CHAIMAN'S CORNER



Rainford Wilks Chairman Gibson McCook Relays 2023 Organizing Committee

Fifty years in the life of any individual or organization represents an achievement in and of itself. For that organization to grow, adjust and remain a relevant contributor to development is further reason to celebrate. Relay running is inherently exciting with spills, thrills and uncertainty, and so McCook and his band of track and field diehards picked a winner. Organizing and executing a relay carnival with multiple participants requires more than dreaming and finally, to consistently execute the event on schedule is no mean achievement. These are some of the characteristics of the Gibson McCook Relays (GMR) that has made it famous and a staple in the Jamaican track and field diet.

McCook and team were serious fans of sport. McCook was a season ticket holder at Arsenal in the English Premier League (EPL) and it predecessor, as well as at the Miami Dolphins in the United States National Football League (NFL). It can be argued that track and field was his favourite sport as it is the one that he rose to the highest levels of sports administration.

It was a serious band of sports enthusiasts who set their minds on replicating the famous Penn Relays, which is preparing to host its 127th renewal, in Jamaica. No doubt this group was familiar with the Penn Relays even before Jamaica's participation but the immediate success achieved by the first Kingston College team to the Penn Relays in 1964, must have whetted their appetites even more. Nine years after KC's success at Penn Relays, the Gibson Relays was on show in Jamaica on February 24, 1973.

Jamaica's reputation for talent and success in track and field athletics was well established by Wint and McKenley et al but for the island create a successful industry to develop athletes consistently required more. This was an essential part of McCook's vision and the Gibson Relays was one pillar in the structure that he envisaged. McCook revered Bishop Gibson, a visionary leader and builder of schools beginning with Kingston College. That McCook and his team named these relays after Gibson, the first native Bishop of Jamaica, came as no surprise to those who knew him.

For forty years, McCook used his skills at marketing, networking and organizing to secure support for this event which provided another major showcase for Jamaican and other athletes, to add to the Boys and Girls Championships for high schools and the emerging events for the other age groups from primary to clubs and institutions. At the Gibson Relays primary school children would share stage with Olympians which must provide immeasurable inspiration. Today almost every national representative in track and field athletics is a graduate of the GMR. A proud achievement indeed.

The sustainability of this event was guaranteed by McCook diligence in identifying individuals who would be groomed to carry on the task. The technical aspects of running a meet: funding, security, health and safety, technical officials, hospitality, hydration, timely execution, audience engagement and other aspects were planned in fine detail.

On the passing of McCook in 2013, the committee agonized over adding his name to the title of the event. This had nothing to do with his deserving that honour. On that we were all agreed. But we also knew that McCook would never have agreed because that was never his ambition

and more importantly, he would never presume to have his name equated to that of Bishop Gibson. We agreed because he was deserving, it was the right thing to do and most importantly, he was not here and could do nothing about it.

It has been a privilege and honour to carry on the legacy of McCook et al, but it has not been easy. Many things have changed, the details of which need not be catalogued here, but their impact have been unquestionable. The protracted economic difficulties have savaged sponsorship as well as attendance at the meet. Gate receipts over the years have been the largest contribution to the budget and live audience attendance has dwindled as it has for all sporting events as disposable income has become more scarce every day. The technological developments which allow remote access alongside an ageing and unwelcoming venue have discouraged visits to the National Stadium. The demand for more excitement at meets has also been a new desire by live audiences worldwide. This has led to conflicts between the purists who see these additions as distraction and the generation which finds it difficult to sit and reflect on a performance in between events while discussing past performances and predicting the future of the talent on show. The phenomenon has been inadequately studied, if at all and deciding on how to retain audience attention remains guess work. The leaders in track and field should commission the research to provide the answers to how we retain audience interest and monetize the content that is brilliant athletic performance in order to fund the sustained development of an industry which is now a legitimate career alongside the traditional professions.

Amidst the uncertainty outlined above the GMR has survived through a combination of factors including its genuine entertainment value, the international success of our native athletes fueling national pride, loyal sponsors, dedicated technical officials and volunteers, loyal fans and a dedicated organizing committee. The organizing committee pays tribute to these loyalists as well the enabling government posture toward sports despite challenging financial circumstances. The unstinting and reliable support of PUMA athletic gear manufacturer has provided the stability when uncertainty prevails. Our local sponsors have been faithful beyond what could be predicted by the financial circumstances. Our gratitude to these stakeholders knows no bound. The faithful band of officials and other volunteers are to be commended on developing and maintaining their skills and making them available to the meet organizers.

