A farmer's trust with Queen

The renowned Queen Pineapple of Tripura is spiny, golden yellow in colour, with a distinctive aroma, and has high juice content, tanginess and sweetness that sets it apart from the pineapples grown in the other Northeast states. Sewa International hosted a 2 day of training in Tripura on "Common Package & Practices of Pineapple Cultivation" at the Kanchan Chera Old Panchayat Community Hall. The resource person and trainer for the course was Shri Abhijit Debnath, Scientist & In-Charge of KVK Dhalai who trained 25 farmers in this session.

A crafty way of exhibiting empowerment

We aim to empower the women of Uttarakhand to transform their skills into income-generating opportunities. Handicrafts by these women were sold at a Fair & Exhibition Khadi Gram Udhog Pokhari Cluster and Triyug Narayan Village in Narayankoti, Uttarakhand, after a protracted process of training in local art and crafts. The exhibition saw an overwhelming sale of products, generating Rs 2,25,280 in sales. The dual objective of empowering women financially by developing the SHG network and promoting local crafts through mass skill development was achieved.



Striving for healthy Himalayas

For the people of the hilly terrain, access to a good healthcare system is a crucial issue. We have been working with the local communities for awareness of health and hygiene. And our efforts seemed to show results when people came swarming for the two-day multi-speciality health camp organised with the support of Oracle. The doctors attended 230 patients in the villages of Urgam and Tapovan in the Chamoli District of Uttarakhand.



Young hands showing the way to serve Himalayas

The source of water for drinking and irrigation in hilly regions is surface water. In the absence of proper rainwater harvesting structures in the region, rainwater is hardly available and stream water is available only for the people living close to river banks. But the streams of the Himalayan region are suffering from irregular clogging due to waste accumulation.

Sewa International team under the PRAWAH project organised a cleanliness campaign involving volunteers and local people from the Chandrapur district of Uttarakhand. 150 volunteers from schools and universities worked together to clean up the surrounding areas and collect plastics.

It will inculcate a sense of responsibility in the students towards the environment so that they can gradually bring a change.

Opening doors that lead to mainstream

Sewa International augmented a fully trans-led & trans-owned enterprise - Hasini Tiffin Centre in Kadapa District, Andhra Pradesh. Through this initiative 6 transgenders were provided employment, enabling them to lead a life with dignity.

Sewa International's SHE-CAF launched a training program in Bangalore for 20 transgender people. The program focuses on setting up garlic peeling machines, These machines have been procured and we are currently training our beneficiaries on the usage of these peeling machines. The program is also providing market linkages with grocery outlets and metros across the city for the sales of peeled garlic cloves.
