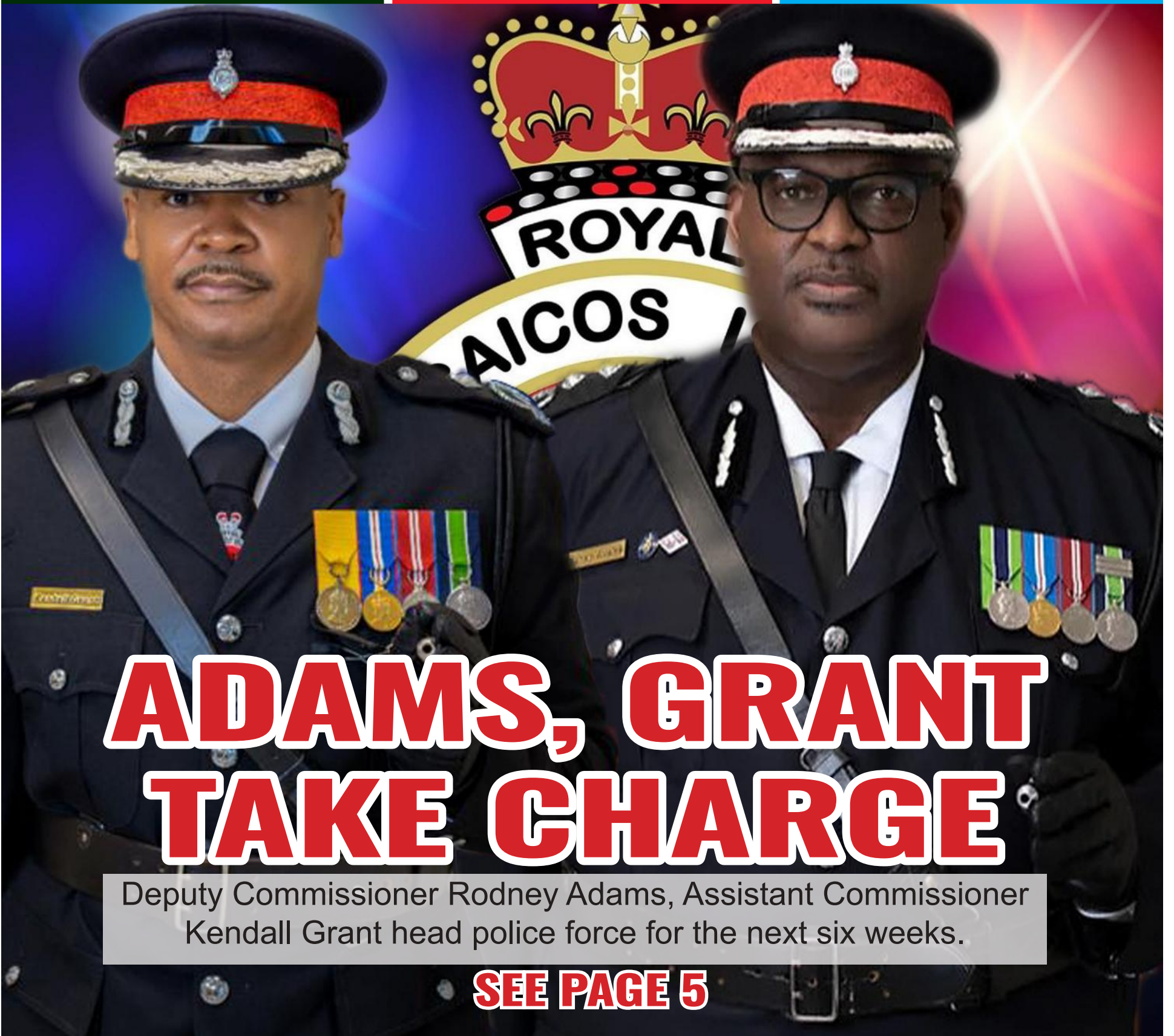





How do I know if I am squatting on Crown Land?

If you have no documentation showing your title to the land or if you have documentation that has not been registered with the Land Registry, you are considered to be squatting. In either of these instances you will receive a notice from the Crown Land Unit informing you of your status as a squatter. If you have documentation showing your title to the land, you are urged to contact the Crown Land Unit should you receive such a notice.

