

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Getting Served in Campus Clubs

Orientation Week Procedures for Stables and Scholars Clubs

New membership procedures have been put in place by the management of the Stables and Scholars clubs to ensure that they are not closed again this year.

Anyone who wants to apply for membership can do so by logging on to http://www.clubs.ul.ie. You must be over 18 and a student, graduate or member of staff at UL to be eligible for membership. Once you apply, you will be nominated as a member by the management committee, and your name will be displayed in the bar for two weeks. Once one week has passed, you will be elected as a member and will be able to collect your membership sticker atthe Students' Union after 6pm. If you wish to become a member of the clubs, please apply as soon as possible. Those who have club

membership cards from second semester of last year can give in their card at either of the clubs or SU reception after 6pm. You will be issued with your new sticker on payment of €1.

Further measures have for the time being, and especially during Orientation Week, been put in place to prevent the club rules being broken. Neither the Stables nor the Scholars club will be serving alcohol before 6pm. They will of course be serving food and non-alcoholic beverages.

At 6pm, all customers will be asked to leave the premises of the club. This is to be 100% sure that the rules are followed and that no room is left for error. Please co-operate with the staff of the clubs at this point as this is best way to ensure that the clubs stay open this year.

After 6pm, there will be a member of the

club at the door to check that everyone is over 18, and that all non-members are signed in correctly.

These steps are being taken to ensure that all the rules of the club, including membership rules are being upheld. This follows an objection to the renewal of the licences of the clubs meant that they lost their licences and were forbidden to serve alcohol, last year. This ban was appealed by the management, which meant that the bars were only closed for one week, but neither ULSU nor the clubs want a repeat of this situation.

A spokesperson for ULSU siad, "We are hopeful that by week two, most of the people who wish to become members of the clubs will have done so, and that disruption to club members will be reduced. Until then, bear with us!!"

College of Business becomes Jim Kemmy Business School thanks to anonymous €5,000,000 donation

Over the summer, U.L. has received a five million donation towards the development of the College of Business, which will now be renamed 'The Jim Kemmy Business School'. The Irish benefactor who donated this substantial amount of money wishes to remain anonymous, but wished for the late Limerick politician, Jim Kemmy to be honoured. Jim Kemmy was a one-time mayor of Limerick and was well known for his then radical socialist views. A stonemason by trade, he was noted for his work for the poor and disadvantaged and when elected mayor, he donated his £16,000 salary to help organisations. Speculation has been rife as to the identity of the private donor, and there has been much coverage and conjecture in the national media about the story in general.

This gift is one of the largest private donations ever made to an Irish Third-Level institution and it will help the University of Limerick to further develop its reputation as a leading University. U.L. President, Professor Roger Downer has stated that the generous donation 'reflects not only vision and foresight, but also great trust and confidence in our capacity to further develop our College of Business to the highest international standards. This donation is an investment in our future as a University and recognises the contribution that a highly reputable business school can make to that future, to economic growth development regionally and nationally'. This boost in funding for the College of

Business will enable a new, state-of-theart Business School building to be constructed beside the present Schuman Building and will help to develop the quality and capacity of the school. The new Business School will bring together all Business faculty and staff, allowing for a more efficient running of the Business College. Plans are currently being prepared for the design of this new facility, which will provide facilities which will allow postgraduate, executive professional educational programmes to co-exist with research centres on work, entrepreneurship and tourism policy. Business students will be able to benefit from the use of 'wireless' computing facilities the new building, which is planned to be opened for the beginning of the 2005/6 academic year. While the building may not be in use until 2005/6, the College of Business became the Kemmy Business School on Septmber 1st this year. While the official name for the college is "The Jim Kemmy Business School", it will be known as the Kemmy Business School.

But what does this mean for students in the College of Business, its 2,500 students and 75 faculty? As a Business student who hopes to graduate in 2005, it means that I will miss out on this new facility, but hopefully it will raise the profile of the College of Business here in U.L., which would help us get work at the end of the day, and judging from the media coverage this news received early this summer, I think it is succeeding in doing this. Fourth year Business Studies class representative Anna Keely is happy that such a large boost is being given to the School of Business, but is also concerned that the money go to improve resources for students. She draws attention to the fact that the Final Year Project, considered by many to be an essential part of a UL degree, is being made optional for Business Students. She





says that this is occurring because the College of Business has insufficient resources to cater for a full complement of students doing FYPs. "This money could change this situation. I think that students, especially Business students, need to be told exactly where the money is going," she said.

