

Cleveland Football is on the move – both on the field and in the community! My focus as a coach continues to be building a strong, united team by instilling in every player the importance of our team culture – Honor, Integrity, and Discipline = Virtue and Value. I hope this team will take these values to heart and apply them both on the field and forward into their lives beyond Cleveland.

This year, we tripled the number of freshmen players from last season, and I'm encouraged by the growth potential of this team. We decided to play as a JV team this season to help our players gain more experience and confidence on the field. We

are currently at a 2-2 season with five more games. I'm excited for the future of Cleveland Football, and we train, practice, and grow together as a team.

Off the field, we worked together to represent Cleveland High School in the community proudly. In July, the team marched with our family and fans in the Seafair Parade! We paid special honor to two Fallen Eagles and CHS football players, Louis Gray ('82) and Brian Carlin ('86), by carrying banners with their pictures (made possible by the CHSAA) down the streets of downtown Seattle. The Gray and Carlin families joined us by marching alongside the team, and we were proud to honor our fellow Eagle football

brothers that day. In addition, we were wearing Gray and Carlin's initials on our helmets this season and honored them at halftime during our Homecoming game, which we won 30–12 against Lincoln – the highest-scoring game for us in four seasons! Cleveland Football has also built a significant partnership with the Seattle Seahawks and the Virginia Mason Athletic Center (VMAC), who provided 53 pairs of football cleats to our players and tickets to the Seahawk festiveal this year.

In November, the team will join forces with MenOFValue to feed and clothe the homeless at a community outreach event at Lumen Field. These team activities helped me reinforce our team culture and the importance of being a good football player and caring about our community. I also want to thank the CHSAA for the generous Fallen Eagle donations that helped us purchase new uniforms and helmets this Fall. CHS GOLFER TOUNALOM COMPETES AT PEBBLE BEACH

Cleveland Senior Colin Tounalom was one of 80 First Tee participants selected to play in the 2023 PURE Insurance Championship Impacting First Tee tournament at Pebble Beach Golf Links and Spyglass Hill Golf Course in September. The annual event, now in its 20th year, brought teens from First Tee chapters across the country to meet, play, and be mentored by PGA TOUR Champions players and amateurs. The tournament was televised around the world on the Golf Channel.

First Tee was formed in 1997 as a partnership among several professional golf associations to make the sport affordable and accessible for all kids. First Tee is committed to helping kids build character strengths and important life skills through the game of golf. Colin joined the First Tee chapter out of Jefferson Park Golf Course on Beacon Hill when he was just nine years old.

"My dad wanted us to learn golf because it's a sport you can play your entire life, even when you're old," laughed Colin, "Luckily, I learned to love the game, and now I coach younger golfers in the First Tee program."



Tounalom was paired with Tour Pro Mark HensTby from Australia, placing 42nd in the tournament.

Tournament participants ranged in age from 14 to 18. They were selected by a national panel of judges based on their personal growth and development through First Tee's programs, as well as their playing ability. On average, selected golfers have been involved with First Tee for over seven years, have a 3.95 GPA, and have recorded a 1.5 handicap. Colin has eight years of First Tee participation and boasts a 4.0 GPA and a 4.7 handicap!

"This was a one-in-a-lifetime opportunity", says Colin, "I met First Tee golfers from across the country and PGA TOUR Champions players I've been watching play my entire life. I was paired with Tour Pro Mark Hensby from Australia, and we placed 42nd in the tournament. It was an incredible experience."

Colin will graduate from Cleveland as a member of the Class of 2024 and plans to pursue a 4-year college degree. "If college golf is an opportunity at a school I want to attend, then I'll consider it," says Colin, "but my education comes first, so we will see!"

A DAY AT THE FOREST

The Cleveland Connects Summer Bridge Program spent the day at the Cleveland High School Memorial Forest in July. Teachers Joseph Mingo, Kacey Cambell, Anna Leslie, Jenn Kekuna, and Counselor Chloe Kimiai accompanied almost 50 incoming 9th graders and student helpers to experience the beauty of the outdoors.

