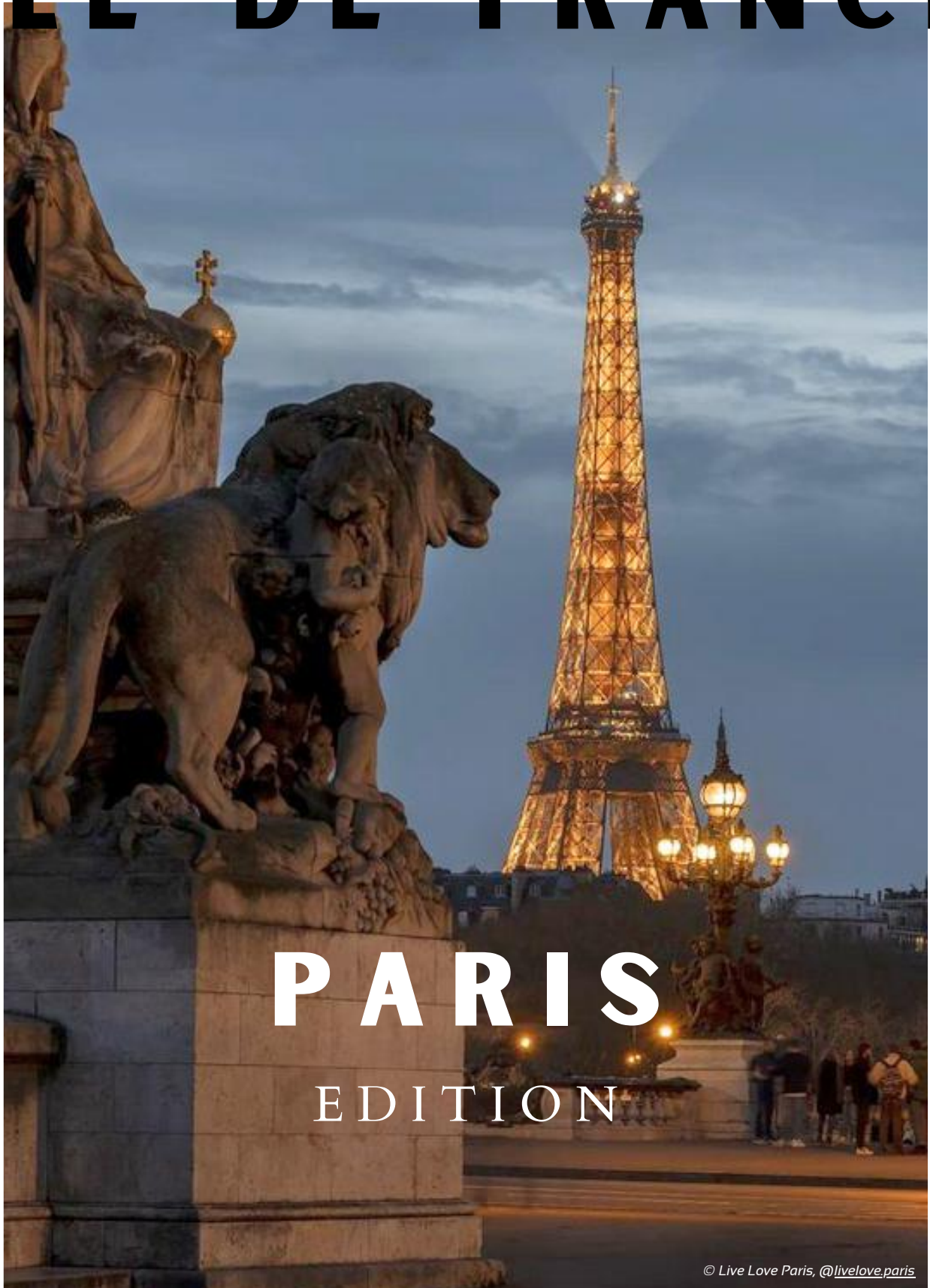

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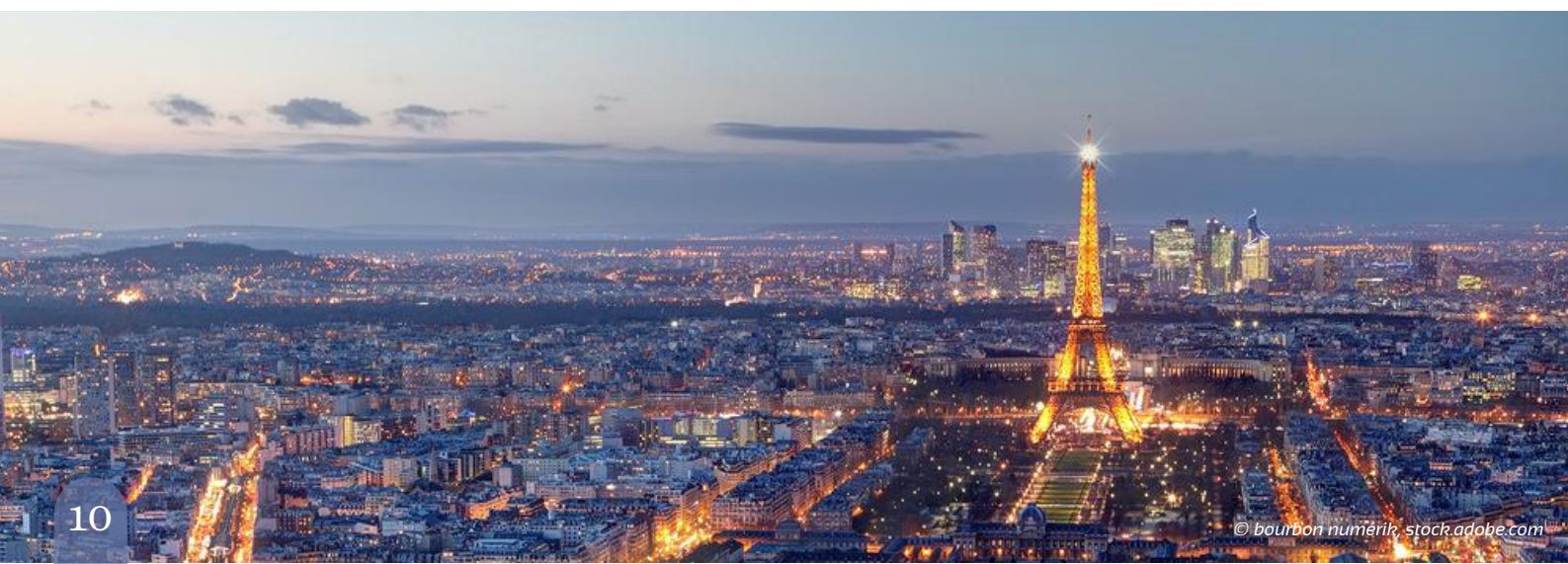
HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY

The department of Paris, created in 1968, replaced the former department of the Seine, in place since the French Revolution. This reorganization was intended to simplify the administrative management of the capital and its suburbs.

The name of the city, first mentioned by Julius Caesar in the middle of the 1st century BC in "The Gallic Wars" in the forms Lutecia or Lutetia. Paris owes its name to the Gallic people of the Parisii. Since the Middle Ages, Paris has established itself as an important city. Under the Capetians, it began to develop as a center of power and commerce, and then during the Renaissance and French Revolution, the city became the heart of the country's political and intellectual turmoil.

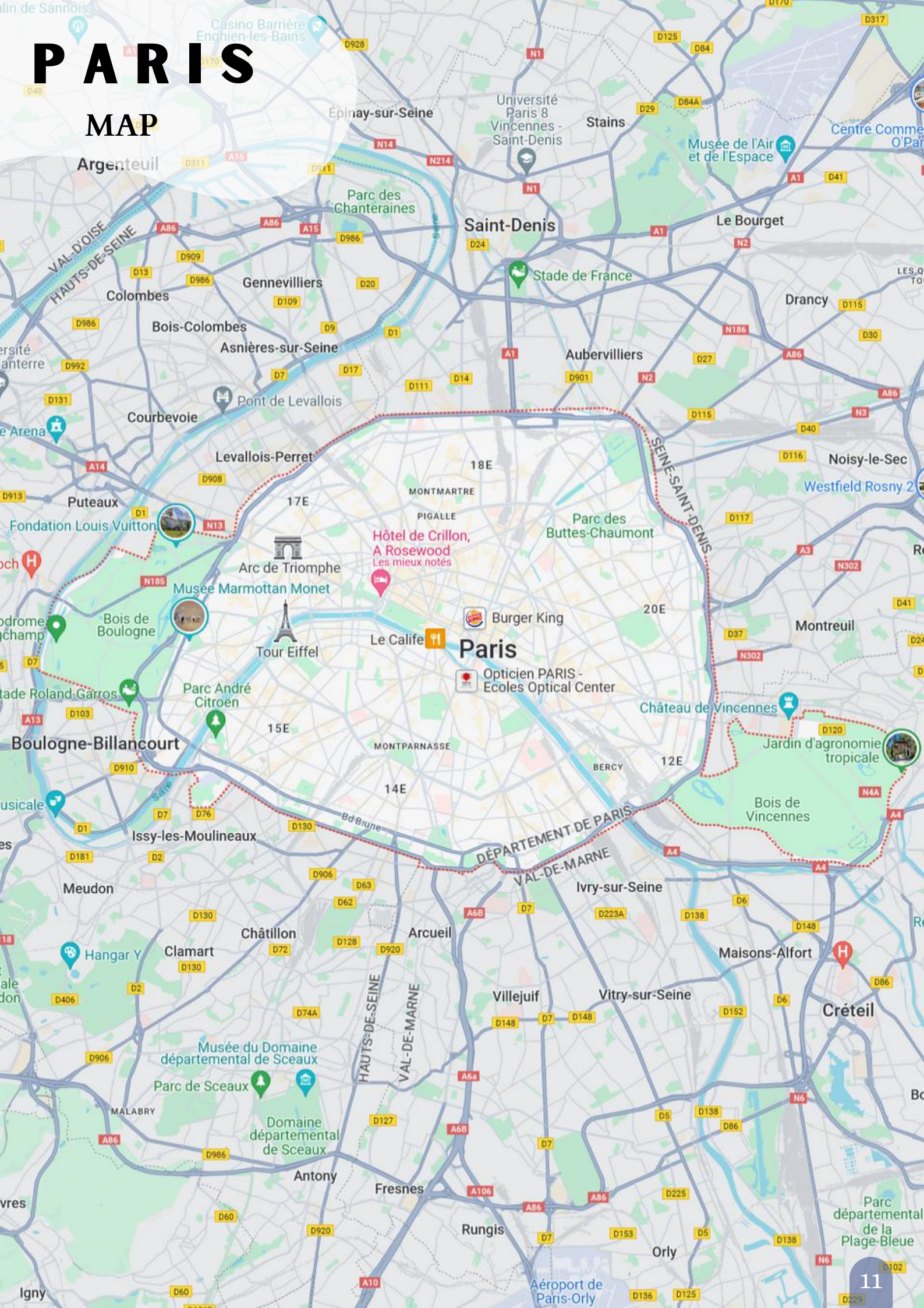
The department of Paris corresponds exactly to the city of Paris and is divided into 20 municipal districts. The Seine crosses Paris from east to west, separating the city on the Right Bank (north) and Left Bank (south). This river plays an essential role in transportation, trade and water supply.

Although densely populated and economically important, Paris is home to many parks and gardens, such as the Luxembourg Garden, the Parc des Buttes-Chaumont and the Bois de Boulogne. The city is also famous for its historical monuments (Eiffel Tower, Notre-Dame, Louvre) and its typical architecture of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, including the Haussmann buildings.

