economic fabric, where their contributions are recognized by the greater population and where they feel comfortable settling for an extended period.

ANC values

As an organization, the ANC values inclusiveness, respect for others, dignity, integrity, empowerment, independence,

and equality. The organization holds itself accountable to its clients, funders, and employees by honoring its commitments, striving for the highest quality of service, and fostering community awareness on the benefits of immigration, multiculturalism and cultural diversity.

Helping you settle

The ANC is the designated service provider for the Atlantic Immigration Program (AIP), and provides services to both employers and program participants. For employers, the ANC offers guidance and assistance with the designation process, including required intercultural training, while program participants and potential employees have access to guidance on matters such as the endorsement process and application information. All in-Canada applicants — and any dependents destined to join them — will also meet with an ANC representative for an AIP Needs Assessment and AIP Settlement Plan. The Association can help by providing information on the AIP, as well as other streams available to newcomers.

Training and assessment

As part of the Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC), The Association delivers instruction on Canadian Language Benchmarks (CLB) levels 1-6, as well as 3 pre-benchmark levels (A-C). These services are available through offices in St. John's, Corner Brook, Gander, and Labrador

West. The ANC also provides English as a Second Language (ESL) conversation circles where available, as well as distance and online ESL programs across the province.

Public education

The ANC Diversity Outreach Team provides cultural intelligence workshops meant to meet the needs of businesses, government agencies, schools, and other non-profits and community organizations. Additionally, the annual diversity summit, IDEAS 2022, highlights the social, economic, and cultural benefits provided to the province by growing immigration to NL, while also offering useful tools to implementing inclusion, diversity and equity measures in the workplace. The ANC's Community Connections Program creates impactful community connections through the engagement of newcomers and volunteers at the local level. Volunteer supported programs and events include:

If you or a member of your family will be looking for employment, there are a number of helpful on-line job boards you can check regularly.

Canada Job Bank

The Canada Job Bank (CJB) is one of the most popular job posting websites in the region. Many local employers use this as their primary job board for any positions they're looking to fill. If you find a job on another job board, you will often be redirected to the CJB to fill out your application.

The CJB also has a dedicated section for newcomers to Canada. Here you can search for jobs from employers that support newcomer applicants, and browse a variety of tools and resources that will help you start your employment journey. These re-

Social Insurance Number

To work in Canada, you need a Social Insurance Number (SIN). You should apply for your SIN as soon as you come to Canada.

Foreign Credential Recognition

Some occupations in Canada are regulated, and you will need specific professional licenses or certifications to work in those fields. Before applying to jobs in Canada, you should find out if the occupation you're interested in is regulated, and whether it requires specific credentials and/or licenses. If it does, there may be a specific process you will need to go through before your foreign credentials are recognized. The Foreign Credential Recognition Tool (FCRT) will help you find out if the occupation you are interested in is regulated and, if so, help you understand the process required to get your credentials recognized in Canada. This includes the job prospects and average salary for that occupation across Canada, and will also show you similar jobs you could consider until your credentials are recognized.

Language Training

If you're looking to improve your English or French, there are

on-line and in-person resources that can help you do that. The CJB provides links to government resources like self assessment tests, and directions to free on-line content, as well as other local organizations that help newcomers get signed up for language classes. You may also benefit from seeking out local language opportunities like the conversation cafés hosted by the Association for New Canadians. Keep in mind that while you may be coming to Canada with sufficient or significant English proficiency, some local dialects might be more challenging. However, this will become easier in time as you familiarize yourself with local slang and develop an ear for accents.

Services for Newcomers

Whether you're planning to come to Canada, or you're already here, the CJB can direct you to resources for newcomers. Prearrival services include preparing to live and work in Canada, getting your education and experience recognized, and connecting with Canadian employers. Post-arrival services include help looking for work, getting a language assessment, registering for language classes or finding a place to live and track down community services.

Resume Builder:

The CJB can also help you make a modern and professional resume to help you showcase your experience and potential with customizable templates To set up your Canada Job Bank account, go to jobbank. gc.ca. To find the section specific to newcomers mentioned above, scroll down to the section titled "Resources made for you" and select "Newcomers to Canada". Tip: The Canada Job Bank, like many sites you'll encounter during your immigration and employment journey, is a government website. If you have any trouble finding the government resources mentioned here, or any other government resources you encounter, you can go to canada.ca, and search for the content you're looking for in the search bar at the top (mobile) or top-right (web) section of the homepage. Canada.ca is a great page to familiarize yourself, and will have links to direct you to other federal government departments, and all topics from jobs to taxes.

Other job banks

There are several other popular job sites you will want to check regularly as well. Two of the most popular job sites are Indeed and CareerBeacon. Like the CJB, these will allow you to refine your job search by region or municipality, and by keywords. Likewise, they allow you to make an account and upload a resume to make applying for jobs easier and faster. LinkedIn is another good job resource with its own job search feature, and is an excellent source of professional networking.

