



ISI REPORT



e were delighted to welcome the Independent School Inspectorate (ISI) into School in March 2023 for a Focused Compliance and Educational Quality Inspection. The Focused Compliance Inspection reports on the school's compliance with the regulatory standards; which are either 'met' or 'not met'. We were delighted that Surbiton High School 'met' the requirements across the eight key areas.

The Educational Quality Inspection reports on the quality of education with two key outcomes; 'achievement of pupils', including curriculum, teaching and pastoral care, and 'personal development of pupils'. A clear judgement is made on each aspect using the following grading: 'excellent', 'good', 'sound' and 'unsatisfactory'. Surbiton High School was graded as 'excellent' in all areas.

"Pupils throughout the School demonstrate exemplary attitudes to learning. They are deeply engaged in the learning process. They show a genuine appetite for learning and extremely high levels of motivation, whether working independently, collaboratively or when taking the lead."

GCSE Results

G

CSE results day was a day of celebration for our Year 11 pupils with 42% of all GCSEs at grade 9 and 88% at grade 9 to 7.

Every subject achieved over 70% of all grades at grade 9 to 7 with the following subjects achieving around

90%: Biology, Chemistry, Chinese, Classical Greek, Drama, English Language, English Literature, Further Mathematics, Geography, German, History, Italian, Mathematics, Physical Education, Physics, Religious Studies, Russian and Spanish. It is wonderful to see our STEM and language subjects thrive at Surbiton High School.



Every pupil has a story to tell and many have committed huge amounts of time to their studies, while also juggling busy co-curricular lives. We had four rowers achieving 24 grade 9s and 8s between them, while also rowing for GB! Two musicians combined their talents in achieving ABRSM diplomas and learning rare instruments with achieving 18 grade 9s between them! While three budding thespians and technical theatre crew achieved 29 grades at 9 to 7.

The majority of our GCSE Class of 2023 have gone on to enjoy their chosen A-level subjects, allowing them to explore their interests from the broad range of 32 A-level subjects on offer at Sixth Form.

Biomedical scientists and neuroscientists, potential lawyers, mechanical engineers, medics. artists. musicians. linguists and vets are amongst the 89% of our students going on to study at Russell Group and Times Top Ten Universities, with the remaining students heading off to prestigious music and art institutions

or to take up apprenticeships. Over 86%

have achieved their first choice at university.



ART

he Art Department at Surbiton High Boys' Prep School had a busy and exciting year! The pupils had the opportunity to explore a wide range of mediums and art techniques, fostering their self-expression and creativity.

In Year 3, the pupils delved into the history of art and learned about the first artists. They documented their skills and experiences in sketchbooks and experimented with various media such as charcoal, oil pastels, paints, and clay. They also explored Roman art, including mosaics and vases.

Alongside their Rainforests topic in humanities, Year 4 studied the renowned artist, Henri Rousseau, and his painting, 'Tiger in a Tropical Storm'. Pupils experimented with paint to create different tints, tones, and shades. Additionally, they engaged in a whole-class collaborative art project using a variety of media.

COMPUTING

his year, the Computing Department at the Boys' Prep School have been focused on enrichment. School iPads continue to support and extend learning both inside and outside the classroom, with children demonstrating excellent digital literacy skills throughout the School.

New equipment has been purchased to further invigorate the curriculum, such as new laptops, BBC Microbit Computers and Crumble Controllers. We were also visited by Open Education, who delivered fantastic e-safety workshops to the whole of the Boys' Prep School. The children discussed real-world e-safety problems through the context of drama games.

In the Summer Term, Prime VR visited Key Stage 2 to deliver workshops using virtual reality headsets, giving the boys a taste of the topics that they will be learning about next year. They looked at pollution in Tokyo, threatened polar bears in

the Arctic, deforestation in Indonesia and endangered lions in Africa

The children have fully immersed themselves in the Computing curriculum this year. Here are a few examples of what they have been learning about and creating:

- Programming floor robots (Dash) in Key Stage 1
- Block coding with Scratch in Year 3
- Programming their own step counter using the BBC Microbit in Year 6
- Designing and creating their own leaflets, animations, podcasts, and films - to name just a few

Overall, we have been blown away by the boys' extensive knowledge and enthusiasm with regards to Computing this year and look forward to their continued success in this curriculum area.





DAY TRIPS

E

ach year, the boys experience exciting and fun day trips to support what they are learning in their lessons at School.

The Look Out Discovery Centre in Bracknell

The boys had an exciting school trip to The Look Out Discovery Centre. The Bug and Beasties Workshop was a highlight, where they learned about minibeasts and their habitats. Armed with magnifying glasses, they explored outside and discovered spiders, beetles, and ladybirds. The instructors taught them how to handle the creatures and shared interesting facts. The trip deepened their appreciation for minibeasts' importance in nature and inspired a sense of responsibility for their conservation. The experience sparked their curiosity and passion for the environment, leaving a lasting impression and a desire to continue exploring the natural world.

Natural History Museum

Year 1 boys were introduced to the story of Sophie and how the fossil dinosaur was found. Linking to their curriculum, the boys constructed a 'Stego-jigsaw-rus' to learn how scientists piece together fossil finds. The boys examined different parts of Sophie's anatomy: head, plates and spikes. In an interactive plenary, the group used their new skills and knowledge to complete a poster about Sophie.

London Zoo


Year 2 had an exciting trip to London Zoo to support their current Humanities and Science topic, 'Africa', and learn more about animal life cycles. The boys visited many animals including hippos, giraffes, zebras and monkeys! The boys had a thoroughly enjoyable day, with all of them discovering new animal facts.

Chiltern Open Air Museum

Year 3 immersed themselves in Stone Age and Iron Age life through two tailored workshops of activities in line with their Humanities topic of 'Prehistory'.

Hampton Court Palace

Year 5 visited Hampton Court Palace to enrich the work they have been doing investigating the Tudors in Humanities. The boys got to explore the extraordinary palace and gardens, and imagine what life must have been like for the Tudors!

Bank of England

Year 6 visited the Bank of England Museum where they learned more about money, the economy and the history of the Bank of England. They then climbed all 311 steps of the Great Fire of London Monument and saw spectacular views of the city, followed by a walk across Tower Bridge and sightseeing some of London's best landmarks from the Thames Clipper.

DRAMA

rama plays a crucial role in the holistic development of the pupils at Surbiton Boys' Prep School, helping them enhance their emotional intelligence, communication skills, confidence, creativity, and teamwork abilities. It provides a dynamic and enriching platform for self-expression and personal growth. One of the ways we accomplish this is by giving pupils the opportunity to perform a musical production in Year 4 and Year 6. This provides them with the opportunity to develop a character, acquire line memorisation skills, engage in onstage performances, and interact with set design, props, and lighting.

Key Stage 1 - The Nativity

Years 1 and 2 took to the stage for the annual Nativity performance, retelling the story of the birth of baby Jesus. Year 2 dressed as their characters, Year 1 dressed as stars and Reception were cute little angels. The boys spoke their lines loudly and clearly as Mary and Joseph rode their donkey to Bethlehem. All boys sang the song 'Little Donkey' while using sign language to emphasise the lyrics. It was a beautiful performance of this traditional Christmas song.

Year 4 Production - 'Fleeced'

Every Spring Term, we give Year 4 the opportunity to experience performing their own full-length musical production on a theatre stage. This year, they took a trip to Ancient Greece for 'Fleeced', a comedy re-telling of the 'Jason and the Argonauts' story. Featuring a selection of fun, upbeat songs, the boys had an amazing time showing the audience their performance skills, which shone through with confidence and humour. One of the many highlights we always see are those boys who were able to step out of their comfort zone when playing a character and showing a totally different side of themselves on the stage.

Year 5 Debating Team

During Year 5, our emphasis lies on honing the boys' debating and public speaking skills, fostering the cultivation of their own viewpoints on specific subjects, and encouraging them to consider multiple perspectives. Notably, our Year 5 debating team emerged victorious in a recent local public speaking competition.

Year 6 - 'An Evening with Dracula'

The Year 6 boys enjoyed showing off their brilliant work and amazing talents when telling the story of 'Dracula'. Oscar and
Tristan did a brilliant job of directing the boys and

telling them where to go. This production was different from others, for it did not have a script which made it even harder to know what to say, but all the boys did so well and improvised, especially because we had only had three

weeks to practise!

We were thrilled to have all parents join us for an enchanting evening as our School presented the timeless classic, 'Oliver Twist'.


Our talented boys had dedicated many hours of hard work and passion to bring this classic production to life, ensuring an unforgettable experience for all who attended.

n the Boys' Prep School, the Reception boys began their school journey by meeting each other for the first time, learning about their classrooms and their new routines. ear 5 kicked off their historical journey at the Boys' Prep School with a trip to Hampton Court Palace. What a resource to have right on our doorstep! We toured the kitchens – decided we wouldn't be keen to eat a heron or a badger and immersed

ourselves in the lives and lifestyles of the Tudors. Did you know that privies were not very private at all? LEARNING SUPPORT

he year began with an excellent training session for staff by the infamous Fintan O'Regan who gives strategies, tips and anecdotes around ASC (Autism Spectrum Condition) and ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder).

The first term for the boys is all about settling into their new environment/classroom. The Learning Support Department work alongside the Form Teachers to help with the transition and to support those who may need a helping hand. Further up the School, the team are kept busy in the Autumn Term with Year 6 11+ exams.

In the Spring Term, the focus on other aspects of learning support became the topic of some of the CPD/coaching

sessions. This included discussions on social stones, LEGO Therapy and ELSA (emotional literacy support) support.

We work with outside agencies for some of the specialist support required (speech and language therapists, for example) but also have a great, proactive team here at School. One of our very successful programmes is OT-style (occupational therapy) support for some of our boys by Mr Trigwell. He supports boys with balance, core strength, target setting, resilience and much more.

We then come full circle into June preparing the boys for their next transition. We are very proud of our team and the boys that benefit from their excellent work.



MATHS

t has been an exciting year in the Maths

Department and the boys have not only enjoyed

maths inside the classroom but had plenty of

opportunities to use maths outside the classroom. For example, Year 4 looked at the area and perimeter of different sports pitches and Year 6 related their learning about money to exchange rates, the economy and managing a budget and even visited the Bank of England. They have all been working hard on learning key facts such as multiplication and division facts and developed their reasoning and problem-solving skills.

The boys have been busy taking part in inter-school and national maths competitions. In November, the Year 4, 5 and 6 boys completed the Primary Mathematical Challenge, gaining 68 bronze, silver and gold

medals, a tremendous achievement. Participation in the Junior Mathematical Challenge, open to Year 8 and below, is always fierce competition but the boys in Years 5 and 6

achieved 42 medals and many qualified for the bonus round.

To celebrate International Pi Day on 14 March, the Year 6 Maths Ambassadors hosted a 'Pi Day Challenge' encouraging their peers to learn the digits of Pi in a fun competition. One boy managed to recite over 130 digits of this strange but interesting number!

Term to pass on their expertise in the subject. The Reception boys loved receiving a Maths lesson from their much-admired Year 6 Buddies.

t the Boys' Prep School, we prioritise a comprehensive education that extends beyond academic excellence. As pupils progress from Year 3 to Year 6, our mentoring programme becomes an

integral part of their development, equipping them with essential life skills. With two mentoring sessions per

week, we aim to foster their growth in key areas crucial to their overall well-being.

Throughout these sessions, our dedicated mentors focus on concepts such as character strengths, positive emotions, goal orientation, caregiving and community, creativity and imagination, and confidence and well-being.

To develop critical thinking and communication skills, pupils engage in activities like debates

and team games, fostering cooperation, problem-solving, and effective teamwork. Research projects encourage analytical thinking and information literacy, while community service initiatives nurture empathy and social responsibility.

Creativity and imagination are fostered through artistic endeavours, such as drawing and storytelling. Pupils learn to express themselves creatively and think outside the box.

To boost confidence and well-being, pupils participate in

public speaking exercises and learn stressmanagement techniques. These activities help them develop self-assurance and

resilience.

In conclusion, our mentoring sessions from Year 3 to Year 6 focus on developing crucial life skills while nurturing critical thinking abilities. Through activities like debates, team games, research projects, community service, creative arts, and public speaking, pupils gain practical experiences that enhance their character strengths,

emotional intelligence, goal setting, and well-being. These diverse activities empower our pupils to become well-rounded individuals, equipped with the skills necessary to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.



MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Highlights

The boys enjoyed learning about language and culture through dance. In the Summer Term, we were delighted to welcome Maika to School. She ran several workshops throughout the day. The energy, enthusiasm and enjoyment in the room was contagious and the boys loved discovering about Spanish culture and dance. Through dance, they also learned some vocabulary: greetings, numbers up to eight, and the names of the dance steps in Spanish.

In the Spring Term, we welcomed the Onatti Theatre who performed a French play to all our Key Stage 2 pupils. This was a fun, interactive and creative way of bringing the language to life.

Early Years Foundation Stage

In the Autumn Term, as well as looking at some traditional tales in French, the pupils read 'La Chasse à L'Ours' story and played the board game.

In the Summer Term, we met all our Petites Bêtes friends with whom we stretched and prepared for their race. We were all surprised when Emile l'éscargot won!

Key Stage 1

The pupils love getting creative! This year, they created and wrote a poem about autumn, a Mother's Day card, a Christmas card, and an Easter mini-book - all in French.

Year 1 learned about farm animals and read 'Cher Zoo' as well as using puppets to act out and make sentences. In the Summer Term, we have really enjoyed meeting all the sea creatures in the Sous L'Océan topic and reading 'La Baleine at L'Escagote' story.

Key Stage 2

All pupils enjoy a variety of different ways of learning

languages, including interactive games and activities, such as Kahoot, Quizlet, Linguascope, and Language Angels Pupil Games. The children enjoy taking part in competitions, the most recent one being to create a monster and label the body parts in Spanish.

This year, we have been very proud to have had some of the children's work being selected for publication in the 'Write Away!' magazine, which celebrates the work of language-learners.

All pupils in Years 5 and 6 have taken part in the Spanish Spelling Bee competition, and we are very proud that four of our boys have successfully got through to the national

final in June at Cambridge University.

