With support from The City of Kenosha, the Kenosha Public Library spearheaded an initiative through Kenosha Park Alliance to establish a summer parks program for youth. Lincoln Park, Hobbs Park and Roosevelt Park collaborated with various community agencies to provide enrichment programming. Kenosha Public Library was honored to receive this award for our role in implementing, supporting, and growing the Kenosha Parks Alliance project. The Kenosha Parks Alliance brings positive youth programming to parks throughout the center city of Kenosha.