UL President, Roger Downer also said that "the University of Limerick is proud to be associated with the name of Jim Kemmy, a man who devoted much of his life to championing the cause of the underpriveleged and disadvantaged. It would be a splendid legacy to Jim's name if the graduates of the University of Limerick played a leadership role in persuading corporations to assume responsibility for redressing the plight of the billions of people who currently survive on less than €1 per day."

Public Administration Student wins Award

City Venue gets Students Moving

New mural gives Games Room a fresh look





The Common room in the Students' Union building, which once hosted only arcade games, vending machines and pool tables, is now home to a brand new mural, commissioned recently by ULSU. The mural is situated along the back wall of the Common Room. The wall is divided into four sections and each section contains two panels of the mural.. So that's eight different paintings all of which the artist does directly onto the wall with aerosol paints. The mural itself is comprised of four abstract pieces and four figurative pieces and promises to brighten up even the most boring pool game in the games room. If you get the chance to grab a look at the mural do so, the games room is on the second floor of the union building up the stairs and to the

The artist is a young Limerick-schooled artist by the name of Conor Harrington but he also goes by the tag name of Mr. Who. Anyone who sees the mural and paintings can see that Conor has more than a little of the graffiti artist in him. He describes his style as 'Abstract Aerosol Art' and says that his intention is to bring a graffiti style to Fine Arts . He got his degree in Fine Arts and Painting from Limerick School of Art and Design in 2002 making him a recent graduate and he was commissioned to do this work over the summer break period. Conor has already shown his work in an exhibition of graffiti on canvas and he

The Irish Chamber orchestra based here in the University of Limerick recently appointed a new chairperson . former president of Ireland and UN High Commissioner on Human Rights Mary Robinson. The orchestra invited Mary Robinson to chair their board of directors when she recently completed her term as United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights. Mrs Robinson is currently Director of the Ethical Globalization Initiative.

On her election to the Chair, Mary Robinson said: 'Having spent a term as Patron of the Irish Chamber Orchestra when I was President, I am delighted to resume my association in steering the ensemble through this exciting period in its history. This outstanding orchestra's commitment to excellence will see it prosper internationally.'

The Orchestra has elected former President of the University of Limerick Dr. Edward Walsh as deputy chairperson of the board of directors of the ICO. John Kelly Chief Executive of the Irish Chamber Orchestra welcomed the appointments. Speaking to An Focal about the appointment of Mrs Robinson he said that 'We are honoured that Mary Robinson has accepted our invitation to Chair the Board. It is very encouraging to have the support of one of Ireland's most distinguished citizens in our quest to become one of the great chamber orchestras of the world.

The Irish Chamber Orchestra is regarded as one of Ireland's most distinguished ensembles. Consisting of top Irish and international string players, the orchestra has gained a reputation, not just in Ireland, but further afield, as a vibrant and refreshing force in the sphere of classical and contemporary music today. The enthusiasm of the members of the orchestra for the music they perform characterizes the unique personality that the ICO has developed over the years. This, coupled with the irrepressible charisma of Music Director Nicholas McGegan, and the artistry of Principal Guest Director Mariana Sirbu indicate exciting times ahead!

Limerick Students Pull Together to form LASU

Limericks student bodies moved a step closer together during the summer with the formation of LASU - Limerick Association of Students' Unions. The SU's of Limerick's four main colleges UL, LIT, Mary I and the Art College met on the grounds of the oldest of the 4, Limerick School of Art & Design for the formal launch. The four student representative organisations agreed to cooperate on ents, campaigns, promotion of public transport, publications and getting better deals for students in the shops around Limerick City.

Limerick's population includes a higher percentage of students than any other city in Ireland. Last year the combined Students' Unions worked together to mobilise these students and to organise successful protests against the proposed re-introduction of fees. The anti fees protest in Limerick City last October saw 3,000 students on O'Connell St. and was the first City Demo in the Country on the subject. Eddie Price President of LSAD Students Union said "We feel that continuing this co-ordinated approach will best represent the needs of Limerick students."

