
LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

ith an impressive record of 8-2 for the Shaw Eagle Football team and a district title, it's easy to see the difference that Coach Hank Tierney and his coaching staff have made for the program. The return of the beloved coach, however, means more than just a winning season: it's a homecoming for a figure who had long been separated from the place he believes he truly belongs.

Coach Tierney came to Shaw as an assistant coach in 1978 under Head Coach Joe Zimmerman. In 1983, Coach Tierney became Head Coach and led the Eagles to legendary heights. Out of 19 seasons as head coach, the team made it to the playoffs 18 times. After some reflection and hoping to bring his talents to other up-and-coming programs, Coach took his leave from Shaw in 2002.

Coach Tierney would cement his talents as a coach over the next twenty years where he led successful programs and won a number of championships at public schools. Despite the successes and recognition, Coach Tierney found himself conflicted: he didn't have the same impact on the student's lives as he had when at Shaw. At the end of the day, he was *just* the football

coach. The relationship between coach and athlete ended when cleats stepped off the field.

Central to Archbishop Shaw's identity as a Catholic and Salesian school is the Preventive system of Saint John Bosco. Don Bosco famously devoted his life toward helping the young, especially young men who were often homeless or orphans. In his system, he emphasized three characteristics of a Salesian school: rea-



son, religion, and loving kindness.

This spiritual ethic had deeply impacted Tierney as a young coach and would continue to shape his character and spirituality. When Coach received the invitation to return to Shaw, his goal was simple: to bring this philosophy in a deeper way to the field. Despite the desire to win and to compete well, the hope is not to just make better football players, but better people.

At Shaw, however, the same disciplines preached on the field are found in the classroom. A student is not just an athlete or a scholar: he is a unique creation of God, destined for holiness off and on the field.

By combining the values gained from his many years as a coach with the full support of the school, Coach Tierney envisions football as an extension of the student's growth and formation. He upholds a high standard for his players: watching one's tongue in the locker room and the field, reprimanding unsportsmanlike behavior, benching anyone who received a detention

notice. These are all important aspects of a team that can go neglected, but because of this strict adherence to honorable, upright play, "developing the work ethic of the team has been easy" says Coach Tierney. He points to many examples in the past where a "star" player was benched for breaking these fundamentals while fully acknowledging the consequences that would bring to the team. The message was simple: talented players don't win games: teams do, and when one person hurts himself by his actions, it



hurts his brothers, as well

one of the biggest questions Coach has received from the moment he appeared under a banner emblazoned with "Welcome Home Coach" was "why"; why return to Archbishop Shaw after all these years? By his own admission, he had fully planned to retire, having had his 300th win and sitting comfortably as an accomplished coach. However, he couldn't help but notice that the very place where he had gotten his start as a young coach and learned so many valuable lessons was, itself, in need of a restart. Despite declining enrollment and a malaise that seemed to define the school for years, faces both new and old resolved to start a new chapter in her history. Coach recognized his opportunity to become part of that story one last time.

Jason Brown, Jr. (Class of 2023) was born and raised in Marrero, LA. He is a member of the Archbishop Shaw Swimming, Lacrosse, and Wrestling teams. He is a member of the Robotic club, the Student Government Organization, Mu Alpha Theta Honors Society, and Science Honors Society. He is the Treasurer of the Spanish Honors Society and Secretary of National Honors Society. He and his family attend Visitation of Our Lady Catholic Church where he is a lector.



Coach Tierney's return is more than just another chance at coaching football: it's a mission to keep the spirit of Don Bosco alive in Marrero. His program understands that football is more than plays, games, and victories: it is a vehicle of growth for Shaw and of formation for her men, giving back to more than just the school, but the Salesians and the Westbank as a whole, as this was the place that made him the man he is today.



SHAW and the state of the state

Not everyone can be a Shaw Eagle: it takes a young man who is dedicated to his education and community. However, every young man deserves the chance to **become** a Shaw Eagle. Mr. Benjamin Russo, Assistant Head of School of Student Formation, discusses his efforts to make this possible.

he family spirit at Archbishop Shaw is no accident. It is one of the most important signs of the Salesian charism being alive and well at our school. How do we cultivate that family spirit, particularly among increasing large eighth grade classes coming from a diverse background of middle schools; public and private, Eastbank and Westbank, urban Gretna and rural Lafitte.

Our school decided to implement a Shaw 101 class for all eighth graders, a semester class that aims to prepare students for their time here at Shaw not just through math, reading, and writing practice but through teaching students about all of the elements of our school that make us Archbishop Shaw. In Shaw 101 we learn Shaw history, develop school spirit, learn about the Salesians and St. Don Bosco, explore the purpose and roles in the House System, and work on becoming the best young men we can be at Archbishop Shaw.