Suspected Gang Member Remanded For December 1 Sufficiency Hearing

Cydereo Smith, a 26-year-old man who was charged with being associated with gang activities in the Turks and Caicos Islands was remanded until December 1, when a sufficiency hearing will be held to determine whether the charge against him has merit.

The Kew Town, Providenciales resident appeared before the Magistrate Oreika Selver-Gardiner unrepresented on Tuesday, October 17, when the case was mentioned. The sufficiency hearing will take place in the Supreme Court because the Magistrate’s

Courts do not have jurisdiction to try such matters.

According to the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force, Smith’s apprehension and subsequent charge followed a shooting incident on February 5th, 2023, in Grace Bay, where a group of men reportedly brandished weapons and opened fire firearms at another group. Fortunately, no severe injuries were reported in the attack.

The charges against Smith were leveled under the Anti-Gang Ordinance (2022) after a thorough investigation, and subsequent consultations between law enforcement officers and the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Superintendent Dean Holden, the Head of Crime, Safeguarding, and Public Protection, commented on the matter, saying, “This is another example of the Police Force’s relentless pursuit of those suspected to be involved in gang-related crime, specifically the criminal use of illegal firearms. This latest charge also demonstrates our continued use of the relatively new Anti-Gang legislation to target individuals who cause harm to our communities.”

The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force is advising the public cooperate with law enforcement by reporting any information related to gangs or other illegal activities. They can reach out to 911, the nearest police station, the RTCIPF Serious Crime Unit at 232-8752, or TCI Crime Stoppers at 1-800-8477, all while maintaining their anonymity.

In addition to local resources, individuals are encouraged to contact Miami-Dade & Florida Keys Crime Stoppers at 1-305-471-8477 to share information anonymously. This collaborative effort aims to combat gang-related activities and enhance public safety within Providenciales.

Police Issues Guidelines for Escorting

The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force wishes to advise the public of the following requirements when requesting police escort and coverage for planned events.

1) Applications MUST be addressed to Superintendent of Divisions and Community Policing Dwight Gardiner (dwight.gardiner@tcipolice.tc) and copied to Assistant Commissioner of Police Darron Williams (darron.williams@tcipolice.tc),

the Office of the Divisional Commander Assistant Superintendent of Police Calvin Chase (calvin.chase@tcipolice.tc) and Communications Officer Denyse Renne (denyse.renne@tcipolice.tc)

- 2) Applications MUST be submitted 14 days before the event;
- 3) Date of the event;
- 4) Venue;

- 5) Proposed commencement and end times;
- 6) In the case of Walkathon, Runs, Cycling – Detailed Routes;
- 7) Expected Attendance at the event.

According to the police, these requirements have become necessary to ensure the effective planning and allocation of resources. The RT&CIPF thanks the public for its cooperation.

Rodney Adams, Kendall Grant Take Charge of Police Force For Six Weeks

With the departure Commissioner of Police Trevor Botting, Deputy Commissioner of Police Rodney Adams and Assistant Commissioner of Police Kendall Grant are put in charge of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RTCIPF).

Last week, Her Excellency Governor Dileeni Daniel Selvaratnam, staged a farewell reception to mark Botting's retirement Commissioner of Police for the

Turks and Caicos Islands.

According to the Governor's Office, the reception was held to thank Botting for his service to law enforcement in the Turks and Caicos Islands for the last six years. The Governor's Office state that the hunt is underway to find a replacement for Botting, noting that within the next six weeks, the replacement should be in place.

"Mr. Kendall Grant and then Mr. Rodney Adams will be Acting Commissioner for the next six weeks until the Commissioner of Police recruitment is completed," a statement from the Governor's Office said. It is not immediately clear as to whether Adams or Grant has applied for the position.

Botting's tenure as Commissioner of Police was marked by both challenges and achievements. He presided over a period in which the Turks and Caicos Islands experienced their highest-ever murder rate – 2022, as well as the emergence of the notorious criminal, Bradon Rahming, who was responsible for many murders, including children.

Under his leadership, Rahming was shot to death in confrontation with the police. Additionally, Botting played a significant role in modernizing the RTCIPF, particularly in the digitization of the Police Records Department, resulting in significant improvements in record-keeping efficiency.

In a statement, Governor Dileeni Daniel Selvaratnam praised Commissioner Botting for his professionalism and dedication in leading the police force during a period of increasing complexity in the policing landscape. She also mentioned his efforts to imple-

ment wider safeguards for victims of crime.