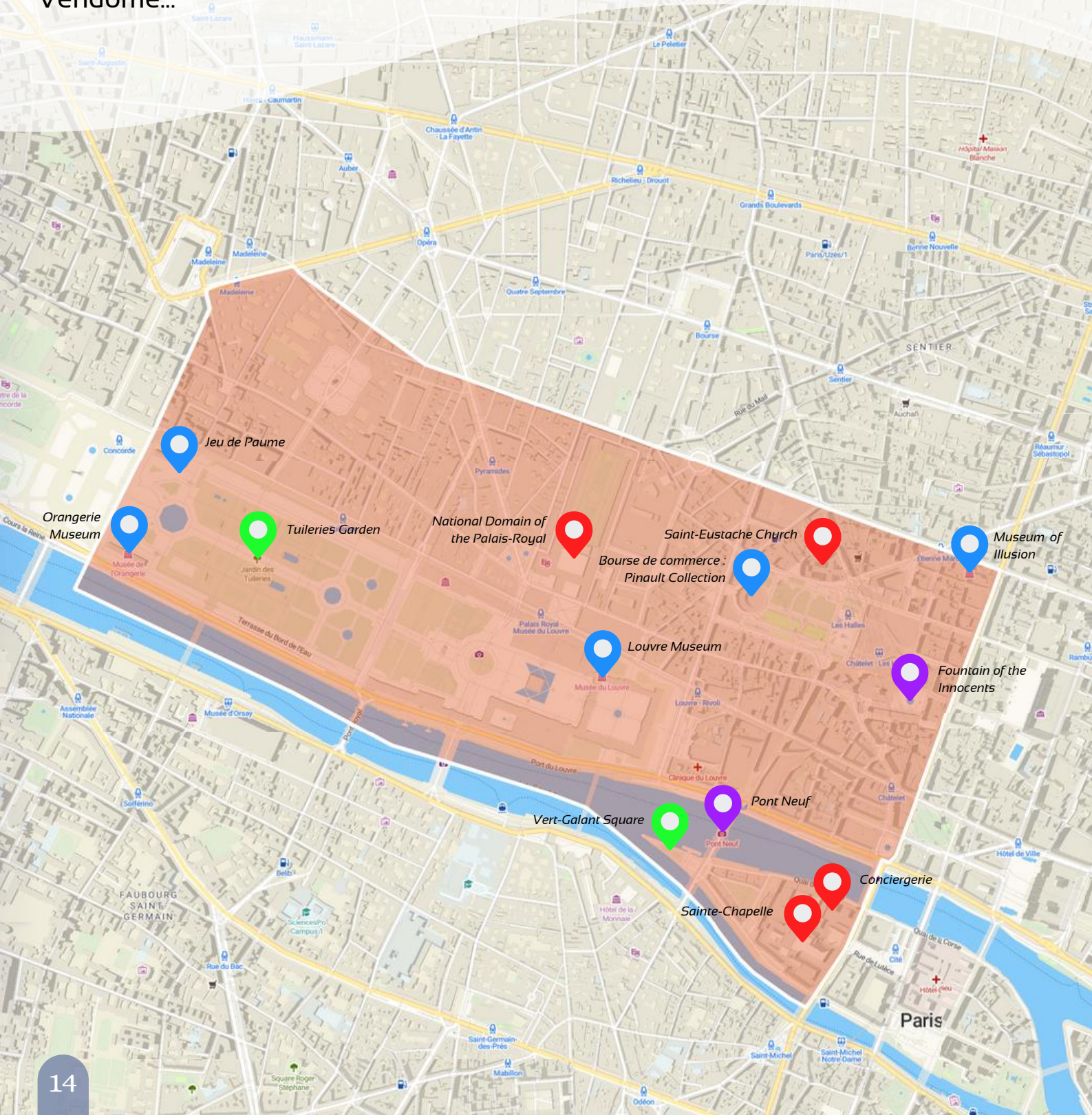
1ST ARRONDISSEMENT



1ST ARRONDISSEMENT

The 1st arrondissement is the true historic heart of Paris. Most of the remains date from the 18th and 19th centuries, but some ruins are much older, such as a part of the surrounding wall of the king's garden, dating from the 13th century.

Also called "the Louvre arrondissement", the 1st arrondissement houses major monuments that contribute to the rich heritage of the capital: the Comédie Française, the Palace of Justice, the Louvre, the Conciergerie, the Place Vendôme...





Louvre Museum

Renowned for being one of the largest and most famous museums in the world, the Louvre Museum invites you on a real journey through history. A former royal palace, it houses an extensive collection of works of art spanning several millennia, from antiquity to the modern period.


His masterpieces include Leonardo's Mona Lisa, Venus de Milo and the Sphinx of Tanis. The museum also organizes numerous temporary exhibitions and exciting events.

The Louvre is also famous for its glass pyramid, located in the heart of the Napoleon courtyard, which serves as the main entrance. This complex architectural work, designed by Chinese-American architect Ieoh Ming Pei, is today an emblematic symbol of the museum.

Open Monday, Thursday and weekend from 9am to 6pm, then Wednesday and Friday from 9am to 9pm. Closed on Tuesday, as well as 01/01, 01/05 and 25/12.

Orangerie Museum

Renowned for its exceptional collection of impressionist and post-impressionist paintings, the Orangerie museum is particularly famous for housing the vast panels of Claude Monet's Water Lilies, offering a unique immersive experience.

In addition to the works of Monet, the museum presents the Walter-Guillaume collection, which includes masterpieces by artists such as Paul Cézanne, Henri Matisse, Amedeo Modigliani, Pablo Picasso and Pierre-Auguste Renoir.

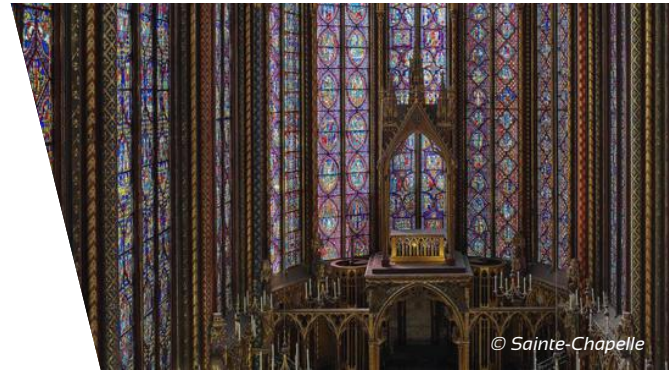


Sainte-Chapelle

A masterpiece of radiant Gothic architecture, the Sainte-Chapelle is famous for its stained glass windows, which cover an area of more than 600 m² and tell biblical scenes.

Built in the middle of the 13th century by King Louis IX to house the relics of the Passion of Christ, it is a real artistic and spiritual feat.

The Conciergerie, originally a royal residence in the Middle Ages, is best known for its role as a prison during the French Revolution. 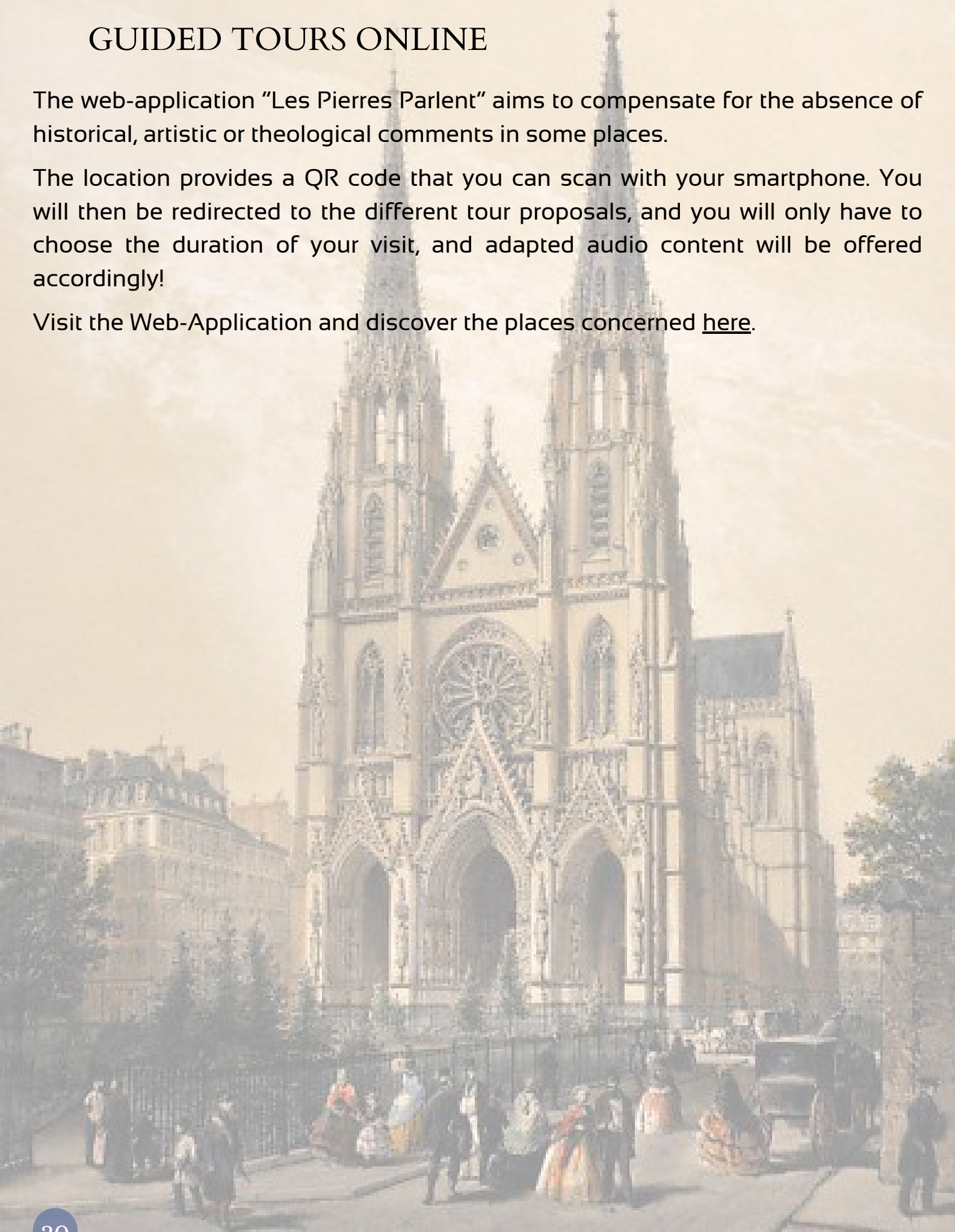
LES PIERRES PARLENT

Built in the 17th century for Cardinal Richelieu, le Domaine National du Palais-Royal was then the residence of the kings of France before becoming a cultural and political center.

The Palais-Royal includes several historic buildings surrounding magnificent French gardens open to the public. They offer a haven of peace with their shaded paths, flowerbeds and beautiful fountains. At the center of the gardens are also the famous Columns of Buren, a contemporary artistic installation created by Daniel Buren in 1986.

With its unique blend of history, art and culture, the Domaine National du Palais-Royal is a must visit for those who wish to discover an elegant and tranquil facet of Paris.

Tuileries Garden

The Tuileries Garden is one of the oldest and most famous public gardens in the capital. Created in 1564 by Catherine de Medici, it was redesigned in the French style by André Le Nôtre in the 17th century, becoming an emblematic example of the French garden.

Spanning 25 hectares, the garden offers extensive tree-lined walkways, flowerbeds, ponds and classic and contemporary statues.

It also houses the Orangerie Museum and the Jeu de Paume, which were presented previously. Cultural events and open-air exhibitions are held regularly.

Vert-Galant Square

The Square du Vert-Galant is a charming green space that offers a view of the Seine and the bridges of Paris. It was named in tribute to King Henry IV, nicknamed the «Vert-Galant», for his reputation as a great seducer.

Surrounded by water, it offers a bucolic setting and is an excellent starting point for a tourist boat ride on the Seine.

Considered the oldest stone bridge in Paris, the Pont Neuf was built in 1578 under the leadership of King Henri IV. It is distinguished by its 12 arches, its 381 masks and the equestrian statue of Henri IV, the first effigy on a public road in France!

Fountain of the Innocents

incontournable 🏆

Built in 1260 on the forecourt of a small church, it marked the place where the Kings of France were celebrated after their coronation at the cathedral of Reims. In 1550, it was decorated with Renaissance mythological scenes and creatures by Pierre Lescot, at the king's initiative.

Today surrounded by many restaurants and cafes, it serves as a central meeting point in the neighborhood.

The name of this monument is related to the Holy Innocents and the "massacre of the Innocents", a biblical episode related in the Gospel according to Matthew. In the 1st century BC, King Herod, fearing the advent of a king of the Jews, ordered the killing of all children under the age of two in Bethlehem. It was then that Jesus' parents fled to Egypt, a famous scene in Christian iconography.