Shaw 101 is a course that forces the eighth graders to work with one another and encounter the members of their class that did not come from the same school they did, are not in the same extracurriculars, and those that have other interests. It helps them move from an eighth grade class composed of students from twenty plus elementary schools to becoming one unified Shaw class, ready to make the most of their next four years at Shaw.

Mr. Benjamin Russo grew up as the fourth of six children in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma. He earned his Bachelor of Science in Chemistry from the University of Dallas and earned his Masters in Education from the University of Notre Dame. This is his eleventh year teaching at Archbishop Shaw where he serves as Assistant Head of School of Student Formation.

Rosary for Life

On Friday, October 7, in honor of the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, all of Shaw came together to pray, rosaries in hand, with one voice.

The prayer was led by members of Father Steve Ryan's Senior Theology class. A big part of Father's class is the idea of putting faith into action. In the past, the class has put on religious plays and has helped with such activities as reconcilation services. The school-wide Rosary is one of such activities.

In light of recent events in our country's history, the Rosary was offered in recognition of the dignity of life, especially of the unborn. To that end, the school welcomed Mrs. Hyuna Franklin, director of the Community Center for Life, a crisis pregnancy center. The center's mission is to educate future mothers who may be struggling to support themselves and their child.

The school then had the opportunity to put that mission in action by taking home baby bottles. Everyone was asked to fill up the bottles with donations meant to support the center.

Dogs & Treats

The National Honors Society is a an academic organization that recognizes students' educational and athletic successes, acts of charity, and signs of character. To be considered a National Honors Scholar, students must be recommended by an educator. This recognition is a testament to how much hard work an individual has put into their school career.

This year, NHS members have performed acts of service that exemplify these characteristics. One of the major projects was assisting the Jefferson Parish Animal Welfare Society (JPAWS). JPAWS, in addition to their animal welfare work, offers shelter for the ever-growing number of stray and abandoned dogs. Five students (Seniors Kobe Nguyen, Dominic Allelo, Dylan Hyunh, Colin Crespo, and Josh Nguyen) attended a workday on September 28th and helped the workers clean, walk, and feed homeless dogs.

"We really wanted to be there; it's almost as if we didn't work at all," reflects Dominic Allelo, President of Archbishop Shaw's NHS Chapter. Despite the fun of working with newly-made furry friends, it's not all chew toys and treats:

"Certain dogs, especially the bigger ones, made it harder to control and groom because of their size." However, the students were unperturbed and handled them in stride. JPAWS workers were thankful for the students' concerns for the stray. Even though the students were there for only one day, their work and concern has inspired their peers to help in the cause.

Sometimes service looks a lot more like fun than a chore: NHS was also a part of this year's Trunk-or-Treat event for Halloween. Students and faculty came together to give children a smaller, safer version of trick-or-treating. NHS set up, in the trunk of a car, a spooky display and handed out treats to passing children. Over 500 children and their guardians were in attendance with not a *Kit-Kat* or *Twix* to spare.

NHS is looking forward to more service projects to come for the Christmas holiday and into the Spring.

Kobe Nguyen (Class of 2023) is from Marrero, Louisiana. He is a member of the Shaw Wrestling team and the National Honors Society. He is a parishoner of Saint Bonaventure Catholic Church in Avondale.

The day was also important for our Salesian identity as the community celebrated the canonization of Saint Artemide Zatti. This event is an important moment for the Salesians as Brother Zatti is the first Salesian brother to be canonized as a saint.



Brother Tom is a Salesian brother who is on his way to becoming a priest. He taught Theology at Shaw and was the baseball team's chaplain for two years. He is continuing his studies in Mexico.

How's life been since leaving Shaw?

It's going well. This summer I took six weeks of Spanish classes and got to work our summer camp. I am enjoying my classes (even with the challenge of them being in Spanish). I also get to do some ministry. We walk through a nearby poor neighborhood and talk to families to see if the kids can come for a time of games, prayer, and food.

Has your relationship with God grown since you left?

I have felt God calling me to trust Him a lot more during this time and also to grow in humility and to ask for help when I need it, which is often. God has definitely been my greatest support during this time of transition, which often times has not been easy. He's given me a lot of peace.

How would you describe your experience with your new lifestyle?

It has been a big adjustment getting used to a new language and culture. I have tried to be open to the differences. I always try new foods (most of which I've tolerated well except pickeled pork skins). We have a very full schedule here: prayers and Mass from 6:30 to 7:45 in the morning, classes from 8:30 to 2pm, lunch and then a majority of the Salesians play soccer from 3 to 4, the afternoon for study and chores until prayers at 7:30 followed by dinner at 8. After dinner, some of us have ministry or more time to study.

Do you miss teaching?

Of course, I miss being in the classroom and seeing all my Shaw Eagles. It has been a big adjustment going from being a teacher to a student but it has given me a greater appreciation for my professors here and the work they do.

