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

SPARE THE SPARROWS

- Chairman Mao Tse-tung led the Chinese Communist Party from 1935 until he died in 1976. In 1958, in a bid to boost the prosperity of the Chinese population, he declared war. However, he declared a war against "the four great pests" which were rats, flies, mosquitoes, and sparrows. The effort was collectively known as "The Great Leap Forward."
- Sparrows were included because they invaded agricultural fields, eating grain intended for people. For several years, all kinds of small sparrow-like birds were driven to the brink of extinction.
- What he had not considered was the fact that sparrows also eat insects, and are particularly fond of locusts. With the sparrow population wiped out, the locust population grew exponentially, as well as many other species of crop-loving bugs. The insects devastated crops all across the country.
- By the time the death sentence was repealed in 1961, famine had spread across China. Between 20 and 30 million citizens starved in the next several years.

BOOSTING BOOTLEGGING

• At the end of World War I, the nation entered a period of prosperity. Though people wanted to celebrate, Prohibition interfered with plans by making the production or distribution of alcohol illegal. Now, instead of purchasing alcohol legally from safe sources that were taxed, people got it from shady underground sources. Thriving small businesses and their suppliers went out of business, while Prohibition served as an incubator for the rise of the Mafia. Bootlegging and Speakeasies now became lucrative businesses, and organized crime hogged much of the action. Profits were plowed into other illegal activities such as prostitution, gun running, casinos, etc. (cont)

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HOMESTEAD HORROR


- The Homestead Act of 1862, signed by Lincoln, granted any citizen ownership of 160 acres of government land provided they could live on it, and improve it, for five years. This allowed many people, including women, former slaves, and immigrants, to settle the West.
- However, the Enlarged Homestead Act of 1909 had problems. This act granted 320 acres to hardy pioneers, but by now all the best lands had been spoken for, leaving only marginal lands to claim. Those areas were mainly located on the prairie plains where tough grasses had been growing for eons.
- Settlers spent the next couple of decades trying to turn these sparse lands into productive farms, starting with plowing under all the native deep-rooted drought-resistant grasses. With too little rain to support crops, and the grasses now long gone, the entire area turned into an environmental catastrophe now known as the Dust Bowl. The program was designed to turn the vast prairies into productive farmland, but it damaged the environment and the economy so severely that it took decades to restore the balance.

THE COBRA EFFECT

• In the early 1900s when Britain ruled India, the British government was concerned with the number of cobras in Delhi. A bounty was offered for each dead snake turned into government offices. Predictably, this led to cobra-breeding programs by enterprising entrepreneurs throughout the city. When government officials found out about this, they ceased paying the bounty. All of those cobra breeding facilities then let their snakes go free, increasing the population of the reptiles far more than they'd started with. Today this has been dubbed "the cobra effect." 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NUGGET OF

The Mexican government decided Mexico needed more trees. They set aside billions to pay farmers to plant new trees in 2019. No money was granted for farmers to maintain mature trees that already grew on their property. Over 280 square miles were completely deforested so farmers could collect money for planting tiny seedlings.



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YACHT YIKES


• The luxury tax on yachts was implemented in 1991, charging a 10% tax on yachts costing \$100,000 or more. The result, however, is that the rich, who still liked to get a bargain, either bought yachts overseas, held on to their older boats, or bought smaller boats for less than \$100,000. The market for luxury yachts tanked. Many boat-building businesses went bust, putting skilled blue-collar workers out of work and on welfare. This cost the government far more in unemployment benefits than had been brought in by the new tax. The luxury tax on yachts was repealed two years later.

ACCIDENTAL RULER

• In ancient China around 200 B.C., there was a police officer named Liu Bang. One day, he was transporting some prisoners and they managed to escape. At the time, the Qin Dynasty laws stated that the punishment for letting prisoners escape was death. Liu Bang thought it would be quite a waste of his life to be put to death for losing control of his prisoners. Instead, he joined up with his former prisoners, became a warlord, overthrew the Qin Dynasty ruled China, peacefully and fairly, for over 400 years.

DEATH OF SALES

• The chain department store JCPenney decided to eliminate special sales and implement an "everyday low pricing" policy where they set their prices to the lowest amount they would ever sell it for, regardless of the time of year. They underestimated how many people loved to shop the sales and got a thrill out of finding a bargain. With no special sales, those people quit coming to the store. Sales tanked, and the company was reorganized under Chapter 11 bankruptcy shortly afterward.



Vintage Advertising

Thanksgiving will be here soon, and while the best organizers among us may already have everything in place, most of us are probably still working through our shopping lists. Let's see ... turkey, seasonings for stuffing, ingredients for side dishes, pumpkin pie spices -- oh, and don't forget a six-pack of Coke!

Well, that last item might not be on the menu for most Thanksgiving dinners, although this c. 1950 advertising banner, which sold for \$150 at Woody Auction, shows it's not from the company's lack of trying.