Diarmuid Moriarty, Vice-President, Mary Immaculate Students' Union said "We in Mary Immaculate College Students' Union are excited and expectant about the agreement. We see

this as a huge opportunity to build on the promise which lies in the city's four Students' Unions. However, the Union is nothing without the students' involvement and we urge all students to get involved in student affairs to fulfil the potential which is close at hand."

So far LASU have been working on a Limerick Student Discount Card and on lobbying the City Council for Student Representation on the Cities Transport & Infrastructure Special Policy Committee. Two big student nights have been organised; the Limerick Freshers Ball in the Royal George Hotel and the Halloween Ball! There is also talk of a Limerick-Wide Safety Campaign in the offing.

Eamon Clancy, Vice-President, Limerick Institute of Technology Students' Union. said the four Unions forming LASU are dedicated to representing third-level students in Limerick to the best of our ability. He added "Limerick Institute of Technology Students' Union believes that this association can only benefit student life in Limerick, which will in turn benefit Limerick city."

Eoin Ó Broin, President, University of Limerick Students' Union, said LASU has the potential to turn Limerick into a rocking town. More interaction between Limerick Students also means more students in the city. He suggested that co operation on ents could be of huge benefit to the four students bodies in terms of student deals and the, attracting big names and the diversity of events large numbers could allow.

The LASU logo, the four students unions lassoed, will feature prominently on the fresher bags to be given to first year students across the City.


An Bainisteoir gives a run down of some of the more discerning points which First years should note in their fresher year at college.




same without Becks, from both neutral and Manchester United perspectives.

GOLDFISH MEMORY





No Furlong. No Hamilton. Crucially, no Cameron. Arnie has only himself to blame for signing up for a third instalment. Now that he's on the campaign trail in California, and a fourth Terminator has been confirmed (with or without Arnie), the only complement to pay T3 is that is doesn't screw up too much. Picking up 10 years after T2 left off, Nick Stahl does an admirable job making John Connor the most unlikable character in the film. Claire Danes plays a woman with no charisma, tact or

warmth, so we empathise with neither him nor her. So that leaves the two terminators. Arnie and newcomer Kristanna Loken as the TX to hold up the film. They make a decent stab at it, but they're not helped by a dodgy script that has too many laughs at their expense, and some dodgy computer effects in the middle of genuinely spectacular action sequences. An OK entry in the series, but this will never be revered as a classic, unlike its' predecessors.

Plucky Irish journalist goes up against the toughest Irish criminals and gets shot dead in the process. With material like that, you can't go wrong, can you? Movie Feature - Extreme Cinema

This topic isn't likely to appeal many people, but then if you're reading this article it must hold some interest for you... Are we a film watching public getting fed up with the increasingly sterile, banal and tepid shite that Hollywood seems so keen to force-feed

We see every summer the same films been reproduced (with sequels literally), that all follow a certain pattern... i.e. ...big budget, special effects, wafer thin plotting and more advertising than could possibly be good for us! Certainly this summer was no different than every other with the likes of X2, The Matrix Reloaded, The Hulk, Terminator 3 etc all clogging up the local cinema. However, they are all repeating something we've seen a million times before only in some cases with more finesse and efficiency and in which case they can make for great popcorn entertainment. Otherwise it's just recycling what was there just to screw the viewing public for more cash.

Maybe it's for this very reason that viewers are turning their attentions abroad. In mainland Europe in the last year alone we've had the sexually shocking yet surprisingly adult The Piano Teacher and Irreversible. Both rate high on the shockometer but have different approaches to their dark subject matter. The Piano Teacher deals with

sexual repression and S & M, but in an implicit rather than explicit way, where as Irreversible is extremely upfront about a vicious rape (shocking for its single shot 9 minute long view of this) and the tragic consequences of it. Maybe we as viewers are getting fed up with Hollywood's easy answers and we are looking to be treated as adults and want responses other than the norm from characters in these unusual circumstances.

