

BULK TRASH SURVEY RESULTS

Survey information was provided to 330 households.
Neighborhood surveys are considered:

Excellent if you receive a 50% return rate (165). Surveys are conducted in person.

Good if you received a 30% - 50% (99-165). Surveys by providing information (as we did to porches) and continuing to follow up with other methods like emails.

Surveys returned: 127 (38%) A "Good" survey. Duplicate submissions for same household were removed, leaving 127.




Ginny Barnes Mystery Novel: A Success!

Thus covering up the red wire. Come to find out that some of the Ace Hardware stores had green cages.





Past to Present “Teeing Up” Encanto-Palmcroft Historic District

APRIL 2025

Did you realize the Encanto-Palmcroft Historic District is bigger than our residential community? Part of the original 1984 submission placing us on the National Register of Historic Places included 100 acres of Encanto Park to the north of Encanto Blvd., including the golf course (first 9 holes) and lagoons. [The last 9 holes were added to the district in 2018.] The park and golf course were deemed to have a significant association with our neighborhood.

In 1934, the city acquired the acreage for the course from James W. Dorris to the east and James C. Norton to the west. Dorris originally envisioned a large resort with golf on the property east of 15th Ave. but due to challenging economic times it was not built.


The Encanto Golf Course was designed by William P. Bell a famous golf course architect from Southern California. Building began in 1935 and opened to the public November 1936. The course today still provides wide level fairways making it suitable for all golfers, however it does have challenges in the finishing stretch appealing to more advance golfers.



What make Encanto Golf Course unique today? It is a historic golf course located in a historic district with incredible views of downtown Phoenix skyline. Thus, equal measures of both “Past to the Present” ...

William P. Bell, Golf Course Architect

- Famous course designer, primarily in southern California, 1920s to early 1950s
- Known for his bunker designs which are copied by designers today
- Designed Adobe Course at the Arizona Biltmore in 1928
- Tom Lehman renovated Adobe in 2023-24, keeping existing Bell corridor

Encanto Palmcroft Security Corp Update: Keeping Our Neighborhood Safe

As a reminder, the new **EPSC membership rate is \$40 per month or \$480 per year**. This investment goes directly toward funding **Vet-Sec Protection Agency**, our dedicated security team that patrols Encanto-Palmcroft and keeps a watchful eye on our homes and streets. Some of you made your payments in January and they were for the \$360 for the year, or \$180 for 6 months based on last years' fees. - Their officers provide **neighborhood patrols 8 hours per day, 7 days a week** responding quickly to any suspicious activity.

- They collaborate with law enforcement, adding an extra layer of protection to our historic community.

Mindful Moments

Welcome to "Mindful Moments," your monthly breath of calm in our vibrant community. I'm Allison, your neighborhood therapist sharing simple practices for mental wellness.

This month, let's try the "Sigh Breath" - a technique inspired by Polyvagal Theory that helps regulate our nervous system during stress.

Your vagus nerve acts like a communication highway between brain and body. During stress, it can trigger fight-or-flight responses. The good news? Your breath can help reset your system, even during stress - Phew!

The Sigh Breath mimics your body's natural calming mechanism. Here's how:

Take a normal breath through your nose, filling your lungs about two-thirds full. Add a second small breath, filling your lungs completely. Then exhale slowly through your mouth with a gentle "ahhhhh" sound.

Try this 3-5 times whenever you need to reset. You might notice your shoulders relaxing and tension melting away.

Why does it work? The long exhale signals safety to your nervous system - like telling your body, "It's okay to relax now."

The beauty lies in its simplicity - you can use it anywhere, anytime.

March 11, 2025 Valley Garden Center/Zoom Called to Order: 7:00PM

Vice President, Lauren Armour, read the mission statement.

Board Minutes from January 14, 2025 meeting - Nina Loughman requested feedback and edits on the January 14, 2025 proposed meeting minutes. No edits were requested. Jenny Gendreau motioned to approve the minutes as presented. Stuart Early seconded the motion. Board voted and passed unanimously at 7:02 p.m.

