



On the same day, our guests from Ngāi Tahu led officials from the Ministry of Education, the building contractors (Naylor Love), and the College community in blessing the site for the

MAC UPGRADE

We at Team Green are passionate about helping the environment as well as promoting a sustainable lifestyle at school and in the wider community.

Projects and events we have been involved with this year:

At "OUR PLACE", the sustainability hub at this year's Wānaka A & P Show, Team Green and a group of community-based organisations came together to create a space of interactive and fun learning for all ages to show how land, water, flora, fauna, climate and humans, are all connected. Team Green's aim was to promote active transport and our pedal powered juice bikes were a big success. LIBRARY

"When in doubt go to the library." - J.K. Rowling

It's been a busy year in the library in our temporary space where we have maintained a warm, safe and welcoming environment for our school community.

As part of our move we took the opportunity to refresh our collection. We removed the tattered and torn, stained and forlorn books which were handed on to Team Green.

We are now replacing these items, filling the gaps in series, responding to requests for new books and rebuilding our collections. We are also acquiring graphix and manga, adding items in Te Reo Māori, and sourcing resources to support the New Zealand History Curriculum. We were grateful to receive \$200 worth of NZ History books from the Ministry of Education.

We have added over 1100 books to the collection, and the librarians have been supported in processing these - barcoding, stamping, labelling, covering, and cataloguing - by Eamon, Emma, and Shannae from HQ doing weekly work experience, and Zephyr working on the William Pike Challenge.

Our students and staff can access around 2000 eBooks through our Wheelers ePlatform.

These eBooks are now discoverable and downloadable through our catalogue when signed in using a MAC login thanks to Nick, our IT guru. Wheelers generously granted us free access to 900 eAudiobooks for 12 weeks due to lockdown.

We updated our library page at library. mtaspiring.school.nz, adding useful links and resources to support students and staff.

We have co-ordinated loans from the National Library to support teaching and learning across all curriculum areas, supplying around 800 extra books to support inquiry and reading engagement. We have also continued to co-ordinate the Scholastic Book Club for our Year 7 and 8 classes.

We have created in-library displays to celebrate Matariki, promote the Out on the Shelves campaign and focus on Romance, among others, and we contribute weekly to the MAC newsletter to communicate with our community.

Debating



The midday sun glares above the buzzing metropolis. A

Look! Closer. no, closer. There is a flickering of light, a spark of hope. A table. A chair. A lamp. Many books.

Listen. The old man flips the pages, his eyes are unclosed to see the dark, folded town. He is present in life, yet distant. Trapped in the cage of the book he holds, he is innocent and naive. A thread of his former self. Hiding away from the world. Locked in four walls of fantasy, with no key to escape. Never had he pushed boundaries against life. Never had he broken the law. Never had he done anything to disobey her.

He is unknown. Unwanted. Maybe this is why she is now targeting him? He has no purpose. No reason to live. A lonely man, in a lonely house. It is time.

She, mother nature, has won. Taking control hungrily, fire rips open the pages. Orange flames wave at the old man as print and paper dissolves inside them. Burning words fall from their sentences. The timber turns red once again.

She is unfathomable.
As if clueless, the old man stays perfectly still. She has come

perfectly still. She has come to collect him, he knew it was his time. The smoke continues to choke the house, spreading down the hill. Deathly coughs echo throughout the town; but not a soul comes to help. Glaring down towards the fearful town, she cackles with glee, then attacks. She hunts. She destroys.

Listen. It's the night scampering away, escaping from its threat of light, like a vampire in the sun. All is vulnerable.

The Quake - by Ella Hall

The city is buzzing with life; flawless, untainted buildings loom over her. Carefully constructed framework crawling higher into the clouds. The pavement beneath the soles of her shoes has been warmed a little by the sun and sends bolts of heat up through her legs. A delicate whisper of sea salt tickles her nose and she thinks about how she hasn't visited the beach, in what feels like forever. "Perhaps I'll go tomorrow," she considers. The cathedral stands proudly to her right as she saunters past, stained glass eyes staring. A tiny breath of air teases the flourishing green trees, causing miniature tornadoes to dance atop the branches. The whirring of car engines fills the streets and the city is almost pulsing. Just as she is about to cross the street, a bus thunders past in front of her; a stampede of wildebeest shaking the concrete savanna. She