The next fifty years require bold game-changing investments of which I will suggest two: the development of a modern state of the art venue alongside modern satellite venues strategically located around the island; and secondly the monetization of remote access to the content produced by our athletes and meet organizers in order to secure the just return on investment by athletes and their support teams as well as by organizers.

The GMR looks forward to the support of a grateful and loyal Jamaica, from fans to sponsors and everyone in between as well as visionary leadership by the local federation and the schools and finally the provision of an enabling environment to be facilitated by government.

Here's to the next 50 years!



RULES OF GIBSON RELAYS

- 1. The meet shall be called the GIBSON McCOOK RELAYS.
- 2. Control of the meet shall be vested in the GIBSON McCOOK RELAYS ORGANIZING COMMITTEE.
- 3. Entries are by invitation only. Each member of a competing team must be a bonafide student or member of the invited institution, and be registered to participate in the event.
- 4. In school events, the age limits and all other regulations governing competition in Jamaican High School boys, High School girls, Preparatory and Primary schools, shall be determined in a similar manner as they affect these various competitions.
- 5. Any violation of the above regulations will result in the withholding of an invitation to the defaulting institution from participation in this annual meet for a period of time.
- 6. Any action that brings the event into disrepute will result in the withdrawal of accreditation.
- 7. Except as provided for in these rules, the rules of the World Athletics shall apply.
- 8. Coaches must produce a valid photo ID to collect their team's package.
- 9. Athletes must have their numbers affixed to both the front and rear of the vest.
- 10. Each member of a competing team will be similarly attired in the colours of the institution or club.
- 11. No part of a competitor's vest properly tucked into his/her shorts must be removed during or immediately after competition. Athletes guilty of this offence will automatically have their team disqualified.
- 12. The names provided to the Organizing Committee are the only names allowed to compete in the particular relay event.
- 13. Each team scheduled for the finals must collect a relay card from the call room desk, complete same, and return the completed card to the call room desk at least one hour prior to the finals.
- 14. Competitors will warm up outside the stadium and will be brought into the stadium when their event is about to take place.
- 15. Lane placement in the finals will be decided by draw of the eligible finalist teams, made by representatives of the controllers of the meet.
- 16. Any individual or member of a relay team guilty of a false start will be automatically disqualified.
- 17. A protest or objection against the conduct or placing of a team shall be made to the referee of the meet by the representative of the protesting team according to World Athletics rules. If the protesting team is not satisfied, the protest can then be taken to the Jury of Appeal, along with a required deposit of One Thousand Jamaican Dollars (J\$1,000). The resulting decision of the Jury of Appeal shall be final.
- 18. Only officials or competing athletes under the direction of call room officials are allowed on the field.
- 19. Teams declared as 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place must make one representative available for medal presentations immediately after completion of the event.
- 20. Failure to comply with any of the rules of this meet will result in disqualification.

GIBSON MCCOOK - A CORNERSTONE OF JAMAICA'S BATON CULTURE



It's funny how history works. One isolated act can create ripples of cause and effect. Viewed from this perspective, the Gibson-McCook Relays is a cornerstone of Jamaica's success in the 4x100 and the 4x400 metres.

The Relays were first staged in 1973 as a sporting tribute to legendary educator Bishop Percival Gibson, the founding headmaster of Kingston College. At that time, Jamaica was already known for its prowess in sprinting but had but one Olympic relay medal - a glorious 4x400 gold from the 1952 Games when Arthur Wint, Les Laing, Herb McKenley and George Rhoden defeated the USA in world record time.

The picture changed at the end of the first decade of the Gibson Relays. Leleith Hodges, Jackie Pusey, Juliet Cuthbert and Merlene Ottey sped to Jamaica's first major medal in 1983 at the inaugural World Championships. One year later, at the 1984 Olympics, Albert Lawrence, Greg Meghoo, 1976 200 metre winner Donald Quarrie and Raymond Stewart zoomed to the silver medals in the men's 4x100.

Jamaica has won 17 Olympic relay medals, with a near equal split between the 4x100 and the 4x400, 8 to 9. However, even though the 4x400 got a head start in 1952, our relay gold medal count is 4 in the sprint relay with that same 1952 gold signifying our only Olympic win in the longer event.