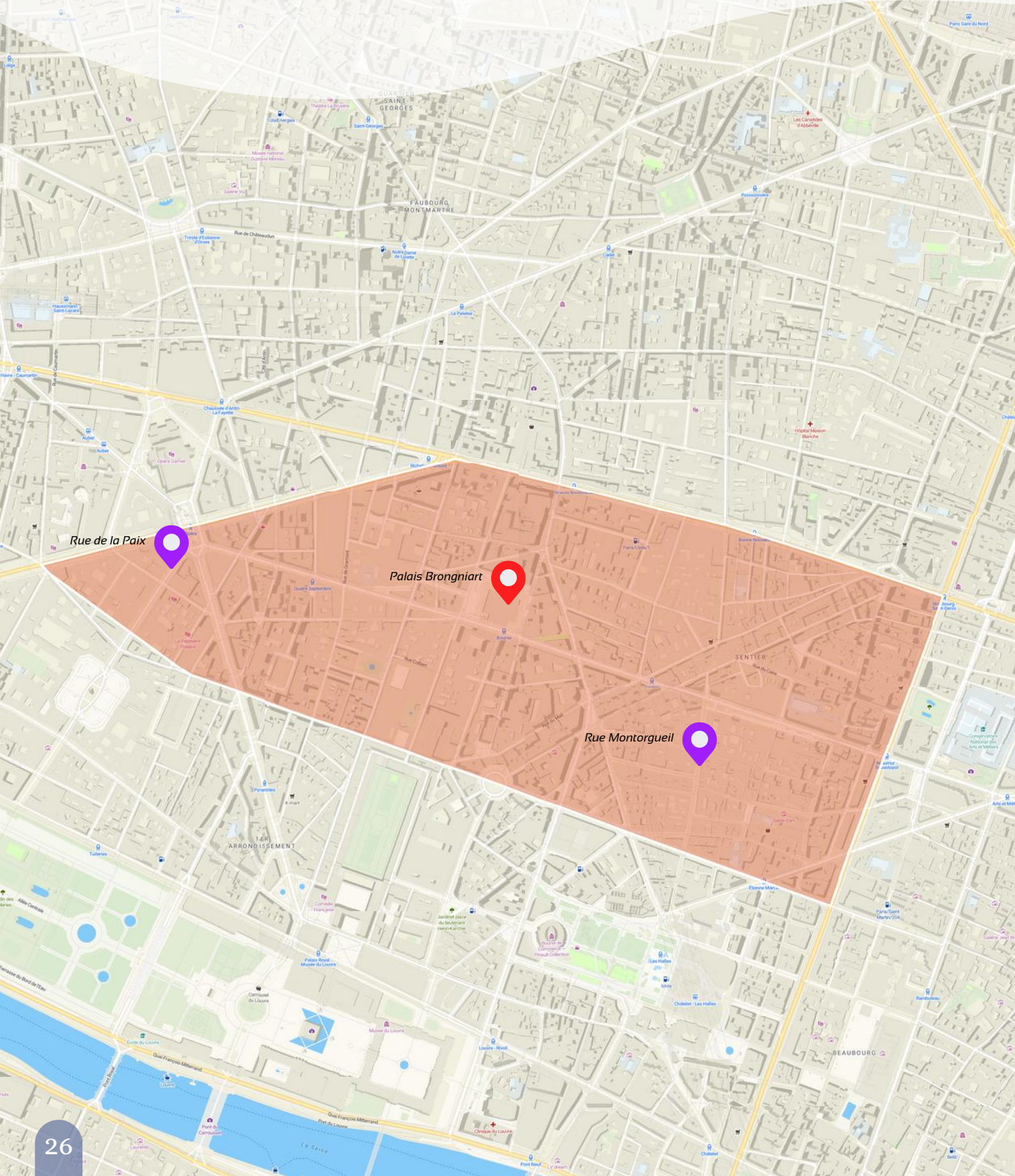

2ND ARRONDISSEMENT

The 2nd arrondissement of Paris is a small neighborhood known for its historic walkways, financial institutions and lively shopping streets. It is home to the Palais Brongniart, rue Montorgueil and rue de la Paix.



Palais Brongniart

Built between 1807 and 1826, the Palais Brongniart was the seat of the Paris Stock Exchange until 1987.

Currently, the Palais Brongniart conferences, fairs, exhibitions, fashion shows, awards ceremonies or corporate events.

Rue Montorgueil

Rue Montorgueil is one of the oldest, busiest and most beautiful streets in the capital. It is full of historic buildings and charming little squares.

Constantly bustling with its many cafes, restaurants, bars and shops, the street is famous for its many gastronomic establishments. Among the emblematic addresses, the **Stohrer pastry shop**, founded in 1730, is one of the oldest in Paris.

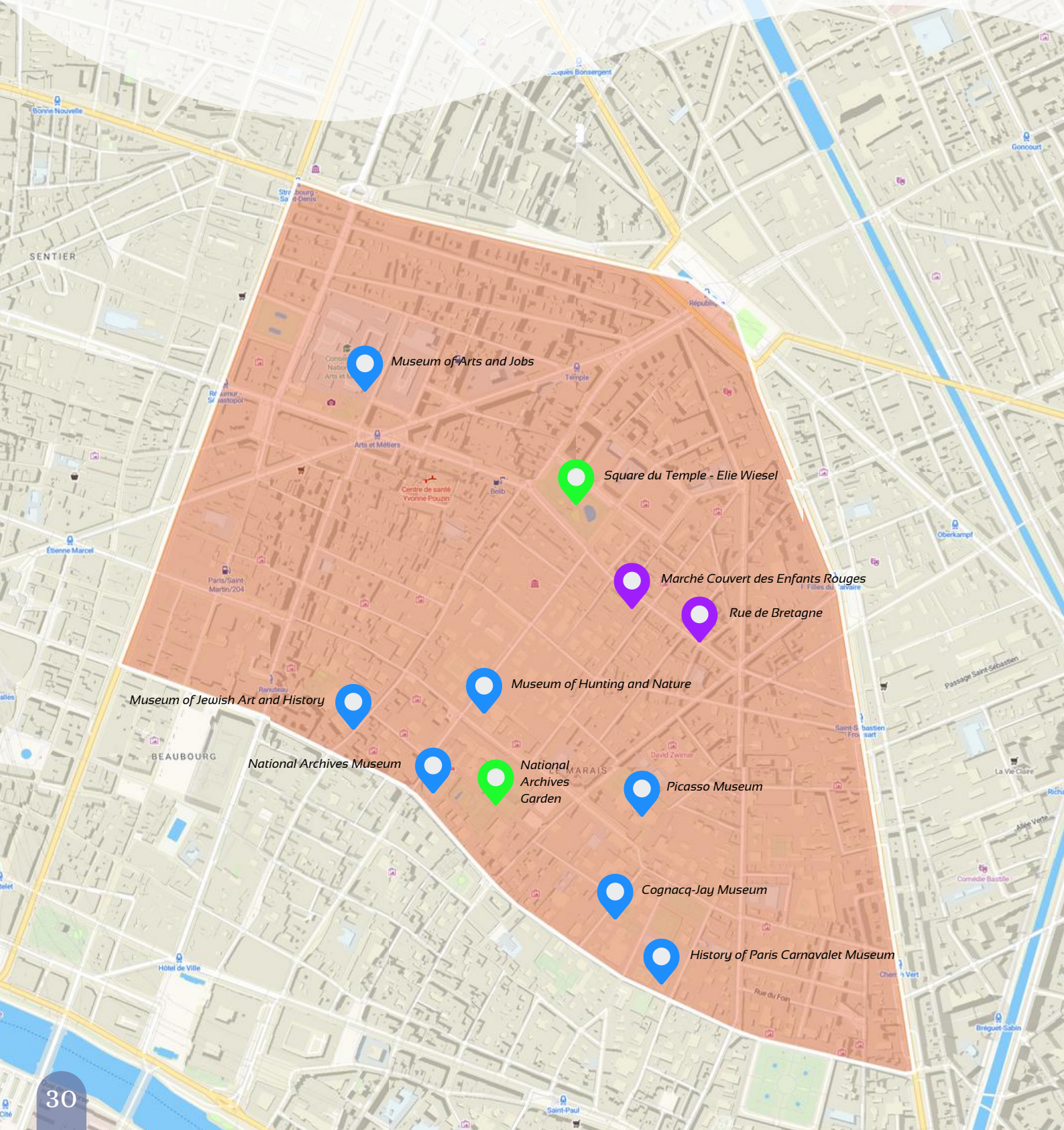

3RD ARRONDISSEMENT

A vibrant and historic district known as "Haut Marais", the 3rd arrondissement of Paris is renowned for its picturesque streets, its dynamism, and its many museums such as the Picasso Museum and the Museum of Arts and Jobs.

The area is also home to the Marché des Enfants Rouges, the oldest covered market in Paris, offering a variety of fresh produce and international food stalls.





Picasso Museum

The Picasso Museum houses more than 5,000 works by Pablo Picasso, covering all periods of his career, from the first sketches to the famous Cubist paintings.

The museum presents a varied collection of paintings, sculptures, ceramics, drawings and engravings, as well as personal objects of the artist.

In addition to its permanent collections, temporary exhibitions to explore different aspects of Picasso's work are regularly organized.

Museum of Arts and Jobs

The Museum of Arts and Jobs is one of the oldest technical and industrial museums in the world, founded in 1794. Housed in the former Abbey of Saint-Martin-des-Champs, the museum houses a vast collection of inventions and significant discoveries in the history of science and technology.

Its seven thematic departments cover areas ranging from scientific instrumentation to transport, energy and communication. Among the centerpieces are the Foucault pendulum, the first steam engines and the prototype of the Chappe telegraph.

Open from Tuesday to Sunday from 10am to 6pm. Extended until 9pm on Friday. Closed 01/01, 01/05 and 25/12.

Museum of Jewish Art and History

The Museum of Jewish Art and History, housed in the Hôtel de Saint-Aignan, a 17th-century mansion, is dedicated to the preservation, study and promotion of Jewish art and history.

The museum exhibits a variety of objects such as torahs, illuminated manuscripts, textiles, and decorative art objects illustrating the life of Jewish communities.

It regularly organizes temporary exhibitions and offers a varied program of cultural activities to deepen understanding of Jewish culture and history. This museum is a must for discovering the Jewish heritage in Paris.

Formerly a marshy area that was cleaned up in the 12th century, Le Marais became popular with the nobility in the 17th century. There are many mansions, such as the Hôtel de Sully and the Hôtel de Ville. The district retains a medieval charm with its narrow cobbled streets, contrasting with the great Parisian boulevards.

This area is home to renowned museums and has a rich Jewish history, especially around Rue des Rosiers. Le Marais is known for its lively cafés, bars and varied restaurants, but is also known for its contemporary art galleries, fashion boutiques and concept stores.

In short, Le Marais is a district where history, culture, fashion and diversity come together, offering a unique experience to visitors and residents.

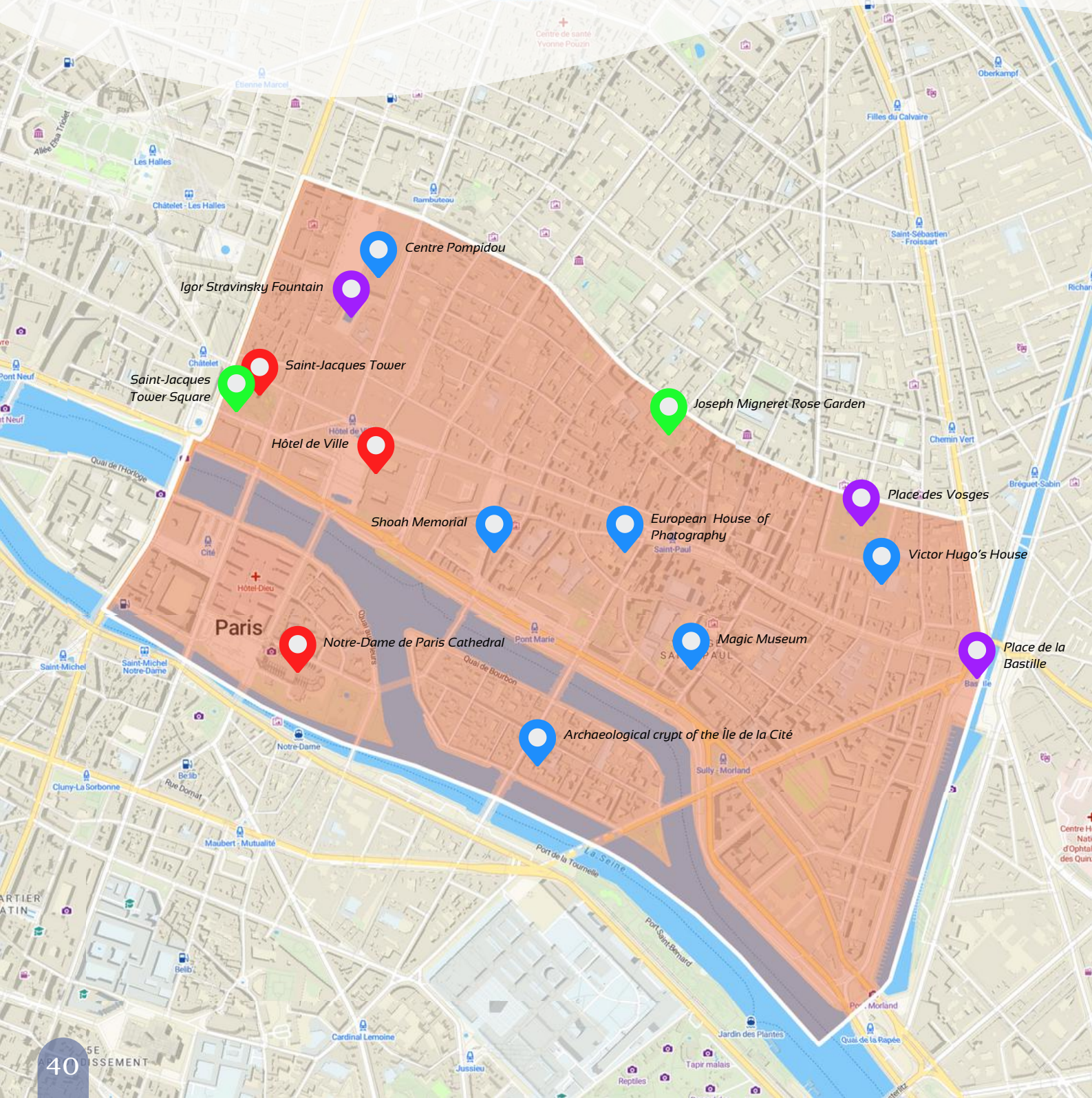
4TH ARRONDISSEMENT



4TH ARRONDISSEMENT

This historic and lively district combines emblematic monuments such as the Hôtel de Ville and the Place des Vosges, a rich culture with sites such as the Centre Pompidou and the Magic Museum, as well as a vibrant neighborhood life thanks to its many cafes, bars and shops.