The governor stated: "Commissioner Botting has served the Turks and Caicos Islands with dedicated care for the past six years. As Commissioner of Police, he has led the Force with professionalism, dealing with a changing policing landscape that has become ever more challenging and complex. During his tenure, Commissioner Botting has also worked with partners across the criminal justice system, to implement wider safeguards for victims of crime. I would like to thank him for his service and wish him all the best with his future endeavours. The recruitment campaign for the next Commissioner of Police will issue shortly."

For his part, Commissioner Botting expressed pride in leading the RTCIPF for four years as Commissioner and two years as Deputy Commissioner. He emphasized his confidence in the force's ability to continue to evolve and meet the challenges it faces. He further assured that his departure would be carried out with minimal disruption to the force's operations and the services it provides to protect the community and visitors.

"It has been my privilege to lead and serve the men and woman of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force for the last four years as Commissioner, and for over two years prior to that as the Deputy Commissioner.

"I am proud of what the Force has achieved in this time, and I am confident that it will continue to develop to meet the challenges it faces. My departure from post will be carried out in a way that causes the least disruption to the Force and the services we provide to protect our communities and all those who visit our islands," Commissioner said.

Commissioner Botting was appointed as the Commissioner of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force in July 2019 having previously served as the Deputy Commissioner from May 2017.

The search for the next Commissioner of Police is truly in earnest, with the job advertisement highlighting the need for individuals with the utmost integrity, ethical values, and a commitment to maintaining high policing standards.

"The Commissioner of Police leads the command of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RTCIPF). You will serve the people and the interests of the Turks and Caicos Islands (TCI), understanding and meeting head-on the scale of the territory's national security challenges. You will need to work effectively in a multi-agency environment to tackle, reduce and prevent crime, ensuring the RTCIPF builds trust and confidence with the communities it serves.

"As the Commissioner of Police, you will need to be a person of the utmost integrity and ethical values, demonstrating personal drive, energy, and commitment to the role. You will define and reinforce policing standards, demonstrating these personally, whilst implementing a strong ethical framework of behaviour and personal responsibility for the RTCIPF," the advertisement said in part.

According to the advertisement, the new Commissioner will be tasked with addressing national security challenges, working collaboratively in a multi-agency environment, and building trust and confidence within the communities served by the RTCIPF.

"You must demonstrate excellent interpersonal communication skills, with the ability to engage and influence key stakeholders, manage relationships, build trust and work in collaboration.

"You will need sound judgment, decision-making and problem-solving skills with an understanding of applicable laws, policies, and procedures in the context of the Turks and Caicos Islands, the advertisement continued.



Someone sold me land and I have a receipt. I have since learned that the land was Crown Land and not theirs to sell. What should I do?

If the property is Crown Land then you need to contact the Crown Land Unit who will investigate the issue and refer you to the relevant authorities if a fraudulent act has been committed. Under section 23(1) of the Crown Land Ordinance, it is an offence for a person to purport to sell or lease Crown Land to another person without lawful authority or title to do so, whether or not any purchase price or rent is paid.