Coca-Cola is a favorite brand among collectors of vintage advertising. Their holiday advertisements are especially beloved; their Christmas ads from the 1930s to 1960s by painter Haddon Sundblom are credited with creating the popular image of Santa Claus. Even if it doesn't make it to every holiday table, Coca-Cola has become an icon of everyday American life.

Q: My sister has a handwritten letter and handwritten envelope dated Dec. 10, 1997, from Harper Lee. Is this worth contacting an auction house?

A: We think so. Harper Lee was the author of "To Kill a Mockingbird," which won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction in 1961 and is still considered one of the greatest American novels of the 20th century. Her signature sells well at auctions. Several examples have sold for high prices this year. An autographed bookplate sold for \$130. A typed excerpt from "To Kill a Mockingbird" with Lee's signature sold for \$530, and a first edition of the novel accompanied by a handwritten letter from the author sold for an impressive \$14,400. Look for auction houses that specialize in autographs, books or Americana. Get references before you sell anything. If you prefer to sell locally, you can look for antiquarian book dealers as well as antiques dealers. Some coin and stamp dealers also buy and sell autographs. The dealer usually sets the price. If you decide to send the letter and envelope to an out-of-town dealer or auction house, send it with tracking. You may want to get it insured as well.



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

The Covid pandemic has been a pot of gold for thieves and scammers who want to exploit the critical needs of hospitals and doctors. As usual, however, the criminals aren't too bright.

There was the medical supply company that conspired to sell masks that were misbranded, trying to pass them off to hospitals as genuine National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH)-approved N95 masks. The thieves gathered up their fake masks from miscellaneous sources and shipped them off at inflated prices. When NIOSH tested the masks, the scam was discovered because the masks couldn't pass the filtration tests.

A whole alphabet of federal agencies, including the VA's Office of Inspector General, came together in this effort to investigate and prosecute the thieves. Between the price gouging, the fake masks and the interstate commerce, the authorities had a good case for pandemic-related defrauding and conspiracy.

When the case goes to court, selling misbranded medical equipment alone could net the thieves a fine of a half a million dollars. Adding in the interstate commerce and price gouging could tack on additional fines and years in prison.


Then there was the guy who tried to sell millions of dollars of personal protective equipment to the VA. The scam was pretending the company was an authorized distributor of the PPE. They even generated a fake website and email address. The goods that were sent out were nonconforming and the masks were counterfeit.


Another guy stole gloves and PPE and sold them for a cool million dollars. Another scammer stole the relief funds he received, diverting \$180,000 of it for his own use.

In one scam, however, it almost wasn't worth the thief's time: A woman was given two paycheck protection loans for two businesses she owned -except the didn't own a business. All she got out of the scam was \$41,000.



One of Brown's biggest legal issues that caused him to be shunned in the first place was his domestic violence case against fellow singer Rihanna back in 2009. Although he's since wriggled his way back into the public's graces, Brown has faced assault charges, sexual assault charges, restraining orders from ex-girlfriends, and allegations of being involved in a hit-and-run. The doc tracks much of his issues back to his childhood and even spotlights a new accuser with more allegations against Brown. Out now. (Max)





Moments in time THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On Nov. 11, 1831, Nat Turner, an American slave and educated minister who believed that he'd been chosen by God to lead his people into freedom, was hanged in Jerusalem, Virginia, for leading a revolt with 75 followers through Southampton County, killing about 60 white people.
- On Nov. 12, 1969, investigative journalist Seymour Hersh revealed the extent of the U.S. Army's charges against 1st Lt. William L. Calley at My Lai, Vietnam, in a cable picked up by more than 30 newspapers, saying that "The Army says he [Calley] deliberately murdered at least 109 Vietnamese civilians during a search-and-destroy mission in March 1968, in a Viet Cong stronghold known as 'Pinkville.'"
- On Nov. 13, 1979, Philadelphia 76ers center Darryl Dawkins leaped over Kansas City Kings forward Bill Robinzine for a memorable slam dunk that shattered the fiberglass backboard. His equally memorable comment on the move, which was not his last and the sound of which spectators likened to a bomb going off: "It wasn't really a safe thing to do, but it was a Darryl Dawkins thing to do."
- On Nov. 14, 1882, outlaw Frank "Buckskin" Leslie shot and killed Billy "The Kid" Claiborne, who had publicly challenged him, in Tombstone, Arizona.
- On Nov. 15, 1984, Baby Fae, a month old infant who received the world's first baboon heart transplant, died at California's Loma Linda University 20 days after the operation.

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Three other people had received animal heart transplants, but none survived longer than a few days.