Centre Pompidou

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The Centre Pompidou is a world-famous architectural masterpiece and a cultural hotspot. It is a centre dedicated to contemporary art and culture. Inside, there is an extensive collection of modern and contemporary art including works by Picasso, Kandinsky, Duchamp, and many other renowned artists. The museum also has fascinating temporary exhibitions that explore current artistic trends and cultural movements.

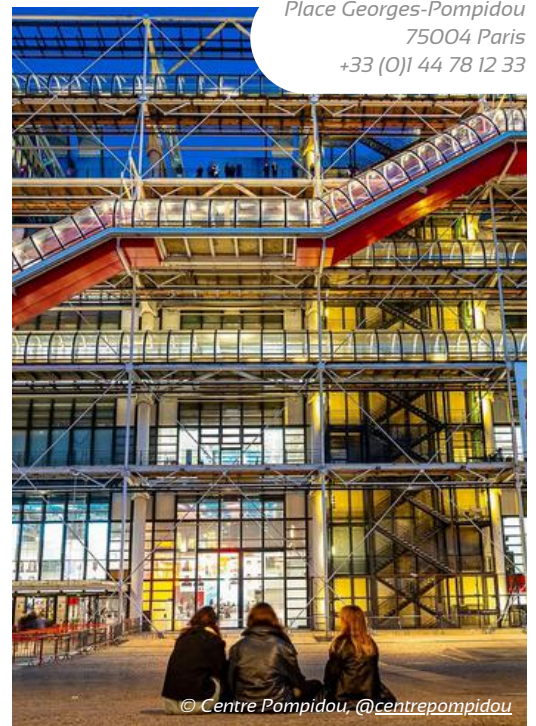
In addition to art galleries, the Centre Pompidou offers spaces dedicated to music, cinema, literature and the performing arts. Its public library, one of the largest in Europe, provides access to an extensive collection of books, magazines and multimedia materials.

Finally, enjoy a gourmet break on the terraces of the Centre Pompidou, which offer exceptional panoramic views of Paris.

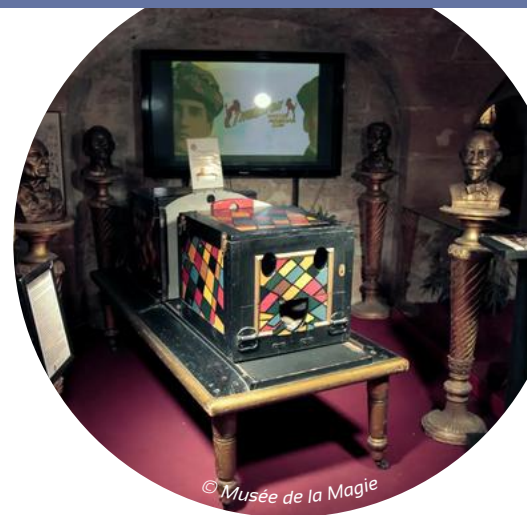

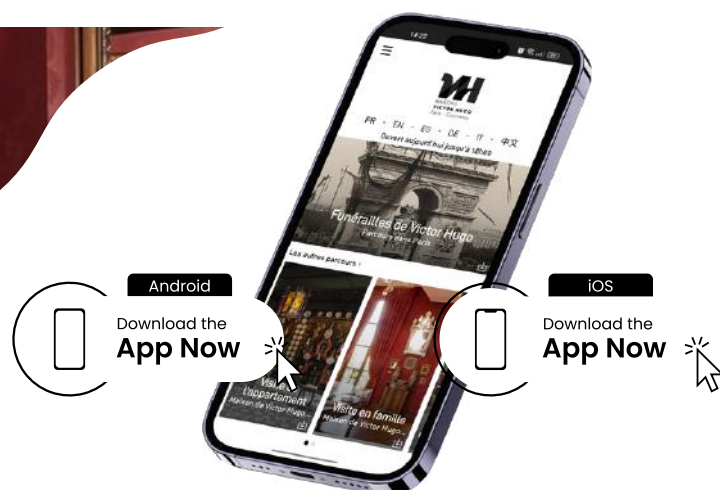

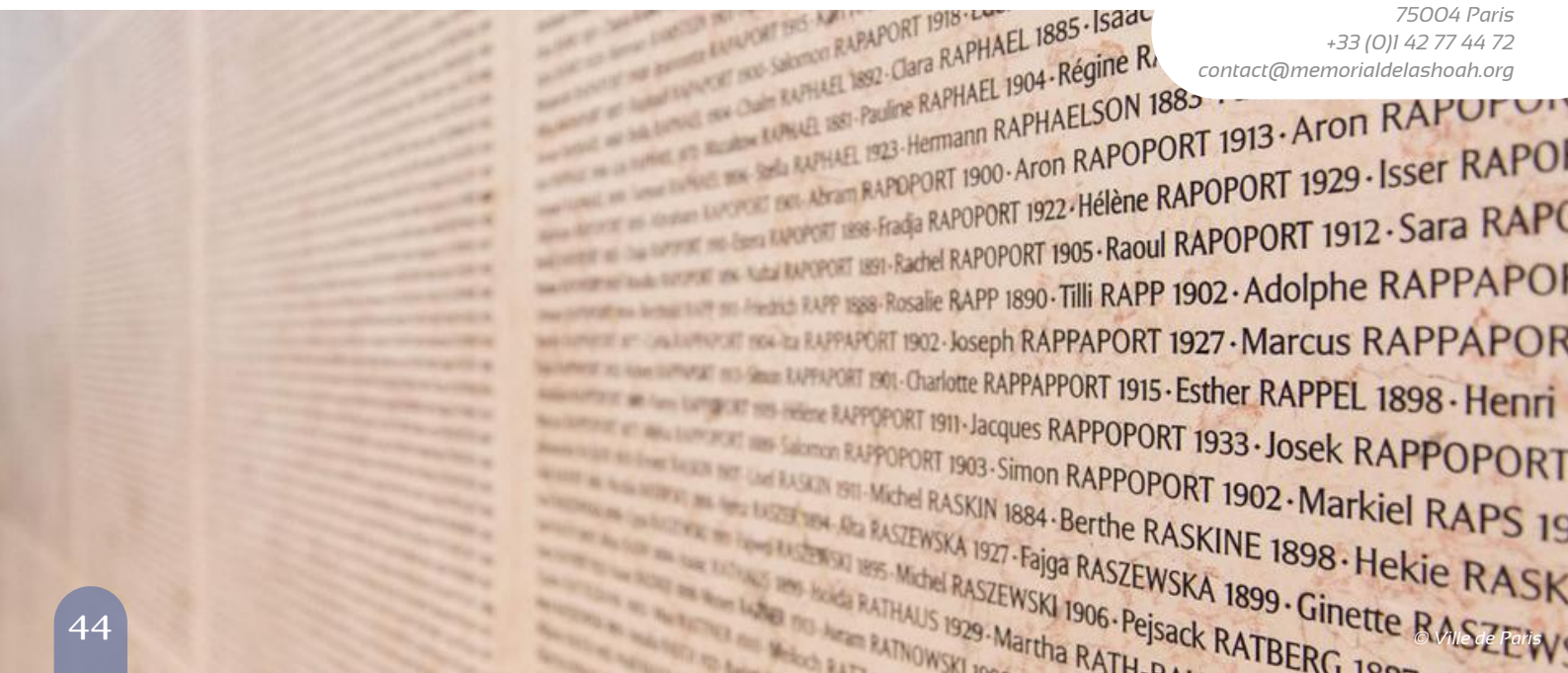

Saint-Jacques Tower

Formerly the site of the Bastille prison, whose capture on July 14, 1789 marked the beginning of the French Revolution, the Place de la Bastille is an emblematic place of French history.

In the center of the square stands the [Colonne de Juillet](#), erected in memory of the revolutionaries of 1830. It is even possible to visit the lower parts of the monument. Another major point of interest is the [Opéra Bastille](#), known for its rich programme of operas, ballets and concerts.

Surrounded by cafés, restaurants, bars and lively streets, the Place de la Bastille is a popular meeting place, which also serves as a starting point for many cultural events and events.



Place des Vosges

Place des Vosges is one of the oldest and most beautiful squares in Paris. Inaugurated in 1612 during the reign of Louis XIII, it is remarkable for its harmonious architecture and its red brick buildings with slate roofs.

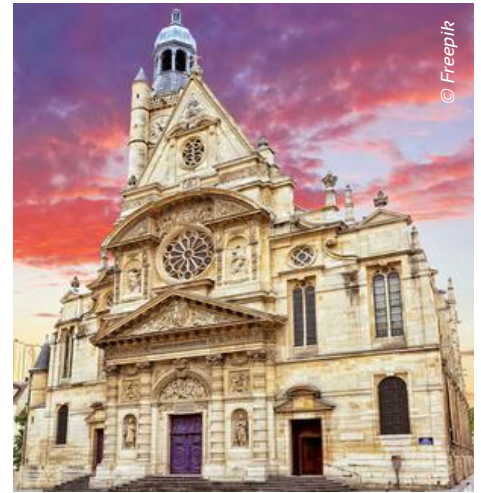
Saint-Étienne-du-Mont Church

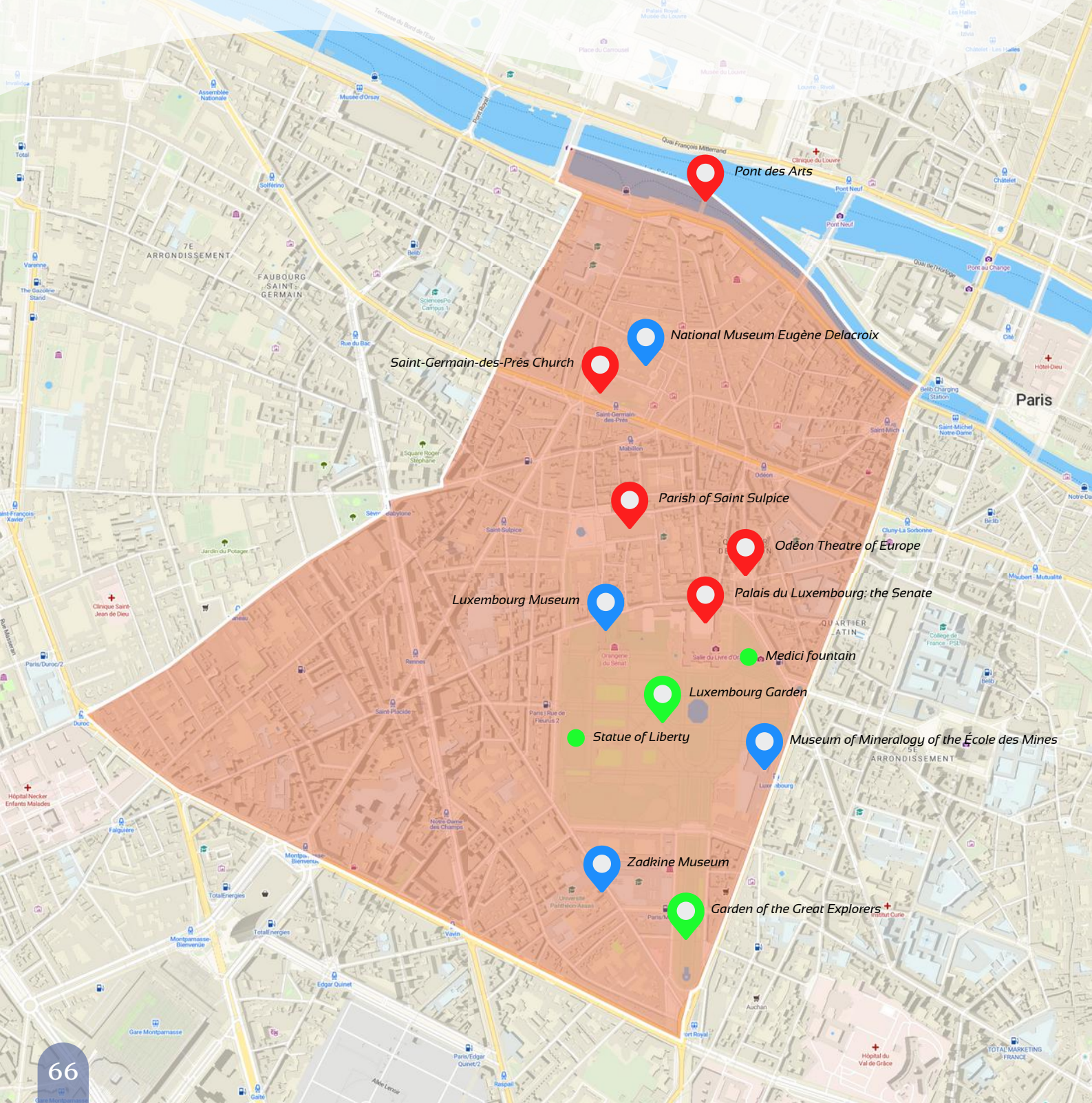

The Pont des Arts is an iconic pedestrian bridge built during the reign of Napoleon Bonaparte. It is the capital's first metal bridge.