In addition, the relays account for 19.5% of the national's Olympic medals.

The numbers look similar when it comes to the World Championships, with the relays contributing almost a third of Jamaica's all-time 137 medal haul. The same 4x100/4x400 imbalance is evident here too, with 11 of the 12 relay gold medals coming in the shorter event.

Relays rely on the quality of the sprinters selected. We have seen what happens when the likes of Usain Bolt, Shelly-Ann Fraser Pryce, Yohan Blake, Elaine Thompson-Herah, Asafa Powell, Shericka Jackson, Michael Frater, Kerron Stewart, Nesta Carter and Sherone Simpson are on duty. There is another factor, however. That is the quality of the baton passing. Practice, coaching and relay competition at meets like the Gibson McCook Relays have honed this skill of passing the baton at high speed.

It is my observation that the Gibson-McCook Relays is at the centre of a sprint relay culture. Similar meets were developed in the East with the Morant Bay Relays, in the West with the Western Relays. In addition, the National Stadium hosted events like the First Life Relays and the JN Intercollegiate Relays. More recently, the Central Hurdles and Relays has become a fixture on the track and field calendar.

The outcome is that every coach, every team and sprinters from every age group had ample opportunity to practice the requisite relay skills and to run the races that either built confidence or sent all concerned to the drawing board. Significantly, the 1983 4x100 bronze medal by Ottey and company and the 1984 silver with Stewart on anchor occurred 10 years into the life of the Gibson Relays, by which time the new relay culture had become ingrained.


Today, the event is being staged for the 46th time, 50 years after its first staging and often, when the finals begin at 4pm, the National Stadium is a tinderbox. Anxious to see what might happen at Boys and Girls Championships, fans raise their voices to a crescendo for each big race. It is in these charged conditions that young sprinters attempt to pass the baton in such a way that it keeps flowing around the track at high speed.

Mistakes mean disaster.

Those who pass this test of skill and character carry the lessons learned at Gibson-McCook into the international arena. From this perspective, it is no surprise that Jamaica owns the world records for the men's 4x100 and 4x200 and the under 20 girls 4x100. Moreover, the women's 4x100 has become a more consistent Olympic and World Championship medal winner for Jamaica than the 4x400 metres, with the score being 19 medals to 11.

This last milestone is even more remarkable since each country is allowed to have just one team in each relay. By comparison, the allotment for individual events is typically three athletes per country.

Therefore, it is fair to conclude that this sporting tribute to Bishop Gibson has served two purposes. Firstly, as intended, it has kept his illustrious name alive. At the same time, the Gibson-McCook Relays helped to launch Jamaican success in the sprint relays.

REMEMBERING THE TOKYO 1964 OLYMPICS

(Interesting & Little-known Facts)

The Games of the XV111 Olympiad also known as The Tokyo Olympics 1964 were the first Olympics held in Asia.

The hosting of a world event so soon after the devastation wrought by World War 11 and the brilliant execution of the Games itself, were accomplishments that brought great pride and joy to the Japanese nation. The 1964 Games occupy a proud moment in the modern history of Japan.

The Tokyo Olympics also marked the first time that South Africa was excluded due to the use of its Apartheid system in sports.

The 1964 Games were the first to be telecast internationally, thanks to the very first communication satellite launched by the USA a few months earlier. The young amongst us might be fooled into believing that there was worldwide viewing of the events. Nothing of the kind - only some sites in the USA and Europe with special equipment to receive the satellite signals, enjoyed live telecast, something the whole world today takes for granted.

The 1964 Olympics were the last to use the cinder running track. Since Mexico 1968, a superior, synthetic, all weather, smooth surface has been used.

In 1964, strict amateurism was the order of the day. If it was known that an athlete earned \$1dollar from sports, even in a non-Olympic sport, he/she would be deemed a professional and be ruled ineligible to compete in the Olympics. Today, athletes earning millions of dollars from sport can compete.

Tokyo 1964 marked Jamaica's 5th appearance at the Olympics, but its 1st as an independent nation. It was then that the new Jamaican flag and colours (black, green and gold) first graced the global stage and in the ensuing years, have been displayed so many times that it brings to mind Bob Marley's lyrics, "you a-go tired fi see me face, can't get me out a the race".

