

In Notting Hill, you might find a rainbow of colors. You'll find quaint and quiet mews where horses were once stabled but are now luxury homes.

This area of London is very pretty. Many Royal parks are found in these areas and there is definitely a neighborhood vibe with coffee shops, cafes and high streets



These areas are more relaxed with more opportunities to get away from the crowds, unless it's Saturday morning and you want to pop up to Portobello Road for the iconic market.

The hotels will be more boutique-like in these areas. But beware, some will have below-ground rooms that you have you looking at everyone's feet as they pass by the window. They aren't the worst, but they are also not my favorite. But, it's the nature of some of these houses that have been converted to hotels

It will be easier to find grocery stores in these areas as they are more residential. That's a plus if you want snacks or drinks during your stay.



DO you love skyscrapers and busy traffic?
Do you not mind that things shut down
early and you're happy to retreat to your
hotel room with some takeaway food to
relax and watch TV for the evening? If so,
then the big city vibe might be for you.
Hotels will generally cater to business
travelers and you may find them cheaper
on the weekends. Many of the services are
geared towards what I call "The Blue Suits"
who pack up and head for a drink at 5 and
then head home to the



outer areas of London where they live. Don't get me wrong, there are some great gems in this area from many of the high viewing platforms to the Royal Courts of Justice to Leadenhall Market and the Barbican Center. But, this area somewhat lacks the charming neighborhoods and tourist haunts most people come to London to see. And, many of the hotels have a more business-like feel and approach devoid of charm. And, there will be quite a few American and UK chains here catering to business people.







The Big City Vibe is characterized by tall buildings and restaurants and services catering to the business crowd. It gets pretty quiet at night.

This area is known as "The City" or "The Square Mile" and it is the central business district of London.

Coffee shops like Starbucks or Pret often open later and close earlier in this part of London. And, you won't as easily find grocery stores. Many restaurants will be very busy right after 5 and then closed up by 7 or 8. It becomes a bit of a ghost town in the evenings.

The Big City areas of London are sort of anywhere North of the Tower of London including Aldgate and Whitechapel. I would consider the Canary Wharf area also part of the big city vibe as it's very modern but doesn't close up as early. St Katherine's Docks probably also fits that. But, there is a nice large Waitrose in that area that is great for groceries.

If you watch Call the Midwife or Peaky Blinders or any show set in London where brick buildings are prominent, this is what I consider to be this vibe. It's classic bricks and mortar London

Call the Midwife is set in Poplar, an area of London that is characterized by brick buildings, warehouses, and other industrial looking places. Brick lends itself to street art so many buildings are covered with it for good or bad.

Some of the best ethnic food is found in these areas and street art walks are common. It's also the area that was terrorized by Jack the Ripper. In some of these areas, the brick warehouses have been converted to hotels or luxury flats. You may also find cheap hotels and small independent grocery markets. There may be wide foot pavements where street markets are always set up. In some parts, you'll see more Middle Eastern or African clothing than western looks. And, the sad truth is that there are some areas you should not stay in due to crime. But, they are not listed here and they are a often a bit farther out.




The Gritty Vibe is characterized by brick buildings and street art.

Street art is everywhere in this grittier London vibe. Brick Lane is bursting with street art, markets and great Indian Food. The Leake Street Tunnel on the south side of the river is an explosion of color. These are funky areas that have a cool vibe appealing to the younger crowd.
