Founders Letter

From its inception, the goal of the Dickinson Music Enrichment Center has been to offer a completely free after-school music program for underserved students in grades 4-6 (ages 9-12). Additionally, we provide free instruments for students who continue the program and enroll in band in the 6th grade, which is the earliest you participate in the band program in grade school. The free lessons will continue through middle school and high school for those students that may need additional instruction to improve their technique and sound quality.

Established in 2021, the founders spent 12 months posturing and preparing to launch their vision. Through the help of a grant in 2022 from the Dickinson Management District, the use of space at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Dickinson, and the support of many individual and corporate sponsors, in the fall of 2023, the program launched with a total of 15 students. The 2024-2025 year has seen a 240 percent increase in student enrollment. The students are mentored and coached by 11th and 12th grade students at Dickinson Sr. High School, who serve as section leaders with the Dickinson ISD band program. The coaches are paid positions. We find this type of structure for our students provides good mentorship experience and helps our older students who are hoping to increase their opportunities of band scholarships at the university level. In 2023-24 school year, the program has 9 student coaches/mentors which has grown to 11 based on increased student enrollment.

The goal of The Dickinson Music Enrichment Foundation is to provide an opportunity for all children, even those facing economic challenges, to access and participate in a music curriculum. This initiative aims to remove financial obstacles that may hinder children from experiencing the benefits of music education early in their lives. By doing so, it seeks to provide a fair and equal chance for every child to explore and enjoy the advantages that come.

We were honored to leverage the mayor's ambassadorship to provide awards for our PK-3rd grade outreach program. This recognition has motivated our young students and acknowledged their hard work and achievements. We also received inspiring quotes and endorsements from our ambassadors, which have further validated our efforts and inspired our community.

One of the highlights of the year was our collaboration with the CCISD Art Department and the Yamaha Cares Upcycle Program to sponsor an art contest. Students created art entries on guitars donated by Yamaha, competing for scholarship money. This unique contest not only showcased the artistic talents of our students but also supported their educational goals.


Year In Review



Kids Served From 2023-2024




Thanks to the hard work, dedication and passion of our coaches, parents, ambassadors and donors TDMEC there was a 230% increase in overall student population.

Future Growth

The future growth of the Dickinson Music Enrichment Center (TDMEC) looks promising and is poised for significant impact in the community. Transportation has been identified as a critical barrier to participation for many students. To address this, TDMEC is seeking funding to purchase a gently used 8-passenger Ford Transit van. This 'Musical Journey Transport Program' aims to ensure that all kids can attend lessons and events, regardless of their transportation challenges. Providing reliable transportation will significantly increase attendance and participation, allowing more students to benefit from TDMEC's programs.