On September 15, 1964, the main party of Jamaica's delegation of 21 athletes and team officials (compare 51 Tokyo 2020) boarded a propeller plane and departed for Miami, en route to Vancouver for a pre-Olympic warm up meet.

At the time of the team's departure, the expenses of the trip were not fully paid, even with the Government's last minute grant of $\,\pounds\,425\,$ (see accompanying Gleaner clipping)

The great Herb McKenley was the coach. The team had no doctor or physiotherapist due to lack of funds. Jamaica was for the first time, sending sprint relay teams to the Olympics, but could not afford to send even one reserve sprinter for either the men's or women's team. If a member of either quartet got hurt, that's it

-- game over. In 1964, the sprint relay had three rounds (heats, semis, and finals) all within 24 hours, unlike today's "luxury" of two rounds and the option of making up to two substitutions in the finals. The sprint relay, notoriously fraught with mishaps, with each team member burdened with the fortunes of the other three teammates, is arguably the most stressful track event. Three rounds in 24 hours at the Olympic level is cruel, and that's telling it from the "horse's mouth".

The team arrived in Tokyo and was greeted the first night with a strong, frightening earthquake. Army barracks (wooden buildings) were used to house the athletes. The accommodation was comfortable but would not compare with today's more luxurious Olympic facilities.

The composition of Jamaica's team of athletes was notable for a number of reasons. The team included for the first time at an Olympics, a non-track and field athlete in the person of Ronald Holmes, a boxer, in the light heavyweight division.

In previous Olympics, Jamaican athletes were coached by foreigners in the countries where they were based. The first time "home grown" athletes gained selection to represent Jamaica in an Olympics was in 1964, and they did so despite the budgetary constraints. Among the "home grown" were three teenage children in High School, namely, Rupert Hoilette, Una Morris and Neville Myton. Three-time Olympian Vilma Charlton had just left High School. Jamaican High School children competing in the Olympics was the realization of a vision the legendary Sydney "Foggy" Burrowes voiced a few years earlier.

Regrettably, there were no medals won by Jamaica in 1964. However, Jamaica placed 4th in four events:

- (1) men's 800 metres (George Kerr who won the bronze medal in Rome 1960)
- (2) men's 4x400 metres relay (George Kerr, Mel & Mal Spence, Laurie Khan)
- (3) women's 200 metres (Una Morris, age 16yrs)
- (4) men's 4x100 metres relay (Pablo McNeil, Patrick Robinson, Lyndie Headley, Dennis Johnson)

Jamaica's time of 39.4 secs in the sprint relay bettered the existing Olympic and British Commonwealth records.

The sprint relay baton exchange technique used universally today, was developed by the great American coach Leroy Walker in 1964, before the start of the Olympics. Through the instrumentality of

Herb McKenley, Mr. Walker came to Jamaica and coached the Jamaican teams in the new technique. Only Jamaica and a few other nations used the new technique in the Olympics, its global spread was yet to be. It has been almost 60 years since the switch from the old to the new technique, a move spearheaded by Jamaica, a move which has stood the test of time.

It is difficult for persons in today's Jamaica, (having been spoilt by the achievement of Usain Bolt & company) to believe that back in 1964, track and field analysts and the public at large, thought that Jamaica had performed well. Such an assessment was perhaps influenced by "Foggy" Burrowes' conviction that "Jamaica should regard any Olympic finalist as a hero."

It is worthy of note, that in the case of the men's sprint relay, it took 44 years (2 generations) after Jamaica's first entry in 1964, to win the gold medal in Beijing 2008, with Bolt, Asafa Powell & company. In the case of the women's sprint relay, it took 40 years with Veronica Campbell, Aleen Bailey & company in the Athens 2004 Olympics.

Nearly 60 years on, there remain some indelible memories around the 1964 Games and mention will be made of a few.

The temperature at the time of the sprint relay finals was a very cold (for Jamaicans) 55 degrees Fahrenheit, not allowing you to break a sweat while warming up in a sweatsuit. Stripped down to just a vest and shorts at the start of the race, you questioned -- is this really the "Summer" Olympics?

The Americans had a masseur and his equipment, stationed in the training area. As long as he wasn't busy attending to an American athlete, he would accommodate athletes from any country, a welcomed gesture for countries like Jamaica that could not afford their own masseur /physiotherapist. Such kindness exemplified true sportsmanship and friendly rivalry, ideals of the Olympic movement.