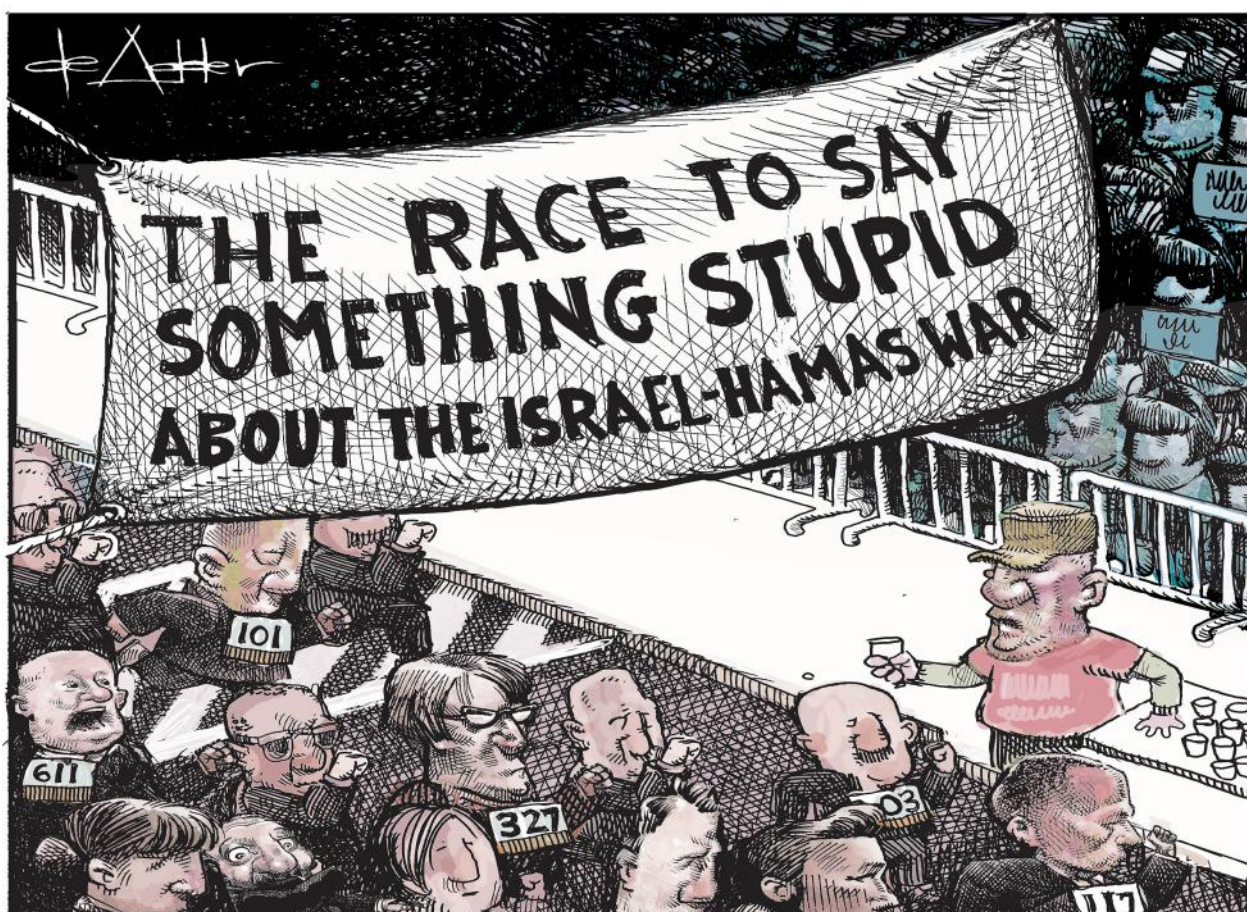

Dangerous Sex Enhancers On Sale In TCI



Extenze is Labelled to contain yohimbe



Inner Man Gold Male Dietary Supplement, which is was not on the Health Canada list. However, its label indicates the presence of yohimbe. Reports are that it is on the TCI market.



Vialis 2 Oral Jelly has been tested by Health Canada and found to contain tadalafil.

Stiff Rox, a product with similar packaging (previously seized) was tested and found to contain sildenafil and tadalafil. Reports are that it is on the TCI market.



Ministry of Health and Human Services (MoHHS) is cautioning against the selling and purchasing of health products that are promoted as sexual enhancers

The MoHHS, in response to a Health Canada advisory, is advising all local suppliers and the general public to discontinue the sale and/or use of these health products which promote sexual enhancement.

This advisory - borne out of a public health concern - is issued due to the serious health risks associated with the consumption of these products. The products in question – which are unauthorised

in Canada- have been tested by Health Canada and are found to contain active ingredients not listed on product labels (including prescription drugs, that have possibly exceeded the maximum recommended doses), also dangerous ingredients single or a combined (particularly drugs that should be available only by prescription, or a combination of ingredients that are not permitted because of serious health risks).

The MOHHS said the public is reminded that prescription drugs should be taken only under the supervision of a health professional because they may cause serious side effects. Using a product that contains ingredients that the consumer is not aware of increases the chance of dangerous allergies and interactions with other medications and foods. Some of these products were found to have ingredients such as acetaminophen/paracetamol, levodopa, sildenafil, tadalafil and yohimbe.

Acetaminophen/Paracetamol is a drug that can pose serious health risks if too much is taken These include serious skin reactions (e.g. blistering) and liver damage. Liver damage may lead to liver failure or, in the most severe cases, death.