French phonics has been incorporated into the curriculum: Year 5 have been singing along and doing the dance moves to 'Une Glace à la Vanille' song intercultural understanding is important in teaching a language.

Years 4 to 6 partake in weekly
Duolingo competitions in both French
and Spanish. Each week, there are
winners in each class who are awarded
House points, a certificate and a prize in the

target language.

Coming Up

With Spanish being the world's second most widely spoken native language, spoken by over 460,000,000 people in the world, we have decided that, as of September 2023, it will be the Modern Foreign Language taught to all pupils in EYFS, Key Stage 1 and Year 3.

Pupils in Years 4, 5 and 6 will continue to learn both French and Spanish. We intend to provide broad linguistic and cultural experiences for our pupils that enable them to foster a love of languages and to develop their communication skills.



MUSIC

Music at EYFS & Key Stage 1

In EYFS Music lessons, we explored the use of sound through voice and instruments. The boys learned how instruments can be used to make different sounds and how sounds are made. The boys started their year learning how to read basic musical rhythms, perform them in a steady beat, and understand music vocabulary.

Music lessons in Years 1 and 2 focused on developing rhythmic and melodic performances. Year 1 have explored the musical elements, incorporating them into songs and graphic score compositions. Year 2 have learned to play the recorder while reading melodies on the music stave.

Music at Key Stage 2

Throughout this academic year, pupils in Key Stage 2 have worked on developing their composing skills. Years 3 and 4 performed and composed rhythms on percussion instruments, while learning about music in other cultures. Year 5 learned about the instruments of the orchestra before composing music based on 'The Planets' by Gustav Holtz, and Year 6 studied film and theatre music before ending their year preparing for their production, 'Oliver'. Termly topics are seen below:

- Year 3 African Music, String Instrumental Programme, GarageBand Compositions
- Year 4 Samba Music, Year 4 Production, Pulse & Rhythm (focusing on composing a piece of music based on the London Underground)
- Year 5 Instruments of the Orchestra & 'The Planets' by Gustav Holtz, Brass Instrumental Programme, Musical Ladders
- Year 6 Film Music, Music & Theatre, Year 6 Production

Key Stage 2 Body Percussion Workshop & Choral Concert

In October 2022, pupils in Key Stage 2 participated in a body percussion workshop lead by Alua from the company Beat Goes On. Leading up to the workshop, pupils learned one of the songs they were going to sing in the Spring Choral Concert during their choir rehearsals. While in the workshop, each choir worked with Alua to learn body percussion to use in their performance of the song. The workshops with each choir were full of energy, allowing the boys the opportunity to explore

new ways to create music. During the Spring Choral Concerts, each choir brought their song to life as they incorporated the precise rhythms taught to them by Alua.

Instrumental Programmes

Each year, pupils in Years 3 and 5 participate in our Instrumental Programmes. Pupils in Year 3 learned to play the violin or cello, while pupils in Year 5 learned to play the trumpet, French horn or trombone. Lessons were instructed by our amazing Visiting Music Teachers (VMTs) here at Surbiton High School. Throughout the term, they discovered how to hold the instrument, play the instrument properly, read music on the music stave and understand music theory. At the end of the term, pupils demonstrated the progress they made through a performance to parents.

Coffee Morning Recitals

It is always a highlight of the year to hear our pupils perform a solo on their chosen instrument in a formal setting. For many pupils who performed, it was their first time ever performing in front of a live audience. For those who have performed in these recitals before, hearing the progress they had made on their instrument was incredible! We are so proud of the hard work the boys put into learning their instruments outside of School and thrilled that they shared their talents with us through these recitals.

Outreach in the Community

The Boys' Prep Chamber Choirs sang their hearts out in the community over the Christmas season. From performing on the top floor of the Bentall Centre to on the stage in the Kingston Market Place, the choirs shared the holiday spirit with the Surbiton and Kingston communities.

We also had several boys participate in Music Making Days at local senior schools. It is always a pleasure to experience music in a different location with many other pupils.

e place great emphasis on Philosophy and Religious Studies (PRS). In Year 3, the focus has been on leaders, both religious and

Year 5 takes a unique approach by linking AI to philosophy, while also exploring sacraments, and Christian figures from both the past and present. They examine their life journey, key milestones, and explore thought-provoking topics such as life and death, humanism, miracles, and lesser-known religions from around the world.

PSHCE

ersonal, Social, Health, Citizenship and Emotional Education (PSHCE) serves as the golden thread running through our curriculum. Starting from Reception with Personal, Social, Health and Emotional Development (PSHED), all year groups explore topics within the three core areas of health and well-being, relationships, and living in the wider world. Additionally, each year group engages in Relationships and Sex Education (RSE), ensuring a comprehensive and holistic approach to education.

In Year 1, our pupils delve into topics such as understanding emotions, respect, self-worth, and the importance of communities. Building on this foundation, Year 2 extends the learning with areas such as choosing good behaviour, personal relationships, emotional awareness, financial literacy, and self-care.

Year 3 delves even further, exploring healthy lifestyles, self-respect, safety, personal growth, and development. In Year 4, pupils learn about the importance of sleep, being their best selves, understanding emotions, entrepreneurial skills, and further growth and development.

Year 5 covers rights and responsibilities, managing emotional

roller coasters, nutrition, safety, digital citizenship, and the physical and emotional changes of puberty. These lessons prepare our pupils for the transitions and challenges they will face.

Finally, in Year 6, we conclude the life-skills journey, equipping our pupils with the tools and knowledge they need for their transition to senior school. Topics include aspirations, self-improvement, economic awareness, positive thinking, healthy relationships, puberty and reproductive education, dispelling myths, and aligning with science curricula on the life cycle of a human.

RESIDENTIAL TRIPS

hroughout Key Stage 2, the boys have the opportunity to take part in residential trips which traditionally take place during the Summer Term. The aim of each trip is to teach the boys new skills, and provide them with numerous and varying experiences and team building opportunities.

Year 3 - Juniper Hall

Our Year 3 boys had their first residential trip to Juniper Hall in Box Hill, Dorking. They learned bushcraft survival skills, semaphore signals and explored the village. SCIENCE

cience at the Boys' Prep School is an exciting and fascinating subject that allows the boys to explore the world around them in a hands-on and engaging way. It is taught through a combination of classroom

lessons, practical experiments, and outdoor exploration. The boys are encouraged to use their natural curiosity to ask questions, investigate and make predictions about the world they live in. SPORT

he Sports Department are delighted with the boys' progress in both PE and Games. It has been fantastic to see the boys' skill progression develop on the pitch and in a full, extensive fixture programme against local schools. It fills us with great pride how well the boys represent the School on and off the pitch acting not only as fantastic ambassadors for their sports, but also as ambassadors of excellent sportsmanship. Here are some of our highlights from the year.

Cardiff Sports Tour

Year 4 travelled to Cardiff for this year's autumn Sports Tour. The boys enjoyed football training sessions at the House of Sport, where boys were able to develop their skills with Cardiff City FC Foundation coaches. The boys even ventured to the main stadium to watch Cardiff City v Coventry City in the championship. The trip culminated in a tour of the famous Principality Stadium.

Holland Sports Tour

Years 5 and 6 had the exciting opportunity to go on the Annual Sports Tour to Holland. The boys arrived in Odijk for their first training session with the FC Utrecht coaches, before competing against three local rugby clubs in Amsterdam, where they really came together and recorded several wins. They had the fantastic experience of visiting the Amsterdam Arena for a behind the scenes tour, where they saw the changing rooms, press room and pitch side view from the technical area. Watching the FC Utrecht v Go Ahead Eagles was another thrilling addition to this jam-packed tour.

Boys' and Girls' Prep School Gymnastics

We won the Floor & Vault mixed group. They are the first Surbiton High Prep School team to ever win a medal in this category at a national final! A brilliant achievement - well done!

Swimming Programme

Pupils from the Boys' and Girls' Prep Schools recently competed together, taking third place overall, in the Kingston Borough Swimming Gala. The team displayed impressive skill and determination in the pool, with a true team spirit throughout the entire day.

Hockey Outreach Programme

Years 4 and 6 have enjoyed participating in hockey sessions during this year, where they have developed their skills, learned new techniques and improved their teamwork and communication. It has been a privilege to watch our girls grow and develop throughout the year. We are immensely proud of all their achievements and the progress they have made in their





Many different year groups have enjoyed trips to nearby areas such as Bushy Park, where they have learned all about life cycles and pollination and of course hunting for bugs! We are only just getting started with the development of Forest School at Surbiton High School and can't wait to see what next year brings - watch this space!



HUMANITIES

e have covered a broad range of locations and eras across the School through the year, aiming to further expand our curriculum to ensure the girls examine a diverse range of locations, cultures, historically significant people, and events as they progress through the School.



Some highlights this year include Year 1's 'Victorians at the Seaside' workshop and profile of the Space Race. Year 2 profiled renowned inventors, looking at both their achievements and the learning habits they demonstrated. Year 3's trip to Fishbourne Roman Palace included dressing





up in period costumes, examining artefacts, and trying activities from the era. Year 4 had a fantastic trip to the British Museum to look at Egyptian hieroglyphs and mummies and wrote rough guides to key towns and cities in Brazil, with



their year culminating in the fantastic Hooke Court Tudor residential trip which included feasting and even a beheading! Year 5's highlight was their fantastic Polar Explorers Week culminating in the girls pitching their ideas and preparations for an extreme environment trip in a Dragons' Den style competition. They also looked at our quest for knowledge from ancient civilisations to the Scientific Revolution.

KONA


ur School Dog, Kona, is an apricot and white Cavapoochon, a wonderful cross breed (Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, Poodle, and Bichon Frise) renowned for being affectionate, friendly and loyal companions due to their calm nature and love of children. They are very intelligent and easy to train and Kona has been trained as a School Assistance Dog since she was eight weeks old. When at School, Kona is considered a working dog rather than a pet, and over the past year has become an integral part of our school community.

Kona's role at School is varied and continually evolving. She spends much of her time in Mrs McCabe-Arnold's office where she happily meets with girls, staff, and parents. At various points during the day, she works with groups of children either outside or in the classroom, takes part in the weekly Walk and Talk Club, joins in with Celebration Assemblies as well as visiting the library with classes where she will sit and "listen" to children read. During many lessons, however, she will be doing what dogs do best and sleep! Kona is fully accustomed to the busy comings and goings of school life.

Numerous research studies have shown the benefits of therapy dogs in schools. Therapy dogs have become increasingly popular at working in school environments in the UK but have been commonplace in schools across Australia and the USA for many years now.

Evidence indicates that benefits include:

- Cognitive companionship with a dog stimulates memory, problem-solving, and game-playing.
- Social a dog provides a positive mutual topic for discussion, encourages responsibility, well-being, and focused interaction with others.
- Emotional a school dog improves self-esteem, acceptance from others and lifts mood, often provoking laughter and fun. Dogs can also teach compassion and respect for other living things as well as relieve anxiety.



- Physical interaction with a furry friend reduces blood pressure, provides tactile stimulation, assists with pain management, gives the motivation to move, walk and stimulates the senses.
- Environmental a dog in a school increases the sense of a family environment, with all of the above benefits continuing long after the school day is over.
- Empirical evidence has shown that the rapy dogs can enhance children's psychological development, improve social skills, and increase self-esteem among other benefits. Dogs in the classroom can be used to calm fears, relieve anxiety, and teach skills.

Perhaps most importantly, however, Kona provides cuddles for girls, staff, and parents and is a much-loved part of our school community.

LEARNING SUPPORT

he year started with staff CPD across the Girls' and Boys' Preparatory Schools with excellent training on understanding and using strategies for ASC (Autism Spectrum Condition) and ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder) from Fintan O'Regan. We invited Fintan back again after he had a well-attended audience with parents from the whole School the previous year.

Following the Dyslexia Screener and/or recommendations from external reports in the Autumn Term, the Learning Support Department offered bespoke 1:1 lessons and support in the classrooms.

Many other learning support interventions ran during the year; some 1:1, some small groups to develop subject skills and confidence. Social Thinking groups in Years 3 and 5 were delivered by one of our highly trained teaching assistants. These groups support our pupils who struggle with their social communication.

Kona the school dog is sometimes included in small reading sessions or whole lessons to support any feelings of anxiety.

The School continued to work closely with visiting Speech and Language Therapists (SALTs) and Occupational Therapists (OTs) during the year, offering assessments of children following concerns from staff and then tailored interventions and strategies to ensure they were accessing the curriculum fully. Some recommended resources were given to classes to support concentration, focus, and attention for those pupils who need more help with this.

The Summer Term focus is on residentials and successful transitions for our pupils. It was fantastic to see pupils with additional needs excel in the challenge of being away from home and strengthening their independence and resilience in different environments. Later on in the term, the focus is on ensuring smooth transitions. Whether for new starters to Reception from Nursery, the next year group, or making the

big step to senior school. The Learning Support Department invite pupils to transition groups and provide a space for pupils to discuss any worries they have about moving up and work together to find strategies and solutions to make them feel more confident and excited about the transition. Our learning support pupils receive more detailed transitions as we are keen to prevent any anxiety around this change.

Throughout the year, the Learning Support and PE Departments have worked closely to ensure inclusive PE, Sports Days and sporting events are all thoroughly accessible and enjoyed by the children and parents.






MATHS

ransferring mathematical knowledge of position and direction to their programming lessons using floor robots, graphing temperatures in Polar Week, recording and displaying data in Science, and measuring/drawing bearings to sink WW2 boats and planes, are just some examples from the plethora of cross-curricular links Maths has made this year. Taking this approach ensures maths is based in the real world, makes it accessible, and helps create meaning.

26 of our Year 6s took part in the Primary Maths Challenge (PMC), created by the Mathematical Association, which is a fun and exciting challenge. It encourages enthusiasm and boosts confidence by exposing the pupils to a range of problemsolving and reasoning questions. Seven girls continued their journey to the bonus round, an invite-only opportunity for pupils who did extremely well in the first round to extend and challenge their maths skills. From there, they received four silver and one bronze award.

