Welcome to the Senior School

The Senior School provides each student with the foundation and support to explore their interests.

Here, students are encouraged to engage in a wide range of spiritual, learning and cocurricular activities, and through this develop the dispositions to be citizens of the world. The formation of each boy is guided by the words from our School Prayer; to be strong and lovely young men of good report, ready to tackle the world beyond the walls and fields of this historic school precinct.

Each day, as you walk through the school gates, one is struck by the very essence of what education in the 21st century should provide young people. Our Senior School is home to approximately 1000 boys, including 100 boarders who reside on campus in the Boarding House. In a world that is becoming increasingly disconnected, our School provides a safe place for boys to explore and build connections with each other through the taught and experiential opportunities on offer. Our shared values of truth, respect and service, along with our strong connection to our Anglican heritage, help in shaping the character of each boy, equipping them with the skills and knowledge to navigate the wider world.

The structure of our Senior School is designed to gradually increase students' responsibility and independence. In Years 7 and 8 our students work within mentor groups to build strong connections with their peers. These groups are expertly led by Middle School Mentors, Year Level Coordinators and the Head of Middle Years to ensure a supportive start to their Senior School journey.

As students progress to Year 9, the focus shifts towards their House community, where vertical mentor groups help guide their growth and development as they begin their journey towards adulthood. During these years, we continue to consolidate and build on the strong foundations laid earlier, through the pursuit of academic excellence, career discovery and personal growth.

At St Peter's College, we believe our programs not only build academic excellence in our graduates, but also place great focus and energy on the emotional, physical and spiritual formation of each boy. We are committed to being an exceptional community of learning where every student is known, understood and supported as they navigate their senior years of education.

Anglican Identity

Our Framework

Because we are Anglican

- we are inclusive and invite people of other faiths, or none, to join our community.
- we pursue truth and share the truth of God's love for all people.

Academic Formation

The Anglican tradition is built on a balance between scripture, tradition and reason. The Theology and Philosophy curriculum provides students of all faiths or none with a rigorous introduction to key principles of the Christian faith, an open-minded coverage of other world religions and an understanding of the basic concepts of the western philosophical traditions.

Spiritual, Community and Wellbeing Formation

Through our Chapel program students are encouraged to develop an appreciation of the role that spirituality has in wellbeing. This is an inclusive program, focused on encouraging thoughtful engagement and meditation.

We impart our Anglican values directly through our House Chapel Services, School Musters, and indirectly through the role-modelling of our teachers and through the celebration of students past and present who have represented these values.

All students are required to attend our engaging, relevant and dynamic Chapel services led by our School Chaplains. They are encouraged to explore their spirituality, consider their faith and express what they believe. They are challenged to reflect on the meaning of faith for their own lives.

Service Formation

As a School, we uphold the Anglican tradition that service, character and spiritual formation are deeply interconnected. We believe that serving others fosters personal growth, and that strong moral character naturally leads to acts of service. Since our foundation, this principle has shaped our identity and continues to guide our mission as an Anglican School.

We are committed to developing young men of integrity - individuals who embody truth, respect and service. Through meaningful opportunities to serve, both within the School and in the wider community, students learn to lead with empathy, act with courage and contribute with purpose.

Pastoral Care

We place a strong focus on the pastoral care and wellbeing of every student. Strong relationships foster a culture of encouragement and inclusivity, and our School focuses on relational environments in all our endeavours. Anchored by a robust pastoral care program, our students learn that shared meaning and purpose emerge when they belong to something far greater than themselves.

House System

Upon entering the Senior School, every student is allocated a House, each led and guided by a Head of House. The House system provides opportunities for students to participate in annual traditions and community activities that enhance a sense of belonging and camaraderie. Active participation in the House system supports students' academic growth, leadership development and wellbeing.

Middle Years

In Years 7 and 8, students are placed in year-level mentor classes to help them navigate the complexities of puberty and the physical, emotional and social changes it brings. In these years, the Mentor is the first point of contact, supported by the Year Level Coordinator and Head of Middle Years.

The Pentreath Building, home to Years 7 and 8 students, has been purposefully designed to ensure a smooth transition into Senior School life. Its flexible and innovative learning spaces provide boys with the opportunity to learn, collaborate and play in an environment tailored to their needs.

Senior Years

From Years 9 to 12, students join vertical House Mentor groups. Mentor time serves as a home base, providing space for check-ins and preparation at the start of each day. In these years, the Mentor and Head of House are the first points of contact for students and parents, supported by the Deputy Head of Senior School (Students). Together they take a collaborative approach in guiding and supporting each student. The relationships formed within Mentor groups and Houses often last a lifetime.

Mentor Sessions

Across the Middle and Senior Years, pastoral care sessions create opportunities for meaningful discussions on current events and issues, where students can respectfully share and listen to opinions. Each day begins with a Bible reading contextualised by the School Chaplain, encouraging thoughtful discourse among students.

Students are also supported by a mentor to set and review goals and evaluate progress in their academic and co-curricular endeavours. Mentors conduct regular one-on-one check-ins to build confidence and help each student reach his full potential.

Alongside Mentors, students are supported by Year Level Coordinators, Chaplains, Heads of House, peers and school psychologists. The psychologists also play a key role in guiding both proactive and responsive approaches to student wellbeing. We believe that when our students feel supported and valued, they are equipped with a strong foundation for all aspects of their education.

Academic Program

The curriculum at St Peter's College provides opportunities for every student to be educated to take their place in the world as informed, active, responsible citizens, often in positions of leadership in the community.

We want every student to develop into a creative, open-minded, life-long learner who can use failure as a tool for growth.

