A Conversation with Ann Ciccolella, Artistic Director of Austin Shakespeare, on Living the Creative Life

Ann Ciccolella loves to spark creative and innovative ideas, both through her role as Artistic Director of Austin Shakespeare and through her weekly group, The Artist's Way. Created in 1984, Austin Shakespeare is one of the leading nonprofit theater companies in central Texas. The Artist's Way is a workshop method for anyone interested in living more creatively. During her conversation at AWC on October 2, Ann will share her journey to her current position, including her thoughts on what Shakespeare means to her, the importance of integrating creativity into everyone's life, and the challenges of managing a professional theater company in Austin.

Ann is an accomplished playwright and has adapted several shows for Austin Shakespeare, including The Odyssey, The Seagull, and O. Henry Stories. Her script Madam X, based on the painting by John Singer Sargent, was described by one reviewer as "developing an absorbing inquiry into art's purpose and place in our lives."

Ann will be interviewed by AWC member, Dr. Patricia Greene. Patti is Professor Emerita at Babson College and served as the 18th Director of the Women's Bureau of the U.S. Department of Labor. She is an amateur Shakespeare enthusiast.

Home Economics and the Muppets

Robyn Metcalfe/Joy Stoddard

Aside from Martha Stewart and the film *Lessons in Chemistry*, you probably haven't heard much about Home Economics recently. Now, home economics is about to reappear, although not as it existed during the early 19th century. Dr. Metcalfe, historian, former professor at UT, and co-founder of The Lunar Society will reveal how the founders of home economics and its graduates made contributions to science to reshape our homes, our clothing, and what we eat. Even more than household solutions, graduates of home economics were innovators in both the scientific and artistic fields. As we begin the journey towards an Aldriven world, Metcalfe shares her insights about how the mindset instilled through home economics may empower us to thrive as humans.



Robyn Metcalfe is a historian, author, executive producer, and Founder of The Lunar Society, an experience design group. She is intensely curious about how things work, human and their stories, and how we navigate the inter-

section our digital and analog worlds. For decades, she explored how our food systems evolved from the 19th century into the future. As an author, she wrote The New Wizard War, Meat, Market, and the City, Food Routes, and Humans in Our Food. As Executive Producer, she produced several documentary films, including The Long Coast, Arc of Oblivion, and Shelf Life. Her previous experiences include The University of Texas at Austin, Kelmscott Rare Breeds Farm, Arthur D. Little, and Sunset Magazine. Robyn received her bachelor's degree in history from the University of Michigan, and her Masters and Doctorate degrees at Boston University, both in Modern European History. Joy Stoddard believes that everyone has the right and potential to flourish, and we all need support at one time or another during our lives. Joy spent 23.5 years at Whole Foods Market, at first opening stores

and training thousands of employees. Then she served as Development Director for its nonprofit Whole Planet, dedicated to alleviating poverty, helping to raise \$140 million to fund 7 million microcredit loans for low-income entrepreneurs - mostly women - in 80 countries including 26 U.S cities such as Austin. Now, she is Vice President of Development at Free To Choose Network, raising awareness and funds for documentaries advancing capitalism and freedom, and its educational affiliate nonprofit izzit.org, which provides free materials to teachers to inspire students to think critically and flourish in a free society. Joy joined AWC and the Development Committee in July 2025 and she has lived in central Austin for 25 years.

Just Who is Sleeping in the Texas State Cemetery? Wathan Stephens - Texas State Cemetery

Nathan Stephens serves as the Administrator of the Texas State Cemetery, one of the most unique historical sites in the state. Nathan has had the honor of managing prominent funerals, public events, and outreach programs at the Cemetery since 2018. He will be speaking on the history of the Texas State Cemetery and some of the honored Texans who lay at rest there.

The Texas State Cemetery was founded in 1851 as a burial ground for lawmakers and public servants. Since that time, the Cemetery has evolved into the final resting place for Texans who have made significant contributions to Texas history and culture in any number of fields, from artists and athletes to scientists and scholars; it has come to represent the best of Texas and what makes it such a special place.

Born and raised in Houston, Nathan has lived in Austin more than 35 years. Nathan first entered state government service in the 1990s, serving under two House Speakers as Assistant Sergeant at Arms in the Texas House of Representatives. He then founded and operated several building and development companies, producing diverse types of residential housing in the greater Austin area before returning to state service as Cemetery Administrator.

Nathan and his wife Ginger are avid campers, especially enjoying their stays at the many beautiful and diverse Texas State Parks. They love spending time at home with their two dogs, and cherish the visits they enjoy with Nathan's adult sons Jacob and Lucas.