According to the MOHHS, Levodopa is combined with other drug ingredients in anti-Parkinson’s medications. It may interact with drugs prescribed for high blood pressure. It should not be used by people with narrow-angle glaucoma, with untreated heart, liver, blood, kidney, lung (bronchial asthma) or hormonal diseases and breastfeeding or pregnant individuals.

Some of the side effects requiring medical attention include:

- severe or persistent nausea or vomiting,
- irregular heartbeat or fluttering in the chest,
- hallucinations,
- lightheadedness when standing quickly,
- or unusual changes in mood or behaviour.

“Sildenafil and tadalafil are used to treat erectile dysfunction. They should not be used by individuals taking any kind of nitrate drug (e.g., nitroglycerin) as they can cause potentially life-threatening low blood pressure. Individuals with heart problems are at increased risk of side effects such as heart attack, stroke, chest pain, high blood pressure, abnormal

heartbeat, abnormal vision and hearing loss.

“Tadalafil taken in combination with caffeine may increase the risk of serious adverse reactions, including, but not limited to heart attack, stroke, blood pressure changes and abnormal or irregular heartbeat,” the MOHHS said in a statement.

It said further that Yohimbine is derived from yohimbe, a bark extract. It said the use of yohimbine or yohimbe may result in serious adverse reactions particularly in people with high blood pressure, or heart, kidney or liver disease.

Side effects include increased blood pressure and heart rate, anxiety, tremors, and sleep disorders. It should not be used by people who are pregnant or breastfeeding, those who have liver, heart, or kidney disease, or by people with psychiatric conditions. The product Inner Man Gold which has been identified on the TCI market is not listed on Health Canada’s list, but its label indicates the presence of yohimbe.

The MoHHS said that its top priority is to ensure public health safety and so wishes to advise consumers to stop using the mentioned products and contact their respective local suppliers. Consumers may contact the Environmental Health Department at 338-2142 for more information on how best to dispose of these sexual enhancers.

In addition, the MOHHS said consumers should contact their pharmacist, physician or other healthcare provider if they have any questions, concerns, or have experienced any problems related to the use of these sexual enhancers. Consumers are also advised to report any side effects via the MoHHS’ Adverse Drug Reaction Form found at <https://gov.tc/docs/ADR.pdf>.

SOTIC '23 Regarded As 'A Tremendous Success'

The Caribbean Tourism Organization's (CTO) return of the State of the Tourism Industry Conference (SOTIC) 2023, in Providenciales a tremendous success, according to the Ministry of Tourism.

The first staging of SOTIC since the pandemic, the

conference saw insightful and informative discussions over two days at the host hotel, The Shore Club, Long Bay @theshoreclubtc, under the theme "Invest. Innovate. Inspire. A new model for Caribbean tourism growth".

Turks and Caicos Islands Governor, Her Excellency Dileeni Daniel-Selvaratnam, said in her welcome remarks that the theme highlights the critical position of the travel and tourism industry as a vehicle for social and economic development, which needs to be underpinned by long-term tourism policies that account for impact investment, waste management, conservation and sustainability.

Hon. Charles Washington Missick, Premier of The Turks and Caicos Islands, in his remarks, urged delegates to work together to make the Tourism Industry sustainable, particularly in the face of the challenges posed by climate change for Small Island Development States (SIDS).

Hon. Josephine Connolly, Minister of Tourism for The Turks and Caicos Islands, in her welcome address, spoke with pride of the Carrying Capacity Study, The Turks and Caicos Islands in the process of conducting. The first Caribbean country to conduct an in-depth study of entire the tourism industry.

"It reflects our dedication to safeguarding our pristine beaches, lush landscapes, and vibrant culture. It embodies our promise to protect what makes the Turks and Caicos Islands unique, ensuring that future generations can revel in the same beauty that has enchanted us for centuries," she said.

In his opening address, the Hon. Kenneth Bryan,

Chairman of the CTO Council of Ministers and Commissioners said the "Caribbean is one of the fastest growing tourism regions in the world and in order to keep up with the rapidly evolving pace of change, we have to be willing to do things differently to maintain our competitive edge".

Day one's theme "Tourism Investment and Financing in the Caribbean" saw keynote speaker Franz Rojas-Ortuste, Director of Water and Sanitation Analysis Division at CAF- the Development Bank of Latin America and the Caribbean, look at potential areas for investment, urging the region to maximise niches such as festivals and gastronomy to bring in millions of dollars like their Latin American counterparts.