Importantly, every student is responsible for their own learning. Teachers work with all students to enable them to show independence of thought, develop intellectual tenacity and to understand themselves as a learner.

From Years 7 to 12, students are challenged, inspired and nurtured through both a rich and diverse curriculum and through evidence-based, innovative teaching. Opportunities are provided for students to come to know the world through different perspectives, represented by subjects within nine faculties:

- The Arts
- English
- Wellbeing, Health and Physical Education
- Humanities
- Languages
- Mathematics
- Science
- Technology
- Theology and Philosophy Technology

Course structure

Years 7 to 8: A broad, liberal education

During the first two years of the Senior School, students study a broad range of subjects with no early specialisation. Students choose one 'Language other than English' (LOTE), selecting from Chinese (Mandarin), Chinese Language and Literature or French. Arts and Humanities subjects are compulsory, offering the broadest possible base on which students can build their aspirations as learners. Students are also invited to take part, where appropriate, in our Micro-Credential Program.

Years 9 to 10: Electivity and learner agency

In Year 9, students are still required to study a language and an arts, drama or music subject. Beyond these constraints, students are free to choose from a wide range of bespoke, semesterised, elective subjects that speak to the values of student passion and inter-disciplinary learning. Additionally, some Year 10 electives offer accelerative possibilities for appropriate South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) candidates.

Whereas students study Science as a single subject in Years 7 to 9, in Year 10 the Science program divides into three specialised subjects – Biology, Physics and Chemistry.

Students in Years 9 and 10 also begin to prepare themselves for the SACE. Our 'stage not age' approach means that some students in Years 9 and 10 may have the opportunity to study courses and material beyond their year level. Students are also invited to take part, where appropriate, in our Micro-Credential Program.

Years 11 and 12: Acceleration and moving beyond the ATAR

Learning in Years 7 to 10 is designed to provide a firm basis for success in the SACE.

The School offers over 25 SACE subjects, in nine different areas, to enable students to select a course of study in keeping with their abilities and interests.

Most SACE Stage 2 subjects are now offered in Year 11 for learners in need of acceleration and enrichment. This approach also means that many senior classes will operate on a 'stage not age' basis. Heads of Faculty will determine applicants' suitability for each class, remembering that one size never fits all in education. Successful acceleration candidates will do more in Year 12 than simply prepare for their remaining assessments.

Where appropriate, the School guides learners through our University Studies courses, allowing students to begin studying university degree courses before they have finished Year 12. Additionally students will be able, where appropriate, to engage meaningfully with a range of workplace, entrepreneurial, creative and micro-credentialled opportunities offered in their final year as a way of immersing themselves in the real world as they near the end of their secondary education. University Studies Program

The School teaches a number of University subjects onsite, using tertiary-vetted SPSC teachers to guide students through Business, Law, Medical Science, Philosophy, and Theology subjects. The School also mentors learners through various university subjects outside the onsite program. This program allows boys to challenge themselves intellectually and begin studying university degree courses before they have finished Year 12.

Catering to diverse learning needs

All students are different and learn differently. Curriculum content or speed of lesson presentation is varied to reflect the particular needs of a class group. Subject teacher planning is flexible in recognising the needs of all students as individuals and ensuring progression and relevance. However, students whose needs are truly exceptional require enhanced provisions to enable them to fulfil their potential.

There are provisions made across the Senior School for both enrichment and reinforcement in the curriculum. Students who have a diagnosed learning disability or difficulty may be eligible for Curriculum Support which provides support through several methods. Students may be on an Individual Learning Plan or be provided with in-class support. Students who require more intensive support may meet the criteria to be eligible for Curriculum Support Class (Years 7 to 10). These classes are smaller and allow for more individual attention.

Students who are recognised as being highly able will have access to a wide range of enrichment opportunities. Beyond acceleration, some subjects feature streamed classes and many electives are tailored to students who are particularly able in certain areas. Faculties and the Diverse Learning Needs team may identify and work in different ways with truly exceptional learners in an effort to challenge them beyond the school, state and national standards.



Information, communication and learning technologies

MacBook Program

St Peter's College uses Apple technology in combination with the Office365 suite from Prep to Year 12. All students from Year 7 to Year 12 are required to have a MacBook as part of their enrolment. The MacBook must be enrolled under the School's device management for the duration of their time at the School. Student devices are fully released from this management at the end of their time at the School.

Learning Technologies and Online Safety

We deeply value safe, productive and creative use of technology by all students. Partnership with parents is a critical element of our approach; therefore, we invite parents to attend information sessions on our learning technology programs and approach to online safety.

Please note that further details regarding minimum device specifications, ordering/delivery deadlines and parent information sessions will be sent at the end of September.

Procuring a MacBook

Option A: Purchasing from the SPSC ICLT Online Store

To assist in providing affordable and ready access to Apple technology, the School partners with Compnow, an authorised Apple reseller.

The online store provides an ordering portal with a shortlist of models that meet the current recommended specifications. There is also the opportunity to purchase accessories such as laptop cases. Purchasing through the portal offers competitive pricing and excellent insurance options as well as a smooth delivery and setup

process; we strongly recommend the use of this option where possible.

Devices purchased through the online store prior to the order cut-off date will be delivered to the School, configured by the Keystone Support staff and made ready for collection.

Option B: Purchasing from another vendor

If you decide to purchase the device from another vendor, please ensure that it meets the minimum specifications and is delivered to the Keystone Support Centre for configuration as advertised in the upcoming communication. If purchasing elsewhere, we recommend delivering the device to the School unused to ensure a smooth configuration process.