The group gathered near Fall City, where they received an introduction to the forest from Alumni Bernie Moskowitz and John Barton. This included a brief history lesson on how the forest came to be and how it is being preserved. The students then gathered around the firepit and worked as a team to build a bonfire, where they later roasted hotdogs and enjoyed burgers from

the grill. They ended their visit with self-guided hikes over the various trails and took note of the different types of plants and green spaces they encountered.

Many of our students don't get to go on trips like this outside of Seattle, so it was a great experience for them. They connected with the Alumni and gathered in a space so special to Cleveland.

The Cleveland Connects Summer Bridge Program is a 3-week program that allows incoming Freshmen to experience what high school is about before returning to school in the Fall. Students get to experience relationship-building, project-based learning, and social-emotional learning. The Bridge program has been available to students since 2012.

IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CHS MEMORIAL FOREST

The photo to the right shows the entrance to the Cleveland High School Memorial Forest. It's not very impressive. The unpaved driveway on the right leads to a crude-looking gate.

I'm sure some people have driven by for years and never realized that this is the property where CHS Alumni honor 43 of their classmates who sacrificed their lives while fighting in the United States military, starting with World War II (32), Korea (7), and then Vietnam (4).

There used to be a wooden sign calling it the "CLEVELAND MEMORIAL FOREST," with no mention of its association with the high school in Seattle. We suspect this sign was used for firewood by a homeless person living in the area.

The bronze plaques (listing our war dead) were ripped off and likely sold as scrap metal. We replaced the plaques with a granite monument --- granite lasts for 1000s of years, is too heavy to steal, and has a low resale value. Similarly, as shown in the following sketch, we want to replace the wooden sign with a granite sign that correctly names the property as the CLEVELAND HIGH SCHOOL MEMORIAL FOREST. But we need more than just the granite sign. We need to modify the overall setting for the entrance, including the following action items:

- Clear an area for the sign by removing trees and brush from an area measuring approximately 50 feet wide by 25 feet deep, adding landfill, leveling the ground, and expanding parking.
- Construct a concrete base for the granite sign.
- Install lighting to illuminate the sign from both sides.
- · Install a wrought-iron fence behind the sign with a gate.



As with all improvements to the property, it requires donations by alumni to make this improvement and others a reality.

As you can see in this issue and other newsletter articles, teachers use the CHS Memorial Forest more frequently to benefit their teaching needs. In this first week of October, Ms. Clare Sobetski of the Washington State Department of Natural Resources took five busloads of students to the forest for educational studies associated with the environment. WHAT IF IT RAINS? The students are vulnerable to the rain if the weather turns bad. We need funding to rebuild the Lyceum. The Lyceum was an opensided structure built in the 1960s by the alums. It measured 50x25 feet. During the late 1900s, we lost this structure due to arson. We need to provide another structure made of metal so that it won't be vulnerable to arson.

We need your FINANCIAL SUPPORT to make these dreams a REALITY.

This is our second re-design of the sign for the Cleveland High School Memorial Forest sign. The estimated cost of the carved granite stone is \$16,470. Our design features a carved granite stone sign on a granite slab. The granite slab measures 100 x 38 inches, with identical carving on both sides. Internal steel bars would extend vertically from the concrete slab into the granite to provide stability. READINGS FROM PAT SULLIVAN'S BOOK



HONORED DEAD

The following text is from Patricia Sullivan Rosenkranz's Book Honored Dead: The Story of Cleveland High School's World War II Gold Star Men.

Richard Cornell June 23, 1919 - April 29, 1943



While the Japanese were taking possession of the Phillippines and other islands in the Pacific, efforts were being made to send troops and armor to fight the Germans and Italians in Europe and North Africa. Prior to our declared involvement in the war, President Roosevelt and Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill made an agreement giving top priority to defeating Hitler and the Axis. Rather than attempt to deliver reinforcements to the Pacific forces, North Africa and Europe became the main focus for American troops and supplies.

Control of the Mediterranean Sea and Island bases within the sea was vital in the battle to defeat the Germans and Italians. Cut off from shipping lanes and landing ports, they would be unable to wage attacks or receive necessary materials. The lands in Libya, Malta, Sicily, and Italy became areas of major military campaigns.

British armies had been in Egypt since the beginning of the war. From Cairo the British waged campaigns against Italians troops and, in December of 1940, the Italians were driven from Egypt into Libya. The Germans then sent air forces and armored corps to support the Italian troops. Field Marshal Rommel be-

gan campaigns in March 1941, moving into Egypt and attacking nearby ports. From that date, until May 1943, a series of battles were fought with victories and defeats on both sides.