When the American Bob Hayes crossed the finish line in 1st place in the men's sprint relay, he immediately tossed the baton high into the air. It was reported in a newspaper that the "Negro" tossed the baton into the air. In those days, the use of "Negro" was acceptable.

"African American" was not yet in vogue. Even Martin Luther King in some of his speeches referred to the "Negro".

An English language newspaper in Tokyo, on its front page, carried a message from the head of a gangster organisation, instructing its members not to operate in the Tokyo area for the duration of the Olympics, but instead to conduct their activities in provincial towns (outside of Tokyo). Incredible, that such a notice could be published! How remarkable it is that the criminal mind contemplated not damaging the standing of the Japanese Nation in the eyes of the world, by placing national interest above self-interest.

On the humourous side, it seemed clear that the female Japanese volunteer workers were coached to ward off any perceived attempt by a male to befriend them. A simple compliment, would every time elicit the standard response, "Velly solly, velly solly, can't explain" followed by a quick departure.

You could not help being struck by the railway transportation system, with trains operating at three levels -- underground, ground level and on elevated platforms, in order to cope with a densely populated, large city. In the Tokyo underground, a train arrived every 45 - 60 seconds. The Bullet Express, the fastest train in the world at the time (200 km / hour) was new in 1964 and some of the Jamaicans got an opportunity to ride on it.


There are three athletes in the track and field squad whose names have not been mentioned above. They are Adlin Mair, Wesley Clayton, and Carmen Smith.

Today, almost 60 years later, nine team members are still alive, led by Ronald Holmes, 88 years old. Seven have died. May their souls rest in peace.

CAN EDWIN ALLEN CONTINUE DOMINANCE AT GIBSON MCCOOK RELAYS?

THIS YEAR'S staging of the Gibson McCook Relays will be a very special one as it will be the 50th anniversary of the most popular local relay meets and there will be no better time for high school teams to make their presence felt, as winners will definitely score psychological advantage going into what is expected to be a very competitive ISSA Boy's and Girl's Championships.

Undoubtedly, Edwin Allen High Girl's from Frankfield, Clarendon has been the most dominant female team at these Relays over the past seven staging ,and once again all eyes will be on the Michael Dyke coached team as they seek to continue that trend, where over that period they have been unbeaten in the 4x800M, while a year ago their Class 1 4x100 metre team clocked an amazing 43.37 seconds to win the event in a meet record and became the first High school female quartet to go sub 44 seconds at the Meet.

Since 2016, Edwin Allen has only lost once in the 4x100 metres, in 2019 when St. Jago High won. The Edwin Allen team last year was a special one, which included the Clayton twins, Tia and Tina, the World 100 metres Under 20 champion, along with Brandy Hall and Serena Cole the World Under 20 100 metres silver medalist, and the only survivor of that team back at Edwin Allen. The new looked Edwin Allen team will be under severe pressure to retain their title here as, Hydel after their second place finish last year with 44.40 seconds also inside the old record of 44.48 seconds, will start big favourites to capture their first title in this event .At the Camperdown Classics, the quartet of Alana Reid ,Oneika, McAnnuf, Shania Myers and Aaliah Baker made it known that they will be the team to beat after an easy 44.59 seconds clocking for a meet record and definitely it will be hard to go against them here.

Both 4x400 and 4x800 metre relays will be worth miles going to see as Edwin Allen, Hydel and Holmwood in the former and Edwin Allen and Holmwood in the later will be in mega clashes. After a record breaking performance of 3 minutes 33.76 seconds last year , Hydel will be seeking their fourth title here but will have to deal with season leader, Edwin Allen who won at the Milo Western Relays in 3 minutes 37.52 seconds to turn back Holmwood 3:38.10 seconds and in the process turn the tables on Holmwood who had earlier defeated them at the Central Hurdles and

Relays meet, where they won in 3 minutes 38.12 seconds.

The defending champions will have their hands full here as McAnnuff will need more help, while Edwin Allen which has not have much success in this event will be very hungry here for a win. At Milo Western Relays, on the final leg Holmwood Technical got the baton some eight metres behind Edwin Allen but an unbelievable anchor leg from the in-form ,Rickiann Russell nearly brought them home. Holmwood will definitely be coming to avenge that defeat, while Hydel will be hoping for their fourth win in the event ,and despite not contesting the event so far this season they will be hoping to go all the way , as the stage is set for a keen and exciting contest here.