Option C: If your son already has a MacBook

If your son already has access to a MacBook that meets the minimum specifications, it can be used; however, please note that the device must be configured for management by the School and it is therefore important to back up and save any existing data prior to delivering the device to the Keystone Support Centre for configuration.

Repairs

In the event that your son's MacBook requires repairs, the School provides servicing and repairs through an authorised Apple Repair Centre. The service can be accessed via the Keystone Support Centre; however, please note that the repairers will communicate directly with you regarding quotes and expected timeframes.

Insurance and Warranty

It remains the responsibility of families to repair or replace malfunctioning or damaged MacBooks. The School recommends taking out sufficient insurance such as the one offered via the online store to cover the device.

Software Supplied by the School

The School provides all software that students are required to use via a portal that is made available once the device is enrolled.

Laptop Bags or Sleeves

The School requires students to have an appropriate bag, hard case or sleeve to help protect their device as they move to and from school and between classes. Families are able to choose the option that suits their son best.

Keystone

Keystone is the learning, information and communication platform developed by St Peter's College.

It is in Keystone that the School's events, processes and information are communicated. Importantly, Keystone is also the digital platform that records student's academic, co-curricular and personal development.

Navigating Keystone

Keystone is an innovative, dynamic website that contains dozens of useful tools for the School's many different processes and activities. Each tool is represented by a labelled tile, and users will be presented with a suite of default tiles based on their individual needs.

Menu bar

The menu icon reveals all the Keystone tiles, sorted into drop-down categories. If you are seeking a tile that is not on your dashboard, you can find it in the menu.



Searching for tiles

Search for tiles or other Keystone content in the search tool, denoted by the icon of a magnifying glass. Start typing the name of a tile to find it.

Customised dashboard

While Keystone pre-selects tiles for your dashboard, you can also customise it. Press the menu bar to start customising, then add, remove or rearrange tiles at will.

Keystone tiles

Among the many tiles available within Keystone, the following are particularly useful for most users:

My Details

Update the personal details that the School holds about you and your son, including emergency contact details.

My Tasks

A tool for recording, tracking and submitting homework tasks allocated to your son.

Photography Consent Form

An online form granting permission for your son's photo to be used in School publications such as St Peter's College, Magazine and social media.

My Photos

Photos that capture all aspects of student life from in-classroom learning and co-curricular activities through to School events, music and sports.

Student Medical Details

An online form for parents to keep their son's medical information up to date to ensure that he is able to safely attend School activities, camps and excursions.

Financial Information

Update your banking information and view your current fees balance, transactions and print receipts.

Lunch, SEA and Online Orders

Place your son's lunch orders in advance or recharge your son's lunch card for purchases while at School.

Music Timetable and My Music Diary

Enrol your son in instrumental music lessons and check his lesson timetable, plus view weekly updates on your son's progress with the online Music Diary.

Sport Zone

Access sporting event information for the entire sporting program. Discover your son's upcoming sporting fixtures, sports reports and his past results.

Community Directory

A searchable archive of contact details of parents and students at the School.

ICLT Online Store

Purchase hardware through our online store.

School Calendar

A searchable list of every official event in the School Calendar, displaying updates in real time.

My Teachers

Find your son's teachers and their contact details at a glance.

Learning Curve

The latest detailed information regarding your son's academic performance and progress. Parents can view upcoming assessments, review how he has performed at specific skills and knowledge, and see his overall grades. Data is published throughout the year in real time.

My Timetable

An easy-to-use, updated display of your son's academic timetable.

My Actions

An archive of Areas of Strength, Improvement and Concern generated by staff about your son, to help you engage with and reflect with your son about his achievements, progress and challenges.

Boarding

Up to 100 boarders call the School home for 38 weeks of the year.

They are supported by qualified and dedicated boarding staff who provide the necessary support for the students in their care.

The boarding staff supervise students during out-of-school hours and provide pastoral and academic support. Senior boarding staff are teachers at the School and are in constant communication with the boarders' mentors and class teachers to ensure they are accessing the necessary support.

We recognise that all students are unique and respond to the challenges of living away from home in different ways. Led by our Director of Boarding, our staffing structure ensures students always have someone to speak to while also encouraging students to develop independence.

The health and wellbeing of our boarders is our primary concern, and we encourage students and parents to make contact should any concerns arise.

A significant amount of thought and planning is put into the staffing of our Boarding House. This is to ensure all students are well supervised and are able to access a staff member for any questions or concerns they may have. There is always a minimum of two live-in staff on duty who are directly accessible by students. Furthermore, during supervised study periods we have dedicated learning support assistance and additional tutoring staff are accessible to provide flexibility in offering small group and one-on-one academic assistance when required. Out of hours, the boarding students are provided with a comprehensive and engaging program. Emphasis is placed on combining exciting activities with a meaningful 'life skill' curriculum and to developing meaningful relationships and independence.

Each night a staff member resides in a dedicated overnight room, so that students have a single location to go to during the night should they need support or feel unwell.

The Director of Boarding and Heads of House also live on School grounds in close proximity to the Boarding House and are accessible to students whenever they are needed.

Service Learning

As an Anglican School, we are called to service and it is through these acts of giving that our students learn about themselves and their communities. We know that boys are at their best when they feel needed and that they strongly respond to the authentic needs of others through engaging in relational and meaningful service.

The St Peter's College Service Learning program supports our students to take part in a range of service activities that foster growth, empathy, connection and kindness. Through making meaningful connections with people beyond the classroom and their regular circles, students gain an appreciation of the broader world, its everchanging challenges, and their position within the global community.