waits for the ground to stop quaking, and prepares to cross the road. Except, the bus flits further and further down the street and the shaking continues. In fact, it's getting more intense, she realises. It's an earthquake. "Oh well," she thinks, "It's nothing I haven't been through before." So she leans against the nearby fence and waits, once again, for the shaking to stop. But it doesn't. Soon she is gripping the fence and struggling to stand upright. She's thrown to the ground like a ragdoll, and bites her tongue in the process. The metallic taste of blood fills every crevice in her mouth as she tries to reach the wooden bench about a metre in front of her, but every time she makes even the smallest amount of progress, an invisible force pulls her back. She feels like one of those tiny metal balls in a pinball machine at an arcade and Mother Nature has decided she wants to play. At long last, she grabs a hold of the metal leg of the bench, and uses all her strength to pull herself underneath it. She covers her head with her hands and shuts her eyes tight. The earth is still shaking. Shaking, shaking, shaking. It doesn't feel like it will ever stop.

And then it does. She ever-so-slowly opens her eyes and tries to see through

the hazy layer of dust that hangs in the air. She peers out from beneath the bench and looks across to the buildings on the other side of the street. They look like they've been hit by a bomb. Or a wrecking ball. She drags herself to a standing position and takes it all in. What was once carefully structured and planned is now a pile of rubble. The road in front of her is now a sea of tarseal and cars are swimming around in it. It reminds her of her grandmother's creme brulee; once you crack the hard caramelised surface, your spoon sinks further and further into the custardy mixture beneath. 






The Festival of Colour is a biennial arts festival held in Wānaka and the Southern Lakes region. After a difficult year in 2020, the Festival aimed to bring back some heart and soul and good vibes into the community. Closed borders certainly did not stop organisers putting together an outstanding line-up of national performers, many of whom shared their skills and knowledge with our youth community through the schools' programme.

The Festival is held in the last week of Term 1 but, for a group of our Year 8 students, it began at the beginning of the school year with 16 chosen to participate in a climate change photography project. 'Wanaka, Through the Eye of the Lens' came about in collaboration with Track Zero, an organisation which combines the arts to show the effects of global warming. The students were gifted a digital camera and taught photography techniques by two renowned New Zealand photographers. Each student had one of their photos exhibited as part of the Festival of Colour. The exhibition was then picked up by Urban Grind cafe in town, before being displayed in the school foyer.

Twenty of our Year 7 and 8 students left their mark on Helwick Street after transforming 42 of the shop windows into works of art with New Zealand artist Michel Tuffery. These students along with a group of seniors worked tirelessly at the start of the week to complete the murals which portrayed a wave-like Pasifika design flowing down both sides of the street.

We were lucky to have so many of our students involved in the Schoolfest. Year 9 students got a visit from author and Poet Laureate Selina Tusitala Marsh who conducted a poetry writing workshop. Our choir students worked with Voices NZ on their own choir pieces as well as some new songs.

The following week the NZ String Quartet played for Years 7-10. Their performance was outstanding and for many students this was their first taste of concert music. Our students were impressed that the quartet had played in major centres all over the world and really took to question time at the end.

The Music Department hosted electronica songwriter and performer Anthonie Tonnon in a 'life changing' workshop for our senior music students. This came complete with all the tech as Anthonie showed the students his whole set up and performed for the group.

Our performance was buzzing with physical theatre workshops from Thomas Monkton with Year 11. Red Leap Theatre company with Year 12 and 13 and Rollicking Entertainment with Years 8 and 10 all bringing their own take on physical theatre skills with the Year 10s getting a taste of stage combat.




































MAC sport climbers performed strongly in the recent NZAC National Indoor Bouldering Series. The series comprised of four events in Wellington, Christchurch, Dunedin and Auckland. Congratulations to the following climbers: Nat Warburton won the U16 Males Series with wins in all four events. Tama Huston-Jefferies finished 3rd in the U14 Males Series. Fia Warburton won the U12 Female Series with convincing wins in each event.

We had two successful MAC teams in the Challenge Wanaka Half Secondary School teams this year. MAC students Tom Sides, Hugo Sinclair, Carter Guichard, Zavier Taylor (Year 10) and Cooper Mills (Year 11) came 1st out of all the Secondary School teams and placed 4th overall in the Challenge teams with a time of 4:21:11. In addition to this, the MAC team consisting of McKay Watson, Ben Silipo, Hannah Prosser and Olivia McLachlan placed second in a time of 4:31:03 in the Secondary School teams division and 6th overall.

A very successful student, Zoe Antone, entered 2021 moving into the U17 category for archery, which shoots a distance of 60 metres (having previously shot at 45 metres). During the school holidays, Zoe shot in the Archery New Zealand National Championship and is proud to now be ranked second in New Zealand in the U17 recurve category.