This bridge is renowned for its romantic setting and panoramic views of the surrounding Parisian monuments. Once famous for the thousands of "love padlocks" hung by couples, the weight of these padlocks required their removal in 2015 to preserve the structure of the bridge.

Then in 2020, another part of the padlocks took the form of a work of art located on Place du Palais Royal: an ephemeral house 3 meters high covered with padlocks and entitled *Chez Nous*.

Saint-Germain-des-Prés Church

The Saint-Germain-des-Prés Church, one of the oldest in Paris, is a historical and architectural jewel founded in the 6th century. It features a mix of Roman and Gothic styles, with frescoes, stained glass windows and interior sculptures.

It houses famous tombs, including that of René Descartes. Surrounded by cafés, bookstores and art galleries in a lively cultural district, the church is a centre of intellectual and spiritual life, welcoming masses, concerts and events.

Medici fountain

Located in the Luxembourg garden, the Medici Fountain is a masterpiece of baroque architecture and sculpture. Commissioned by Marie de Medici in 1630, this fountain is a peaceful and romantic place, surrounded by greenery and a serene pool.

In the center of the fountain, a large niche houses a statue representing the mythological scene of Polyphemus surprising Galatea and Acis, carved by Auguste Ottin in the nineteenth century.



Statue of Liberty

The Statue of Liberty of the Luxembourg Garden is a miniature version of the original work located in New York and created by the French sculptor Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi.

Like its American model, this replica installed in 1906 is a tribute to the Franco-American friendship and a symbol of freedom and democracy. She holds a tablet inscribed with the date of the American Declaration of Independence (July 4, 1776) and a torch symbolizing the light of freedom.



Garden of the Great Explorers

The Garden of the Great Explorers is a peaceful green space dedicated to the famous French explorers.

It is adorned with statues and memorials and houses the magnificent Quatre-Parties-du-Monde Fountain, the work of Jean-Baptiste Carpeaux. It represents the four continents supporting a globe, surrounded by sea horses, dolphins and turtles spitting water.

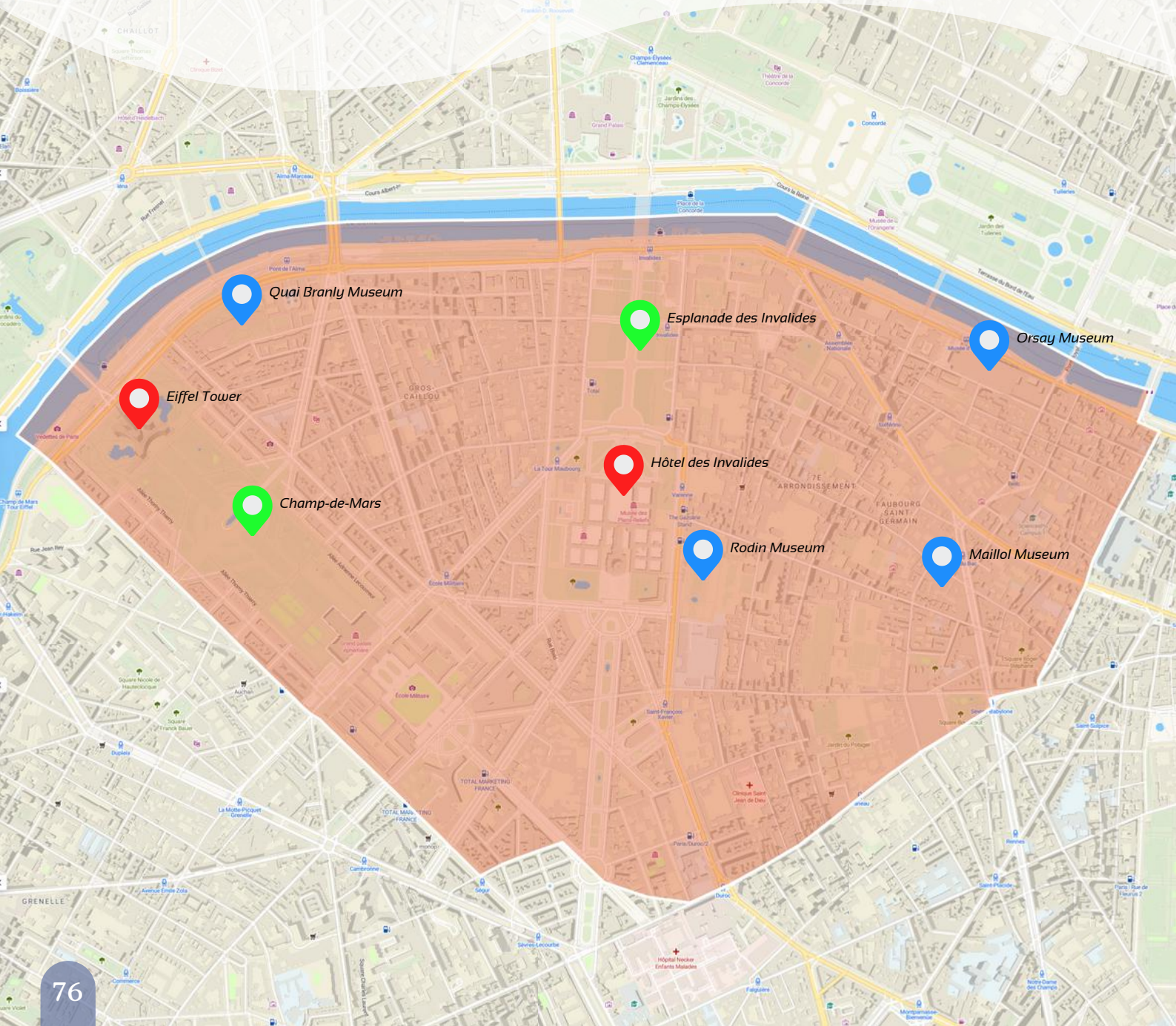

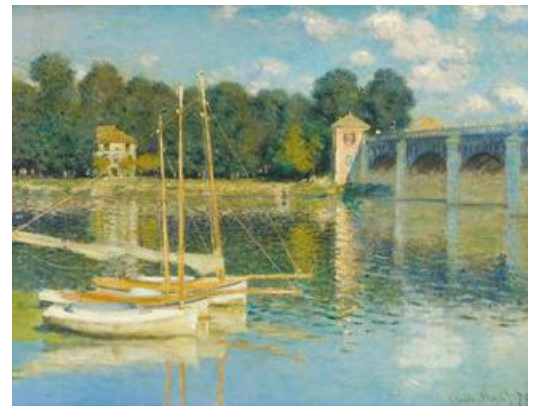

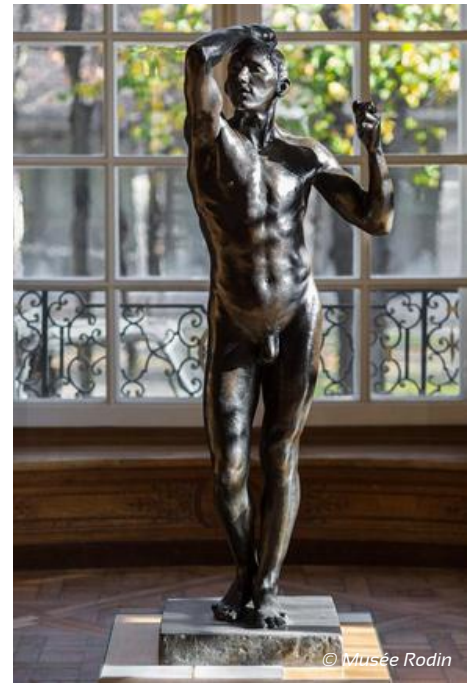

Hôtel des Invalides

The Hôtel des Invalides is a historic architectural complex built at the end of the 17th century to house war invalids. This majestic site is now a military museum and a national memorial site.

It can be spotted in the Parisian landscape thanks to the gilding of its famous Dome. Designed by Jules Hardouin-Mansart, it is a masterpiece of French Baroque architecture, and houses the tomb of Napoleon Bonaparte.

In addition to the tomb of Napoleon, the Hôtel des Invalides houses the graves of several other important French military figures, such as Marshal Foch.

Tomb of Napoleon I

Located under the golden dome of the Invalides, Napoleon's tomb is an iconic and majestic site that attracts visitors from around the world.

Napoleon died in exile on the island of Saint Helena in 1821. His ashes were brought back to France in 1840, during what is known as the "return of ashes", and were placed in his tomb in 1861.

The sarcophagus of Napoleon, in red quartzite, rests on a base in green granite of the Vosges. The whole is surrounded by 12 statues symbolizing Napoleon's military victories, as well as bas-reliefs depicting scenes from his life.



Saint-Louis-des-Invalides Cathedral

Located in the heart of the Hôtel des Invalides, the Saint-Louis-des-Invalides Cathedral is a historic church dedicated to Saint Louis, King of France.

Designed by Jules Hardouin-Mansart and Robert de Cotte for veterans, it has a sober and elegant classic style, typical of the seventeenth century. Its façade is decorated with pilasters and niches housing statues of saints.

The interior of the cathedral is remarkable for its large nave, vaults and side chapels. It is also decorated with military flags taken from the enemy, and is connected to the Dome of the Invalides.



Army Museum

The Army Museum is one of the most important military museums in the world. It traces the military history of France and has an impressive collection of weapons and armor, from the Middle Ages to the present day. The galleries display swords, knight armor, muskets, cannons and uniforms.

The chronological exhibitions make it possible to follow the military evolution of France through the centuries, with sections dedicated to the great historical periods such as the Napoleonic Wars, the First and the Second World War.

The Salle des Plans-Reliefs presents historical models of fortified cities, made between the seventeenth and nineteenth centuries, allowing to visualize the evolution of fortifications and military strategy.

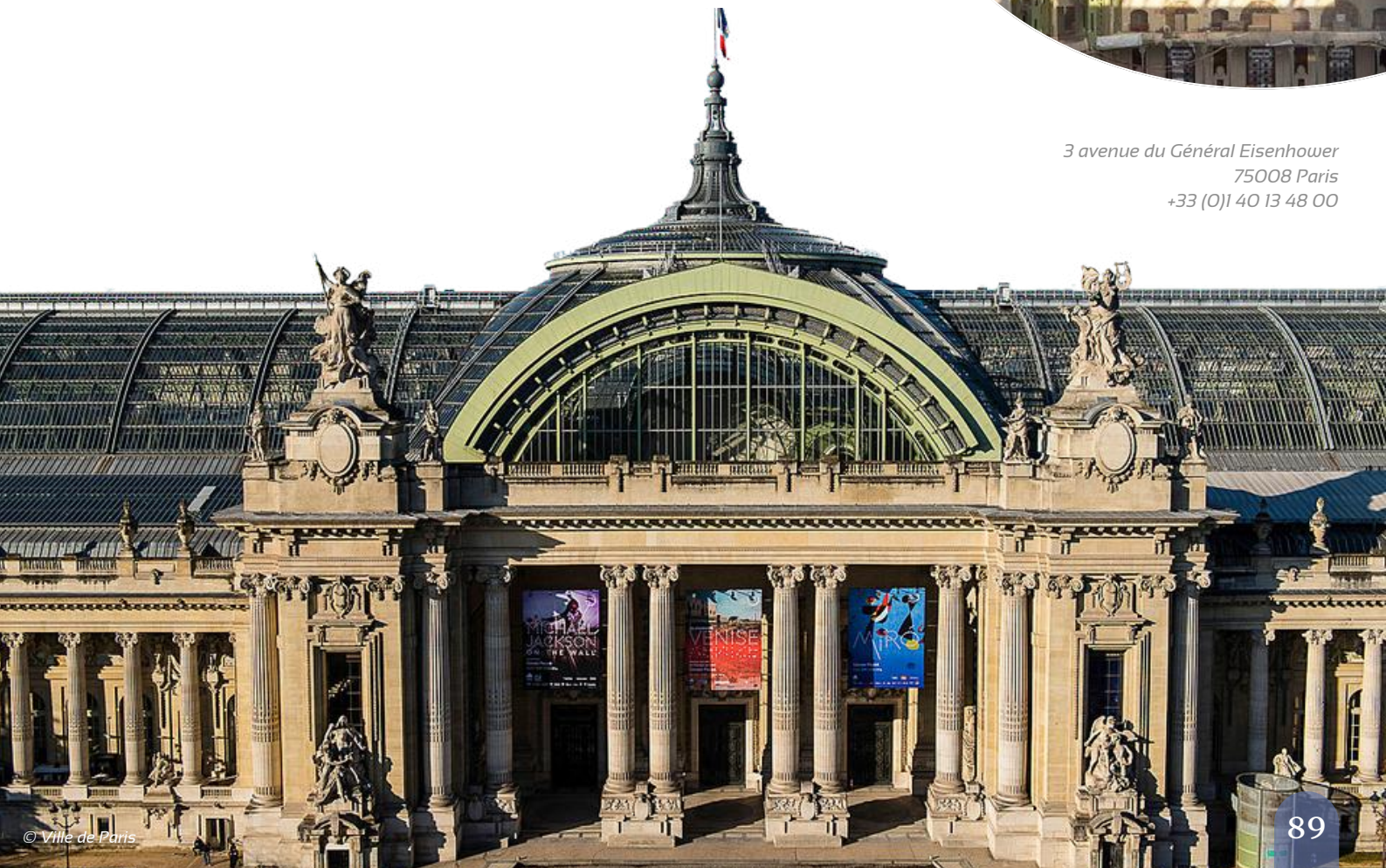

Arc de Triomphe

Commissioned by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1806 to celebrate his military victories, the Arc de Triomphe is one of the most emblematic monuments of the French capital. It is now a place of national commemoration, especially during the celebrations of July 14 and the ceremonies of November 11.