Some of our core service offerings include:

Buddy Up

Buddy Up brings together our students and young people with disability each week for an afternoon of meaningful peer connection and social inclusion. While students and guests build lasting friendships and develop important life skills, guest families enjoy a well-deserved break knowing their young people are in a safe, caring environment that meets their needs.

The experience of Buddy Up was unforgettable, I can still remember making giant bubbles for the kids, and the soapy water going everywhere. Every time we saw the kids smile, we felt what we were doing was worth it. – Sky (SHT 2024).

Sony Foundation Children's Holiday Camp

Our annual Sony Foundation Children's Holiday Camp in partnership with Wilderness School involves a three day and two night camp where students care for children with disability. The students are responsible for the 24-hour care of their guests, allowing their families to take some valuable respite.

It was an honour to be involved and care for such incredible children - the genuine laughter, smiles, and bonds I formed proved how small acts of kindness can significantly affect others' lives. – Archie (MAC 2024)

The Smith Family 'Student 2 Student' reading program

The Smith Family 'Student 2 Student' reading program supports disadvantaged young Australians in Years 3 to 8 who struggle with reading. The program matches a student who is struggling with their reading, with a peer Buddy who helps to improve their reading skills over an 18-week period.

'Student 2 Student' helped me grow as a leader and a communicator, but also as a person. I've learned to be patient, encouraging, and open-minded. I've seen firsthand how showing up for someone can change the direction of their journey. – Sebastian, Year 9

Mary Mags Dinners

Mary Mags Dinners are committed to reducing loneliness and hunger on Saturday nights in the city. Three times a year our students and parents cook and serve a three-course meal for 100+ people at a Mission Hall in the city.

Mary Mags deepened my understanding of how important it is to meet people where they are, both literally and figuratively, and to create spaces that restore not only physical needs but also emotional wellbeing. – Adan, Year 11.



Outdoor Education

Outdoor Education is a fundamental, memorable and compulsory component of the St Peter's College Senior School experience.

Students are encouraged and supported to expand their capabilities and extend their skills in group outdoor activities. Students learn about our wonderful South Australian natural environment, explore the indigenous connections to the land and consider personal journeys in connection with the journey of others. Many students reflect on their Outdoor Education journeys as a turning point in their growth and development.

Our Pushing the Boundaries sequential program consists of the following elements for all students in Years 7 to 10:

Year 7

An overnight lead-in program at our Outdoor Education campus at Finnis forms strong bonds within Mentor groups and introduces students to fundamental expedition skills. Later in the year, these skills are expanded upon through a five-day expedition journey in small groups, focusing on bush craft and community living.

Year 8

Over five days, students journey in small groups exploring wilderness areas of the Yorke Peninsula. White sand beaches, secluded coves and dramatic cliffs are the backdrop for cycle touring, fishing, snorkelling and hiking.

Year 9

The Grampians (Gariwerd) National Park is the perfect venue to build confidence around sense of self, self-reliance and personal responsibility. Groups will summit peaks, descend into gorges, and ride alongside flowing rivers. They complete this venture mentally and physically equipped for their final Pushing the Boundaries journey in Year 10.

Year 10

A milestone of a student's education at St Peter's College – our 21 Day Journey is an extended wilderness program at the end of Semester 1. Students, in small expedition groups, complete an epic journey through the Flinders Ranges. Across mountains and through gorges by day, and beside a campfire under a blanket of stars by night, students become in tune with themselves thrive in this stunning landscape.

Exploration Society (ES)

An opportunity for students in Years 7 to 12 to engage in outdoor activities with our Outdoor Education team on weekends and across school holidays. ES can be an opportunity to build confidence and skills in preparation for our Pushing the Boundaries program, or as an opportunity to stretch and extend through incredible experiences in the wilderness.





Sport

Sport and co-curricular activities are integral to the St Peter's College educational experience.

We provide exceptional facilities, coaches and programs to support every student in developing their knowledge, skills and abilities necessary for a successful life.

The relationships developed through our comprehensive program are helpful in promoting enjoyment, learning and community. The School participates in interschool matches each week while interstate and overseas trips enhance the calendar. Our programs have enabled talented students to be selected at state, national and international levels. Traditional Intercollegiate (Intercol) competitions between St Peter's College and Prince Alfred College are also held for summer and winter sports at the culmination of each season.

We look forward to welcoming each new student into our community of sports.

St Peter's College has a compulsory sports policy. Please refer to the table below for information about the requirements for each year level.

Students who play club sport are expected to manage club sport commitments (and any academy or state level of commitment) alongside their school sport commitments. If school and club sessions clash, school sport should take priority. However, the School will always aim to ensure that students honour and manage all their sporting commitments in a safe and responsible manner.

Making choices via Keystone

1. All students in Years 7 to 12 must select a primary sport for each term. This choice is placed in the space labelled 'primary sport'. However, Year 12 students will usually put 'no selection' in the Term 4 'primary sport' space due to Term 4 examinations.
2. Some students may wish to play both a primary sport and an additional sport. The additional sport must play matches on different days to the primary sport. This choice may be entered in the space labelled 'additional sport'. Please note that if a student chooses an additional sport his full commitment to both, including practice, is essential. We recommend that Year 7 students do not choose an additional sport. The coach will tend to select 'primary sport' students in preference to 'additional sport' students to ensure everyone plays at least one sport each week.
3. Students will generally practice twice a week, in the afternoons, however some sports train in the morning from 6.45am. Refer to the individual sport summaries that follow, as practice days and match days differ for some sports.
4. Once a student puts his name down for a sport he is expected to attend all practices and, if chosen in a team, all matches.
5. Cross reference the sport choices with music tuition and co-curricular activities and societies to ensure sport choices do not conflict with other commitments.
6. Teams are entered for the Sports Association for Adelaide Schools (SAAS) competitions, based upon the number of students who choose a particular sport. A student will not be permitted to change his sport during the season unless there are exceptional circumstances. In this case, the student must first consult with the Director of Sport and HPE.
7. Because of limitations imposed by grounds, and the number of other schools participating in a particular sport, it may not be possible for all students to represent the School on a regular basis in their chosen sport. This may then create a rostering/rotation of players. Attempts will always be made to place a student in his preferred school team.