Guests

Andrew Simek, Field Representative & District Operations Manager for Congresswoman Yassamin Ansari stopped by to say hello and to invite the neighborhood to the Congresswoman's town hall at the Burton Barr Library on March 18th, 6 - 8 p.m. The town hall will discuss the presidency actions and how it is impacting our Arizona neighbors. He left contact information and business cards.

Michael Pissos - Community Relations Coordinator, Mayor Gallego also wanted to say hello. Mayor Gallego strives to have her office accessible to the public. He said not to hesitate to reach out to him for constituent services. He left his business cards for those in attendance.

Presidential Remarks

- We are not an HOA, but we are the only elected body in the neighborhood. We are neighbors helping neighbors.
- We facilitate dialogue
- Concerns coordinating the quarterly trash pick-up was outside our lane
- Mark originally raised the issue in December - he shared the following:
 - Any given week there could be piles of trash in the neighborhood - put out week in advance - could be constant piles of trash
 - He scheduled an individual bulk-trash request - and was told there were no longer any alley pick-ups.
 - He called the Sanitation Department and spoke with the manager. The manager said that a number of neighborhood requests to go back to a quarterly pick up.
 - They said once your neighborhood agrees, we will just drive through the neighborhoods like before, but just one day instead. Will have one week to put it out
 - If the survey says to move forward, we have a tentative hold on the dates with the city already.
 - February - two neighbors came to the Board meeting and shared that Fairview Place went back to quarterly. People in attendance suggested we conduct a survey to gather interest
 - Reopened dialogue alley pick-up and was granted permission from the city to continue as in the past.
- Survey Results – 38% return rate
 - 106 said yes
 - 11 said no
 - 8 said either way
- Stuart Early motioned to go back to quarterly, bulk trash pick-up, with those with alleys continuing to use them,, preferably the first week of March based on the expressed wishes of the neighborhood. Carlo Sanchez seconded the motion.
 - Board authorized Mark Gunther to continue coordinating with the City as he was the original point of contact. Passed unanimously at 7:28PM.

Update from Security Corporation (Jenny Gendreau, President Security Corporation)

- Lost a few members who have stepped away from their roles. A few new members
- Working with VetSec - happy with the new SUV. We are at 8 hours of coverage, try to do 4 hours in the AM and 4 hours in the PM. Diligent about hitting every alley and every street during their route. Working on their new system to get reports from them.
- Will continue to put out newsletter updates regarding security
- Call 911 or non-emergency police and NOT VetSec.
- Creating an opt-in list for phone/text updates
- Note that rates have increased
- Transitioning duties from Jay to Jenny, Brent, and Melissa Coleson

Presentation of Treasurer's Report - Tamera Zivic reviewed the February Financial Report. Without Home Tour, we don't spend a lot monthly. Taxes filed ahead of time, we owed nothing to the federal government but we will be paying \$50 to the state. March will have a more deliberate accounting of the Home Tour. Nina Loughman motioned to approve the Treasurer's Report as presented. Stuart Early seconded the motion. Board voted and passed unanimously at 7:44 p.m.

Committee Updates

- **Home Tour & Street Fair (Jenny Gendreau, Joyce Grossman, Nina Loughman)** - Jenny short 5 people to volunteer in homes and in a pinch, the group as it stands will work but would like home owners to be able to walk around. Joyce was concerned about trash pick up, she will coordinate with Maddie to have Nate use his truck. Mark said he had a trailer as back up for trash collection.
- **Social Committee (Joyce Grossman)** - Tabled
- **Website Committee (Carlo Sanchez)** - Tabled
- **Philanthropy Committee (Alison Tamboer)** - Virtual auction closes at 3PM on Home Tour. Right now we have 14 bidders but expect more in the days ahead.
- **Block Watch (Joyce Grossman, Tamera Zivic)** - The quarterly report will be placed on the April agenda.

Old Business


- Triangles beautification - will partner with Friends of Encanto Park to replace benches (put in 1995), they were never fountains but very large bird baths. Meeting with neighbors who want to participate. Funds in a trust for ongoing maintenance since we can't rely on neighbors only. Meeting sometime in April - Tamera will be in the lead.
- Neighborhood Directory/Roster - Revisit after the home tour.

New Business