Summer Term brought two more maths challenges for Key Stage 2. Some of our Year 5 and 6s entered the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge, designed to make pupils think by providing additional challenges through mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency. As the paper is run for Year 8 and under, the level of challenge was higher and made it all the more competitive!





Years 3 and 4 entered the Mathematical Association's First Maths Challenge (FMC) – a paper of increasing challenge through multiple choice questions. It encouraged the girls to think outside the box and approach problems in a logical manner! We had some fantastic results from both year groups, who enjoyed their first experience!

Mr Peters and Mr Staines ran a programme with Year 6 and 10 pupils from the Girls' Prep School and Senior School. Year 10 pupils volunteered as Buddies whilst in Year 9. From September, the girls met weekly with their Buddies, which developed a range of skills in both year groups, including problem-solving, fluency, communication, and logical thinking, as well as huge reported increases in confidence.



Our multiplication and division facts teaching has had two healthy additions this year: '144 Club' and 'Sub-1 Club'. Key Stage 2 pupils are regularly tested on their facts and if they successfully answer 144 questions in the allotted time correctly, their name is added to the Roll of Honour board. For those super-speedy on the Times Table Rock Stars (TTRS) app, the Sub-1 Club welcomes those who can answer more than 60 right answers in a minute. Throughout the year, over 25 pupils joined the Sub-1 Club, and over 120 pupils joined the Roll of Honour board.

MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

e started the year celebrating International Week and the languages and cultures within our school community. The girls enjoyed events and experiences, including a Treehouse Storytime, a global taster breakfast, researching South American countries, and even a language detective Escape Room challenge. Across the week, we heard Arabic, Chinese, Finnish, French, Japanese, Punjabi, Slovak, Spanish, and many more languages! The girls discovered more about themselves, their peers, the world around them, and the languages spoken – all while celebrating what makes each of us unique and special.

At Surbiton High School, we are proud to be part of such a diverse community. One of MFL's biggest projects this year was to update our map of the world showcasing the diversity and individuality of our pupils. Every girl in the School decorated a small picture with something that, for them, represented their country or heritage. Many girls drew flags or national animals. Numerous girls made two or three pictures in celebration of the different countries their families have links to. Incredible pieces of artwork were created ranging from leprechauns (Ireland) and





dragons (Wales), Big Ben and afternoon tea (England), tartan (Scotland), to tigers and the Taj Majal (India). We then grouped the girls' 300+ pictures into countries and pieced them together, resulting in a wonderful global tapestry.

In the classroom, girls throughout the School have been learning French, with Year 4 starting to learn Spanish this year. Year 1 celebrated Poisson d'Avril by making paper fish to play an April Fool's trick at home and Year 2 learned about the Legende des Cloches, the story of who delivers Easter eggs on Easter Sunday. In preparation for the return of the Year 6 French Trip, our outgoing Year 5 pupils have been developing their conversational French for a range of real-life scenarios. In Year 6, our focus has been on securing language foundations ready for Key Stage 3 with a range of transferable skills.

Finally, Summer Term saw the return of our Year 6 and Year 12 French Ambassadrice programme. The two year groups worked together to devise fun activities for their classmates, meanwhile developing their language skills. Novel creations included a new version of French Monopoly, an Eiffel Tower-shaped board game, and a French take on 'Snakes and Ladders'.



MUSIC

Music at EYFS & Key Stage 1

EYFS music lessons saw girls explore the use of sound through voice and instruments. They learned to read basic musical rhythms and perform them in a steady beat. They also learned how to describe music using simple vocabulary.

Music lessons in Years 1 and 2 focused on developing rhythmic and melodic performances. Year 1 explored the musical elements, incorporating them into songs and graphic score compositions. Year 2 learned to play the recorder while reading melodies on the music stave.

Music at Key Stage 2

KS2 pupils have developed composing skills. Years 3 and 4 performed and composed rhythms on percussion instruments, while learning about music in other cultures. Year 5 learned about the instruments of the orchestra before composing music based on 'The Planets' by Gustav Holtz, and Year 6 studied film and theatre music before ending their year preparing for their production 'Annie Jr'.

Key Stage 2 Body Percussion Workshop & Choral Concert

In October 2022, pupils in Key Stage 2 participated in a body percussion workshop led by Alua from the company, Beat Goes On. Each choir worked with Alua to learn body percussion. The workshop was full of energy, allowing pupils to explore new ways to create music.

Instrumental Programmes

Pupils in Years 3 and 5 participated in our Instrumental Programmes. Year 3 learned to play the violin or cello, while Year 5 learned the trumpet, French Horn, or trombone, including how to hold the instrument, play the instrument properly, read music on the music stave and understand music theory. At the end of the term, pupils demonstrated the

progress they made through a performance to parents.

Coffee Morning Recitals

A highlight of the year is hearing pupils perform a solo on their instrument in a formal setting. For many girls, it is their first time ever performing live in front of an audience. We are proud of the hard work the girls put in and thrilled that they share their talents with us through these recitals.

Outreach in the Community

Year 3 performed at Willow Grange Care Home with the famous hit, 'Dancing Queen', which was a delightful chance to connect with the wider community.

Reception had a Family Celebration where they sung their own versions of 'Daddy Cool' and 'Just the Way You Are' for their parents. The girls worked very hard to learn all their words and actions to express their gratitude for their parents and carers.

Scholarships and Instrumental Exams

 3 scholarship offers across 3 senior schools, 1 of whom received a scholarship to Surbiton High School.

44 pupils passed their ABRSM exams.

Christmas Carol Service

Our Carol Service was a beautiful start to Christmas. Soloist, Anais, opened the service with confidence and flair, followed by readings professionally executed by our Year 6 pupils with music sung by each year group.

St Mark's Church were so impressed with pupils' behaviour and wanted the parents to know how amazing all of the girls were, supporting each other and celebrating together as a community.











PHILOSOPHY AND RELIGIOUS STUDIES





ingston Insight invited Year 2 to join the Christmas
Journey; an immersive, multi-sensory retelling
of the Christmas story. The girls engaged with
why the Christmas story is still so important to
Christians today and were given a small craft activity.

Year 5 joined an Easter Experience, also organised by Kingston Insight. This took the girls back in time to meet characters, who were present at crucial events from the last days before Jesus' death and those after His resurrection. They asked questions and reflected on what they had learned about the Easter story.

Mr and Mrs Patel and their daughter,
Aashima, told us about how their family
celebrates Holi, an ancient Hindu festival, also
known as the 'Festival of Colours' and the 'Festival of
Spring'. Holi marks the arrival of spring, the end of winter,
and the blossoming of love for many. It is a festive day to meet
others, play and laugh, forget and forgive, as well as throw

lots of paint. We were joined by Senjuti, a professional Indian dancer. PSHCE

hrough our PSHCE focus, we have had such an enriching year, using our school values to underpin teaching and grow our curriculum. This occurs in our core PSHCE lessons, as well as through Form Time, Mentoring, Computing (internet safety), assemblies, PRS, and through the varied and diverse cocurricular opportunities and experiences held at the Girls' Prep School.

At the start of the year, roles of responsibility and expectations for the year ahead were a focus across all year

groups. While voting for school leaders, we also

noticed those in our wider communities who have responsibility for keeping us safe: nurses, doctors, firefighters, and the police. RESIDENTIAL TRIPS

t the Girls' Prep School, our residential trips are a rite of passage, sitting as a key highlight for pupils throughout the course of each academic year. e welcomed an array of visiting companies and speakers to the Girls' Prep School this year. They shared their knowledge and interactively enriched the girls' learning in imaginative ways.

- Why are you speeding near our school?
- Are you aware of the consequences of speeding?

Girls explored the police van and put on the sirens. It was an







amazing introduction for many of the girls who didn't know about being in the police.

We met Liz from TinlinTalks.org who gave a tour of the solar system, where girls explored the whole universe. Girls were amazed by facts she shared with favourites including:

- That the sun is halfway through its life, with about 5 billion years to go.
- Two galaxies are going to collide at some point in the future.
- Perseverance has just landed on Mars and is looking for fossils to see if there was life on Mars a long time ago and if humans could live there.

Key Stage 1 pupils discovered Burglar Bill and Burglar Betty running amok in the Runcie Hall on one otherwise normal school day, courtesy of the Pied Piper Theatre Company! The story – loved by many of the girls – was brought to life as they watched naughty Bill search for stolen treasures. It was a morning of much enjoyment. The girls are eagerly awaiting Burglar Bill's return next year!

These few highlights are a taste of what the girls have enjoyed – a huge thank you to all those who have created wonderful learning opportunities – and memories – for our pupils.■

urbiton High School's vibrant art studio is always brimming with pupils and an array of co-curricular clubs; from set design and craft to photography and digital drawing. This year was no exception!

The Surbiton Showcase of Visual Arts exhibited exceptional work across all three schools. Having Prep School pupils and their parents alongside Sixth Form work was a fantastic opportunity as younger pupils couldn't help but be inspired by the older students' work. The atmosphere for this evening was a real feeling of celebration for all the pupils' achievements and amazing creativity.

On a Wednesday lunchtime, we ran a weekly art club where Year 7 pupils were encouraged to try out new mediums, materials and ideas! Over this year, they've experimented with drawing, sculpture, collaborative making and painting.

Year 8 went to the Natural History Museum to sketch the range of specimens there to inspire their 'Art and Environment' projects. They really enjoyed drawing from the collection and developed their observational drawing skills.

Year 11 artists visited the Tate Modern to begin their examination project with the theme, 'Lock'. They were hugely





inspired by the different artists' work and created some fantastic observational drawings in response to help with the development of their ideas.

The A-level students went on an amazing trip to Florence and Rome at the beginning of the academic year during October half term. The students saw some world-renowned architecture and artworks; there was a fantastic mixture of historical and contemporary work on view. The students enjoyed long days of autumn sunshine eating ice cream and looking at masterpieces.

Every Wednesday, our A-level students were invited to attend life drawing sessions as a co-curricular activity. Not only are these sessions a vital part of a portfolio application, but life drawing is also a tremendous discipline to learn, as well as one which provides a relaxing pastime.

Gifted and Talented

Another element of our diverse Art Department is our Gifted and Talented Art Programme. This year, pupils took part in various projects and collaborations with other departments within the School and also local galleries! Highlights include creating a 3D slotted sculpture, exhibiting at a music evening where the Music Scholars performed a piece written by Dave Webb, our Composer in Residence. The Art students responded to the piece in the style of Wassily Kandinsky, an artist who saw colour and pattern when listening to music.

Another highlight was the workshop day and exhibition at The Stanley Picker Gallery; pupils created in response to our Artist in Residence Lydia Moraitis. Lydia, who uses collage and

screen printing as her main mediums creates from her own experiences; writing poetry, she then forms screen printed sculptures with found imagery that relates to the lines in the poem. We asked the pupils to do the same but in response to a poem by David Whyte entitled 'Working Together' and encouraged the pupils to find imagery in response. During an all-day workshop within the gallery space, they then painted and printed from their images.



In our workshop, we listened to a staff member of Stanley Picker talk about the inner workings of a gallery and what it's like behind the scenes. Finally, we discussed what it means to curate a space and how to put work together in an interesting way, which resulted in a wonderful showcase of their work at The Stanley Picker Gallery!

Artist in Residence

Our Artist in Residence, Lydia Moraitis is an emerging artist who works primarily with screen printing. Lydia's work explores confessions of fear, love, loss, and an element of poetic humour. She uses imagery gathered from magazines before screen printing them onto MDF, subverting them alongside autobiographical iconography/symbology relating to her personal experiences. Reminiscent of their original form, the cut of the paper is mimicked in the shape of the MDF,



allowing for copycat tears and jagged scissor lines. Her debut solo show took place at TM Lighting Gallery in August.

GCSE and A-level Exhibitions

The GCSE and A-level exhibitions took place in June. They were excellent showcases of all the work produced by Year 11 and Year 13 at the end of their GCSE or A-level course. The Art Department turned the art studio into an amazing exhibition space for both these events. This not only showed the work at its best for the external moderator but was also a fantastic celebration of all the pupils' superb work.

We're looking forward to the creativity next year will bring!





ART HISTORY

s a dedicated A-level subject, students in Year 12 looked at two thematic topics this year, Nature and Identity, before focusing on two different time periods in Year 13 – Baroque and 19th century France and England. We had a fantastic trip in October where

France and England. We had a fantastic trip in October where we were able to visit Florence and Rome, touring around fantastic sites such as the Uffizi, Piazalle Michelangelo, the Duomo, the National Gallery of Contemporary of Modern Art, the Colosseum and many more, soaking in the food, culture and plethora of art on display.

Throughout the year, we have also taken advantage of the galleries on our doorstep, including visits to the Victoria Miro Gallery, Tate Britain and more recently, the National Gallery, looking at works directly related to our course, such as 'Whistlejacket', 'The Arnolfini Portrait' and 'Bathers at Asnières'.

Students also entered the National ARTiculation competition, a public speaking contest where pupils present a seven to ten-minute speech on a work of art of their choice, answering questions from a live audience. Year 12 student, Nina H, successfully went through to the regional round with a fascinating talk on John Singer

Sargent's 'Carnation, Lily, Lily, Rose' at The Lightbox in Woking. She received some excellent feedback from the adjudicators, and only narrowly missed going through the following round.

The Art History lecture series, as part of Community in the Classroom, continues to be ever popular, focusing on different themes each week looking at works of art history around the world, throughout time.



It is so fantastic that Art History is fully implemented into students' learning from Key Stage 3 through to GCSE where, within their Art lessons, they have dedicated sessions looking at a vast array of works, focusing on a particular theme, such as nationality or landscape. This not only hones their skills in visual interpretation, but also introduces students at a young age to the rich history of the world around us.

History of Art Club has become a wonderful environment for students to freely discuss any artworks, artists, artistic movements or indeed galleries they have been to, and is a fantastic time for some unstructured discussion with a huge variety of topics covered.

BUSINESS & ECONOMICS

he Business and Economics Department has continued to thrive with over 100 students taking the subjects across Years 12 and 13. This enthusiasm has been further backed up with over half of our Year 13 students intending to read Business or Economics-related degrees at university next year. In the classroom, we focused on ethical business behaviours, the cost-of-living crisis, gender equality, and climate change. As governments struggle to grasp the enormity of the climate crisis, it is clear our students have a vision for building a greener, more equitable global economy.