Badminton

Badminton is a successful and popular sport at St Peter's College. The Badminton program at St Peter's College caters for all students, offering participation opportunities for students looking for fun, more technical coaching for students looking to develop their skills and advanced training for students pursuing state/national representation. Badminton training sessions usually run in the off season (Terms 2 and 3) and a variety of holiday clinics are also offered.

St Peter's College also enters Open and Middle teams into the State Knockout Competition each year.

The School has strong connections with local clubs and state/national associations providing students with many competition opportunities outside of school to pursue their aspirations in the sport.

Cricket

Cricket at St Peter's College has been running for over 170 years and is for students of all ages and experience. The program offers national and international tours from Year 6 through to Year 12.

The aim of the cricket program is to create an environment that is inclusive to players of all backgrounds. Senior School cricketers can expect to train twice per week with their teams, play matches on weekends, and participate in optional specialist skills sessions and a strength and conditioning program available to all players.

Training and games emphasise fun and participation, enhance skill development, and further advance a player's ability to make decisions and work cooperatively as a team on and off the field.

Team Sailing is regularly described as "chess on water" where strategy, tactics and ability combine to ensure fast and exciting races.

Basketball

Senior School games are played on Saturday and each year our Open 1st Team competes in the Open A1 competition, which offers qualifying teams the chance to participate in the state knockout tournament.

Students who are selected for our Middle 1st team and Open 1st team compete in an annual tournament with Shore Grammar in Sydney, with each school hosting the tournament each year.

In addition to weekly training, students are also offered school holiday basketball camps which take place during Term 1, Term 2 and Term 3 holidays. These camps include a range of basketball topics with classroom sessions between on court sessions, including basketball video presentations of on-court learning concepts, nutrition for basketball, and basketball pathways information. A range of extra sessions are also offered during and outside the regular season.

Basketball is available to students of all ages and ability levels. Trainings will vary depending on the number of teams and as facilities demand.

In recognising the importance of students engaging in co-curricular activities and a desire to provide parents with certainty around pick-up times so they can plan accordingly, our Extreme Weather Policy has been updated.

First and foremost, our priority is to provide a safe learning environment for all students and staff. As such our policy details the actions to be taken when an extreme weather event impacts sports training and/or competition.

Sports training

Rather than rely on a predicted temperature or forecast conditions, a decision regarding sports training will be made in real time when the actual weather conditions can be assessed. Reasonable effort will be made to ensure training sessions go ahead as planned. In the case of extreme weather, coaches and staff will modify the session and/or relocate activities inside. Unless otherwise advised, parents should plan to pick up their son at the regular conclusion time of after school activities.

Sports competition

Sports competitions are governed by various associations and in negotiation between schools. In the case of extreme weather, reasonable effort will be made to reschedule or adjust competition fixtures to maximise participation. Extreme weather policies between schools can vary so parents and students should check Sport Zone carefully for match details and any information regarding cancellations or adjustments to fixtures.

Cancellations due to other weather conditions

The SAAS Executive Officer in consultation with the Chair of the Executive may issue a blanket cancellation when weather conditions across the metropolitan area are considered to be so extreme as to warrant such a cancellation.

It is recognised that extreme weather conditions (hail, lightning, rain, thunderstorms, wind gusts etc) could impact upon proceeding with games.

Fixtures may be cancelled by either participating school if deemed necessary.

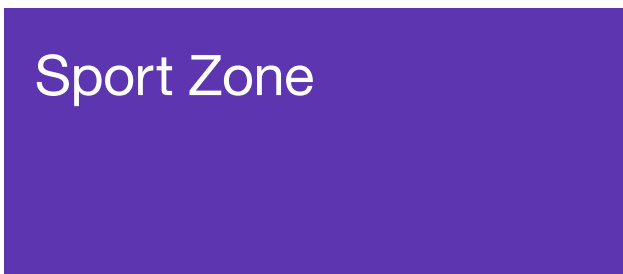


Sports choice submission procedure

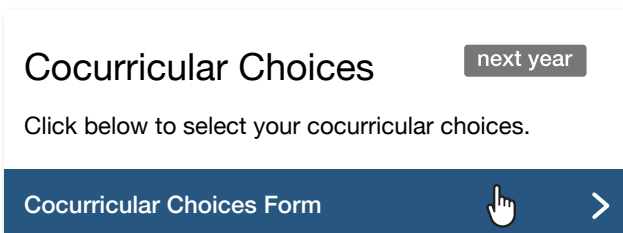
In the Senior School, students select their sports using our online form, and then parents are notified of their son's choices by email.

Please follow these steps to complete the online Sports Choice form.

4. Complete the Sports Choice form.

Years 7 to 9 primary sport – must choose both a summer and winter sport.

Year 10 primary sport – must choose a summer or winter sport. Must choose a second sport or debating/chess. Can choose additional sports, co-curricular and/or societies.

Year 11 primary sport – must choose one summer or winter sport. Can choose a second sport or debating, chess, music or service learning as their second cocurricular activity. Can choose additional sports co-curricular and/or societies.

Year 12 primary sport – must choose one sport in their final year. Can choose additional sports, co-curricular and/or societies.

