This term, we were lucky to welcome award-winning children's author Clare Helen Welsh to seven CELT schools as part of her author-in-residence roadshow.


Learners across the schools were treated to engaging assemblies and creative activities, where Clare shared insights into her stories, her writing process, and what it's like to be a professional author.

Pondhu Nursery Officially Opens

There were big smiles at Pondhu Primary School as learners, parents, carers and staff celebrated the official opening of the school's nursery.

Special guests, including Noah Law, MP for St Austell and Newquay, town councillors, and St Austell Mayor Colin Hamilton, joined families eager to see the new facilities.

The nursery provides a caring and creative start to education for children aged two to four. Visitors explored bright classrooms and an outdoor play area, where the first group of youngsters were already enjoying story time and hands-on activities.

The £150,000 redevelopment was funded by the School-based Nursery Capital Grant, part of a national initiative to increase childcare places. MP Noah Law praised the project, highlighting its benefits for local families and children's development.

Jake & Leo from Newquay Junior Academy were both selected to represent East Cornwall in football and travelled to Bath for their first tournament in November.


POPPY SHINES

10 / WHAT WE'VE LEARNT THIS TERM

This term, schools across Cornwall Education Learning Trust have embraced new learning experiences. With a focus on exciting classroom projects, creative arts and outdoor adventures, our children have been busy exploring, discovering and approaching new experiences with enthusiasm.



St Mewan CP School took part in UK Parliament Week, learning how democracy works in the UK and why every voice matters. Learners explored what Parliament does, the roles of MPs and Lords, and how laws are made.

Children engaged in hands-on activities, including writing their own manifestos on issues they care about, such as protecting the environment, and taking part in debates to practise sharing their views respectfully.







Year 7 learners at **Newquay Tretherras** thoroughly enjoyed an engaging visit from author Matt Oldfield, co-creator of the bestselling Ultimate Football Heroes series. Matt shared his passion for storytelling and football, inspiring learners to explore the joy of reading. Learners also gained an insight into the writing process and were encouraged to develop their own creative ideas and love of books.





WHAT WE'VE LEARNT THIS TERM

Year 5 and 6 at **Port Isaac Academy** explored the wonders of the blood and circulatory system in science!

To bring their learning to life, they headed outside and created a giant model using hoops and bean bags to represent the heart, lungs, digestive system and body.

They had so much fun learning to say hello and goodbye in Spanish, singing, dancing, counting with instruments, and finishing with lots of bubbles. The session supported key areas of the EYFS framework through music, movement and language, while introducing them to the joy of learning another language in a playful, engaging way.







Year 3 learners at **Carclaze CP School** have been learning to play the steel pans this term.

The music lessons have been provided by Cornwall Music Service Trust and have enabled learners to build confidence and nurture a love of performing.

Throughout the visit, learners took part in a range of practical, hands-on activities designed to help them develop important life skills and understand how to stay safe in everyday situations.

The children learnt how to help someone who is choking and were introduced to the basics of CPR, gaining valuable knowledge that could one day help save a life.

They also explored how to stay safe near railways and learned about the importance of online safety in today's digital world. To add to the excitement, pupils even had the opportunity to step into the role of community safety officers by handing out a few (mock) parking tickets. Overall, the workshop was both educational and enjoyable.



Year 8 learners from **Penrice Academy** spent a day being immersed in creativity and inspiration in St Ives! Learners explored the collections at the Tate Gallery and discovering the legacy of sculpture at the Barbara Hepworth Museum. The day was topped off with a hands-on art workshop hosted by the Salvation Army.