Surbi Sunrise, our Friday breakfast club, continues to be a huge hit. Over 30 pupils from our department, and Politics and Sociology, join Mr Fitch bright and early to digest the weekly news over coffee and croissants. This is an exciting, open forum where current affairs are explained, but also debated by students in a university seminar-style environment. We have covered topics ranging from Chinese influence in Africa to the political implications of the Coronation.

Our Year 13 economists were very generously hosted by the London Stock Exchange Group (LSEG) in their shiny head offices in London. We also visited the Bank of England Museum and had a tour of the heart of the city by Mr Fitch himself. The students learned about how financial markets first started up in London, the role the Bank of England plays in stabilising our economy, and even got to hold a solid bar of gold! The real highlight of the trip was to hear two successful women at LSEG discuss the opportunities for women today and gain a few tips on how to stand out and be successful. We have also





started a work experience programme with LSEG, shadowing a senior account manager and so far, it has been an enormous success. This year, we had three formal applications and we conducted job-style interviews to help choose the student who will gain the experience next year.

This year, we had external speakers illustrating the impacts our subjects have on the real world. Our economists were treated to a talk by the Chief Economist at Santander Bank, Frances Haque. The students engaged in a great Q&A session about the impacts of rising interest rates and the fear of banking instability with the failures of US banks such as SVB. Our Business students got to hear from Tara Hallam, a senior consultant at Accenture Song. Tara explained her role in helping businesses launch new products, deliver marketing strategies, and help target key client demographics. The students were amazed at how many of the A-level terms Tara used in her day-to-day job.

Our pupils have also taken part in many competitions throughout the year. We entered a team into the Wharton Business School KWHS Investment Competition, where students created an investment portfolio for a client to meet their specific financial and social needs. The teams traded in real time and learned invaluable lessons about investment theory and the stock market. We have also had great entries into essay competitions, where two students have earned distinctions for their well-researched and evaluated work.

This has been a busy and exciting year for the department and while we say a sad goodbye to our Year 13s, we look forward to what's in store next year!



CAREERS & WORK EXPERIENCE

New Morrisby Functionality

Over 400 pupils undertake Morrisby Psychometric Careers Profiling annually: an interest-based version in Year 7; a Year 9 re-test ahead of GCSE choices, and a fuller version in Year 10 including an interest's questionnaire, aptitude and personality tests. This year, we rolled out the Morrisby tracker system meaning we can better identify career interests and target pupils with relevant activities.

Gatsby Benchmarks and Essential Skills

Career-related activities accompany a review activity on Morrisby, connected to the eight Gatsby career excellence benchmarks such as employer encounters and personal guidance. These review activities also connect to the government's eight essential skills such as teamwork and communication.

Over time, we can track provision to make sure it covers the Gatsby benchmarks and essential skills. Pupils can also provide feedback. We're delighted that the vast majority of our careers activities have scored 4/5 or above, no mean feat given how careers provision has habitually been considered in schools!





Expanding Virtual and In-Person Career Guidance Interviews in Younger Year Groups

We use virtual interview software helping pupils practice employment interviews. We led the country in adapting the software to deliver career guidance interviews (emulated by other schools). In only a few years, over 1,000 Surbiton High School pupils have undertaken these interviews.

While a great innovation, there is no substitute for a live interview. Alongside 1-2-1 interviews in Years 11 and 12, we introduced Year 8 group career interviews, with a member of the careers or Sixth Form teams getting pupils thinking about what they can do to explore future options, e.g., GCSE choices.

Careers Department Interviews

Over 350 Year 11 and 12 career interviews with Morrisby feedback and write-ups. We also delivered an evening reenacting interview formats used by medical, dental and veterinary schools.

Higher Education and Careers Fair

Over 40 universities and over 20 professionals provided consultation aiding career and university planning.

Career Talks

Including from: Alumna, Harriet, gave a talk on medical school and medical careers in the Army and RAF. Jen Sullivan in our

Development Department spoke to students about management consultancy and Frances Haque, Chief Economist at Santander, visited the School.

Application Support

The Careers Department supported many university applications and several apprenticeships applications.

PSHE

Each year group had at least one careers PSHE, including:

- Year 12 five tutor periods for our award-nominated university small-group supervisions allowing students to explore super-curricular activities to confirm their degree subject choice and strengthen their personal statements.
- Year 10 CV and Application Form Writing.
- Year 8 The Step into the NHS/Future Factor Careers competitions. We are delighted to announce that Kate S, Sophia M and Isabel M-E won the 2023 London region award in 'The Step into The NHS Careers' competition for their video advert entry promoting a career as a haematologist.





WORK EXPERIENCE

Year 11 Work Experience Week is just the start of active career exploration. The many benefits include the opportunity to investigate a career and decide if it is the right choice. Pupils also start developing transferable skills. Over the week, they complete a journal created by us to reflect on and capture their career learning. Throughout Year 11, pupils attend PSHE lessons to help with career planning and preparation for work experience week, including:

- Networking to secure work experience.
- Inspiration from current Year 12 students who share their work experience stories.
- How to prepare and get the most of Work Experience Week.
- Work experience debrief, by sharing their learning with peers.











CLASSICS

Autumn Term

We kicked off the term by inviting pupils to join one of the many Classics Clubs we offer including Year 7 Myth Makers Club, Greek Stretch and Challenge Club, and the Senior Classics Society.

We enjoyed a brilliant trip to Greece to experience archaeological sites we've been studying. We started in Athens, ascending the Acropolis and admiring the beautiful Parthenon and its neighbouring buildings. We explored the rest of the city on foot and a highlight was the National Archaeological Museum in which there were many of the artefacts our GCSE and A-level students study. Next, we journeyed to Delphi and ascended Mount Parnassus to experience the wonderful atmosphere of this ancient sanctuary. We visited Olympia, the location of the first Olympic games well over 2,500 years ago and ran the original running race, which became very competitive! We spent our final days near Mycenae, the mythical home of infamous King Agamemnon. We were first at the site one morning and it was so atmospheric discovering it with no other tourists around. This trip was a huge success and meant that many classicists were able to form firm friendships across year groups and indulge in their enthusiasm for the ancient world.

Our passionate Sixth Formers enjoyed teaching an interactive session to Year 4 pupils from St Andrew's and St Mark's Primary School before Christmas, who visited us as part of their ancient world project. The children loved re-enacting a Roman sacrifice and learning some new Latin words in the process!

Spring Term

First, we had a small but extremely enthusiastic group of pupils enter the annual Greek and Latin reading competition where they were pitted against hundreds of local school pupils to compete for the prize of kudos alone: to be the best speaker of Latin or Greek in the southeast! Our pupils competed valiantly and Evelyn L in Year 12, came away with the senior Greek solo prize.

We ran an all-day workshop in ancient Greek theatre with the Actors of Dionysus theatre company as part of our Ancient World Day for Year 7. Pupils donned costumes and masks and thanks to our wonderful catering team, even enjoyed a Roman-inspired lunch!

Our Senior Classics Society were busy recording revision podcasts on aspects of the A-level course and continued to build our classical community by attending a theatre trip together at the National Theatre; 'Phaedra' was an engaging take on the myth made famous by Euripides, Seneca and later the French writer, Racine. The pupils loved it and it's always brilliant to see the Classics inspiring modern literature and culture!

Summer Term

We hosted 60 pupils, parents and staff members for the Classics Quiz night - a pub quiz evening, with questions on general knowledge, but with a classical twist. Rounded off with a curry and some 'Taskmaster'-style games, it was a very fun evening and one that celebrated our wonderful Classics community!

For our final trip of the year, Year 9 pupils went to Oxford, to enjoy the amazing exhibition at the Ashmolean Museum: 'Labyrinth'. An exploration of the Mycenaean world through video reconstructions and beautiful artefacts. The pupils who have chosen Classical Civilisation as a GCSE option, came away excited for their courses to start in September! Topped off with a walking tour of Oxford and lunch at Pizza Express, all in all, it was a great day!



CO-CURRICULAR

e are committed to providing a broad and balanced curriculum, aiming to support pupils in achieving their best academic qualifications, while enriching their lives beyond the classroom. As Ken Robinson once said, "Whether or not you discover your talents and passions is partly a matter of opportunity." With this philosophy in mind, we strive to create ample opportunities for pupils to explore their interests and talents.

This year, we offered an impressive selection of over 157 co-curricular clubs covering various interests, including chess, archaeology, sports, drama productions, music classes, academic clinics, and stretch and challenge clubs. Each year, co-curricular clubs are seamlessly integrated into the School's daily activities, including the House system, charities, and enterprise initiatives. In September 2022, we hosted Co-Curricular Fairs where pupils had the opportunity to meet teachers and staff members to ask questions and sign up for the clubs they were interested in.

Drama, dance, music, and sports form the pillars of the co-curricular provision at Surbiton High School. The drama and dance clubs provided pupils with the chance to perform on stage or work behind the scenes as AV technicians. The Music Department offered various ensembles, choirs, and orchestras, while the Sports Department presented an extensive range of options such as athletics, cricket, football, equestrian, gymnastics, hockey, netball, rowing, skiing, and tennis.


COMPUTING


Dance Scholars

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

e are delighted that our pupils completed excellent outcomes in the Non-Examined Assessment projects, designing and developing a very wide variety of creative ideas, from dog beds to architectural models. Pupils excelled themselves, using traditional craft techniques combined with modern techniques such as 3D printing and laser cutting.

It has been a busy year for our co-curricular clubs. Costume Club worked on live projects within School and the wider community. In autumn, we researched, designed and made crinolines and bonnets for the Year 8/9 performance of 'A Christmas Carol', and helped with wardrobe backstage. Evie and Millie, two Year 12 Product Design students also made a Minotaur costume for the Year 7 play.

We worked on a project called 'Windows on the World' in association with The University of Edinburgh. The project involved displaced children in Ritzona camp in Greece. A team from Edinburgh University are working with performing arts and creative arts therapy to improve well-being and this will culminate in a production in Greece.

Costume club designed and manufactured part of the textile set, reusing materials and preparing specialist dyed fabrics for their costume. We were thrilled to collaborate with The Natural History Club experimenting with some natural dyeing techniques, reducing the environmental impact.

Year 12 and 13 Fashion and Textiles students visited the factory that makes the costumes for the Strictly Come Dancing series.







Students were thoroughly impressed by both the quality of the fabrics and the meticulousness and efficiency of the workshop. From stretchy Lycra to breathable mesh, they witnessed a variety of fabrics in vibrant jewel tones and the design sketches by the designer, Vicky Gill, and the manufacturing specifications for the different garments. They witnessed the workshop itself, full of talented seamstresses and tailors. They gained an invaluable insight for their A-level examination into both bespoke and batch productions.

We invited ex-pupil, Sophie G back to speak to the Fashion and Textile Year 12 students. Sophie is in her last year at The London College of Fashion and will start her MA in Fashion at The Royal Academy of Art in September. Sophie shared her work and brought in samples of different fabrics which she has created. She did an excellent Q & A session with the students, who were inspired and impressed with her work.

Year 12 students visited Kingston University's impressive product design studios and were treated to a tour of the department and its facilities, where they were able to gain an insight into further education and careers in this field.

Mrs Morito led a Bullet Journalling Graphics Club, where the pupils learned how to plan pages with month-to-view, mood trackers and playlists. The pupils enjoyed contributing their own ideas for page designs and themes. They learned about different fonts for different purposes and have practised brush lettering to create beautiful page headers.

Our new DT Technician, Mr Thomson, launched the Picture Book Club; a Friday lunchtime co-curricular activity appealing to budding illustrators. Pupils created artwork for a story and the book is going to be published and sold to raise money for Children in Need.



DRAMA

Year 8 & 9 Production

The Year 8 and 9 Production was the spookily titled 'A Christmas Carol – A Ghost Story,' written by Mark Gatiss. Pupils took on this iconic story both as actors onstage and as backstage crew working behind the scenes. Iris J successfully took on the challenge of playing Scrooge, ably supported by a large ensemble cast, who brought to life the many different characters within the world of the play. This production was a testament to the determination and dedication of our talented pupil company.

Year 7 Production

In the Summer Term we produced our first ever 'Year 7 Double Bill'. The SAR was transformed to create both a magical courtroom and a ruined Grecian temple. 'A Fairy Tale Courtroom', written by Dana Proulx, was comedic, light-

hearted, and entertaining! The ensemble-driven piece of drama in the style of physical theatre brought to life the story of two, extremely mischievous villains. The show involved audience participation and the brilliant comedy allowed us to hear the testimonies of the villains who have prevented the public from living happily ever after. From the deep, dark forest, an enchanted castle, and the magical land of Oz we met with

some of our favourite fairy tale friends who shared with us their journeys and stories throughout the night. Guilty or not quilty, that is the question!

Half of our Year 7 actors ventured into the world of ancient Greek Mythology in Laramie Dean's moving play, 'The Gorgon Sisters'. This was an ambitious piece of character driven storytelling, following the eldest Gorgon sister, Stheno's, quest to bring her deceased sister, Medusa, back from the dead. The Gorgons may be monsters, the characters within the play fantastical, but the themes that the pupils explored and performed so beautifully and sincerely to our audiences are so very human and timeless.







Senior Drama Company

In March, our Senior Drama Company crashed a plane in the tropical island that was once the Main Hall. Pupils from across Years 10 to 13 emerged from the wreckage as a group of young 1950s girls. Soon, order turned to disorder, fires escape their control, the girls use masks of blood to dehumanize themselves, and their growing obsession with hunting and death leads them to murder and savagery.

In only six short weeks of rehearsal time, our older talented cast and crew worked with energy and passion in their creation of this bold and experimental performance. Their in-the-round audience were sensorially confronted with onstage fights, flashing lights, haze, dead bodies, and loud soundscapes. The audience watched with horror as our excellent actors performed

these well-behaved and disciplined schoolgirls and then altered their characters into increasingly darker versions of themselves. This experience has grown our pupils as character actors and the ensemble were highly committed. It was clear the pupils were having a fantastic experience and the audience were too.

