Event Spotlight

The <u>Inaugural Conference</u> of the GW Competition & Innovation Lab took place on April 25, 2025. Dedicated to the better understanding of the relationship between competition and innovation by antitrust authorities, the inaugural conference included presentations of articles to be published in the Antitrust Law Journal for the symposium 'Beyond Dynamic Competition'.

Keynote speakers included Susan Athley, then DOJ's Chief Economist, and Adam Cella, Chief Counsel of the U.S. House of Representatives.



Publication Spotlight

Senior Fellows Douglas Melamed and Richard Gilbert wrote a GW Lab Working Paper "Antitrust for Innovation: A Progress Report" to be published in the Antitrust Law Journal.

The authors review the more recent treatment of innovation by antitrust enforcement agencies and the courts under the Sherman Act and the Clayton Act. Finally, they add some thoughts regarding analytical approaches for conduct or mergers that affect innovation.

Our Regional Initiatives

A distinguishing feature of the GW Competition & Innovation Lab is its capacity to establish local teams dedicated to on-the-ground research and engagement with regional policy frameworks.

To date, the Lab has launched six initiatives: the Hispanic America Initiative, the Brazil Initiative, the European Union Initiative, the UK Initiative, the South Africa Initiative, and the India Initiative.

Looking ahead, the Lab plans to introduce additional regional initiatives, including the U.S. Initiative, the Canadian Initiative, the Turkey Initiative, the China Initiative, the Japan Initiative, the Australian Initiative, and the New Zealand Initiative.

These jurisdictions have been prioritized based on identified research needs and the establishment of robust local networks, enabling the development of comprehensive research programs.

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

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
