





- Contestants will be given (2) chances to get the sled moving from the starting line.
- The pulling tractor must stay between the lines while pulling the sled. If the tractor crosses one of the side lines, the pull will be measured to where it crossed the line.
- After tallying all the measurements of contestants pulls for each class, the farthest pulls will determine the top 3 winners.
- In case of a tie, a pull-off will be held.
- Measurements made by the event officials are final.

<u>Rules:</u>

- 1. Participation is limited and contestants will be allowed to register on a first come first serve basis including online entries.
- 2. Boys and girls will pull together and pulling class will be determined by age at the date of the event.
- 3. Contestants will pull in the order that they signed up.
- 4. Due to time constraints, the contestant MUST be present when their name is called to pull or will be disqualified.

Safety Requirements:

- Contestants must be able to pedal the tractor with his or her feet without assistance.
- Contestants MUST wear closed toe and closed heal shoes. (rubber soles are recommended)
- Contestants must not touch wheels & must keep feet on pedals at all times while pulling.

Tractor Pull Rules

- 1. The Martha's Vineyard Agricultural Society assumes no responsibility for loss, theft and/or injury to the participant or property competing.
- 2. Tractors must be standard make, at least 25 years old, rubber tread, wheel type, equipped for farm use. No four wheel drives allowed, no dual tires, no studs or chains permitted. All power must be transmitted to the wheels. No hydrostatic drives allowed.
- 3. The order of pulling in each class will be determined by drawing numbers for each class at the time of weighing in.
- 4. The pull director will determine the number of classes you may enter.
- 5. The first-place winner may enter the next class and pull last in order. The second-place tractor will only be allowed to enter the next class if the pull director determines that the class is less than full and time allows.
- 6. All pullers will have a total of 4 minutes of pulling time. During that 4 minutes they can make as many hitches as they want with only longest pull counting. The pin resets with rehitching.
- 7. All pulls must be made on the concrete slab provided. Dead hitch to boat by cable, clevis and pin provided. Hitch for tractors under 2,000 pounds must not be over 12 inches from the slab. Any hydraulic drawbar found raised after original check will be cause for disqualification. All drawbars to be stationary (rigid) in all directions at all times. Hitch for tractors over 2000 pounds must be less than 20 inches from the slab.
- 8. Load must be pulled six feet in one hitch from the starting point. Distance is measured to the point where the boat first stops forward motion. Any yank pull, which tips the concrete block off the load, will be cause for disqualification of both operator and the tractor for this contest. No previous tries will be counted for awards.
- 9. All tractors must be weighed on fairground scales. Weight is to include the operator.
- 10. The winner of the previous class may add weight to correspond to the next class.
- 11. No portion of the tractor may interfere with the boat.
- 12. All weight must be safely secured to the tractor and must not move rearward while pulling.
- 13. All tractors must have a rigid seat and tip seats must be secured while pulling.
- 14. The Fair strongly recommends the use of stabilizer bars.
- 15. Operators will use all due consideration for the safety of other operators, track crew, and spectators and remain in the seat at all times. No operator shall allow their tractor to continue spinning after the boat has stopped and they have been signaled by an official.
- 16. The rules and classes are subject to change. Any changes will be announced before the contest starts.
- 17. All four tires must remain on pad while pulling.
- 18. The drawbar hole must be easily accessible to hookup. The hole size is to be no smaller than 1 1/4 inches.
- 19. Any loss of liquid on the pulling surface or loss of weights or safety equipment may be cause for disqualification.

- 1. Use safe practices at all times
- 2. Make sure controls are how you need them before starting
- 3. Judge will check with operator and make sure they are ready to go. Time starts on signal and finishes when last item placed back in starting position
- 4. All items will be placed in starting position before Operator begins
- 5. Items must be picked-up and moved using only the bucket as no use of thumb allowed
- 6. If judges deem you are being unsafe you will be Disqualified
- 7. Two timers will be used with average of both times being the official time
- 8. Judges decisions are final
- 9. All operators must sign a release form before being able to compete No Exemptions
- 10. Must have 1 year experience running an Excavator

SHUCKING COMPETITION HELD SATURDAY @ 4PM

- <u>Classes</u>

- B. Oysters

Preregistration is not required.

Rules:

- 1. All rulings by judges are final.
- 2. Shuckers may wear gloves, use their own knives and carry an extra knife for use in case the first breaks.
- 3. Each contestant will receive the same amount of oysters that will be randomly selected by the judges. Four of oysters may be exchanged by the shuckers if I they don't like the look.
- 4. The shuckers may arrange the oysters in front of him/her for the event.
- 5. Time-keepers from the audience and/or the judges will keep track of each shucker's time of completion. At the start of the event the Judges will yell "Go!", initiating the start of the event.
- 6. When a contestant has finished shucking and is satisfied with his/her arrangement of the shucked oysters, he/she will raise their hands and the timekeepers will stop their stopwatches.
- 7. The shuckers may not touch their trays after they have signaled completion.

Note: <u>**Presentation is of utmost importance**</u>. An appetizing arrangement is rewarded over a "sloppy" or "hacked" presentation.