Additional sport – additional sports are optional. Should you wish to choose an additional sport, you must fully commit to this sport in addition to your primary sport, including training sessions and matches.

To select an additional sport for summer and/or winter, tick the checkbox in the light blue panel to reveal the sport choices.

What you select for summer (Term 1) will be automatically applied to summer (Term 4).

Should you wish to choose an **additional** sport, you must fully commit to this sport **in addition** to your Primary Sport, including Training Sessions and Matches.

5. Click the **Submit** button to submit your sports choices.
6. Parents will be sent a notification email containing their son's sports choices. Sports choices are considered approved by default.
7. If a parent does not wish their son to participate in one of the sports, we ask that they negotiate with their son and for the student to resubmit their sports choices, or please contact the Director of Sport and HPE, Mr Barnaby Eaton on beaton@stpeters.sa.edu.au.
8. If an **Exemption** has been selected for either season, parents must upload a supporting document marked for the "Attention of the Director of Sport and HPE". Parents may submit the supporting document online. Please use the link provided within the notification email. Supporting documents may be uploaded in the following formats: .doc .docx, .jpg, .pdf, .txt.

Athletic Development

The Athletic Development Department offers a range of programs for the diverse physical literacy needs of students from Years 4 to 12. Working in collaboration with all sports and the Health and PE Department, the Athletic Development programs aim to enhance every student's physical literacy ie their ability to use cognitive processes to help them move with economy, confidence and poise through a range of physically demanding environments.

Strength and conditioning (Years 7 to 12) - age and training age appropriate, progressive programs utilising a variety of exercises from body weight, to loaded complex exercises including weightlifting derivatives, complex plyometrics and injury prevention exercises. Students who participate in the Athletic Development program from Year 7 will potentially learn >400 exercises.

Rehabilitation programs for injured students

(Years 7 to 12) - working with the relevant medical practitioners, the Athletic Development team either modify current training programs, implement early-stage rehabilitation programs or develop and deliver end stage rehabilitation programs for students.

Sport specific testing (Years 7 to 12) - allows for comparisons across years, tracking individual changes and differentiating performance levels.

Speed@SPSC - delivered two times per week in the summer sport season, the sessions include sprint, agility and change of direction drills for students from all sports from Years 7 to 12.

Run Club - for boys from Year 4 to 12. Held every Friday morning of the school year, Run Club allows students to build their general aerobic fitness with their peers.







Music

An appreciation for music is developed from an early age at St Peter's College.

From the Early Learning Centre through to Year 12, students are encouraged to explore music in a variety of forms and refine their musicianship skills. Music is a compulsory subject until Year 8 and is offered as an elective from Year 9.

Our music programs give students the opportunity to perform, compose and use their critical thinking skills to analyse a wide range of music. Our extensive ensemble program provides opportunities to perform in concerts and participate in interstate and overseas tours.

Each week more than 30 instrumental ensembles and choirs rehearse and around 350 students enjoy private music lessons.

Co-curricular, clubs and societies

St Peter's College offers an extensive range of co-curricular clubs and societies.

Co-curricular activities play an important role in the lives of our students and are integral to the way they learn about themselves and others. Every encouragement and opportunity is given to students to pursue their current interests and to develop new ones.

We offer an extensive range of clubs and societies that students can join. These activities complement the academic curriculum and help to develop creativity and critical thinking skills beyond the traditional classroom.

Art Club

Open to students who would like to create artworks using a range of media such as drawing, painting, printmaking and pottery. Meetings take place in the Art Centre at lunch time on Monday and Tuesday.

Audio Visual Society

The AV Society allows students to develop video production skills such as storyboarding, film techniques and editing using professional software. AV participants have the opportunity to record the School's most significant events and create their own small films to be shared with the whole community.

Blue Group

Blue Group is run by the School Captains and is open to any students who want to be a part of student led initiatives to raise awareness of mental health.

Book Club

Book Club gives students the opportunity to widen their reading horizons and share their experiences across multiple literary genres. From graphic novels to poetry or the latest best-seller, no books are off limits.

Chinese Society

Open to students interested in Chinese culture in the Senior School. Different Chinese cultural activities will be run throughout the year.

Cross Keys

The Cross Keys is the School's annual publication celebrating student creativity in both Art and Literature, from the Early Years through to Year 12. Open to Senior School students with an interest in editorial journalism, publishing, visual art, literature, or marketing, this co-curricular provides hands-on experience in curating, designing, and promoting a professional publication. Participants contribute to all aspects of production - from selecting and editing student work to layout and marketing - developing valuable collaborative and creative skills along the way.

Drama

Drama allows students to be involved in productions, either as a performer or as part of the technical and stage crew. Each year auditions take place for the senior play or School musical and a junior play (involving students in Years 7 to 9). Rehearsals occur after school and on weekends.

In the event that the School collaborates with other schools, rehearsals may take place in venues off campus. There is also a 'Tech Club' and an improvisation performance troupe (TheatreSports™).

EAL Support (English as an Additional Language)

For students whose first language is not English and require extra support.

Exploration Society

Developing and extending interest, knowledge and skills in the outdoors. The society is designed to be fun, and delivered through a wide variety of outdoor activities.

French Society

Open to all French students and others interested in French language and culture. The student led society hosts a variety of activities, competitions, language support and Francophone cultural experiences.

Future Problem Solving (FPS)

Future Problem Solving (FPS) requires students to write a 1,500 word story in response to a global concern. Concerns could include global warming, the ethical treatment of animals and disappearing languages. Students work with the FPS Coordinator to brainstorm and structure an engaging story that explores the chosen issue. Students have six months to craft their scenario.

