For families, carers, and educators, these books provide pathways to connection. They reframe dementia as an unfolding JOurneY that can still hold wonder, creativity, and warmth. By fostering understanding and inclusion through literature, we ensure that the path forward, no matter where it leads, is filled with purpose, dignity, and joy.

May we continue to tell stories that remind us that joy is possible even in difficult situations, and that love is never forgotten.

Selecting Children's Books About Dementia

Stories play a powerful role in shaping how children understand and navigate the realities of dementia. When curating books for *A JOurneY of Love & Learning: Children's Books About Dementia*, careful attention was given to selecting stories that move beyond portraying dementia solely as a tragedy. Instead, this collection highlights books that foster understanding, connection, and hope—reinforcing that living well with dementia is possible.

Criteria for Selection

Hopeful Representation – These books acknowledge challenges but center on meaningful moments and lasting relationships.

Respect for the Person with Dementia – People LIVING with dementia are portrayed as whole, valued individuals.

Encouraging Connection – Meaningful ways for children and families to stay connected are highlighted, from shared activities to creative expression and quiet moments of togetherness.

Emotional Honesty Without Overwhelm – While dementia presents challenges, these books avoid excessive fear or sadness, offering reassurance that love and connection persist.

Engaging and Age-Appropriate – Language, illustrations, and themes are carefully crafted to be accessible to children, helping them process dementia in ways that align with their developmental stage.

Inclusive and Diverse Perspectives – Books reflect a variety of families, cultures, and experiences with dementia, ensuring that more children see their own stories represented.

Encouraging a Shift in Perspective – Dementia is reimagined as a different way of being—one that still holds joy, meaning, and possibility.

While every effort was made to select books that align with these criteria, it is important for families, carers, and educators to review books before sharing them with children. Each child's experiences, sensitivities, and emotional needs are unique, and thoughtful selection ensures that stories provide comfort, understanding, and meaningful engagement.

By carefully choosing books that meet these standards, this collection offers a resource for fostering empathy, connection, and hope. These books serve as bridges to enriching conversations, fostering a future where dementia is met with kindness, inclusion, and the recognition that joy and connection remain possible—even in the face of change.

Together Is a Good Place to Begin

A JOurneY of Love & Learning: Children's Books About Dementia is designed to help people LIVING with dementia, their families and carers, as well as educators, librarians and other community members choose and share children's books about dementia in a way that fosters understanding, empathy, and connection.

Each featured book includes

- Title and Author
- Recommended age or grade levels (based on publisher guidelines and reader feedback)

As always, readers are encouraged to consider each book's fit for the child's interests, abilities, and comfort with the topic.

May this collection be a companion that helps you find joy in the moments you share.

Because together is always a good place to begin.

Getting Started

Choose a book that matches the child's age and experience including the child's personal connection to dementia-whether they know someone with cognitive changes or are just beginning to learn.

Create a comfortable and welcoming reading environment where the child feels safe to ask questions.

Let the child explore the book's cover and illustrations before you begin.

Encourage thoughtful conversation before, during, and after reading.

Discussion Questions

 Before reading: Gently introduce the topic by asking what the child already knows.

Have you ever heard the word "dementia" before?
What do you think it means?
Do you know someone who has changed from how they used to be?

- During reading: Pause to talk about feelings, characters, or events.
 How do you think the character feels in this part of the story?
 What do you notice about how family and friends are helping?
 If you were in the story, what would you say to the person with dementia?
- After reading: Reflect on the story's message and how it relates to real life.

What part of the story stood out to you the most? Why? How did the family or friends show kindness and patience? How can we help people LIVING with dementia feel included and loved? What is one thing you learned from this story?

Beyond the Book: Activities to Deepen Understanding

- Create a small scrapbook with pictures, drawings, and notes about special moments shared with a loved one.
- Choose a scene from the story and pretend to be different characters, exploring their emotions and actions.
- Illustrate a favorite moment from the book or draw yourself spending time with someone who has cognitive changes.
- Brainstorm ways to support someone LIVING with dementia, such as singing a familiar song together or looking at family photos.

Why Sharing Stories with Children Matters

By reading and discussing books about dementia, we can empower children to respond with compassion, curiosity, and love. Regardless of their age or experience, every child has the ability to make a difference in the lives of people LIVING with dementia. By sharing stories and having open conversations, we can help children feel more confident, compassionate, and included in the JOurneY of living better with dementia.
