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## When Paris Heats Up, So Does the Eiffel Tower

The Eiffel Tower might look like a sturdy fixture of the Paris skyline, but it actually grows taller in summer. As temperatures rise, the metal frame expands, giving it a temporary boost of nearly six inches. So yes, the Iron Lady quite literally stretches her legs when the sun comes out.

Back in 1889, the tower made its debut as the grand entrance to the World's Fair. Believe it or not, not everyone was thrilled. A group of artists and intellectuals famously slammed the design in a public letter, calling it a useless monstrosity that would ruin Paris's beauty.

Their criticism didn't stick. The tower turned heads and drew crowds almost immediately. Even though it was only supposed to stand for twenty years, its usefulness as a radio tower kept it firmly planted. Gustave Eiffel initially had a limited permit at first, but the structure's growing popularity ensured it would stay

Today, it's hard to imagine Paris without it. And now you know it's not just charming and iconic, it's also a little taller when it's hot out.

## Sweet Memories From Grandma's Kitchen

Many desserts that once filled American kitchens have quietly disappeared from our tables, replaced by modern conveniences and shifting tastes. Some evolved with the times, while others simply faded into the pages of cookbook history.

The transformation of dessert culture really took off when sugar became accessible to everyday families. In the 17th century, colonial trade made sugar widely available for the first time. What was once a precious commodity suddenly became affordable, pushing sweet courses to the end of meals and sparking an explosion of cakes, pies, and confections. Here are seven beloved desserts that capture the ingenuity of kitchens past:

Vinegar Pie: When fresh citrus was too expensive or unavailable, resourceful bakers created a pie using vinegar as a substitute. The sharp bite of vinegar surprisingly mimicked the tartness of lemon, earning it the nickname "desperation pie." It perfectly shows how home cooks turned limitations into delicious solutions.

Jumbles: These delicate butter cookies were twisted into elegant knots and perfumed with rosewater or spices. Beloved for centuries because they stored beautifully and traveled well, jumbles were the reliable sweet that could sit in a tin and still taste wonderful weeks later.

Carrot Pudding: Long before carrot cake, there was carrot pudding. This dish straddled the line between savory and sweet, often including potatoes and warming spices. Sometimes baked, sometimes steamed, it showed how cooks turned humble root vegetables into something special. Shoofly Pie: Pennsylvania Dutch kitchens gave us this sticky molasses pie topped with buttery crumbs. The name supposedly comes from bakers constantly shooing away flies attracted to its irresistibly sweet surface.

Mincemeat Pie: Originally a method for preserving meat and fruit together, this pie has evolved over time. By the Victorian era, most recipes dropped the actual meat for spiced fruits, nuts, and suet. It remains a cherished holiday tradition in

Fruitcake: Before becoming the butt of holiday jokes, fruitcake was serious business. Roman soldiers carried dense, fruit-packed versions on campaigns because they lasted forever. The booze-soaked versions we know developed over centuries, aging like wine.

Tomato Soup Cake: The Great Depression sparked incredible kitchen creativity, and the tomato soup cake might be one of the most surprising success stories. Using Campbell's condensed tomato soup, bakers created moist, warmly spiced cakes that nobody would guess contained vegetables.

These desserts remind us that the best recipes often come from making the most of what we have. Whether born from scarcity or abundance, each tells the story of people who found ways to bring sweetness into their lives.