Historical Society

The Historical Society is student-directed and responds to the wide-ranging historical interests of its members. Meetings provide opportunities to celebrate all things historical, through topical presentations, tours, films, documentaries and guest speakers.



The Historical Society aims to encourage community interest and knowledge in the School's vibrant history, and provides members with opportunities to develop research, leadership and mentoring skills, by being involved in the School history.

Latin@SPSC

Latin@SPSC is a co-curricular activity where students from Years 7 to 12 meet weekly at lunchtime to learn Latin in an engaging and supportive environment. Learning Latin strengthens vocabulary, improves understanding of English and other languages, and sharpens analytical thinking. It also provides valuable foundations for many careers, particularly in medicine, law, and science, where Latin terminology remains essential. The society offers students the opportunity to explore the language of Ancient Rome, gain insights into classical culture, and build skills that extend far beyond the classroom, enriching both academic pursuits and future professional pathways.

Lunchtime support

Teacher support is available for catch up on homework and assignments.

Maths@SPSC

The Maths@Saints program originated in 2006 following a generous donation from an old scholar, who wished the gift be used to promote mathematics within St Peter's College and the activities of the School in the wider community. One of the objectives of Maths@SPSC is to provide opportunities for students to engage in a range of exciting learning opportunities in addition to the standard curriculum.

These include the Mathematics Enrichment, the Mathematical Society and the Informatics Society.

Mooting

Mooting is an activity where schools take part in mock trials. Students are given a set of facts and witness statements two weeks before a trial, where barristers examine and cross-examine witnesses to establish their version of the case. It is open to students in Years 9 to 12. Venues include the School, opposition school, or the Supreme Court at Victoria Square. Blazer uniform is to be worn to trials.

OzClo Society

The OzCLO Society is dedicated to exploring the fascinating world of languages through the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad. Open to students from Years 7 to 12, the society meets once a week at lunchtime to practice solving challenging and creative linguistic problems. These activities help students strengthen their analytical thinking, teamwork and problem-solving skills, while also deepening their understanding of how languages function. Beyond preparing for OzCLO, the society organises events and activities that celebrate the rich linguistic and cultural diversity of the world, encouraging students to appreciate and engage with global perspectives.

Public Speaking

Public Speaking includes a variety of internal and external events and competitions in which students from all year levels can participate to help develop and practice their public speaking skills. Lunchtime meetings and training sessions are offered to support students in the development of their public speaking abilities.

Reconciliation Committee

Open to all students who are passionate about understanding Indigenous issues and creating change in our community. Members will have opportunities to contribute to reconciliation events such as National Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week.

Science@SPSC

Students who take delight in coming together to discuss and debate all things science and are passionate about all aspects of science.

Service Society

Service Society works on supporting School community service projects and also initiating their own. All students are welcome.

Tournament of Minds (ToM)

Students work in teams of seven to craft an imaginative response to a problem under the title of applied technology, maths engineering, social sciences or language. They create a script, props and costumes and perform their solution at the annual ToM Tournament day at Flinders University.

Young Archies Portraiture Group

This program focuses on portraiture and general art skills. Sessions run from 4.00pm to 5.00pm on Mondays and/or Tuesdays across the school year. The group is open to all Years 6 to 12 students with an interest in Visual Arts. Students will have the opportunity to develop their artistic skills in a fun and supportive environment, with the program culminating in the submission of their works to the Young Archie Competition, as well as numerous other exhibition opportunities throughout the year. Optional weekend workshops led by highly experienced and recognised South Australian portraiture artists are offered 2-3 times across the year.

Youth Connect

Youth Connect is a Christian Youth group for Years 7 to 12 students from all schools.

Girls and students are welcome and young people from all backgrounds can have fun and grow in their relationship with God and each other. In a fun and supportive environment, students can grow in faith and live with purpose.

Tuck Shop and lunch orders

Personal presentation

As representatives of the School, a high standard of personal dress and presentation is required by students at all times. The School uniform is to be worn correctly at all times within and outside the School grounds. While students are encouraged to take responsibility for their personal presentation, parents are expected to send their sons to school in accordance with the following standards:

Blazer

The blazer is to be worn when travelling to and from School in Terms 2 and 3, unless travelling by bicycle. In terms 2 and 3 the blazer is worn at School Muster and in Chapel.

If removed at School, the blazer should be locked in a locker.

Pullovers and ties

The School pullover (grey with blue and white bands), or the Year 12 pullover may be worn with the summer or winter uniform.

Ties are worn with the summer and winter uniform. When wearing a tie, the top shirt button must be fastened and the tie done up.

Shirts

Long sleeved shirts are to be buttoned up at the cuffs or neatly rolled to the elbow. All shirts are to be tucked into shorts or trousers. If a t-shirt is worn under the shirt it is not to be visible.

Belt

A black leather belt (with a plain silver buckle) is to be worn with the school uniform.

Shoes

Black leather lace-up school shoes (not sneakers or boots) are to be kept in good order and regularly polished.

Socks

Blazer uniform: plain grey or black calf-length socks.
Summer uniform: long white socks pulled up to knees.

Hair and personal presentation

Hair must be neatly groomed at all times and in a style appropriate to wear with the St Peter's College uniform. Cuts, styles or colours which, in the opinion of the School, are extreme, not a natural hair colour or show significant contrast in length are not acceptable. Hair should be no shorter than a number 3. Hair must be above the collar, and fringe length must not be below the eyebrows nor tucked behind the ears. The School will exercise discretion in determining whether or not a haircut or style is acceptable. Students who do not comply will be sent home until hair is considered acceptable by the School. Visible items of jewellery (including earrings and necklaces), other than watches, are not to be worn. All students are required to be clean shaven.