An Evening of Musical Theatre

In May, pupils involved in the Senior Musical Theatre Ensemble performed in our second annual 'Musical Theatre Cabaret'. The pupils presented a range of musical theatre numbers that were contrasting, unique and dynamic, and challenged them. They shared their contagious energy and passion with the audience. The supportive, energetic, and creative nature of the pupils created a 'buzz of excitement' amongst the audience.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH

his year has been a busy one for Duke of Edinburgh, with two assessments for Bronze, a Silver training and a Silver assessment at the end of June.

Wrapping around these expeditions, we offered after-school training opportunities, covering aspects of expedition skills

such as route planning and navigation, dealing with incidents and food planning, alongside some online content for our participants to access to reinforce their learning. Take-up has been good and we really hope it's made a difference to everyone who's accessed it.

A huge thank you goes to all the school staff who gave up weekends for training and assessed expeditions, manning checkpoints, providing much needed advice and encouragement - as well as tracking down the occasional 'geographically challenged' group - we're never lost, just temporarily misplaced...

In other outdoor education opportunities, Year 7 all went to PGL at Hindhead in September, where groups took part in climbing, giant swings, bushcraft, orienteering, blind trails

and more – a fantastic way for the new year group to get to know each other, make friends and start working in teams early in their Senior School journey with us.

Since September, Year 8 pupils have had the opportunity to do some Outdoor Adventure Activity lessons as part of their sports curriculum, which were well received. We've covered

working as part of a team, the importance of insulation, shelter and hot drinks, and navigation and finished with a lesson on campcraft, featuring tents and hot chocolate! A really good lead into future DofE participants.

This year we were lucky to have the opportunity to take our A-level Literature students to The Rose Theatre to see Oscar Wilde's 'The Importance of Being Earnest'. A fusion of the modern and the contemporary, this vibrant re-telling was an absolute joy. We visited the New Wimbledon Theatre to see 'An Inspector Calls'; the directorial choices provoked a lot of discussion on Priestley's intentions for his characters. And, back by popular demand, the English staff – under Mr Sebastian's directorship – once again performed our very own radio performance of the play to our Year 11. Pupils valued seeing their teachers in a different context, revising the text in

a collaborative and fun way. In addition, Mr Allan deftly navigated the train and tube strikes, determined to get our GCSE students to the highly acclaimed production of 'To Kill a Mockingbird' at the Gielgud. All those who attended were blown away by seeing Lee's masterpiece enacted on stage.

Mr Allan has been teaching adult learners this year, as we offered, for the first time, the IGCSE English Language as part of our outreach programme. Mr Allan guided

learners through the complexities of the

Edexcel Specification B qualification. After the success of her English Language GCSE last year, Ms Huntley sat the paper alongside her own pupils!

In preparation for exams season, Miss Hajialexandrou and Mrs Goldhawk offered masterclasses for Year 11s; Mr Sebastian compiled a comprehensive range of online clinics and podcasts to assist our examination groups; and all English teachers were on hand to deliver surgeries and clinics.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank each member of the team for their expertise, energy and enthusiasm this year, and for the incredible support they offer to all our fantastic pupils. Here's to another year!

GEOGRAPHY

his year, our Geography students have continued to enjoy getting back outside for fieldwork. In October 2022, Year 11 pupils investigated the characteristics of the River Tillingbourne at Juniper Hall FSC in Dorking. The pupils used the data they collected to support their understanding of river landscapes and flood management. This involved measuring velocity, width and depth and in some cases emptying rather waterlogged wellies!

In order to prepare for their A-level coursework, Year 12 geographers experienced both coastal and urban fieldwork techniques with a residential trip to Swanage in February. Despite some rather windy weather, the students had a great time, seeing many coastal and urban processes happening first hand. Year 12 students also travelled to Stratford in April, to investigate some of the various impacts of the sports-led regeneration that has taken place there since the Olympic Games in 2012.

The Year 7 geographers investigated some of the potential traffic issues in the local surrounding area of the School. Year 8 pupils travelled to Kingston to assess the impact of regeneration in the town centre. We are very much looking forward to more trips over the coming year to further broaden pupils' experiences of the natural and human world.

he Green & Silver Club is the Alumni Association of Surbiton High School and –as this quick review of some of the highlights of this year shows – so much more. Our Green & Silver Community of current and former pupils, staff and parents stand ready to support and inspire each other and members can access the collective knowledge and experience of the community throughout their lifetime.

Indeed, the key aim of the Club is to celebrate all that is Surbiton High School and to provide opportunities to rekindle and create new connections between members. In addition, we seek to raise funds for the Green & Silver Sixth Form Bursary Award and are enormously grateful to all those who have supported us this year.

In School

Alumnae returned to provide career talks, judge competitions such as the Fashion Show and Science Exhibition, mentor, and offered support by email. HISTORY

ear 7s kicked off their voyage into the past by considering a big question - what did people around the world believe in the Middle Ages? Pupils travelled along the route of the historic Silk Roads, before arriving in England in 1066, ready for the Norman invasion and conquest. Year 8s investigated England's most infamous family, the Tudors - does Mary I deserve her 'Bloody Mary' reputation? How did Elizabeth I manipulate her image? Year 9 conducted a local history study of the women's suffrage movement. They handled sources describing the activities of local suffragettes which ranged from tea parties in the Assembly Rooms, to burning down a cinema in Kingston in an effort to reach a judgement on whether we agree with historian Fern Riddell's assessment of suffragettes as terrorists! This provoked lots of discussion and debate the heartbeat of any history classroom!

Years 10 historians commenced learning about Germany 1890 to 1945. They followed the journey of how the German Empire became the Weimar Republic after the disaster of World War One as Germany embraced democracy, and then sudden economic crisis led to Hitler's dictatorship, and ultimately to World War Two. Pupils used the recent groundbreaking book, 'A Village in the Third Reich,' which examines the villagers of one mountain village through the rise of Nazism, to address questions of complicity and collective responsibility.

Year 13 historians put the finishing touches to their non-examined assessments – 4,500 word essays worth 20% of their overall A-level grade – which they started in Year 12. Unlike many schools, Surbiton High School students are given free reign over their topic of investigation. As always, the range of topics was outstanding: from the patterns of Victorian urban crime to American foreign policy and the reasons for the downfall of Tsardom in Russia.

Years 8 and 9 developed their collaboration skills with mini projects linked to their enquiry questions. Year 8 journeyed through the continent of Africa to research and establish aspects of art, culture, government and religion in different eras

and areas before the establishment of the transatlantic slave trade. This culminated in a cross-curricular mini marketplace activity during PSHE, where pupils set up their findings in the style of a museum exhibition, and invited pupils from other classes to visit. In a parallel project, Year 9 considered the impact of troops from the British empire in the First World War. In small groups within their classes, pupils researched why soldiers from as far away as India, Australia and Canada would fight in a war for a country they had never visited. This led to some insightful discussion and reflection on how the First World War is commemorated in each country, and whether the contributions of empire soldiers is adequate.

In March, Year 11 historians embarked on a trip to 17th century London. A mix of historical detail, promenade theatre, musical

interludes and a coffee-tasting session, this trip was tailor made by the historian Dr Matthew Green in order to deepen pupils' understanding of the impact of Restoration coffee houses, which forms an essay question of the GCSE examinations. Despite the snowy weather conditions, the pupils left with smiles on their faces, in no small part to the interjections of Pasqua Rosée, the first coffee shop owner in London, who serenaded us around London! The group also visited St Paul's Cathedral to

take in the majesty and brilliance of Wren's architecture.

Year 7 enjoyed a historical visit to Windsor Castle to gather evidence for their project on a castle's purpose – for defence, power, or as a status symbol. Pupils had a brilliant time exploring the site, from the ramparts to the staterooms, and even to St George's Chapel where they saw the resting places of Queen Elizabeth I and King Henry VIII. They also attended a highly enjoyable workshop, complete with dressing up costumes.

Year 12 historians had a glorious trip to London encompassing the Tower of London and a Tudor-style journey via water taxi to Westminster Abbey. The students took part in several tours and a workshop on the Mid-Tudor crisis. It was fantastic for them to be able to see and experience the sites where so many significant events of the Tudor period took place, and to walk in the footsteps of the kings and queens from over the centuries.

HOUSES & CHARITY

he House system brings a sense of vibrancy, community spirit and healthy competition to our School. Alongside this, it helps to promote our commitment to philanthropic giving and encourages the pupils to look beyond their own situations and actively support those in need.

Each Head of House works closely with their Year 12 House Leaders and Deputy Leaders to help plan, organise, and support all House events. Each House supports a local charity, voted for by the whole House. The charity gives a clear and dedicated focus to the House activities and fundraising events. This year, we have raised over £22,000 for our seven House charities and three main school charities, YuYo, KYGN and Kujuwa. We can only pass on our sincerest thanks to the parents, pupils, staff, and the whole community who have contributed and embraced the ethos of philanthropic giving.

Year 7/8 Team Building Day

The House Leaders started their tenure by helping to organise an exciting team-building morning for the new Year 7s and their buddies in Years 8 and 9. The event was introduced to solidify connections between year groups and develop a sense of community early in the school year.

The pupils had a wonderful morning, led by our Outdoor Learning expert, Mr Johnson, and took part in a huge scavenger hunt and a en masse game of Egg to Dinosaur.





Sports Aid Week

Sports Aid Week was a chance for pupils and staff to get stuck into some "organised chaos". Alongside the annual bike and ergo distance challenge, we also ran events ranging from sack races, bean bag toss and duck and spoon dash, to the hotly contested netball and staff vs pupils dodgeball. It was lovely to see so many of our community getting involved to raise awareness and funds for the Sports Aid charity.

House Public Speaking

In February, over 500 pupils from Years 7 to 9 created speeches on a topic of their choice, endured rehearsals, heats and judges to finally produce a House Team of three consisting of a proposer, a speaker and a vote of thanks.

We were delighted to welcome GB Olympian Leah Wilkinson as our guest speaker and Head Judge, and each House delivered moving and informative speeches; the competition was fierce.

Austen were victorious overall, with Manuela (Year 7), Jasmine (Year 8) and Olivia (Year 9) being highly commended for their roles.

Fashion and Arts Showcase

The highlight of the House calendar is the Fashion and Arts Showcase, with more than 800 pupils involved, making it the largest pupil-led event of the year. This year saw the introduction

of an increased 'Arts' focus with the challenging theme of 'Art and Diversity'. The Fashion Showcase provides an opportunity for all pupils to contribute towards a House piece and brings together so many leadership opportunities. There are creative outlets in outfit design, backstage organisation, make-up and accessory development, modelling, choreography, IT skills in video and music editing. The Fashion Show is also our biggest charity fundraiser and enables our constant support of our school charities; KYGN, which aims to support the education and welfare of young people in the Kilimanjaro region of Tanzania and YuYo, which provides education to all, including those impacted by disability, HIV and AIDS and Kujuwa, a period poverty charity supporting young girls in Kenya with their education. This event has raised over £97,000 in the last ten years.

RAG Week

During Raising Awareness and Giving (RAG) week, the Houses run a series of activities to raise funds and awareness for the seven main House charities. This year, the pupils participated in Sponge the Teacher, Penalty Shootout, Karaoke, Lucky Dip and Hook a Duck. We also welcomed representatives from the House charities into School to raise awareness and inform the pupils about the impact our donations will have on the lives of others.

Sports Day

The main House point event of the Summer Term is the House





Sports Day, which took place at the end of June. This is an exciting event where pupils competed in a variety of sports and gained points for their House. Points are awarded from 1st to 7th in each year group, emphasising the need to take part, as well as rewarding success. Congratulations to Austen for getting the most House points!

Throughout the year, the wonderful Sports Department help keep the competitive spirit high by leading on House Netball, House Hockey and House Rowing. Thank you for your time and commitment to keeping the House sports competition running smoothly.

The wide variety of House events means that there is something for everyone to get involved in, to display their talents, try new things and have an input into the type of charities they want to support.

LEARNING SUPPORT

he start of the academic year is always a busy time for the Learning Support Department with dyslexia screenings sweeping across Years 7, 9 and 12, as well as starting our Transition Group for Year 7. This offers a safe space to help navigate the worries and practicalities of starting a new school and coping with the difficulties of moving from a small primary setting to a large and dynamic secondary one.

As we hurtled towards Christmas, the Autumn Term became more exciting and this year, the Year 7s and 8s in Learning Support relished the opportunity to share their Christmas stories with children from the Prep Schools. This was a wonderful opportunity to use skills learned in creative writing to share with eager listeners at story time.

During the Spring Term the Handwriting and Touch-Typing Club was well underway with pupils from all year groups polishing their technique and increasing speeds. In March, we





focused on Neurodiversity Week, promoting and celebrating difference, diversity and inclusion.

Finally, the term ended on a positive note with Neil MacKay, creator of the concept of dyslexia-friendly schools and author of 'Dyslexia: Taking the Hell out of Homework', joined us for an extremely popular online presentation which offered strategies for parents and teachers to help us support our neurodiverse learners.

KYGN PSHE Project

Year 9 were once again involved in raising money for the KYGN School in Tanzania, where we built a library approximately five years ago. Fundraising endeavors included sponsored walks, making bookmarks, and a bingo session at a local care home, to name just a few. The cohort collectively raised an astonishing £7,102; a truly exceptional achievement that will make a tangible difference to KYGN, its library, and, most importantly, its children.

Read Up!

The Read Up! project involves all incoming Year 7 pupils being gifted a book by the School to read over the summer before they start with us in September. This year's book was 'The Girl Who Lost A Leopard' by Nizrana Farook, and after













participating in some lessons and competitions around the book earlier in the year, the project culminated with an enjoyable talk from Nizrana to the pupils in April. Thank you to Nizrana for agreeing to be our Read Up! author this year, and we look forward to welcoming a new author to the School for next year's equivalent project!