- On Nov. 16, 2001, British author J.K. Rowling's most famous and beloved creation, the bespectacled boy wizard Harry Potter (played by Daniel Radcliffe in his first major role), made his silver-screen debut in "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone," which went on to become one of the highest-grossing movies in history.
- On Nov. 17, 1903, the Russian Social Democratic Labour Party split into two factions: the majority Bolsheviks and minority Mensheviks. The Bolsheviks went on to become the Communist Party of the Soviet Union.

Beware: listeria and salmonella

The saga of listeria in sliced deli lunch meat continues, month after month. The list of affected items gets longer and longer as there is now an additional company subject to recalls due to listeria.

To stay current on the lunch meat recalls, go to CDC.gov and search for "lunch meat listeria recall." That will give you several articles with information you need.

As if that's not enough, to be safe, do we need to change the way we prepare eggs? The Food and Drug Administration has now labeled the ongoing egg recall as a class 1, which means it's "reasonable" to assume that the eggs can cause serious health consequences or death.

To be safe from salmonella, they say, gone are poached and sunny side up eggs. Instead, to kill any possible salmonella, we need to scramble or hard boil our eggs and cook them thoroughly, with both the yolk and the egg firm.

To learn more, go to the FDA website (fda.gov) and search for "egg safety salmonella."

The latest food recalls cover a wide variety of products. There's dip that's being recalled because it potentially has mold contamination. And lactose-free milk that has tree nuts. There's dog food recalled for salmonella and listeria. And whole cantaloupes with salmonella.

But it's not all food. There's the drug remdesivir that has glass particles in it. And the dietary supplement tainted with dexamethasone (a corticosteroid) and chlorpheniramine (an antihistamine). And the baby powder with metal or chemicals in it.

On recalls.gov -- a site that covers recalls from the FDA, U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission and FoodSafety.gov -- there are recalls for consumer products, boats, medicine, cosmetics, food and more. At this writing, there are recalls of bicycle helmets, bathroom mirrors, yard tractors, playpens and so much more.





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Taking Preventative Measures Against Sun Exposure Is Essential

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have a question about suntanning. First off, I want to say that I get yearly skin cancer checks, love the sun, and hardly ever use suntan lotion. I monitor my time outside, so as not to get a sunburn. I see warnings about certain days being high ultraviolet (UV) days. Are they talking about UVA or UVB, and which one gives you a tan? --S.K.

ANSWER: You're not going to like my answer, because all types of UV light exposure, whether they lead to a sunburn or suntan, cause damage to the skin and lead to an increased risk of skin cancer. A tan from sunlight leads to a small degree of protection against further UV light damage, but there is still ongoing skin damage with UV light exposure. Even people with very dark skin are susceptible to skin cancer, although their risk is a lot less than others.

UVA light is more constant throughout the year and penetrates deeper into the skin. UVB light is stronger near the equator, at higher altitudes, and closer to the summer solstice. The UV index reported by the National Weather Service considers both UVA and UVB light in its calculations, as well as the time of year, altitude, and cloud cover.

Both UVA and UVB light cause the skin to tan, but tanning from UVA light alone (for example, in a tanning machine) doesn't provide any protection from the sun. So, while I am at least glad that you aren't exposing yourself enough to get burned, I don't agree with being out in the sun to get tanned. I do recommend the liberal use of a sunscreen with protection against both UVA and UVB. It needs to be used in a large-enough quantity to provide protection -- approximately an ounce for an average-sized body, plus another teaspoon for the face and neck. I recommend a high-SPF sunscreen (30 or more). I buy mineral sunscreens such as zinc oxide or titanium dioxide for myself and my family. Finally, sunscreen needs to be reapplied regularly, especially when exercising or swimming.

Staying out of the sun, wearing sun-protective clothing, and wearing sunscreen will not only help you avoid cancer, but also help you avoid problems that I see in my older patients, who did what you did when they were young. Now they have thinned skin that bleeds easily, as well as "age spots" and other signs of skin damage from the sun, including wrinkles.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I read your recent column on blood pressure. I want to know what the recommended blood pressure is for a completely calm person. In other words, what if my blood pressure is always higher during the day and only stays at the recommended pressure when I'm totally relaxed at night?


I read some comments from a longtime cardiologist, stating that you need to take many blood pressure readings during the day and get the average of these readings. -- J.J.

ANSWER: Normal blood pressure is considered to be less than 120 mm Hg systolic and less than 80 mm Hg diastolic. It is certainly recommended to be as relaxed as possible when you get your blood pressure taken at the doctor's office, since many people have "reactive" or "white coat" hypertension and will be treated unnecessarily based on office readings. However, a minority of people have "masked" hypertension, meaning that the office readings are normal when they actually have high blood pressure at home and at work.

What your cardiologist said about getting many readings is correct. The more readings, the better. Best of all is a 24-hour blood pressure monitor, which has been proven to be the most accurate. I recommend a certified blood pressure monitor for all my patients and consider their home readings to be more important than office readings.
