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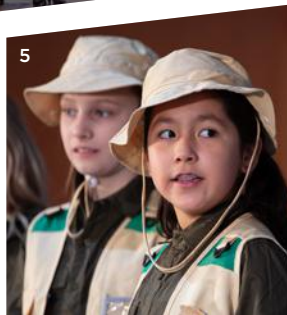
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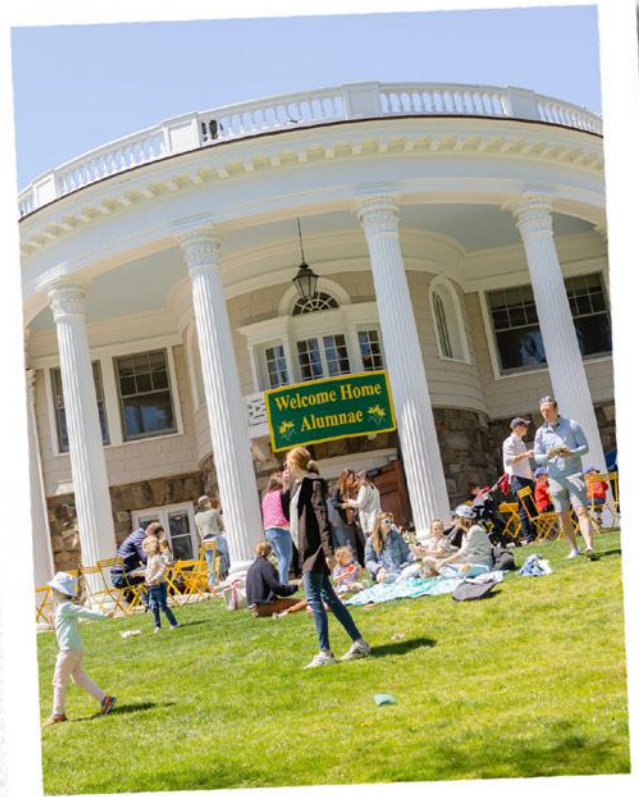

Global Citizenship

“I see global citizenship as an essential skill for leadership today. Our girls will be going to college with students from around the world and will be working with—and leading—multinational corporations and organizations. It is important that they develop curiosity about other cultures and an appreciation for different perspectives and lived experiences. By participating in global exchanges and educational trips, our students are immersed in communities and traditions different from their own. From PC through Group XII, GA students are encouraged to broaden their horizons and deepen their understanding of the world around them. Opportunities to explore other cultures are woven throughout the school experience, from classroom lessons to schoolwide traditions. Each year the community gathers for GATORfest, a vibrant celebration of global cultures featuring music, food, and traditions from around the world.

Global awareness begins early. Geography is embedded throughout the curriculum, helping students understand the connections between people, places, and cultures. Lower School girls begin building relationships beyond their own communities. This year, Group IV exchanged letters with pen

pals in Taiwan through a program organized by Associate Teacher Lauren Chen. One of the highlights came when students learned about their pen pals' favorite Taiwanese snacks—and even had the chance to try them in class.

By Middle School, students are exploring world events and global issues through the current events program, which encourages thoughtful discussion about how international developments shape daily life. Travel opportunities also begin at this stage. This spring, Group VII students will have the chance to travel to Costa Rica for a hands-on exploration of sustainability and tropical ecology. While staying at a working eco-lodge, they will learn about organic farming, renewable energy, and beekeeping; spend time in the rainforest; and end

exchanges and experiential travel. GA has participated in international exchange programs since the 1990s, and the program has recently expanded again after a pandemic pause. Students in Group X can spend three to four weeks living and studying abroad with partner schools in Argentina, France, and the United Kingdom, and will host their exchange partner at GA.

“Cultural exchange programs provide numerous benefits, such as promoting tolerance and understanding, enhancing language skills, and expanding horizons,” says Victoria Harper, co-director of international programs. “Students gain a broader global perspective and develop essential life skills such as adaptability, communication, independence, and intercultural competence.”

Additional travel opportunities allow students to deepen their language and cultural studies. Recent trips have included Taiwan for AP Chinese students and Spain or Guatemala for Spanish students. Longstanding traditions also continue, including the Madrigal singers’ European tours—this summer to Portugal—and the theater program’s performances at Scotland’s Fringe Festival.

Students interested in a deeper academic exploration of global issues can pursue the Global Scholars Program, a three-year interdisciplinary course of study that combines research, project-based learning, and international travel.

Together, these experiences help students develop the curiosity, perspective, and cultural understanding needed to thrive—and lead—in an interconnected world.

Group VIII students can participate in a cultural trip to France and Spain. This year’s itinerary includes visits to Paris and Madrid, where students will tour museums and historic landmarks, explore neighborhoods on foot, learn to make French pastries, and experience local specialties—from picnicking near the Eiffel Tower to enjoying churros con chocolate in Madrid.

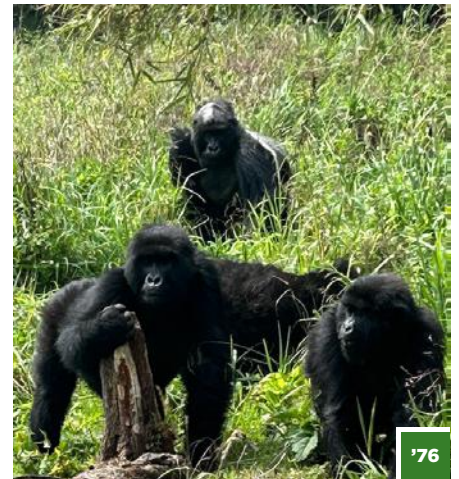