World Book Day

World Book Day proved to be another feast for the literary senses at Surbiton High School. A notable highlight of the day itself was, as ever, the sight of staff and pupils alike dressing up as their favourite book characters. It was a treat to then see some of these characters inhabit our cosy lunchtime corners and read to audiences at various locations across the School. Other events that spanned the week included a House Quiz that put the School's collective literary knowledge to the test and special assemblies led by Mr Humphreys, Ms Huntley, and a team of passionate Year 12 readers, which carried the all-important message that reading is transformational and life-changing, and for that reason, the School must continue to celebrate this all-important day.

MATHEMATICS

Averages from a frequency

ur primary focus in the Mathematics Department is helping our pupils to improve their ability and confidence in maths, no matter what their starting position is when they join us.

This year, we worked to achieve this by offering support clinics and intervention sessions almost every day while also challenging our most able mathematicians with trips and competitions, not forgetting our Surbiton Ultra Mathematical Society (or SUMS Club).

SUMS has continued to be popular with Year 7 pupils who need an additional challenge – they have enjoyed working with physical puzzles such as the Towers of Hanoi, and also solving tricky Maths Challenge problems that will prepare them for the UKMT Team and Individual Maths Challenges.

In Individual Challenges, Year 12s and Year 13s took the Maths Olympiad for Girls, which consists of five long questions taken over two and a half hours. Students in this

group won two Distinction and three Merit certificates. Sixth Form mathematicians were also offered the Senior Maths Challenge, in which our 63 students were awarded 24 Bronze, 13 Silver, and a Gold certificate. Our Gold certificate winner then progressed to the Senior Kangaroo round, where they



were awarded a Certificate of Merit.

The Intermediate Maths Challenge is offered to pupils in Years 9 to 11 and was taken by 82 pupils, who won 10 Gold, 15 Silver, and 23 Bronze certificates between them. Two of the pupils were awarded certificates of Merit in their Kangaroo rounds. In the Junior Maths Challenge in April, our top sets in Years 7 and 8 won 22 Gold, 56 Silver, and 36 Bronze certificates; around 85% of the pupils who took it achieved a certificate. 13 of these pupils will go on to take the follow-up Kangaroo round

later in the Summer Term.

We have run two enjoyable trips to hear talks by renowned maths communicators, to raise the aspirations of pupils and give a flavour of how maths is used in real-world contexts. In November, Year 11 pupils visited the Phoenix Theatre for a half day of Maths Inspiration talks. It was a chance to experience the UK's most inspiring maths speakers presenting mathematics live in the context of exciting, real-world applications, including crowd movement and dynamics, architecture, and

They particularly excelled in the Relay Round, coming first in this. Overall, they came a highly commendable third and, as importantly, had great fun.

cademic progress has been wonderful, with pupils engaging in lessons with their customary enthusiasm and flair. The ISI visit sparked immense pride among the MFL team, particularly

following their observation regarding pupils' fluent use of the target language in lessons. Our language ambassadors have supported younger pupils at the Girls' Prep School whilst pupils have embraced a myriad of clinics, 1:1 mentoring sessions, and Oxbridge tuition in all languages. We heartily

congratulate Juliet who secured an offer to read French and English at Oxford and wish her well with her future studies - the MFL Department could not be happier!

The year started with European Week of Languages celebrations. Year 7 dressed up in a host of national costumes, or flags reflecting their heritage. Morning breaks provided a literal bun fight as pupils jostled to buy delicious treats from France, Germany, and Spain. To cap it all, we gathered for the MFL karaoke session. What joy to hear everyone sing their hearts out to

contemporary French, German, and Spanish songs.

The French Exchange proved hugely popular with 40 Surbiton pupils matched to 40 pupils from Le Collège International in Fontainebleau. French pupils visited Surbiton in March and had a wonderful time visiting Windsor Castle, Hampton Court Palace and enjoying a host of activities with their Surbiton "corress". The return visit to France was a huge success with pupils visiting Paris (including the Eiffel Tower and a bateau mouche trip), Fontainbleu and spending a weekend in the homes of their French hosts.

The Spanish Department travelled to Costa Rica. We flew to San José, where pupils enjoyed Spanish lessons in the sun and visited a local orphanage which was an emotional but highly rewarding experience. We travelled to Reserva Pacuare, a seasonal nesting area for leatherback turtles where biologists, volunteers, and scientists work together to preserve the natural habitat of this docile animal. We spent two days helping with important projects and discovering more about the turtles' habitat. Next was the Cahuita National Park, a terrestrial and marine national park. Pupils explored the marine life in the various aquatic forests and learned about the ecosystems of the Caribbean coast. We went on a boat trip to the Cahuita Coral Reef, where pupils snorkelled in the colourful coral reefs, followed by visiting a sloth sanctuary. We then departed for the rural area of La Fortuna, trekked into the Arenal Volcano National Park, enjoyed a canopy tour, and

> relaxed at the mineral Baldi Hot Springs. back in San José.

> Sixth Form Spanish students attended the British Film Institute to learn about filmmaker Pedro Almodóvar's themes and styles. Dr Miguel García and Professor Sarah Wright talked, mostly in Spanish, about the complexity of Almodóvar's characters, the effects of different camera angles, recurrent themes and how the social and political situation in Spain, both past and present,

are portrayed in his films. We watched the award-winning film, 'Volver' (2006). The vivid colours and poignant scenes did not leave any student (or teacher!) numb, but rather sparked debate, both on our walk back to Waterloo and in our subsequent lessons.

MUSIC

ractical music-making is at the heart of our KS3 curriculum, through which pupils explore the three main strands of music: performance, composition, and appraisal. Throughout KS3, pupils learn about a range of diverse musical topics, including Keyboard skills and learning to play either flute or clarinet in Year 7, African Drumming and Samba in Year 8, and Popular Music and Film Music in Year 9. Each topic encourages pupils to develop an appreciation of how music is constructed, produced, and influenced by different times and places.

Autumn, Winter, Spring and Summer Concerts

Our termly concerts have once again been a highlight in the calendar as a chance to show off all the hard work of our choirs and ensembles. All ensembles perform at least three times per academic year, with many ensembles additionally performing in assembly, Prize Giving, Carol Services and Founder's Day. We are proud to host over 25 rehearsals per week, with groups ranging from percussion to a cappella and everything in between!

St Andrew's - Awaking & Sleeping

The annual Spring and Choral Orchestral is the highlight of the Music Department calendar. Every year, pupils from Year 6 to Year 13 come together to create a combined choir of over 100 people. This year, the choirs and orchestra presented pieces of work around the theme of 'awaking and sleeping'. The finale performance was of Rutter's 'Mass of the Children' and featured four Senior School soloists – Inès, Katy, Molly and Alice.

'Legally Blonde'

The Music Department had another successful year with the School Musical in what was one of the most challenging musical scores yet! Pupils were challenged with the task of very little musical breaks and playing straight on from one number to the next in different tempos, styles, keys and quick instrument changes. It was a music-heavy musical and the pit band members, lead singers and chorus members handled it expertly. Auditions were held in the Spring Term, and we eagerly anticipated the rehearsals beginning after the Summer break. Before we knew it, show week was upon us and the cast and crew were residents of the New Wimbledon Theatre.

The Oxbridge Programme Saw Another Busy Year

Mr McDermott met over 80 Year 12 applicants to the programme, discussing a possible application and what subjects and universities to consider. Each student joining the programme was assigned a mentor to help with exploring prospective subjects, choosing subjects and institutions and application preparation. They undertook mock test and interview days, helping students assess their strengths and development points as applicants and helping refine institution and subject choice.

Inspiring the Next Generation of Oxbridge Applicants!

40 Year 11 pupils attended the Oxford University trip and were shown around Somerville College by Dina, a 2022 leaver, studying German. Julia, a 2022 leaver studying Philosophy, Politics and Economics (PPE), delivered a tour of Hertford College before a professional level admissions talk. Pupils also handled giant Madagascan hissing cockroaches and participated in a Brussels sprout tasting experiment during an evolution workshop at the University's Natural History Museum.

A large Year 9 group visited Cambridge University, exploring the Museum of Classical Archaeology, colleges, and an essential part of Cambridge: punting!

Oxbridge Outreach

Mr McDermott has shared the School's expertise with United Learning Schools, building capacity in United Learning Academies to run effective university and Oxbridge programmes. Elms Academy in Clapham saw four Oxbridge offers in 2023. Prior, they hadn't received an Oxbridge offer in 12 years.

PHILOSOPHY & RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Year 9 began their studies with a challenging and thoughtprovoking study of medical ethics. We explored ideas around what we value alongside concepts including autonomy, quality of life, and personhood, then applied these to ethical scenarios including the treatment of animals, euthanasia, abortion, and fertility treatments. The Spring Term began by studying the core theological beliefs of Christianity,

Religious Studies course which we began with a unit on 'Relationships & Families'.

Several Year 9 students have furthered their interest in philosophical concepts in Mr Cheal's weekly co-curricular Philosophy Club.

which provided a firm foundation for the GCSE

his has been an exciting year in the Philosophy & Religious Studies Department (PRS).

We were thrilled to welcome a large Year
7 cohort, whose boundless enthusiasm and
engagement in discussing philosophical topics
such as "How can I know anything is real?" and "Can I trust
my senses?" resulted in passionate discussions in every
classroom. In spring, we began a critical study of the religion of
Islam, including a trip to The Baitul Futuh Mosque in Morden,
where they learned about the history and use of the building,
and took a guided tour of the museum and prayer halls.

Year 8 began with an introductory study of Buddhist philosophy, exploring ideas such as suffering, attachment, and self. The whole year group visited the Buddhapadipa Temple in Wimbledon and were in awe of both the architecture of the building and grounds, and the practices of the community. The Spring Term followed with an exploration of the ethics of punishment, including the nature of moral responsibility and the philosophical concept of moral luck. Our year ended with an overview of minority truth claims, introducing the concept of truth, and belief systems such as Taoism, Baha'i, Jainism, and Rastafari, among others.



Key Stage 3 pupils had the opportunity to submit an entry for the prestigious Independent Schools Religious Studies Association's (ISRSA) essay competition. Each year group could choose from three essay titles on Religion, Philosophy, or Theology, and this year we had the largest number of entrants for this competition.

GCSE classes have explored 'Religion, Philosophy, and Ethics in the Modern World' and theological beliefs and religious practices in Judaism and Christianity. Year 10 pupils visited the Jewish Museum in Camden in the Spring Term and participated in a workshop on 'The Nature of G-d through Jewish Festivals'. Some of the Year 10 pupils have also engaged in broader discussions on moral issues in the weekly co-curricular Ethics Discussion Group led by Ms Cameron,





where pupils had the opportunity to lead the discussion on a topic of interest to them. For our Year 11s, the key focus was the mock exams in January. We were impressed with the mature attitude they showed in preparation for both the mocks and their final exams.

GCSE classes have explored 'Religion, Philosophy, and Ethics in the Modern World' and theological beliefs and religious practices in Judaism and Christianity

Year 12 and Year 13 students relished their studies in either the Philosophy or Religious Studies A-level, exploring a variety of topics such as Epistemology, Philosophy of Religion, and Moral Philosophy, among others. Students attended the Academy Masterclass on Philosophy, Ethics, and Religion in London. The speakers are experts in their field and this year the programme included Professors Alister McGrath (Oxford), Keith Ward (London), and James Orr (Cambridge) exploring the question "Is Theism rationally defendable?". Student feedback was particularly positive about the talk given by Professor Daphne Hampson on 'God and Gender', a key strand in the Religious Studies A-level course.



PHOTOGRAPHY

hotography is not only an integral part of the Art curriculum, but also an important subject in its own right. We now have many pupils taking this for both GCSE and A-level, and numbers continue to grow thanks to the fantastic success of the course.

Kew Gardens Trip

To start off the A-level project, we took the Year 12 students on a trip to Kew Gardens. They were able to document the plant life as well as the amazing architecture.

Barbican Trip

In February, GCSE and A-level Photography students attended an exhibition of work by contemporary artist, Soheila Sokhanvari, at the Barbican. Students enjoyed the opportunity to view and interact with inspiring multimedia installations. The stimulating architecture of the gallery and

surrounding area gave students the opportunity to practise their on-site photography skills and served as a springboard for new project ideas.

Florence and Rome

The A-level students went on an amazing trip to Florence and Rome at the beginning of the academic year during October half term. The students saw some world renowned

architecture and artworks; there was a fantastic mixture of historical and contemporary work on view. The students enjoyed long days of autum sunshine eating ice cream and looking at masterpieces.

POLITICS

t's been another busy year for the Politics
Department. Unprecedented national and global
political events persist; the fascinating and everchanging nature of the subject makes it one with
which pupils are keen to engage. The department continues

to educate pupils across the School about these events. We recorded podcasts on the fall of Liz Truss as well as a deep dive into the 2022 US midterm elections. The Politics and International Relations Club, run by our superb subject ambassadors, has kept pupils of all ages informed on the major political stories each week and generated lively discussions on a wide range of topics.

We have also been on several informative and engaging trips this year. The students in Year 13 attended a trip to the British Library where they heard a series of lectures

from university professors on UK and US politics and had a question-and-answer session with two recently retired US congressmen. This gave them an interesting perspective on some live issues in the US which have been largely settled here in the UK, including gun control and a woman's right to an abortion.

The Year 12s have thoroughly enjoyed their first year and are making good progress. They have been on a trip to parliament, where they were able to have a tour of the Palaces



of Westminster and attend a workshop where they were very lucky to hear from Ed Davey, MP for Kingston and Surbiton and Leader of the Liberal Democrats. He gave students a unique insight into the role of a party leader and the connection between liberal philosophy and public policy. They have also

With a UK general election and the prospect of a second Trump term both on the horizon in 2024, I'm sure the months ahead will provide ample opportunities for debate and discussion and to inform all our community of why politics really matters.

PSHE Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) & Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)

ersonal. Social. Health and Economic (PSHE) & Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) are central to every pupil's education at Surbiton High School. We pride ourselves in providing dedicated time for each year group to discuss a range of topics in weekly PSHE & RSE lessons as well as through one-to-one Form Tutor conversations, SCOPE days and inspirational speakers.