Of course extreme cinema would not be complete without the Far East showing the rest of the world how it should be done. Battle Royale (school kids dumped on an island and forced to kill each), Audition (psychological horror that'll mess with your head for days), Versus (manic, over the top action, zombie, horror flick), and Ichi The Killer (uber violent adaptation of Japanese comic, strong stomach essential) are just some of the examples of how film makers can make truly vivid pieces of cinema that stick in your mind. Admittedly some of them seem to be overtly violent and shocking just for the sake of it. But hasn't that always been a part of the medium of film? Pushing the boundaries, just to see


how far you can go?

But, only on a small scale are foreign language films permeating the mainstream. Only Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon has really gone on beyond a cult following and achieved financial success. But I'm not advocating foreign over Hollywood, merely highlighting the fact that the movie watching public has more choice than the homogenised product Hollywood feels is fit for mass consumption.





The InterView

"It's my Fucking Show!" - An Interview with Phil Coulter

We caught up with Mr. Phil Coulter as he was recording Coulter & Company in the University Concert Hall. He had just confirmed that he was coming back for a second season of You're A Star, and the new show had nudged its' way into the Top 10, while Mickey-Joe Harte floundered in the EuroVision. Authoritative yet affable, Phil seemed very relaxed...

How did the idea for Coulter and Company come about?

The producer of "You're A Star", asked me if I'd fancy being on the jury, and I said "I don't think so. I've seen those types of shows, and that kind of cruelty is not my style. I'm not sure I want to be on TV every week. I was a bit ambivalent about the whole thing, until I had a conversation with my kids, and they said 'Oh yeah Dad, that'd be dead cool, you gotta do that!' So "cool" and "daddy" are two words that aren't said together too often in our home, so I thought "Hey, I'd better grab this bit of credibility while I can". So, I really started to enjoy myself as I got more into the show, and my role expanded as the show went on.

You found yourself getting drawn in?

Oh, definitely. I became more involved in the selection of the finalist's songs, the commissioning of the songs, that kind of stuff. That's kind of my nature; I'm a handson kind of guy, and if I'm sitting watching something that's not being done properly, I'll say "That's not being done right, let me fix it". So the kids were choosing the wrong songs and shooting themselves in the foot, so I kinda volunteered to help them with that. So, on the back of that, suddenly I have a profile on TV I never had before. I knew that when ten-year-olds started following me around Tesco's, a new constituency I never had before. Then I was approached by RTE about hosting my own show, and the concept of Coulter & Company came from David Heffernan, the executive producer and me. Very much a music show, not a chat show, because the last thing the world needs is another chat show.

Well, you are now in the same timeslot as the Late Late, RTE's most successful show. Is there any pressure because of that?

Oh sure, but if you can't stand the heat, don't be in the kitchen. I don't want to do a show that's broadcast at half-eleven on a Sunday night; I want to succeed or fail spectacularly. That's the only way to do it- you can't hide yourself away and hedge your bets; you have to go out there with all guns blazing. So this was really on the deep end, a big, big undertaking. Ten shows, with an average of 4-5 guests performing each night. They're

performing two songs each, so that's 80 compositions that have to be arranged, transcribed, rehearsed, all that stuff. It's a mountain of work.

Do you find the music industry getting more like people basically just looking out for their own interests?

Well, all chat shows today are just a parade for people coming on to sell something. They'll sell a new book, a new film, there's an election coming up, they're just about to start a new tour, or whatever it might be. It's a sales pitch; it's a cynical thing, but that's what it is. Most people on this show have nothing to sell, certainly not the senior members. We don't play that game. Two rules for coming onto the show - everyone coming onto the show has to be able to perform acoustically. No miming. And secondly, no trouble, no grief. Anyone who's got a reputation for being difficult, no matter how good he is, I don't want him in the show.

So, no prima donnas allowed?

Absolutely not. We were offered a couple, mentioning no names, and I turned them down. I've worked with them, I know they're difficult, and I know they would have changed the dynamic of the show. You've probably spotted that it's very relaxed; it's very comfortable, because that's what I want. In the few lumpy bits there's been so far, where there's been any sort of tension so far, you diffuse that, rather than saying 'It's my fucking show, you'll do it my way.' I don't do that - there's ways of compromising, ways of getting round a problem. When you've been doing it as long as I have, the last thing you need is a fight.

You've worked with an array of stars over the years - Van Morrison, The Rolling Stones et al, but there have some stranger, more interesting collaborations, such as the recently late Gregory Peck...