PENALTIES: Judges will add seconds of time accordingly:

Three (3) second penalties

An oyster is not completely severed from the shell.

An oyster presented on a broken shell (No penalty if placed on the top shell).

An oyster presented with grit, blood or other foreign substances.

An oyster is cut.

An oyster is not placed properly in its shell.

Twenty (20) second penalty

An oyster is missing from the shell or plate.

BONUS: Judges may (optionally) award a bonus reduction of ten (10) seconds as an award for the tray whose presentation is deemed outstanding.

The Judges will then declare the winner by the shucker with the fastest time, including all penalties and bonuses.

HOW DO I ENTER?

- Once you get to Fair Entry, you will be instructed to create an account or login if you've entered previous fairs.

- Once all classes have been selected (animals classes must complete the "add an animal" portion), please proceed to review entries.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues (M.G.L.C.128 ss214D, 14E, 44 and 330 CMR 4.03, 4.07, 16.03), all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance of the fair.

2024 ANIMAL HEALTH RULES FOR FAIRS AND SHOWS

NO animal will be admitted to the fairgrounds unless it meets the requirements below. NO animal is to be unloaded or enter a barn or tie-out stall until the animal and its paperwork have been inspected and approved for entry.

A. General Rules for All Animals: See M.G.L. c. 128 §2C, 129 §2

- All animals must be in proper physical condition, be properly identified and free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease at time of arrival. Specific diseases and conditions which will disqualify an animal for entry are identified for each species in the following sections of the rules. Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.
- Evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in the animal's rejection for entry. THE INSPECTOR'SDECISION IS FINAL.
- 3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly-licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 4. Official ID: See Final Rule: Summary of Traceability for Livestock Moved Interstate (Summary of general requirements by species) All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved for the species, e.g., official metal ear tag, tattoo, scrapie tag, or microchip. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification.
- 5. <u>Health Certificates: -- One Official Certificate of Veterinary</u> Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (*CT, *ME, MA, **NH, RI, and ***VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved. Note that *CT, *ME, **NH, and ***VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these

states are valid for a shorter period of time and may have additional language, movement and permit requirements.

For the 2024 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have official certificates of veterinary inspection (OCVIs) that meet the following requirements:

 a. MA and RI: OCVIs issued on or after January 1, 2024, may be used for those animals being shown at multiple fairs and shows in MA, and RI through the 2024 show/fair season ending October 31, 2024.
 MA Notes: The Big E Eargrounds in West Springfold

MA -Notes: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires an Infectious Disease Waiver (provided by The Big E) for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition. All Bovines must have official RFID tags.

- b. CT and ME: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture (860-713-2504) or ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits or questions.
- c. NH: * * NH: To qualify for the extended CVI, animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after April 1, 2024, to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31. The extended CVI is not available for animals that do not reside in New England. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for details and permits.
- d. ***VT: Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802-828-2421) for specific import requirements that deviate from the general information in this letter and must be met for legal import of livestock.
- e. A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited. MA animals being shown ONLY in MA may substitute a signed, dated latter on the letterhead of an accredited veterinarian for an OCVI if all required information is included and all additional requirements are met.
- f. Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- g. An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
 - i. A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.

- ii. That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
- h. The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the "destination" on the OCVI form. In addition, "See attached list" or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- i. Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were present on show/ fair grounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- j. Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2024 for health reasons it must have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- k. Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

Updated May 24, 2024: Please be advised that the above guidance does not apply to Lactating Dairy Cattle moving interstate for purpose of showing or exhibition. Lactating Dairy Cattle are subject to the Federal Order requiring a negative test for Avian Influenza and an Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) written by an accredited veterinarian in the state of origin within 7 days of movement. This is an evolving situation. Changes to these requirements will be published as they become available. Fairs and shows may elect to prohibit lactating dairy cattle from entering the show premises.

All petting zoos are required to have a USDA APHIS Exhibitor's License (as needed) and valid 2024 health certificates.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EACH SPECIES ARE LISTED BELOW

B. Cattle: See M.G.L. c. 129 §§2, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

 TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626 -1795 or 857-348-3922). All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox and open or draining wounds.

- 2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated against rabies.
- 3. Note: The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle entering the Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2024. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact fair office with questions.

C. Poultry: See M.G.L. c. §§2, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02.

- 1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
- 2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum-typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.
- 3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood- tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date.
- 4. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.
- 5. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January1, 2024 shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out-of-state exhibitors.
- 6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty days of the fair will be admitted.

D. Goats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- 1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals.
- 2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds. All goats must also be free of soremouthandscrapie exposure.
- 3. Based on theFederalScrapieEradicationProgram (FSEP), goats and sheep ofany age or sex broughtto show orexhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.

E. Camelids (Llamas, Alpacas, etc.): See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, M.G. I. c. 131, §23,321 CMR 9.02

 TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States or for in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must contact MDAR for an entry permit.