The first day also featured a Ministerial Panel on Investment Trends, Partnership and Maximising Tourism Growth, a message from the UNWTO on green investments and a panel discussion on strategies for positioning tourism for new investment opportunities.

On Day two, under the theme Exploring the Drivers for Caribbean Tourism Growth, keynote speaker Doug Lansky, Global Tourism and Travel expert challenged stakeholders to find creative and innovative ways to incorporate sustainability into their operations and enhance tourist spend.

There were robust panel discussions on Aviation Competitiveness in the Caribbean with the thorny issue of inter-regional travel taking centre stage. There were also panel discussions on Digital Transformation in Tourism, Engaging the Filmed Entertainment Industry to advance

Caribbean tourism and a path towards growth of tourism in the context of the Turks and Caicos Islands experience.

The week kicked off with a welcome at the Grace Bay Club @gracebayclub on Monday night which showcased the culture and cuisine of the Turks and Caicos Islands.

There were performances from the TCI songbird Barbara Johnson, David Bowen and TUCA, Mike 'The General', the Q Band Lynks and top sound system Prime DJs.

The close of the conference saw Tourism Ministers and delegates immersing themselves in The Turks and Caicos Island's culture at the popular Thursday night Fish Fry where they enjoyed local cuisine and performances from Provision band, Elroy Simmons and TCI Dolls as well as a Junkanoo display.

Outside of the formal activities, Ministers of Tourism were treated to a private dinner at Parrot Cay and the regional and international media experienced tours to North and Middle Caicos, South Caicos and Grand Turk as well as dinner at @CrackpotKitchen and @KokomosBotanicalResort.

The week closed with the Youth Congress at Beaches Resort Villages and Spa @beachesturksandcaicos in The Bight, which saw the region's youth from 14 countries present their plans for the tourism industry in their respective islands. First place went to Naomi Onwufuju of the British Virgin Islands, second place, Jordan Greig of Barbados and third place, Jael Morgan of Tobago.

The Turks and Caicos Islands Airports Authority (TCIAA) is advising the the public and potential bidders that the deadline for submissions on the Invitation for Prequalification for the Howard Hamilton International Airport Redevelopment Project has been extended to November 10th, 2023.

The Turks and Caicos Islands Airports Authority issued on August 15, 2023, an Invitation for Prequalification for the Public Private Partnership (PPP) for the redevelopment, expansion and ongoing operation and maintenance of the Howard Hamilton International Airport (the "Invitation for Prequalification").

A Prequalification Application must be enclosed in a sealed envelope with APPENDIX 1 (Prequalification Envelope Label) attached firmly to the front. No additional marks should be placed on the envelope. Almost 2,000 Police Records Yet To Be Collected



The Police Records Department of the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RTCIPF) are asking applicants who applied for their police records up to October 16 collect them.

A news release from the RTCIPF stated that there has been a pile-up of police records which were yet to be collected. The release said almost 2,000 processed police records have been sitting at its Old Airport Road facility, awaiting pick-up.

The release stated: "Persons who have applied for their Police Records from June 29th – October 16th, 2023, are kindly asked to visit Police Headquarters, Old Airport Road, Providenciales to collect them.

"Presently, 1752 certificates are awaiting collection. Certificates, except for public holidays, can be collected from 8:30 a.m.

-3 p.m., Monday to Friday. Please note certificates are valid for SIX (6) months from the issue date. The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force thanks you for your cooperation."

The processing of police records have been the bone of contention for members of the public, who complained that it took months for them to get their records after making their application. However, the RTCIPF, who solicited the assistance of Deputy Premier and Minister of Finance Hon. E. Jay Saunders, created a news system, designed to process hundreds of applications per day.

That system, according to the RTCIPF has been working magnificently, to the apparent point that they are being processing these document much sooner that the applicants' expected them to.

BROWN Pelican

Turks & Caicos is home to the Caribbean brown pelican. It is also the national bird of the TCI. They are easily identifiable by their skin pouch under the their bill. They use this pouch as a sort of 'fishing net' to swoop down and catch fish. The brown pelican was listed as endangered in the '70s because of pesticides. For it's time, filming a scene of such a 'provocative' nature was unheard of. It's rebelliousness of that era was what made it iconic.