Edwin Allen are Queens of the 4x800 metres relay and after success in 2016 they will be hoping to make it seven wins in a row .However, after their last success in 2015, Holmwood Technical will be hungry to get back on top. The team from Christiana started the season on a bang after a record breaking performance of 8 minutes 52.99 seconds to win at the Central Hurdles Relay meet to turn back Edwin Allen.

After a feisty 9:01.65 seconds clocking on grass at the STETHS Invitational meet Edwin Allen proved that their win was no fluke as at the Milo Western Relays they blew away Holmwood, winning in 8 minutes 51.61 seconds, to put a dent on a very confident Holmwood team after a second place finish in 9 minutes 05.54 seconds. Holmwood has a quality squad and will want to show that below average performance was an off day for them. They will be rejuvenated for their Gibson McCook Relays as they seek to take back an event that they ruled supreme in the 1990s.

Only the bravest souls do predictions for relays, but with this being the 50th anniversary of the first Gibson-McCook Relays, here goes.

BOYS CLASS 1 4X100

Be in your seat at 5.10pm if you're hungry for records. KC have a fine team with World Under 20 100 metre runner-up Bouwahjgie Nkrumie at the helm but Jamaica College is stacked. 3 members of JC's 2022 Boys Championships winning 39.43 team is back.

Caymanian Jaden Reid, Christopher Scott, and Hector Benjamin are all in great form and Calabar's 2015 record - 39.32 seconds - is in danger.

BOYS CLASS 2 4X100

Calabar dazzled everyone at the Camperdown Classic with the two fastest times of the season at 42.88 and then 41.66 with Nickoy Bramwell, last year's class 3 200 winner, and powerful hurdler/sprinter Shaqaune Gordon on second and anchor. The boys in green-and-black are ahead of everyone else.

If Calabar slip up, look out for STETHS, who ruled class 3 in 2021, with Tremaine Todd and 2022 Carifta Games under 17 winner Ricoy Hunter. They'll be highly motivated to win this one for Eldemire Smith, the STETHS coaching icon, who died last week.

BOYS CLASS 3 4X100

Calabar outran JC 44.47 to 44.65 at the Camperdown Classic. At Gibson-McCook, they will both be hard pressed to resist St Jago, whose second leg runner Ray-J Reece is the fastest boy in class 3.

It's no cake walk for St Jago, who dropped the baton on the last exchange while challenging Calabar and JC at the Classic.

BOYS CLASS 4 4X100

KC won in 48.18 seconds at the Western Relays and that might be vulnerable.

GIRLS CLASS 1 4X100

Alana Reid, the 2022 World Under 20 200 bronze medalist,

captain Oneika McAnnuff, Shania Myers and Aliyah Baker scooted 44.59 seconds for Hydel High School at the Classic. By comparison, Holmwood managed only 45.86 at the Western Relays.

GIRLS CLASS 2 4X100

This one is close. Hydel and Holmwood have clocked 46.61 and 46.62 respectively. If there is an interloper, St Jago has a squad that has been winning since class 4 at both Gibson-McCook and Boys and Girls Championships.

GIRLS CLASS 3 4x100

Now that last's year top class 4 sprinter Natrese East has joined forces with 2021 class 4 hurdles winner Tianna Marshall, Wolmers' has the fastest class 3 4x100 team in the nation at 46.95 seconds. That time was enough to beat Hydel, 47.15 at the Classic.

GIRLS CLASS 4 4x100

Andrew Henry's Mount Alvernia quartet - Masha-Lee Farquharson, Giana Murray, Chanel Clarke and Mickhaela Phang - upset Holmwood 49.11 and Edwin Allen 49.33 at the Western Relays in 49.03 seconds while Hydel took the Classic in 49.18. However, Hydel won by 1.27 seconds and weren't pushed.

BOYS CLASS 1 4x200

JC won last year in 1 minute 25.73 seconds and Harrison's A squad could the record - 1.24.67 - by the legendary 1992 JC quartet.

Once again, Kingston College could challenge with Nkrumie and Adrian Kerr.