On November 7, 1942, three American forces were transported to the African Coast by U.S. and British Navies. Ten thousand troops from the 39th Regiment, 9th Infantry, known as the Fighting Falcons of the 39th were the first to enter Africa from the shores of Algiers. Richard Cornell was a member of that unit.

Richard was at Cleveland High School in 1935. He is pictured with the Junior High Boys' Cooking Club, but there are no photographs after that year. As happened with many young men at that time, it is possible he enlisted in the service before graduation in 1940. He was with The Fighting Falcons in 1943.

After the November landing in Algiers, the drive against Rommel's armies began as the Allies moved toward Tunisia. On February 11, 1943, General Dwight D. Eisenhower was named commander-in-chief in North Africa, and he established headquarters in Algiers. General George Patton commanded the Seventhy Army, and as they moved to Libya and Tunisia from the west, General Montgomery's British troops moved in from Egypt. German-Italian troops were meeting defeat on several fronts. By March 1943 the Allies were overtaking Tunisia. The 39th Regiment 9th Infantry was part of that battle.

The Falcon's symbol was AAA-O, "Anything, Anywhere, Anytime, Bar Nothing." This motto was given to them by Colonel "Paddy" Flint, who became the regimental commander in Sicily, following the downfall of Tunisia. The final attack on Tunisia began April 23, 1943. On May 7 the German forces were defeated, and North Africa was freed from Axis control. Much of the Mediterranean Sea was open for shipping materials and transporting troops, and the move into Siciliy and on to Italy began.

The Fighting Falcons of the 39th

moved to Sicily, and from there they participated in battles in Normandy, Northern France, Belgium, and Central Europe proudly displaying their AAA-O symbol on their helmets and vehicles, an unusual practice during campaigns. When questioned about this, Colonel Flint commented that if the enemy lived through a battle, they would know to run the next time they saw that symbol. The Falcons earned three Presidental Unit Citations, as well as citations for valorous action from the Belgians and French.

Richard, one of the many who helped the 29th earn its reputation as Fearless Fighters, did not live to see the honors bestowed on his regiment. He died during the final battles to drive the Germans from North Africa. A credit to his Regiment, Richard was killed April 29, 1943. he is buried in Plot D, Row 5, Grave 5, at the North African-American Cemetery, Carthage, Tunisia.



By 1943 the Axis controlled Europe from France to Russia, Noway, and Finland. Control in North Africa extended from Morocco to Egypt. American and British forces moved across North Africa to defeat the German armies.


Rev Dr. Dorothea "Dottie" Widger Brooks, '59, passed away in a rehabilitation facility near her home for many years in Amherst, New York. She succumbed to cancer. She was seen daily by her two children, daughters, one from New York, the other from Tacoma, Washington. Her brother, Dr Charles Widger, CHS '61 of Bellevue, Washington, arrived

in Amherst the night she died. After graduating from Cleveland High School, she attended the University of Washington in 1963 with a BS in microbiology. In performing work in the microbiology laboratories there, she met her future husband, Sheldon Brooks, of Tacoma. They shared a passion for mountain climbing. Dottie had been introduced to hiking with her family, taking her first 4-day pack trip at age 13 with her father and brother. This pack trip followed the Pacific Crest Trail north from Chinook Pass to Government Meadows, then southeast along a forest road to a campground on the Little Naches River. The valley for the Crystal Mountain Ski resort was then uncleared of forest. She and Sheldon climbed several major peaks in Washington State. including Mount Olympus, Mount Saint Helens (well before the 1980 eruption), Mount Adams, Mount Baker, and Mount Rainier. Following her University of Washington graduation and marriage, the couple moved to Massachusetts, where Sheldon had found work as an engineer in a company produced wastewater equipment for pulp mills.