Look of Death

Monroe's then-husband, Joe DiMaggio, was apparently less than thrilled at the sight of the seductively billowing dress. In his book, Wilder, director of 'The Seven Year Itch', described the 'look of death' on DiMaggio's face as he stormed off the set to the nearby St. Regis Hotel. It was then chronicled by many that when Marilyn returned to the hotel, the couple was in heated debate. This, apparently being one of several straws that ended their marriage. Back in Los Angeles 3 weeks later, their divorce was announced. News headlines read 'Marilyn Splits with Joe Over Sexy Pics'. If there's anything we can learn from this ordeal, it's that we should embrace body autonomy, no matter the situation. Marilyn embraced her body and sexuality and in turn became an example to women today on not minimising yourself so that others can feel big. Wear what makes you feel good, powerful, confident, sexy.

The Informal Settlement Unit (ISU) is now accepting applications from suitably qualified and experienced persons to fill the posts of Temporary Surveyors, to assist the Unit in assessing the living conditions of persons living in informal settlements throughout the TCI, which is scheduled to take place during the period November 2023 to January 2024.

ISU is encouraging residents with the requisite skill set or aptitude to sign-up for this project, as the Social Needs Assessment Survey is essential to understanding the dynamics of informal settlements, to inform policies and initiatives aimed at improving the

living conditions and opportunities for residents in these communities.

Prospective Surveyors must be at least 18 years of age and; must sit a written aptitude test; must have a clean police record; must be able to conduct surveys using tablets, possess good numerical and reading skills; must possess strong interpersonal and communication skills; be willing to work evenings and weekends as and when required; and be available to attend three days of training in preparation for the work.

If selected, the incumbent will be expected to:

- Locate and visit personally ev-

ery inhabited or habitable dwelling in the informal settlement (s) to which he/she may be assigned;

- Complete survey forms accurately for each person and each dwelling according to instructions;
- Assist any other Surveyor in the performance of his/her duties in any other informal settlement if so directed by the ISU Supervisor; and
- Assist the ISU Supervisor in the performance of such other duties as the ISU Supervisor may determine.

Selection will be based on successful completion of: Training and Evaluation Test and Mock Interviews.

Exclusions

Persons employed with professional obligations that may conflict with the confidentiality provision within the ISU are excluded.

Those individuals would be persons employed within the Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force and the Immigration Department and candidates for elective office in the last general election. The reason given is that the principle that the Survey is that it is a national activity and should be seen as non-partisan.

Persons that do not have or cannot show proof of a clean police record will be excluded.

If your breasts could speak, what would they say?



GENETICS PLAY a strong role in breast cancer risks. A history of ovarian or breast cancers on either side of a woman's family sometimes increases the risk of developing breast cancer. According to Dr Andre Williams, haematologist and integrative Oncologist at Teshuva Wellness, when thinking of signs of cancers in women, many people list lumps in the breast as one of the top contenders.

"While it is true that if a new lump suddenly forms, you should get it checked out by a doctor, most breast lumps are perfectly natural. If all you feel are the same bumps in both breasts over a long period of time, you have nothing to worry about," Dr Williams said.

BUMPS AND BIRTHMARKS

When it comes to breast health and your body in general, clear skin is healthy skin. The skin on your breasts should naturally be more or less flat and smooth. Again, consistency is key. Bumps and birthmarks that are always present are not a problem.

"A sudden change in the skin on your breasts should be reported to a doctor. This is not a common sign of breast cancer, but may be a different medical issue. Skin changes as a sign of cancers in women are relatively rare. Even so, clear skin is the best indicator of good breast health," Dr Williams said.

When your body is healthy, circulation causes the temperature to be consistent everywhere, including the breasts. Breasts should be warm like the rest of the torso. Reporting any unnatural warmth to your doctor can help prevent breast cancer. Heat could be a sign of an infection or another condition. In general, the tem-

perature of your breasts should feel natural and aligned with your whole body temperature.

The only thing that should ever come out of your nipples is milk. If you are not breastfeeding, there should be no discharge from your nipples. Discharge if you are not pregnant or breastfeeding could be a sign of a variety of things, from a medication side effect to cancer.

BREAST SORENESS

Also, your breasts should not hurt on a day-to-day basis. As always, there are exceptions to every rule. Many women experience soreness in the breast before or during their period. If this is normal for you, it is nothing to worry about.