F. Swine: See M.G.L. c. 129 §14E, 330 CMR 11.04(2), 9 CFR 71.19

- 1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
- Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, mange, and open or draining wounds.
- 3. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.
- 4. All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or monitored herds in qualified pseudorabies free States only. The pseudorabies status of the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state.

G. Sheep: See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous eighteen months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.
- 2. No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which soremouth has existed or in which soremouth Vaccine has been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
- 3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, sore mouth, pink eye, ringworm, and open and draining wounds. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

H. Equine: M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C, 44 , 330 CMR 16.05.

- 1. All equines entering a Massachusetts fairground must have a valid health certificate.
- 2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and

conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.


- 3. All equines originating from both within and outside of the Commonwealth must have a negative USDA□approved EIA test (i.e., Coggins test or ELISA test) dated within twelve months of entry.
- 4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and NV within one year of the fair.

I. Rabbits: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2

Rabbits must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: rabbit hemorrhagic Disease Virus 2(RHDV2), snuffles, wet tail, and skin and ear infections. Microchips may be used for ID in rabbits originating in MA.

J. Dogs and Cats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §39G

- 1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm and mange.
- 2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies

- 8. **All Animals and Poultry** should be brought in between 3-7PM on Wednesday or 7-9AM on Thursday. Animals leaving before 4PM Sunday forfeit any prize money which they might receive unless arrangements are made with the Barn Manager.
- 9. **PETS** Register with the Pet Show Committee at the stage on Friday August 16th. Show starts at 3:00PM.
- 10. Exhibits may be accompanied by descriptive information, but the exhibitor's name must not appear until after the judging. The Society provides a tag for all Hall exhibits, with information to assist in judging. This tag must be firmly attached to the exhibit by the exhibitor.
- 11. The Chairman of any Department may establish a special category if there is a wide divergence in the entries of any one Class. Such new class is eligible for Ribbon Awards. The judges record of awards shall be final.
- 12. The judges are under no obligation to award a 1st prize in each category if they feel the entry does not warrant it. Judges shall

award only one first, second, third prize in a particular category. Some exhibits warrant an honorable mention.

- 13. All exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the owner. The MVAS will not be responsible for loss or damage but will use every reasonable precaution to protect entries.
- 14. No exhibit which violates the laws of the Commonwealth will be allowed on the grounds. Please be sure you have checked all conservation laws.

It's about knowing the basic skills of the show ring while highlighting your animal's strengths and minimizing its weaknesses. Your knowledge and understanding of your animal are crucial in this process.

Possible Questions the exhibitor might be asked:

Sheep, Goats, Horses, Bovines

- 1. What are the males and females of this species called?
- 2. How much does your animal weigh?
- 3. How much water does your animal typically drink in a day?
- 4. What does your animal eat?
- 5. What is your animal's DOB?
- 6. Who is your animal's sire and dam?

Participants should

- 1. Have your eyes on the judge
- 2. Know how to set your animal
- 3. Know the faults of your animal
- 4. Have a clean animal, including ear tags, ears, feet
- 5. Know how to carry and use a show stick or other showing implement
- 6. Your animal must be clean
- 7. Hooves must be clean
- 8. Your clothing must be clean and appropriate
- 9. Know how to lead your animal

Working Animal Class

- 1. Your team or single must be under control
- 2. Your team must meet the requirements of the above list
- 3. You and your team will complete an obstacle course
- 4. In the case of a tie, the teamster with the lowest time will be the winner.







ENDANGERED OR RARE WILDFLOWERS OF MARTHA'S VINEYARD

NOT TO BE PICKED OR UPROOTED

The Martha's Vineyard Garden Club has provided us with the following list of wildflowers which are in special need of conservation on the island. These flowers are uncommon or considered threatened by reason of their susceptibility to picking, digging or disturbance of their habitat. Some are listed by the MassWildlife Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) as endangered, threatened or of special concern, and as such are officially protected. Do not pick any flower without being certain of its identity.

Summer Flowers

<u>Bushy Rockrose</u> - yellow - Crocanthemum dumosum - Dry, sandy plains <u>Butterfly Weed</u> - orange - Asclepias tuberosa - Dry, open fields <u>Cardinal Flower</u> - red - Lobelia cardinalis - Stream banks, damp meadows <u>False Foxgloves</u> - yellow -Aureolaria ssp. - Dry, sandy areas, roadsides <u>False Solomon's-Seal</u> - Maianthemum racemosum - white - Shaded roadsides, edges of clearings

Gerardias - pink/purple

1.Purple gerardia - Agalinis spp. - Moist meadows and bogs 2.Seaside gerardia - A. maritima - Salt marshes

<u>Goat's Rye</u> - yellow/pink - Tephrosia virginiana - Dry, sandy clearings <u>Hairy Solomon's-Seal</u> - Polygonatum pubescens - white - Mesic, shady roadsides

Lilies - orange

1.Wood lily - Lilium philadelphicum - Dry, thickets, fields



NEVER pick all the flowers in bloom in one area. Leave more than half the flowers to make seeds for next year. Use scissors or a knife so you do not disturb the roots.