A wonderful beautiful man, I was very sorry that he passed on. Last year BBC did an hour-long TV Christmas special from my Hometown, to celebrate my 60th birthday. Gregory Peck was in the frame to present the show, but he was too ill to travel.

How it came about, I lived in Hollywood, in Beverly Hills for a couple of years in the 70's. I worked with people like Elmer Bernstein, and met a lot of famous people there. Four years ago, I did a two nights of my one-man-show, which I called Both Sides Now. So we did it in St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York. We had James Galway, Frank Mc Court, Edna O Brien and Gregory Peck. And Peck and the rest, they were doing readings. Gregory read from the Seamus Heaney Ciara Troy. "When hope and history rhyme" - wow, it was like sitting watching Moby Dick with HIM. He was just

endlessly gracious, and it was a privilege to occupy the same performing space as him. I said at the time, if there were a hierarchy in Hollywood, he'd be the Pope.

You've received doctorates and given lecture courses in the US. Would you ever think about giving them in Ireland?

If I had the time, I sure would, no problem. I have a doctorate from Queen's, my old university, and one from the University of Ulster, and I was visiting professor in the music section of Boston University for about 3, 4 years. Which I reluctantly gave up because of time pressures, just too many trips across the Atlantic. But I definitely enjoyed it; I enjoyed the energy of the students and the young people, who have this veracious appetite for knowledge, knowledge of music, of Irish music. Having spent 5 years in a campus situation, the first thing that occurred to me coming back here was, 'This takes me back, the sun is shining... shit, exams'. And I got this uneasy feeling, like 'Shit, I should be studying', just like a trigger. So, that whole graduate thing, I think young people with that kind of energy is great.

And you're part of the famous St. Colum's bunch...

Ah now, we're now famous, but we never thought we were going to be famous. But it is, it's quite uncanny. I'm often asked, particularly in America; St. Colum's produced two Nobel Prize winners, also produced Mr. Hume and Heaney, Brian Friel, Seamus Dean, Paul Brady, Fergal Sharkey, and numerous other academics. Was it the privileged school, the progressive school, for the rich and famous? No way. It was the only school; it was the minor seminary in Derry. If you were aspiring to third-level education, that was it. We were all beneficiaries of an education act that opened up thirdlevel education to scholarship. Seamus Heaney would never have expected to get to college with his parents paying for it, I would never have gone to university, Hume neither, Friel, if we hadn't had the opportunity of the new scholarships. That was a turning point, which really is what produced that kind of a flowering in St. Colum's that coupled with the work ethic at St. Colum's. In those days, if you had a talent it was beaten into us, sometimes literally, you had an obligation to do something with that talent. No time for dossing - you can aspire, buy into a new lifestyle that nobody in your family has ever aspired to before. And your world would change, and maybe the world around would change.

Metroid prime has been a long time in the making.

The Metroid games began on Nintendo's NES system many moons ago and despite the last update being for the SNES (Super Metroid) Metroid has had a place in most gamers memories, simply because it was one of the best side scrolling platformers/shooters ever.

Ingenious level design, a wide area to explore and taxing puzzles has made sure that the previous versions of metroid still rank high in today's top 100 games list Being the only major Nintendo franchise not to be released for the N64, metroid is back.

If it can live up to the pedigree of its predecessors is another matter.

The story of the game is thus: taking control of Samus Aran (no, metroid is the name of some of the enemies you face, not the hero of the game) last of the chozo, you are sworn to hunt down and explode with extreme prejudiced the evil space pirates.

Just so you know the chozo were an all powerful race that rejected the ability to defend themselves with their technology in favour of being more like the Amish. The space pirates are a group hell bent on ruling the galaxy, and the murdered Samus' family.. The nasty gits.

Anyway the game starts with Samus landing on a research facility owned by



the space pirates.

One swift battle later and the station is kaput, however Samus takes a nasty explosion in the face and looses all but the most basic functions in her battle suit. She decides to follow the space pirates to the planet below, Tallon IV, which handily enough was an old chozo colony and contains all the powerups Samus just lost, plus a whole range more besides.

All that stands between our girl and being fully accessorised is 5 areas filled with vicious space-pirates, mind altering puzzles and more angry locals than Limerick late at night.