It is 50 meters high and 45 meters wide. It is decorated with monumental sculptures depicting battle scenes and allegorical characters.

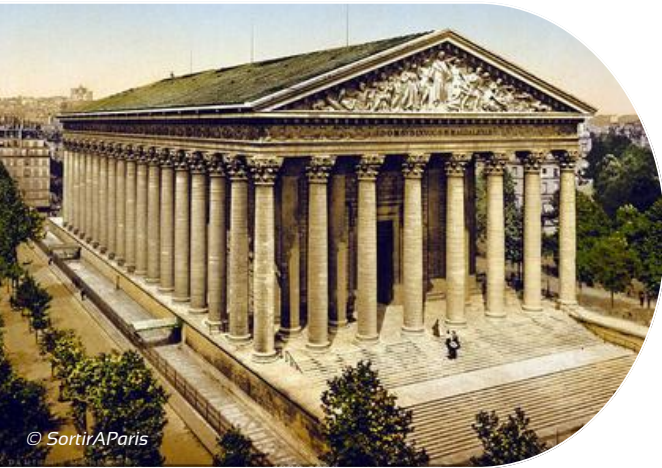


Madeleine Church

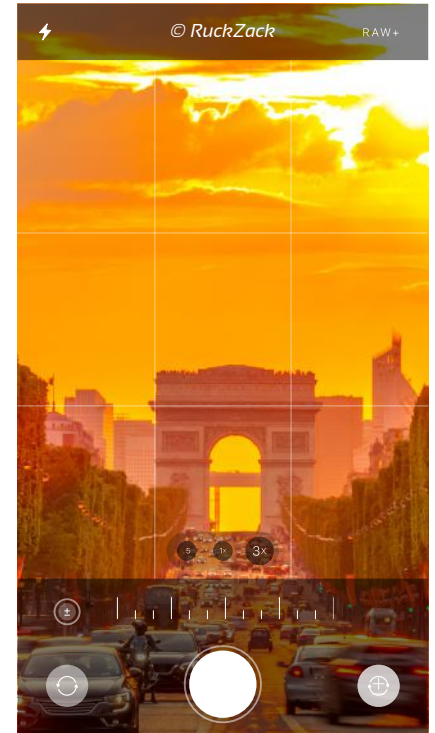

The statue of a zouave, a North African light infantry soldier, is one of the most famous elements of the bridge. It is often used to measure the level of the Seine during floods.

Also very famous, the Flame of Liberty, a replica of the flame of the Statue of Liberty, became an unofficial memorial for Princess Diana, who died in a car accident in the Alma tunnel in 1997.



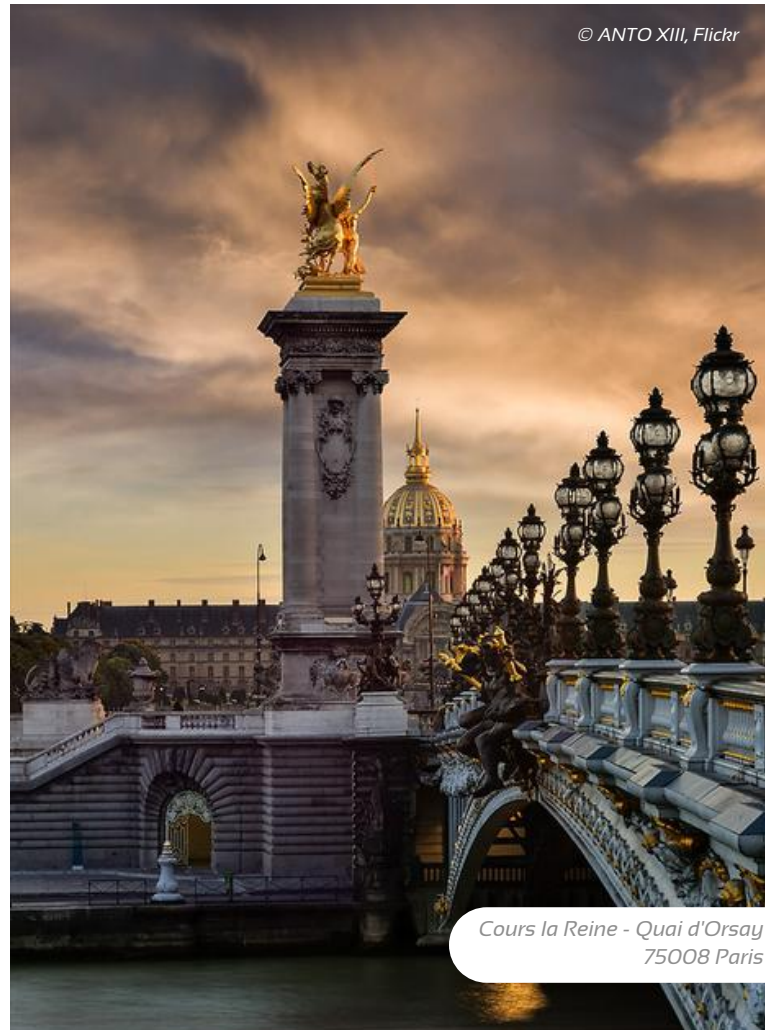

Often considered the most beautiful bridge in the capital, the Pont Alexandre III, inaugurated in 1900 for the Universal Exhibition, symbolizes the Franco-Russian friendship and is famous for its elegance and decorations.

The bridge is decorated with sculptures and statues in gilded bronze, representing nymphs, winged Pegasus and allegorical figures.

It offers spectacular views of the Seine and iconic monuments such as the Invalides, the Grand Palais and the Petit Palais. It is a popular place for photography, especially at sunset.





Monceau Park

Monceau Park is one of the most beautiful and elegant gardens in the capital. Created in the 18th century and refurbished by Baron Haussmann under Napoleon III, this park combines an English style with classical elements.

The park houses a neoclassical rotunda at the main entrance, a Venetian bridge, a Corinthian colonnade, and statues of famous writers and musicians, such as Guy de Maupassant and Frédéric Chopin.

With its vast lawns, shady groves, winding alleys and century-old trees, Monceau Park offers an ideal setting for a walk or a picnic.

Coulée verte René-Dumont



The Coulée verte René-Dumont is an old railway transformed into a green promenade and extending over about 4.5 kilometers.

Inaugurated in 1993, it is the first elevated urban greenway in the world! The promenade is beautifully landscaped with a variety of plants, trees and flowers, and includes raised sections, underground passages and tunnels, creating a fun walking experience.

The route crosses the **Viaduc des Arts**, a structure housing artisan workshops and galleries, as well as the **Reuilly Garden**, a popular green area with lawns and playgrounds.

Bois de Vincennes

Covering nearly 995 hectares, the Bois de Vincennes is the largest green space in Paris.

Created in the 19th century under the reign of Napoleon III, it houses several lakes, including the **Daumesnil Lake**, the **Minimes Lake**, the **Saint-Mandé Lake** and the **Gravelle Lake**, where it is possible to rent boats and enjoy boat rides. The wood is therefore a popular place for hiking, jogging, cycling and picnics.

Tropical Garden

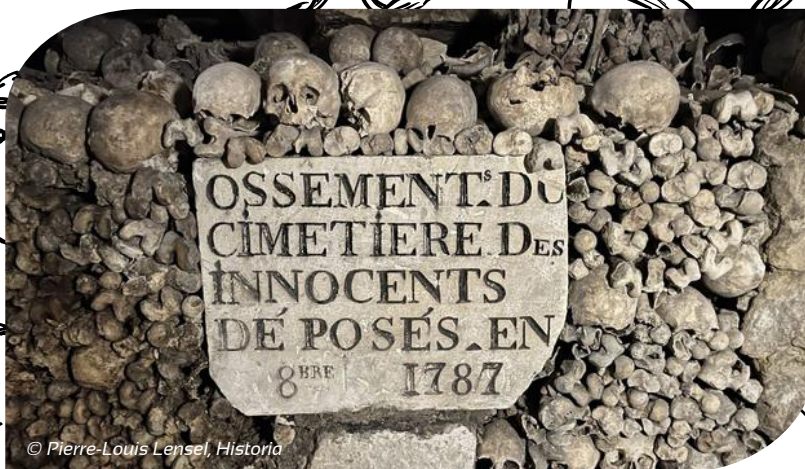
The Paris catacombs are former underground quarries transformed into municipal ossuary to solve the problem of overpopulation of Parisian cemeteries

Paris Observatory

Founded in 1667 under the reign of Louis XIV, the Paris Observatory played a crucial role in the development of astronomy and space sciences in France.

Today, the observatory is still active and also houses the Institute of Celestial Mechanics and Calculation of Ephemerides (IMCCE) and other specialized research institutes.

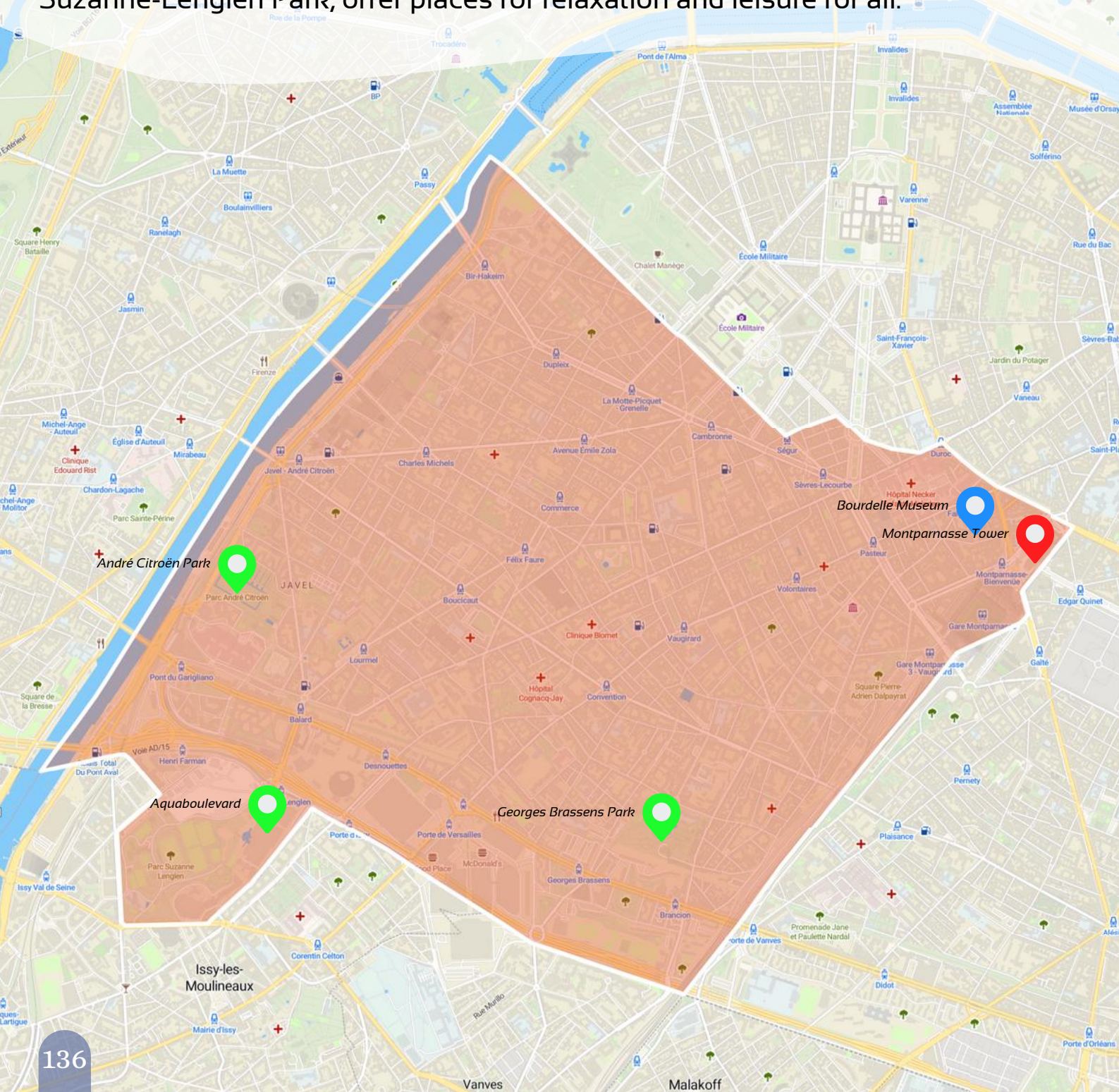


15TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 15th arrondissement is a residential area that harmoniously combines modernity and tradition. It is appreciated for its infrastructure, green spaces and family atmosphere.