Dottie attended the Hartford Seminary Foundation (now the Hartford Seminary) in Connecticut for preordination studies. She completed these in 1967 and returned to Seattle to be ordained at the Beacon Hill Congregational church on S Forest Street, now the First Baptist Church. She returned to the Boston area, where she served as vouth minister for a church. She began to participate on several archeological digs in Israel, which kindled her interest in the Old Testament. She returned to the Hartford Seminary Foundation and was awarded a Ph.D. in biblical studies. For her dissertation, she identified the source of clay in pottery shards through neutron activation of rare earth elements of the shards and clay samples taken from wadis in

Israel. She used the Brookhaven National Laboratories on Long Island, New York, to perform the neutron bombardment and identify the percentages of the rare earth elements. While her husband had entered medical school in Guadalaiara. Mexico. Dottie moved to Buffalo, New York, where she taught classes at both Canisius College, a Roman Catholic private school, and the University at Buffalo, one of the four university centers of the State University of New York. She also served several local churches as a minister in several capacities. She returned to Seattle in 1980 to officiate the wedding of her brother. Charles. at the Plymouth United Church of Christ on 6th Avenue. She returned again in 2005 to renew their vows in celebration of their 25th wedding anniversary.

A joint memorial for Dottie was held by two religious communities, much influenced by Dottie. One was the Congregation Shir Shalom of Williamsville, New York, led by Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein. The Torah study group appreciated her expertise in the Old Testament and her knowledge its original languages. The other was the Cleveland Heights Christian Church of Cheektowaga, New York, under Rev Jennifer Heckmann. Rev Heckmann regarded Dottie as a valued mentor. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the congregants for the memorial gathered at their respective religious facilities and on the internet via meeting software.

KAREN ANN (SCHUEHLE) FRANK '59



craftsmanship, and unwavering love for his family and friends. His presence will be deeply missed, but his memory will forever be cherished.



Mary was also a scrapbooker, a very talented and prolific one. Her legacy includes carefully crafted scrapbooks from the early 70s to 2018, the current one she was working on. In addition to big annual books, she made special scrapbooks for her children's weddings, grandchildren's birth, annual Hawaii trip memories, and Sewing Club exploits. She would find special paper to coincide with adventures and save receipts and memorabilia to add depth and stories to her lovingly crafted pages.

Mary was passionate about genealogy. Tracing the lineage of our family and all those connected to it was her ultimate scavenger hunt. She visited cemeteries, libraries, and records offices all over the country, often with her close friend and genealogy mentor Barbara, and dug deep through her Ancestry and other online resources. When a diverse and extensive collection of family photos and archival material came into her possession from numerous sources, she set about on a monumental 6+ year project, creating a multigenerational family heritage album of 92 pages, and then duplicating that effort more than a dozen times to ensure that every branch of her family tree

had this wonderful resource.

She had an incredible memory bank, filled with unique family stories, anecdotes, and curious situations. When she wasn't researching or creating, she was an avid reader and consumed books at an alarming rate. She loved a good Hallmark Movie and lived a life straight off the pages of one.

Mary's second family was her close friends. Over the years, she amassed a special group of friends you could truly only classify as family. From the early days of her M2H group to the close village of team members in the Camp Huston, Wonder Bar & Z-Team fireworks enterprises, to a dozen or so Monroe-area families coined "The Sewing Group," her network both respected and loved her deeply. The outpouring of emotions following her passing has clearly demonstrated how her unique approach to life ensured her impact upon all who were fortunate enough to know her. A dear friend expressed this so well when she wrote:

"She lived her life with verve, and she was not afraid to color outside the lines".

Mary & Carl raised their children alongside these parents, who also had children of similar ages. Their group stories, adventures, memories, and shenanigans across annual Lodge weekends, trips to Pacific Beach, Omak, Sun Lakes, summer picnics, and the Gorge Amphitheater, plus holiday gatherings and many more events, are so very special.

Carl & Mary loved to travel, spending almost half the year on adventure. Their destinations were nearly always proximal to special friends and family. From annual pilgrimages to Hawaii, time spent East of the mountains, Heaven Can Wait Lodge, Lake Pend Oreille, and along the WA and OR beaches. A couple of their favorite adventures took them around the Pacific Rim, to Ireland, Italy, and the Soviet Union at the time of its demise.

On June 29, 2023, we held an "URGENT" Special Board meeting in person at the call of our President, Bernie Moskowitz. The purpose was to address concerns raised by our board members regarding the generous donation of \$15,000 for the 2030 Veteran Project from our former board member, Alison Sing. 
