

Transgender Day of Remembrance was founded in 1999 by a small group, including **Gwendolyn Ann Smith**, **Nancy Nangeroni**, and **Jahaira DeAlto**, to memorialize the murder of Black transgender women **Rita Hester** in Allston, Massachusetts and **Chanelle Pickett** in Watertown, Massachusetts.

After Hester's death, Smith was surprised to realize that none of her friends remembered Pickett's murder.

The first TDoR took place in November 1999 in Boston and San Francisco, as both Hester and Pickett's deaths occurred in November.