Dr Williams said the aim of Teshuva Wellness is to empower women by creating a culture where they can be proactive about their breast health all the time, not just once per year.

By being proactive, women, he said, can also take advantage of breast thermography, or thermal imaging, which is a non-invasive and painless test that doctors sometimes use to monitor for early breast changes that could indicate breast cancer. It works by detecting increases in temperature.

"Thermography does not involve radiation, no pain, no squeezing, no contact with the machine. Instead, it uses an ultra-sensitive camera to produce high-resolution, infrared photographs, or heat images, of the breast. Skin surface temperatures and blood vessel patterns display normal and abnormal physiology," Dr Williams said.

According to him, research studies have also shown that an abnormal thermogram is the

highest known marker of risk for the presence of or future development of breast cancer.

FAMILY HISTORY

"An abnormal thermogram is 10 times more significant as a future risk indicator for breast cancer than a first order family history. In the context of breast cancer screening, thermography is FDA approved for use in conjunction with mammography or other imaging modality," Dr Williams said.

A breast thermography can be done as often as necessary, and usually needs two images. "A breast thermography is not affected by patient age, breast size, breast density, implants, breastfeeding or previous breast surgeries. The result is obtained within seven to 10 days, and often describes the health of your breasts, and also provides information about your hormonal balance," Dr Williams said.

"The test cannot confirm that cancer is present. It can only show that there are changes that may need further investigation. If the thermography detects any abnormalities, the person should seek further screening, which may include a mammogram. If a mammogram confirms that a lump is present, the doctor may recommend an ultrasound or MRI scan and a biopsy. Only a biopsy can confirm whether cancer is present," Dr Williams said.

If you notice any changes in your breasts that concern you, talk to your doctor. Most of the time, it is not anything to worry about.

The draw effectively pulled the curtains on the TCI campaign to advance from the zone. They remain at the bottom of the three-team zone.

Veteran and captain Billy Forbes scored a brace in the game, while the BVI goals were scored by Joshua Bertie and substitute Justin Smith.

A disappointed Coach Ricky Hill blamed inexperience and Naivety on the part of his charges that resulted in the equalizing goal. He said this performance was much better that the Dominica game which the TCI lost 0-3. In that game, according to coach Hill, his team started well but petered out as the game wore on, but in this game, they

started out slow but picked up steam as the encounter wore on.

The TCI went behind in the third minute after the BVI number 10 player, Joshua Bertie got past the TCI defenders and slotted past custodian Sebastian Turbyfield.

Undaunted by the setback, the TCI players, pressed for the equalizers, and created a few chances to do so, while Turbyfield ensured that they did not slip further, with some spectacular saves, and ensuring that the scores were level going into the half-time break.

Their press from the TCI resulted in a BVI player bringing down TCI forward Junior Paul in the box, resulting in a penalty in the 27th minute, which Forbes converted for the first of his two goals.

TCI started where they left off in the first half, having lengthy ball possession and making daunting forward runs. One of those runs resulted in a TCI forward being brought down on the edge of the box, giving Forbes the opportunity to score a brilliant freekick, which sparked wild celebration around the venue.

Forbes' celebration, which saw him scaling the perimeter fence and into the bleachers, earned him a yellow card from presiding referee Hakeem Harvey.

The TCI enjoyed good ball possession, which sometimes resulted in some threatening runs. One of those runs resulted in the fleetfooted Junior Paul, while attempting to outpace his opponents, brought down millimeters from the 18 yards line. That tackle rendered him severely injured and making him unable to continue the game.

The resulting freekick by Raymond Burey, however, resulted in quick counter by BVI in the 90+5 minute, resulted in the equalizing goal.

Coach Hill, while clearly expressing his disappointment, heaped praise on Forbes for his two goals, and for his leadership on the field. However, he said team was let down by the inexperience of some of the other players.

In the meantime, coach for BVI Chris Kiwomya, the BVI coach, expressed his disappointment at not winning the game. He told the news conference that his team got the better chances to score but somehow did not make good use of them. Kiwomya said he was also disappointed with the officiating of the referee, stating that he could have allowed the game to flow freer, rather than stopping the game for every infringement.

TCI will complete their fixture against Dominica away. Even if they won that game, they will not go through, as they will end on four points. Dominica will also play the BVI away. Nothing but a win for either team will suffice.