What are you looking forward to in the years to come?

The coming years will be a lot of big steps for me. In two years I will make perpetual vows to be a Salesian forever and then, at the end of that school year, I will be ordained a deacon, and a year after that a priest. I'm also excited to see a lot of ministries that the Salesians do here in Mexico, such as working with kids who live on the streets and prison ministry, two things that Don Bosco did.

What career experience did you have before coming to Shaw?

t sounded like a pretty good deal: a whole week off of school without any assignments, responsibilities, or worries. However, there was a catch: the whole week would, instead, be filled with sharing, reflection, and *prayer*.

"When I first learned about it, I was tempted to see it as a joke," recounts Junior Austin Rudolph. "I didn't see the seriousness of it at first".

Austin is one of many students at Shaw who are seemingly involved in everything: he's a drummer for the Eagle Band, a percussionist in the school's choir, a member of many honors societies and clubs, a nationally-recognized cheerleader, amongst other things.

Despite his clearly visible love for Shaw, Austin found that, within himself, there were places in his heart where he felt walled-off and distant from others. While this emptiness was sure to be a topic of discussion during the retreat, he didn't expect much to change.

That is until a few days into the retreat when everything changed.

While a week away from school may seem like a welcome reprieve for some, others may find it to be a daunting proposition.

Junior Braden Cortez knew that this opportunity could very well be offered to him someday; as a peer minister, it seemed like a natural conclusion that Braden would be asked to go.

Despite the privilege, Braden didn't immediately consider it as such. On top of all of the responsibilites and duties he would have to make up after the retreat, Braden wasn't fond of having to spend a week apart from his family and friends.

While there was some hesitation in his heart, Braden immediately realized upon arriving at the Marian Shrine that there was something at work that was much bigger than any of the excuses he could had given not to go.

PARTICIPATE, DON'T ANTICIPATE

The Salesian Leadership Retreat is a week-long opportunity for Salesian school students to come together for formation, spiritual growth, and community. The hope of the retreat is that each student will bring his or her experience back with them and share it with their peers. That's where the leadership component comes in.

Perhaps the most unique aspect of the retreat is that most of it *is a bit of a secret*: students aren't told what to expect once they arrive. For some, that can be a bit disconcerting.

"I think they were skeptical at first," admits Mr. Eric Budd, a second-year social studies educator who was asked to accompany the young men. "They didn't know the schedule or what really to expect, but we kept encouraging them to "participate, don't anticipate": to let go. Once they did, they finally realized why we kept asking them to do that."

That moment of realization happened, ac-

cording to Budd, when all of the students finally met one another. "There was solidarity in the fact that they were all in this situation together," prompting the students who, despite knowing nothing about one another, to trust in each other, the process, and the Lord.

"It felt good to express myself in that way; I don't get that many opportunities in my daily life to express myself like that," reflects Cortez. "It was weird, at first, but I saw the goodness in it; I knew it was good".

"It was like a punch in the chest that I could feel in my soul."

The week isn't just hanging around: "I was impressed with just how jam-packed the schedule is," according to Budd. "The kids are always doing something." A big part of that hidden schedule are opportunities for reflection and spiritual formation.

"Specific talks [during those times] really resonated with me, it just really made me emotional," admits Rudolph. "I don't know how to explain the feeling I had. It was like a punch in the chest that I could feel in my soul."

It's that core feeling, that fundamental shift of mindset, that Austin describes as the true beginning of the retreat. "Faith is a journey and I am on my way, no matter how long it takes, I will get there and I will be better than I have been."

FAITH IS A JOURNEY

"It was nice to experience... everyone just talking with each other and having fun," Cortez reflects. What seemed to impress him most about the retreat was just how swift and profound was the transition from strangers to friends. It was in this intimacy that Braden says he got to know himself better: "It all connected back to me and my own life. It made me remember the spiritual sense of my life."

While the phrase *leadership* often conjures up images of grand plans and heroic action, the journey for these leaders starts within: "They've resolved to start going to weekly adoration together and to invite kids they may have otherwise never spoke to," says Mr. Budd. One takeaway for Braden that can be revealed is that leadership starts with one's own journey of faith:

"I began to understand myself and my character... the relationship I'm called to have with my brothers, friends, and everyone. The retreat helped me to understand that."

Both Austin and Braden know that this journey of faith is just the beginning and that the end result is to be more than ambassadors for the school, but evangelists and co-workers with Christ.

A trip to New York, however, would not be complete without sampling some of the culinary offerings the Empire State is famous for. The best thing according to Austin? "Pizza. New York pizza is the best." For Braden, the answer is the same: "New York pizza has something special going on. It's been hard eating 'normal' pizza since."


Spanish Honor Society Gives Desks to Honduran Students