BOYS CLASS 2 4x200

It's hard to overlook Calabar here as Bramwell and Gordon look strong and fast. At the Classic, Calabar had 5 of the fastest 7 boys in the class 2 100, with Gordon on top at 11.00 seconds.

BOYS CLASS 3 4X200

With 4x400 duty not on the agenda for class 3 boys, this event often follows the form of the 4x100. So, expect Calabar,

St Jago and KC to do battle for top spot.

BOYS CLASS 4 4x200

Not contested in 2022, this event favours Kingston College, the fastest team of the year in the 4x100.

GIRLS 4x200 OPEN

Serena Cole rescued Edwin Allen at Western Relays with an urgent anchor leg and may have to do so again after Mount Alvernia's sprint display at Western Champs. The ladies from Montego Bay will rely on Western Championship class 1 winners Carletta Bernard, first at 200 and long jump ace Aaliyah Foster, who took the 400.

BOYS 4x800

JC's super team took almost three seconds off the record and left it at 7 minutes 24.30 seconds. Times will be more modest this year but expect a battle between JC, whose top man Kemario Bygrave smashed his personal best down to 1.50.90 last Saturday and Western Relays winner, Kingston College. Bygrave, Tyrone Lawson and Khandale Frue might just bring it home for JC.

GIRLS 4x800

The score is 1-1 between Holmwood and Edwin Allen in this event this season. Holmwood struck first at the Central Hurdles and Relays at 8.52.99 and Edwin Allen struck back at the Western Relays at 8.51.61 with neither race being close. Depth will be the decider, and, on paper, it points the verdict to Edwin Allen.

SPRINT MEDLEY GIRLS

Alphansus Davis High School may bid for victory here. Outgoing senior Kishay Rowe has improved her 800 metre best to 2 minutes 09.23 seconds. That will surely be too much for everyone else.

SPRINT MEDLEY BOYS

In Bygrave's fast race at JC, Guyana's Seon Booker set a new lifetime best of 1 minute 51.67 seconds. If his teammates can keep him close, Dinthill will have its first Gibson-McCook win in years.

GIRLS 4x400

Hydel has speed to burn. At the STETHS Invitational, Hydel went 1-2 in all the flat 400 metre events and had the 400

metre hurdles champion as well and, with Onieka McAnuff and reliable Alliah Baker on duty, Hydel should win.

Edwin Allen beat Holmwood, 3.37.52 to 3.38.10 in the season's fastest race, the Western Relays, with Rickiann Russell rushing through a 51.2 anchor in vain.

BOYS 4x400

JC ran 3.13.08 solo at the Camperdown Classic. KC cruised an easy 3.14.36 in Trinidad and Tobago. STETHS did 3.17.65 on grass last month. When you add Carifta champions Bryan Levell and Delano Kennedy to the mix for Edwin Allen, you have a fine race to end the 50th anniversary of the first Gibson McCook Relays.

Who will win? Normal grass to synthetic conversion transmutes that STETHS run to sub-3.12. If Shamer Blake, Jasuana Dennis and company are still emotionally charged from Smith's untimely passing, a win would give STETHS something to smile about.



AFTER A truncated Gibson McCook Relays last year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic it will be a welcome return for the crowd at the 50th anniversary of the first staging of the Relays where Kingston College and Jamaica College look set to ignite an expected big crowd in the Championships Class 1 4x100 and 4x800 metres relay.



Led by World Under 20 silver medalist and National Junior record holder in the 100 metres following his 10.02 seconds clocking in Cali , Colombia last summer ,Bouwahgjie Nkrumie will lead a stellar Kingston College line up here. Also on the team will be , Adrian Kerr who like Nkrumie was on Jamaica's silver medal winning 4x100 metre relay team in Cali . Quarter miler, now turn 100 metres sprinter, Emmanuel Rwotmiya and Nicholas Francis who all did well at the Youngster Goldsmith Classics will make this one of Kingston College most outstanding foursome in several years and they could produce something special.

Jamaica College, like their North Street rivals are also loaded in the sprints as Hector Benjamin and Jaiden Reid who were in impressive form at the Camperdown Classics will join up with Christopher Scott and Dwight Downer, who have both been impressive this season at Development meets.

Anticipation is for something special here, where any number can play and with both teams blessed with so much speed and seems to be on par, the winner could be decided on which team has the best baton exchanges. This as contest should definitely have the expected large crowd in a frenzy.