The first thing that strikes you is Metroid primes graphics.

This game is a showpiece of what the

Gamecube can do with relative ease. The game creates rain soaked jungles and massive tundra's with consummate ease. The game is constant eye candy with tiny little effects being thrown in just to show off (for example Samus charge shot warps reality around it as it flies towards its target)

The sound is of an equal high quality, with changes in tempo indicating battle and every creature having a unique sound, and the game supports Dolby surround sound, for a completely immersive experience.

But it's the gameplay that really shines. Like Mario and Zelda before it, Nintendo have shown they are the masters of converting 2D titles into the 3D realm. The game retains everything that made the original metroid special, and then adds some new features.

The original ideas of new areas being opened only when you have the required ability still stands but there are new ideas such as the 4 different view modes, the grapple beam for swinging across chasms and a variety of new weapons.

The game even eliminates the bane of all console first person shooters, that being the clunky control system for shooting foes, by using a lock on system that with a click of a button homes onto the nearest enemy, leaving you to manoeuvre and fire without having to worry about ending up staring at the floor.

Metroid is almost perfect, but it has a few

Firstly it may be a bit too sedate for some, the major battles are well spaced and for those who demand constant warfare Metroid prime might be too relaxed for them.

Also the lock-on system while effective 99% of the time, makes it hard to avoid charging enemies.

But these are minor gripes.

The game oozes class and polish, this is indeed a worth addition to the metroid family, and indeed to anyone's game collection, this game is probably one of the best FPS on any of the consoles, and knocks halo into a cocked hat.

After Mario, Zelda is Nintendo's best known character. Star of multiple games all the way back from the NES days, most well known of these being the SNES game Legend of Zelda: link to the past, and the N64 games Ocarina of time, and Majoras mask. The Latest instalment of the series has been clouded in controversy since the first shots of it surfaced well over a year ago.

There was uproar, people were outraged. In an age where most games are measured in how photorealistic their graphics are Nintendo had committed a cardinal sin.

They made it look like a cartoon.

I'll return to the graphics in a moment, but first just a little exposition. Wind Waker follows the adventures of a young boy from a little place called Outset Island. It is traditional upon coming of age the boys would wear the traditional dress of the legendary Hero of time. Not best pleased at being outfitted in a green tunic and foppish hat the young lad goes



about his business as best he can.

However soon enough he sees a large bird being chased by a pirate ship, as it flies over the island it drops a young girl into the forest on the top of the island. From here things spiral out of control taking the young hero on a journey all over the world to save his sister, slay evil, sail his way across vast seas, and collect as many items as he can.

Now back to those controversial graphics. They who game has a cartoon feel about it, all the characters have a thick black outline, making them look like 2D drawings in a 3D world, the wind blows about in stylized gust and the whole world looks like it leapt straight from a illustrated folk tale.

This isn't to say that its unimpressive,

quite the opposite, its one of the most refreshing and bold graphical looks to a game in quite some time. Technically it's quite stunning as a variety of real-time lighting is employed, and the heros' facial animations make the game come alive as he twitches, squirms and when left idle will offer clues by looking in the direction of the solution to the current problem.

The sound is of equally high quality, be it sailing the sea, or navigating a monster-filled dungeon the score fits it perfectly. I promise that the sailing theme will be stuck in your head for days at a time.

The controls are beautifully intuitive, with an improved combat system making the hack-and-slash a lot more skilful than

simple button bashing, and navigating the levels is also a breeze as the analogue stick is just sensitive enough.

The Gameplay itself is solid and while not as innovative as I would have liked, it is packed full of new items and features to keep everyone happy.

However seeing as the bulk of the game involves you sailing about the sea in order to find new islands and vital treasures from the ocean floor; it's a shame that after a while such an essential piece of the game can become tedious.

No matter how packed each square of sea is with items and challenges there will come a time when a sea of blue will just seem really unappealing.

But these times are few and far between as the action is very well paced and keeps the game from lolling into a stupor. This is another piece of gaming genius from Nintendo, well paced, imaginative and oozing charm and impossible not to love, its no wonder this has been hailed as the game of the year

For those who have never played a Zelda game before this will most probably be the "best game ever" for those who have played a Zelda game before, it's merely brilliant.