It consists of several different neighborhoods such as Vaugirard, Javel, Grenelle or Saint-Lambert; and houses famous places, such as the Montparnasse Tower, the Bourdelle Museum, Aquaboulevard, or Île aux Cygnes.

Many green spaces, such as André-Citroën Park, Georges-Brassens Park and Suzanne-Lenglen Park, offer places for relaxation and leisure for all.





Bourdelle Museum

Dedicated to the work of sculptor Antoine Bourdelle and installed in his former workshops, the museum in his name allows to discover his universe through his sculptures, drawings and paintings. The works on display trace Bourdelle's artistic evolution and testify to his influence on modern sculpture.

By going to the Bourdelle Museum, you can visit the artist's authentic studio, the great plasterwork room, where are exhibited many plaster sculptures, but also the sculpture garden, where several monumental bronze and marble sculptures are presented.

Open from Tuesday to Sunday from 10am to 6pm. Closed on 01/01, 01/05 and 25/12.

Montparnasse Tower

The Montparnasse Tower is one of the most emblematic skyscrapers in the French capital. With its 210 meters of height and its 59 floors, it is one of the tallest buildings in Paris.

The Montparnasse Tower Observatory, located on the 56th and 59th floors, is accessible to the public and offers a 360-degree view of Paris.

The tower is also home to restaurants and shops, including the 56th-floor gourmet restaurant "Le Ciel de Paris", offering a culinary experience with stunning views of the city.

The Observatory is open every day from 9:30am. From 01/10 to 31/03, closed at 10:30pm on weekdays, and at 11pm on weekends and holidays. Closed at 11:30pm from 01/04 to 30/09.

André Citroën Park

Inaugurated in 1992 on the former site of the Citroën factories, the André Citroën Park is one of the most recent and modern parks in the capital.

It has synchronized water jets, canals, as well as several thematic gardens: the White Garden and the Black Garden, two opposite gardens in terms of color and atmosphere; the Greenhouse Gardens, six thematic greenhouses each dedicated to a specific plant; and the Gardens in Movements, where vegetation changes with the seasons and years.

Within the park, a balloon that works as an indicator of the city's air quality allows you to go up to 150 meters above sea level, to enjoy a panoramic view of Paris!

Open from 8am on weekdays and from 9am on weekends. Closes at 8:30pm from 29/04 to 30/09, and at 7:30pm from 01/10 to 26/10. From 29/04 to 29/09, opening in the morning from 7am on weekdays and 8am on weekends.

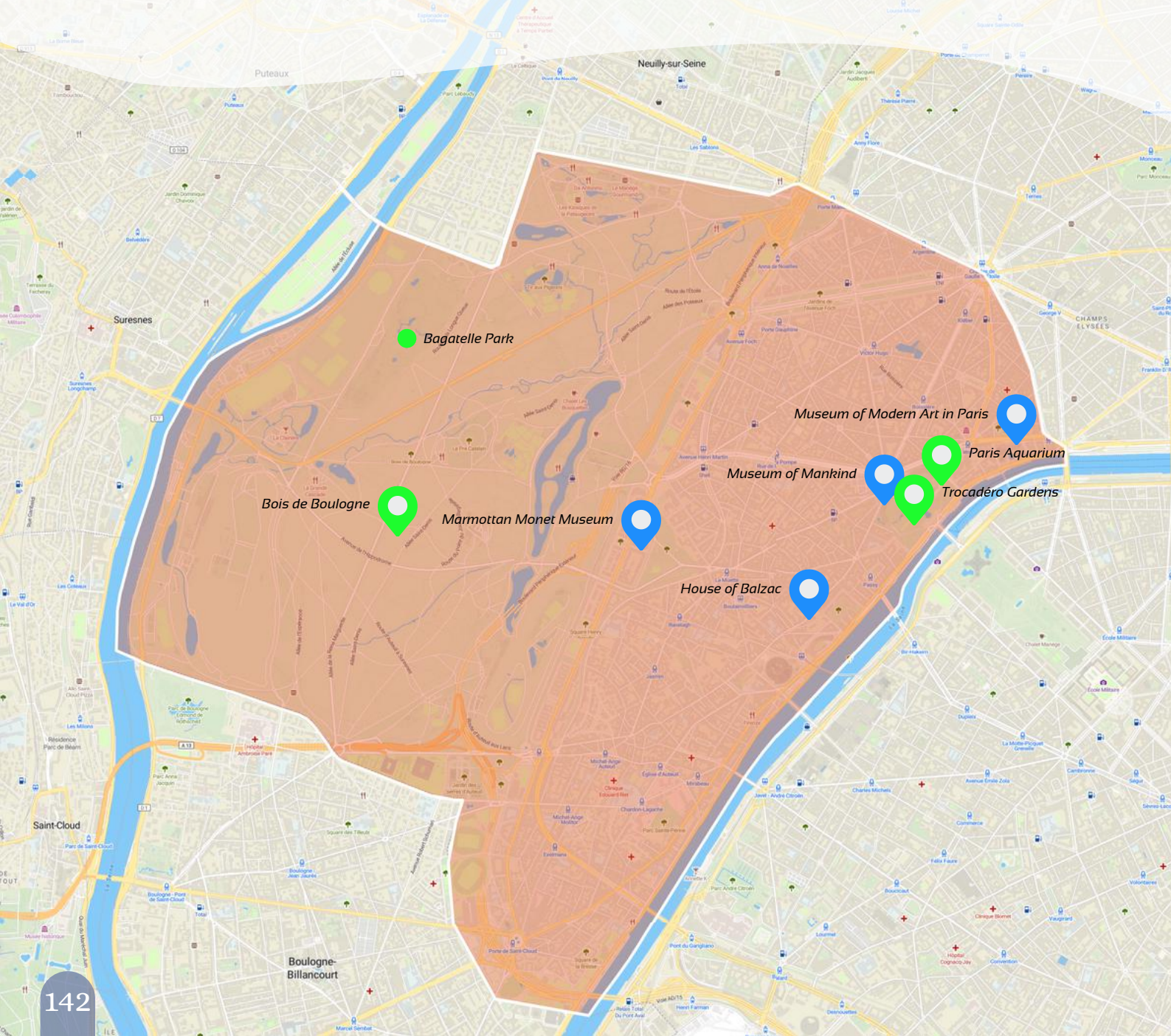


16TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 16th arrondissement of Paris is one of the largest and most prestigious arrondissements of the French capital. It is renowned for its chic residential areas, green spaces and renowned schools.

It is divided into four administrative districts: Auteuil, La Muette, Porte-Dauphine and Chaillot. Avenue Foch and the district of La Muette are surely the most elegant places of the 16th.

It offers many luxury shops, local markets, fine restaurants, but also many monuments and museums, such as the Palais de Chaillot, the House of Balzac, or the Marmottan Monet Museum. Many green spaces also shape this district, including the Bois de Boulogne, the Ranelagh Garden, or the Bagatelle Park.





Marmottan Monet Museum

Housed in the former home of the collector Paul Marmottan, who bequeathed his art collection to the Academy of Fine Arts in 1932, the Marmottan Monet Museum is particularly famous for its impressionist collection.

It has the world's largest collection of Monet's works, including paintings, pastels, drawings and sketches. In addition to Monet, the museum houses works by Berthe Morisot, Edgar Degas, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Paul Gauguin, Camille Pissarro and many others.

Museum of Mankind

Located within the Palais de Chaillot, the Museum of man is an anthropology museum that is part of the National Museum of Natural History.

Bois de Boulogne

Once a royal hunting forest under the kings of France, the Bois de Boulogne is now one of the largest public parks in Paris.

Characterized by its vast expanses of lawns, dense woods and landscaped gardens, the park also has an artificial river that meanders through the park, and two main lakes, which offer islands accessible by boat.

Within the wood, you will find the Bagatelle Park, but also the Garden of the Serres d'Auteuil, a botanical garden with magnificent historic greenhouses housing a wide variety of exotic plants.

Bagatelle Park

Located in the heart of the Bois de Boulogne, the Bagatelle Park is a beautiful garden mainly known for its Roseraie.

It was created in 1775 following a bet between Marie-Antoinette and the Count of Artois, brother of King Louis XVI. He had bet that he could build a castle and a garden in less than 64 days, which he managed to do.

The Castle of Bagatelle is an elegant neoclassical mansion, which now serves as a setting for temporary exhibitions and cultural events.



The Bagatelle Rose Garden is one of the most famous in the world, with more than 10,000 roses of 1,200 different varieties. But the park also offers spaces dedicated to other plants, such as in the Iris Garden or in the Waterlilies Garden.

The park is a privileged place for bird and plant watching, in a quiet and relaxing place.

Paris Aquarium

Opened in 1867, the Aquarium of Paris is one of the oldest aquariums in the world.

It is home to more than 10,000 specimens of 500 different species in about 30 basins. One of the highlights of the Aquarium de Paris is its underwater tunnel, which allows you to walk underwater and observe sea creatures in an immersive setting.

As for the tactile pool, it offers an interactive experience where visitors can touch certain marine species, such as starfish and flatfish, under the supervision of specialists.

Fish and shark feeding shows are regularly organized, accompanied by educational commentary.

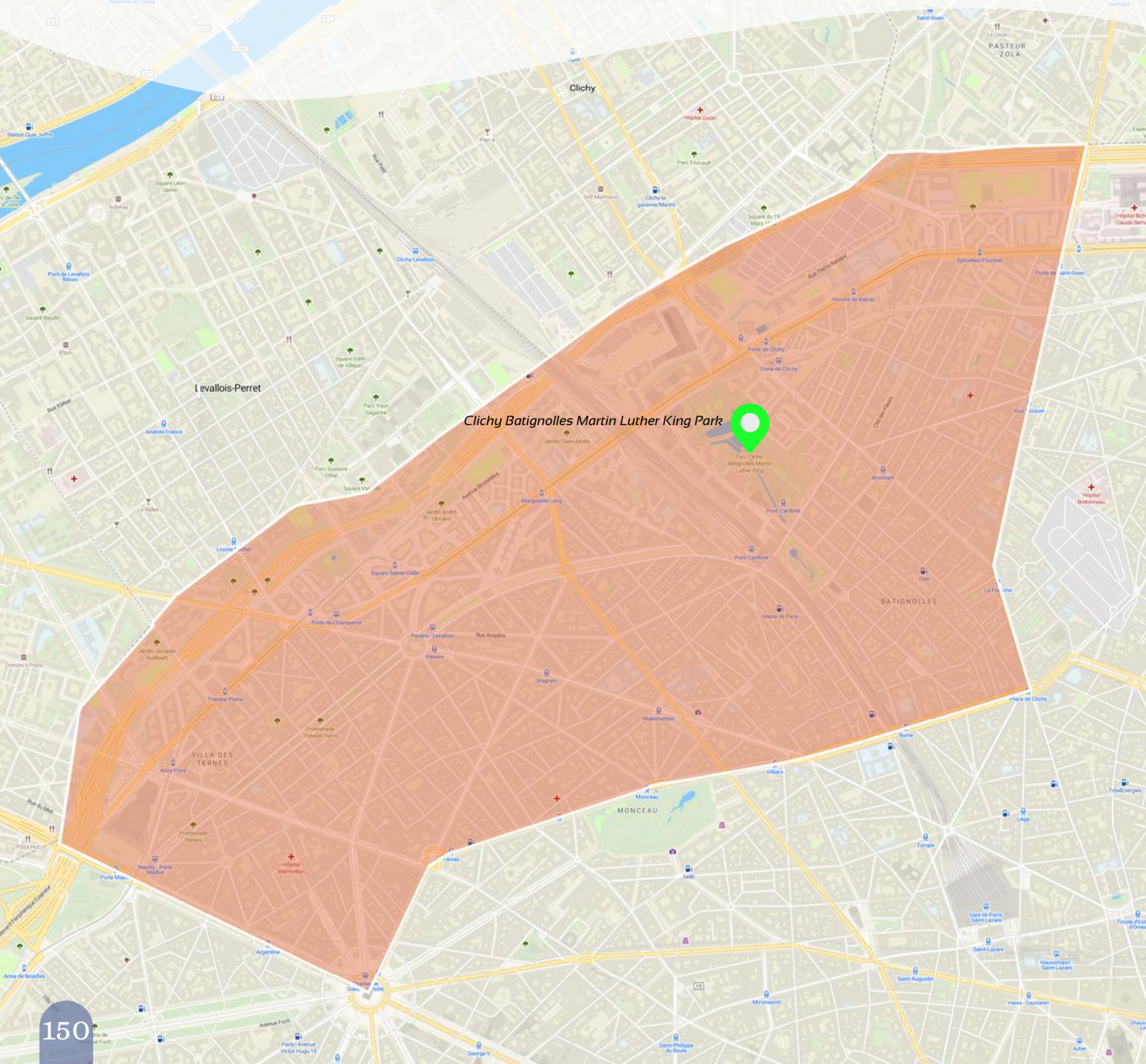


17TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 17th arrondissement of Paris includes several old villages and hamlets, including Batignolles and Ternes, which have retained a certain independence and a distinct character.