Events

In Goose Bay there are occasionally events that provide opportunities to connect with employers. There's an annual job fair at the College of the North Atlantic that hosts a variety of employers who are actively recruiting. This job fair is typically around March and April. Expo Labrador — our region's premiere economic development conference and trade show — is another great opportunity to connect with local employers. While Expo isn't specifically focused on employers looking to hire, it is still an excellent venue to explore employment opportunities in the region. See our 'Events' section for more information about Expo Labrador.

Bethel Immigration & Community Services

The Bethel Immigration and Community Assistance Program (BICAP) is a new program from the Bethel Pentecostal Tabernacle in Happy Valley - Goose Bay. BICAP provides a variety of postarrival settlement services to new Canadians in the region.



A Note on Childcare


While staffing constraints are troublesome for childcare providers and those seeking their services, it also provides employment opportunities for those with Early Childhood Education (ECE) credentials, or those seeking a new career in a field with ample demand. For those interested in seeking a stable and in-demand career that provides significant benefits to local communities, ECE credentials can be acquired through the College of the North Atlantic, and the Central Labrador YMCA.

Peacock Primary School (K-3)

If you have children between kindergarten and grade three, they will attend Peacock Primary School. Located in the Valley, Peacock has around 350 students and offers both English and French Immersion — a program meant for English speaking students who will do much of their grade-school learning in French. Additionally, while English stream students' classrooms and classmates change from year to year, French Immersion students' classes will typically stay the same, resulting in a more tight-knit group of students working their way towards multilingualism. Peacock's mascot is Buddy the Husky, who always reminds his friends and classmates to ask themselves if what they're doing or saying is appropriate, safe, and kind.

Queen of Peace Middle School (4-7)

If your child is between grades four and seven, they can expect to attend Queen of Peace Middle School. Just a short walk from Peacock, this former Catholic school is also conveniently located in the Valley, and comes equipped with a lovely playground and sports field to meet student's recreational needs. Home of the QPMS Wolves, Queen of Peace hosts a wealth of resources for students and parents alike, so everyone has the opportunity to succeed together. Like Peacock, QPMS has educational streams to meet a variety of language needs, from English to French Immersion.




Mealy Mountain Collegiate (8-12)

If you're coming to Goose Bay with high school students, they may like to familiarize themselves with Mealy Mountain Collegiate (MMC). The relatively newly built high school is split into two wings, with junior high classes on one end, senior high classes on the other end, and access to shared facilities like the gymnasium, canteen, and a multi-purpose room in the center. Home of the Hawks, MMC is a truly Labradorian facility, and the hallmark of the winter season is a slew of students' snowmobiles parked out front. MMC is located directly in the middle of town, and is steps away from a well maintained playground and skate park.

Ecole Boréale (K-12)

Located in the Valley, École Boréale is Central Labrador's only francophone school. Teaching students from kindergarten all the way to grade 12, École Boréale teaches the same programs as our other schools, but with a French first approach. École Boréale also offers the 'Good Start' program, which allows your child to experience kindergarten one year before enrolling in school, ensuring a smooth transition into schooling. While École Boréale is focused on children for whom French is their first language, parents of kids who are just starting school who are interested in having their kids learn French may like to look into the French Immersion program mentioned in the Peacock Primary School section.

Central Labrador is home to a wide variety of youth-focused activities. If you don't know what's available here, it can sometimes be hard to find out.


We're here to help.





Veterans' Memorial Park

PARKS



A number of fantastic local parks and playgrounds dot the Central Labrador landscape, and offer residents a variety of opportunities to get outdoors and stay active.

These include a number of well equipped playgrounds that are ideal for youngsters, a swath of open fields that are excellent for picnics and sporting events, and some that offer immaculate views of our northern landscapes and rivers.

In Goose Bay, Mealy Mountain Collegiate — the local high school — is accompanied by an adjacent skate and BMX park.

Kinsmen Park — the largest park in the region — is one of our most widely used parks and a treasured local landmark.

A mainstay for local community events like Canada Day celebrations and the Community Outdoor Market, Kinsmen Park is equipped with all of the playground staples, a splash pad, a stage for musical performances and other entertainment.

During larger community events, as well as the outdoor market, the park's ample open spaces are used by vendors and local craftspeople to sell their wares, and

Kinsmen Park is most widely used in the summer, and is ideally located in the middle of town.

While used less in the winter, the park is decorated with bright Christmas lights, and the ground fills up with snow, perfect for winter activities like snowshoeing.

If you're living on 5 Wing Goose Bay, you'll be very close to Veterans' Memorial Park. The VMC is equipped with a modern jungle gym, and a nearby outdoor skating rink, meeting the needs of youths and adults all year around. Also on the base is a lovely golf course, as well as an area dedicated to disc golf.

Throughout Goose Bay, you'll find a number of lovely parks and playgrounds peppered across town, with some near schools, and others along our neighborhoods. Some of the most popular playgrounds can be found on our community map, but for a complete list, check out The Directory at the end of this magazine.