Consequences

Any breaches will be dealt with in line with the School behaviour code.

Uniform Shop online booking information

The School uniform is the most visible symbol of identity for students at St Peter's College. It is expected that all students take pride in their appearance and ensure their uniform is well-fitted, clean, neat and worn in a dignified and respectful manner during the school day, and while travelling to and from school. To ensure your son has all his uniform needs prior to the start of the 2026 school year, please book a uniform fitting appointment at the St Peter's College Uniform Shop.

Appointments are essential during the following periods:

Summer or winter uniform changeover: Last two weeks of Term 1 and Term 3 and the first two weeks of Term 1, Term 2 and Term 4. Appointments can be made through the booking portal on Keystone and are available at recess, lunchtime or after School.

The Uniform Shop is situated between Girdlestone and Main Ovals on the ground floor of the old Athelney House Stables.

Use of mobile phones

For students in Year 9 and above, mobile phones are to be stored in the student's locker from arrival at School to 3.30pm. Students may briefly check their phones for messages at their locker at the start of recess and lunch. Teachers, at their discretion, may direct students to bring a mobile phone to class for educational purposes.

Students using a mobile phone outside of these expectations will have their phone collected and a My Actions entry will be recorded. Students can pick up their phones from the Senior School Office at the end of the school day. Repeated misuse of mobile phones will result in the student handing their phone in to the front office at the start of each school day for a period determined by their Head of House in consultation with parents. Students in Years 7 and 8 will be participating in the Wait Mate pledge.



Road safety procedures

Pedestrians

When students are crossing North Terrace on their way to and from school, they must always cross at the pedestrian traffic lights situated near Trinity Street or outside the Junior School. They should not cross the road at any other place, even when traffic is stopped for the lights.

Students crossing at Hackney Road must use the traffic lights on the corner of North Terrace or the pedestrian island crossing. Under no circumstances are students to cross Hackney Road at any other point than the pedestrian island crossings or the North Terrace traffic lights.

Driving

Students, parents and staff must drive with due caution inside the School and on the surrounding roads.

Parking

Students who drive to school must park in the Hackney Road car parks. They must register their vehicles via Keystone. Students must not park in other School car parks and are asked not to park on surrounding streets.

Senior School parents should park in the Hackney Road car park.

In the interest of student safety, the Junior School Avenue is open for parking until 9.30am each week day. It is then closed for traffic throughout the day and reopens at 2.30pm. On weekends the Avenue is available for general parking.

Dropping off and picking up

Parents may drop off and pick up students inside the School grounds in the Hackney Road car park, outside Memorial Hall, or in the Avenue. However, there is no long-term parking in the Avenue, or in front of Memorial Hall. Parents cannot drop their sons off along the road adjacent to Memorial Hall and Lloyd Oval.

Parents may also drop and collect their sons at the Pembroke Street gates. Please note there are some parking restrictions in this area, and parents should not drive their car through this gate to drop off their son inside the school.

For safety, parents are asked not to use the Hatswell Street gates or car park for drop off or pick up. The adjacent streets are very narrow, and not designed for significant volume of traffic.

Parents should not drop students off nor collect them from the western side of Hackney Road, but are encouraged to drive into the school and use the Hackney Road car park.

Bikes

Bikes are to be kept inside the bike shed near the Pembroke Gates or the bike rack in Allen Quad. If students require access to bikes during school hours, a permission slip must

be obtained from the Senior School Office. Bikes are not allowed to be left on the campus over the weekend.

School buses

Hills, Northern and Unley-Eastern bus service

All bus routes are provided by Kanga Coachlines and can be booked by contacting them directly. The cost of the bus service is \$6.40 per trip plus a \$200 annual booking fee per family. Only registered students are able to use the services. To register, please email Kanga coachlines at team@kanga.com.au with the subject title St Peter's College Bus Service. Kanga Coachlines will then confirm the route and timetable via return email.

*These are 2025 fees and subject to change for 2026.

It is anticipated that services will arrive at St Peter's College no later than 8.15am each day and depart from school no later than 3.45pm. Please note that pick-up locations and times will be finalised by Kanga Coachlines once student registrations are confirmed.

By Week 3 of each term, families must confirm specific travel requirements for the remainder of the term. This allows time for co-curricular schedules to be finalised. Bus and associated fees will be charged to your fee account at the end of each term.

Students using St Peter's College bus services are held to the same high standards of behaviour for when they are at School. Senior School students have a responsibility to look after younger students and are charged with assisting Junior School students to be safe at all times. The School reserves the right to temporarily suspend, or withdraw, the bus service for students engaged in misconduct.

School fees

To ensure the School community is aware of the payment process for school fees, the following information and important dates will assist you in your financial planning.

An email will be sent to all members of the School community in December each year, advising of the fees for the following year, payment options, and terms and conditions.

The fee brochure is available on the website www.stpeters.sa.edu.au/enrolment/fees

School fees for 2026 will be emailed in January, at which time you will be provided with three options for payment:

1. Lump sum payment at the beginning of the school year with 1.0% discount if paid in full by 28 February
2. Three equal instalments due on 28 February, 31 May and 31 August; or
3. 10 equal monthly instalments from February to November (by direct debit only).

N.B. A surcharge of 1% Visa/Mastercard or 1% American Express will be applied.

Total school fees include tuition fee, boarding fee, fixed charge and IT Levy.

It should be noted that music fees, bus fees, overseas and interstate trips and some miscellaneous charges are not included in school fees and are billed separately, with payment due within 30 days of invoice.
