The Juggle Struggle: MULTI-TASKING VS. MONO-TASKING

In today's busy world, multi-tasking is seen as a badge of honor - but maybe we should reconsider when to use each strategy for increased productivity and wellness.

HAVE YOU EVER:

- Watched TV while scrolling on your phone?
- Helped your child with homework while making dinner and waiting on hold?
- Ate a meal while reading email and supervising a classroom full of students?
- Driven your car while texting and eating a burger?

Obviously, some of these tasks are okay to double up, but others can increase mistakes, strain relationships, or be very dangerous.

– The Science –

Cognitive Cost of Multitasking: A study from Stanford University found that frequent multitaskers perform worse in task-switching and memory retention.

The Power of Deep Work: Cal Newport's book Deep Work argues that the <u>ability</u> to focus without distraction is becoming increasingly rare—and valuable.


The Brain's Limits: Research by the APA shows the brain isn't wired for simultaneous tasks; instead, it switches rapidly—inefficiently—between them.

SINCE THERE ARE ONLY 24 HOURS IN A DAY, and our to-do list seems endless, here are a few instances when you should, or should not double up.

OKAY TO MULTI-TASK	BEST TO MONO-TASK
Waiting on hold while replying to emails	Planning and decision-making
Folding laundry while watching a movie	Learning a new skill or producing creative work
Organizing computer files while listening to a podcast	Driving, using tools or other potentially dangerous situation

Summer Challenge: MONOTASKING

Thatcher Wine's book, The Twelve Monotasks: Do One Thing at a Time to Do Everything Better suggests that you can become more productive, produce higher quality work, reduce stress and increase happiness by focusing on one task at a time. I Make a Difference Awards