SCOPE Days

Our SCOPE days (Surbiton-Cope) are at the core of our PSHE & RSE curriculum. These drop-down sessions allow the pupils to hear high-quality speakers and have the time and space to reflect and respond with their form groups and Tutors.

The first SCOPE day of the year (October 2022) was based on the theme 'using your voice for positive change'. All pupils heard from Rebekah Pierre, a care-experienced author, journalist and social worker on her campaign to #KeepCaringto18. Pupils also took part in a variety of tasks to celebrate difference through a focus on the protected characteristics as well as fighting for change through 'dare to dream' and 'follow your heart' craftivism projects. Years 8 and 9 and the Sixth Form heard from ex-pupil, Joanna Maiden in Kenya, about her work for the Kujawa Initiative on period poverty. Years 10-13 heard from Debi Steven from Action Breaks Silence about her mission to educate and empower communities to fight against gender-based violence.

Our second SCOPE day (March 2023) focused on well-being. Pupils heard from a number of speakers on healthy lifestyles and relationships and they also took part in a range of activities including crafting, chair yoga, singing, pilates and using essential oils for positive mental health. We were delighted to welcome Fiona Spargo-Mabbs from The Daniel Spargo-Mabbs Foundation, an evidence-based drug and alcohol awareness charity to speak with Year 11. We also welcomed back a number of established speakers into School. These included IT Happens who gave age-appropriate talks to Years 7, 9 and 10 on healthy relationships and Henry Hudson, from 'People Change Minds', who spoke to Years 9 and 12 about his project on how to create a welcoming and supportive environment for LGBTQ+ people.

Community Work and Pupil Voice

As part of the PERMA framework, we encourage pupils to become involved in community work and we continue to listen to pupil voices through termly meetings with the Sixth Form Pastoral Team and the PSHE & RSE amhassadors

Speakers

As well as our SCOPE day speakers, we integrate a variety of speakers into our PSHE & RSE curriculum over the year to help support and reinforce learning inside the classroom.

Many of our speakers come from inside our school community, including the School Nurses, Counsellors, the Careers Department and Mr Gibbons' highly-valued sessions on personal finance. In addition, each year group has heard from external speakers on topics such as internet safety, puberty, finance, vaping and consent.

PSYCHOLOGY & SOCIOLOGY

e are so proud of our Year 12 and Year 13 cohorts in both Sociology and Psychology this academic year! August 2022 saw our first set of results in Sociology, with 62% of students achieving an A*. Equally impressive was that 52% of our Year 13 Psychology students achieved an A* respectively.

Our Year 13 Sociology students have impressed the department with their lively debates, their sense of social justice and pure enjoyment for the subject. They attended a trip to the Royal



Courts, in November, where they took part in a mock trial on stop and search. Both Mr Gunning and I were very impressed with the lines of argument that both sides of the court case argued.

The Psychology Department has been just as busy this academic year. Psychology Society has been growing in numbers, which demonstrates the Year 12 and 13s' eagerness to learn beyond the curriculum. They have been looking into







how the curriculum should diversify because most of the content on the specification is researched from a male perspective. Other topics that have been explored in Psychology Society have included body language, the history of delusions, photographic memories, and sleep deprivation.

Also, the Psychology Society undertook practical investigations such as using jelly beans to replicate Jenness' (1932) study on conformity to ambiguous situations and despite the study

taking place in 1932, the Psychology Society achieved the same results. Our Subject Ambassadors have been on hand to speak to Year 11s to help them in their A-level choices as well as being busy leading Scholar Lunches for Years 7 to 11. They have facilitated such topics as prejudice, aggression, and obedience. Finally, our Oxbridge applicants entered a competition at Royal Holloway where they researched and put a presentation together on, 'How Can Psychology be Used to Research the Misinformation Epidemic.'

SCHOOL MUSICAL







urbiton High School's 2022 Production of the dazzling 'Legally Blonde' was a phenomenal success. Over 2,400 audience members watched the four performances at the beautiful New Wimbledon Theatre which involved more than 150 pupils from Years 8 to 13 and countless staff. The School Musical comprised of staff from the Drama and Dance Department, the Music Department, Art Department, DT Department, AV Technicians and Communications and Marketing Team.

With rehearsals only beginning in September 2022, the company had to work incredibly hard to ensure that everything was prepared by the time show week rolled around. Unlike previous musicals, large sections of 'Legally Blonde' are

sung-through, which made rehearsals even more complicated than usual. However, the pupils involved rose to the challenge performing flawlessly on each occasion.

The wonderful community spirit that makes this event so special was once again in evidence. Whilst the week was long and tiring, the performances produced were superb, leading to countless compliments from audience members who were bowled over by the professionalism on display, with many audience members claiming that this was, once again, the best show that we've ever put on! The band included several pupils, whose performances matched those of the staff and professionals also present.





SCIENCE

he Royal Institution Science in Schools Show came to Surbiton High School with a focus on the topic of energy. Key Stage 3 pupils were amazed by exciting demonstrations on the different stores of energy and how they affect our lives. A Key Stage 2 show followed, attended by pupils from the Girls' and Boys' Preparatory Schools , and pupils from local primary schools as part of our outreach programme.

In March, the whole School participated in Science Week, coinciding with British Science Week. The week began with making slime and nylon in the Quad, and a Sixth Form debate on whether the internet has done more harm than good for connecting people. Science pop-up activities continued throughout the week with pupils making models of neurones from sweets and mobius strips from paper. Other activities included a fingerprints forensic session and explosive chemistry demonstrations. To finish off an outstanding week, we held a House Science Quiz.

In our inaugural Science Fair, pupils created their own projects on topics ranging from 'Do dogs display handedness?' to 'How will quantum entanglement provide more secure data transmissions?' Those attending commented that the standard was extremely high, including an ISI inspector! Rawan A and Keerthi A in Year 10 were crowned Senior winners, with Anika

G and Hannah B in Year 7 being crowned Junior winners.

Year 12 Science Ambassadors have worked incredibly hard to raise the profile of science in the school community and beyond. They communicated effectively at Year 6 marketplace events, the GCSE options evening and delivered the pop-up events during Science Week. They produced a half-termly Science magazine to encourage the school community to get involved in science beyond the curriculum, as well as supporting co-curricular STEM clubs. They also helped to deliver sessions for a taster day for Year 5 Girls' Prep School pupils.

During Activity Week, Year 7 pupils took part in a STEM day with the theme being sustainability. They participated in a STEM careers session, a practical competition, and a Dragons' Den session exploring ways to make the School more sustainable with the best ideas submitted to the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) for possible implementation. In July, a group of Year 7 and 8 pupils attended the Key Stage 3 STEM in Action event at the Emmanuel Centre with interactive sessions that explore a variety of STEM concepts. This was followed by an afternoon visiting the Science Museum.

Throughout the year, we have promoted diversity in science through celebrating female and BAME scientists on the science foyer screen.













Biology

n November, our A-level Biology students attended Biology Live in central London. They were inspired by lectures given by Professor Alice Roberts on how human domestication of species became central to our survival as a species, Professor Robert Winston as the pioneering expect in IVF treatment on the science of human reproduction, and the award-winning cognitive neuroscientist Professor Sarah-Jayne Blakemore on the adolescent brain. They also heard from the UK Deputy Chief Medical Officer during the pandemic, Professor Jonathan Van-Tam, on how science was able respond to Covid and how this will help us fight future disease, and Dr Adam Rutherford on the genetic inheritance of European royal families. Year 10 pupils participated in a trip to the Natural History Museum in December to develop their understanding of the theories of evolution and speciation. They researched the evidence that has been collected to support these theories, broadening their understanding of the origin and variety of life on Earth. In October, we adopted a corn snake from the Escott family. We really appreciate their generosity in donating Elmo and her vivarium. Elmo has had a huge impact on pupil engagement in ecology and there has been a marked increase in attendance at science co-curricular clubs. Pupils find her fascinating and many have reported her presence has helped them conquer their fear of snakes. In April, our chicks hatched. Pupils could watch the hatching process live from a web cam and their rapid development was studied by our Natural History Club, the Whizz Bang Pop! Club, and the Biology Stretch and Challenge Club. In June, our Year 12 biologists participated in a field studies residential trip in Exmoor. During the four-day trip, students learned about data collection, analysis of results, species diversity and conservation. They were given expert tuition and experience of being a "proper biologist" as they conducted their own investigations in grassland and freshwater habitats. Also in June, the Year 12 biologists took part in the Intermediate Biology Olympiad. Congratulations to all pupils involved!

SCIENCE







Chemistry

he Chemistry Department have continued to provide a range of learning and enrichment opportunities in the laboratory and beyond. In November, a team of four pupils competed in the Royal Society of Chemistry's Top of the Bench competition regional heats, held at St Paul's School in Barnes. Katie S and Maisie H in Year 9, Lilia M in Year 10, and Emma P in Year 11, undertook a practical-based challenge and a multiple-choice question paper, answering questions on topics covered in the specification, and challenge questions beyond the curriculum. All performed to a very high standard by demonstrating a real aptitude in Chemistry, and while the team did not advance to the national finals, they had a thoroughly enjoyable time.

In January, several Year 12 chemists participated in the extremely challenging Royal Society of Chemistry's UK Chemistry Olympiad. Our students performed well, gaining two silver certificates (Allegra B and Yifei Y), four bronze

certificates (Andrea I-P, Bailey O, Laura B and Raaniya M), as well as two certificates of participation (Tilly I and Vaisika T).

In February, many of our future Senior School pupils currently in Year 6 participated in the Discover Science live event. After listening to guidance from Mrs Osmond and Dr Keaney, our budding new chemists carried out a series of experiments in their kitchens including making indicator solution from red cabbage, testing household substances for their pH, and separating the dyes in felt-tip pen ink by using chromatography. The Chemistry Department apologises for the chaos caused in numerous kitchens throughout south-west London!

In June, Year 12 students completed the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge despite having only just finished their Year 12 exams. Katie AV, and Yifei was awarded Gold certificate and Allegra B, Laura B, Maya KM, Phoebe W and Tillie I, were awarded Copper certificate and Natasha VC was awarded a participation certificate.

Many Year 13 students have offers from distinguished universities to study Chemistry related degrees, including two who have offers from Oxford to study Chemistry. We wish all our Year 13 chemists the best of luck in their future studies!

Physics

he Physics Department has been particularly active in entering Surbiton High School pupils for national competitions this year – a grand total of 260 entries from across every year group were made into eight different papers. One of our most inspiring successes was in the flagship British Physics Olympiad Round 1, sat by fourteen A-level physicists in November, where we provided the highest number of female entrants of any school in the country. Top performers were Esme G (Year 12) and Alex B (Year 13), with plenty of promise for the future. Astrophysics competitions, a new feature at Surbiton High School drew in twenty-six students in the Autumn Term, with Emilie B and Anuli K (Year 12) coming top in the Senior paper and Evie K (Year 9) impressing in the Junior paper placing her in the top 20% nationally.

In the main Physics Challenge papers, we go from strength to strength in both number of entrants and quality of results. Izzy S (Year 12) shone in the second round of the Senior competition, coming in the top 10% nationally, while Magdalena M (Year 11) dominated in the first round (despite sitting it a year early!) as well as being the top in the School in both rounds of the Intermediate paper. The Junior paper was sat in May by twenty-one pupils from Year 7 to Year

10 where all achieved at least a bronze, with Lilia M, Alice F and Sydney F all achieving gold, putting them in the top 15% nationally.

In May, fifteen of our Year 12 physicists put their hat in the ring to compete in the Isaac Physics Senior Physics Challenge. Katie A V was one of the top 50 entrants out of thousands from across the UK and so won a place at a four-day residential course run by the University of Cambridge, involving advanced lectures on quantum mechanics and undergraduate lab experiences. She is the first Surbiton High School student to make it to the camp and will hopefully be a trailblazer for those in the years below to follow in her footsteps.

Throughout the year, the Astronomy Club has been extremely well attended, with over forty pupils joining at the start of the year. Activities have included a virtual tour of the solar system, making models of the inside of the sun, making an icy dirty comet, considering the effects of supernovae and black holes, and making their own mini planetariums for studying the constellations.

The Sixth Form Further Physics Club have been learning some advanced Physics in an unashamedly mathematical way as preparation for external competitions and to give an insight into how Physics would be taught at university. Our Year 13 physicists have offers to study STEM degrees, including engineering and medicine. We wish them all the best in their future studies.



SIXTH FORM

t has been another very busy year for our Sixth Form students, who have excelled in so many academic and co-curricular areas. The following are just some of the many highlights as there is not enough space here to celebrate all of our students' successes.

We are again immensely proud of our students' successes with their higher education applications. We are confident this will be another bumper year, with students gaining places on a diverse range of courses, including places at Oxbridge colleges, aerospace engineering, medicine and veterinary science, music, law, speech and language therapy, Anglo-Saxon, Norse and Celtic as well as business management degree apprenticeships and the most competitive art

foundation courses. Students have also gained places at some of the world's most prestigious international universities, including Stanford and Yale.

On the sports field, our U18 football team continued to trailblaze as they competed in their first National Schools football final. This team has set the bar for future football teams to aspire to. There have also been great successes across a range of other sports, including Isabelle L becoming the UK U18 tennis champion. In the prestigious

Championship WJ18 eight events, the rowing team won a





silver medal against the fastest eights in the country and not to forget Freya R, Hettie W and Elani S who were selected for England U21 Hockey.

Last November, five of our students joined students from across United Learning for a COP27 simulation event at the British

Council. Our students confidentially negotiated with the other representatives on ways to reduce carbon dioxide emissions and their environmental impacts. Our students commented that they found the day challenging, enlightening and immensely rewarding.

Our students always appreciate hearing from people from a wide range of backgrounds and with a diversity of interests. In April, we were delighted to welcome Jess Phillips MP into School to speak to our students. Jess delivered an engaging talk on the challenges of being an MP and followed this with a Q&A session, giving our students an excellent opportunity to gain an understanding of how laws are proposed and refined, and the wider role of MPs in shaping our society.



SPORT Athletics

he weather hampered the start of the season's training programme but that did not stop a run of excellent performances in several competitions during the second half of the Summer Term. Our new outstanding facility at Xcel, which is used during athletics lessons, has no doubt enhanced the pupils' learning experience. In addition, training at Weir Archer has enabled pupils to specialise in field events to an even greater level.