In the 19th century, the Batignolles district became an important artistic centre, attracting painters such as Édouard Manet and Pierre-Auguste Renoir. As for them, the districts of Ternes and Monceau develop as affluent residential areas.

The 17th arrondissement is home to the Clichy Batignolles Martin Luther King Park, the Saint-Ferdinand des Ternes Church, and the Palais des Congrès de Paris, a convention and entertainment centre.

By using rainwater harvesting systems, planting a wide variety of plant species to promote biodiversity, and lighting the park with renewable energy, the park is a model for urban ecology!

It is divided into 3 thematic areas, between seasons, sport and water. It offers a multitude of facilities and activities for all ages; from playgrounds to sports fields and water pools.

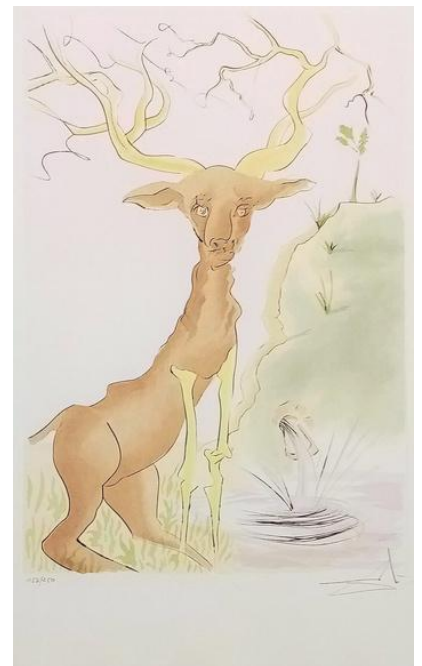

Created by Frédéric Baron and Claire Kito in 2000, the wall is an artistic work dedicated to love. It gathers 311 declarations of love written in 250 different languages, in tribute to the universality of love and cultural diversity.

This wall symbolizes peace and unity among peoples. The fragments of red phrases, which form broken hearts, represent the evils of humanity, while the “je t’aime” unite these fragments, symbolizing reconciliation.

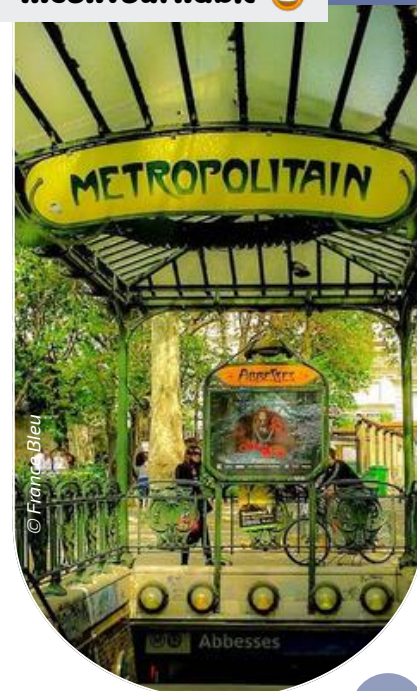
Place des Abbesses

Vineyards of Montmartre

Located in the heart of Montmartre, the vineyards of Montmartre date back to the Middle Ages and recall the wine-making past of Montmartre, which was once covered with vineyards and mills.

Today, the vineyard covers about 1,500 square meters and produces a small amount of red wine and rosé every year, which is auctioned off to finance the neighborhood's projects.

Although the vineyard is generally closed to the public, guided tours are sometimes organized, especially during the Harvest Festival, which takes place every year in October. It is a festive event that includes parades, concerts, or wine tastings.

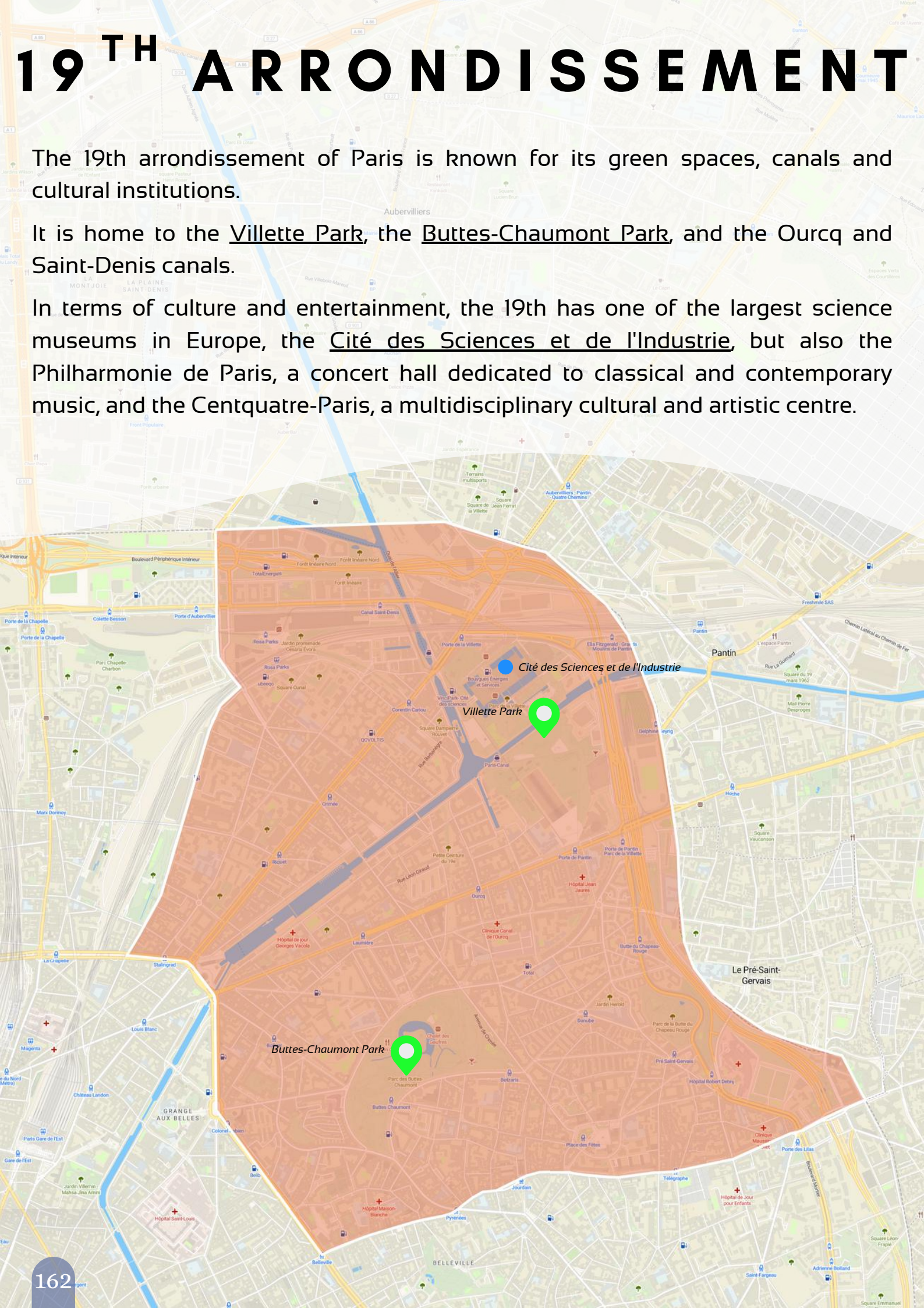


19TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 19th arrondissement of Paris is known for its green spaces, canals and cultural institutions.

It is home to the Villette Park, the Buttes-Chaumont Park, and the Ourcq and Saint-Denis canals.

Its main objective is to make science and technology accessible to the general public, especially young people and families, through interactive exhibitions, demonstrations, workshops and educational events.

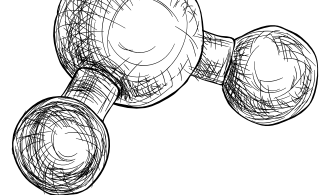
The planetarium, where simulations of the starry sky and shows on astronomy are projected, provides a better understanding of the organization and principles that govern our galaxy.

Belleville Park



Formerly a wine-growing area and then a densely populated district, it has been redeveloped into a green space to become today's Belleville Park.

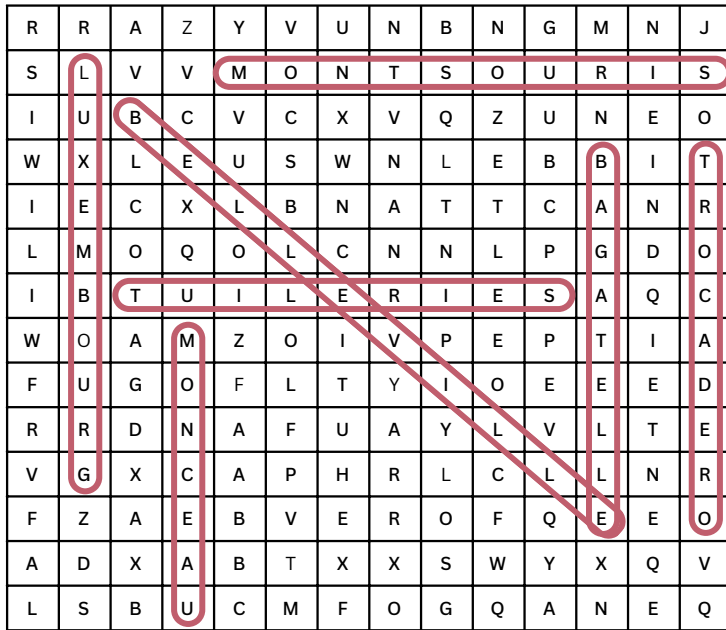

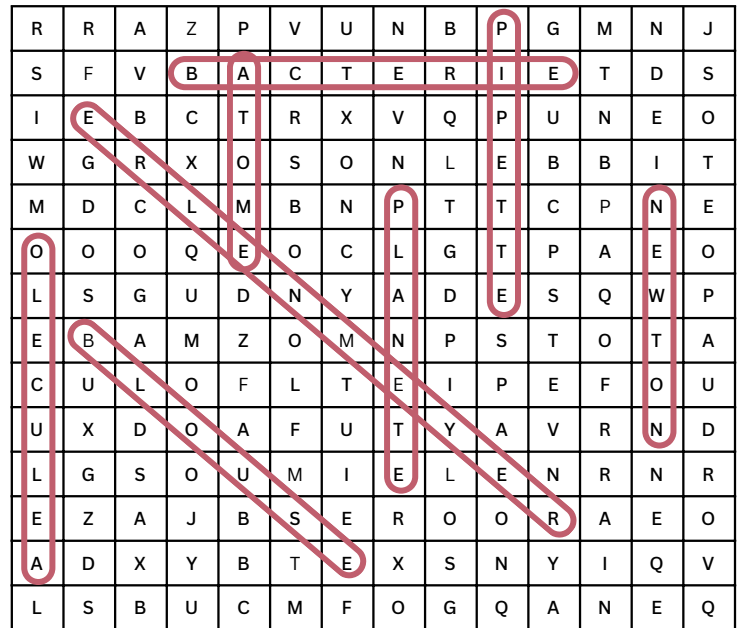

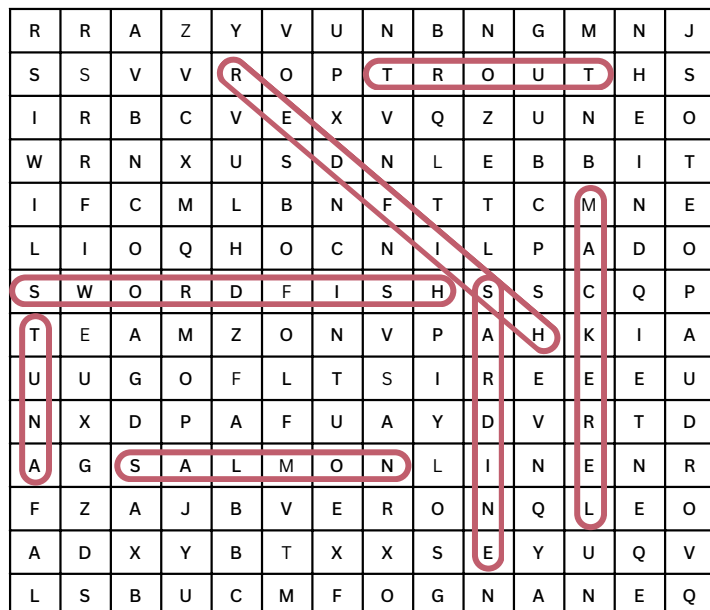