Accessing healthcare in Newfoundland and Labrador with our provincial health care plan MCP. The Newfoundland and Labrador Medical Care Plan, or MCP, is a publicly administered comprehensive plan of public medical care insurance. Introduced in April, 1969, MCP covers the cost of insured physician services for residents of the province, provided they have met the eligibility criteria to register as MCP beneficiaries. MCP beneficiaries are also entitled to coverage of insured medical services received in a hospital under the Hospital Insurance Plan.

Beneficiaries must present a valid MCP card when receiving services, so make sure you take your card with you when visiting a doctor.

Everyone applying for an MCP card will have to fill out an application, but the documents you will need to provide depend on your residency status.

Canadian Citizens will need to provide documents that confirm their citizenship status, like a Social Insurance Card, a Canadian Passport or birth certificate, or an official federal ID card.

Landed Immigrants will need to present Record of Landing Documents from Citizenship and Immigration Canada. Both Canadian citizens and landed immigrants may be required to provide additional information, such as their previous province or territory's health care number or card, and/or proof that Canadian citizenship or landed status has not been lost if returning to Canada after a lengthy stay abroad

Foreign Workers are required to present an Employment Authorization (Work Visa), which must be issued before coming to Canada, for a named NL employer, for a specific job within the province, and it must be valid for at least 12 months, except for foreign health care workers. All foreign applicants should be prepared to present a valid foreign passport for identification purposes.

International Students have to provide a copy of a student permit issued by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Your permit must be issued before coming to Canada, and issued for an educational institution located in the province for a period of at least 12 months.

Applications should be sent to one of two MCP offices:

Grand Falls-Windsor, or St. John's. See our Directory section for mailing details. Keep in mind, you should not send your original documents. Use photocopies and keep the originals

For complete and current details on how to apply, visit gov. nl.ca/hcs/mcp. If you're moving Labrador and would like assistance, reach out to The Association for New Canadians.

What's covered by MCP?

Your MCP card pays for most medically necessary services like hospital visits, home care, addiction services and primary care services.

What's not covered?

Most prescription drugs, eye exams and eyewear, dental services and appliances like hearing aids or crutches. For a comprehensive list of MCP coverage, visit gov.nl.ca/hcs/mcp.

Ports of Entry

Central Labrador is accessible by air, by road, by sea, or a combination of the three. To the west, Route 500 bridges the gap between Labrador and Quebec, while Route 510 will take you South East towards Newfoundland. For locals, the most common by-road destinations for trips are Labrador City (about 530 km to the West), or to Newfoundland (630 km to the East). People looking to venture further North are served by a seasonal ferry along the communities of Nunatsiavut, along Labrador's North

Coast.

The Goose Bay Airport is located at 5-Wing Goose Bay and services flights from Air Canada, Provincial Airlines & Air Borealis

There are two post offices in Goose Bay: Station B in The Valley, and Station C uptown. Canada Post does not deliver door-to-door, so any mail shipped through Canada Post will be available for pickup here. When shopping online, packages are most often shipped through Canada Post.

However, if you've made a purchase from a vendor that ships with a courier like FedEx or Purolator, your package will be delivered to your door by a local "last-mile" delivery service. Either way, you'll receive an email once you've made a purchase that will include a tracking number and the delivery service provider.

After your Canada Post delivery has been received and processed by a local office, you may receive an email that says Canada Post tried to deliver your package but could not. At this point, your mail has been received and processed at the Post Office. Simply disregard the note about the attempted delivery and pick up your mail at the office.

Garbage Disposal

In Goose Bay, residential garbage collection is provided by Hickey Construction and operates Monday to Friday, during all holidays outside of Christmas Day. Our community is divided into four zones and each zone's trash is collected on a particular date. The garbage collection schedule can be found on the Town's website at townhygb.com.

Groceries


Pantry staples and international goods offer accessible variety to our diverse community Goose Bay offers excellent access to groceries, with two main stores catering to most needs. The Terrington Co-Op, located on Abbott Drive, and Northmart, on Hamilton River Road, both offer a comprehensive selection of produce, meats, pantry staples, frozen foods, cleaning supplies, and other household essentials.

For those seeking a quicker shopping experience or specific items, several smaller shops also offer grocery items. Quickstop, conveniently located across from the Co-Op, provides a small grocery selection alongside a popular Kentucky Fried Chicken outlet. Uncle Ern's, a short drive away, carries a diverse range of dry goods, frozen foods, meats, housewares, and even toys. MOR Meats, a local favorite, specializes in high-quality meats and also offers tempting

daily sandwich specials, fresh salads and more. Finally, Canex, located at 5-Wing Goose Bay (The Base), provides groceries, clothing, and electronics for those in the area.

Reflecting Goose Bay's diverse population, the availability of imported international foods has increased notably in recent years. Shoppers can find a delightful selection of products from South and Southeast Asia, particularly from the Philippines, at Northmart, The Co-Op, and Quickstop. Additionally, Skipper Joe's Uptown location— one of our local convenience stores — is an excellent source of dry and frozen goods from India. For those seeking domestic international flavors, Uncle Ern's and Canex offer a range of options to explore.