The Guildford High and Claremont school meetings were well attended with strong competition from the other Surrey-based schools. The intersquad has had an excellent season.

Georgia G represented Kingston at the County Schools competition in the javelin event, finishing in third place after throwing a personal best. Exceptional attendance and positive feedback from the winter cricket programme validated its effectiveness in nurturing talent, promoting cricket as a year-round activity, and building a vibrant cricketing community at School.

We have a new partnership with the Rajasthan Royals at Reed's School with Cricket Scholars (Mayako D, Izzy H, Elana T, Minnie S) attending 1:1 sessions.

Pupils participated in closely fought matches, gaining valuable experience and pitch time. Our U15s showed resilience in a narrow defeat in the County Cup after putting up a tough opposition with spirited bowling. In the U14s, Izzy H and Mayako D displayed scholarly standard with excellent bowling. Our U13s were the epitome of good sportsmanship in a tough fixture. The U12s enjoyed an exciting game, with Isabelle J and Charlie J standing out with their excellent middle order partnership.

Having progressed to the National Cup's third round (where they won against Epsom College) the U15A side confidently faced Emanuel School. Batting first, the team were 23/3 off



seven overs. This brought a partnership of Izzy Y and Georgie C to the crease, that not only kicked on the scoring rate but couldn't be broken. SPORT Rowing

he end of last year's rowing season finished in triumphant success with our best ever racing season with 60 gold medals, 37 silver medals and 31 bronze medals. At the National Schools' Regatta, we topped the table for the leading girls' school in the country. At the Henley Royal Regatta, we made it through to the semi-finals. Eight pupils represented Great Britain. At the Junior World Championships, two of our athletes rowed in the eight winning a silver medal, while one athlete represented GB at the Coupe de la Jeunesse winning two gold medals. Five U16 pupils were selected to represent GB in the annual GB v France match.

2022/23 started with the largest contingent of rowers the programme has ever had, putting us as the biggest girls' rowing programme in the country.

The first two races were Kingston Small Boats Head and Teddington Head. Both raced over 5,000m and netting us a total of 14 1st, 13 2nd and nine 3rd place finishes.Next, was the prestigious Hampton Small Boats Head which attracts junior crews from across the country and is the first real test of racing at a national level in small boats.

Our rowers hauled in three 1st, two 2nd and three 3rd places. Our first tideway head race this season was Quintin Head, which was raced only in eights and where we achieved three 1st and two 2nd places along with the winners of the Quintin Hogg Memorial Prize.

Our yearly Gala at Richmond Golf Club was a highlight, with 200 partygoers celebrating our Boat Club's success, raising funds, presenting awards, and dancing. Alumna, Lola Anderson, a full-time GB athlete, was our guest speaker.

Our rowers come up with the great tally of wins totalling four 1st places, seven 2nd places and one 3rd place in the Hampton Big Boats Head race. The first National event was The Schools Head on the tideway, where our rowers won two gold medals and two silver medals. The Junior Sculling Head raced at Dorney Lake with over 3,000 competitors and the medals are hotly contested. We won four gold medals and one bronze medal.

During April, the J14, J15 and J16 squads qualified several boats to represent 'Thames London' at the Junior Inter-Regional Regatta. All our rowers medalled, winning gold for the J15 quad and J16 eight, and silver for the J14 quad. At Wallingford Regatta, a multi-lane race over 2,000m our rowers came away with one 1st place, two 2nd places and two

3rd places. Next on our roll call of races was the Junior Sculling Regatta where we sent along our J14 squad, and they won the A and B octuple event.

Three days of racing was next up on







the calendar, with the National Schools Regatta where 5,000 rowers compete over three days of racing. This year, we sent a large contingent of rowers to compete form J14 through to J18. The first day of racing had our J14 and J15 squads racing for the much-coveted medals - gold for the WJ14 second octuple; silver for the WJ14 first octuple, WJ15 second eight, WJ16 coxed four and WJ18 second eight; and bronze for the WJ14 third octuple. In the Prestigious Championship WJ18 eights event, we won a silver medal racing against the fastest eights in the country. This event bagged a total of 68 individual medals for the Surbiton High School rowers.

On an international level, Maddie and Izzie have raced for Great Britain at the Munich Regatta, where Izzie won a gold and bronze medal.

The summer break brought a wave of triumph for Surbiton High School rowers as they clinched multiple medals, including a World Championship title. Among the standout achievements, Izzie K emerged as a World Champion, securing four gold medals and three silver medals.

Our J16 4+ (Paloma C, Siobhan S Emily S, Lucia K and Hannah J) were selected to compete for the U16 GB team in an annual

match against France - our girls won their race, one of only a handful of GB crews that came away victorious.

Steffi B competed for Team England at the Home International Regatta in the JW4+ and JW8+ - she gained a silver in the 4+ and an amazing gold in the 8+.

Emily S competed for Great Britain at the Coupe de La Jeunesse (Europeans) in Amsterdam. Emily won a gold in the JW8+ and a silver in the JW4+ on both days of the event - four international medals in total. Flo G, our own coach, was selected to coach these boats. A fantastic achievement for both of them.

Madeleine G (JW4-) and Izzie K (JW8+) competed for Great Britain at the U19 World Rowing Championships at the future Olympic Lake in Paris. Madeleine rowed fantastically to get a silver medal - narrowly missing gold. Izzie K became a World Champion in the 8+ - taking gold in a photo finish with Germany, Romania and the USA.

The rowing community takes immense pride in the accomplishments of these extraordinary athletes, who have not only showcased their skills but also represented the School and country on an international platform.











SPORT Skiing

fter a successful regional qualifier, a five-team strong squad travelled to the English Schools National Finals. The U12 team consisted of Girls' Prep School pupils; it was noted the quality of

this team, whilst finishing second in the female race, would have still been quick enough to win the boys' race. The U14 skiers, from Year 8, showed fantastic tenacity and effort to come away victorious.

The afternoon saw the U16 category. The A-team, with a wealth of experience, worked hard skiing to their full potential winning in a national title. The B-team was not outdone, and, for most, this was their first National Final. They did themselves proud winning 5th place amongst a mix of exceptionally strong teams.

The U19s, having qualified with a full complement of skiers a few weeks before, incurred a last-minute injury leaving the team with three skiers instead of four. The pupils did everything in their power against strong teams at full strength, coming away with the bronze; something they can be exceptionally proud of. Both open teams qualified for the British Schools Championships.

Before that race though, 30 pupils experienced the Surrey Schools Championships, where first-time racers mixed with Ski Scholars. This was a great day, where winning a plethora of team and individual medals across all age groups was the icing on the cake.

2023 saw the British School Girls Champs in France where skiers had two days training, before the Dual Slalom race. After three comfortable wins we were in the quarter finals against Reeds. With two ex-Surbiton High School pupils in their team, it would be a tough race. It was neck and neck, with us taking a small lead, Reeds then catching up. The final skiers started together battling throughout. The video was checked for the too-close-to-call-by-the-eye finish. Surbiton High School A-team had won! No time to celebrate; back up they went for the next race! After beating Aiglon in the semis, Wellington School was next. Our skiiers had trained hard for this moment, and they completely delivered coming away as Dual Slalom champions!

A great start in the Giant Slalom race put the A and B-teams in a strong position for day two. It was a tense wait until the prize

giving for the overall combined results. We won the Eve Alcott memorial cup for the fastest combined B-team. With alumnae skier, Chemmy, presenting her mother's trophy to the Surbiton High School B-team, this was a special moment for all.

Then to Italy with 21 pupils for the Interschools Challenge Cup. Female and male skiers compete in this event, in races split by sex. Therefore, with no males competing within our team we could only pick up half of the points on offer – before we hit the slopes! What a phenomenal achievement it was finishing 3rd overall given other teams could compete in all of the races. Nothing stopped us picking up a plethora of individual age group medals and displaying talent, resilience and determination!

The British Schools Indoor Championships saw the ski team achieve the following:

- U15 Team Winners (Immy M, Saskia S, Darcy D, Amy-Rose E)
- Individuals 1st and 2nd for Darcy & Freya
- U19 Team Winners (Jenna M, Ciara Mc, Ella B and Freya T - skiing up 2 years)

The ski team travelled to Welwyn Garden City for their final race of the year; the London Schools Champs. Each race is split into two sections to accommodate advance racers and those competing for the first time, which gives an excellent opportunity. As the largest running school ski programme in the country, this allows more pupils to compete. Support for those racing for the first time from their peers was excellent. The teamwork was truly fantastic and we came away with impressive results, including:

- Years 7-9: A-team winners, B-team 3rd. 1st and 3rd individuals for Freya and Darcy
- Years 10+: A-team winners & B-team 4th. Clean sweep of individual medals for Ciara 1st, Charlotte 2nd and Jenna 3rd

The team point calculation revealed that Surbiton High School was the overall school champions and fastest London school. And it hasn't just been about racing. The Ski Club's current expansion has seen 193 pupils ski for at least a term, if not weekly all year. We have lots of happy pupils engaging in a sport which isn't provided, to this level, at any other school.

SPORT Tennis

he Autumn and Spring Terms tend to be relatively quiet for our tennis players in terms of school competitions. However, after successfully coming through the county rounds, our U15 team had the opportunity to compete in the latter rounds of the Schools Team Tennis, a national event that extends beyond the school calendar. Despite a strong performance, they narrowly lost in the regional finals against a formidable team from Queenswood School. Nevertheless, their impressive achievement of finishing in the top 12 in the country greatly contributed to our year-end ranking.

Throughout the year, our scholarship training programme remains in full swing, supporting and guiding our players as they participate in various individual tournaments outside of School. This year, we are proud to have had seven players competing on the British Tour and four players in ITFs, all experiencing great success witnessing continuous improvement in their national international and rankings. Undoubtedly, the highlight of the year thus far has been Isabelle L's triumph at the LTA U18 National Championships, securing her a spot at junior Wimbledon for the third consecutive year. At only 16 years old, her outstanding achievement also earned her a wildcard into the Wimbledon Women's qualifying draw - an exceptional feat.

On the topic of Wimbledon, our ball girl programme has once again proven successful. Surbiton High School is privileged to have the opportunity to train and nominate some of our pupils for the official Wimbledon ball girl trials. The selection process is rigorous, but this year we are proud to announce that three of our pupils successfully made it through and joined the two pupils who participated last year at the 2022 Championships. It is truly remarkable to have our pupils both competing and serving as ball girls at Wimbledon.

We have recently received the official LTA rankings for 2022, albeit with a slight delay in their publication this year. Following an exceptional year in 2022, Surbiton High School finished as the second-best-ranked tennis school in Great Britain, surpassing our previous third-place finishes over the past six years. These rankings take into account the school's performance in the U13, U15, and U18 National events. Our U18 team's victory in the event, coupled with our B-team's qualification for the finals, significantly contributed to our success.

As we moved into the Summer Term, our tennis clubs bustled with activity, open to all interested pupils. Alongside friendly fixtures, our focus shifted to the Surrey league event.

Special mention goes to our U13 pairs who had a fantastic run in the ISTA National Schools Doubles event held at Eton College. They both won through two qualifying groups to make it to the main draw. Anais and Darcey had a good run to the quarter-finals, despite giving away several years in age to the competition. Sofia and Audrina also had a fantastic run, winning 10 matches in a row to reach the finals, but sadly, they lost to a very strong pair from

Sevenoaks. Great job, team!

Our U18s were once again successful in qualifying for the U18 National Finals (Aberdare Cup). Due to our current players having such high rankings, we were pre-seeded along with the other top three schools in GB straight through to the finals. The team played unbelievably well all week, showing their typical fighting spirit in every round to reach the final. Despite their best efforts, they were outplayed on the day by a fantastic team from Queenswood School. The Queenswood team will now represent England at the World Schools finals in Bahrain next year. Good luck to them!

YOUNG ENTERPRISE

t was another very successful year for our Year 12 students participating in Young Enterprise - a charitable nationwide business programme which provides students with the opportunity to establish a business, create, design and market a product, sell it to customers, and (if all goes to plan) generate a profit. It is highly valued by universities and employers for developing leadership skills, creativity, an understanding of teamwork and commercial awareness. Many Surbiton High School alumni proudly reference Young Enterprise in their LinkedIn profiles.

As usual, a large number of students were keen to commit to this year's programme, enabling us to run two teams: Mode de Vie and Iris. Concerned about recent news reports around personal safety, Mode de Vie developed a self-defence key chain. They designed this themselves to differentiate it from similar products available on the market. Iris made "affirmation candles", their unique selling points being the addition of sustainable mini-crystals to the candle wax and a booklet to accompany the candle containing positive messages linked to particular crystals.

There is a role for everyone in a Young Enterprise company, be that management, social media, finance, design, marketing or sales. The teams met at their own formal board meetings after School once a week to discuss their product and to implement initiatives to raise capital to fund product development. The Year 7 disco, which the teams ran jointly in the Autumn Term, proved an excellent way of generating initial





funds and enhancing team spirit.

The selling season started with the School Christmas Fair and then continued into the Spring Term with opportunities to sell at a local trade fair in Kingston town centre and at a very large trade fair in Spitalfields Market in the City of London. These events selling products that the teams have created to members of the public are excellent for building confidence and communication skills. They are huge fun for the students too, taking them out of their comfort zone in an invigorating way. At Spitalfields, there were over 50 schools taking part so it was a remarkable achievement, amongst such competition, for the managing director of Iris to be awarded the 'Future Female Leader' prize.

Other competitions ran throughout the Spring Term and Mode de Vie excelled, winning a national award for their video advertising their keyring and being voted 'Second Best Company' at the Kingston Schools Area Final. The latter award enabled the company to progress to the South London Schools Final where they won the prize for best marketing.

Young Enterprise creates an environment where students discover strengths and skills that they were not aware they had. This year was no exception and Mode de Vie and Iris learned so much about themselves and about business, confirming that Young Enterprise is a fantastic way for students to put their foot on the first rung of the working ladder in a supportive, stimulating, and enjoyable environment.
